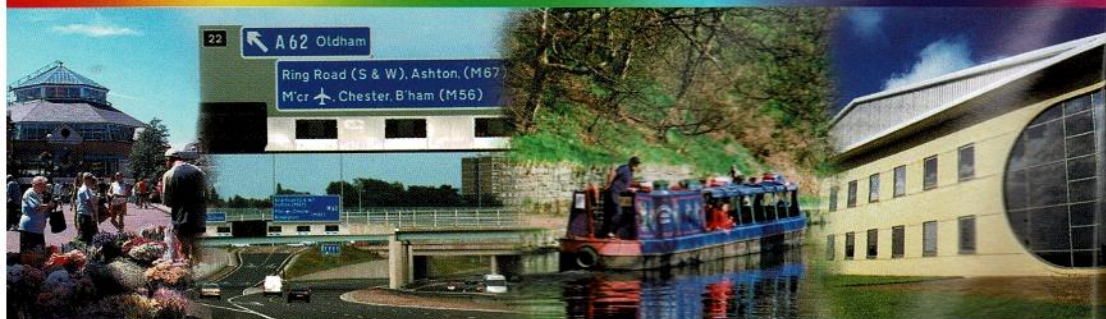
Oldham continues to take significant strides to be THE desirable place to live, work or visit in the North West.

MEN WELCOME

A Potted History of Hull Kingston Rovers . . . by Don Yates

HULL Kingston Rovers have been members of the Rugby Football League since 1899 and have enjoyed three golden eras, the early 1920s, the late 1960s and those glorious years between 1977 and 1986.

The first honour won by the club came in 1920 when the Yorkshire Cup was won, a particularly satisfying triumph because they defeated arch rivals Hull FC in the final. Two seasons later the Robins became League Champions for the first time and they won that title again in 1925. Rovers came close to winning the double in 1925 but Oldham beat them in the Challenge Cup Final. The Robins lifted the Yorkshire Cup in both 1966 and 1967 as well as going close in other competitions. However their best ever period came ten years later when Rovers won nine major trophies in as many seasons. They won the Yorkshire Cup, the Floodlit Trophy, the Regal Trophy, the Premiership twice and the League Championship on three occasions. The trophy which brought most satisfaction to followers of Hull Kingston Rovers was that 10-5 Challenge Cup Final victory over Hull FC at Wembley in 1980. In addition to these successes the Robins also appeared in eight other major finals during this memorable spell.

The most recent piece of silverware won by the Robins was the Silk Cut Plate in 1997 when Hunslet were defeated by sixty points to 14 on another glorious Wembley afternoon.

Apart from their trophy winning exploits, the Robins have been involved in several record-breaking achievements. Way back in 1905 Rovers were drawn against Cumbrian amateurs Brookland Rovers in the Challenge Cup. The tie ended in a 73-5 victory for the Robins with winger George Tich West establishing two records that still stand all these years later. He scored eleven tries and ended with a personal haul of 53 points, record totals in the British domestic game.

Another long standing record created by a Hull Kingston Rovers player was the

190 consecutive appearances which utility back Gilbert Austin made between January 1919 and December 1923. It was a record that stood for almost 60 years before it was eventually extended by Keith Elwell of Widnes.

One of the most famous players in the history of the Robins is diminutive stand-off Roger Millward. He was a member of the last Great Britain team to win a test series

against Australia. That was in 1970 when the second test at Sydney Cricket Ground was won 28-7. Millward scored two tries and seven goals in that victory, his twenty points haul equalling the record score by a British player in a test against the Kangaroos.

Wing three-quarter Ged Dunn was a prolific try scorer for the club. In February 1975 he raced in for six touchdowns in a 56-5 victory over New Hunslet at the old Craven Park ground. Dunn's feat equalled the try scoring record for any individual player in a Second Division match.

Scoring legend Neil Fox holds the career point scoring record with 6,220 points, which he amassed between 1956 and 1979. Fox scored most of those points with his first club, Wakefield Trinity, but he also served Hull Kingston Rovers as well as Bradford Northern, York, Bramley and Huddersfield.

Another record involving Hull Kingston Rovers was established in 1985 when they met Hull in the final of the Regal Trophy. That final was staged at Boothferry Park, then home of the Hull City soccer club and it attracted a crowd of 25,326, a record attendance for that particular competition.

Of Roughyeds And ... Robins

TODAY WE extend a warm welcome to the players, officials and supporters of Hull Kingston Rovers. The "Robins" joined the league for the 1899-1900 season and towards the end of that first campaign for the Rovers, Oldham travelled to Humberside on April 7th 1900 for a friendly match that was the first meeting between the clubs. Oldham triumphed that day by a scoreline of fourteen points to six.

The first league match took place on September 27th 1902. Again the fixture was in Hull with the Roughyeds victorious (7-2). The return game at Watersheddings the following January, saw Oldham complete the double (19-2) with the help of a hat-trick of tries from right winger Tommy Cash. The first time Rovers lowered the Oldham colours was on February 2nd 1906 with a five points to two win at Hull. There have been many meetings between the clubs from that day to this with three encounters in particular worthy of special mention.

These, of course are the three BIG

games between the two sides. First there was the 1925 Challenge Cup final at Headingley. Oldham brought home the trophy after a Reg Farrar inspired, sixteen points to three victory. Next there was the saga of the twice replayed Challenge Cup semi final in 1964. After two nerve wracking, bone crushing encounters at Headingley and Station Road, it was Rovers who proved the stronger in the second replay at Fartown. Their success (12-2) taking them to Wembley and a final tie against Widnes.

Last but not least there was the 1990 Old Trafford showdown in the second division premiership final. After building up a commanding lead by early in the second half, it looked as if Rovers were bound for the honours. However, a remarkable come back by the Roughyeds saw them sneak through by thirty points to twenty nine. Another nerve tingling experience served up by these two great trans-Pennine rivals. Long may such fixtures as these continue.

FIRST OF ALL, what a great win for the Academy lads in the Grand Final at Manor Park on Saturday. They did the club and themselves proud in blistering heat and both sides deserve credit for serving up such good rugby in extreme conditions. It says much for both sides and the officials that there were only seven penalties in the whole match.

Wasn't it a good idea to allow a pause in the game halfway through each half to allow the players and officials to take on water? It seems that special permission from the RFL had to be gained in order for this to happen. It might well be a good idea for this to take place in every game when the temperature is so high and both teams agree.

Whilst on the subject of the youngsters' success, can I on behalf of the club thank the fans for the great turn out at the game? We don't have an accurate count of the numbers but generally people's estimate was between 500 and 600. Seen in context this was more than at two National league 2 games, equal to one in National League 1 and not far behind Hornet's crowd against Dewsbury. It really is a thrill for the lads to have had such a following especially as it was so vocal. Let's hope that the experience encourages more of these fans to become regular supporters of the Academy lads in the future.

On to NL1 and the next four games - it really is very close. We were very unfortunate to have all our preparations hit by the injuries to John Hough (we must have a word with Svab as to where to put his 'plates of meat' next time) and Iain Marsh on Saturday and Jon Goddard having to cry off with sunstroke on Sunday morning exacerbated this. On top of that Ryan Staziker badly ruptured a

hamstring early in the game and Darren Shaw, as well as playing out of position at hooker, picked up a suspected broken thumb in the first ten minutes of the game - but still completed the whole 80 minutes of the game.

Just as we were hoping our early season injury jinx had gone away, things appear to be worsening again. Let's hope that their injuries are not as bad as they first look - but it is certain that young Ryan is out for the season and I have just heard that Shawy's thumb is confirmed as being broken. I know that Steve and Chris are working hard, trying to get some new faces in before the August 22 deadline and if everything has gone to plan there could be a new face on the pitch today.

Today's game is vital as Hull KR have a much better points difference than us so it is very important that we get off that 12 points mark. It really is essential that we try and get the fourth place which will guarantee us a home draw in the first play off round - something we have never had in the past. Not only would it give us an advantage but would also bring in much needed revenue.

On to the broader front in respect of Ian Wilson's article in today's programme (written a fortnight ago because of holidays) there still doesn't seem to have been any more progress as far as TV rights for next season are concerned. It is hoped that now the powers that be in TV have finally sorted out the FA Premiership deals they will put more time into finalising a deal with the RFL. The Leeds v Bradford game last Friday showed just how good Rugby League looks on television and must have improved the RFL's bargaining powers greatly.

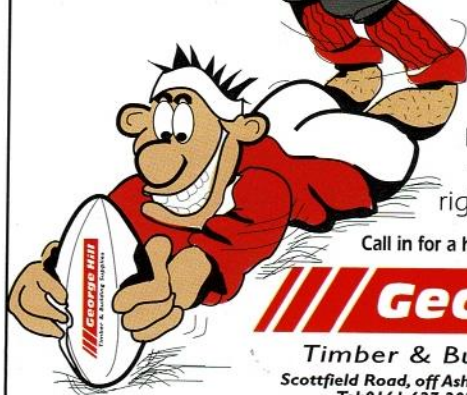

Back On The Terraces

WELL, here we are at our penultimate home game of the regular season and it's still all to play for. With the top three places all but secured by Salford, Leigh and Rochdale, the battle for the remaining play off positions is now really hotting up. However, after staring a relegation battle firmly in the face just a few weeks ago, much improved form has meant that the Roughyeds could now even be in a position to even push for fourth spot.

However, so tight is the division, with a structure that has been a real success in my opinion, that the teams involved in the fight for the play offs could easily find themselves in 8th or 9th position and actually be playing off for survival. Now that's testament to just how competitive our division really is.

In terms of preparation for the play offs, there has been some frantic transfer activity, with clubs looking to bolster their squads for one last push for the play offs. The Roughyeds know only too well how successful that can be. Indeed, our own player coach was the subject of such a move not too long ago. It will therefore be interesting to see whether we make any similar acquisitions in a push for end of season glory. With the squad depleted in terms of numbers, a couple of timely additions could just make all the difference.

Our last home game against Salford provided tangible evidence of the progress made over the last month or so. We finally fronted up to our full time opponents and came out of the game with a huge amount of respect. Whilst it was a great team effort, a couple of players that should be singled out for particular praise are Chris Morley and Iain Marsh. As ever, Morley was uncompromising in defensive but also explosive on attack and, in my opinion, was clearly our man of the match. Marsh too is looking back to his best, delivering some powerful big hitting tackles as well as looking strong with the ball in his hands.

Interestingly, following the game many pundits singled out Gavin Clinch for special praise in directing Salford to the two league points. Whilst there is no doubting Clinch's quality at this level, I personally have grave reservations about his ability to operate

back in Super League. His kicking game apart, Clinch didn't take on our defensive line in 80 minutes of rugby, opting purely to offload, sometimes spilling the ball when under pressure. Give me a fully fit Neil Roden every time, particularly when partnered by Svabic at outside half.

On the Svabic issue, it was praise indeed from fellow contributor, Ian Wilson in his last programme article. As match reporters for 'opposition' publications for many years, Ian and I, together with the irrepressible Roger Halstead, have often pontificated over various issues over the years. It's fair to say that we have slightly different views and unlike my approach that is doused with a certain amount of cynicism (or was that realism?), Mr Wilson is the eternal optimist - his unfaltering faith in our sliding defence being a prime example of this. Healthy debate apart, it's nice to see that Ian not only actually reads this column but also agreed with one of my opinions for a change.

I note that New Zealand Rugby League chiefs have expressed their fear over the proposed Tri-Nations series planned for the next three seasons. Whilst they are quite rightly concerned that this could sound the death knell for any future Lions tours Down Under, more specifically, they are angry that all the Tri-Nations matches will be played in Britain.

That said, New Zealand RL Chairman Selwyn Pearson does not appear to have a solution of just how a Lions tour could now be arranged whilst Australian League chiefs are unwilling to back any visit. Whilst this statement gives an insight as to just who the real power brokers are on the International RL committee, it also addresses a real concern over a meaningful International league calendar.

Perhaps of more immediate concern to Pearson was a way to move forward in the wake of the recent 48-6 defeat at the hands of the Kangaroos. A Test series against Great Britain would probably be viewed as an opportunity for the Kiwi's to re-group against 'easier' opposition. Now there's an incentive for the Lions if they ever needed one!!

Words of Wilson

AS I WRITE this piece, there is no TV agreement in place for next season's league programme, or for future Challenge Cup and RL international fixtures. Just how important is TV for Rugby League? And how should the answer to that question influence those in the hierarchy of our game who are currently engaged in negotiations with the TV companies?

As far as I can see, RL benefits from TV in three ways - direct money income, indirect cash benefits and general public relations via TV exposure. The first is obvious, and has had a revolutionary effect on the whole game. Before Sky, we were basically a semi-professional game, operating largely in parts of northern England, during a winter season, September to April. Now, we are, at least for the elite Super league clubs, a fully professional game, with around two hundred and fifty players, plus associated administrative staff, earning their living full time from it. This is the main direct consequence of Sky TV payments.

Of course, this Sky - initiated revolution has had lots of secondary effects. The game is largely now a 'summer' one, at professional and semi professional levels, as well as at the new amateur National League Three and Summer Conference Levels - though leaving the bulk of the amateur game still playing in the winter. Lots of supporters of the semi-pro clubs have been left - on balance, just about matching the new ones attracted to Super League. And we have also lost a few traditional clubs - Bramley, Mansfield and Kent Invicta.

The second source of income, which depends on TV exposure, is individual club sponsorship revenues, and these should not

be ignored. Just ask any of those semi-professional clubs who featured on ITV's Rugby League Raw programme, how much they would like National League games to be shown on TV - or, indeed, the RFL, who have no sponsor at all for the National League, just as cricket hadn't for their national one day league competition, because of its lack of attractive TV exposure.

Which brings me to the third TV benefit - general PR - and, again, this must not be underestimated. The non-regular, non-committed sports enthusiast, in my experience, knows virtually nothing these days about the game, because it has, for most of the year, disappeared from terrestrial TV - and I am certain this is why Richard Lewis and his team are so keen to get an improved BBC Cup and international package in place first. And isn't Sky's superb coverage - apart from the benefits it brings in terms of quantity and quality of RL coverage, compared with to anything there has ever been before, for us committed supporters - also the reason behind the fantastic growth in the game nationally at amateur level?

Let us hope, then, that the strategy works, and the BBC and Sky packages can both be agreed - maybe even also with boosted ITV (or some other terrestrial channel) snippets of the National Leagues: Because there is also another side to the equation. How important is RL for TV? The whole negotiating process is fraught with dangers, I suspect with us having rather more to lose than the TV companies. Which is why if Mr Lewis pulls off a satisfactory outcome, he should earn the long lasting respect and gratitude of the whole game.

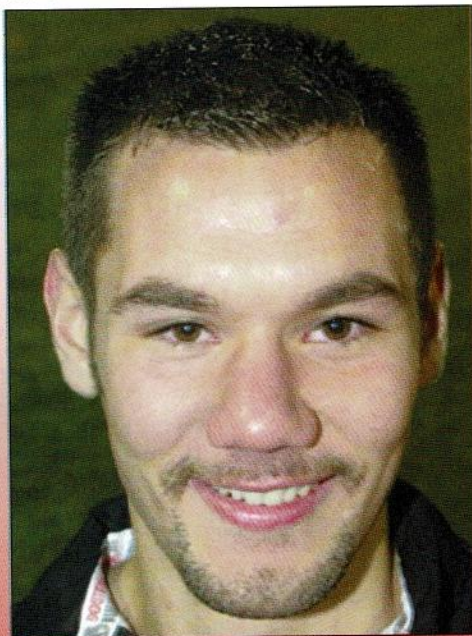

In Yer Face

O.K. so Rugby League doesn't get everything right and from time to time the game takes a terrible stick from the media when positive drugs tests are revealed. However, last week the government agency UK Sport said that: "We've found that the Rugby Football League is one of the exemplary governing bodies, who always keep us informed. They are also one of the very few - cricket and football are others - that provide funding for their own testing." The result of R.L.'s policy is obvious: the more tests carried out and the more frequently this is done the more chance there is of catching offenders. 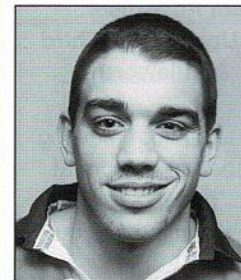
ON THIS DAY

... with Don Yates



FORTY-SIX years ago Oldham won the League Championship. As reigning champions they began the following season with a match against Halifax at Watersheddings on Saturday 17th August 1957. The Roughyeds won that match 21-11 with two of their three tries being scored by loose-forward Derek Turner who had been signed from Hull Kingston Rovers. The other try scorer was winger John Etty and full-back Bernard Ganley added six goals. Making his debut for Oldham in that match was stand-off Rowley Moat who had been signed from Hull during the summer for £200. Moat's stay at Watersheddings was not a happy one. He played only six matches in 18 months, scoring two tries, before moving back to Humberside in December 1958 when he joined Hull Kingston Rovers. Oldham made a small profit on the deals, however, because he was sold for £500.

Twelve months later, on Sunday 17th August 1958, a couple of Oldham players were in Australia with the British Lions and they were included in the team which took on the New South Wales Coalfields in Maitland. The Lions won that match 30-23 with scrum-half Frank Pitchford scoring two tries. The other Oldham player involved in that match was centre Alan Davies. A third Oldham player made that trip down under, prop-forward Ken Jackson, but he returned home early after suffering a knee injury which was to eventually end his career.



Pat Rich

Sunday 17th August 1997 was a significant day in the career of the former Oldham goal-kicking centre Pat Rich. That day he made his senior debut as a member of the Keighley team that lost 30-17 at Widnes in a

Divisional play-off match. Rich had been signed from Durham Tigers, the north east amateur club, and he went on to make 25 appearances for the Cougars, scoring five tries and 20 goals, before moving over here to Oldham during the autumn of 1999.

It was on this day in 1990, Friday 17th August, that the St. Annes' utility back Steve Gartland, brother of our current academy coach Shaun, turned professional by joining Rochdale Hornets. He was an instant success at Rochdale where, during the 1992-93 season, he broke the Hornets point scoring record with a haul of 276. Twelve months later he joined Oldham but returned to Rochdale in 1997 when the original Oldham club folded. He also had a spell with Swinton. His best years, however, were with Hornets for whom, during his two spells at Spotland, he made 105 appearances and scored 63 tries, 227 goals and twelve dropped goals.

Eight years ago, on Thursday 17th August 1995, Hull Kingston Rovers entered the transfer market when they signed the powerful and abrasive prop-forward Andy Dannatt from St. Helens. At first the signing did not go down well with the more biased of Rovers followers because Dannatt was reared on the west side of the city, deep in Hull FC territory. He made his name with the Airlie Birds, gaining Great Britain test honours, and, at one point, he worked on the groundstaff at the Boulevard. After ten successful years with Hull he joined St. Helens but only stayed for a couple of years on this side of the Pennines. Dannatt had reached the veteran stage by the time he joined Hull Kingston Rovers but he enjoyed four happy years at Craven Park during which time he won over all the doubters and made 95 appearances, scoring a couple of tries. He was a member of the Hull Kingston Rovers pack which destroyed Hunslet at Wembley in 1997 when the Robins convincingly won the Challenge Plate by 60 points to fourteen.
