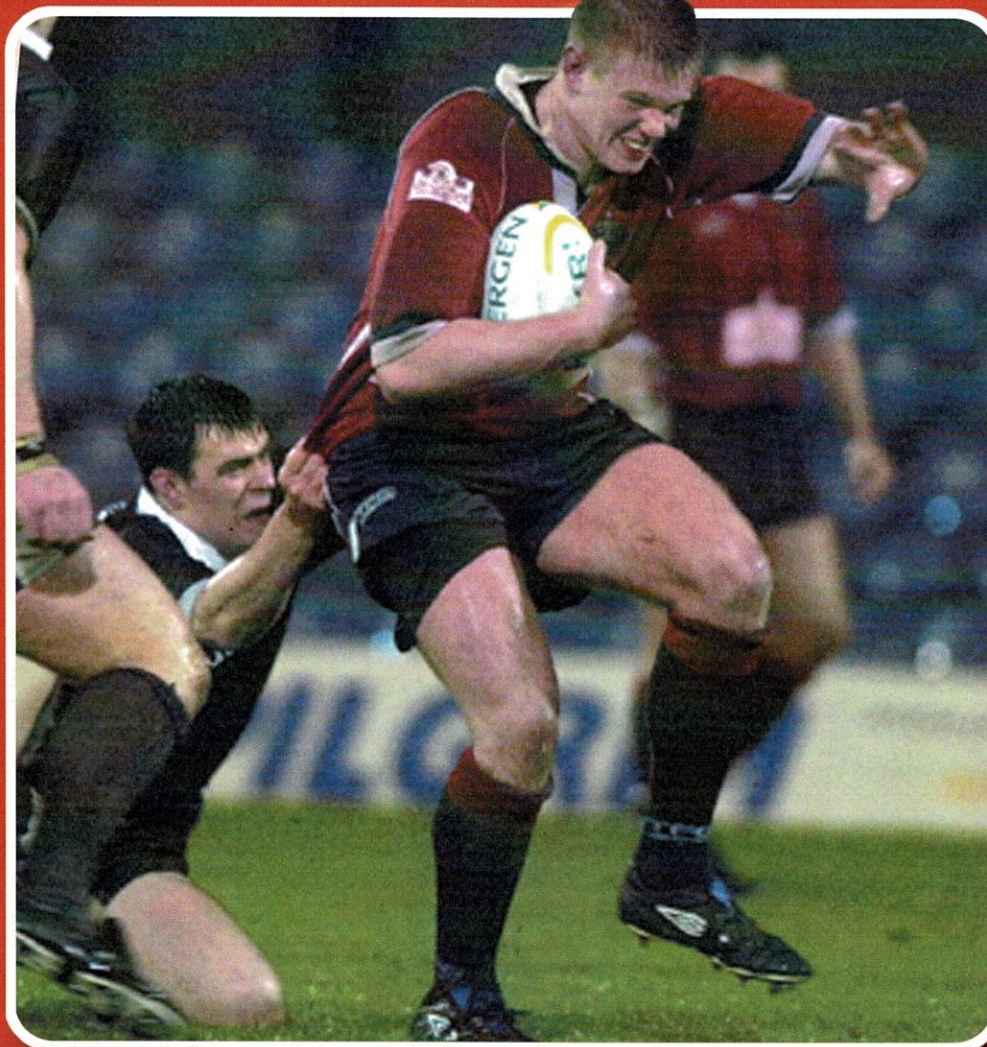

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The Powergen Champion Schools Cup starts to get serious this week, as schools up and down the country prepare for the last-sixteen clashes in each age group.

After massively successful regional and local stages of the competition, the Powergen Champion Schools Tournament reaches its national stage this week with schools knowing they are now only three wins away from a place in the finals being played in Cardiff on Powergen Challenge Cup Final weekend.

With over one thousand secondary schools entering this year's competition and 16,000 school children taking part across the UK, the Powergen Champion Schools Tournament is now the largest Rugby League competition in the world.

Charlotte Meekham, Powergen Sponsorship Executive commented: "The Powergen Champion Schools Tournament has been a spectacular success story over the last two years and we are extremely proud to be supporting such a worthwhile initiative.

"With school teams across the UK now only three wins away from appearances at the Finals in Cardiff, there should be some fantastic action being played this week as the standard of league continues to get better and better."

The list of schools left remaining in the last sixteen shows the divergence and spread Rugby League has gained through the competition. Alongside established Rugby League schools such as St John Fisher (Wigan) and Cowley High (St Helens) are King's House Preparatory School in Richmond (the former school of England rugby union skipper Lawrence Dallaglio) and Cardiff's largest school, Whitchurch.

St Helens' skipper Paul Sculthorpe will be hoping his old school Counthill (Oldham) can progress through to the quarter finals, while Parramatta Eels' new signing Chris Thorman will also be keeping a keen eye out for his old school Burnside (North Tyneside) who have also reached the last sixteen.

"Virtually all the Secondary Schools in Oldham play Rugby League through the good work of the teachers at the schools, the local amateur clubs and the Oldham Rugby League Schools Association, which all come under the banner of Oldham Service Area," said Chris Thair, the RFL's North West Regional Development Manager.

"Oldham has always been a strong area for nurturing top talent and playing rugby in school time is an important part of that process.

"Good luck Counthill, and may I take this opportunity to thank everyone involved in making this years Powergen Champion Schools Cup the biggest ever RL competition."

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IN THE CHAIRMAN'S OPINION

Welcome to Boundary Park for today's fourth round Powergen Challenge Cup tie against Charlton Rovers.

When we sometimes play amateur opposition we need to dig deep to find information about them but after their exploits in the last round Charlton found instant fame when they dumped Dewsbury Rams out of the competition in a game which ultimately cost Andy Fisher the Dewsbury coach his job.

Despite what people may say it is still a fantastic achievement for any amateur team to beat a professional team and Charlton are to be congratulated on their victory.

It was interesting to listen to people from National Leagues One and Two at the draw for the fourth round, which was held at Odsal Stadium in Bradford, about why the amateur clubs should not be allowed to play National League clubs.

Don't forget this was coming from victorious National League Chairmen and not representatives from the three clubs who had been knocked out by amateur opposition!

This year was no different in either the fact that at least one professional club was knocked out in round three or because people moan generally about having to play amateur teams.

The general gripe seems to be that "we lose a fortune by playing these teams in round three and its money we can't afford to lose".

It is a fact that these games rarely make money for the professionals because, with a shared gate and the higher running costs that professional teams have, we are bound to lose money - our own situation is a prime example because with the rent and gatemens and stewarding costs we are paying over FIVE THOUSAND pounds a game. In cup matches although some of the costs are shared the ground rental is borne by the home club.

Whilst in the current financial climate for clubs outside of Super League, with little outside or central funding, that is undoubtedly a major problem. It always seems to escape Chairmans' minds that progression to the next round gives higher prize money and the

opportunity to draw one of the "big guns" in the next round.

I am quite sure that you will not find anybody connected with Workington Town complaining that they had to play Crossfields in round three given that they now have the chance of a big pay day against Leeds Rhinos in round four.

That tie itself also epitomises exactly what the Powergen Challenge Cup is all about because, if we forget the financial side of things for one minute, every year every Chairman, Coach, player, sponsor and fan sets off with a cup dream.

We have all fantasised about our club getting to the final, playing a big team and causing an upset or maybe even just getting the chance to play against a side you would not otherwise get to play like one of the Russian or French teams.

In that statement lies the answer to all the negative comments about the amateurs being in the competition - who are we to take away the dreams of everybody connected with the amateur clubs who week in week out put in a lot of work - these games are their reward for that and you will never hear me saying we should alter the format for that reason alone.

Today's game will certainly be a hard one and there is no doubt we will need to be on our guard but there are no excuses whatsoever for us not being prepared and indeed I know we are. We hope everybody connected with the Charlton club enjoys their day out but leaves looking forward to next year's dream not the next round's dream!!

Finally I would like to thank Powergen for their continued support of the Challenge Cup and we hope that their guests today enjoy the game.

As usual don't forget to be as loud as possible as with a big following behind them our opponents today will be highly motivated and as I keep on saying you as fans can play your part - I only wish more of you believed me!

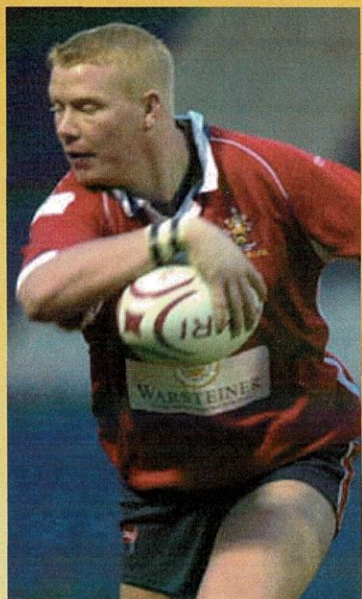

leveller and certainly didn't help our cause.

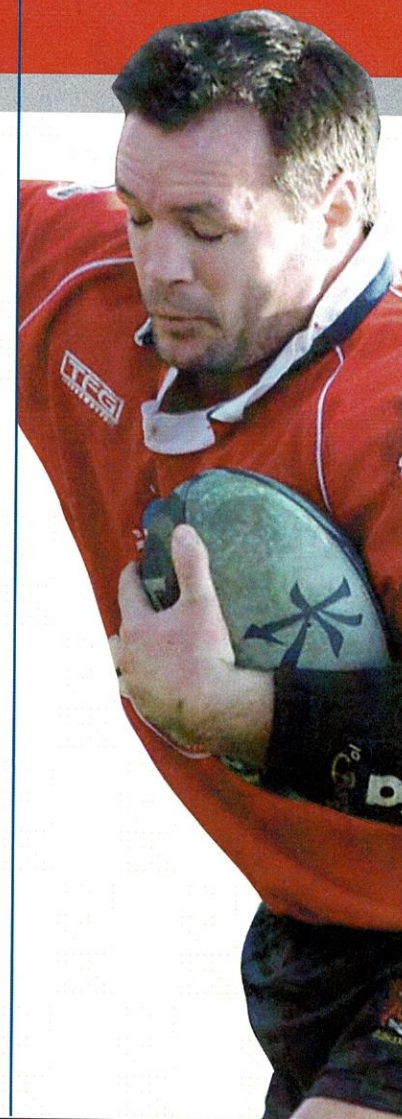

own.

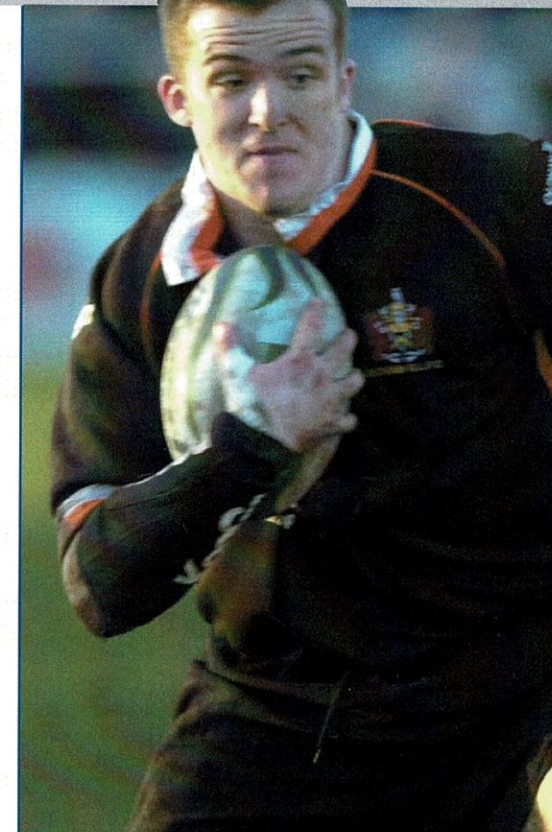
I saw the specialist earlier in the week and he's

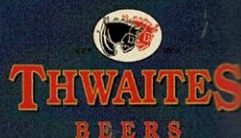
"The lads are treating

The World Club Championship and the opening round of Super League fixtures have re-enforced what a wonderful game Rugby League is. And, with the outstanding performances provided by several amateur clubs in the Powergen Challenge Cup, it is clear that quality on the field of play percolates right down through the game.

So it is with some dismay that one reads of continuing problems off the field. The lockout of some Warrington Wolves season ticket holders at the opening of the new Halliwell-Jones Stadium is just not acceptable. I know the administrators will plead special circumstances because of the circulation of numerous forged tickets, but I find the statement by Wolves media officer, Gina Coldrick, bizarre: namely that, "we know at this stage that there were a lot of forgeries, but we don't know how many or WHICH STAND THEY WERE FOR." Pardon? Wolves' officials couldn't tell which part of the ground was most affected? Surely not?

Similarly clubs continue to struggle with replica merchandise. From lack of Great Britain jerseys last autumn to lack of new season replicas, clubs seem beset with difficulties. They get away with it because fans are loyal but it shouldn't happen. Before Christmas a business colleague with no particular interest in Rugby League went to Odsal to buy a Bradford Bulls shirt for his young nephew who has just started playing junior football in West Yorkshire. My colleague was appalled at the rutted driveway at Odsal, which took him to a poorly lit area serviced by a portakabin outside of which was a long queue. Standing in the cold he eventually got to the counter to be quoted £30 for the junior shirt he required. Being in the textile business, however, he was outraged as the shirt was of polyester. Now I know polyester takes printing better and retains colour longer, but for comfort it's a long way behind cotton. Why else do all these Premier league footballers wear cotton T-shirts under their playing kit? Anyway he wasn't having any of it and ended up in Bradford buying a Kooga cotton, England Rugby Union replica. I know not everyone would react in the same way but remember this is the marketing arm of the supposedly best Rugby League Club in the world following their World Club Challenge victory. A portakabin on a slag heap! Makes you think doesn't it?

And so to today's Fourth Round Powergen Challenge Cup fixtures. In the last round I successfully forecast an East Hull victory at Swinton but I did not see today's visitors Sharlston defeating Dewsbury. And after saying I couldn't see Castleford Panthers shocking Oldham, I'd better be careful with today's predictions because, although the Panthers didn't pull off a shock result

they certainly put on a magnificent show of commitment and skill. Rest assured Sharlston will be just as determined and confident so Oldham, who have not yet performed consistently for 80 minutes, will have to be on their guard,

Elsewhere, by the time you are reading this, several ties will have been decided. On Friday, Wakefield should have swamped Chorley, and on Saturday Warrington will have accounted for Rochdale. Castleford, whose friendly performances and opening day defeat at Huddersfield have been less than convincing, will have scraped a win over U.T.C. from Perpignan and, similarly, Batley will have edged home against Bradford Dudley Hill, another amateur club I seriously underestimated last time out.

In today's fixtures Huddersfield will win by about 20 points against Pia, Doncaster will defeat Hunslet, Hull will account for Leigh after a titanic struggle. Featherstone will overwhelm London Skolars, Wigan will account for Widnes and Leeds will overwhelm Workington.

The other games are where there could be upsets. I have confidence in Salford to win at London Broncos (brave forecasting there) and in Oldham to keep their heads against Sharlston. I fancy York at Sheffield and think Halifax, despite an unconvincing start to the season, will have enough ability to take out Limoux.

And the big one? Bradford are too powerful for St Helens, but what a magnificent match it should be.

Finally, the joy of Rugby League as recorded by referee Dave Asquith, who officiated his 1000th game last week. In charge of a game between Blackpool and Chester last summer a woman collared him after the game and said, "I've been watching you for 20 years, Asquith, and you're still bl***y crap." Who'd be a referee?

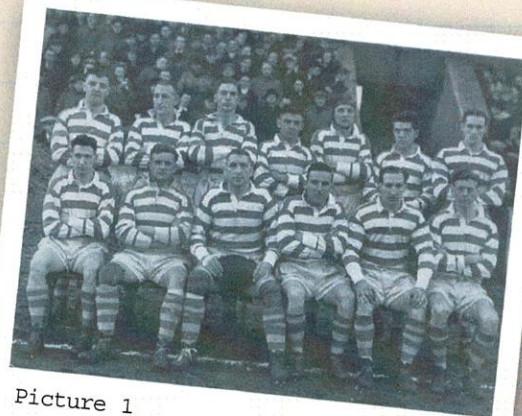

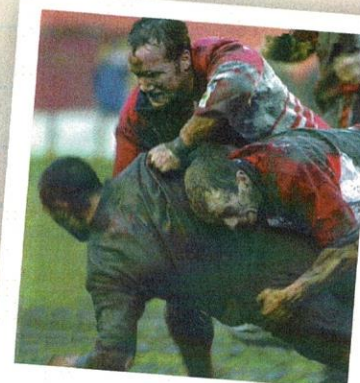

LITTLE SHARLSTON ROVERS HISTORY

The village of Sharlston has been steeped in rugby football for over one hundred years. Well back in 1881 results have been found when Sharlston played local teams from Wakefield and Featherstone. In 1895 they joined the Wakefield and District League and were crowned "League Champions". This was the start of many cups and trophies, which were to come the way of Sharlston Rovers, without doubt one of the oldest amateur clubs in existence.

Sharlston have produced a long list of talented rugby league players. Probably the first one of note was Frederick Goodfellow in 1895, he was the father of one of the all time greats, Herbert Goodfellow, the Wakefield half back who, incidentally, signed for Oldham in 1951 making 23 appearances.

The most famous player in Sharlston's history was Jonty Parkin, the first player to go on three consecutive tours of Australia in 1920, 1924, and 1928. For two of these series he was captain. Jonty registered with Sharlston in 1909 and was then on his way to the Hall of Fame where he proudly hangs today.

The list of Sharlston greats reads on:- Neil Fox MBE, world record 6,220 points in a career; brothers Don Fox and Peter Fox; three Lance Todd trophy winners - all Sharlston lads - were Neil Fox (Wakefield Trinity), Don Fox (Wakefield Trinity) and Carl Dooler (Featherstone Rovers). The list reads on and on right up to the modern era.

Sharlston are no strangers to the Challenge Cup either, having been in the First Round proper on three previous occasions. In the 1934/5 season Sharlston Rovers made the long trip to Barrow and were not disgraced although Barrow deserved their 28-3 victory. The next occasion was in 1938/9 when Bramley visited Sharlston and again the Rovers put on a fine show, finally going down 23-5.

Workington Town were the next to visit Sharlston in 1945/6 where the amateurs won by 12 points to 7. Unfortunately, that year, it was a two-leg affair and they were to lose overall by the slimmest of margins.

As we all know the last time they were in the first round proper (now the 3rd round) was just a couple of weeks ago when at Featherstone's Post Office Road ground Sharlston Rovers wrote a new chapter in Rugby Challenge Cup history defeating Dewsbury Rams 30 - 28.

The Rovers have evidently displayed brilliant form throughout the season lead by the gallant Martin Wood. Martin has been like a breath of fresh air to the club. Gordon Long and Chance Leak have also done fantastic jobs and the team has a unique blend of experience and youth. They have high hopes of young stars like Danny Grimshaw, Lee Lingard, Gareth Davis and Andy Booth, and getting to the fourth round of the competition must surely be the highlight of their season. There is no way however that they will see this as the end of the road. The pride and passion and 'never say die' attitude that goes with the club means they will once again give it their all to bring off another shock and there is no chance that Oldham will take them lightly.

AS IAN SEES IT

The 2004 Round 3 of the Challenge Cup must have been one of the most significant in the long history of the competition. Three victories for amateur sides over semi-professionals, as well as three others for French sides, and three more amateur defeats by 2, 6 and 8 points, makes for the best ever performance by what might best be regarded as challengers to the 'old guard'. So this weekend's 4th Round is made up of the 12 Super League sides, 8 from NL1, 6 from NL 2, plus the 3 amateurs and 3 from France: definitely the most cosmopolitan mixture there has ever been in the last 32 of the famous old tournament.

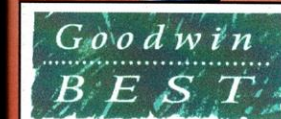
And you wouldn't completely bet against another so-called upset or two in this weekend's fixtures. Although the away side should win in each case, in theory, you can't imagine that any of Doncaster, Whitehaven, Halifax or Batley would be anything but relieved and delighted to come away from Hunslet, East Hull, Limoux and Dudley Hill respectively with a win under their belts.

Before we consider the reasons, due credit should first be given to the RFL authorities. It was they who opened the Challenge Cup to more amateur sides, and then to the French, not to mention the Russians - and this season's results so far could not have provided greater vindication. The only pity is that in general attendances have not really reflected the higher quality of the competition - the average was just 996 in Round 3. How about a campaign, to raise the profile, for the BBC to screen a couple of Round 3 games next season?

So do the 'shocks' so far mean a lowering or a raising of standards? I cannot believe that it is anything but the latter. Certainly the standard of Cas Panthers' performance here at Boundary Park, particularly in defence, was superb, and people who saw the games say the same about East Hull and Dudley Hill. I am sure that the standard of coaching at the best amateur clubs is now several grades higher than it used to be, particularly in terms of individual skills and defensive patterns - again, credit due to national coaching schemes, surely? - and that this has narrowed the gap between the better amateur sides and the National League teams. And long may it continue. How long before promotion on merit between NL3 and NL2? But, with all due respect to the other 5 'shock' causers of Round 3, to me the most significant result of all was the one at Hull K.R. They are one of the three favourites in NL1 to make Super League next year, but lost, on their own, always very hostile, midden to UTC. What a great pity that the Catalan side didn't draw Castleford at home in Round 4; but, even so, how I would love to see them compete well, even if an actual victory might at this stage in their development be too much to hope for.

UTC, of course, are the French side chosen to join Super League, and to pick up the baton carried so briefly by Paris St. Germain in 1996 and 1997. Although there was a great deal wrong with the PSG experiment - Don Yates pointed out in League Express earlier this month that when they were the first overseas club to play a Challenge Cup match, at Batley, seven years ago, their 17 did not include a single French player, for example - who can forget the heady days of the opening Super League match in Paris? And although our second trip to the Charlety stadium holds awful memories, since relegation (and oblivion) of the Jim Quinn club was assured there, the inclusion of a French club added so much to the status, credibility and spectator-appeal of Super League. How much better it could be, too, if a genuinely French club, based in one of the true homes of Jeu a Treize in the deep south-east of the country, could become a properly competitive member of Super League. That is why UTC's victory at Craven Park could be so significant. I have nothing at all against Cas; quite the reverse, in fact, since they stand out as a small town club who have shown themselves able to survive and indeed prosper against the big boys in Super League. But it is also why I would love to see UTC in Round 5, with a home fixture against a top side for a place in the quarter-finals - and on BBC TV, too.

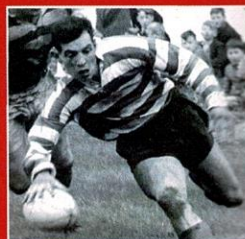

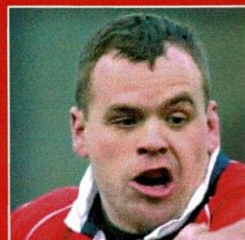

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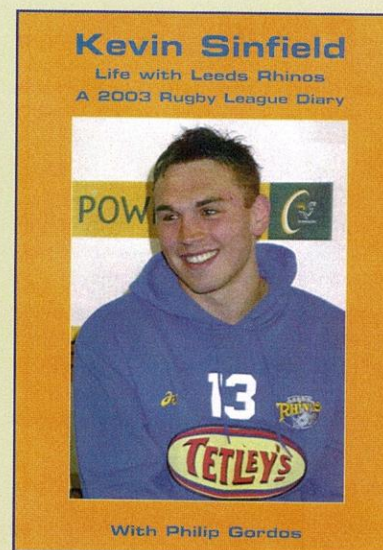

Oldham born Kevin Sinfield was only 16 when he first broke into the Leeds' Rhinos first team so it was no surprise when the brilliant ex Waterhead RLFC youngster was given the responsibility of being club captain at the age of 22, by then a seasoned campaigner!

The recently released book **Kevin Sinfield, Life with Leeds' Rhinos** written by Leeds supporter Philip Gordos is a day to day diary of the 2003 season. It's an hero to villain affair reliving the tension and ultimate glory as a result of Sinfield's magnificent touch line conversion that forced extra time and with it the chance to forge victory against St Helens in last season's Powergen Challenge Cup semi-final, followed by the stupidity of the young captain's decision not to take a reasonably easy shot at goal to level the scores 22 - 22 late in the game against the Bulls in the final. Sinfield decided to go for glory running the ball in the hunt for four points but Bradford's defence held to take the trophy. An ill thought and unprofessional decision by Sinfield but there is no cover up and Gordos tells it as it was.

This is a fascinating insight into the day to day running of one of the sport's top clubs and not failing to cover the imprisonment of Chev Walker and Ryan Bailey.

WHERE ARE THE CROWDS?

WHILE Super League clubs were rightly celebrating their bumper opening weekend attendances last Sunday night, there must also be concerns at the RFL about the decreasing numbers coming through the gates at National League level.

While the top flight could reflect on a record aggregate attendance for a six fixture round, with an average of 11,583 supporters attending each game, the story was a whole lot different in the Arriva Trains Cup.

Of the ten ATC fixtures staged last Sunday, just four attracted four figure crowds - at Hull KR, Leigh, Featherstone and Hunslet.

That is a travesty to the standard of Rugby League that players at this level are producing. The quality of games at this level has continued to rise during the last few years - but unfortunately, the crowds have not.

This is not a recent, one-off problem.

In 2003, only five clubs out of the 20 in the National Leagues had an average gate that was an increase on the previous year. Contrast that to Super League, where eight of the 12 clubs reported increases.

Between 2001 and 2002, only four clubs' average attendance rose.

In the first season of summer rugby in 1996, the 11 clubs in what was then Division One, had an overall average crowd of 2,405.

Last season in NL1, that figure was 1,462.

The individual club averages in 1996 were: Batley (1,358), Dewsbury (1,402), Featherstone (1,988), Huddersfield (3,344), Hull (3,008), Keighley (4,871), Rochdale (1,271), Salford (3,495), Wakefield (2,109), Whitehaven (1,081) and Widnes (2,528).

What some of those clubs wouldn't do to have those figures this season!

So what can be done to improve the situation?

Well, if the standard on the field is improving - as just about every coach at this level will insist it is - then it is a matter of the clubs selling that product to the public.

Are clubs doing enough to market themselves, even on a small scale? Is it to do with the scheduling of the season? Can more money be put aside by the RFL to help the clubs promote their games?

They are undoubtedly questions that need answering if the National Leagues are to continue operating at their current level, and hopefully progress in coming years.

Several clubs are doing superb work in the local communities, thanks often to the innovative Rugby League Club Support Unit. In addition, the RFL's help in setting up blossoming lottery schemes is reaping its benefits in certain areas.

But clubs will continue to stand still, and in some cases struggle badly, unless they can attract more people through the turnstiles.

JAMES BUNYAN

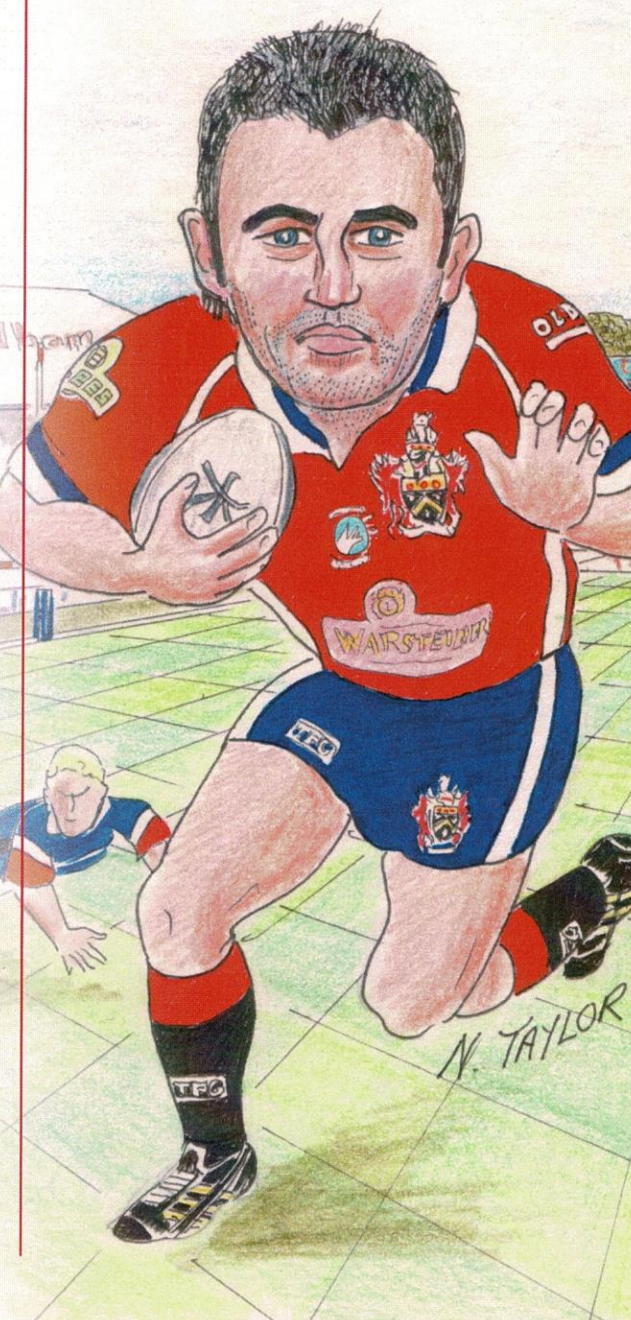
JAMES Bunyan, one of our three new signings from Rochdale Hornets', played a lead role last season in the Hornets' third-place finish in National League Division One. He made 29 starts, plus two appearances off the bench, for a total of 31 matches out of a possible 32 - a record of consistency bettered only by another of our former Scotland men, Ian Watson.

A Yorkshireman - and proud of it - James was born in Leeds. His first professional club was Huddersfield, for whom he played in 1998 and 1999, making a total of 15 Super League appearances and scoring two tries.

Then it was on to Doncaster in 2000, before Martin Hall, preparing a side for his first season in coaching, 2001, took him to Rochdale where he was to spend the next three seasons under Hall. Rochdale finished third in each of those seasons - behind Leigh and Widnes in a 19-club Northern Form Premiership in 2001 (Oldham were fourth); behind Huddersfield and Leigh in an 18-club NFP in 2002 (Oldham were ninth); and behind Salford and Leigh in a ten-club National League first division in 2003 (Oldham were fifth).

For much of his time at Scotland, Bunyan played in the second row, while Matt Calland and Brendan O'Meara wore No 3 and No 4 for the Hornets. But when that partnership was broken up before the start of the 2003 season, Hall had no hesitation in switching 26-year-old James to the centre.

He quickly made a reputation as a fearless defender out wide and a strong-running attacker, who could always be relied upon to give his opposite number a tough time. In particular, he seemed to like scoring tries against the Roughyeds - little wonder, then, that when he came out of contract and Hornets were unable to keep hold of their 2003 players

because of a financial crisis, Oldham moved in to sign him along with his Hornets team mates, Watson and Paul Southern.

Hornets played to a pattern in which their second-rowers get wide at every opportunity the result being that centres Bunyan and Jon Roper were somewhat overshadowed in the scoring charts by Paul Smith and David Larder, who finished with 35 tries between them: a remarkable record for two second-row forwards.

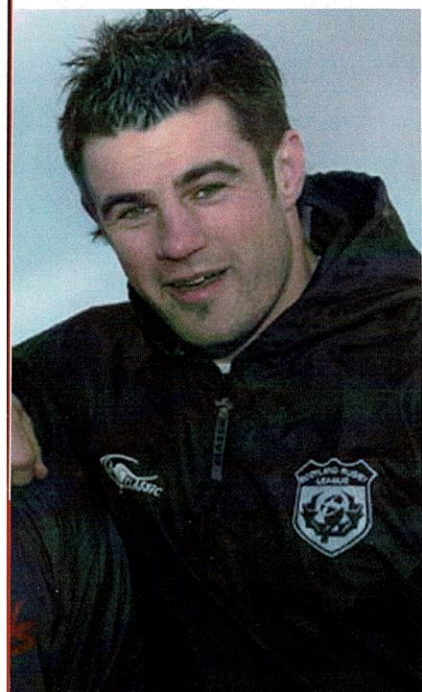
Smith collected 19 tries and Larder 16, while Roper chipped in with 17 and Bunyan with seven – 24 for the centres as against 35 for the second-rowers.

Nevertheless, James's strong, forceful and direct running, coupled with his ability to offload to good support, played a huge part in a stack of tries scored by his team mates. And how he liked to score against Oldham teams!

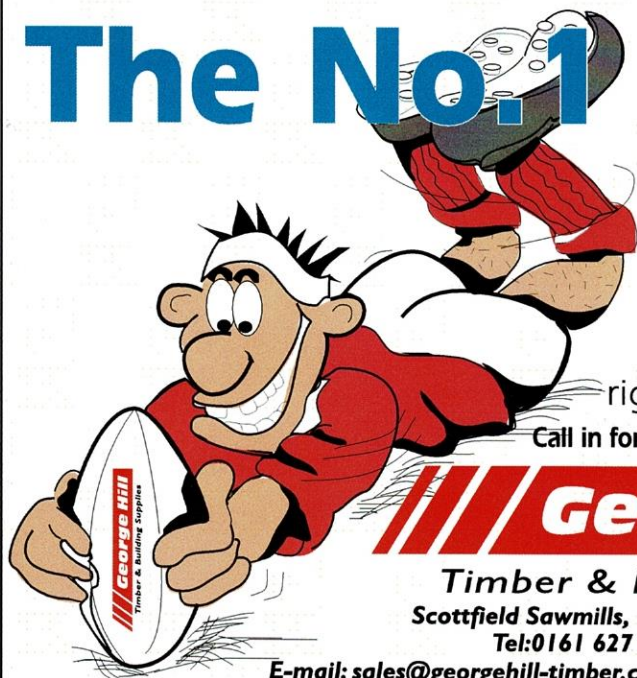
He opened up with a try in the early-season Powergen Challenge Cup win against Oldham St Anne's and then added another in a 22-22 draw with the Roughyeds at Boundary Park in the Arriva Trains Cup.

Later in the season, in the first of the National League first division games, he crossed twice for Hornets, as did his fellow centre Roper, in a 33-28 win at Boundary Park. His seventh and final try of the season was scored against Hull Kingston Rovers at Spotland in a memorable play-off match in which Rovers snatched a last-gasp try to win 30-26 in the elimination semi-final.

It was to be his last try, and his last appearance, for the Hornets. The Roughyeds are confident that Rochdale's loss will be Oldham's gain.



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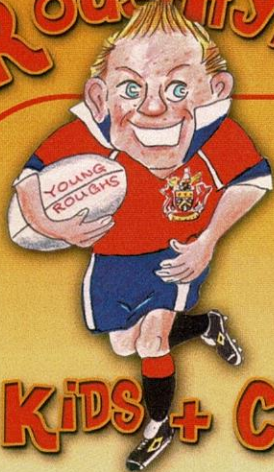

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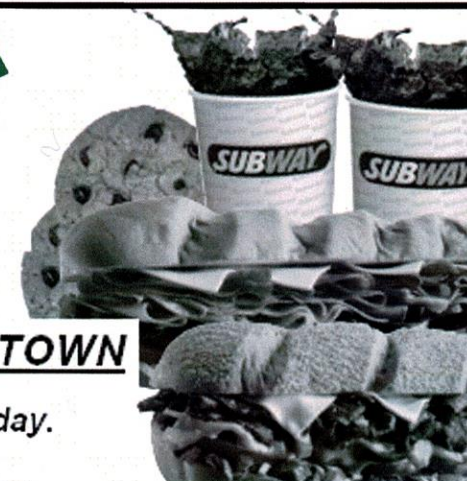

DON YATES LOOKS BACK TO FEBRUARY 29TH YESTERYEAR

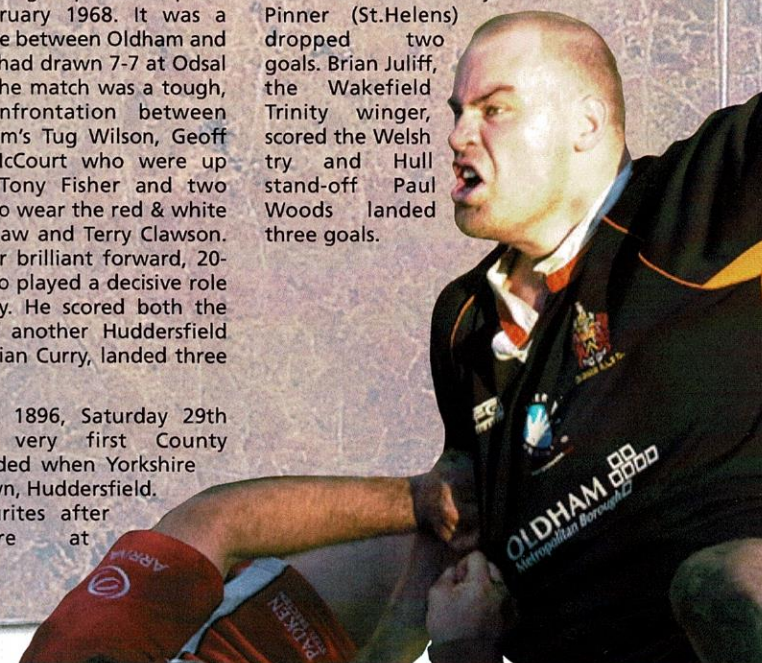
This afternoon Sharlston Rovers pay their first visit to Boundary Park. It is not the first time that their inspiring loose-forward Martin Wood has appeared at this venue, nor is it the first time that a team from the Calder region has travelled over to Oldham for a Challenge Cup-tie. On Sunday 29th February 1964 Oldham entertained Featherstone Rovers before a Watersheddings crowd of over 12,000 during that amazing 1964 Challenge Cup campaign. It was for a second round tie which Oldham won 9-7 with a try from hooker Len McIntyre and three goals from skipper Frank Dyson. Arnie Morgan scored the Featherstone try and Malcolm Dixon landed two goals but the tie was probably decided before kick-off when goal-kicking loose-forward Don Fox, a Sharlston product, was ruled out. He was Featherstone's top point scorer that season with twelve tries and 129 goals so his absence severely hampered Rovers' chance of victory that day. Oldham went on to reach the semi-finals that year in an unprecedented tournament which, remarkably, produced nine draws and that heart breaking abandoned semi-final when Oldham led Hull Kingston Rovers in extra time but still failed to reach Wembley.

Another epic Watersheddings cup-tie took place on Thursday 29th February 1968. It was a replayed second round tie between Oldham and Bradford Northern who had drawn 7-7 at Odsal the previous Saturday. The match was a tough, sometimes brutal, confrontation between forwards such as Oldham's Tug Wilson, Geoff Fletcher and Charlie McCourt who were up against Ken Roberts, Tony Fisher and two players who were later to wear the red & white of Oldham, Terry Ramshaw and Terry Clawson. However, it was another brilliant forward, 20-years old Bob Irving, who played a decisive role in Oldham's 12-2 victory. He scored both the Roughyeds' tries whilst another Huddersfield born player, full-back Brian Curry, landed three goals.

It was on this day in 1896, Saturday 29th February, that the very first County Championship was decided when Yorkshire met Lancashire at Fartown, Huddersfield. The Tykes were favourites after defeating Lancashire at

Watersheddings the previous December. The Red Rose triumphed, however, with Lancashire winning 8-3. Three Oldham players were included in the Lancashire line-up with centre Sam Lees scoring a try and goal. The other two Oldham players involved were forwards Emanuel Bonser and Bob Edwards. Edwards was, in fact, from Durham but qualified to play for Lancashire under the residential rule. Lees and Bonser were both Oldham lads, Lees was from Lees and Bonser from Greenacres.

There was just one Oldham player involved in the European Championship clash which was staged on the old Craven Park ground, Hull on Friday 29th February 1980. That player was the versatile Bill Francis, a Featherstone lad, who played at centre for Wales against England. The match ended in a 26-9 victory for the English who went on to win the Championship whilst Wales finished up with the wooden spoon. A crowd of 7,557 saw England score four tries through prop-forwards Roy Holdstock (Hull Kingston Rovers) and Keith Rayne (Wakefield Trinity), centre John Joyner (Castleford) and full-back George Fairbairn (Wigan), who incidentally is a Scot. Fairbairn also landed six goals and loose-forward Harry Pinner (St.Helens) dropped two goals. Brian Juliff, the Wakefield Trinity winger, scored the Welsh try and Hull stand-off Paul Woods landed three goals.



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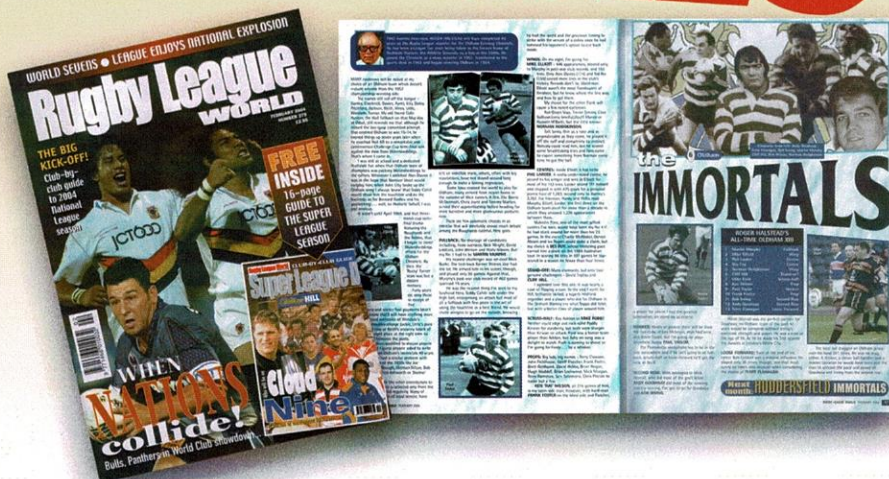

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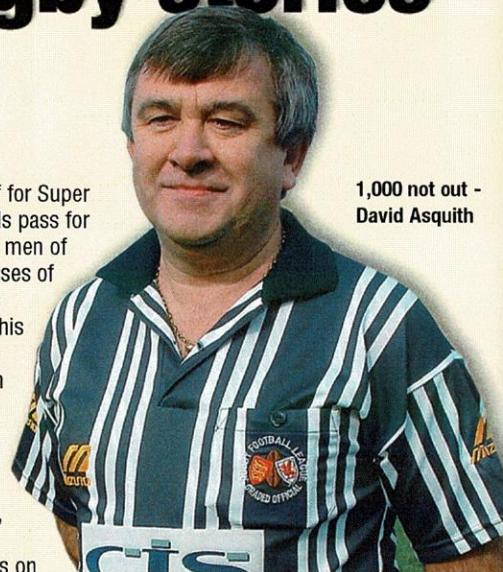

1,000 not out -

By the time you read this, several things are certain. Stevo will have bet his house and pool on a video decision and will already be facing spending 27 rounds of Super League IX on Eddie's sofa. The League Weekly will have received its first letter stating categorically that Ganson/Smith/Kirkpatrick/UncleTomCobleyAndAll is truly the devil's spawn, and should never be allowed in a rugby league ground again, not even if they pay.

For the sake of the love of the sport however, David Asquith will have given it his best, enabled 30-odd blokes to enjoy 80 minutes of The Greatest Game, and headed off to the bar with them in the hope – and it's sometimes little more than that – that someone will have appreciated the ref's input to the proceedings sufficiently to have a polite natter while he chews on his egg mayonnaise butty and sips a lager shandy.

Talking to David about his exceptional career, I asked him about the highlights. His first game was almost exactly 25 years ago – on March the 3rd, 1979 in the Pennine League. It transpires David was the first video ref to officiate in an Ashes test at Wembley. He even remembers that he was first called on to adjudicate a Jason Robinson offside decision – and allowed it. He was also the video ref at the first Old Trafford grand final in 1998, and indeed at Wembley for the Challenge Cup, when London played Leeds. Before that, as an amateur referee, he recalled that he took his first 'big' game, the Yorkshire Cup Final at Odsal, in 1985/86.

"Dudley Hill versus Mysons," I said to him. "You were there, were you?" he asked. "Oh, you could say I was there," I grinned malevolently, adding, "Shame there wasn't a video ref that day, David." "Why's that?" he asked innocently. He'd walked straight into it, like a sidestepping winger into a prop's trailing arm. "Because David, you disallowed three tries that I scored in that match. And I have seen the video!"

Blooming refs – it's a good job we won the game anyway. But hats off to a fantastic feat from a 100% RL man ... and every single one of those willing to put up with the earache so the rest of us can have a sport to watch.

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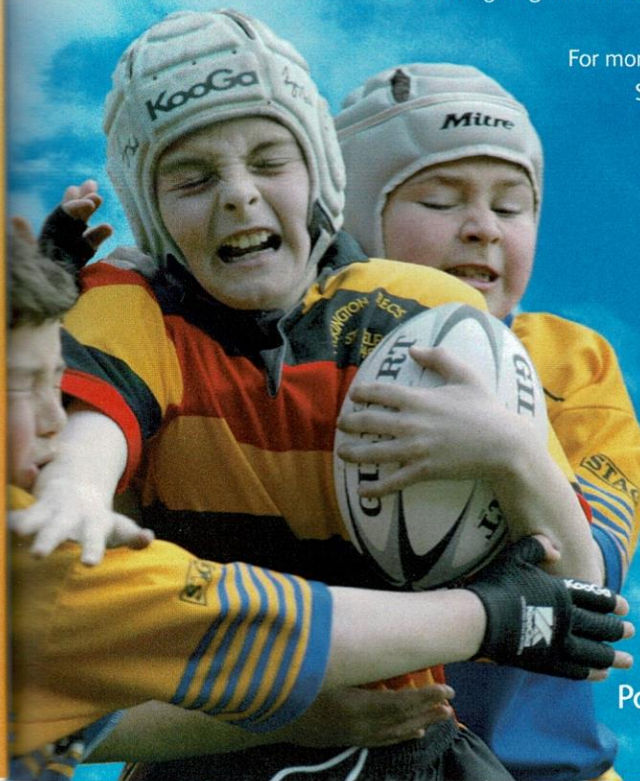
