Another Sunday, another important

By now we will have played either Huddersfield or Salford and hopefully will have put up another good performance.

It hasn't been easy for the players or Mick Worrall over the last few weeks but they are all to be congratulated on their efforts



We are learning to win it tough, especially away from



AS IAN SEES IT

with IAN WILSON

Given that Super League have now decided its promotion/relegation process for the end of season 2005, and, more importantly, perhaps, agreed to change its current rather farcical fixture formula for the 'extra' six games of the league season, perhaps it is time for the National League also to have another look at the structure of its season.

I take it that there are a number of elements of the season for NL1 and NL2 that are agreed:

- Some form of cup competition (the ATC or equivalent), which cannot be won by a Super League club, is highly desirable.
- The bulk of the season should consist of 'proper' league fixtures.
- The RL Challenge Cup, played at its new, later time of the season, should, in its early rounds, interrupt the normal flow of league fixtures.
- The current 10 teams per league set up should continue, certainly for 2005, and lead to a play off series and a Grand Final as at present. [For 2006, of course, there is the extra issue of two teams relegated from, and one promoted into, Super League. Two to be relegated from NL1? Or an 11 team league?]


As a general principle, I am in favour of as much continuity as possible, and minimal tinkering. I think we all agree that the last ten years has seen enough change for the time being, and that consolidation is the order of the day, with only evolutionary change – for example, to permit for movement into the semi-pro National Leagues if and when a club such as Coventry Bears or St Albans Centurions (or Bramley?) wishes, and is deemed ready to, join them.

However I think the current season has one major fault – and I strongly suspect that attendance figures would support this view. It is that the group stage of the ATC goes on for far too long. Many of the later games are of little relevance, and the start of the league seems to lose momentum very quickly. And, in 2004, what a terrible waste of a traditional

Rugby League day – Good Friday – for it to be the 8th and final ATC group fixture!

My solution would be to play just 4 group qualifying games, and then to spread out the knock-out stages as now, though earlier in the season, with the final played before the Challenge Cup. And to replace the four last games by four extra league fixtures – a la Super League, though organised in a fair way, obviously. [It is not beyond the wit of man to devise extra fixtures, still based on previous year's league positions, but with position one having slightly harder' games than position two, and position 2 slightly harder than position 3, etc., etc. If no-one at Red Hall can manage that, I am certainly willing to offer my services!]

That would give 22 National League Fixtures, to be followed by the play off series. And, of course, there would also be rather more logic in the play offs when the 10 teams in each league have not played each other the same number of times. More important, though, I think the whole season would have more competitive games, and a more coherent

I caught the after match chat following the Salford v. Widnes fixture last week and was outraged by Mike Stephenson's comments. Not only was the administration of Rugby League and roundly and unjustifiably condemned but the well-being of the game as a whole was totally ignored. The composition of Super League and the fixture format and its deficiencies are largely in the hands of the clubs themselves and not of Red Hall. Yes, it's ridiculous to have a fixture format which can place a club at a disadvantage by finishing sixth because the following season they will have a harder fixture list than the club finishing seventh (as per London Broncos this year). Well, I read this week that the clubs are already proposing a new system of odds and evens which should alleviate the unfairness in a season when two sides will be relegated. Of course, much of the difficulty could be removed if clubs had the same courage as Widnes who proposed extending the league to 14 clubs and taking less money. Not unexpectedly selfinterest prevailed and the other teams turned down what is an eminently sensible suggestion.

Meanwhile Mr.Stephenson seems to think that abolishing promotion and relegation will somehow improve Super League. Well, I have news for Mr. S., abolishing relegation will cause Super League to stagnate because without it you can bet your bottom dollar the same old faces will be propping up the league year after year. After all there's nothing quite like the fear of the drop for concentrating minds; just look at the performances of London Broncos in the last few weeks (and, come to that, of Castleford last week). With nothing to play for can you imagine how exciting Salford v. Castleford would be at the end of a long, hard season?

And the obverse of Mr. Stephenson's idea is to condemn every club in the National Leagues to perpetual second best status.

Where's the incentive in that? In fact under the Stephenson format every National League chairman might as well pack up and go home. If you can't progress up the ladder what's the point? Would the likes of Leigh, Whitehaven or Oldham put the incredible effort they do if there was no hope of progression? It's all so typical of the attitude of the privileged and cosseted: I only watch Super League so sod the rest of you! And that from a son of Dewsbury! Clearly one who's forgotten his roots.

It didn't take long for my comment about head tackling in the last programme about the dismissal -or not- of offenders to become pertinent. One week in fact, If you went to Rochdale you'll know exactly what I mean. Strange isn't it that Oldham's two most dangerous players on the day, Martin Mcloughlin and Lee Marsh, didn't complete the match because of head injuries?

The news of the return to Oldham of David Gibbons (and, hopefully, of twin brother Anthony next season) is just the sort of tonic Oldham fans need. I, for one will be thrilled at their return as I rate the pair among the very best to have represented the new Oldham club. Great players, great attitude, great clubmen. What more can you say?

MARTIN McLoughlin -- Macca to his friends and team mates at Oldham -- is a forward in form . . . and that's a huge plus for the Roughyeds as they bid to consolidate their place in the upper reaches of the LHF Healthplan National League first division.

The 24-year-old former Wigan and Barrow forward is reaching his season's peak at the very time Steve Molloy's men are pushing for a third-place finish in the league under intense opposition from Doncaster. Featherstone Rovers and Hull KR.

It's been an eventful few weeks, too, for Macca, who is emerging as one of the most promising young front-row forwards in the National League.

He had a relatively guiet first four months of the season, but it was to prove the Juli before the storm. In 13 of the first 16 games of the 2004 campaign he was used as a substitute, coming off the bench to give Molloy, Paul Southern or Dane Morgan a breather.

It all began to change in the Arriva Trains Cup qualifier at Doncaster on April 25 when Macca was sent off by referee Steve Nicholson in the 27th minute of a fiercelyfought contest in almost unbearable heat.


He was alleged to have gone in high when tackling a Dragons forward, but player and Oldham club contested claims that it was malicious or deliberate and the judiciary upheld their view that, while the challenge was higher than it ought to have been, it was not intended to cause damage.

McLoughlin was found quilty with a sending-off-sufficient verdict, whereupon he won a starting spot for the next few games while Southern recovered from a broken bone in a hand and a recurrence of a long-standing groin injury.

Macca, who had spent much of the season up to then somewhat in the shadow of his more senior props Molloy and Southern. not to mention Dane Morgan (who had hopped between front and second rows), was gradually beginning to make his mark.

He had a great game at Blackpool against Batley when three props were absent due to injury -- Molloy, Southern and young Adam Sharples --- and when he and Morgan shouldered most of the heavy work up front.

Two games later, against Whitehaven at Chorley, the Roughyeds produced one of

their best wins of the campaign with McLoughlin and Morgan in the front-row, although Molloy did return to action from the bench after missing two games with a neck injury.

It was to be the player-coach's first and last appearance for several weeks. He damaged a shoulder in training on the Friday night before the next match at Doncaster and with fitness doubts continuing to haunt Molloy and Southern, it was Macca's big chance to establish himself higher up the prop pecking order.

He has been first choice No 10 in the last three games against Hull KR, Rochdale and Batley and on each occasion he has impressed as a man who is starting to hit his best form at the right time as the business end of the season kicks in.

He was devastating at times in the shock defeat at Rochdale where he suffered a badly cut eye in the second half while in the act of setting up a try for Neil Roden with a terrific drive and a clever offload to the man in support.

As Roden, his old school chum, strode away to dive over the line for a try that put Oldham back in front in a derby thriller, McLoughlin was hurt in a threeman tackle and had to leave the field, never to return.

The incident was placed on report and, as a consequence, Rochdale forward Gareth Price was called to the RL disciplinary committee to answer a charge that he committed an offence in the tackle.

McLoughlin needed several stitches, but he was able to play the following week at Batley, with the

wound protected, and he had another powerful game in a splendid Oldham win, 34-18.

Macca is enjoying his rugby right now, not that he has ever been anything but happy at Oldham. "It's great here," he said the other night after training. "And on a personal note I think my form is following a similar pattern to last year when I started to come good towards the end of the regular season.

"I've had a lot more starts in recent weeks and that has not only increased my confidence, but it has given me more game time and, in turn, that has helped my general match fitness."

A Wiganer, Macca signed for the Warriors as a youngster but eventually moved to Barrow when the men from Craven Park were being coached by New Zealander Cameron Bell.

Cameron's son Dean - the former Wigan and New Zealand Test centre --- knew all about Martin from his days in charge of the youngsters at Wigan and when he recommended the young front-rower to his father it was just the tip Barrow needed to pursue their interest.

McLoughlin eventually moved to Barrow where Bell snr. used him mainly in the second-row as a wide running forward. He had one excellent season with the blue and whites before cash problems hit the Shipbuilders and many of the players moved on.


Macca was recommended to Oldham by Neil Roden's father Jack, a senior scout for the Wigan club, and the rest, as they say, is history.



DON YATES LOOKS BACK TO AUGUST 22ND YESTERYEAR

Although today's visitors to Boundary Park, Keighley, lie at the foot of the First Division table, they will provide dangerous opposition and are fully capable of springing a surprise. Five years ago, on Sunday 22nd August 1999, Keighley were hovering in mid-table when they entertained topof-the-table Leigh. The visitors were expected to continue their winning ways but Keighley produced a superb performance and knocked Leigh off top spot with a memorable 29-14 victory. The former Oldham player Pat Rich was at loose-forward for the Cougars and played his part in the win. He scored a try and two goals. Winger Jason Lee (2), prop Steve Campbell and secondrower Phil Stephenson also scored tries with stand-off Christian Tyrer adding two goals and a dropped goal.

Oldham were reigning League Champions when they visited Barrow on Thursday 22nd August 1957. The Furness club also had a capable outfit in those days but they were no match for the Roughyeds who won 27-10 at Craven Park. Looseforward Derek Turner (2), centre Dennis Ayres, prop Ken Jackson and winger Dick Cracknell scored tries with full-back Bernard Ganley adding

Two years later, on Saturday 22nd August 1959, Barrow met Keighley at Lawkholme Lane where the Cougars won 23-17. Winger Terry Hollindrake scored a try and two goals for Keighley in that victory. He is one of only two Keighley players who have played test match rugby whilst at Keighley, the other being Daryl Powell. Hollindrake is a local lad who joined the club from Keighley Albion. Equally at home whether at fullback, wing or centre, Hollindrake was a popular figure at Lawkholme Lane. He was an accurate goal kicker and prolific try scorer who enjoyed two spells with the club. He joined Keighley initially in December 1951 and was transferred to Hull nine years later. He then moved on to Bramley and had a spell back in local junior rugby before rejoining Keighley in October 1969 for another couple of years. During his two spells with the club Hollindrake made 249 appearances and scored 113 tries and 330 goals.

The 22nd August is a significant date in the career of Graham Starkey. It was on that date in 1964, Saturday 22nd August, that Starkey made his senior rugby league debut when he was centre in the Rochdale Hornets team which defeated Salford 10-4 on the old Athletic grounds. He had joined Hornets from Old Rochdalians RUFC the previous month. Starkey enjoyed five successful seasons with Rochdale, scoring 43 tries and 333 goals from 144 appearances. During his final two seasons at Rochdale. Starkey was player-coach and he continued in that capacity at Huddersfield after he joined them in 1969. In June 1970 Starkey returned to this side of the Pennines when he joined Oldham, again as player-coach. The fee was £2,000 and Starkey made his debut for Oldham on Saturday 22nd August 1970. It was not too successful a start for Starkey as Oldham lost 24-11 at York that afternoon. He landed four goals on his debut with diminutive scrum-half Ged Smith scoring the Oldham try. During his three years with the Roughyeds he made 14 appearances and scored five tries and 16 goals. Starkey left Oldham in June 1973 when he joined Wigan as coach but he returned to

Watersheddings January 1979 manager, a post he held until May 1981. A deep thinker about the game, Starkey was well ahead of his time and was instrumental in the setting up of National Coaching Schemes. Although no longer officially involved in the game, Starkey still takes a keen interest in the sport.

IT'S a funny old world. A Super League player can decapitate an opponent with a Samurai sword and the ref austerely crosses his arms and puts it on report. This while paramedics try to gather up the rolling head and shove it in a bag of ice – yes, I think we could perhaps have definitely called that a high shot, ref! You know, of the 'red card' variety? Meanwhile the Batley Bulldog mascot, Battler, does a bit of hand-jiving behind Colin Morris's back – he thinks – and Group 4 is called in, complete with Armalite rifles, to march him off the premises. Let that be lesson number one young master Bulldog – Colin Morris really does have eyes in the back of his head.

This year more than any I can recall, our referees have been taking more stick from more and more angles. And no, not just losing coaches looking for a scapegoat, or fans who would swear on a stack of Bibles that so-and-so has got it in for their team. With respect, so-and-so never knocked on, threw a forward pass or missed a tackle. Crucial decisions or not, few matches are ultimately decided by the ability of the man in the middle. Moments are decided, not matches. And it's often how a team responds to those moments that is the measure of its champion potential. That does not detract from the fair criticism that is levelled at referees, because despite what I have just said, a ref having a particularly bad game can and does influence the outcome. Just as importantly, he can influence people's enjoyment of the spectacle — and it's the paying punters we have to look after. Watching professional sport is not cheap, at whatever level. The fans deserve the best we can give them. Don't let's feed their frustration and give them a reason to believe it's not worth their while.

I know Stuart Cummings and his department put more effort than ever before into developing referees across the entire spectrum of the sport. My observation would be that their good work is not yielding its fruits fast enough to keep up with the demands of fans, coaches and the ubiquitous lens of the camera. We're developing young refs specifically because they need to be very fit to keep with the pace of the game, but the result is often that they haven't accumulated the rugby experience to match. I feel some are even a bit starstruck out there. Very few, outside the top four or five, command natural respect from the players. In the National Leagues 1 and 2, where there is more devilry from the players and not necessarily the professional self-discipline of Super League, the situation is exacerbated – and they also get the more junior officials.

So what to do? How about more players as referees? Instead of developing just coaching career paths while they are still turning out, why not give active professionals the same opportunity with refereeing skills? Retiring from playing in their early 30s should give them a good 10 years or more at the top as a ref. I would also like to see the top referees go full-time professional, and in turn pump their increased expertise back into a refereeing Academy. If we want to do our fantastic sport justice, then we cannot afford to neglect this most crucial element of it.

And as for Battler the Bulldog? Well I hope he gets sending off sufficient ... and that someone persuades Mr Morris to lighten up a bit. A word in the mascot's ear should have sufficed.



SEVENS HEAVEN?

CRICKET has enjoyed remarkable success with the "20/20" scaled down version of their sport - could Rugby League adopt something similar to help take our game to a wider audience?

For those who haven't seen "20/20", it is basically a shorter version of a usual game of cricket, played over 20 overs. But the sport hasn't just amended the game itself to tailor for new, and crucially younger, supporters.

They have also introduced a string of new innovations to make their game more watchable. And I'm not referring to the coloured kits and music over the tannov.

One example is that players in the fielding team usually including the captain - play the game with a microphone that connects them to the television commentary team. As a result, they can be asked what happed when they take a brilliant catch - just seconds after the incident.

The move has been hugely successful, with the semi-finals and final being played in front of a capacity crowd at Edgbaston recently.

So could Rugby League take a leaf out of their books?

The crucial thing to remember here is that cricket is not attempting to change its own game - it is merely providing an easily understandable and watchable product that gets new people interested in their sport.

The ideal model for League could be Sevens - an all action, non-stop version of our game that, with innovations similar to those in cricket's "20/20", could be a huge success.

Why couldn't a player, for example, be interviewed briefly on the pitch as he returns to his own half after scoring a try? We saw something approaching that in International games of recent years, when cameras went onto the pitch and followed players taking up their positions for kick-

It would allow those watching to be able to instantly relate to the ayers on the field - as well as providing an insight into the game.

But already there is a major stumbling block - isn't there always with League? - in that the Australian clubs appear to have thrown a major spanner in the works by effectively killing off the recently relaunched World Sevens.

The 15 NRL club bosses rebelled against the Sevens at their meeting in Sydney last week, turning their backs on the public, who had enthusiastically embraced the concept.

The fans particularly warmed to players from the fledgling nations such as Russia, Samoa and Tonga, and the competition has been a significant factor in helping to foster the game in several developing nations.

The clubs do not want the tournament because the cost of paying their players, however, and the risk of injury on the eve of a new season.

There is already talk of switching the competition to another country - maybe even this one - and surely this is too good an opportunity to pass up.
