

ONLY two games into the Co-Operative National League Two campaign and I have to say things are going okay. It is too early - far too early --- to start over emphasising what we have achieved, or how well we have played, although I was highly satisfied with our performances against Featherstone and Blackpool.

On the Fylde RU ground last time out we scored seven tries and had a few more

disallowed for forward-pass decisions. The game was a little bit stop-start but whenever there was any fluidity we looked okay.

Another pleasing feature was that we had the man-power to rest one or two of the forwards who have shouldered a lot of the heavy work work for us so far this year --- players such as Jason Boults, Simeon Hoyle, Ian Sinfield and Wes Rogers --- and bring in Geno Costin after six weeks on the sidelines with shoulder trouble, give a debut to Tony Tonks and call on John Hough for the first time this season now that he has fully recovered from his toe injury.

Lucas Onyango also got his first run-out for us on the wing and it was pleasing for him that he should mark his debut by scoring one try and preventing another when he turned and caught Phil Cantillon with a try-saving tackle.

In some respects it was disappointing that we didn't have a game last weekend to keep the momentum going, but on the other hand we have a real demanding few weeks coming up with Keighley today, Celtic Cruasaders away next Friday night, Harlequins here in the Carnegie Challenge Cup on May 13 and then Barrow Raiders here only seven days after that.

A long season stretches ahead of us and during what could well be a long, hot and extremely interesting summer of 2007 many things will remain outside our control.

What we must do is stay focused on the things we can control and continue to work hard so that we can make improvements both individually as players and collectively as a team and as a squad.

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Suffice to say I feel confident that, should we stay relatively injury free, the squad is capable of getting into the play-offs and for all those teams that make it anything can happen in the cut and thrust of one-off football.

To each and every supporter who made the effort to travel with us to Blackpool I speak on behalf of all the lads in the dressing room when I say THANK-YOU BIG STYLE.

We almost felt we were playing a home game, such was the extent of your backing. I would estimate Oldham fans outnumbered theirs three to one and that sort of support away from home makes a huge difference.

It helps players with their confidence and self-belief, and it promotes a feel-good factor generally in the club. It's a twoway street, and I feel sure that by working together we can all have a successful season.

The message from the dressing room is this: keep supporting us (I can assure you that support is really appreciated) and if possible persuade a friend or a workmate to come along and have a look at us as well. We look forward again today, and all season, to hearing you all in full voice.

### **TOWN-TEAM LADS CAN WATCH FOR FREE**

ROUGHYEDS have supplied the local Service Area with 100 free season tickets for distribution among town-team players at various age groups.

The scheme, a move designed to further foster links with the sport locally at grassroots level, kicked in when Featherstone came to Boundary Park for the opening game in the Co-Operative National League Two campaign and it will cover each of Oldham's 11 home league games.

Said Chris Hamilton, chief executive: "We would like nothing better than to see these tickets used extensively at every home league game.

"Roughyeds are delighted to show their appreciation of the excellent work the Service Area does and to give a pat on the back to the many players who have worked hard to achieve town-team recognition. It is a great honour to play for your town.

"Hopefully, we can encourage the town-team lads to watch us on a regular basis; to become interested in the club and the team; and maybe to convince them, if and when they get the opportunity to turn pro, that Oldham is a good club to sign for."

This new move follows the club's decision taken before the start of the Northern Rail Cup in February to encourage more young people to watch by cutting admission prices for under-16s to £5 for a seat anywhere in the main stand and to introduce a concessionary rate of £8 and £9 for students under the age of 18 and in full-time education.

AFTER only a handful of games in the Oldham jersey. Aussie stand-off Mark Ogden has joined Swinton Lions and he goes with the very best wishes of everyone at the Roughyeds.

Due to a problem involving overseas quota regulations the club

was forced to unload one of its three Australians and after a lot of soul-searching it was decided Mark was the one to leave, largely because Geno Costin is a forward and Drew Houston prefers back-row to centre and it was felt by coach Steve Deakin that under no circumstances could he consider weakening his forwards.

Deaks has since stated publicly that this was an awful decision to have to make; that he has the highest regard for Mark as a player and as a man; but that pack strength is of paramount importance if the club is to be successful in the tough league campaign that lies ahead.

The problem arose because Roughyeds had been led to believe that Costin would be exempt from the quota. This was subsequently discovered not to be the case.

Both Deaks and chief executive Chris Hamilton, on behalf of the board, expressed their regret at what this "unfortunate and difficult" situation meant in terms of Ogden's departure. "He has handled it with dignity -- that's the sort of bloke he is." said Deaks.

Added Mr Hamilton: "We have nothing but praise and admiration for the way Mark has conducted himself in England on and off the field, from last Boxing Day when he arrived until when all this was sorted out. He has been a credit to himself. We were only too pleased to help him as much as we could in terms of getting him fixed up elsewhere.

"He is happy with the move to Swinton. It isn't far away and it enables him to stay with his mate Geno in the house they share in Shaw. We wish Mark all the luck in the world."

Mark said: "I have no grudges. I am just happy my mate Geno can get to stay. As for the club, they have done everything possible in the situation. Chris (Hamilton) has been very good. I class him as a mate."

UNLUCKY Lee Wingfield has finally come to terms with the fact that his shattered right knee is going to keep him sidelined for many months to come. "I'm gutted," he said, "but this time I won't be coming back until I am 100 per cent fit and ready --- I don't care how long it takes."

The best wishes of everyone at the club go to the likeable and popular Leigh lad, who gets married in mid-July in Atherton. He is just hoping that if his knee is placed in a brace post-surgery he will still be able to walk down the aisle.

Lee damaged the cruciate and medial ligaments in his knee during the 42-18 Northern Rail Cup win at Swinton on Mach 25.

He said: "The incident was something and nothing -- that's what makes it all the harder to take. I stuck out my right leg to get to a loose ball. A Swinton player was trying to dive on the ball, but he ended up tackling my fully outstretched leg. That's all there was to it

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All those Giants fans calling for the head of Jon Sharp should now be writing letters of apology to the Galpharm stadium after Huddersfield have racked up four victories to lift them off the foot of the Super League table.

It never ceases to amaze me how impatient and fickle so-called fans can be: it's instant success or nothing. Well, I'm afraid sport isn't like that: it's like life itself - there are good days and there are bad days. Expect little and any win is a pleasure but take winning for granted and you soon get kicked in the teeth. Nearly all examples of sporting success point up the same moral, that continuity, planning and application will eventually bring their own reward. I have no doubt that Oldham and today's visitors, Keighley, see the wisdom of that. I have the feeling that both are planning for long term success and I hope that each can avoid the destructive effect that lowly status inevitably entails when it becomes almost impossible to prevent the loss of talented players to richer clubs waving chequebooks. Even so if the right structures are in place success eventually follows because the right structures produce a conveyor belt of talent to keep feeding an ambitious professional club. Whatever the final outcome of their season we have a magnificent example of that right here on our own doorstep in Oldham Athletic. As their motto has it " Keep the Faith".

I have no doubt Coaches know what they mean when they speak to the press but have you ever read something and had to re-read it several times over to try to make sense of it? For example, Leigh Coach Darren Shaw: "His attacking ability is second to none. He runs great lines on the edges." Just what does that second sentence mean? Doesn't everyone run in a line? And on the edges of what exactly? Or, Brian Noble on Great Britain: " If we had two decent halfbacks who could play at the line rather than through the line we would do better." Excuse me, does that mean we don't want halfbacks who can make a break ,because that's how it reads? Then, how about Castleford Coach Terry Matterson after beating Workington Town 50-24 last week: "There's not a lot for us to gain from these games to be honest.....It's hard to get up when these big scores are happening." Well, I'm sorry I thought the idea was you took the fixture and played the game to the best of your ability. St. Helens certainly do. If you don't want to play Workington, don't enter the competition. Apart from which I thought you tended to get demoralised when you lost not when you've won! Of course, it's easy to be picky because these days the Coach is expected to come up with some instant pearl of wisdom. Which leads me to question the whole ethos of modern journalism: do we really need to know what the Coach thinks a minute after the final whistle? Wouldn't it be better for the match reporter to give us his match report telling us just what happened in the game -especially useful to the reader who didn't attend but might be tempted next match - and leave the Coach to have his say a couple of days later when he's had time to reflect? Just a thought.

#### 'I TURNED MY BACK ON SOCCER TO **FOLLOW A DREAM IN RUGBY LEAGUE'**

## Richard Mervill tells of the big decision that was to shape his sporting

LIVES are often shaped by decisions taken at the proverbial cross-roads. Do I go this way? Or do I go that? Do I follow my heart? Or do I follow my head? Which path will suit me better?

Richard Mervill, the Oldham prop, had not even reached his 16th birthday when he came to that mythical junction, facing the biggest decision of his young life. In the case of sporting all-rounder Richard he had to choose between the sport into which he was born --- football ---- or the one which he adopted "purely by accident" -- rugby league.

The story of his early sporting life is a remarkable one given that, while still a pupil at Brighouse High School, he had Huddersfield Town soccer club and Halifax Blue Sox rugby league club chasing him and until a couple of years before that he had never handled a rugby ball in his life.

The youngest of three --- he has two elder sisters, Helen and Rachel --- Richard was born in Halifax on June 24, 1981

Rugby league had no place in his early boyhood. He was hooked on soccer. But though he didn't know it at the time the safe hands that enabled him to be one of the best schoolboy goalkeepers in and around Halifax and Huddersfield in the late 1980s and early 1990s would prove a more than useful ally when the day dawned on which, for the first time, he would pick up the hall and run

Soccer-mad Richard won town-team honours in Huddersfield schoolboy football at every age group and hoped he might one day become a professional.

\* Then came the incident that was to turn his sporting life on its head. Recalled Richard: "Two mates in the third year at Brighouse High played rugby league for the school. One night after school I went along to watch. Another member of the team didn't turn up and I was asked to take his place in the front-row of the pack."

The up-and-coming goalkeeper had never played rugby before: had never even handled an oval-shaped ball. But on that memorable day on a Brighouse sports field he picked up the ball and ran for the first time . . . AND SCORED FOUR TRIES!

He took to the sport immediately and was soon devoting every Sunday to sport --- rugby in the mornings, football in the afternoons.

Let Richard take up the story. "I kept my interest in football, but my love of rugby was growing all the time. "Then, three months before my 16th birthday, Huddersfield Town got in touch and offered me a goalkeeping apprenticeship and while I was still

thinking about that the Blue Sox came in with the offer a full-time rugby league apprenticeship with them."

Richard, still a schoolboy, stood at the crossroads; weighed up both routes; and chose to take the path into rugby league.

"It wasn't an easy decision," he said, "and I sought advice. But in the end I opted for the Blue Sox because I thought there was perhaps a better chance of my succeeding in rugby league than in a huge sport like

His sporting destiny decided, Richard signed for Fax in the summer of 1997 at the age of 16 and spent the next two years there, learning his trade in academy rugby and then adding to his experience with a four-month spell on loan with French club Tonniens, situated not far

Aged 19, he got an offer to extend his full-time stay at Fax "for next to nothing" but with first-team rugby in mind he opted instead to spend a year up in the North-East with Gateshead. It was the season which started in December, 2000 and ran to the late summer of 2001. well remembered by Roughyeds fans, of course, because it was the year the club reached the Grand Final only to be beaten by Widnes.

In a 19-club Northern Ford Premiership, Oldham launched their Grand Final bid from fourth spot, while Gateshead finished third from bottom with only two wins from 28 games.

It was a tough year for rookie prop Mervill who, at the age of 20, got the wanderlust and headed for Australia with his Gateshead team mate Wes McGibbon. They played for Grafton Ghosts, a club situated near Byron Bay in northern New South Wales and coached by a man who was to play a significant role in Richard's career progress, Dean Callaway.

Returning to England in time for the 2003 season, Mervill signed for Keighley Cougars, mainly because the Cougars coach at that time, Gary Moorby, had coached him previously in the second team at Halifax. It proved to be a good decision. The summer of 2003 was a good one for Cougars, who finished third in division two and went on to beat Sheffield Eagles in the Grand Final with a team that included Mervill and his current Roughyeds team mates Simeon Hoyle, lan Sinfield and Paul Ashton.

Richard was to tough it out at Cougar Park for two more seasons --- Cougars were relegated again in 2004 --before again getting itchy feet and heading off for a second trip to Australia at the end of the 2005 English

By this time the coach with whom he had enjoyed a divisional championship win in Grafton four years earlier. Dean Callaway, had moved south to the Wollongong area to join Dapto in the Illawarra competition -- recognised as the third or fourth strongest in the whole of Australia.

Richard was delighted to get the chance to link up once more with Callaway, and it was at Dapto also that he first met his now firm friend and fellow Roughved. Drew

The lad from Calderdale settled easily into the Aussie lifestyle and he had a couple of willing helpers in Drew and his brother Chris (now a St George Illawarra player in the NRL) with whom he shared a house.

Mervill and Drew Houston helped Dapto to win the title and in so doing formed a lasting friendship which led to Drew accompanying Richard back to England early this

Said Richard: "When we knew we were coming over here, I spoke to a lot of my mates in rugby league in England and one of them was Simeon Hoyle. He said he had signed for Oldham and things were looking good.

"Drew and I were left with the same impression when we spoke to the club and to Deaks (coach Steve Deakin). The club had signed some good players and everyone seemed very ambitious. So we signed, and we're glad we

"Results were a bit ordinary at the start of the season, but with so many new players in the squad that was to be expected. Apart from anything else, we had to get used to the systems Deaks wanted to put in place and we had to learn how to play to them.


"We've made big strides forwards in recent weeks, but we are still nowhere near to fulfilling our potential. We still have a lot of progress to make, but we are all confident we will make it. We are improving all the time, and the club have been signing new players who are also keen to do well so the future is full of promise.

"Promotion has to be the ultimate goal, but it's going to be a hugely competitive division. Some clubs, like Celtic Crusaders, Featherstone and Barrow, are throwing a load of money at it. We have to live with that and endeavour to be up there with them as one of the strongest teams in the

"We must also aim to hit the business end of the season running and in the sort of form that will stand us in good stead to face up to whatever the competition throws at

Away from rugby, 25-year-old Richard likes nothing better than to relax with his partner Danielle when he isn't training or playing and when he gets time off from his full-time

He works in Halifax at a pupil reference centre, helping to shape the young lives of 14 to 16-year-olds who have run into problems and who have been excluded from mainstream education --- a rewarding and satisfying job for a man who knows what it's like to stand at the crossroads as a teenager faced with a life-shaping

#### Oldham win back Cup again after 23 years SAINTS' PACK BEATEN AT OWN GAME

OLDHAM 2 - 2 - 10, ST. HELENS 0 - 1- 3

Remember the names Jackson, Keith, Vines, Little, Winslade and Turner, for they will go into rugby history books as the combination of forwards who played the greatest part in bringing the Lancashire Cup back to Oldham after a 23 year absence. In the bashing, crashing second half at Wigan on Saturday, the Oldham six not only kept the team's lead intact, but (apart from one spell) completely overwhelmed the St. Helens pack

bullocking tactics were the order of the day they were again a shade better than the Saints,

Oldham forwards were. In the first half they gave a classic display of fast moving attacking play, and in the second, they showed that if Dick Cracknell and John Etty. during this period turned in some fine attacking displays and on a couple of occasions were unlucky not to score tries.



- Oldham scored 214 tries and kicked 217 goals during the campaign. The left flank partnership of Dennis Avres and John Etty, between them, scored a remarkable 70 tries.

- Frank Pitchford, Jack Keith (hooker) and Derek Turner (loose-forward) played for the Rugby League 13 against the Australians at Leigh.
- . Great Britain won the Ashes by two Tests to one. Alan Davies played in all three and Derek Turner in the second and third. Davies took on the unusual role (for him) of goal kicker in the third and deciding Test at
- · The Lions also played a three match international series against the French. Derek Turner and Sid Little played in all three matches - two of which were won by Great Britain - with one (played in Toulouse) drawn.
- Roughyeds' prop-forward Ken Jackson played for the Rest of the League vs. Great Britain.
- · Alan Davies, Sid Little and Derek Turner after a gruelling season then played in the World Cup series in Australia which was won by the Kangaroos. Little played in 58 matches that season and Turner 56!
- Biggest disappointment, Oldham, Challenge Cup favourites, lost 5-0 in atrocious conditions away to Leigh the only trophy to elude the Roughyeds during this fabulous season.

# THE MEN WHO CARRY ROUGHYEDS' HOPES AND AMBITIONS INTO 2007

ASHTON, Paul (half-back): Aged 27, Paul learned his trade at Saddleworth before playing for Halifax, Rochdale, Keighley and Swinton. Got his big chance at Oldham in 2006, initially on a week-to-week basis, and did enough to earn a full contract for 2007. Can play at scrum-half or stand-off.

BAINES, Chris (back-row): A young forward who also did enough for coach Steve Deakin last year, while on loan from Warrington, to win a contract for the latter part of 2006 and then for 2007. Toured New Zealand with Great Britain Young Lions in 2003. Product of Chorley Panthers and Wigan St Pat's.

BOULTS, Jason (prop): One of many new boys in the Roughyeds squad for 2007, 23-year-old Jason arrived on the recommendation of two of his former Halifax team mates, Jamie Bloem and Alan Hadcroft. Spent four years as a young pro with Bradford and then had two seasons at The Shay, missing only a handful of games.

COSTIN, Geno (prop or back-row): A 22-yearold Aussie, Geno first established himself in the Queensland Cup with Wynnum-Manly, but last year played in the same comp for Logan Souths. A rugby workaholic, he puts in overtime on defence and, in possession, always runs strong and straight.

CRABTREE, Andy (hooker): Won Great Britain academy honours in his Wigan Warriors days. Came from Swinton this year. A tidy footballer with good hands and game awareness, he can also play loose-forward. Alert and alive at dummy half.

GOREY, Andy (winger): A scrum-half in his Royton Tigers days, Andy became a good full-back in the former Roughyeds academy side. It was as a winger, however, that he finished 2006 as the club's top try scorer with ten --- no mean feat in a losing side.

HADCROFT, Alan (centre): A robust middle back, 29-year-old Alan signed from Halifax for the 2006 season, but his campaign was marred by a series of shoulder injuries, notably at Barrow and Whitehaven. Future as a player in some doubt, but highly regarded as coach Steve Deakin's acting No 2.

HODSON, Ian (back-row): Initially rejected new offer for 2007 due to work commitments, but the Roughyeds door remained open and he re-signed in March after playing the odd game or two for Tyldesley RU Club. One of the club's better performers in 2006, he always gave maximum input, even when asked to play at stand-off.

HOUGH, John (hooker): First player to sign for the 'new' Roughyeds club. Still here nearly ten years later --- that's loyalty with a capital L. Joined Warrington from Waterhead as a boy, but carved himself a niche in the annals of the new Oldham club when he signed as a free agent on December 2, 1997. Has played more than 230 games.

HOUSTON, Drew (second-row or centre): Once a youngster linked with Melbourne Storm, Drew had two seasons in the Queensland Cup with Storm feeder club Brisbane Norths before heading south to join Dapto whom he helped to become champions of the Illawarra competition last year.

HOYLE, Simeon (hooker): Formerly with Keighley and Haifax, Simeon is a hooker of the old school --tough in defence yet able to make things happen from dummy half. Helped Keighley to win promotion in 2003 in the same team as Paul Ashton, Richard Mervill and lan Sinfield.

LANGLEY, Gareth (winger): Pacy, and a good finisher, 'Gaz' joined Roughyeds this year after five years at St Helens. He was Saints academy player of the year in 2005 and runner-up in 2006. Played at Salford as a teenager before joining his hometown club at Knowsley Road.

LITTLER, Craig (centre): Another Saints old boy, Craig was Langley's centre for four years at Knowsley Road. A year younger, he had the chance of another year with St Helens academy, but opted to sign for Roughyeds and continue his centre-wing partnership with Langley.

MERVILL, Richard (prop): Formerly with Halifax and Keighley, Richard joined Roughyeds for 2007 after playing Down Under in the same Dapto side as Drew Houston. Suffered a broken hand in one of his early games for Roughyeds, but goes into Co-Operative NL2 action in a good seam of form.

O'CONNOR, Paul (full-back): Signed for hometown Widnes after winning students' international honours for Ireland and for Great Britain. Looked good in three loan games for Roughyeds in 2006 and returned on a more permanent basis in 2007, although he will be away for 14 weeks on a prearranged trip Down Under.

OLDHAM, Stuart (winger): Formerly with St Helens and Swinton, Stuart played his first serious rugby with Sedgley Park and Liverpool St Helens RU clubs before switching codes to join Saints. Had two seasons with Swinton and became one of six Lions to sign for Roughyeds for 2007.

ONYANGO, Lucas (winger): A real flier, aged 25, Lucas grew up in rugby union in his native Kenya. Has played for Sale Sharks, Manchester and Leigh in Union, and also Widnes Vikings in League. Did well at Vikings before damaging a knee. Over that now and keen to make the most of his chance at Oldham.

RODEN, Neil (half-back): Neil rejoined Roughyeds from Leigh for 2007 after leaving the club initially to go to Batley in 2004. In his first stint here he scored 290 points (68 tries and 18 drop goals) in 142 games over four and a half seasons. Has overtaken Mark Sibson as the 'new' club's leading all-time try scorer.

ROGERS, Wes (prop): Aged 29, and club captain. Like Neil Roden and lan Sinfield, has rejoined Roughyeds for a second spell. Signed for Widnes as a 15-year-old, then had three years at Swinton, one here, three at Rochdale and three more at Swinton before coming "home" for 2007.

SANDERSON, Lee (halfback, hooker): Signed in March after a difficult period with Barrow. Roughyeds paid an undisclosed transfer fee for the Leigh lad, whose uncle, lan, was an accomplished Oldham hooker in Watersheddings days. Lee has previously played for Leigh, London Broncos, Rochdale and Barrow.

SINFIELD, lan (back-row): Another experienced forward who has returned to his hometown club for a second stint. Brother of Leeds captain, Kevin Sinfield, lan played in the first ever Roughyeds game at Rochdale on New Year's Day, 1998. Had four years here, then moved on to Rochdale, Keighley and Swinton.

SMITH, Kris (back-row or centre): Kris, aged 28, has been on the books of four Super League clubs, namely Leeds, Salford, London and Halifax. A product of the Eccles amateur club, he was snapped up by Leeds while still a teenager. Joined Roughyeds after four seasons at Swinton.

STOUT, Michael (second-row or centre): Signed from Swinton, Michael has a good turn of speed for a forward and likes to use it while breaking wide out. Played at academy level for both Warrington and Widnes. Chose to join Oldham after rejecting a Swinton offer for 2007.

TAMGHART, Said (utility): A French international, Said has represented his country at every level, including full Test matches against Australia and New Zealand. Came under Steve Deakin's influence when both were at UTC, better known now as Perpignan-based Catalans Dragons.

TONKS, Tony (prop): Roughyeds have high hopes of the 22-year-old Yorkshireman, signed from Bradford Bulls just prior to the start of the Co-Operative NL2 season. One year at Wakefield academy, then six at Bulls as a full-time pro, including last season on loan at Doncaster.

WILKINSON, Alex (centre, wing): Played his early rugby with Royton Tigers and toured with GB schoolboys to Australia in 1999 and with England academy to New Zealand and Australia in 2001. While a young pro at Bradford Buils, he had loan spells with London Broncos, Huddersfield and Hull before going part-time with Roughyeds to continue his studies.

WINGFIELD, Lee (second-row): Played for GB at amateur level in Russia, France and Australia, but desperately unlucky with injuries since he turned pro for Roughyeds on a two-year deal covering 2006 and 2007. In top form early this year, but then broke a hand before suffering a serious knee injury against Swinton on his first game back.

What a superb Easter programme of RL we had available to us - assuming of course that one had access to Sky! [I shall not even speak about Setanta, except to say that I am currently missing hugely my weekly fix of Aussie RL!] And what was best about it, I would submit, was that it was quality, not just quantity.

Taking the four televised Super League games, Bradford v Leeds and Hull v Hull KR were good games - competitive, well-matched sides, with committed defence and some well-created tries. Bradford must still be wondering how they lost, but they were at a decent level, and Hull KR, even if they have been unable to sustain their marvellous start, still looked to me like a team which would be able to compete in Super League over the full season.

The other two games involved Wigan - and what contrasting fortunes for the pie-eaters. On Good Friday, they were simply outclassed by Saints, again. However, they then got out of jail at Leeds four days later; credit to them for resilience, certainly, but Leeds must be kicking themselves, as they should have won by at least two clear scores.

One fairly obvious lesson to come out of the games, I thought, was the need for clubs to do rather more homework before they sign overseas so-called "stars". For Leeds, if Toopi had been a solid no-nonsense ex-Leeds academy player, I am sure they would have thrashed Wigan. And Brian Noble surely cannot be very proud of being in charge of a Wigan seventeen with no fewer than NINE overseas players in it, most of them not fit to

lace the boots of such as Kenny, Miles and Ferguson of not so long ago. How can anyone defend - Mr. Lindsay? - watching players such as Aspinwall, Robinson, Melling, and shortly Ashton playing for other sides when his unbelievably loyal supporters have to put up with the mediocre offerings they get from such as Bailey, Vaealiki, Withers and Fletcher.

Back to Super League, I am delighted to see the return to winning ways of Huddersfield. After ten rounds, they have 6 points, though a positive points difference of 47, which is remarkable; in contrast, Salford, only one league point lower, have -124, and Wakefield and Wigan, in the top six, are also negative on net points aggregate. Although the "big boys" may have moved towards taking over the very top of the table, the Huddersfield case surely confirms that the overall standard is indeed more genuinely competitive than ever before; it remains the case that anyone [except maybe Salford!] can beat anyone on their day.

And what of the start of the National Leagues? It is still very early days, of course - but I would hazard a guess that our division will prove to be more closely contested than NL1. Widnes and Cas seem way out in front, with only Whitehaven, thank goodness, as realistic challengers. Whereas NL2 seems likely to be much less predictable. We shall see!

#### SUPER LEAGUE STARS TO GRACE BOUNDARY PARK

THE Harlequins of London, placed fifth in Super League at the time of writing, will bring their big-name stars to Boundary Park in the fifth round of the Carnegie Challenge Cup on Sunday, May 13 (3pm kick off).

It will be a huge day for Roughyeds, given that Quins are more than capable of cementing their place in the elite competition's top six and that they can call on classy top-line performers such as Mark McLinden, Scott Hill, Danny Orr, Rob Purdham, Lee Hopkins and Henry Paul, to name but a few.

It isn't every day that rugby league fans in Oldham get the opportunity to watch stars of Super League pitting their wits and their skills against local favourites, the Roughyeds, here at Boundary Park.

It has happened only twice previously in recent years --- in 2001 when John Harbin's Wakefield came here in a Challenge Cup fifth-round tie and won 26-6 and in 2004 when Warrington knocked us out of the last 16 with a 44-10 triumph.

On the only other occasion we reached the last 16 (since the 'new' club was formed ten years ago, that is) we went down 18-2 at Whitehaven in 1999, although fans will recall that we were beaten 40-6 by St Helens at Stalybridge in a fourth-round clash in 2002 before going down 42-12 a year later to London Broncos at Griffin Park at the same stage of the competition.

The team that day was: Dodd; Irwin, Anderson, Marsh, Cowell; Barber, Roden; Molloy, Hough, McLoughlin, Doran, Stazicker, Farrell, Subs: Shaw, Svabic, Morley, Murray. Tries were scored by Dodd and Stazicker, while Barber and Svabic each kicked a goal.

Neil Roden was placed in the sin-bin by referee Michael Dawber midway through the second half for allegedly slowing down a restart.

Four years later we are again paired with the London club ---- Broncos no more, now Harlequins --- and irrespective of the result we hope to make it a big day for Roughyeds on and off the field, hopefully with the support, both at the turnstiles and on the corporate front, of the town's rugby league community.

Normal league-match prices will be charged --- namely £13 for adults in the upper stand and £12 in the lower stand; £9 and £8 for pensioners and students under 18 in full time education; and £5 in both sections for children under 16.

Bill Quinn and the directors are also hopeful that there will be demand

for hospitality suite places at a cost of £35 a head, this to include prematch meal with wine, use of the pay bar, seats from the comfort of the boxes if so required, the opportunity for a small additional outlay to win prizes in competitions, and inclusion after the match in the official man-of-the-match and champagne moment presentations.

So make a note in your diary. It's our next home game, two weeks today, Sunday, May 13. The Swinton league game scheduled for that day is to be rearranged and, instead, we have the visit from the capital of a Super League side that began the current campaign with a performance that shocked the whole of the sport ---- a win at St Helens

More recently, they took maximum points over Easter with wins against Hull FC at the Stoop and Catalans Dragons in the south of France, followed by a 22-22 home draw with Wakefield Trinity Wildcats.

Had Quins snatched it, they would have pulled off their fourth straight win, but it was interesting after that match to hear what coach Brian McDermott had to say about the possible after-effects of a tight 22-22 draw in searing heat on the back of the crowded Easter programme.

Expressing the view that the demands of the busy schedule could be felt well into May, McDermott told League Express: "When you are playing a week-in, week-out sport you can't give someone a dig in the ribs and expect the bruising to go within ten days.

"It isn't as if we put the players on drips during the week and then they are ready to go for the next game. How I handle coaching in the next four weeks will be very important."

It all makes for an interesting build-up to the tie, Roughyeds also having a tough run-in with today's game against Keighley and then a visit to South Wales next Friday night to play Celtic Crusaders in a match to be televised live by Sky.

They don't come much tougher in Co-Operative National League Two than Celtic Crusaders away in a night match after a potentially tiring coach trip on busy roads to South Wales on the worst day of the week for traffic. Next up it's Harlequins and then, on Sunday, May 20, fancied Barrow Raiders are here in another big game.

The next two Boundary Park matches should be crackers. Try to get here --- and bring a friend.

Cougars have been strengthened in the past couple of weeks by the signing of Featherstone centre or back-row forward Brian Sutton and by the return to fitness from a long absence with a broken leg of stand-off

Injuries have hit hard, though, and Cougars were glad of a Sunday off last weekend while they took stock and stepped up their search for new

Centre Mike Hastings (shoulder) and back-row forward Greg Nicholson (wrist) were the latest of 13 senior players on the casualty list, but with welcome relief from last week's day off Eaton hoped to have wingers Sam Gardner, Rvan Smith and Alex Brown, as well as Nicholson, fit for today's trip to Oldham.

Among Eaton's other key men are prop Simon Bissell, who has returned 'home' after spells with Wigan and Batley; hooker James Feather, who has risen through the ranks from Keighley Albion and the Cougar Cubs; loose-forward Chris Redfearn, recruited this season from Hunslet Hawks; full-back Gavin Duffy, another home-produced product; and stand-off Craig Fawcett, signed this year from Featherstone, who forms a more than useful half-back combination

Add to the aforementioned, prop Gareth English, long-serving utility back Matt Foster, Aussie forward Brendan Rawlings and back-rowers Tom Palmer and Richard Knight and you have a useful-looking Cougars squad who will be determined today to reverse the result at Cougar Park on April Fools' Day.



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
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# I journalistic II cense

THERE is a saying in sport that a contract is not worth the paper it is written on.



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# Destination Blackpool Memory lane

#### 'MURPH' LAUNCHES A STROLL DOWN MEMORY LANE FOR FORMER PLAYERS

MARTIN Murphy, who played more post-war games for Oldham than any other player, is "proud and priviliged" to become the first member of a new Oldham RL ex-players' association to be

Now aged 58, and living in Moorside, the lionheart full-back spent 15 years at Watersheddings

and clocked up 462 first-team appearances to boast the the third highest number of games for the club in more than 100 years of pro rugby league in Óldham.

Only Joe Ferguson (627 between 1899 and 1922) and Jack Read (463 between 1925 and 1939) played in more games than 'Murph', who was No 1 in the post-war record books: who wore No 1 on his full-back's shirt during his long service to Oldham: and who now becomes member No 1 in the club's new association for former players.

It is being set up in conjunction with Roughyeds and is open to anyone who has played professionally for either the current club or the previous Oldham club, which was liquidated in 1997.

"An active ex-players association in Oldham is long overdue and I am honoured to give it a kickstart," said Martin, who had the distinction of captaining the former club in its centenary season of 1976-77.

Still a window cleaner in the town after nearly 30 years in the job, he added: "I have wonderful memories of my rugby days and I would love to share them with the blokes who played for Oldham at the same time.

"In those days we spent years at one club and built up friendships which shouldn't be allowed to fade as we get older. I still see some of my old team mates around town, but I would love to meet up again with out-of-towners like Tommy Davies, Tommy Warburton, Tommy Canning and Wilf Briggs, just to name four.

"An organised association will enable former players from various decades to renew old friendships. The years are rolling on. If we are going to do it there is no better time than now."

On behalf of the Roughveds, former Oldham Chronicle reporter Roger Halstead, who covered

> Oldham RL for the paper for more than 40 years, will work alongside Murphy in getting the new body up and running.

> The plan is to hold an initial meeting in the Roughyeds social club on May 29 to be attended by Roughyeds, interested ex-players and particularly those who might wish to become involved in the setting up and administering of the association.

From that meeting, it is planned to launch the association publicly at the Oldham v Hunslet game at Boundary Park on Sunday, July 22.

In the meantime, all explayers interested in joining Murphy on his trip down Memory Lane are

For the record, only eight players have recorded more than 400 senior games for Oldham, going back to 1876, and two of them played for years in the same team as Murphy ---- winger Mike Elliott (446 games) and hooker Kevin Taylor (429

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
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
