

The Lost World of Swinton and Oldham...lan Jackson


In January 2005, a series of three remarkable television programmes were broadcast by BBC TV that showed long forgotten moving images of Edwardian England at the turn of the 20th century. "The lost world of Mitchell and Kenyon" showed recently discovered film footage of the North of England at the very start of cinematography filmed by two entrepreneurs from Blackburn, named Sagar Mitchell and James Kenyon. The silent films, which even pre-date cinemas were mainly showed at fairgrounds and captured busy town centres, scenes at factory gates and even sporting events. Batley, Hunslet and Leeds were all featured in the BBC TV series at the very beginning of Rugby League, which was then known as Northern Union.

In the early 1900s both Swinton and Oldham were amongst the finest teams and attracted huge crowds at Chorley Road and Watersheddings, respectively. So did Swinton and Oldham feature in some of the 800 film reels of Mitchell and Kenyon? A clue lies in this extract from Trevor Delaney's book: "The Grounds of Rugby League" (1991). In the chapter on Oldham, it read:

"The game against Swinton on 12 January 1901, when it was said a "cinematograph apparatus" was on hand to record events, was ordered to be replayed after thousands of spectators went inside the fencing along the touch-lines and behind the posts. The gates were closed but thousands watched from outside on the hills at the Ripponden Road end (of Watersheddings)."



Blackpool Panthers 24 Swinton Lions 34

The Lions kept up their good start to the campaign with victory over the Panthers at an icy cold Bloomfield Road.

The Panthers took the lead in the 2nd minute when Eric Andrews collected a through kick at the corner and ex-Lion Jake Johnstone added the difficult conversion. The lead was stretched 16 minutes later when Johnstone added a penalty goal.

The Lions had early chances but ball-handling let them down. However, Phil Joseph scored his first Lions' try from close range in the 22nd minute and Lee Marsh added the goal points. It got even better two minutes later when Chris Maye raced 70 metres to score on the left, and again Marsh converted to put the Lions in the lead at 12-8. Marlon Billy added a 3rd try just before the break but Marsh was unable to convert.

Marsh added a simple penalty goal just after the break to stretch the Lions further ahead and Swinton made the game safe with three tries in nine minutes midway through the half. Billy, Maye and Stuart Oldham all went over and Marsh added two more goals. Arguably a lack of concentration and discipline in the closing stages allowed the home side to come back strongly in the last 17 minutes and they too ran in three tries thanks to Gary Smith, Danny Barton and Johnstone. Johnstone also added two more goals to allow the Panthers to recover from 34-8 down to a more respectable 34-24.

The lost world of Swinton and Oldham (Continued)

Did the "cinematograph apparatus" belong to Mitchell and Kenyon who were active in recording such events across Lancashire at the very same time? Whatever the answer, the Lancashire Senior Competition was definitely hard-fought that season between the top two sides: Oldham and Swinton. The Lions won the original fixture by 7 points to 5 thanks to a Bobby Messer try and two goals by Bob Valentine. However, Oldham successfully protested against the result because of the large number of spectators that had strayed onto the field of play. Steve Wild's history of Swinton RLFC, "The Lions of Swinton" (1999) also records that the Oldham protest was upheld because if the original game was declared void and replayed then "they would give a third of the gate receipts to the Northern Union!" The Swinton and Pendlebury Journal reflected:

"What Oldham failed to achieve on the pitch, they have achieved with cloaked diplomacy"

The re-arranged game took place at Watersheddings on 25 February 1901 and the result was a 3-3 draw. The replayed game was an original four-pointer, without it the Lions would have won the league by a single point! The final league positions show the full extent of the decision to deem the original fixture void.

Whether or not footage from the void Oldham versus Swinton game at Watersheddings of 1901 still remains and is amongst the many hours of restored film archive from Mitchell and Kenyon requires more research to find out for certain. If it is, then the film would clearly show over 21,000 spectators packed into the ground plus hundreds locked outside where, the "hillside was black with would-be spectators." Such is the lost world of Swinton and Oldham.



OLDHAM ROUGHYEDS

Gareth Barber. Stand Off

Local born player, who started his professional career with Super League club Warrington Wolves. He has been used effectively as an impact player coming off the bench to exploit tiring defences. Barber represented the National League under-21 side that defeated their Super League counterparts in 2001.

Rick Bibev. Second Row

Started his career at Leigh before making a name for himself at Wigan. Moved on to St Helens last season. Signed for Oldham on a permanent 12 month contract, with an option of another 12 months.

Will Cowell, Full Back, Wing, Centre

The 23-year-old Cumbrian is a product of that prolific provider of Rugby League players, Kells. After originally joining Warrington he left Wilderspool permanently to join Oldham originally on a one-year contract which he has extended for another year on two occasions.

Gavin Dodd. Full Back. Winger

A product of the Royton Tigers youth set up, who later had a spell with Bradford Bulls academy team. Gavin represented Great Britain students in Australia and New Zealand four years ago, and was selected in the GB under-21 squad two seasons ago.

Martin Elswood, Second Row, Centre

Local 20 year old signed from Super League club Huddersfield Giants. At around 6'4" and 16st Martin has power as well as pace. He is eager to further his career and for this reason wants to get some first team rugby under his belt.

Craig Farrimond, Back Row, Hooker

He started his rugby years at the Wigan based Ince Rose Bridge before signing for Warrington, where he was the captain of the under-21 side for two seasons. Craig was offered a full-time contract by the Wolves, but he did not consider it lucrative enough to give up his job. Oldham beat off Leigh and Halifax for his signature.

Tere Glassie, Second Row, Prop

Signed at the beginning of the 2005 season along with his fellow Cook Island internationals, Carlos Mataoro and Jonathon Wilson. Tere has had experience in the top grade in Australia as well as the Batercard Cup Competition in New Zealand and arrived at Oldham from the Newtown Jets.

Jon Goddard, Full Back, Centre

Reared in Castleford youth and schools rugby before joining the Tigers academy, Originally joined Oldham on loan in 2002. Jon swept the board at the Oldham awards last season taking all but the Roughyeds Kids player of the year award. Selected at full back in the 2004 mythical NL1

Andy Gorey, Full Back, Half Back

Completing the second year of a two year contract in the 2005 season. A versatile back who has played most of his rugby in the academy at full back. He is enjoying the more demanding training rigours of the first team squad and is itching for his first senior run out.

Simon Haughton, Forward

Signed from Rugby Union club Orrell. While at Wigan he won a host of medals and has 5 GB caps to his name including a man of the match performance against Australia at Old Trafford. Simon has also represented England on more than a dozen occasions.

Jon Hough, Hooker

Came from Warrington and was the first player to sign for his home town club when the new Roughyeds were formed by Chris Hamilton and his fellow directors in the autumn of 1997. He has just signed a new contract to take him to the end of the 2007 season, which will allow him to complete 10 years with the club.

Andy Isherwood, Second Row

25 year old signed from Leigh Centurions. Andy started off as a 14 year old at Wigan but did not make first grade there and moved to Leigh in 2002. He also had a spell with Widnes for their 2003 Super League season, but was injured on a pre-season tour of South Africa. Signed by the Roughveds for the 2005 season.

Nick Johnson, Wina

Signed for Oldham towards the end of the 2003 season for the run in to the play offs, on a loan deal from Bradford Bulls. He spent most of the 2003 season on long term loan to London Broncos. Last season Nick smashed the Oldham Roughyeds try scoring record, beating the record set by Mark Sibson.

James Kirkland, Prop

Another off the academy conveyer belt. A front row partner along with fellow team mates Adam Sharples and Danny Nanyn, who have also progressed into the ranks of the first team squad. James has the opportunity to deputise the senior hookers in the team, an opportunity made vacant by the retirement of Keith Brennan.

Carlos Mataora, Stand Off, Hooker

Another Cook Island international brought to Oldham for the 2005 season. He played in the victorious Cook Island team which thrashed the NZ Maoris in the final of the Pacific Rim Cup. Known in the Cook Island team for his robust style of play he is also an astute goal kicker.

Damian Munro, Wing, Centre

New signing from Leigh who notched up 42 tries in 46 games for the Centurions during a two year spell. At 28 years old he has had plenty of experience both in Super League and at the upper end of the National League and has been in two National League 1 Grand Final winners sides with Widnes and Leigh.

Danny Hanyn, Prop

Has risen from the Academy ranks, and is now on the verge of making a first team berth his own. After making his first team debut in the 2004 season, only an untimely injury prevented him from adding to his number of NL1 appearances.

Paul Norman, Prop

Although not the bulkiest of front row forwards, Paul is a player who always makes the gain line and is no stranger to the top end of a tackle count. He started his pro career with the Oldham Bears. where he made 12 appearances before the demise of the club in 1997. Since then he provided sterling service to Leigh Centurion.

Mark Roberts, Centre

Joined Oldham on loan from Warrington Wolves at the end of the 2004 season. He was then the first player to commit to the Roughyeds for the 2005 season. Used last year mainly as a centre, where he can display his devastating turn of pace, he also has the upper body strength to enhance the back row of the pack.

Adam Sharples, Prop





Leading Lights

THE Northern Rail Cup may be just two weeks old, but already a host of stars have began to emerge. A cluster of individual players have stood out in the opening two rounds of the competition. As impressive as anyone so far has been Hull Kingston Rovers' new Australian signing James Webster.

Webster joined the Robins from Parramatta Eels, having played plenty of first grade games Down Under. He has already played scrum half, stand off and hooker for Rovers — excelling in all three. He was outstanding in both their victories over Keighley Cougars, and despite his slight frame, looks set to be one of the NL1 stars of the season.

Another should be Castleford scrum half Paul Handforth, a second player to win consecutive 'Gamestar' awards in Rugby Leaguer & League Express. Handforth spent the early part of his career at Wakefield, where he alternated between halfback and hooker and played primarily off the bench. Now he looks to have already made the Cas number seven shirt his own, and has been hugely influential in wins over York and Featherstone.

Another to have produced impressive back-to-back displays has been York City Knights prop John Smith. The 24 year old was a late starter in the professional game, having played until recently at Featherstone Lions. But his high workrate has seen him become a cornerstone of the Knights pack.

There has been no shortage of quality displays from halfbacks in the opening two rounds – in addition to Handforth and Webster. Halifax's Ben Black was in sparkling form at times during their big win over London Skolars, while Ryan Sheridan gave Dewsbury supporters a glimpse of what is to come with a commanding display against Batley. And Featherstone halfback Josh Weeden has also shown plenty of nice touches in his two games so far.

In the pack, two players to catch the eye on the opening weekend were Workington's John Tuimaualuga, and John Tomes of Gateshead. They shared the season's first NRC Player of the Week crown, but missed out on the action last weekend when their scheduled clash was postponed.

More stars are sure to emerge this weekend. It's shaping up to be a terrific competition.

Well, did everybody enjoy the night out at the best 'half a football ground' in the country last Friday? I certainly did, but I must admit, it was strange to see the 'Lions' playing on the home ground of my favourite football team. Not

for the first time though, as I remember the night back in March 1987, when we last played at Bloomfield Road, against the old Blackpool Borough club.

Having been a Blackpool FC, supporter from a very early age - I can remember back to the days of Jimmy Armfield and Tony Waiters and more recently Mickey Walsh, Derek Spence, Paul Stewart and Colin Hendry's mish mash of a team from today - it is with a great deal of goodwill that I wish the new Blackpool Panthers all the best, in their quest to make Rugby League a success on the 'Costa Del Fylde'.

However, in the first three home fixtures for the Panthers, only one will have taken place as planned and that was a friendly against St Helens. Today. they are being forced to play Rochdale Hornets (Not Oldham as their P.A. announcer claimed last Friday night), at the home of Preston Grasshoppers RUFC and of course, our game last weekend was played on the Friday night instead of the Sunday because Blackpool were due to play Bradford City on Tuesday!!!! It doesn't bode well for the future of the new venture it seems.

Commendably, the Panthers are claiming excellent relations with their soccer landlords. However, my spy on the 'Costa Del Fylde' claims the football club are to blame for the state of the pitch. It seems they don't have a full-time groundsman. With this being the case, it is very understandable that Colin Hendry has insisted on a four day hiatus between Rugby and Soccer matches on the ground.

Also, when Blackpool FC began the re-development of their stadium three years ago, the current stands were built in different positions to the old West Stand and Spion Kop. As a result, the pitch had to be moved in a North Westerly direction, so that it was closer to the stands we visited last Friday. Unfortunately, my spy tells me the football club went for a cheaper option when the pitch was re-laid and hence the current problems are the result. Port Vale manager Martin Foyle claimed recently, "I am glad my team don't have to play on that pitch every other week"!!! (And that was before the Panthers had even set foot on the place!!!).

It is the same old story though, and that is that the grass is cut a lot shorter for Soccer than it needs to be for Rugby, which causes the pitch to wear out much quicker. Why do you think that so many soccer players have complained about the pitch at the Millennium Stadium being so slippery because it's a Rugby ground with longer grass, that's why!!!

The re-development of Bloomfield Road has more recently been held up through the club having to wait for the old railway bridge on Bloomfield Road itself, to be knocked down. This having recently been completed, the local council have stated that they want the football club to commence the building of that part of the ground.

It is great to be able to go to Blackpool once again to watch professional Rugby League and I really do hope that the Panthers can make a go of it, except that is for Good Friday, 15th May and 24th July, Yes, I may well have a had a Tangerine and White scarf in my pocket last Friday, but it was the Blue and White one I wore, not only to try and keep warm, but to show who I was really supporting!!!

One Lion on the Shirt...by Ian Jackson Swinton II

The recent book "Played in Manchester" by Simon Inglis (2004) laments the fact that there are "no memorials at all for Station Road, the former home of Swinton RLFC, sold for re-development in 1992." However, what memorial is suitable for our former ground? In summary, Station Road staged:

- Championship Finals
- **Premiership Finals**
- Challenge Cup Semi-Finals
- International Test Matches
- World Cup Matches
- International Matches
- Lancashire County Cup Finals
- War of the Roses County Games

In addition, Station Road was the venue for many International Tour Games and Amateur Cup Finals as well as home matches for the Lions. The debate continues for a fitting and lasting tribute to Station Road and all those great Swinton players from the past, such as Bryn Evans and Martin Hodgson from the early days of the ground, which opened in March 1929; the Championship side of the 1960s that included Ken Gowers and Alan Buckley through to more recent times and the likes of Danny Wilson and Les Holliday. Of course, the wonderful thing about Station Road was the variety of visiting teams that played there as well as the Swinton greats. Here are three great rugby league wingers who graced the wide open spaces of Station Road.

Brian Bevan, (Warrington and Blackpool)

Australia-born Bevan is the leading try scorer in the British game with 796 tries between 1945 and 1964 mainly for the great Warrington side of the 1950s. Initially, Station Road was not a happy hunting ground for Beyan who was on the losing side in two Lancashire Cup Finals and three Challenge Cup Semi-Finals at Swinton between 1945 and 1953. However, Brian Bevan scored a crucial try in the 8-4 victory over Leeds in the 1954 semi-final at Station Road that sent Warrington to play Halifax in the final. The Wembley game was drawn 4-4 and the Wire eventually won the replay at Odsal in front of over 102,000 spectators.

Tom Van Vollenhoven, (St. Helens)

South Africa-born Vollenhoven was equally good in defence and attack. The first and only rugby league winger to score a hat-tick against him was Swinton's John Stopford at Station Road in April 1959 (a feat John repeated at Knowsley Road in April 1963). In total, Vollenhoven played 17 times at Station Road, against the Lions and also in finals and semi-finals. The flying Springboks played at Swinton more than any other venue except Knowsley Road in a rugby league career that lasted from 1957 to 1968.

Billy Boston. (Wigan and Blackpool)


Wales-born Boston played at Station Road for both club and country. Boston notched up a try against the Australians at Swinton in Test Matches in December 1956 and October 1959 as well as for Wigan against Oldham in the 1966 Lancashire Cup Final. In all Boston scored 571 tries in a career from 1953 to 1970 and is second only to Brian Beyan in the all time list of rugby league try-scorers in Britain.

All three players are featured in the "Rugby League Hall of Fame" by Robert Gate (2003) but there are no Swinton players not even Martin Hodgson who played 12 times against Australia for Swinton, Cumberland and Great Britain and was never on the losing side. Hodgson also holds the record for the longest kick in rugby league history (77.75 yards) and deserves a monument at Station Road all of his own.
