ARRIVA TRAINS CUP FORMAT

The competition includes all 20 National League clubs.

It commences Sunday 1st February with 5 groups of 4 teams. They are North, West, East, Pennine and Yorkshire. The West group includes Leigh Centurions, Swinton Lions, Chorley Lynx and Oldham Roughyeds. Each club plays the other three home and away plus one other team home and away from one of the other groups. In Oldham's case this is Rochdale Hornets.

To qualify automatically for one of the eight quarter final positions a club must finish top of its group. The other three qualifiers will be decided by the five group runners-up plus the best third placed club (based on points/points difference) entering a free draw. The draw will produce three matches, the winner of each will provide the other three quarter finalists.

The quarter finals and semi finals will be 'out of the hat' with the first team out having home advantage.

The final is scheduled for Sunday 18th July with the venue to be decided.

The previous winners are Huddersfield Giants and Salford City Reds.

A new season of summer rugby kicks off today (on February 1st!) with the visit of Chorley Lynx in the Arriva Trains Cup.

Last season the Lynx played exceptionally well under the coaching of a former Oldham favourite in Darren Abram to finish joint top of National League Two, so even though Abram has now departed to take up the reins at Leigh it would be foolish to underestimate Chorley's capabilities.

Judging by attendances at some of the friendlies spectators are already looking forward to the new season after being starved of their favourite sport for four months, at least in terms of cheering on their own club team.

The changes here at Oldham suggest a stronger side than last term with the addition of the former Rochdale contingent of James Bunyan, Paul Southern and Ian Watson. Watson in particular is an outstanding capture, a current Welsh international who, in my opinion, is the best scrum-half in National League One. A fine playmaker and accomplished kicker, he should add variety to the Oldham attack and give the side more options. Bunyan and Southern will provide plenty of go-forward and both were star performers in what was, if we lay local prejudice aside for a moment, an excellent Rochdale Hornets combination. In addition, Oldham have added pace on the wing with the permanent signing of Nick Johnson, so we must try to out flank defences, most especially here at Boundary Park on a wide pitch.

commencement of a new season and it is easy to get carried away with the potential of one's club. Just as we at Oldham will be quietly confident of making progress during the season, so too will the followers of the likes of Featherstone, Doncaster, Whitehaven and Batley. The Press seem to have decided that National League One has a big three consisting of Halifax, Leigh and Hull K.R. On paper that might look realistic but the other clubs mentioned will not be daunted, especially knowing how competitive the league was last year. There will he no runaway leader this time so expect the league table to be fairly fluid, with some rapid changes of position week by week. The obvious target in the league is to win your home fixtures and about one third to a half of your away games, a situation which should guarantee a top four place. Thereafter its all in the melting pot of form, injuries and loan signings as the Holy Grail of Grand Final and promotion to Super League looms.

In the meantime there is the little matter of the Arriva Trains Cup. In My view clubs need to treat this as an Important competition in its own right. Using it to experiment with your squad is tantamount to saying it doesn't matter and if you say that you can't grumble if the fans stay away. A good cup run breeds confidence and everyone likes a bit of silverware on the sideboard as well as the potential for extra revenue. And, unlike the Challenge Cup, everyone has a realistic chance of doing something In the Arriva Trains. Sheffield, Hunslet and Chorley will be among those looking to spring surprises and it will be good for the game if they do. So, who are my qualifiers for the knockout stages of the cup? In the Northern group Whitehaven should account for Gateshead, Barrow and Workington but runner-up is intriguing with Barrow my tip to pip Workington. In the West I'd like to think Oldham can pip Leigh, these two hopefully too strong for Chorley and Swinton. Halifax start favourites in the Pennine section but don't be surprised if Keighley knock them over in their home fixture. Hunslet and Rochdale are the other contenders here. Hull K.R. and Doncaster will battle it out to head the Eastern division. Top will be decided by whoever loses to Sheffield. And the 'group of death' this time is the Yorkshire section where, despite the difference in divisions, National League One sides Batley and Featherstone won't find it easy against National League Two sides York and Dewsbury. Batley's cross group games against Doncaster as against, Fev's with Hull K.R. could make all the difference.

Enjoy the competition: it promises to be a cracker!

IN THE NEWS

Pre season matches can create many differing opinions and the Law Cup match against Rochdale was no exception.

In the first period of play we recorded a 16 point advantage only to see it evaporate early into the second half. What a relief to see us edge in front by 2 points at the final hooter.

Should we use so many subs?

Does it ruin the consistency of play by continually changing the personnel?

Or can the coach be forgiven for protecting the 1st team personnel for the real thing?

Today is the real thing and there can be no substitute for getting it right.

This season promises to be even tighter than last year at the top as many believe that Halifax will not follow in the footsteps of Huddersfield and Salford and dominate the league. So if Halifax are not. to dominate, who will be up there at the end of the season.

I think Leigh have a very strong squad this season and a coaching team almost as long as the playing squad, what remains to be seen is how they all get together and whether players not regularly in the squad can be kept happy. Hull K.R. have also bought well and Martin Hall and his extended coaching team will be keen to impress. My only negative with Hull K.R. is whether they can improve their results away from home.

Halifax, as we have said, are not being rated by many but I don't think we can write them off and I feel they will be there or thereabouts. I certainly feel that the dark horses could be Whitehaven who have kept the nucleus of last year's side and bought in some more good players. Their coaching set up is good and the whole club appear to be on a very positive wavelength and keen and eager to do well.

How about ourselves? I think we have the nucleus of an excellent team with a fine balance of youth and experience. To my mind our season will depend on how our young academy stars make the transition from academy to National League One football. With the squad being relatively small we are going to need these young lads at some time in the season and this could be the making or breaking of their rugby careers and vital to the clubs progress. Let's hope the boards investment in youth will begin to pay off this season.

As for the rest I feel Rochdale, Keighley and Batley will struggle, which just leaves Doncaster and Featherstone, who I see as middle of the table this season.

I look forward to revisiting "Cougar Park" next season.

Then a fairly comfortable Salford win over Leigh. Couldn't really get too excited, though, since I really wanted both sides to lose!

October 12th Stayed at home to watch Leeds v Wigan on TV –who the hell fancies the M62 on a Friday evening? Very brave effort by Wigan, but once again Leeds under-performed on the big occasion. A great pity, I felt, because I thought Leeds had a much better chance of giving Bradford a game.

October 19th. As usual a great night out at Old Trafford for the Grand Final. Managed to find a new non-RL mate to take for the first time – and he was completely bowled over by the

whole event. Another brave effort by Wigan, but you got the feeling in the final 10 minutes of the first half, even though they were still ahead, that the tide was beginning to turn, and so it proved. To be fair, though, surely the right team won it at the end. Can't wait for Bradford v Penrith and what a fantastic performance it was by Richo's Panthers to win in Aus. It says an awful lot for the spirit there, and even more about the whole Aussie competition. It is like Wakefield winning Super League here in 2004; what a hope!

October 27th. Great to see Roden and Barber signed up again. Rumours of Watson and Southern too-which would certainly be better than more Leigh rejects!

November 3rd. Fantastic effort by young England 'A' v Australians, but can't say I am optimistic about the first test. League Express had a headline on its letter page "Pick a genuine stand off ", but I bet he won't.

November 8th What a fantastic effort by GB after Morley's moment of madness -but the frustrating thing is that, even with only 12 men on, we should still have won.





with GARETH WALKER of RUGBY LEAGUER & LEAGUE EXPRESS

READY TO RUMBLE

THE months of waiting are finally over - the Rugby League season gets underway today as the Arriva Trains Cup embarks on its journey.

All 20 National League One and Two clubs will had into today's matches rife with hope and optimism for the new campaign - whatever their varying targets for success might be.

While still considered a pre-season competition in some quarters, the ATC nevertheless has several merits, the major one being that it is a realistic opportunity for clubs at this level to win some silverware.

And with the Finals of this competition growing in stature during its two year's of existence (the first was the slightly different Buddies Cup, held midseason in 2002), there is also a significant financial boost awaiting the winners.

Over 6,000 attended last year's ATC Final between Leigh and eventual winners Salford at Spotland, and this year's event has the potential to be even bigger.

There have been a couple of slight modifications to last season's competition, with the groups changing a little and a new method of deciding the eight

quarter-finalists from the five groups.

The first five places are taken by the respective group winners.

The five group runners-up, plus the best third place club (based on competition points, then points difference), enter a free draw

The three clubs who win their play-off game go forward to the quarter-finals, along with the five group winners.

So who will progress from the group stages? For my money, the five group winners will be Whitehaven. Leigh Centurions, Halifax, Hull Kingston Rovers and York City Knights.

NL2 side York could emerge as the competition's surprise package - already they have built up some considerable momentum during the close season, and despite being in the toughest group, they might just have enough quality to make it to the last eight. But doubtless Batley, Featherstone and Dewsbury will have plenty to say about that.

Whoever progresses, it should be fascinating to watch it unfold, as well as laving down some genuine markers for the National League seasons. Enjoy

PLAYER SIMON SVABIC

SIMON Svabic, a baby-faced lad from Ashton-in-Makerfield, was barely 16 when he first linked up with Oldham. His father Peter, himself a rugby league nut and actively involved in the coaching and administration of the grassroots game, drove him to the old Watersheddings ground for talks with the club's academy coach at that time, Brian Gartland.


Brian, a talent spotter of some repute. had exceedingly high hopes of the bright young boy he had seen playing youth rugby down the East Lancs Road. One thing led to another and, while still at school, the Lancashire lad with the Yugoslavian surname signed on the dotted line.

It was 1996. The Bears were in Super League, with an alliance team and an academy side. Like a certain Paul Deacon a few months earlier, Simon settled quickly at Watersheddings, Brian said at the time: "He has good hands, good vision and for a lad of such slender years he is a good organiser."

Despite being so young, Svabic played regularly in the academy side of '96. A year later, with the financial storm clouds gathering Watersheddings, he was playing in both academy and alliance sides - and regularly scoring tries and kicking goals.

The future looked bright for him. Butlike so many other players of all ages, he suddenly found himself at sporting crossroads when the storm clouds burst and the old club was liquidated.

The players became free agents and went their separate ways. Simon, for better or worse, moved to Salford, but it is interesting to record that his last appearance for the Bears was in the final alliance game of the 1997 season, a 22-18 defeat by Warrington.

He kicked two goals, Deacon one, and tries were scored by Switzer, Gumbs and Prescott.

Svabic was still only 17 when he arrived at The Willows, but he eventually made the City Reds' Super League team and, while still a teenager, made a total of 18 appearances in the elite division, scoring three tries and kicking 19 goals for a haul of 50 Super League points.

From there it was on to Leigh, where he helped them to top the league in 2001 and to finish second in 2002 when the Centurions reached the Grand Final for the second time in three years only to go down 38-16 to Huddersfield at Widnes.

By that time changes were also taking place at cash-strapped Leigh and several players were on


the move at the end of that season, including Paul Anderson, Chris Morley, Chris Irwin and Svabic, all of whom came to Oldham.

In his first season with the Roughyeds, the standoff half, who can also play full-back, shared with Lee Doran the distinction of playing in all 32 games. Along the way he kicked 82 goals and two drop goals and scored five tries to become last season's top points scorer with 186.


Of the four who took the road from Hilton Park to Boundary Park in the late autumn of 2002, only Simon still remains with the club. He has signed a new one-year contract for 2004 and he is sure to play a key role in whatever the Roughyeds achieve in the coming season.


And THAT surname? His grandfather was Yugoslavian, but Simon and both his parents were born in Lancashire . . .Simon with a rugby ball in his hand.



ON THIS DAY

DON YATES LOOKS BACK TO FEBRUARY 1ST YESTERYFAR

This afternoon Oldham will be hoping for a much better result than the one they suffered in the Challenge Cup six years ago. On Sunday 1st February 1998 the Roughveds visited Widnes where they conceded nine tries in a 48-8 defeat. Two of those Widnes tries were scored by full-back Jim Salisbury who was making his debut for the Vikings after being signed from Liverpool-St.Helens RUFC the previous month. In August 1999 Salisbury spent a three-match loan spell here in Oldham with the Roughyeds but was not signed permanently. The Oldham try at Widnes was scored by hooker John Hough with secondrow forward Brian Quinlan landing two goals.

On the same afternoon, Sunday 1st February 1998, Chorley Lynx, then playing under the name Lancashire Lynx, also ran in nine tries as they demolished West Hull 46-0 in the same competition. Making his debut for Lynx was centre Darren Abram, signed from Oldham a couple of weeks earlier. He was a try scorer against the Humbersiders and then developed into a superb coach at Chorley before moving on to Leigh.

In 1936 Wales won the International Championship for the first time and they did so with the help of two Oldham forwards. The title was clinched at the old Craven Park ground of Hull Kingston Rovers on Saturday 1st February 1936 when Wales defeated England by 17 points to 14. The Oldham forwards involved were prop Lou Rees and second-rower Norman Pugh. Rees, a former Welsh rugby union international, joined the Roughyeds from Cardiff RUFC and Pugh from Swansea RUFC. They were both loval and reliable servants to the Oldham club and epitomised the Welsh team. Although England fielded a glamorous line-up of household names, the lesser known but more workmanlike Welsh were well worth their victory.

Great Britain entered a team in the 1997 World Nines Competition, which was staged in Townsville, Queensland, Australia. Oldham had one player included in the British squad, talented half-back and playmaker Martin Crompton. On the second day of the three-day tournament, Saturday 1st February, the British boys defeated France 20-0, Japan 46-0 and trophy holders New Zealand 12-10. Crompton scored two tries in the victory over Japan and acquitted himself well in the other matches but could not prevent Britain from losing to Western Samoa in the semi-finals. New Zealand went on to retain the trophy.

Twelve months ago, on Saturday 1st February 2003, the rugby league world was rocked with the news of the death of former St.Annes'. BARLA Great Britain and Oldham forward Peter Deakin. He was aged just 49. Peter was a larger-than-life character with an infectious enthusiasm for the game. The rugby world in general will probably remember him most for his commercial acumen which caused crowds to rocket so spectacularly at Bradford Bulls. But there was much more than that to Peter Deakin whose legacies are scattered throughout both codes of rugby. The new stadium at Warrington; the World Club Challenge; the Sale Sharks move to Stockport; and the success enjoyed by Saracens RUFC all occurred as a direct result of Peter Deakin's perception. Here in Oldham he will constantly be remembered with affection at St.Annes, where he was always on hand to offer advice and assistance, and at Watersheddings where he made four appearances for the Roughyeds during the late 1970s. Injury cut short memories of Peter on the field of play but, off it, he will always be remembered.




