

Welcome

Good afternoon and welcome to the Halton Stadium for this LHF National League One clash with Oldham.

Last weekend's victory over Whitehaven saw a marked improvement in the team's defence from the previous week at Batley. The two points gained against one of our promotion rivals was a great way to start the second half of the season and with performances improving week on week we should be looking forward to the play-offs and the challenges they will bring. Damien Blanch was impressive on his debut and with Jordan James and Oliver Wilkes committing to the Club for the remainder of the season we are certainly strengthening the squad and giving ourselves every opportunity to achieve our goal of Super League in 2007. It was good to see the Senior Academy playing a curtain-raiser last weekend and the Stadium groundstaff were delighted with the performance of the pitch. After today we have away fixtures at Rochdale, Hull KR and Halifax and if we maintain our winning run I'd like to think that we'd have average crowds of 4,000 for the final three home games.

Finally, we are delighted to welcome back the players from St Gerard's Widnes and Ravensbury Community School, Manchester following their success during last week's half-time game.





I think it's fair to say that some of the confidence that has been missing around the club for much of the season is starting to return.

During the recent run of four winning games Widnes have shown themselves to be more solid performers than they had looked at the start of the season.

Last week's win against Whitehaven wasn't overly spetacular, but it got the job done and the defensive effort was significantly improved on the previous week at Batley.

Fair enough, Widnes had plenty of the ball, but in stifling conditions they didn't let their overall game drop off and the visitors only reached

double figures from a last minute interception. Defending to that sort of standard will mean the Vikings will win most games.

Sterner tests are obviously still to come, with the ultimate being away to Hull KR, but if Widnes make it five wins out of five against Oldham this afternoon then they will really set themselves up. Oldham have had a thoroughly miserable season to this point and, while I have every sympathy, I wouldn't want to see them start to reverse their fortunes today.

The Vikings need to generate as much momentum as they possibly can so that they can take advantage of any cracks appearing in the Hull KR armour.

It still promises to be an exciting race for Super League, especially when a month ago, there weren't too many offering much for Widnes's chances.

There has only been one opportunity to make an assessment, but I think Damien Blanch would have won many admirers for his efforts in his first game after joining from Castleford

I'll be the first to admit to not having seen him in action before, but he looked strong running the ball out from acting half and always threatened to break a tackle.

He made one try-saving tackle, turning a man on his back over the line, and then when his own scoring chance came, he was quick enough to win the race to the touchdown.

All in all it was a thoroughly encouraging debut.

Everyone is aware of how important it is to get into Super League, but the performances of the Widnes Academy sides would seem to highlight the fact even more.

In the younger age group, particularly, Widnes have had a fantastic season so far and obviously have a really good crop of young players. Now you can never say for definite how many will genuinely progress to become established first team players, but the club would obviously want

to be taking advantage of this generation in years to come.
That might not be so easy, however, if a lenghty spell in the National League looks on the cards. Player development was set back when Widnes were last out of the top flight, and

having done a terrific job to reestablish the strength of the Academy set-up it would be sorely disappointing to see it affected by the Vikings' league status.

It was interesting to see Stephen Vaughan's comments about the revenue coming in through the gate on match days, especially given the fact that many of those attending regularly have already paid in the form of a season ticket. I thought the crowds for the last two home matches were slightly disappointing and while Widnes didn't set the world alight at the start of the season, you would hope that the recent run of form might start bringing a few more spectators back to the club.

If they could get the numbers up towards 4,000 that would start to make a substantial difference. Once people get out of the habit of going - at least to all the home games - it's very difficult to get them back into it, but their support is vital to the club's future.

I know stay-aways always say give us a winning team playing good rugby and we'll come back, but the team is on a winning run, quality players have been added to the squad and things are generally looking more encouraging than they have for some time.

It's up to us all to try and get an extra person down to the game and either back in the habit of watching, or watching for the first time. Their support, and ours, could be crucial to the club's future.


Top Gun


Oldham have struggled all season but in Gareth Barber they have a player with the ability to open up opposition defences.

The talented utility back has enjoyed success in the halves and at centre but is currently playing at full back where he is an exciting attacking threat.

Oldham born but a Warrington junior, Barber joined the Roughyeds in 2000 and has been an important player for the club ever since. In 2001 he earned selection in the National League under 21s side.

This year Barber has scored five tries and kicked 23 goals to be Oldham's leading points scorer and is one player who could spark a survival bid.





Shooting Star

■ Desi Williams is a young player hoping to kick-start his career on loan at Oldham after once being tipped for Super League stardom.

A three-quarter with pace to burn, Londoner Williams joined Wigan after coming through the ranks at London Skolars, and he made his Super League debut in 2004 – the same year he represented England Academy on their southern hemisphere tour.

He made just two appearances in the Wigan first team though and left for Hull KR at the end of last season. But with Rovers boasting such a strong squad Williams has been loaned out, first to Barrow, and now to Oldham where he will spend the rest of the season.

Still a youngster at just 20 years old, Williams' potential remains and Oldham will be looking to unlock his promise in the coming months.

■ Steve Deakin was supposed to be spending 2006 leading Catalans Dragons into Super League. Instead he's facing the very different challenge of turning around the fortunes of his home town club. Deakin was a shock Super League casualty before the season had even begun, but a new opportunity soon arose when John Pendlebury vacated the Oldham hotseat.

Deakin brings vast experience to the role having spent nearly a quarter of a century in coaching at a host of different clubs. Notably he has worked in Super League as assistant coach at London Broncos and Sheffield Eagles.

As a head coach he has enjoyed success at Keighley Cougars and in France with Cannes and UTC. His Super League chance never came across the channel but he may just get equal satisfaction from the challenge of rejuvenating his home town club.

Unsung Hero


■ John Hough has seen all the highs and lows of life at Oldham Rugby League Club since becoming the reformed club's first signing back in 1997.

The hard working hooker helped guide the new club through a difficult first year and eventually into one of the division's top sides by 2001. A signing from Warrington, he featured briefly in Super League making 9 appearances in '96 and '97. Now in his ninth season at the club, 30 year old Hough has made over 200 appearances for the Roughyeds. That experience combined with his work ethic and organisation make him a key figure in the club's relegation battle

Tough Nut

Phil Farrell is set to make his second debut for Oldham today after re-joining the club last week. The tough back rower was a popular player during his first spell with the club and will add experience and quality to a young pack. Farrell first joined Oldham from the Wigan academy in 2000 and was a key member of their Grand Final team the following year with his performances earning him selection in the division's all star team.

He continued to be one of Oldham's top performers before leaving the club for rivals Rochdale at the end of 2004. Perhaps his finest moments have come with the Oldham club though and his return provides a timely boost for the Roughyeds.



There's a lesson there I think.







How many times in recent years would a Leeds versus Bradford game have been kicked off the Friday night telly for a Wigan-Wakefield clash?

Or indeed for any kind of a relegation dogfight - and especially with nine games still to play?

Wigan fans are angst-ridden about the amount of gleeful shin kicking they've been getting from the wider Super League fan community this season. They shouldn't - it's a compliment guys. That makes you the rugby league equivalent of Manchester United. Ask an Elland Roader his two favourite teams and he'll say "Leeds United and whoever's playing Man U". And they're not even in the same division!

It just happens that the most successful rugby league club of the past 25 years (if not the last 10) has been the first of the 'big four' to be drawn into a buttock clenching relegation battle. It sure concentrates the mind, doesn't it lads? Imagine Bradford finding themselves in the same mire. Leeds fans wouldn't wet themselves through a fit of giggles, no? Wigan supporters would generously have a whip round to pay for stress counsellors on the terraces at Knowsley Road, were the situation reversed? Yeah,

The ebb and flow of form and results has created the most fascinating engage Super League campaign yet, and no side has been immune. As the rounds tick down, it is clear that the season's critical outcomes could be decided by a club's sick-list more than ever.

The leaders have the strength in depth to survive Paul Sculthorpe's loss, Hull have barely noticed Kirk Yeaman's absence, but Huddersfield and Warrington ought to switch training sessions to the car park of the local infirmary for convenience. And Salford, thinner than

most for depth, suffered two hammer blows on Sunday to Andrew Dunemann and Simon Finnigan. The latter two have enough points in the bag for safety,

but the Giants, with a Challenge Cup semi final looming as well, can be forgiven for looking over their shoulders and hoping to see either Florence Nightingale or John Wayne and a troop of 7th cavalry on the horizon, before Wigan, Harlequins and Wakefield appear. Fascinating stuff, and vindication, if any were needed, of the Salary Cap. A few months ago the RFL's finance director, Nigel Wood, took time to show me exactly how clubs had 'performed' in terms of budgets against the Salary Cap, compared to just a few years ago. It showed a real levelling of the financial playing field - and was before anyone was predicting Wigan for anything other than a top four placing. We're now seeing that development mirrored out on the actual playing field and with talented players 'trickling down' to the LHF National League 1, surely the

game as a whole is feeling the benefits.

Vince Karalius

A Rugby League Legend

Maurice Bamford



Former Great Britain Rugby League coach, Maurice Bamford, tells the story of one his heroes from the game: Vince Karalius.

Maurice relates how young Vince signed for the great St Helens club in 1952 and quickly carved out a reputation as one of the toughest and most skilful forwards in the game, winning many trophies

with the team, including the Challenge Cup in 1956 and 1961 (as captain). Selected for the 1958 tour down-under, he established himself as the scourge of the Australians and earned the nickname from the Aussie press: 'the Wild Bull of the Pampas'.

Moving on to his home town club, Widnes, Vince captained the team to victory in the Challenge Cup in 1964. Then returning as coach in 1972, he steered the club to the Lancashire Cup and the Challenge Cup in 1975 and developed a skilful, athletic team that earned the title 'Cup Kings' over the next decade. After a sojourn coaching the mighty Wigan, Vince returned once more to Widnes and again guided the club to Wembley glory in 1984.

In 2000, Vince Karalius became one of the few players inducted into the Rugby League Hall of Fame in recognition of his awesome ability on the pitch and his technical and tactical 'nous' as a coach. Maurice Bamford captures the essence and character of this tremendous hero in Vince Karalius: A Rugby League Legend.

Widnes v Oldham, 2 February 1963

This game in early February has gone down in Widnes history, but not for the reasons anticipated by the programme editor in the following set of notes!

"Would you believe it! The last RL. game played at Naughton Park was way back in December - the 22nd to be exact - when Widnes beat Wigan by 14 pts to two. We managed to get in that fixture when three other games in the first division end two in the second were called off. Today we are keeping our fingers crossed hoping that the pitch will be fit for play. Never in the history of the club has so much time trouble and expense gone

than ever in an effort to fulfill the fixture with Oldham and we think that we may be one of the few clubs who are able to play this afternoon.

Following successful experiments on the turf near the touchline your officials decided to go ahead with the chemical treatment, an idea which comes from a local company. The chemical is said to be non-injurious to the grass, and any apparent rough treatment to the turf occurred during the massive ice removal operation. If the scheme works well Widnes club will again have given a lead to the Rugby League. We felt that an all-out effort should be made this week to give our players

The game did go ahead, Widnes winning 3-0 to boost our title hopes, but the 'wonder chemical' famously turned the playing surface into a sticky mess for months afterwards! More bad weather delayed the Swinton cup game for another month...we only won through that tie after a second replay, all three matches (plus a league game v Hull) being played in the space of eight days. Subsequently we went out of the cup at the quarter-final stage against Hull KR and then Swinton pipped us for the Championship with a superb late run of form.

Peter Sellers (pictured), Lionel Jeffries and Bernard Cribbins starred in the crime comedy The Wrong Arm of the Law and Sellars also appeared in the Boulting Brothers satire Heavens Above. There were Oscar nominations for Richard Harris and Rachel Roberts in the Rugby

League drama This Sporting Life. The role of the ageing talent scout was played by William Hartnell and this appearance led directly to him being offered his part in Doctor Who.





Stephen talks to lan Cheveau

Vikings owner Stephen Vaughan says he is determined to take the club forward after last weeks board reshuffle and he reckons fans can play a major role in that process.

Last week the club parted with exchairman Tony Chambers, financial director Tom Fleet and directors Alan Gregson and Graham Ashton after Vaughan's acquistition of the majority shareholding. A club statement claimed the directors all stepped down as the board felt the time had come to reduce in numbers and for the new chairman to be seen in full control. Vaughan joined the Vikings board at the turn of the year with a view of taking over the club in time.

But that was accelerated at the start of the season and after uncovering huge debts of more than £3000,000 and he is now urging the fans to come out in force for the remaining Vikings home fixtures.

He and head coach Steve McCormack are hoping the Vikings can boost their 3,000 home gate by at least another thousand in a bid to make the club profitable once more

One of the debts included a fee to Halton Borough Council which has just been paid for usage of the stadium and if the Vikings can't increase their crowd to more than 3,000 then Vaughan claims more money will be going down the drain.

He said: "I am appealing for our supporters to get in in their numbers because any crowd less than 3,000 means the club makes nothing whatsoever.

"We will take this club forward - we have to. The board will prop the club up financially and make up any shortfalls, but we would like to see more fans packed into the stadium which would help us out a lot with sorting the debt out.

"The figures are all in black and white and all this has been discussed and

documented in minutes. I have nothing to hide and there is no hidden agenda with me. I want the club to be returned to-the fans not individuals." Meanwhile Vaughan would like to

thank parting directors Alan Gregson and Graham Ashton for their contribution to the club since he took over the reigns from Tony Chambers.

He said: "I'd like to thank for their contribution they have put in over the last months I have been involved with them." McCormack claims he is playing his part in sorting the finances out by making sure the Vikings win on the field.

He said: "Players have left the club and the coaching staff has tried to reduce salary-cap money.

The fans have been particularly supportive over the past few games.

We need even more of that and it helps towards the performance. The crowd want us to win games and we are doing that and want to stay that way."

Challenge Cup Final - 2nd May 1981 Widnes 18-9 Hull KR

The 1981 final was the second time the Chemics had tasted final success over the Robins, the first coming in 1964. Widnes nerves were settled early as Mick Burke caught his own kick through to score the opening try and Widnes never looked back. The black and whites led 11-4 at the break and Andy Gregory's quick try after half time

sealed the win. In front of a crowd of 92,496 Widnes collected their sixth Challenge Cup trophy.

WE'RE NOT WORTHY

A Rovers Legend Roger 'The Dodger' Millward Roger Millward was one of the genuine greats of English Rugby League from the mid-1960s up until the early 1980s. He was a superb player with Hull KR and Great Britain, as well as having a memorable guest stint with the Cronulla-Sutherland Sharks in Sydney in 1976. His form in the 1970 Ashes series between Australia and Great Britain was nothing short of magnificent. Millward joined Hull KR in 1967 helping to steer the club to its championship success in 1979 and then their famous victory over rivals Hull at Wembley in 1980. Millward retired in 1983 after making over 400 appearances for the club. The Dodger

collected an MBE that same year for his services to the sport. Not only is Millward the most successful Rovers player of all time but he is also their most successful coach.

WHAT'S THE FORM?

What a season the men from East Yorkshire are having so far. They have defeated all in their path on route to the top of National League One and the Semi Finals of the Challenge Cup. Their

win at the Halton Stadium in May by 42-28 cemented their place at the top and convinced many fans that their team could gain that elusive Super League spot. Last week's win over Batley was their 10th consecutive in the league.


