



AS IAN SEES IT

How often do props get man-of- the- match – awards, or other individual honours? Not often enough, I suggest. It always seems to be the try scoring winger or the full back's forays, or the scheming halfback, or the Jimmy Lowes style hooker, or (at last in days gone by) the ball playing loose forward who gets the plaudits. But the importance of props has rally been brought home, at least to me, in a few recent games.


The other week in Super League there were outstanding wins for Wigan over Saints and for Leeds against Bradford, and on both occasions it was the dominance established up front, in terms of drives with the ball, hits without it and general physical intimidation, which was the basis of the wins. Saints, last season, struggled for props, and won nothing. Early on this season, Fozzard and Mason, with good support from Edmunson in particular, outplayed all their opponents, and the rest of lan Millward's side reaped the rewards. They established similar prop dominance in the Cup Final, and Wigan were easily beaten. But with Mason suspended, and Fozzard seemingly more intent on taking peoples heads off than doing the real hard graft,, the outstanding Craig Smith, Terry O'Connor and later Danny Sculthorpe ruled the roost, and Wigan went on to win fairly comfortably.

Much of Bradford's recent success has been based on their four props and the dominance they have often established. Brian Mc Dermott, Paul Anderson, Joe Vagana and Stuart Fielden proved too much for most opponents, and the magic of Lowes and the Pauls, on the back of them, has done the rest. But the other Saturday night, Leeds turned the tables with a vengeance. The evergreen Barry Mac. got the better of Fielden and with excellent support from McDonald and Bailey, the platform

was set for Diskin and Dunneman in particular to run the game.


The reference to us? I would venture to suggest that the first hour against Rochdale, and the final fifty minutes against Batley, in our last two "home" games were our poorest efforts for quite some time – and in both cases, we were stuffed down the middle before our game fell apart everywhere else too. It is often no coincidence whatsoever that Paul Southern missed both games, of course, and that Steve Molloy was forced to watch the whole of the debacle at Blackpool from the bench. In both games, Dane Morgan was our stand-out player, but there is a limit to what he can achieve on his own – and when he was taking his turn on the bench, the floodgates seemed to open wide.

There is lots going wrong this year, of course. But I have no doubt that Steve Molloy knows full well that, if we are to have any chance of turning things round, it has to start at numbers

Oldham's long and fruitless search for a ground to play on after Boundary Park was ruled out for two months finally came to a happy conclusion when Chorley Lynx came to the rescue, Many thanks to Henry Morris and his fellow directors for their timely assistance.

The whole episode points up the problems faced by Oldham since they lost their own ground at Watersheddings. And if summer rugby is to continue into the future it confirms-in my opinion at least-that the Roughyeds could still do with their own ground no matter what the good intentions of the new owners of Oldham Athletic and of Oldham Council, though how that can be acheived I do not know. Ground maintenance work is one of the obvious perils of shared facilities because at the end of the day grass has to have time to grow no matter what the sophisticated rooting systems now in place on many pitches.

Another peril of summer rugby highlighted by recent comments from Steve Molloy is rock hard pitches. I wonder if the large number of injuries suffered by Oldham and other clubs would be fewer on softer grounds? Apparently, taking Keighley as an example, not everyone has the facilities or the desire to water their pitch. All well and good, but it does expose the players to greater risk of injury.

I have recently taken to reading League Weekly, the successor paper to the Rugby Leaguer, in preference to League Express. Largely this is because I like the number of interesting columns by such as Peter Roe, Maurice Bamford, Dave Parker, Chris Pearson and editor Danny Lockwood. Best of all is Ray French whose weekly output is not just readable but full of common sense and, more importantly, is inspired by a vision of the future of our great game. Despite the quality of the writing I am pleased to note that the new League Weekly has not lost some of the typographical errors which graced the old Ruby Bleaguer. For instance, I note that in a recent Oldham academy fixture "Oldham had conceded twenty pints before half time. I just wish I'd been at Manor Park to grab one of

Another regular column in League Weekly is "Life with the Lynx", an enjoyable insight into the trials and tribulations here at Chorley. I note that Henry Morris sang the praises of the club's recent fixture with Hunslet, a high quality match full of good football and intense drama. As ever, however, Chorley's progressive chairman was left tearing his hair out at an attendance of fewer than 400. We at Oldham do not need reminding of the difficulty of attracting spectators as 1200 seems to be about the norm for a Roughyeds match. While the powers that be are crowing about record attendances in Super League (although all the best weekly averages occur when London Broncos play away please note) it might be as well for some serious attention to be paid to LHF Healthplan Divisions One, Two and Three. It is not good enough to say individual clubs have to market themselves effectively when the salary of a commercial manager could account for the entire marketing budget of a small club. Most lower division clubs are entirely reliant on the goodwill of small local businesses to help sustain them but the bucket can only go to the same well so often before the well runs dry. Some years ago I was at Swinton in the sponsors lounge when the commercial manager thanked his sponsors for the day with the sentiment that they were the most important factor in keeping the club going. Not the spectators, note, but the sponsors! Not necessarily true for every club but there's food for thought there. So isn't it about time more resources percolated down to the lower reaches? Without the amateurs and the semiprofessionals where will Super League draw its players from? Or are we happy to populate our leading competition with Australian has-beens?


Roughyeds v Whitehaven

TODAH'S OFFICKENTS MHITEHAUEN

GARY BROADBENT Fullback Joined club from Salford in 2003. One of best full backs in N.1. A classy skilful player who was selected for the N.1 All Star team last season and also captained Cumbria against New Zealand A.

WESLEY WILSON Full back/centre A skilful player who grabbed international honours, with BARLA, at U18 level. Signed from Wrath Brow in January 1997 and quickly secured a first team place. Has been unlucky with injuries in the last few years but came back well last season.

PAUL O'NEILL Fullback/winger Originally signed as a full back but now features mainly on the wing, this former Kells youngster graduated to the top flight during 2001 although injuries curtailed his opportunities last season. A consistent goal kicker.

JOHN LEBBON Winger A young player with a big future. A former Egremont junior who came into the first team towards the end of last season and did really well. Toured France with the NL under 21's last October.

MICK NANYN Three-quarter 'Haven's major close season signing from Rochdale Hornets, older brother of Danny who made his debut for the Roughyeds a couple of weeks ago. A big pacy three-quarter who was Hornets' top scorer last season. Good opal kicker was voted NL1 Young Player of the Year for 2003.

DAVID SEEDS Full back/centre is one of the best centres outside super League. Toured Australia with the BARLA GB squad in 1993. Another product of the famous Kells club, he signed pro later that year. Established a new club record for career trys in 2002 and taking a deserved benefit this season.

HOWARD HILL Centre/second row Local lad who played for Oldham Bears in Super League and has now rejoined his hometown club after a spell at Swinton. He brings a physical presence to the team and turned in consistently good performances last season.

STEVEN WOOD Utility Back A Whitehaven lad who joined the club last season after playing with Workington. A versatile and skilful player who filled most of the back positions last season.

JAMIE MARSHALL Winger Former Barrow winger who joined 'Haven in the close season. Quick and elusive, 'Haven hope he shows the form which brought him 26 tries for Barrow last

MARK WALLACE Winger Returned to Whitehaven in 2000 after spending some time at Workington Town. A pacy winger wh missed most of last season through injury but is making a good comeback this year.

LEROY JOE Stand off Re-signed last year after a spell with Hull KR. Originally joined the club from North Queensland Cowboys. Represented Cook Island in the 20000 World Cup. A classy footballer and key member of the 'Haven squad. Was top try scorer with 26 last season.

LEE KIDDIE Half back Signed from Kells in 1994 and now in his benefit season. A skilful and elusive footballer who has been a regular try scorer for the club and is now approaching his 100th try for the club. Played for Scotland in the 2003 European Nations competition.

STEVEN KIRKBRIDE Scrum half Another product of Kells. Joined Warrington in 1997 and was their Alliance Player of the Year in 20000 before returning home in January 2001. A classy number 7 and a very accurate kicker.

DAVID FATIALOFA Prop A former junior Kiwi who joined the club in 1996. A strong running and solid tackler who was 'Haven's most consistent forward in 2003.

AARON LESTER Hooker/loose forward Another New Zealander, Aaron is rated by many as one of the best players outside of Super League. A dedicated professional who played for Auckland Warriors before coming here in 1996. Current club cantain.

CARL SICE Hooker Former 'Haven Academy hooker who re-joined his home town club last year after featuring fopr Workington. An exciting runner from dummy half, Carl playerd for Cumbria against New Zealand A last year.

MARK JACKSON Utility forward This live wire forward was signed as a hooker from Wath Brow in 2001. A former BARLA international who has quickly adapted to pro. Rugby filling in most pack positions in the last two seasons.

DEAN VAUGHAN Prop Young player with tremendous work rate. A former Academy skipper, looking to bounce back this season after a 2003 where injuries forced his season to end early.

PHIL SHERWEN Prop Big powerful forward who joined us in January 2001 after featuring for BARLA in the emerging Nations World Cup. Another product of Wath brow, he is looking for a big season in 2004 after missing most of 2003 through injury.

MARK COX Prop Back on loan at the club after joining London Broncos last season. Looking to re-launch his career after his 2003 season was cut short due to a car accident.

GRAEME MORTON Second row A strong tackling, hard running forward who never takes a backward step. Signed from Kells in 1993 after representing BARLA Great Britain Under 19's against Australia and France. Played for Cumbria v New Zealand A last year. Another in his benefit season.

CHRIS McKinney Second row A member of Widnes Vikings NFP Premiers in 2001. Returned to his home town team during the close season and is proving a good acquisition. A hard working, industrious back row forward.

GARY SMITH Utility forward Signed from kells in 1999 and made his name in the Alliance side before gaining some first team experience last season. Selected for the

DANE Morgan has become progressively more influential in the Oldham forwards since he made his debut against Barrow at Boundary Park on March 2, 2003.

Now in his second season with the Roughyeds, the popular Aussie is an anchor in Oldham's pack. Be it at prop or in the second-row he is one of the first to have his name pencilled on the team sheet when Steve Molloy picks his line-up each week.

Arriving in Oldham during a cold February last year, he spent many a mid-winter training session shivering in the cold on the all-weather pitch at Grange. And Dane himself would be the first to admit it took him a few weeks to settle when faced with the hardship of a northern hemisphere winter.

He also had to come to terms with a different style of rugby -- English rugby -- as well as settle down with his newly-acquired wife in new surroundings and to a different way of life.

He hardly lacked experience, having played back home for Wests Tigers and Melbourne Storm and having been to England once before when he was a substitute for Melbourne on the occasion they thrashed St Helens in the World Club Championship.

That was a comparatively brief visit, but he liked what he saw of England and he vowed then that, one day, he would come back and play here.


And so it was that he stepped out in Oldham colours for the first time with No 10 on his back on a March day 15 months ago. On the same day Adam Sharples made his entry into the senior side at the ripe old age of 17.

The team that beat Barrow 50-11 that day was: Dodd; Campbell, I Marsh, Goddard, McNicholas; Svabic, Brennan; Molloy, Murray, Morgan, Doran, Stazicker, Farrell. Subs: Anderson, Barber, Shaw, Sharples.

In the first couple of months or so here Dane struggled to find his feet — and how he hated those training nights in the rain, sleet and biting winds that sweep down into Oldham from the Pennines in the early part of the year.

He was in the starting line-up only three times in the first five matches after his arrival, and he spent the next seven games coming off the bench, while Molly and Knocker (Paul Norton) filled the prop positions.

It was when Knocker was forced into retirement on medical grounds after the 12-10 win against Leigh at Boundary Park on May 25 last year that Dane became an automatic choice on the blind-side of the front-row.

The winter storms had blown themselves out: the sky was blue; the grass was green; the players had the sun on their backs --- and the lad from downtown Sydney

By this time he was a dashing Dane, and he was to star in the last 14 games of the season, playing a major role in the late-season scramble to make the play-off six.

Eight points from a possible 12 against Whitehaven, Featherstone and Doncaster at Boundary Park and Batley, Rochdale and Dewsbury away raised hopes of qualification.

Four defeats in a row by Salford and Hull KR at Oldham and by Leigh and Whitehaven away carried the Roughyeds out of the top six and many fans feared the worst.

Molloy's men had to win their last two games to squeeze in and they did it in style by beating Batley at home 36-10 and Featherstone at Post Office Road 19-14 ----Oldham's first win there in 18 years!

Morgan was a kingpin of the Oldham pack throughout that roller-coaster ride to the play-offs, but none more so than at Featherstone.

With time running out fast, and the Roughveds playing up the slope, and trailing, it needed something special to put them back on top.

The great Dane provided it with a solo try which required phenomenal strength to take a posse of Rovers defenders over the line with him.

That was neither the first nor the last time that season that the Aussie emerged an Oldham hero and it was fitting that he should figure in the end of year presentations for a job well done.

It came as no real surprise when, on returning from a

close-season trek across Europe with Mrs Morgan, he again signed on the dotted line to spend a second season with the Roughveds.

This time he was established in England and more was expected of him. He has certainly delivered.

A big shift of emphasis this season saw him move from prop to second-row, his favoured spot. He has played some games at prop, particularly latterly when both Molly and Paul Southern were out injured.

That left a huge hole up front in the engine room and Dane came to the rescue, Mainly, though, he has been in the second-row this time, operating alongside Lee

He has missed only one of the side's 21 games in all competitions and he has proved equally effective at both prop and second-row.

He plays a similar type of game from both positions. He isn't a wide runner like Lee. Dane drives up the middle, has a good offload (they like that expression in Australia) and, once he makes a break, he can be relied upon to make good fast yards and to look for his support.

He blotted his copybook when he was sent off against Leigh for allegedly swinging a punch or two in the direction of Simon Knox. Claiming provocation and going to the disciplinary meeting with a squeaky clean record, he escaped a ban. Justice was served.


Now, the big Aussie can look ahead with confidence to the second half of the LHF Healthplan National League first division campaign and, hopefully, the play-offs.


From here on in every game will be a cup tie in this highly competitive division -- and that's a situation that Dane should relish.



ON THIS DAY

DON YATES LOOKS BACK TO JUNE 20TH YESTERYFAR

Although Oldham fans will, once again, have had to travel for today's home game, they will not have had to travel as far as they did seven years ago to watch their favourites. On Friday 20th June 1997 Oldham were playing 12,000 miles away when they visited Adelaide in the World Club Championship. There was a crowd of 13.852 at Adelaide Oval that evening when the Rams defeated the Bears 42-14. Oldham took the lead in the second minute of that match when Paul Topping scored after the Adelaide defence failed to deal with a Martin Crompton bomb, Francis Maloney converted to put Oldham 6-0 in front. By half-time the Rams had recovered to lead 18-6 and, from then on, they were never in danger. Joe Faimalo and Francis Maloney did score tries for Oldham in the second half but the Bears never looked capable of overhauling their hosts.

Twelve months later, three local juniors were 'down under' in Australia with the BARLA touring team. The opening match of that 1998 tour took place at Davies Park, Mareeba, near Cairns, on Saturday 20th June when the tourists met a North Queensland Aboriginal squad. Winger Paul Brassington (Waterhead) and hooker Jason Wilkes (Saddleworth Rangers) were included in the team whilst utility player Emerson Jackman (Saddleworth Rangers) sat that match out. After an hour of the match BARLA trailed 24-22 but the tourists stepped up a gear in the closing quarter to win 36-24.

Another former Oldham junior, winger Terry O'Grady of St. Marys, was in sensational form when the senior British Lions met Wide Bay at Maryborough on Sunday 20th June 1954. Great Britain won that match 60-14 and, in so doing, ran in 14 tries. Five of those tries were scored by O'Grady.


The 1984 British Lions included five Oldham players within their ranks including current Oldham assistant coach Mick Worrall. They were not the most successful touring team of all time and on Wednesday 20th June 1984 suffered a particularly disappointing defeat when they met Toowoomba. After scoring an early try, the Lions crumbled to a 12-4 halftime deficit and eventually lost 18-16, a final score which flattered the tourists. Oldham's Des Foy began the match at centre but was replaced midway through the first half by the other Oldham player involved in the match, Ray Ashton.

The 1914 Lions tour of Australasia included the famous Rorke's Drift test. Three players from Oldham, Alf Wood, Billy Hall and Dave Holland, played in that epic test. Earlier in the tour, on Saturday 20th June 1914, Great Britain registered a superb 22-8 victory over Queensland before a 12,000 crowd in Brisbane. Stand-off Billy Hall, usually a centre, played against Queensland

and scored one of the six British tries.

In both 1928 and 1932 the Great Britain touring team were managed by Oldham official George Hutchins. Only one Oldham player was involved in those Bob tours. Sloman in 1928. It was on Wednesday 20th June 1928 that the Lions 23-13 won against lpswich with Sloman turning out in the second-

LEAGUE

Danny Lockwood, publisher

THE promotion and relegation debate looks set fair to stay with us for the next 18 months, as rugby league considers its options in light of Perpignan's invitation to the party. It's ironic, given that the constantly changing face of the professional sport seemed to have settled down over the past couple of years. The most dogmatic critics of the modern game have almost unanimously swallowed their arguments, as Super League has dragged the sport kicking into the 21st century. Indeed the latest three-division format provides tremendously competitive platforms throughout the pro game. With the Skolars beating Swinton last week, and the LHF National League Three now providing a further link between the grassroots nationwide growth and the bottom of the pro game, rugby league's case for being considered a 'national' sport has never been more sound.

True, there are enough 'national' teams playing here, there and everywhere, to start their own league. Is the 'Irish' team that plays the USA on St Patrick's Day the same as the Irish team that entered the last World Cup? Obviously the English team playing in the current Home



Super League ... an exclusive club, or an open door to all-comers?

Nations isn't the same as the England A that nearly beat the all-conquering Kangaroos last October. We're all pretty clear about the difference between the Gt Britain big boys and the BARLA Gt Britain lads who will shortly be touring Australia. And I think the Academy tourists going down under are no relation to the Academic Lions I seem to recall from last year. It will all come out in the wash. However if it means we get the same level of funding as the union chappies, and lift the Gillette Tri-Nations to boot, then you can give everyone who ever strapped boots on an international cap for my money.

But we're still left with the thorny promotion/relegation issue. And as long as the answer lies with the vested interests of the existing Super League clubs, I don't believe we are likely to get a solution which provides the best long-term future for the game. Two-down-one-up, one-down-none-up, one down and a play-off ... we've had all kinds of possibilities thrown out. A 13-team league, 14-team league take your pick. What is assured at the moment is that the Super League perennials are highly unlikely to vote for anything which dilutes their revenue streams, and that in itself limits the number of possible outcomes.

After the absolute mess of the 2000 World Cup, the RFL reinvented itself and whether through luck or judgment, found itself an executive chairman and a management team to build a bright new future. The success, in financial, marketing, development and organisational terms, has been profound.

My own feeling is that promotion and relegation to and from Super League should end, probably the year after next. I'll expand on my reasons for that some other time. For now, the Perpignan introduction creates the right time and place to examine the entire structure, and consider a whole range of associated issues. Those decisions should be arrived at independently of the vested interests, under the guiding eye of Richard Lewis. The clubs have managed to trust Mr Lewis on many issues we wouldn't have thought possible a scant few years ago, and been richly rewarded for it. Why stop there?

NATIONAL LEAGUE TALK

with GARETH WALKER of RUGBY LEAGUER & LEAGUE EXPRESS

SKOLARS CONTINUE PROGRESS

THE most startling results of last weekend came at the New River Stadium - where London Skolars marked their continuing progress with a second win of the NL1 season over Swinton.

Here is a National League club making genuine progress.

They are now in their second season, having won just one game in their debut campaign their home match with Gateshead Thunder.

They beat Thunder again earlier this year in the league - their first away win - having defeated Sheffield at home in the group stages of the Arriva Trains Cup.

And the victory over a Swinton side featuring several established National League players marks the latest notch on their bedpost of conquests.

The Skolars have certainly improved markedly on the field this season - gone are the days when they would regularly receive 60-point plus hammerings.

In fact, in August last year, they hit their lowest point in the professional ranks when they were soundly thrashed 98-4 by Sheffield.

That they recently defeated the Eagles is testimony primarily to the work of joint coaches Marcus Tobin and Alex Smits, the second of whom continues to have a significant influence as a player.

This season they have considerably cut down on the number of players they have used, which has doubtless aided their continuity and familiarity on the field.

But it is not just the first team picture where the Skolars' success can be measured.

Their blossoming junior section continues to make strides, and would shame most other National League clubs.

And their crowds are on the increase. Sunday's attendance of 465 might not sound particularly impressive, but for a fledgling club battling against the odds outside the game's heartlands, it is highly encouraging.

Especially when you consider that this is still. ultimately, a team that is losing more often than not - and travelling support is almost always at a minimum.

As one Skolars official commented this week, the nature of Sunday's thrilling 28-26 should encourage spectators to return - hopefully with a few friends.

Certainly League in London could do with the boost, with the Broncos struggling at present.

It would be nice if the Skolars could provide
