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
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IN THE HOT SEAT

The last month has seen us without a home game before last week which puts pressure on cash flow and as we rely heavily on gate income we need you to spread the word.



A Potted History of Doncaster by Don Yates

THE history of Doncaster Rugby League Club is one of almost constant struggle. The club was admitted into the league for the 1951-52 season and in the fifty-two seasons since then Doncaster have finished bottom of the pile on no fewer than 14 occasions. Their best season was, in fact, their first when they ended the campaign in eleventh position, higher in the table than Leeds and St.Helens incidentally.

Doncaster's most memorable season came in 1993-94 when the club ended the campaign as Division Two runners-up. Promotion to the First Division, the Super League of that time, was ample compensation for a disappointing defeat against London Crusaders in the Divisional Premiership competition.

There was an even more memorable start to their season in the top flight. They opened the campaign at St.Helens where they won 29-20 and the following Friday Doncaster beat Widnes 21-6 to top the First Division table. Little wonder that their next home match against Leeds attracted a crowd of 6,440 to Tattersfield, their biggest ever crowd at that venue. Alas the Dons were unable to maintain their high-flying position and at the end of that 1994-95 season they were bottom of Division One. Worst still the club went into liquidation. Doncaster were reformed later that summer but the newly formed club had to start the following season down in Division Two. National League Two in today's terms.

Despite their perennial struggle, Doncaster have appeared in one final. In 1965 the Rugby Football League staged a bottom-14 competition and Doncaster reached the final after beating Batley 24-9 and then Blackpool Borough 22-9. Their opponents in the final were Huddersfield and the match attracted a crowd of 2,450 to Tattersfield. Oldham's Sam Shepherd refereed the match and, after a hard fought encounter, Huddersfield won 13-3.

Recent good results indicate that

Doncaster are on course to reach another final, in this case the National League One Grand Final and, with it. an opportunity to gain Super League status. In order to gain promotion, however, Doncaster will have to perform much better in the play-off series than they have during the past four years. The Dons have qualified for the play-offs twice during that time. Last year they ended the regular season in sixth position but then were surprisingly beaten 27-14 by Batley at Belle Vue. Oldham followers will remember with relish the end of Doncaster's promotion challenge at the end of the 2000 campaign. Doncaster held strong ambitions of going up after finishing the season in third position. After finishing in such a lofty position, Doncaster could afford one slip-up. It came in the opening play-off match when Doncaster visited Keighley and were beaten 44-22. From then on it would be all sudden death starting with the visit of Oldham. The attendance at Belle Vue for the visit of the Roughyeds was a record 2,599. Oldham were enjoying a good run at that time and this looked like continuing when they jumped into a 14-0 lead. Doncaster came back strongly to equalise at 16-16 and force extra time. Viewers to the award winning Rugby League Raw television programme produced by Yorkshire Television saw plenty of raw emotion as the Roughveds snatched a 24-17 victory after a compelling afternoon of superb rugby league action.

Of Roughyeds And ... The Dons

TODAY we extend a warm welcome to the players, officials and supporters of the Doncaster club in what promises to be another close encounter in this ever so competitive NRL Division one.

Although Doncaster first entered the league for the 1951-52 season it would be another twelve years before our two clubs met in a second division match at Watersheddings on October 12th 1963. The Roughyeds won that match comfortably by 45 – 13 and three weeks later completed the double at Tattersfield in a much closer match (12-6). The Dons took their first

point off Oldham in a nine points each drawn game at Watersheddings on March 20th 1971. The first cup tie between the teams was in the first round of the Challenge Cup on February 26th 1978 with Oldham emerging victorious (21 – 7).

The Dons first victory over Oldham came on September 27th 1987 when the so far unbeaten Roughyeds fell to a last minute try and conversion to end up on the wrong side of a 20 – 18 scoreline. The return at Watersheddings was even closer with Oldham scraping home 18 – 17. The

next time Oldham visited Tattersfield there were reverse fortunes to their previous visit when this time Oldham snatched a last minute victory courtesy of a John Fairbank try.

A famous victory for Doncaster came in the Challenge cup 5th round of 1994, when a useful looking Oldham team were soundly beaten 20 – 0 again at Tattersfield.

Since then the matches between the two sides have usually been close affairs, notwithstanding this seasons thrashing at Belle Vue. However, that match will long be remembered by the Roughyeds fans for Chris Campbell's amazing try only seven seconds after the kick off!

I THOUGHT the Rugby League Express report on last Sunday's game against Featherstone Rovers summed up my feeling on the game exactly, "....it would have been good value if the entrance charge had been doubled." Whatever anybody does however make sure Chris Hamilton doesn't get to read this when he returns from holiday on Saturday or he might take it literally. It really was great entertainment value whether you were an Oldham or Featherstone fan or even a neutral. The final paragraph of the report was also a great compliment to both teams and the game in general. "Would someone like to send a video of this game to ITV Sport? If they did there might be a third player in the game's auction of TV rights?

What a good result it was, even though we engineered it that we had to win the game twice, and in that searing heat. There is no doubt that our excellent completion rate gave us the upper hand in the exhaustion stakes late in the game. Other results also went our way, especially the Dewsbury - Whitehaven draw which means we are now only two points off the fourth spot - it's very close in the middle of the table and today's game and next week's away to Dewsbury are vital games for us. Mind you, I seem to have been saving that about every game this season, it's that competitive.

Now onto other good news -Oldham's second row forward/centre.

Lee Doran has been chosen in the 28 man Ireland squad for this autumn's European Championship. Lee has not had as good a season as many expected - but he has to learn how to cope with being a marked man - a compliment to his achievements last season. Personally I am pleased to see him playing in the centre and last week I think we saw the advantage of his great ball handling skills. Just one point that struck me after the game it might not be important - but didn't he play most of his rugby last season on the right hand side? I just wondered if playing on the left hand side this season both in the back row and at centre might have had some significance? Anyway, that apart, congratulations are due to Lee on his selection, one of only six players from outside of Super League. Let's hope his season goes from strength to strenath.

On a final optimistic note - it must be the good weather - wasn't it great to see over 1800 spectators at the York - Keighley game last Sunday? Not only that, York gained a victory over the league leaders - the change in fortune for the newly formed York club can only be good for the game as can Bramley's attempt to rejoin the league in National League 3.

Let's hope we have another good result today and we hope to see lots of you up at the Social Club after the game for a "Barbecue" - hopefully the sun will shine for us again.

Back On The Terraces

WHAT AN EXCELLENT performance against Featherstone here at Boundary Park last week. We looked a completely different proposition to the side that was humiliated at Spotland a week earlier. In a similar situation to the Leigh game here, we backed up from a poor run of form to produce the goods and this led me to think about one or two of the possible reasons for our 'consistently inconsistent' season thus far. As a result, here I break with the traditions of this column and, whether you either agree or disagree with the following observations, as a fellow Roughyed supporter I'm just glad if you care enough to have an opinion and I make no apologies for mine.

Individually, a few performances stand out. Jon Goddard, easily our most consistent back all season, has been a revelation at full back - without doubt he is a natural number 1. His defensive positional play is outstanding and matched only by his appetite for

attacking involvement.

As a result of Goddard reverting to full back, Doddy's move to the flank may have come as an initial disappointment to him. However, you wouldn't have noticed with his performances as he has produced some powerful displays from the wing, particularly from acting half when returning the ball early in the sets. Indeed, had the centres seen more of the football (and I'm coming to that) I'm sure that Doddy would have had even more opportunity to demonstrate the kind of devastating finishing that he showed at Batley.

Another knock on effect from Goddard's move to full back is the hole that his absence has left in the centres. Various options have been used to plug the gap ranging from the loan signing of Potter from Widnes to 'moving Doran out from the pack'. I stress this as he has already effectively been playing a centre's role when wearing the number 11 shirt.

Firstly, let me open up by saying that Lee has got exceptional ability and had a magnificent season last season when his work rate was phenomenal. It therefore came as no surprise that he was generating interest from certain Super League clubs. However, I'm sure that Lee himself would be the first to admit that he has not been reproducing that form this term. Personally I don't see him as 'a marked man' but do think that despite his pace he's simply not suited to playing down the flank, particularly defensively where he finds himself positionally vulnerable at times.

Similarly, on attack Lee has the great ability to turn in the tackle and release a pass but, when positioned out wide he rarely gets the chance to utilise that skill. As a result of this we are often playing with three 'go forwards' rather than four which can result in his work hungry coach taking two or even three drives in a set of six whilst Lee can be stood waiting out wide for a ball that never reaches him. Personally, I believe he is a prop/second rower in the Darren Shaw mould but obviously a few years younger and somewhat better looking. There's no doubting Lee's ability and let's hope the good news of his selection to the Ireland squad gives him the confidence boost that he needs. It will certainly be interesting is to see where he is played should he be selected.

The key area where I believe that we have struggled all year is at halfback. Neil Roden's return to fitness and form is extremely welcome, not solely because of the extra attacking options he offers but

also his scrambling defence that perhaps goes unnoticed but is absolutely second to none throughout NL1. On entering the fray last Sunday, he combined magnificently with Simon Svabic to produce some of the best ball distribution that we have seen all season. Indeed, both have the ability to individually threaten the line as well as have the ball handling skills and timing to know when to link with the back line.

His faultless place kicking apart, Svabic delivers the ball with pinpoint accuracy and, together with Roden, constantly keeps the defence guessing as to their next move. In my opinion, this is by far our best halfback combination but needs some serious and continuous game time to develop. The success of any side is dependant on the halfback/hooker/loose forward combination and, injuries apart, I don't believe in chopping and changing? particularly not during games, Find out what works and stick with it is my motto so it will be interesting to see the team selection today after a good performance against Featherstone,...and how many resulting key changes there are in the 80 minutes.

Like it or loathe it, the current 12 man interchange rule actively encourages change for changes sake. Yes, it allows us to spell the forwards in Summer rugby and that's all well and good but it's becoming increasingly difficult to work out who is playing where, and seemingly not just for us spectators! Interestingly, you may have noticed that during all the televised Sky games this season they have produced an interchange statistic at around about the 60 minute mark. Invariably the losing side has used either 9 or more changes whereas the dominant side has averaged just 6, make

your own mind up. Whilst we have struggled to produce the form that we are undoubtedly capable of, there are plenty of positives that we can build on as we approach the run in to the end of the season. It's been good to see Houghy's form improve gradually as the season has progressed, particularly defensively where his contribution is often underrated. However, it would be good to see more of his trademark runs from acting halfback. Molly's own performances have also been crucial in terms of making the hard yards and a little bit more game time wouldn't go amiss. Paul Anderson, for me remains the best centre we have on the books. Not the quickest, he is an excellent footballer and when in possession gives us extra options out wide. Dane Morgan's form has been transformed since he had his head shaved (other pack members, with the exception of Mr Shaw, please take note!) and Chris Morley's enthusiastic contribution over recent games should also not be ignored.

However, perhaps the one contribution that we should mention is that of inspirational skipper Phil Farrell. His leadership qualities were sorely missed in the early season and, despite Neil Roden's excellent display, Faz was my own personal man of the match against Featherstone last week. He was a constant threat on attack and defensively he continues to lead by example week in week out.

Let's hope that today we continue where we left off last week, tighten up defensively down the flanks and reproduce the attacking flair that had our last visitors at sixes and sevens. Lead the way Faz.



Words of Wilson

HOW ON earth can you explain why so many teams - and not just in Rugby League - perform so differently at home and away? The question came to mind. very obviously, at Boundary Park last Sunday. To take just this season so far. Featherstone have a 100% record at Post Office Road, including a superb victory over Salford, but have yet to pick up a point away from home - and that sequence includes a defeat at Dewsbury, to give Andy Fisher's side its only victory in the League so far. At the same time, we produce superb performances at 'home' - I suppose we should now call it that - to beat Leigh and Featherstone, yet concede over fifty points at both Doncaster and Rochdale, and have yet to win away.

It is more understandable in some sports than others, I suppose. In cricket, for example, wickets vary considerably from ground to ground, and so the home side has the advantage both of greater familiarity with its own wicket, and of being able to prepare it itself, to fit it's own side's strengths. In recent times, the Nottinghamshire side which starred Hadley and Rice is probably the best known illustration of this, it was virtually unbeaten at Trent Bridge, on wickets nearly as green as the outfield, but very much less successful on flatter pitches elsewhere.

On similar grounds, you can understand Batley's familiarity with the Mount Pleasant slope being worth a few points start each match; and Featherstone similarly at Post Office Road. But such explanations are clearly not sufficient, since they only apply in a very limited number of cases.

What about psychological aspects giving home advantage, then? In soccer, the famous "This is Anfield" sign above players' heads as they troop down the tunnel was reckoned to be a major intimidatory factor, helping the successful Liverpool FC side under Bill Shankley and Bob Paisley to fantastic home records. And visiting sides' players have admitted to being beaten before a ball has been kicked when visiting Old Trafford over the past ten years or so. In Rugby League, Halifax were never easy to beat at Thrum Hall in the days when players had to brave a walk through howling home spectators to get to the pitch; and when the Watersheddings walk from the Pavilion was reputedly not entirely popular amongst our visiting players in years gone by!

But how do you explain the exceptions? The case of London Broncos this season - at least, until they fell apart at Wilderspool last Sunday - stands out as a reasonable example.

They have yet to win at 'home', but have recorded seven out of ten victories on opponents grounds, as well as one at a neutral Aberavon. Surely this demonstrates that it must be a function of the mind - set of players and coaching staff? If we had played with anything like the committment and organisation at Doncaster and Batley that we displayed at Boundary Park last Sunday, for example, we would surely now have three more league points than we now have, and therefore be challenging for a top four place rather than a relegation fight. Maybe Steve Mollov could best use his time before we go to Dewsbury next week going down to have a long talk to Tony Rae!

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Age is no barrier



AS the National Leagues continue to provide top-drawer entertainment every weekend, there are a group of elder statesmen playing their full part.

While players in the twillight of their careers in Super League often hog the limelight - note the attention surrounding the imminent retirement of James Lowes - those at a lower level can see their efforts go relatively

But there are undoubtedly a wealth of players over 30 consistently putting in superb performances at this level. And that promoted an interesting discussion in the League Publications offices this week that led to the naming of a National League Veterans side, the qualification being that the player must be over 30 years old.

At fullback, and playing slightly out of position due to the lack of a regular number one, is York's Graeme Hallas (32), whose career has taken in stops at Halifax, Hull KR, Keighley and Huddersfield and a Great Britain Tour Down Under

On the wings, Salford's Alan Hunte (33) - formerly of Wakefield, St Helens and Hull - lines up with Cumbrian stalwart Graeme Lewthwaite (31), a favourite on the teraces at both Workington and Whitehaven over the past decade.

Having played over 100 first-grade games in Australia, Brendan O'Meara (31) is an automatic selection in the centres, especially considering his outstanding performances for Dewsbury, Rochdale and Featherstone in England. He is joined by - as far as we know - the oldest player regularly operating in the National Leagues, Doncaster's 36 year old Simin Irving, formerly with Leeds and Keighley.

At halfback, Doncaster's Paul Mansson (31) is joined by Sheffield player-coach Mark Aston (35). Mansson began his English career with Salford before stops at Hunslet and Widnes, while Aston is a Sheffield legend who also turned out briefly for Featherstone. Aston also gained a Great Britain cap in France in 1991.

In the front row, hooker Lee Jackson (34) would pack down between Harvey Howard (34) and Paul Broadbent (35) - with the trio's combined age being 103! All three have played at the very highest level for most of their careers, and all earned Great Britain caps.



At loose forward is Jason Ramshaw (33) - another long-serving star having recently enjoyed a deserved testimonial at Keighley Cougars. Ramshaw, who started his career at Halifax, is the subject of this month's Rugby League World National League Profile in the August edition of the magazine, out on Friday July 25.

On the bench we had Hull KR duo Latham Tawhai (31) and Paul Fletcher (33), Workington prop Hitro Okesene (31) and Oldham player-coach Steve Molloy (34) - all still putting in the effort on a weekly basis.

And there are honourable mentions too for Doncaster's Jason Lee and Maea David, and Dewsbury's (occasional player) coaches Andy Fisher and Richard Slater.

OLDHAM TURNED in a magnificent, battling performance last week against Featherstone Rovers, once again bouncing back from a dreadful defeat the previous fortnight against Rochdale Hornets. If only the team could find some consistency then there is no doubt that they have sufficient talent to challenge for honours. I never cease to be amazed by the profligacy of the managers of sporting clubs. For a club of St. Helens stature and success to announce a loss of £800,000 for the season is ludicrous. Our champion club with better gates than all bar two other clubs and playing more high profile and, therefore, attractive to sponsors and advertisers, fixtures cannot make a profit.It beggers belief and echoes the situation which forced Wigan to sell Central Park. Unfortunately there is not always a sugar daddy waiting to bale out a club in difficulties and the sugar daddy is not always the long term answer anyway as events at a club not a million inches from where you are sitting prove. The statement made by St. Helens Chairman Eamon McManus on the situation is revealing. "In the past few years the club has achieved great success but at a cost that it could clearly not afford to sustain. The pursuit of this short term success has severely threatened the club's continued existence. Our objective now is to continue to achieve a high level of sporting success and entertainment for the fans, but within the framework of financial performance and affordability". Well, if I were Mr McManus I would note that some of those fans are so supportive that at the first sign of a few poor performances they send back their season tickets demanding refunds. Further, part of the restructuring package depends on "a successful outcome to the current TV rights negotiations." Don't hold your breath Mr McManus. Meanwhile there is to be "a major overhaul of senior and middle management positions in order to ensure an improved business performance in 2003 and beyond while the board continues to support the club financially". It is to be hoped the board can afford it! British management, eh?



ON THIS DAY

NINETY-THREE years ago Great Britain undertook their first ever tour of Australasia. The skipper of those original British Lions was James Lomas of Salford who joined Oldham six months later for

what was then a World record transfer fee of £300. On Wednesday 20th July 1910 the Lions met a Maori XIII in Auckland. The Lions won that match 29-0 with Lomas scoring a try and four goals. Also included in the British line-up that day was Bert Slosher Avery, a powerful and speedy forward

who, although he did not score against the Maoris, crossed for seven tries in eleven tour appearances including three touchdowns against New Zealand in the test match. Another member of that tour party, Oldham prop Tommy Helm, did not play in a single match on tour after suffering injury on the journey down under.

The Great Britain World Cup squad of 1957 called off in South Africa on their way back from Australia in order to play a series of missionary matches against France. The first of those matches was staged at Willowmore Park, Benoni on Saturday 20th July. The match turned out to be more of an exhibition fixture with little tackling. As a result there were 22 tries scored to entertain a crowd of 13,000. French winger Maurice Voron scored five of those tries although they did not prevent Britain from winning 61-41. Two Oldham players appeared in that match, prop Sid Little and loose-forward Derek Turner, but neither managed to get on the scoresheet.

On Saturday 20th July 1946 Great Britain defeated Australia by twenty points to seven in the third test match at Sydney Cricket Ground. The only Oldham representative on that tour was second-row forward Doug Phillips who appeared in all three tests against the Kangaroos.

Twenty-eight years later the same two nations met at the same venue in another third test match. Unfortunately the result was different. Australia beat Great Britain 22-18 on Saturday 20th July 1974 although the Lions were somewhat unlucky in that encounter. They led 16-10 at half time before falling off late in the match. At prop for the Lions that afternoon was Terry Clawson, a player who enjoyed a nomadic career. He made only 19 appearances for Oldham but, during his spell at Watersheddings, he also appeared in no fewer than eighteen representative matches, this test being one of them.

It was on this day in 1994, Wednesday 20th July, that Oldham signed the former St.Annes half-back Steve Gartland from Rochdale Hornets for £25,000. Gartland was a record point scorer for Hornets but he had difficulty settling in with his hometown club. He returned to Rochdale on loan in February 1997 and then, on the demise of the original Oldham club, had a spell with Swinton before returning to Rochdale for a third time. He made only 30 appearances for Oldham during his three-year stint at Boundary Park, scoring three tries, 24 goals and two dropped goals.

Six years ago a BARLA under-18 squad toured Australia and on Sunday 20th July 1997 they met the Adelaide Rams academy team. The Australian youngsters proved too good for the tourists and won this match 24-14. Playing in the secondrow for BARLA that day was David Best, the Saddleworth Rangers junior who has since moved across town and who is currently attached to St.Annes.
