

ARRIVA TRAINS CUP FORMAT

The competition includes all 20 National League clubs.

It commences Sunday 1st February with 5 groups of 4 teams. They are North, West, East, Pennine and Yorkshire. The West group includes Leigh Centurions, Swinton Lions, Chorley Lynx and Oldham Roughyeds, Each club plays the other three home and away plus one other team home and away from one of the other groups. In Oldham's case this is Rochdale Hornets.

To qualify automatically for one of the eight quarter final positions a club must finish top of its group. The other three qualifiers will be decided by the five group runnersup plus the best third placed club (based on points/points difference) entering a free draw. The draw will produce three matches, the winner of each will provide the other three quarter finalists.

The guarter finals and semi finals will be 'out of the hat' with the first team out having home advantage.

The final is scheduled for Sunday 18th July with the venue

weeks. We must remain focussed for the duration of each half because against Leigh and Swinton we had crucial periods of 10 minutes or so that cost us dearly.







The news that the R.F.L. has signed an £38.5m deal with the B.B.C. for coverage of the Challenge Cup and highlights of the Super League programme is very good news. Even though this means re-scheduling the Powergen Challenge Cup to a different time of year with a Final in August the deal has to be a good thing.

There will, of course be those who object because August is a peak holiday month but this is no different to playing league fixtures in the same month. Any deal which maximises exposure of the game is to be commended and exposure on the B.B.C. reaches a wider audience than Sky.

However two considerations arise: firstly, the B.B.C.'s presentation comes up to scratch, with the game being shown as the thrilling, dynamic contest between two teams of athletes that it is with an articulate, informed commentary to match; and secondly, that a satisfactory amount of money percolates down to the clubs at National League and Amateur level. If those conditions can be met the potential for tapping into other revenue streams and sponsorship is enormous. Here's hoping the transition goes smoothly. Certainly a move away from the Challenge Cup being treated as some kind of warm-up to the Super League season is to be welcomed. Whatever anyone thinks there is still a great deal of prestige attached to being winners of the Cup and 20 realistically more clubs have a chance of picking up this piece of silverware than have of winning the Super League Grand Final. For once it's well done the R.F.L.

The postponement of Oldham's cup tie with Sharlston provided the opportunity to view the B.B.C.'s coverage of last week's two outstanding ties between Wigan and Widnes and between Bradford and St. Helens. I found the match presentation excellent. Steve Ryder and, in particular, Clare Balding, who appears to have a genuine love of the game, are two articulate and iteresting interviewers and the studio guests were well chosen in that David Waite and Robbie Paul are intelligent, well spoken individuals who are enlightening and present an image of the game a million miles away from the old flat cap image so beloved of the B.B.C. of not that long ago.

Other contributors, such as Andy Farrell, lan Millward, Brian Noble, and Neil Kelly also add to the game's image establishing in the minds of the neutral viewer the idea that here is a serious sport populated by shrewd and comitted people who know their business. Of the two commentary teams I thought that Dave Woods and Martin Offiah shaded it over Ray French and Jonathan Davies. I particularly enjoyed listening to Martin Offiah who was as big a hit with microphone in hand as he was with ball in hand going for the try line. For once Ray French did not irritate me and did not rack up his usual catalogue of mistakes. All in all, therefore, it was a thouroughly entertaining afternoon with some excellent rugby especially from the two winners.

Wigan's second half turnaround was a delight, the club's youngsters demonstrating once again what a bright future the team has:at this moment in time Wigan are a joy to watch and although they racked up the points in the second half, it was the intensity of their tackling which threw Widnes off their stride. The way the whole team positively flew into the tackle was an object lesson in how to pressurize the opposition. Meanwhile over at Odsal we were treated to as fine an example of a well executed game plan as you are ever likely to osee.lan Millward obviosly knew just what it takes to overcome the Bradford juggernaut:quick play the ball,rapid ball movement,territorial advantage and pinpoint kicking game all contributed to the Saints' superiority. To be rewarded with a tie against Leeds is rough justice but as they say if you're going to win it you have to beat the best sometime.

In the meantime Oldham were given every incentive to defeat Sharlston in their re-arranged tie last Wednesday with a home draw against Warrington. This provides the opportunity to bring in some much needed revenue and enables the players to test themselves against fully professional opposition. It promises to be a wonderful occasion and it is to be hoped it galvanizes the Oldham public to turn out in numbers

Before that, however, there is the litle matter of today's fixture against one of Oldham's keenest rivals in our visitors from Leigh. In welcoming leigh to Boundary Park I feel I must make special mention of Alex Murphy who we had the pleasure of sitting behind at the Coliseum. Alex welcomed us on arrival, made conversation during the game and shook us all warmly by the hand at the end. I am lucky enough to have met Alex before at a Sportsman's dinner and can attest that he is a true gentle-man and a fine ambassador for the game. 



What a week it has been, all in all, at the club, with the £10,000 draw last Friday at the Social Club, the postponement of the Sharlston Rovers game on Sunday, its re-arrangement for Wednesday (which at the time of going to press is still in doubt), and the draw for the next round made on Monday night with a draw against Rochdale or Warrington – if we beat Sharlston of

With so much still up in the air I thought I would tell you about the great night we had at the Grand Draw on Friday – what a night it turned

Dave Bradshaw, the Commercial Manager, had set up a computer run on the Big Screen in the Concert Lounge and from 7.00pm onwards all the 175,546 names scrolled across the screen continuously. Revolution Radio ran their Friday evening's entertainment from the club and there was cabaret as well. At around 9.00pm the main raffle was drawn for a colour television and the lucky winner was Linda Mills who also won the right to press the button to stop the scroll of names and choose the lucky £10.000 winner.

At exactly three minutes past ten the count down began and, with every digit crossed, it all worked to perfection – the lucky winner Mr D Stott and his address in Royton appeared on the screen. If you only knew what a relief that was for the organisers - who had dreaded a winner from Penzance, New Zealand or South Africa -Yes we do have lottery members in these places. At least he was local BUT would he be on the phone and would he be in. The plan was to arrive at his house in a stretch limo - generously provided free of charge by Lady Jayne Limousines of Royton – which was waiting outside, and drive him to the club to be presented with his £10,000 cheque.

The relief quickly turned to mild panic as Directory Enquiries told us there was no phone number for that name and address and there was nothing in the phone book – to make matters worse the lottery agent was out and wasn't answering his mobile – there was only one answer. Into the 'limo' and off to Royton armed with digital cameras, video cameras and of course all the paraphernalia involved with live

Revolution arrived first and when the 'limo' pulled up on the winner's street we were told by their sound engineer that there was no such street number as the one that had appeared on the screen. They stopped at 49 and ours was a higher number – yet another panic – but no need to worry a resident explained to us the complicated numbering system on the street and the correct house was found.

As Mr Stott opened the door in shorts and T-shirt he was obviously gob smacked to see a hairy



microphone stuck in his face, Chris Hamilton standing at his door, a stretch 'limo' at the bottom of the drive and cameras flashing in his eyes. He couldn't have looked more frightened and suspicious if it had been the bailiffs arriving. Chris finally got out of him that he was indeed Mr D Stott of the correct address and was a member of our lottery – then live on air the Revolution presenter told him he had won £10,000 in the Oldham RLFC Club Cash Lottery. By this time the 'limo' had caught the attention of the neighbours, one of whom entertained us, through her window, by raising her blouse and showing us her considerable assets - ah well it takes all sorts!

A quick pause for live interview, photos and then Mr Stott, his wife and youngest son quickly changed their clothes in preparation for their journey to the Social Club in the 'limo' – champagne provided of course. Here they were greeted by the press – more photos and interviews - and then into the Concert Room to the cheers of the 200 plus supporters and lottery members to receive the cheque for £10,000 from Roughyed Chairman Christopher Hamilton and then enjoy the rest of the evening at the club.

Just before midnight their stretch limo arrived to whisk the still dumbfounded trio back to their Royton abode - I bet there was very little sleep in that house that night.



The state of the art, Salford Quays sited IMPERIAL WAR MUSEUM NORTH has organised a special feature SPORT DURING THE WAR to run from July through to October (exact dates to be confirmed).

Their research has concentrated on soccer, rugby, horse racing and cricket with the Oldham club selected to help portray the story of league at war. From a time just prior to the Boar War when Oldham's Lancashire capped forward Ben Andrew emigrated to South Africa and represented his adopted country against the touring British, through the Great War when it was said that the Oldham club provided more of it's players, officials and staff than any other club in the Northern Union to the Second World War, when, unlike during the First, the Government actively encouraged organised sporting events as a diversion from the mundane.

Many from the Oldham club distinguished themselves and some never returned. Former England rugby union forward Bill Nanson, killed at El Krithia and who was awarded the Queen's and King's medal for gallantry will feature prominently in the exhibition but this is also a story of ordinary people, especially those who managed to keep the sport alive during the most difficult of circumstances.

NATIONAL LEAGUE TALK

with GARETH WALKER OF RUGBY LEAGUER & LEAGUE EXPRESS

TIME FOR FRENCH INJECTION?

ONE idea floated in recent years to add to the appeal of the Arriva Trains Cup has been to include French clubs in the competition at some stage.

On the evidence of last weekend's Powergen Challenge Cup games, the French could certainly compete at this level.

Limoux - only sixth in the national French league - beat Super League hopefuls Halifax 19-18 in the major shock of the round, while UTC again impressed at Castleford (having already beaten Hull KR) and Pia showed plenty of guts against Huddersfield.

"The French were full of enthusiasm and aggression, played with a lot of flair and deserved their victory," Halifax coach Tony Anderson said after the game.

"If anyone has to come down here in the next round, they're going to find it very, very tough."

The one obvious objection would be the travelling expenses incurred by having French teams in the English groups. That was one of the reasons for scrapping the Treize Tournoi held just once in 1998 - despite some success.

But that could be neatly sidestepped by having a separate French pool in the group stages. For example, UTC, Toulouse, Pia, St Gaudens,

Carcassonne and Limoux could make up a French pool, with the winners moving through to the knock-out stages.

Fitting it in with the French league campaign may be problematic, but it is certainly something that could be looked into further.

Having French teams in the ATC would add prestige and a touch of glamour to a competition in which the crowds are currently falling below expectations.

It would also significantly boost the game in France to have the opportunity to take on English sides on a more regular basis.

And why not go further than that, and include a pool of teams from National League Three, or the TotalRL.com Conference?

Again, one-sided scorelines would be avoided, as they would compete in a separate pool, with just one side progressing to the guarter finals.

The ATC certainly has plenty going for it at the moment - a wealth of local derbies, the first professional Rugby League action of the year, and the chance for clubs outside the top flight to win some silverware.

But if the competition is to continue to grow, then the addition of a few new teams might be just the injection it needs.

PLAYER WILL COWELL

Will Cowell is in his third season with the Roughyeds and, excluding the scheduled midweek Powergen Challenge Cup tie with Sharlston Rovers, he has made a promising start with three tries in six appearances.

He began a new challenge in his rugby league career when he originally signed a one-year deal with Oldham in November. 2001after four years with Super League club Warrington Wolves.

A product of the Kells amateur club in Whitehaven -- a prolific provider of talented youngsters to the professional game -- he signed for Warrington in 1997 on returning from a BARLA Great Britain under-21 trip to Australia when he was only 17.

While learning his trade as a youngster at Wilderspool, 150 miles away from his home and his roots in Cumbria, he made six starts in Super League, plus another eight appearances as a substitute --- 14 games in total in the sport's elite division.

Mike Ford was still coach here when Cowell signed in the close season before the 2002 campaign, about the same time as Jon Goddard, who came from Castleford. initially on loan, and John Braddish, who arrived on a similar arrangement from St


Cowell signed outright to begin a Roughyeds career in which he scored five tries in 27 appearances in 2002 and two tries in 13 games in 2003.

When he first signed, he said: "I play wing. centre or full-back -- basically anywhere in the backs -- but I have a feeling Fordy will be playing me on the wing."

He was spot on, yet ironically one of his best performances in a Roughyeds jersey came towards the end of his first season when he scored two crucial tries from the left-centre spot at Batley in a 20-20 draw that earned Oldham a vital point in the push for a top-nine finish.

By this time, Ford had gone, John Harbin had come and gone, and Steve Molloy had taken over as boss for the last 14 matches of the season, in which he used Cowell on no fewer than 13 occasions.

On one of them, against Huddersfield Giants at Hurst Cross, Cowell displayed an electrifying burst of speed to score under

the posts from inside his own half as Molloy's men gave the Giants the fright of their lives.

After going 32-12 down, the Roughyeds roared back with 18 unanswered points to claw it back to 32-30 before time ran out on them . . . and the sight of Cowell holding off Huddersfield's speed men to score a superb try from distance is still fresh in the memory of many Roughyeds supporters.

One has the feeling that the best of Cowell has still to come -- and judging by the comments of the club chairman, Chris Hamilton, when the Cumbrian accepted the offer of a new one-year deal to cover the 2004 season, it appeared that the club held a similar view.

I wrote in the Oldham Evening Chronicle at that time: "Oldham accept that Cowell has not had much luck with injuries and that for much of last season (2003) he had an additional distraction in that he was preparing for his wedding.

"Said Mr Hamilton: 'All that is behind him now and Will knows -- he didn't need us to tell him -- that he is due a big season.

'In his two previous seasons with us he has not fully achieved what either he or we would have liked,

We have had a good chat with him. He knows the score and he is keen to make a big impression this time.

'The one thing about Will is that he has first-class attitude and commitment and those are qualities that are always going to give him a fighting chance.'

Molloy, the team boss, spoke similarly and added: "We've seen what Will can do and now we want to see him do it more often. He is determined to go well in 2004."

So far, so good. Now 24, Cumbrian Cowell has made the right-wing spot his own so far this season and has bounced in for three tries as well as doing a feast of work when going inside to help out his forwards or to run the ball out of the Oldham quarter.



ON THIS DAY

DON YATES LOOKS BACK TO MARCH 7TH YESTERYFAR

It was on this day ninety years ago, on Saturday 7th March 1914, that Leigh visited Oldham for a League Championship match. The contest was one of little consequence with Oldham in midtable and Leigh a little lower. However, the Roughyeds were able to avenge an earlier league defeat at Leigh by beating their visitors 19-0. The match was of significance for the talented New Zealander George Smith, a superb all-round sportsman, who was making his 173rd and final appearance in an Oldham shirt. With admirable timing he was able to score his one hundredth try for the club. Second-row forward David Holland scored the other two Oldham tries and full-back Alf Wood added five goals. At the conclusion of that 1913-14 season both Holland and Wood, together with Oldham stand-off Billy Hall, toured Australasia with the British Lions, and all three played in that historic Rorke's Drift test against the Kangaroos.

On Sunday 7th March 1976 a Great Britain Colts team, coached by Graham Starkey, was well beaten, 39-5, by France in the Stade Coubertin. Cannes in the south of France. There were three players from Leigh included in the British line-up that afternoon. The British try was scored by centre John Woods, arguably the most talented player ever to come from that hotbed of rugby league. On the bench for Britain were Tommy Gittens, a hard working second-row forward, and the unfortunate utility back John Burke, whose full potential was never realised after he broke his neck playing for Workington Town a couple of years later.

The senior Great Britain team enjoyed a much better afternoon when they met France in Carcassonne exactly seventeen years later, on Sunday 7th March 1993. Three players familiar with Oldham followers turned out for Great Britain that day. They were the current Oldham coach Steve Molloy; a former Oldham coach and a player for both Oldham and Leigh, Mike Ford; and a player who began his professional career with the Roughyeds, Chris Joynt. Mollov was then with Leeds, Ford with Castleford, and Joynt with St. Helens. The Lions won 48-6 with Mike Ford scoring one of the nine British tries.

Oldham's powerful centre James Bunyan is now with his fourth professional club

since he left Milford in August 1995 to join Huddersfield. After a spell with Doncaster, Bunyan joined Rochdale Hornets three years ago and on Wednesday 7th March 2001 made his debut for Hornets in a Northern Ford Premiership match away to Keighley. It was a successful start to his stay at Spotland with Rochdale winning a close fought encounter 23-20. Bunyan went on to make 84 appearances for Hornets and he scored 26 tries before joining the Roughveds last November.

During the winter months local rugby enthusiasts will have followed the fortunes of the amateur game here in Oldham and in particular the Standard Cup competition, the final of which takes place here at Boundary Park on Easter Sunday morning, 11th April, kick-off 11am. Shaw Rhinos meet Waterhead in that final. Oldham director Sean Whitehead has made a playing comeback with the Rhinos in recent weeks after a distinguished amateur career with Saddleworth Rangers and spells at professional level with Swinton and Rochdale Hornets. He won every domestic honour available with Rangers and twelve years ago, on Saturday 7th March 1992, found himself playing for Rangers in a tough cup-tie against opposition from Leigh. That day Saddleworth entertained Leigh Miners

in a National League Cup. quarter-final tie which Rangers managed to win 24-4. Whitehead landed two goals in that tie. The Leigh points, incidentally, came from a couple of penalties kicked by Carl Unsworth. Saddleworth went on to reach the final that season but were beaten by St.Patricks Central Park.

AS IAN SEES IT

with IAN WILSON

What a fantastic first weekend for Super League! Bradford v Wigan was just men against boys, though I must say that I am fairly happy that I just managed to squeeze Leslie Vainikolo into my FL team! I am not sure that Leeds' trouncing of London was a reflection of Leeds' quality or London's weakness – I hope very much the former. Saints were apparently very impressive against Hull who, in spite of their seemingly inevitable injury crisis, did at least compete very well. And Warrington looked fairly impressive in beating a combative Wakefield side, who looked as though they were unlikely to finish in eleventh place again this season: Their David Solomono looked as though he might be one of the real quality signings of the year.

The other two games were very interesting in a rather different way. Every body seems to be assuming that Salford v Widnes was a relegation four – pointer even at this ridiculously early stage of the season – and they may well be right. So Salford's win might well be crucial by the end of the season, and it was good to see them at least begin their latest effort as a Super League side with a win. Though I suspect they will be relatively few and far between as the season really gets going. Huddersfield's win over Cas. might also prove to be very significant. I think Jon Sharp might turn out to be quite a success as a coach at Huddersfield, and that they and Wakefield might find reaching the safety of the middle one third of Super League IX rather more accessible than, say, Cas. and Widnes this season. We shall see!

What about the attendances? In the six Super League games crowds totalled a record 70,000, so that, with another 10,000 at the ten National League matches, 80,000 people watched professional rugby league live over the weekend. Given the long - run tendency for this figure to be around 55,000 – for the past few years anyway – this can only be regarded as fantastic news, especially given that we are talking about mid – February, hardly the height of summer sun and warmth.


Together with the recently announced deal with BBC TV to supplement the Sky deal – and I hope that the moaners and whisperers give due credit to Richard Lewis here – I cannot imagine a more up beat week for the game to kick off 2004 properly. Long may it continue!

What of Oldham so far ? I have seen the games against Castleford Panthers and Swinton, but, because of other commitments, missed the Law Cup, Chorley and Leigh games. So I think it is only fair to suspend any attempt to make any judgements. As last season, the National League is surely what really matters, so that we are only about half way through the preliminaries at this stage. Featherstone at Boundary Park on Easter Monday is highlighted on my calendar, and I suggest that the players and coaching staff deserve until then to prepare. For the time being, lets all try to concentrate on doing whatever we can to persuade as many people as possible to come and attend as many matches as possible.

IT HAS always been a truism in rugby that 'the ball moves faster than the man' - a strikingly compelling reason, you would think, for passing it rather than running and handing it to your pal.

Not any longer, however. There will be obscure nations in this summer's Olympics whose 'sprinters' would be blown away by the average Super League prop. It's one thing a 5ft 7in, 10-stone winger covering across and trying to get tangled in the legs of an attacker, quite something else when the mountain of beef tracking laterally with malicious intent is the size of a Massey Ferguson and travelling considerably faster.

The world record for a try-scoring prop used to be held by former Batley favourite Trevor 'Tank' Walker. Any part of the body that you chose to try to 'tackle' Tank – from his knees

to his neck – was about 15-feet around. You had a choice. Take his ankles, try to decapitate him, or venture forth accompanied by a swarm of defenders, one of whom he might eventually trip up over. Usually over the try line.

He wasn't – still isn't – a tall man. But apart from having excellent rugby league skills (and a cunning mastery of the dark arts of the scrimmage that the Borgias would be chuffed with) trying to tackle Trevor was like trying to tackle that big orange balloon that used to chase after Patrick McGoohan at the start of The Prisoner. (At least I think it was orange. We didn't have a colour telly).


Now you could never have accused Tank Walker of taking steroids, unless they were secreted in one of Desperate Dan's cow pies. He was strong as an ox, and quick over 10 yards – but generally only the 10 yards out from the opposition try line. Unlike the modern breed of prop forwards, "aerobic" athleticism wasn't on his training agenda ... but then again neither did it have to be, especially when he returned to the amateur game with Dewsbury Celtic. Tank would linger down in the "Nine 'oil" getting his breath, patiently waiting for the supremo of amateur scrum halves, Mick Doyle, to find touch in the opposition 25. Sometimes Tank might have to take two or three strides to where the scrum would form, and he could terrorise the opposition front row again.

The memories of such legendary elements of the game were brought to mind by two sublime moments in St Helens' stunning Powergen Challenge Cup win. The first was when Mark Edmondson accelerated away from the Bulls defence for a try, with a startling show of pace for a so-called engine room man. It reinforced the idea propagated by many that rugby league is now a sport played by 12 second row/centres and a scrum half. I'll bet Trevor Walker came over all hot and bothered just seeing a front-rower running that distance, that fast.

But the second was the artistry of the Lee Gilmour try; a training ground move executed with such precision, and at such pace, as to render the speed of any covering defence irrelevant. Unless of course there just happened to be an 'old school' prop lingering in the vicinity, with a forearm the size of a ballet dancer's thigh, just made for clothes-lining fools daft enough to run onto balls with their heads up ... ah, the good old days!
