

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
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In The Hot Seat

Thanks for all your efforts Knocker, and good luck in the future. $\hfill \hfill$



THE ORIGINS of the Salford club can be traced way back to 1873 although they were not founder members of the Northern Rugby Football Union in 1895. Salford preferred to wait for twelve months to see how the new code progressed before switching to professional rugby in 1896. Since then Salford, like most other clubs, have endured several ups and downs with the club enjoying three periods of outstanding success, in the early 1900s, the 1930s and the 1970s.

Although Salford were a force to be reckoned with at the turn of the century. they failed to lift a major trophy until 1914. On four occasions Salford reached the Challenge Cup final, in 1900, 1902, 1903 and 1906, but on each occasion Salford met with defeat. Captaining Salford in two of those finals was James Lomas, a powerfully built centre or stand-off with a devastating hand off. He was one of the games superstars during that era, skippering the British Lions on their first ever tour of Australasia in 1910. He joined Salford from Bramley for a World record £100 transfer fee in August 1901 and in January 1911, when he left the Willows to join Oldham, it was for another World record transfer fee, £300. That first great era of Salford success ended with the onset of war although, before then, in April 1914 Salford were crowned Champions when they beat Huddersfield 5-3 in the final at Headingley.

The 1930s era was the most successful in Salfords history. Between 1931 and 1939 Salford were Lancashire champions five times, Lancashire Cup winners on four occasions, League Champions three times and Challenge Cup winners for the only time in their history. The Challenge Cup success came after a 7-4 victory over Barrow at Wembley in May 1938. Centre Albert Gear scored the only try of the match in the dying minutes after stand-off and skipper Gus Risman had landed a penalty and a dropped goal. Risman and coach Lance Todd were the mainstays of that great

Salford squad. Todd joined Salford in August 1928 and remained with them until his death in a road traffic accident outside the Floating Light, on the Oldham-Huddersfield boundary, in November 1942. Risman was signed from Welsh rugby union in 1929 and stayed until 1946 when he joined Workington Town. A brilliant allround footballer, Risman is generally regarded as being the greatest player ever to play for the club. When his playing days were over Risman enjoyed a spell as coach up at Watersheddings.

The fifties and early sixties were a bleak period for Salford but the arrival of Brian Snape as chairman in September 1963 changed all that. Several costly

signings were made which enabled the Red Devils to enjoy their third outstanding era. Between 1965 and 1975, in the region of £200,000 was spent on player recruitment including Charlie Bott and Peter Smethurst, both signed from Oldham. In 1972 Salford won the Lancashire Cup

but the highlights of that era were the First Division Championship successes of 1974 and 1976.

Relegation from Super League last autumn was a big blow for Salford but they have coped well in the National League. They reached the quarter-finals of the Powergen Challenge Cup and last month beat Leigh in the final of the Arriva Trains League Cup competition. Their position at the top of the National League suggests that they will enter the play-offs as favourites to lift further silverware and return to Super League as Champions of National League. Of Roughyeds And ... The Red Devils

TODAY we extend a warm welcome to the players, officials and supporters of the Salford club who despite this being an ultra competitive division remain hot favourites to return to "Super League" at the first attempt.

Fixtures between the two clubs go right back to the pre Rugby League era with the first meeting taking place in 1881. However, the "Reds" did not form part of the breakaway group of 22 clubs who formed the Northern Union in 1895 and so it was not until the opening day of the second season of the new competition that the teams met in a

league fixture. On April 4th 1903 the clubs played out a scoreless draw in the Challenge cup semi final at Broughton. Salford won the replay four days later at the same venue by nine points to nil but lost to Halifax in the final at Headingley.

In the 1909-10 season, Oldham finished top of the league of twenty eight teams with Salford in the runners up spot. In the play offs the Roughyeds defeated Wakefield at Watersheddings but Salford lost at home to Wigan leaving it to Oldham to take the Championship with a 13-7 win over the

Central Parkers. The match again played at Broughton.

Both clubs have had their high and low points throughout the years but rarely has there been a time when both Oldham and Salford have been at top form. Nevertheless, a Roughyeds versus Red Devils fixture still fires the imagination and conjures memories of the "greats" who have represented the sides. Sid Rix and Bob Sloman for Oldham in the 1920s, with Alan Davies, Charlie Winslade and Sid Little in the 1950s. Gus Risman and Barney Hudson for Salford in the 1930s and that star studded team of the 1970s featuring the likes of David Watkins, Chris Hesketh and Paul Charlton to name but three.

THINGS certainly seem to be looking up since I last put pen to paper for the Doncaster game. The Cumbrian side might be going through a dodgy spell but are never easy to turn over at home — Remember last season? I'm still having nightmares about that match.

One of the main topics of discussion amongst the rugby fanatics in and around the town has been to discover what in particular has been responsible for the team's turn around in form and results? There have been plenty of suggestions, including: the return from injury of experienced back rower, Darren Shaw: the movement of Jon Goddard to full back and Doddy to the wing; the conversion of Lee Doran into a centre: a more consistent 17 due to lack of injuries. especially in the half back pairings, and the team finally gelling as a unit. To be honest it's probably not any one of these but a combination of them all and the fact that they all seem to have happened in the last few weeks. This has given the lads more confidence in themselves and enabled them to play 'smarter' rugby. To me we are at our best and most dangerous in attack when we are allowed or determined to perform quick play the balls - and isn't it great seeing

"Scruffy" making those darting runs from acting half back again.


On the down side I must pay my tribute to Paul (Knocker) Norton who has been forced to give up the game because of a spinal injury. I am sure Chris and Steve will have something to say about this in today's programme so I will keep it brief. Knocker epitomises to me all that is good in the game of rugby league - a player most admired by his teammates. Knocker always reminds me of an incident in one of my first naive skirmishes with the microphone as PA at Hurst Cross last season. Cleggy had persuaded me, when announcing the teams half an hour before kick off, to replace Paul (Knocker) Norton with Paul (The Nose) Norton. Unfortunately this coincided with all the players doing press ups on the field as part of the warm up. They all collapsed on the ground in stitches and the warm up was seriously disrupted. I got a severe telling off but fortunately we won the game and Knocker seems to have forgiven me. Seriously we wish him all the best for the future and hope to still see him around at our games - we will all certainly welcome him.

On another disappointing note Barrow, at this very late stage in the season, have pulled out of the Academy League. This means that Oldham finish top and go straight into the Grand Final and Sheffield and Doncaster play each other for the right to meet Oldham in the Final. (Details on the Academy page).

Finally a great big thank you to all of you who turned up after the Doncaster game for the BBQ at the new Social Club. It really was a great turn out and enjoyed by all. Can I just encourage as many of you as possible to start supporting the new club and making it your base and regular 'watering hole'. At present the old Hartford Club members far outnumber Rugby members and we really do want to make this a Rugby Club to be proud of and a regular meeting place for Oldham Rugby fans.



Back On The Terraces

What a difference a few weeks can make in Rugby League, particularly when the game has finally found a truly competitive structure for the first time in my lifetime. Indeed, looking through all the divisions you can see that, for the vast majority of teams, there is a massive amount to play for as the season goes right down to the wire, something that can only be good for the game.

From Oldham's perspective, the last three games have resulted in 6 valuable league points which now means that the Roughyed's have given themselves a real fighting chance of reaching the play offs. The Roughyed rollercoaster ride continues when, just three weeks ago, we were staring at the possibility of getting dragged down into a relegation battle.

The last three weeks have seen us finally achieve some of that consistency that was so badly lacking earlier in the season. There is clearly a renewed optimism and an excellent team spirit on show for all to see and the spectators are now starting to respond to this as the lads make their traditional end of

season push for the play offs.

Key to this has been the stability that an unchanged line up brings, players are communicating more effectively, reading each others games when previously they looked almost like strangers. Also key has been the switch to stand off of Simon Svabic, who has brought a whole new dimension to our attacking play. As a result we look far better organised, are now achieving a higher completion rate, the backs are receiving accurate ball in space and our kicking game has got a variety that constantly keeps opposition defences guessing. Don't get me wrong, we are far from being a one man team, indeed. Syabic's presence has opened the door for other team mates to show what they can do with the ball in their hands. Lee Doran out wide is a prime example of this with 7 tries in 3 games for the makeshift

That said, it's all too easy to get carried away, the report card reads, 'showing signs of improvement but could do better'. Whilst attacking we are now really putting the opposition under real pressure, defensively we can still look rather frail at times, particularly out wide. However, what typifies the newly found never say die attitude of the

Roughyeds, is the tenacity of our scrambling defence which I believe is second to none in NI 1

Of course, Salford today provide a real test of just how far we have come in recent weeks. After the two drubbings received from them earlier this season, it will be interesting to see just how the boys react today. Level playing field? OK, they have TV money which allows them to employ a squad of full time professionals, they certainly couldn't do that with the gates they have achieved over the last couple of seasons, but I believe that this is more about attitude than anything else. Other teams such as Leigh, Whitehaven and Featherstone have shown what can be achieved if you front up to the challenge. Today we should see a different Oldham entertain their near neighbours and hopefully no repeat performance of their last visit, they should of course need no more motivation than that!!

On a wider scale, financial concerns have meant that Rugby League's international calendar is set to significantly change over the coming years with the establishment of a Tri-Nations tournament. Whilst the World sevens will be retained in Sydney, Great Britain will host the new 13 a side competition for the next three years. It was also confirmed that two Tests would be played between Australia and New Zealand next year.

The decision to confirm Great Britain as the venue for the Tri Nations tournaments of 2004, 2005 and 2006 was seen as a boost for the game in the UK. However, this effectively puts paid to the possibility of future Lions and Kangaroo tours in the short term, this despite the growing anticipation of the Kangaroo tour later this year. In respect of the sevens, it was viewed that the competition had provided a real boost for the game internationally, particularly in non-traditional/developmental areas for the game.

Personally, whilst World Cups have proven to be a severe financial risk, I believe that the tours are an integral part of the fabric of our game and represent the pinnacle of any RL players career. In terms of pounds and pence we will be able to judge their real popularity come the end of the year. Therefore, I would urge the International RL federation to hold fire before making any hasty decisions just yet.

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

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
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Oldham's big Australian prop Dane Morgan (24), who joined the Roughyeds in February on a contract until the end of the season, has a burning ambition to play in Super League.

What an amazing difference a fortnight can make! At 3 o'clock on Sunday, July 13 we were in 8th place in National League 1, with 6 points from 9 games, and staring the prospect of a struggle against relegation – with all that would involve – squarely in the face. However, by 5 o'clock two weeks later, here we are with 12 points from 12 games, settled in at 5th spot in the table, indeed level on points with Featherstone in 4th place.

When Batley drew level with us, and then missed two easy drop goal chances, you only had to observe the looks on most of our players' faces to see how little confidence they had. And of course this was further reinforced in the abject thrashing at Rochdale. However, the contrast at Dewsbury was quite remarkable. Even when Jamie Benn was putting over his two drop goals, well into the second half, to extend Dewsbury's lead over us, and playing up the slope and with the wind, we still had the look of a side with the belief that we could still win the game. And so it turned out.

How can such a turn around be explained? I am sure there is not just one factor involved. For example, Neil Roden's marvellous display off the sub's bench against Featherstone suddenly revitalised an attack which had looked fairly lack-lustre for most of the previous league games, if we

are honest. No doubt, too, the restoration of Simon Svabic at stand off, as Simon Winnard had previously suggested in this programme, has also helped in this respect.

But I would also like to point to the contributions of some of the most experienced heads in the pack. Phil Farrell - an old head in terms of the way he plays, at least, though not in terms of chronological age - has been immense in all three of the wins. Steve Molloy has also hit on what seems to be a very effective method of rotating his forwards, with Danny Guest and Martin McLoughlin achieving great things off the bench. and Dane Morgan particularly effective in his second half spells. The second row men too, particularly Chris Morley down the left, have been solid when it mattered.

Of course, it would be stupid to think that we have suddenly become a Grand Final side. I still personally have a real concern about our defence – an average of 29.4 points conceded per game, so far and only once, in the superbly committed effort against Leigh, keeping our opponents below 20 points. And, starting with today's game, there aren't too many easy points to be had in our remaining fixtures, it should be said. However, at least we have seen significant change in the right direction – some smiles on faces!

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Clubs prepare for thrilling run in

THE National League seasons are now two thirds of the way through, and both competitions are set for a thrilling run-in.

In National League One, the top three places look assured at present with Salford, Leigh and Rochdale the current occupants and well clear of their rivals. But they will all be jostling for places among themselves, with a place in the top two the most coveted ahead of the play-offs.

All three still have to play each other, with Salford having the upper hand as they play both the Centurions and Hornets at home.

Underneath that trio lies a cluster of teams scrambling for the remaining three places.

Going into the Round 13 of fixtures, five clubs are separated by just two points - Featherstone, Oldham, Whitehaven, Hull KR and Doncaster. And all five will feel they have a good chance of making the top six.

The only two teams that appear out of the race are bottom duo Batley Bulldogs and Dewsbury Rams - whose main concerns now are avoiding relegation.

Only the bottom club is automatically demoted - and the Rams are firm favourites at the moment, not least because of their daunting fixture list. Of their six remaining games, only two are at home and one of those is to leaders Salford. They also still have to travel to Leigh, Rochdale and Whitehaven. In contrast, four of Batley's remaining six games are at home.

But - wrongly or rightly - the teams that finish eighth and ninth can also be relegated due to the unusual format. Eighth will play ninth in an additional play-off match, and the loser of that game will face the defeated NL2 Grand Finalists. Whoever loses that showdown - which will be played at the NL1 club's ground - will play in National League Two next season.

IN NL2, there are seven teams in contention for the six places - and just five points separate top of

With all those sides having several fixtures against each other, the permutations between now and the end of the campaign are almost endless.

Those sides that can find some consistent form between now and September will find themselves in the top three. And it could easily be any three of that leading seven.

The only clubs out of the race are Gateshead Thunder, Workington Town and London Skolars.

But despite the fact that they cannot be relegated, they will all have their own objectives between now and the end of the campaign - especially the Skolars, still looking for their first win.

All of which illustrates why the splitting of the old NFP has been a tremendous success, on the field at least. A few more supporters through the gates wouldn't go amiss, but that's an issue for another column...

In Yer Face

FOR fans of international rugby league the news that a tri-nations series will be played in each of 2004, 2005 and 2006 is good. Or is it? While contests against Australia and New Zealand will generate much needed interest and publicity, this is surely second best to staging a World Cup. Yes, I know 2000 wasn't a rip-roaring success but rugby league needs to take a good, hard, long look at itself for snatching failure from the laws of success. After all 1995 had been an outstanding tournament and made it clear that the right organisation and marketing could provide a fabulous competition. The tragedy, of course, is that the Australians are now almost as insular as the Americans. Rugby League down under has almost become like American football or baseball, where the only contest lies within the nation. And so a 'World Series' pits New York versus Boston and woe betide upstart Canadians in Toronto should they dare to challenge native supremacy.

These days the height of Australian ambition is Roosters versus Knights and similarly - woe betide New Zealand Warriors for having the effrontery to reach a Grand Final. And, of course, the ultimate contest is Queensland v New South Wales. Sorry, but here in the Old Dart, however tough those contests are they seem a poor substitute for international competition. And that opinion seems sure to be upheld when all the hullaballoo starts around the 'kick-and-clap' World Cup this Autumn. If Australia has the ability to stage a World Sevens competition successfully in February each year then I think it's about time their administrators took the plunge and staged a World Cup. For a start I reckon they could count on around 10,000 British fans on the trip of a lifetime. And if they don't think they can get the 'cobblers' to turn up for France v Papua New guinea then it's time they acknowledged that, though they might be world champion players, as spectators and followers of the game they're second class



AFTER three successive victories things are starting to look a little brighter here at Boundary Park. While the Dewsbury victory did not carry the conviction of the home results

against Featherstone and Doncaster, it did suggest that the Roughyeds are finding some form when it matters – at the business end of the season.

Today's visit by Salford City Reds, everybody's favourite for a quick return to Super League (at least outside Leigh), will test Oldham to the limit. After three good hidings at the hands of this particular opposition Oldham will at least enter today's match with rather more confidence than previously, but to pull off what would be a surprise victory the Roughyed pack will need to get on top of a powerful Salford six and then subdue the best halfbacks in the division in Gavin Clinch and Cliff Beverley. A tall order, yes, but an impossibility. no.

Meanwhile competition for the play-off places intensifies and is succeeding in its objective of maintaining interest to the end of the season. Dewsbury look favourites for automatic relegation yet are - as we saw last weekend - an extremely competitive side. Batley look likely to finish immediately above them, victims of the loss of their outstanding halfback pair from last season, Dean Lawford and Glen Tomlinson. Thereafter it's wide open with every match absolutely vital. Apart from Oldham having today's toughest encounter, how about Featherstone v Leigh? The visitors may be full of confidence but Fev at the Lionheart are almost invincible, Whitehaven v Rochdale could go either way with my money on a home win and, although Doncaster might be expected to dispose of Dewsbury and Hull KR to account for Batley at the Mount, don't be too surprised if either of the Heavy Woollen sides come up with a win.

National League Two is equally intriguing with some enthralling encounters to come and, although Keighley are my favourites for promotion, what price Darren Abram's Chorley to claim a promotion spot? It's all great news for the new format which, in my view, has proved extremely successful. If only we could get the bodies through the turnstiles to support the game at this level. I despair of people's attitude to sport these days when only the top level of competition will do. It's killing soccer; let's hope rugby league, with sensible budgeting, can prove more robust.

ON THIS DAY



. . . . with Don Yates

SIX YEARS AGO Salford were one of the Super League clubs battered from pillar to post by the might of the Australian Super League in the World Club Championship. However, on Sunday 3rd August 1997 the Red Devils gained revenge for a 50 point mauling which they suffered in Adelaide when they beat the Adelaide Rams 14-12 in the return encounter at the Willows. The Australian domination of the competition looked likely to continue when Adelaide scored two first half tries. Despite these early setbacks, Salford stuck to their task. Winger Darren Rogers scored a try and stand-off Steve Blakeley landed four penalties which enabled Salford to draw level at 12-apiece. In the closing ten minutes of the match Salford substitute Mark Lee snatched victory with a couple of dropped goals, much to the delight of the crowd of 6.995.

It was on this day in 1920, Tuesday 3rd August, that the Great Britain touring team defeated King Country 47-3 at Taumarruni, New Zealand. The tourists ran in eleven tries that day with Harold Wagstaffe (Huddersfield) and Squire Stockwell (Leeds) each claiming a hattrick. Oldham full-back Alf Wood landed six goals in that match.

The British Lions of 1946 endured a much tougher afternoon on Saturday 3rd August when the tourists were entertained by a powerful Auckland District XIII. The captain of those tourists was Gus Risman and also included in the British party was another Salford player, front-row forward George Curran. Both played against Auckland when a crowd of 20,000 saw the Lions win 9-7.

There were no Salford players selected for the 1958 tour although three Oldham players did make the trip. Prop Ken Jackson suffered injury early in the trip but centre Alan Davies and scrum-half Frank Pitchford both played significant roles throughout the tour. On Sunday 3rd August 1958 they both played against the New Zealand West Coast in Greymouth, a match which the Lions won

19-2. Davies scored more tries for Oldham than any other player, 174, and he later enjoyed short spells with Wigan and Wakefield Trinity before ending his playing career at Salford.

Stuart Whitehead was another player who enjoyed spells with both Oldham and Salford. He was a member of the Salford team that appeared at Wembley in 1969.

Salford lost that final but on Saturday 3rd August 1968 Whitehead was included in a Salford line-up which enjoyed a much better afternoon. The Reds took part in the Wigan preseason sevens that day when they beat Bradford Northern 11-2 and

Warrington 11-10 before lifting the trophy with a 26-23 win against Leeds in the final.

Oldham collected some silverware on Sunday 3rd August 1980 when they entertained Rochdale Hornets at Watersheddings in the Law Cup. The Roughyeds won 32-15 that afternoon with tries from Geoff Munro, Clive Hunter, Mike Cowley, Ray Ashton, Roger O'Mahoney and Terry Flanagan. Mick Worrall, another player who appeared for both Oldham and Salford, landed six goals and Ray Ashton landed one.

Finally, it is to be hoped that the weather this afternoon is much better than it was twelve months ago. On Saturday 3rd August 2002 the local amateur pre-season knockout competition was due to start with Shaw Rhinos entertaining St.Annes and Saddleworth Rangers visiting Waterhead. Unfortunately heavy rain caused both matches to be postponed because of waterlogged pitches.
