



Welcome back to Boundary Park for the first "real" home game of the new season in this years Northern Rail Cup competition.

It was bitterly disappointing to lose last Sunday's match to a waterlogged pitch but we know all about bad weather in this country and I only hope that by the time you are reading this we will have been able to replay the game on Wednesday. It was a real let down after having had such a long close season and like you everybody at the club was frustrated after building themselves up for the big kick off.

The postponement also had a knock on (no pun intended!) effect on our training schedule and myself and John Pendlebury were desperately trying to find alternative venues for the lads as the training pattern was disrupted with the game becoming mid-week and our usual venues not being available.

This merely demonstrates however our reasons for negotiating to lease Hope Playing Fields on behalf of the club as over the past few years the problem of suitable training venues has been a constant source of hassle. Negotiations with the Council have slowed down somewhat recently due to pressure of work on the Council Officers dealing with this matter but we are moving things on and hope to be able to make significant progress in the near future.

Moving on to the playing front I hope that this years Northern Rail Cup will see a change in fortunes for ourselves as we have underachieved by never qualifying from the Group Stages despite always giving the competition the respect it deserves and although we are again in a formidable group let's hope we can shock a few people and get to the Play Off stage.

Our opponents today, Halifax, will certainly provide a stern test and although they slightly disappointed with their league position they came on strong in the National League Play Offs and were not far off knocking Castleford out in the Semi-Final to underline what a strong squad they had.

Although they have seen numerous changes in personnel they have again

appeared to recruit well and I fully expect them to be at the top end of the division and performing well in the Northern Rail Cup.

There are a number of links between the clubs with players moving either way and in addition to Alan Hadcroft and Wayne Corcoran who were at the Shay last year, Ged Corcoran, Craig Dean and Chris Maye have also played for Halifax previously and John Pendlebury still has many friends over there from his spells both as a player and as Head Coach.

One of our other players, Chris Hough, also has a rather tenuous link with the Yorkshiremen in that Halifax is one of only three clubs in the whole of the rugby league that he has not played for!!!!!!

Following on from the success of our ticketing promotion for the Leeds Rhinos game we will be extending this for some other matches his season in conjunction with the Sport Development Unit at Oldham Council. We are aware of the problems that some of you encountered that night with what can best be described as unsociable behaviour from some of the children who took up the free ticket offer and we will work hard to make sure that we learn from that and ensure that future offers are not spoiled for the majority by the minority. I note that Oldham Athletic had similar problems at their recent game against Port Vale and it is a sad indictment on today's society that people do not know how to behave especially when they are getting something

As we embark on another long season I hope you will join me in wishing John Pendlebury, Keith Brennan and all the playing staff every success this season. I have every confidence, as ever in them, and I hope you will show your support to the lads by being as vocal as you can every week

Well the Friendlies are over as is all the pre season preparation and we now come down to what it's all about, performance on the field. I obviously expected, in this column, to comment on our first Northern Rail Cup game against Rochdale but the weather put paid to that —

summer rugby eh! – Hopefully the game will have been played mid-week but too late for inclusion in this column.

Of the two Friendly fixtures I saw the Rochdale game as a unique experience to get to know the squad on the field and made 5 or 6 changes at the same time and therefore did not feel it fair to look at individual performances from this particular game because of this disruption. It was however a good experience for the players, especially those new to the club, as it told them just where they were in their preparations and what they had to do to get to peak fitness and performance. I very soon put this match to bed whilst welcoming the match practice it had given the players.

My philosophy for the Leeds game was completely different. I wanted to concentrate on the continuity of combinations, especially at half back and in the front row and as a result of that I thought we looked far more of a team and played a much better brand of football. This will be a continuing theme over the next 6 cup games where I hope to continue this process and give the players the opportunity to cement places in the team for themselves. One thing that I took out of the Leeds game was the players' appetite for contact in defence - this is vital for a successful rugby league team at any level. This meant that when we made errors and spilled the ball we did not allow this to result in points against because of excellent defensive work. It is my aim to further build up this intensity over the next few weeks.

You hear a lot of talk of coaches using the NR Cup games as a preparation for the season proper and perhaps not being as interested in the results as normal. This certainly is not my way of seeing things. To me the competition is just as important as any other

because an important part of rugby league is playing winning football. Otherwise confidence flags and players must be fully committed to the task in hand whatever the game. Obviously the team will hopefully build as they play more games but we will as always be looking seven days ahead to the next game and producing a team performance to do a particular job for that next game. If there is any complacency this cause a lot of trouble with lack of confidence and injuries. Having said all that I expect the team to build during these cup games and therefore improve as a unit so that, hopefully, come the start of the League season I'll have fully established the style and formation of the team I'm trying to implement.

Today we welcome Halifax and I'm sure you join with me in hoping the Directors, players and fans have a pleasant afternoon here at Boundary Park. I have fond memories of Halifax both as a player and a coach and would especially like to welcome Paul Dixon, the Football Director, and Mick Scott who are old playing colleagues of mine. Looking at their recruitment over the close season and their improved performances at the end of last season I expect them to be one of the top teams in what should be a very competitive league this season.

Please get behind the lads in this their first proper match at Boundary Park. It really does make a difference. Enjoy the game.

An awful lot has happened since my last programme words were penned late last August! This is true both at Oldham and in the game in general. Perhaps I may be allowed a brief look back.



The single most significant highlight was surely the Tri-Nations final victory by New Zealand. What a shot in the arm for the international game, and what a pleasure to see the Aussies humbled as they were. As it happened, I had been allocated to look after the Kiwi visitors a few days before the final, when they were guests at the Rugby Oldham launch/ Hall of Fame induction evening, and although they were quietly confident, I don't think in their wildest dreams they could have envisaged such a trouncing.

Mind you, it was a good job the tournament had such a good end, because it had been a bit depressing up until then. We had flattered to deceive in the convincing win over the Kiwis at Huddersfield, but were clearly no nearer coping with the Aussies at either Wigan or Hull. Still, at least there is now in place an international programme for the next few seasons - Tri-Nations down under this Autumn, tour by a NZ allgolds side the year after and then the World Cup early in 2008. We really must set the goal of winning the last of these, and hopefully make some rearrangements to our domestic season ideally fewer games in Super League in 2007, to make space for better preparation for the international side - in order to give us the maximum chance to achieve it. It should also be said that it is pathetic to see the prevarication about

the organisation of international RL which the Australian game is currently demonstrating.

On the home front, I thought the Finals Day of the National Leagues was again a fantastic day out. Batley's win over Dewsbury was the star game. And although it was in some ways disappointing to see Whitehaven miss out at the last gasp again, it was probably best that Cas should go back into Super League. Let us hope that the experience will push the Cumbrians to get together to plan for a side in Super League from 2008, with the 3-year guarantee which is proposed from then. The 2005 Super League had its regular superb final night at Old Trafford, too, and I personally enjoyed the Bradford charge to overcome St. Helens and Leeds. With London making the finals, Hull playing impressively to beat Warrington - apparently Andrew Johns was like a kid throwing out his dummy after that game! - and Terry Newton at last getting the sort of suspension he has deserved for several years, there was a great deal to enjoy in the run-up to the Final, too!

What about Oldham? I personally was pleased to see Gary Mercer go. Although he certainly had difficulties to contend with, the organisation of the team in the first half of the season was poor, and there were far too many occasions when we played below potential, even given the problems, for him to deserve another season, I felt. Indeed, the final two performances, at home to Batley and at Halifax, were so poor that I found it difficult to believe anyone was arguing that we wanted Mercer back. Certainly, I am much happier to see someone as steeped in traditional English rugby league as is John Pendlebury at the helm, I must

I wonder how those Bradford fans calling for Noble's head a few weeks into the 2005 season feel now? No doubt theyr'e in denial: not me guv!

Super League 2006 welcomes Catalan Dragons after extraordinarily dispensing with the services of Steve Deakin for incompatibility with the players (or should

Despite their grandfather battling to get their registrations accepted the boys were kept out of the game they love for over a year, playing Rugby Union in the meantime. Eventually officials at B.A.R.L.A. and Chairman Spen Allison in particular ruled that the brothers should be registered to play. But if you thought that was the end of the matter you'd be wrong. First up King Cross - not a club I remember monopolising junior honours over the last decade had to pay a fine of £10 every time the boys played. When B.A.R.L.A. ruled this out of order West Riding officials called off King Cross games and awarded their opponents victories by 18-0. Now 16, Richard Lopag has been signed by Huddersfield Giants but brother Peter is left in limbo. I cannot remember a more disgraceful episode. Never mind the 'rules is rules' argument, if officers of a junior league are not there to facilitate the playing of the sport by rugby mad youngsters what exactly are they there for? The whole lot should be ashamed of themselves, should be drummed out of office and never be allowed near an official position again.



Surely we cannot conclude this first column without giving a massive vote of thanks to our two Directors who against all the odds have managed, during the close season, with little





DID WAR HERO PLAY FOR RANGERS?

Just before Christmas the Oldham Evening Chronicle ran the headline "Did war hero play for Rangers?" I thought it meant local amateur side Saddleworth Rangers but it turned out to be Broughton Rangers, a Salford pro-side which were founder members of the of the Rugby League and who played at the same level as the Roughyeds until the mid-fifties



During the 30's they became Manchester's oneand-only professional rugby league club (Swinton playing in the city of Salford) when they moved into Belle Vue Speedway Stadium, later changing their name to Belle Vue Rangers. The war hero the Chronicle referred to was (ironically) Saddleworth born Thomas Steele, who, during the First World War, won the Victoria Cross, the world's most coveted honour awarded for bravery.

The man who prompted the Chronicle to ask the

question was Tom Mather (father of ex Great Britain threequarter Barrie-Jon Mather). Late last year Tom published a book Missing in Action which tells the story behind the death - as a direct result of serving in the forces - of 13 rugby league players, two of which are former Oldham forwards William Nanson and William Jardine. Another was John Harrison, a speedy winger who played for the Hull club and who was a surprise omission from the 1914 tour to Australia and New Zealand - which itself was

curtailed due to the outbreak of the First World War, Harrison was killed during the Battle of Arras in 1917. his Victoria Cross widely believed to be the only one ever awarded to a rugby league player.

The answer to the Chronicle's question is yes, Thomas Steele did play for Broughton Rangers and also for the then crack Oldham amateur side Healey Street Adults. So, does that make Steele the second known rugby league player to win the Victoria Cross or was he a Victoria Cross winner who then played rugby league?

20 year-old Steele, born in Springhead in 1891 - which was then part of Saddleworth in the West Riding of Yorkshire - had had enough of being a bobbin winder in the cotton industry and decided

instead on a military career. Being of parents of Scottish descent he enlisted with the Seaforth Highlanders and was almost immediately dispatched to serve in India.

Following the outbreak of the First World War, Steele. now a sergeant, fought against the Turks in Mesopotamia (modern day Iraq), an inhospitable land that was part of the ramshackle Turkish Empire.

Under the command of the legendary General Townsend the 6th Indian Division was given the task of securing the British owned Mesopotamian oil fields. In what has been described as one of the most mismanaged and ham-fisted campaigns of the war Townsend's Anglo-Indian army, having secured a string of easy victories, and in order to secure a major propaganda coup, were ordered to capture Baghdad. The strength of the Turks was underestimated and Townsend's army came under siege in the town of Kut-al-Amera. Two Indian divisions were dispatched from Egypt, Steele amongst them. They made three unsuccessful attempts to break-out Townsend's stricken army. culminating in the order to surrender the town. resulting in 13,000 British and Indian men falling into Turkish hands.

It was some 10 months later that Steele won his VC. Whilst attempting to re-take Kut-al-Amera he rallied troops who were wavering, kept a machine gun in action until relief arrived, and later led his troops forward resulting in him receiving serious injuries.

The British re-entered the town.

He returned to Springhead in 1919 and in the early 20's played rugby league in the three-quarters for Healey St Adults, a long forgotten Oldham amateur team that just before and immediately after the war dominated the local scene, including appearing in several Standard Cup finals. Thanks to the Rugby League's player registration records, the investigative work of rugby league author Graham Morris, it's been proven that he also played in both Broughton Rangers' first and second teams in 1922. Did he ever attract the eye of the Oldham club, one wonders? Who knows? If you take as an example the 1920-21 season Oldham finished top of the league. Broughton were in the bottom half, the Roughyeds were due to start a

run that would see them appear in four consecutive Challenge Cup finals and had a top-drawer backline. A good number of quality amateur players were at that time forced to take the pro-ticket out-of-town.

Whilst it's been possible to prove that Thomas Steele played rugby league after the war it's been impossible to pinpoint if he played before it started. So, it can't be said that Steele was a rugby league player who won the Victoria Cross but it can certainly be said that here was a VC winner who played rugby

An article surrounding Steele recently appeared in RL Weekly resulting in a third rugby league VC winner being thrown up; Thomas Bryan who played for the Castleford club back in 1905 prior to them entering the league.

Information. The Victoria Cross was instituted by the royal warrant of Queen Victoria towards the end of the Crimea War in 1856. It could not be awarded posthumously until 1907 when Edward V11 revised the warrant, 1,354 medals have been awarded. Two Oldhamers. John Hogan and Walter Mills along with Ernest Sykes of Mossley and Joel Halliwell of Middleton have also been awarded the Victoria Cross. Another, George Stringer who was born in Newton Heath died in Oldham.

Don Yates looks back to February 19th vestervear Halifax visit Boundary Park this afternoon exactly forty years after Oldham made the reverse journey, visiting the old Thrum Hall ground on Saturday 19th February 1966. In those days Halifax had a powerful Way back on Saturday 19th February team, they were reigning League Champions, and the Roughyeds gave a good account of themselves before slipping to a 17-11 defeat. The home side

Last week Oldham began their Northern Rail Cup campaign with a trip to Rochdale where they came up against their former player Darren Abram, now head coach at Spotland. It was thirteen years ago, on Friday 19th February 1993, that Oldham signed the free-scoring centre three-quarter. He was actually signed from Rochdale Hornets and went on to make 127 appearances for the Roughyeds during the following four years. Abram scored 64 tries and eleven goals for Oldham before moving on to Lancashire Lynx in December 1997.

It was on this day in 1989, Sunday 19th February, that Oldham entertained Hull in a First Division match at Watersheddings. Oldham won a close encounter 9-7 with a try from hooker Andy Ruane, two goals from full-back Duncan Platt and a dropped goal from stand-off Chris O'Sullivan. Making his debut for the Roughyeds in that match was looseforward John Cogger who had been signed from Runcorn Highfield the previous Monday for £12,000. Although not big in stature, Cogger was immense in every other sense and his influence on the team was exceptional. An Australian who played first grade with the Western Suburbs club in Sydney, Cogger made 62 appearances for Oldham during his two years at Watersheddings and scored 31 tries.

1898 Swinton visited Watersheddings for a match in the Lancashire Senior Competition. Oldham won that competition and, in so doing, lost only two matches. One was against Swinton the previous October so the Roughveds were seeking revenge when the Lions came to Oldham, who, at that time. played in the Clarksfield district of town. The Roughveds won 16-2 with tries from winger Tom Martin, centre Ike Taylor. stand-off Joe Lawton and forward Bob Edwards together with a couple of goals from centre Sam Lees. That defeat was the heaviest suffered by Swinton since they had joined the professional code two years previously. They did not suffer a heavier defeat for another couple of years, until losing again in Oldham, this time by 17-2.

The first overseas touring team to visit Britain were the New Zealand 'All Golds' of season 1907-08. At the conclusion of that tour several players were targeted by English clubs. Two of the better players who turned professional were Lance Todd, who joined Wigan, and George Smith, who signed for Oldham. It was on Wednesday 19th February 1908 that the pair made their debuts against each other before a crowd of 25,000 at Central Park. Oldham won that match 7-3 with Smith on the right wing opposing Todd who occupied the Wigan left wing berth. Both enjoyed considerable success in the British game. Smith made 173 appearances for the Roughyeds and scored 100 tries and five goals. He was a member of Oldham teams that won the League Championship twice as well as the Lancashire Cup. Both have perpetual trophies named after them. The G.W.Smith Medal is awarded to the manof-the-series in each Great Britain v. New Zealand test series and the Lance Todd Trophy is awarded to the man-of-thematch in the Challenge Cup Final.



chamber's Choice


IN a squad full of fresh young players, many of whom are yet to cut their teeth in the professional game, it wasn't much of a surprise when coach John Pendlebury named wise old head Alan Hadcroft as the man to lead Oldham forward this season.

With experience galore at National League One level, having spent seven years at Leigh and two at Halifax either side of a brief spell in Australia with Wests, the new Roughyeds captain knows exactly what is needed at this level.

Pendlebury, an ex-Halifax coach himself, has spoken about the centre "leading by example" – and if that comes to fruition, supporters can expect to see plenty of hard-working, tough-tackling, dynamic Roughyeds performances this season.

Hadcroft, 28, who signed a one-year deal back in November year despite interest from Rochdale, Batley and Whitehaven, takes over in the role of captain from Gareth Barber amid strong competition for the role from the likes of Barber himself, club captain John Hough and last year's vice-captain Simon Svabic.

Pendlebury, though, preferred to opt for the Leigh-born man in order to bring a fresh impetus to a new-look team.

"Alan leads by example, which is one of the main credentials I was looking for," Pendlebury explained. "He's very positive in

his outlook, which I consider to be important too

"He's also a player who, like Chris Percival and Andy Bailey, has experienced winning rugby at this level, having played for Leigh in a Grand Final."

With Gary Mercer having used three captains last year, Svabic and Ricky Bibey being the other two, Pendlebury opted to wipe the slate clean and start again – an understandable, move considering that 13 of the 23-strong squad didn't pull on a Roughyeds shirt last season.

It could have been a different story for the centre, who made 17 appearances for today's opponents in 2005, helping his side to the National League One Final Eliminator play-offs under the guidance of Anthony Farrell.

Having signed a contract for one year with the option of an additional 12 months, Hadcroft was joining a club that had made significant moves for the player in both the previous two seasons.

"He has a lot of experience at this level, and we see him as a ready-made replacement for Jon Goddard," explained Roughyeds chairman Chris Hamilton. "We tried to sign him before he left Leigh for Halifax and we wanted him again

last year but he chose to take up a second-year option at The Shay.

"Now, we've got him at the third time of asking." Hadcroft runs a business with another ex-Halifax man, full-back Craig Dean, and played alongside fellow winter signing Wayne Corcoran at The Shay last season.

However, his decision to return over to this side of the Pennines was influenced largely by the Oldham chairman.

Mr Hamilton knows the player well. In 2002 Hadcroft, who was named as Leigh's player of the season that year, played in a National League representative team which took on New Zealand 'A' at Hilton Park – under the managerial guidance of the Oldham chairman.

The experience seems to have had a lasting, positive impact, at least as far as Oldham are concerned.

"I've got to know Chris well over the past few years and I've got a lot of time for him," said Hadcroft.

"I didn't sign for Oldham when they talked to me previously because I was younger, there was more money in the game and I was chasing it. This time I'm older and a bit wiser and I have not gone for the money." Which, for a club as cash-strapped as Oldham, is music to the ears.

iournalistic Icense

WHILE the adverse weather conditions of the past week meant that Oldham had to wait a little longer than expected to get the season started, there was enough rugby league action away from Spotland to satisfy even the most action-starved fan.

Super League XI kicked off in real style, putting to bed the disappointingly one-sided World Club Challenge of the previous week.

Wakefield took world champions (or. more accurately. World Club Challenge winners) Bradford all the way with a gutsy display at Belle Vue, Leeds squeezed past a Huddersfield side bolstered by the presence of rugby league legend Robbie Paul, and Salford caused something of a stir by turning over highly-fancied Warrington at the Halliwell Jones Stadium.

And of course, Les Catalans Dragons spectacularly defeated the (once) mighty Wigan, thanks in no small part to the wizardry of Kiwi Stacey Jones.

It's a season that promises much. where nothing can be safely taken for granted.

That applies equally to National League One. The bookies have Roughyeds marked down as prime relegation fodder this season.

At least, that's what is indicated by the 66-1 odds to win the Northern Rail Cup that favours the likes of Celtic Crusaders and Workington over John Pendlebury's men.

But given that the season is still in its embryonic stage, there's nothing wrong with breathing in that wind of optimism now sweeping across the channel from its origins in the south of France.

Many of the new boys in the Roughyeds squad looked impressive in pre-season. The Corcoran brothers, Ged and Wayne, stand out with their willingness to battle away effectively in a variety of positions: Lee Wingfield looks like a powerful runner in the second row, as does Andy Bailey; and Craig Dean, out of the game for three of years, looked like he'd never been away with a nonchalant performance at full-back against Leeds.

Add to that the experience and power of the returning Danny Guest, the try-scoring power of Chris Percival and the know-how of new captain Alan Hadcroft, who has played at this level all his career, and

difficult to make a case for Oldham at the very least avoiding relegation, despite the decimation of last year's squad in the winter.

Barrie McDermott, who opted against joining Pendlebury's guiet revolution in favour of Widnes, has gone a couple of steps further by predicting a Vikings v Roughveds Grand Final (albeit with tongue at least half-inserted into cheek).

Then again, after the events of last weekend, who knows? If Oldham's enthusiastic young squad don't make it there, it won't be for lack of

NATIONAL LEAGUE TALK

A STEAMING START!

THE Northern Rail Cup defied a miserable weekend on the weather front to kick off in promising style.

A host of bumper crowds watched some tense tussles. as most teams were forced to battle against the wind and rain for their opening fixtures.

That was no more relevant than at Widnes, where almost 4,000 saw the competition favourites grind out a tough 18-10 win over NL2 side Swinton Lions.

Vastly experienced prop Terry O'Connor led the Vikings from the front in a game that was still locked at 0-0 at half-time.

There was a similarly low scoring contest in West Cumbria, where Whitehaven battled past local rivals Workington to win 10-0 at the Recreation Ground in front of an attendance of 4,010.

And almost 3,000 saw York City Knights begin their season at a higher level with a 2-32 home loss to Hull Kingston Rovers.

The Knights' chances of victory were hampered severely by the fifth minute dismissal of former Robins prop Jamie Bovill, who was red carded for a high tackle.

Two of the most head turning results came at Gateshead and Featherstone, where Barrow and Sheffield respectively recorded impressive away wins.

A preciously young Barrow side started life under new coach Paul Crarey with a superb win 47-24 win at the Thunderdome, while the Eagles' more experienced charges also made it a dream beginning for Gary Wilkinson by winning 38-18 at their NL2 rivals.

There was also a great debut for Welsh newcomers Celtic Crusaders. Local winger Paul Morgan was among the top performers in a 50-10 win at Hemel Hempstead. In the same group, London Skolars earned a hard-fought opening victory at St Albans Centurions.

Elsewhere, Dewsbury Rams prevailed in the Heavy Woollen derby against Batley, with two Francis Maloney tries helping them to a 25-18 win.

Leigh started life back in the National Leagues with a 36-6 triumph at Blackpool on Friday night, while two tries from Craig Lawton helped the newly titled Doncaster Lakers to a 44-26 win against Hunslet.

Halifax beat Keighley 38-10 with winger James Haley scoring twice in his 50th consecutive appearance. while the Rochdale versus Oldham game was postponed and due to be played in midweek.

The second round of fixtures throws up some equally intriguing clashes. The biggest clash is undoubtedly at Leigh, where the Centurions host Widnes in a match that will give the first indication of their respective strengths.

London Skolars host Celtic Crusaders, while Batley Bulldogs take on Doncaster and Oldham face Halifax. The scene looks set for some more terrific matches.
