





Ricky Bibey was a surprise signing for 2005 from Super League giants St Helens. Rick has a rugged style of play with a ruthless streak, just what is required for making inroads into the tough defences of National League One. At the tender age of 23, young by prop forward terms, Ricky already has two Challenge Cup winners medals, with the remarkable record of beating St Helens when with his former club Wigan, and then doing the reverse beating Wigan when with St Helens. He has also had a loan spell with his hometown club Leigh Centurions.

Martin Elswood Local 20 year old second row or centre Martin Elswood signed from Super League club Huddersfield Giants.

Martin who was on the verge of a first team call up last season when Steve Molloy first looked at him with regard to strengthening his squad for the run in to the play offs, but sadly injury dashed his chances.

At around 6'4" and 16st Martin has power as well as pace, he his eager to further his career and for this reason wants to get some first team rugby under his belt.

Martin was brought up on a strong rugby background at North Chadderton school and was also reared in the Royton Tigers youth set up.

Will Cowell has played 18 times in Super League for Warrington Wolves, mostly as a substitute.

The 23-year-old Cumbrian, a product of that prolific provider of rugby league players, Kells. He left Wilderspool permanently to join Oldham originally on a one-year contract which he has extended for another year on two occasions.

He plays full-back, wing or centre, Although he prefers full-back he has shown great form in the early part of 2004 as a winger. Former Warrington coach Daryl van de Velde, spoke well of Cowell before he was invited to join the Roughyeds.

Gavin Dodd A product of the Royton Tigers youth set up, who later had a spell with Bradford Bulls academy team. Gavin is primarily a Full Back, but has established himself as a winger in the past couple of season's.

Fast on the break, and unpredictable at times, makes Dodd a scorer of spectacular tries.

Gavin represented Great Britain students in Australia and New Zealand four years ago, and was selected in the GB under 21 squad two seasons ago.

**Tere Glassie** was signed at the begging of the 2005 season along with his fellow Cook Island internationals, Carlos Mataoro and Jonathon Wilson. Tere has had experience in the

top grade in Australia as well as the Batercard Cup Comp in New Zealand, he arrived at Oldham from the Newtown Jets, the team that Oldham Hall of Fame player Martin Murphy had a spell with. He has played most of his Rugby in the second row being a very mobile forward, but his versatility also ables him to play in the front row.

**Jon Goddard** came to Oldham on loan in the 2002 season on the high recommendation of Graham Steadman, the then Castleford boss.Goddard was reared in Castleford youth and schools rugby before going to Wheldon Road to play for the Tigers academy side.

During his two seasons in their Alliance team he played three times in Super League, against Wakefield at home and against Bradford and London, both away, in 2001. Jon swept the board at the Oldham awards last season taking all but the Roughyeds Kids player of the year award. A very competent Full Back who was selected in the 2004 mythical NL1 team for that position, he is equally at home in a centre berth.

Andy Gorey is completing the second year of a two year contract in the 2005 season. A versatile back who has played most of his rugby in the academy at full back, but he is also a competent half back. He is enjoying the more demanding training rigours of the first team squad and is itching for his first senior run out.

Simon Haughton from Rugby Union club Orrell. 29 year old Simon is more renowned for his stint with Wigan Warriors, where he was known for his barnstorming runs and prolific try scoring record. He has 5 GB caps including a man of the match performance against Australia at Old Trafford, and has also represented England on more than a dozen occasions. His domestic stint with the Warriors brought him every award going including a Super League Grand Final winners ring, Challenge Cup finalist, Regal Trophy winner, Division One Championship medal and 2 winners medals from the Premiership prior to the advent of Super League.

John Hough The first player to sign for his home town club when the new Roughyeds were formed by Chris Hamilton and his fellow directors in the autumn of 1997. He has just signed a new contract to take him to the end of the 2007 season, which will allow him to complete 10 years with the club.

John is an hooker well renown now in National League circles, he originally joined the Roughyeds from Warrington Wolves. An astute worker from acting half back, he is also capable of filling in at Loose Forward.

Nick Johnson signed for Oldham towards the end of the 2003 season for the run in to the play offs, on a loan deal from Bradford Bulls. Nick is the younger brother of Gavin. He spent most of the 2003 season on long term loan to London Broncos. Nick smashed the Oldham Roughyeds try scoring record last season, beating the record set by Mark Sibson. He has pace to burn, a safe set of hands and is a dynamic finisher. No-one would be surprised to see him extend his try scoring record even

further in the 2005 season.

James Kirkland is another off the academy conveyer belt. A front row partner along with fellow team mates Adam Sharples and Danny Nanyn, who have also progressed into the ranks of the first team squad. James has the opportunity to deputise the senior hooker's in the team, an opportunity made vacant by the retirement from playing of Keith Brennan.

Carlos Mataora is one of three Cook Island internationals brought to Oldham for the 2005 season. He played in the victorious Cook Island team which thrashed the NZ Maoris in the final of the Pacific Rim Cup. Carlos is equally at home in the stand off role or in the front row at hooker. Known in the Cook Island team for his robust style of play he is also an astute

**Damian Munro** is a quality addition to the Roughyeds 2005 squad. At 28 years old he has had plenty of experience both in Super League and at the upper end of the National League. He was with two National League 1 Grand Final winners sides, in Widnes and Leigh. Born in Oldham he is the son of former Oldham favourite Geoff, who is the only Oldham player to score a hatrick of hatricks. Damian is no stranger to try scoring himself as he notched up 42 in 46 games for the Centurions during a two year spell.

He is equally at home in the centre, on the wing or at full back. Danny Nanyn has risen from the Academy ranks, and is now on the verge of making a first team berth his own. After making his first team debut in the 2004 season, only an untimely injury prevented him from adding to his number of NL1 appearances. The younger brother of Whitehaven's Mick, Danny's style of play would be best described as pocket battleship. He is expected to feature in the first team more often during the 2005 campaign.

Paul Norman Although not the bulkiest of front row forwards, Paul is a player who always makes the gain line and is no stranger to the top end of a tackle count. He started his pro career with the Oldham Bears, where he made 12 appearances before the demise of the club in 1997. Since then he provided sterling service to Leigh Centurion. Always willing to do the hard graft required by the front row of the pack. Paul's experience will be invaluable to the Roughyeds in the 2005 season. He has an incredible work rate both in attack and defence.

Mark Roberts joined Oldham on loan from Warrington Wolves at the end of the 2004 season. He was then the first player to commit to the Roughyeds for the 2005 season. Used last year mainly as a centre, where he can display his devastating turn of pace, he also has the upper body strength to enhance the back row of the pack.

Adam Sharples is another of Oldham's academy team production line. A front row forward who made a couple of handfulls of appearances in the first team in 2004, he was not found wanting even when up against the so called more experienced men in the National League 1. A late comer to the

game of Rugby, he has applied his studious mind to the technicalitys of the sport and his physique is not found lacking. Adam is also expected to add to his tally of first team run outs in 2005.

Simon Svabic began his career with the former Oldham Bears club Academy side, where is half back partner was Bradford's Paul Deacon. Since those days he has played Super League with Salford and also at the top in the National League with Leigh Centurions.

He signed for the Roughyeds to begin the 2003 campaign. His prefered position is stand off, where he can demonstrate his silky smooth ball skills, but he is also at home in the full back position.

Marty Turner joined Oldham for the start of the 2005 season. He is a 23 year old scrum half signed from North Queensland Devils the Melbourne Storm feeder team in Australia. Indeed he had just broken into the Storm first team deputising for the impressive Matt Orford, when he and a team mate suffered injuries in a road traffic accident. Since his recovery Marty showed up well again for the Devils earning himself the tag of "Best Back" for the season. Being a New Zealander he has also had Bartercard Cup experience. He is the clubs overseas quota player for 2005. The Roughyeds hope he will be a star of National League one this year.

Alex Wilkinson Local born Alex, toured with the Great Britain schoolboys to Australia in 1999 and with the England Academy to New Zealand and Australia in 2001. He played his junior rugby with the Royton Tigers club and was snapped up by Super League giants, Bradford Bulls. Whilst at the Bulls he had a loan spell with London Broncos where he chalked up 6 Super Leaque appearances, before going on loan to Huddersfield where he added another 13 SL games to his tally, he had a similar amount of games on loan at Hull F.C. where he impressed the Humberside high flyers enough for them to offer him a two year contract. ### Spirited First Half, Disappointing Second

This game was marked down at the beginning of the season as a game that Barrow could possibly get a vital two points from. With this in mind there was an expectant crowd of 1008 hoping that the Raiders could get their second win in the league.

For the first time this season, Peter Roe had over 20 players to pick from for this game but only made a few changes to the team that lost to Widnes. Jason Roach replaced James Nixon on the wing and Jon Williamson started at stand-off as Richard Colley moved to loose forward. Paul Raftery was also brought in at prop forward instead of Stuart Dancer.

So the game began in earnest and after some tough pressure, Featherstone had crossed the line within eight minutes. Some excellent passing between the forwards Nathan Sykes and Steve Dooler eventually got the ball to centre Danny Maun who crossed over.

The visitors squandered another try scoring opportunity on 14 minutes when Richard Newlove mistimed the pass and threw the ball out of play.

However eight minutes later, Featherstone did cross the line again through Carl Hughes. Newlove's pass found Bryn Powell who passed to Hughes allowing the hooker to find a gap in the defence to cross for their second try. Liam Finn scored the conversion and Featherstone lead 10-0.

The home crowd would have been forgiven for thinking this was going to be another whitewash, but it took just six minutes for the Raiders to reply and score a try through Freddy Zitter against his former club. On the last tackle, Darren Holt passed out to Mike Whitehead who passed to Zitter who dived his way over the line. Holt scored the conversion, so Barrow were just four points behind at 6-10.

The Raiders then started to believe in themselves and attacked the Featherstone line more. They could not find a way through though, but managed to get the scores level after two penalties right on half time.

The first was awarded on 33 minutes after Featherstone were guilty of stealing the ball in the tackle. Holt scored that to bring the home side to within two points. Then Barrow received another penalty in the 40th minute for Danny Evans lifting in the tackle. Holt again scored and the scores were level 10 all

So the Raiders had the edge after that comeback and went in to a standing ovation from the home fans for the break. In the second half, Roe's men would have to play like they did at the end of the half in the hope of snatching the two points.

However, that is not what happened. The second half turned out to be a massive disappointment for home side with Featherstone running in another five tries to Barrow's one.

It was second half substitute Andrew Georgiadis who made the difference in the centre of the park. Barrow could not control him as he was involved in a number of the visitor's tries.

Only an excellent tackle on the line from Richard Colley stopped Georgiadis going over six minutes after the restart knocking him out of play. But two minutes later Featherstone did score. This time Newlove went over receiving the kick from Finn. Finn converted so Featherstone were 10-16 up.

The visitors were on the score sheet again on 52 minutes when Hughes scored his second of the match. Powell made a good break through the Barrow line and passed to Hughes who ran over to score under the posts. Finn scored the easy conversion and the gap was getting wider between the teams at 10-22.

It would continue to wider as well, as five minutes later it was Powell's turn to go over. Georgiadis made a magnificent break and passed to Newlove who then found Powell who scored. Featherstone were 10-26 ahead.

With ten minutes to go Featherstone went over again, after Barrow had managed to go thirteen minutes without conceding again (or scoring themselves), dashing any hopes of another late comeback by the Raiders. Substitute Andy McNally was the try scorer this time after some good interchange again. Finn made no mistake with the extras to give the visitors a 10-32 lead.

They were not finished yet and three minutes later, they went over again. Josh Weedon putting more points on the board after running from half way to place under the sticks. Finn converted again and the score read 10-38.

Barrow managed a late consolation try through Adrian Mulcahy, converted by Joel Osborn, but the damage was already done and the score finished Barrow 16; Featherstone 38.





### **Rugby Talk**

ON ONE level we should not be surprised at the lopsided scoreboard that left Bradford Bulls fans disconsolate as they trudged out of Odsal last Sunday. Super League has, in recent years, shown a remarkable tendency for freak results.

Saints themselves have taken a hammering or two - even with a full side - but we've also seen the rampant Rhinos reduced to gibbering wrecks on their travels. London can put 60 or 70 on a team when in the mood, Hull have done the same

What was strange about this scoreline is not the combatants, but the location. Getting the thick end of 70 points put on you in front of someone else's baying home crowd is one thing. Having to swallow that medicine in front of your own faithful is quite something else. That, more than anything, makes the experience more difficult to expunge from the battered psyche.

Have an arm-wrestle with a handbag snatcher in the town marketplace and a black eye is a badge of honour. Get worked over by a burglar in your own kitchen and it takes a different kind of coming to terms with.

There's too much talent and pride through out the Bulls organisation to let that mauling derail the train completely, but it put into stark focus the comment of former Widnes coach Neil Kelly when we spoke on Monday. "I'm glad they have given Brian (Noble) a two-year contract extension," he said. "That will help with their rebuilding process."

'Ned' Kelly is currently defensive coach to the Ulster rugby union team and a talent wasted outside rugby league. I found his remark interesting.

The Bulls in a rebuilding phase? Well we know Ian Millward's Wigan team is rebuilding - literally. They're having to sew dismembered limbs back on at the JJB. But in sporting terminologies 'rebuilding' is another way of saying that a team isn't going to win anything this year, and maybe not for a while. I hadn't reduced the Bulls to the 'rebuilding' category. And you'd never get an Ian Millward or a Brian Noble saying that in public; it may not even have occurred to them in

the way it would to a third party. I'm not even sure 'rebuilding' exists as a conscious process - it's a label reserved, I suspect, for dominant teams who have somehow slipped from the summit - for whatever

The challenge modern coaches have, as much as attracting the munificence of lady luck with the injury list, is instilling that mystery ingredient that evokes winning form; the intangible spirit that can miraculously transform the same 13 blokes from whipping boys one week into world beaters the next - and then putting a lid on it.

Saints, Warrington and Widnes have lately been blessed by it; others - Wakefield particularly - have seen it breeze in and out of the camp with a puzzling fickleness. Messrs McNally, Noble, Millward et al would probably give if not their right arms, a substantial donation from their wage packets, to have the answer to that question.



### NATIONAL LEAGUE TALK

### **CHANGING HOMES**

SHEFFIELD Eagles' clash with Workington Town this weekend is the latest of a series of National League matches to be taken 'on the road'. The Eagles will entertain their Cumbrian counterparts at the nearby Woodbourn Athletic Stadium, due to the temporary unavailability of their Don Valley home.

It is not the first time that the Eagles have made the switch, and they are certainly not the only National League club to find a short-term new base.

National League One side Oldham are no strangers to that situation. Since their chairman Chris Hamilton reformed the club in 1997, they have been forced to play at a host of alternative venues, often outside their own town.

They spent a season at neighbouring Rochdale's Spotland, and one at Ashton United FC.

Last Sunday, they hosted Hornets at another new ground - the Sedgley Park home that Swinton Lions now play their games from. It was a last minute move as well, as the Roughyeds' thoughts of late have understandably been focused on the financial difficulties the club has encountered.

They will also take on Featherstone and Halifax at Park Lane over the course of the next month.

Oldham were forced to switch because their usual Boundary Park home - as is so often the case at football stadiums - is unavailable as the pitch is being reseeded.

Rochdale are also undergoing the same problem, though rather than switch their matches to other venues, they are instead having a lengthy stint away from Spotland.

NL2's Blackpool Panthers are another club to have found a different ground to stage their home matches this year, using Preston Grasshoppers' pitch during the Northern Rail Cup.

And Gateshead Thunder staged a recent home game at nearby Newcastle Falcons RUFC.

It isn't, of course, ideal for the clubs involved, and as Oldham found during Sunday's derby win over Rochdale, the attendance figure can be affected significantly.

But it is often a case of 'needs must' at this level. And it also provides Rugby League supporters with the chance to tick off a couple more grounds they have visited while following their team around the country.
