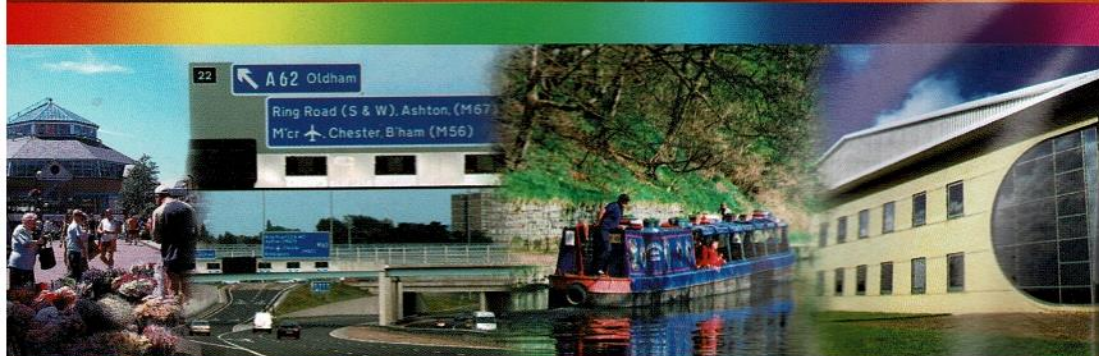
Oldham continues to take significant strides to be THE desirable place to live, work or visit in the North West.

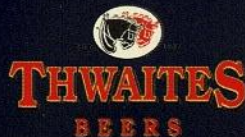

As ever today is going to be hotly contested with both clubs still in a position to make the six and Batley seem to be finding their form at the crucial part of the season.

As our last home game of the season we must get back to winning ways, especially as we have the unenviable task of going to Post Office Road next week and come back with something.

Again the problem over the last month or so has been our lack of consistency.  Formerly with Leeds, Bramley and Oldham, Anthony joined 'The Bulldogs' during the close season.

 Twin brother of Anthony, predominately a stand off half, David has gone down the same professional path as his brother.

Paul Harrison
 60 tries from 131 appearances plus 38 sub appearances shows the value that utility player Paul has given to Batley over the years. Originally a centre he has made the transition to back row forward. Formerly with Hull, Huddersfield and Keighley Cougars.

Steve Hill
 Former Castleford and York prop, Steve joined 'the Bulldogs' last season and made 21 starts plus 2 sub appearances registering one try in the NFP Elimination Minor Semi Final triumph at Featherstone.

Ryan Horsley
 Player of the Year in 2001-02, Ryan has proved to be one of the club's most consistent performers over the last couple of years. Formerly with Featherstone and Wakefield.

Simon Lewis
 Recent signing from Wigan having previously been on the books of Bradford Bulls and Castleford. Has pace to burn.

Craig Lingard
 Club captain and star fullback. Craig has scored 76 tries in 82 appearances plus 25 sub appearances up to the start of 2002-03. Broke the club's post war try scoring record with 28 and fell just one try short of equalising the all time try record in a season in 2001-02 season and would have beaten it had he not been injured in the early part of the season. Along with Barry Eaton has taken on the joint role of Club Development Officer.

Danny Maun
 Star centre, Danny signed 2 years ago from Wigan and immediately made the number three slot his own. Also takes on the additional role of joint Development Officer.

Mark Sibson
 Former Bramley, Huddersfield and Oldham utility back who joined during the close season. Leading try scorer, with Oldham for the last 3 seasons.

Andrew Spink
 Tough tackling prop or second row, Andy joined the club from Dewsbury at the start of 2001-02 making 25 appearances plus 7 sub appearances scoring 2 tries in the process.

Chris Spurr
 Utility back signed for the start of 2002-03 from Featherstone Rovers.

Gavin Swinson
 Hooker who joined also from Featherstone Rovers in the close season.

Mark Toohy
 Local lad, Mark made the step up to regular first team rugby last season.

Leon Williamson

MEN WELCOME

A Potted History of Batley Bulldogs.by Don Yates

THE FINAL visitors of the season to Boundary Park are Batley, one of the founder members of the Rugby Football League. When the northern clubs split away from the Rugby Football Union in 1895, Batley were one of the leading clubs and during the first six years of professional rugby the Gallant Youths lifted the Challenge Cup on three occasions.

They were the first ever winners of that trophy in 1897 when they beat St.Helens in the final by ten points to three. Batley retained the trophy twelve months later when, after beating Oldham 3-0 in the quarterfinals, they beat Bradford in the final 7-0. In 1901 Batley won the Challenge Cup for a third time when Warrington were the beaten finalists 6-0. The Gallant Youths overcame Oldham in the semi-finals that year, winning 9-2 at Huddersfield. In between those Challenge Cup successes Batley were also Yorkshire Champions in 1899.

That golden era has never quite been repeated by Batley although they lifted the Yorkshire Cup in 1912 and were crowned League Champions for the one and only time in 1924. Under the old top-four play-off system, Oldham travelled over to Mount Pleasant for the semi-final and were soundly beaten 38-0. Remarkably it was Batleys biggest win of the season. They then met Wigan in the final at Broughton where they won 13-7.

Yorkshire Cup Final defeats in 1924 and 1952 were the closest Batley came to lifting further silverware until 1998 when they entertained Oldham in the final of the Trans-Pennine Trophy.

Playing down the notorious Mount Pleasant slope in the first half, Batley built up a 26-6 lead and held on in the second half to register a 28-12 victory. The attendance at that final was a creditable 2,696.

Several players have turned out for both Oldham and Batley, including the current Roughyeds player-coach, Steve Molloy. However, the most popular player to represent both clubs must be centre-cum-winger John Etty, a true gentleman in a tough game but, in the words of his biography, a rugby league winner. Etty made five appearances on trial for Dewsbury before joining Batley in 1944. He became a firm favourite at Mount Pleasant where he gained

Yorkshire County honours and also played for the British Empire. Oldham signed John in 1955 and he became a regular selection in the great Roughyeds side of the late 1950s. Ettys final couple of seasons were with Wakefield Trinity. During his career John Etty won every domestic honour including a County Championship winners medal with Yorkshire. Whilst at Oldham he won a League Championship winners medal, two Lancashire Championship winners medals and three Lancashire Cup winners medals. A Challenge Cup winners medal was won with Wakefield as well as Yorkshire Championship and Cup winners medals.

The two attributes which I remember most about John Etty, were his dependability and his under rated defence. Etty only scored

tries when they were needed. He scored twice when Oldham beat Hull 15-14 in the Championship Final but failed to score when Wakefield won the Challenge Cup with a 38-5 victory over Hull. Nevertheless he fully deserved that winners medal for his try haul in the lead up

to the final. In round one he scored twice in a shock 15-10 win at St.Helens, was the try scorer in a 5-2 win at Widnes in round two and again scored twice in the 11-2 semi-final victory over Featherstone Rovers.

None of the top wingers ever scored regularly against Etty who frequently snubbed out any overlap by moving inside to take out the centre. I rate Tom van Vollenhoven as one of the greatest wingers I ever saw but he never scored against Oldham when Etty was in the team. It is no coincidence that the first time Oldham met St.Helens after Ettys departure to Wakefield, Vollenhoven grabbed a brace of tries.

Of Roughyeds And ... Batley

TODAY we extend a warm welcome to the players, officials and supporters of the Batley club. Proud founder members of the Northern Union and first ever winners of the Rugby League Challenge Cup in 1897. Indeed, the Gallant Youths, as they were nicknamed, retained the famous trophy the following year defeating Oldham on the way in the fourth round by three points to nil. However, it would be the Roughyeds who would take the trophy away from Mount Pleasant after their cup final victory over Hunslet in 1899. The cup saga

between the clubs continued with Batley winning a semi-final tie at Fartown in 1901 by nine points to two on the way to taking the cup for the third time when Warrington were defeated at Headingley.

There is no doubt that our Yorkshire visitors have had the best of the spoils in cup ties over the years. Most recently in the Trans-Pennine Cup final on July 10th 1998, when the resurrected Roughyeds fought their way to the final in the inaugural season for the new Oldham club, only to go down (12 - 28) at Mount Pleasant.

On the other hand the

Roughyeds have had much the better of league fixtures and in the forty year period from November 1950 to 1990, Oldham lost only four of the twenty six fixtures between the clubs. Included in that sequence were two draws and the 22 - 4 victory for the Roughyeds at Watersheddings on October 29th 1989 when a certain Tommy Martyn celebrated his debut, before a four thousand plus crowd, with a try and three goals.

In the circumstance he did

excellently and set up two tries in the last ten minutes.

The Club's trip to Whitehaven was a great success again and I must once again thank the people of Whitehaven for making us so welcome. The loss didn't help the last night, but a noisy bingo session and accompanying alcohol soon allowed us to drown our sorrows and thanks to the efforts of Chris, our Chairman, the trips and all the raffles, quizzes and every other method he could find to get money out of our pockets made £1000 for the club.

As this will probably be the last home game, can I thank all the contributors to this programme who give so generously of their time and expertise to produce what many claim is the best programme in the league.

Also I would like to congratulate Danny Guest who if he plays today will be celebrating his 100th game in an Oldham shirt. To my mind Danny has had his best season yet for us and let's hope this is the start of something big (sic).

On a final note can I say how nice it was to see 'Knocker' at Whitehaven - he promised he'd support us and as ever was true to his word. There will be news soon on a farewell do for Knocker so keep your eyes on the Oldham Chron.

Let's hope we see a lot of you again at the barbeque at the Social Club after the game. Fingers crossed for today and the rest of the season and look forward to seeing you all here at Boundary Park next season.

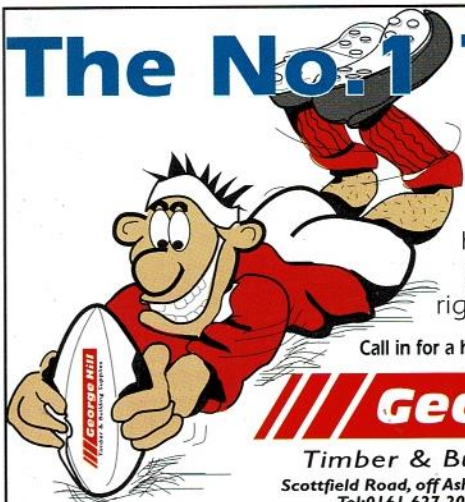

Back On The Terraces

..... With Simon Winnard

I FIRMLY believe that the end of season table never lies. Last year a season of unparalleled turmoil saw us scrape into 9th position and claim that all important National League 1 berth. However, analysing the current table clearly shows that we have made little or no progress since and, despite a clear investment in improved playing personnel, we once again find ourselves in the relegation mire.

A record of 5 wins out of 16 games in such a competitive division could well prove not enough for survival when considering the new play off structures. Inconsistent and for the most mediocre displays have been paralleled by some disappointing Boundary Park crowds and, whilst there is undoubtedly a hardcore of the Roughyed faithful who will turn up week in week out, it's clear that the floating majority simply won't put up with mediocrity in a summer time full of alternative attractions.

The new National League structure has meant that there is an increasingly fine line between success and failure, particularly when you consider that 4th position was a possibility just a matter of a couple of weeks ago. However, following consecutive defeats against Salford, Leigh, Hull KR and Whitehaven the Roughyeds have once again been dragged into a relegation dogfight.

Going into this crucial game, only 3 teams have a worse defence, namely today's opponents Batley, Doncaster and Dewsbury. Of those three, Dewsbury have already been relegated and today's opponents Batley now look to have destiny in their own hands. Indeed so vital is today's game that, should the unspeakable happen and the Bulldogs overcome the Roughyeds, there is every chance of Oldham having to play off for the right to remain in the division.

And off our chances? On form alone, Batley will certainly be considered the favourites. Indeed, I for one felt that we were extremely fortunate to come away from Mount Pleasant with a point. Ironically, it could well be the two draws against the Bulldogs and Whitehaven that prove vital to our survival. The recent loan signings will certainly help bolster the depleted ranks, however, let's hope that it's not a case of too

little too late as the Roughyeds clamber to avoid the bottom three.

One thing is for sure, should we be fortunate enough to avoid relegation, there are many difficult questions that will need to be answered in preparation before our next campaign. Nobody is doubting the commitment of everybody involved with the club, but clearly the paying public expect a much better product.

Away from the action, the recent appointment of the Rugby Football League's medical chief, Dr Lisa Phillips, as a non executive director of the National Sports Medicine Institute has prompted RFL chief executive, Richard Lewis to recently boast about the quality of the medical professionals working in Rugby League today.

I'm sure a certain Mr Kieron Cunningham would be delighted to take issue with this claim following his recent positive drugs test during his recovery from a potentially career threatening elbow injury. Unlike Mr Lewis, I refer of course to Mike Sutherland, the unqualified dietician employed by the RFL who administered the banned substance to the St Helens hooker. Having taken the substance in good faith, the Great Britain star's recovery was made all the more traumatic because of the charge hanging over his head through no fault of his own. Sutherland of course has since been dismissed after an RFL investigation revealed irregularities in his professional qualifications. Let's hope that the processes set in place for recognising medical professionals is somewhat more rigorous in the future.

On a final note, commiserations to our Academy lads who were defeated at Wakefield in the end of season play offs. Bucking the trend by investing in youth development, the Roughyeds have had a magnificent season, led ably by Shaun Gartland. I'm sure that Brian would have been extremely proud of his efforts this season and let's only hope that, following a proposed re-structure for next season, Shaun and the lads are rewarded with a championship place so that they can pit their wits against top flight opposition week in week out.

THREE games to go as I write this (before the Bank Holiday weekend) and we are in sixth place in National League One, with twelve points from fifteen games. If all three final games are won we would probably finish in fourth place with the advantage of a home tie in the first promotion play-off game; but if we finish with three losses, a final total of twelve points could easily leave us in a relegation play-off nail-biter. This surely demonstrates how successful the Rugby League's introduction of the National League system has been - at least, on the field, and in terms of the vibrancy of the competition, if not in marketing. Because the battle for promotion from NL2 also still involves 7 clubs, with very even betting on who will eventually emerge; and NL3 has been nothing if not incredible with Teesside and St. Albans both finishing in the top four, and indeed, Teesside already through to their Grand Final.

I recall my programme notes for the first week in February, in which I suggested that, on 2002 stats, we were favourites for 10th place in the league table, and that 'success' in 2003 would be a top 6 place. I see no reason to change that view!

In case this turns out to be the final match of the season, perhaps I can be allowed the indulgence of a few retrospective thoughts. What gains have we made as a club this season, as we begin to turn our thoughts to how we can best make further progress in 2004 and beyond?

First, to me, is the continuing development of several of 'our' young players, in what has been a tougher standard of rugby league. Messrs. Barber,

Dodd, Doran, Farrell, Goddard, Guest, Roden & Stazicker all seem to me, to be better players now than they were at the start of the season; wouldn't it be great to see them all developing further under Steve Molloy here next season.

Second, I would count what has already been done with the future in mind - Chris Hamilton's drive to get the Social Club up and running, and the progress made on the field at Academy level. Both are crucial areas, if we are to move significantly forward in the longer term.

Third was what we learned about the nature of the club when, in the middle of a very disappointing run of results, and with relegation apparently a real threat; the Chairman gave his full backing to the coach. No one ever agrees with every decision a coach makes, and all coaches have good and bad times. I must admit that even my faith was tested severely at Doncaster! But there could not have been a better way of demonstrating that we are back, with a long term plan, building on solid foundations. If only more than the hard-core 1200 or so fans would take the same view.

Finally, a word of sadness, and of thanks. Houghy, of course is the true Mr new Oldham Rugby, and thank goodness he keeps going. But, in the relatively short time he has been with us, Knocker Norton, has also epitomised to me the 100% effort, whatever the situation, which has been the basis of our successes since he arrived. I can't believe we would have conceded an average of 30 points a game this season if he had played, at full fitness, throughout the season. So it is very sad to see him go in the way he has now been forced to; and thanks for his contribution.

ANOTHER round of fixtures, another week of changing permutations in the National Leagues.

As the two competitions enter the final two weeks of league action, teams continue to change places, as the play-off spots become clearer.

In National League One, Dewsbury's relegation is now confirmed following their heavy defeat at Leigh. The Rams are set to stick by coach Andy Fisher and hand him the opportunity to rebuild a club that won the old Division One Grand Final in 2000.

At the other end of the table, the top three teams are decided, though today's mouth-watering clash at the Willows could decide whether Salford or Leigh take out the Minor Premiership. Third placed Rochdale Hornets are ruled out of the equation after a big loss at the City Reds last Sunday - a defeat they will have to recover from quickly ahead of the play-offs.

The most intriguing battle in NL1 at the moment though, is the race for the top six. With the top three assured of their places, and Hull KR all but mathematically certain, the remaining five teams (Featherstone, Whitehaven, Oldham, Batley and Doncaster) are all involved in the mix.

This weekend Oldham entertain Batley - with the loser effectively out of the race, depending on results elsewhere. In addition, Whitehaven take on Doncaster at Belle Vue in another "four-pointer".

Those that miss out on the top six could then end up in a relegation battle. In the much-criticised additional play-off, eighth place will play ninth, with the loser taking on the defeated side from the NL2 Grand Final for a place in NL1 next year.

Leigh coach Paul Terzis is one who cannot understand the system.

'All this will do is create an anti-climax to the season - we're just creating a game for the sake of it and that's wrong,' Terzis wrote in his monthly column for Rugby League World magazine.

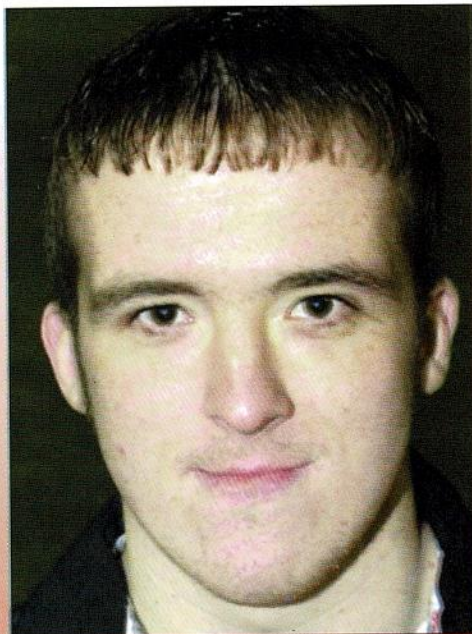
One thing the game does do though is present a second opportunity for successful sides in NL2 - a competition that continues to fascinate.

Chorley now hold pole position but they are likely to lose it if they are defeated at York today. Sheffield and Keighley can still finish top, but are relying on the Lynx to slip up.

Behind them, two more contenders - Barrow and Hunslet - clash at Craven Park today.

If Barrow win that one, and Swinton beat Keighley at home, the Raiders and the Lions will have a last-day showdown for the final top six place at Moor Lane next Sunday.

It all adds up to some more tremendous Rugby League action this weekend. With the venue for the National Leagues Grand Final double header being confirmed as Widnes' Halton Stadium on Sunday October 5, the seasons are boiling up nicely to a superb finale.

In Yer Face

REPORTS that Dewsbury Rams and Halifax will stand by their respective Coaches Andy Fisher and Tony Anderson despite relegation are highly encouraging. Hopefully it is a sign of a new realism on the part of club Directors for in each case here are two good coaches both of whom have helped implement sound academy schemes which should bear fruit in seasons to come. As Oldham know from their recent visit to Ram Stadium Dewsbury were a very competitive side who gave the Roughyeds a good run for their money. I will forecast here and now that Dewsbury will be favourites to bounce back to National League One at the first attempt because, even if Frank Watene their outstanding Kiwi prop departs for pastures new, they have a strong, well-balanced squad which will play for the coach.

Halifax, on the other hand, are a different proposition. As soon as the club lost their outstanding halfback combination of Andrew Dunneman and Gavin Clinch they were always going to be in trouble. Slowly but surely the more experienced and higher paid players have followed in the course of the season. Quite how the club with the lowest wage bill in Super League broke the salary cap is a mystery to me. Now, according to Tony Anderson, the vultures are circling over the remains of his squad which includes some outstanding young talent such as Andrew Brocklehurst, Jaymes Chapman, Sean Penkywic and Oldham born Ryan Clayton. If illegal approaches have been made to any of Halifax's young stars the clubs concerned should be hammered with heavy fines. Remember that it was Halifax who broke

the mould of four club Super League dominance when finishing third under John Pendlebury's brilliant coaching. Thereafter Wigan were quick to poach Gavin Clinch and Chris Chester both of whom they then discarded. Subsequently Wigan also signed David Hodgson and Danny Tickle, each of whom is good enough for the top flight. Add to these the departure, among others, of the likes of Shayne McMenemy, Brett Goldspink, Jamie Bloem (all well known to Oldham followers), Paul Rowley, Simon Baldwin, Jim Gannon and Darryl Cardiss and it is not difficult to see how the club lost its way. It all comes back to inadequate financial backing of course and is a lesson to all that poor revenue streams spell failure.

And what is the relevance of all this? Well, next season the clubs in National League One are not likely to be confronted by a relegated side boasting well paid, full-time professional players. Halifax are not likely to dominate the competition in the way that Huddersfield and Salford have. Ideally Salford will win this season's Grand Final and get promoted back to Super League: this then opens the door to every other club to aim for top spot in 2004 and a place at the Super League table. It would undoubtedly provide great possibilities for the likes of Leigh, Rochdale and Oldham (as long as Boundary Park remains our home) who have the facilities acceptable in the elite competition. You can be sure that the Oldham management team are well aware of this always supposing this season's grand Final hopes are not realised.

TODAYS final league match of the 2003 season takes place exactly forty years after Batley came to town for a Second Division match against Oldham which was staged on the old Watersheddings ground. The Roughyeds won that match on Saturday 31st August 1963 by 44 points to seven. They ran in ten tries with winger Trevor

Simms leading the way with a hattrick of touchdowns. Other try scorers were second-row forward Johnny Rae (2), hooker Len McIntyre (2), loose-forward Dave Parker and centres Johnny Noon and Brian Lord. Skipper and full-back Frank Dyson completed the scoring with seven goals. Centre Malcolm Shuttleworth scored the Batley try with prop Jim Etty, brother of John, adding a couple of goals.

On Saturday 31st August 1996 Australia won the Student World Cup when they defeated Western Samoa 38-16 in the final at Salford. The 3rd/4th-place match was staged as a curtain raiser to that final and was won by New Zealand who defeated France 22-20. A French substitute in that match was Laurent Minut who joined the Roughyeds three years later. Incidentally the tournament director of that competition was Abe Kerr, commercial manager at Oldham in the mid-1990s and a player who made the odd appearance in the Oldham A-team.

International rugby came to Watersheddings on Tuesday 31st August 1965 when the New Zealand tourists played Oldham. The Kiwis won a close match 5-2 with Rhodesian full-back John Winton landing a penalty for the Roughyeds. Making his debut for Oldham in that match was stand-off Tommy Canning who had been signed from the Vulcan R.U.F.C.

Canning went on to make 138 appearances for the Roughyeds and scored 27 tries and four goals during his five years at Watersheddings.

It was on this day in 1946, Saturday 31st August that second-row forward Les Thomas made his debut for the club. Unfortunately Thomas did not make the best of starts in red & white for, not only did he suffer an injury which kept him out for almost four months, but Oldham were beaten 5-0 at Liverpool Stanley. Thomas had been signed from Llanelli R.U.F.C. earlier in the month and he went on to represent both Wales and Great Britain during his short stay in Oldham. He made 58 appearances and scored 19 tries and 17 goals before transferring to Leeds two years later. The deal which took Thomas to Leeds saw Bob Batten and wing three-quarter Les Tate move in the opposite direction. Tate made his debut on Tuesday 31st August 1948 when Oldham gained revenge over Liverpool Stanley by beating them 19-0 at Watersheddings. He scored a try in that match but Tate was not the most prolific winger in the history of the club. He scored four tries and five goals from 26 appearances during his one season with the club. Incidentally the terms under which Tate agreed to sign for Oldham were £7.10s (£7.50p) for a win and £4 for a defeat. Home draw, losing pay, away draw, winning pay and no play, no pay. And those terms were about as good as any in the game!!

Sadly, it was on this day twelve months ago, Saturday 31st August 2002, that the former Oldham second-row forward Tommy Leyland died aged 80 years. Tommy joined the Roughyeds in 1948 from St. Helens and made 111 appearances over the following six years. He scored 15 tries and a couple of goals. His son, Tommy junior, also played for Oldham, during the late 1960s-early 1970s, and he is currently involved on the coaching staff with National Amateur Cup holders St. Annes.
