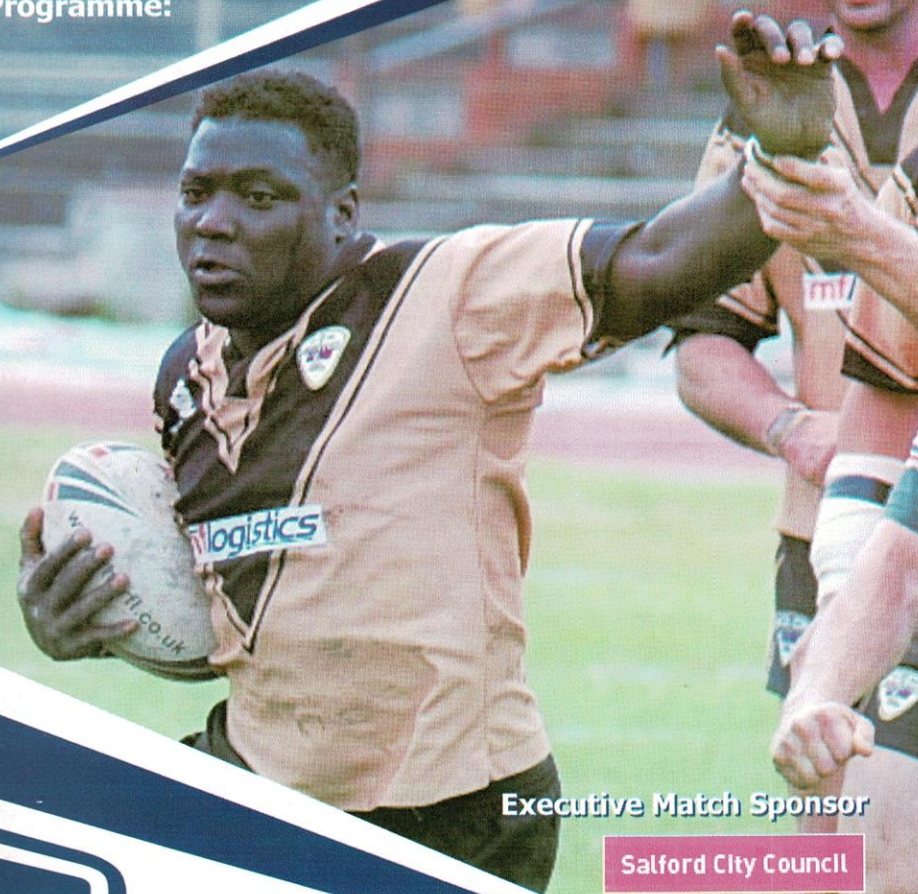

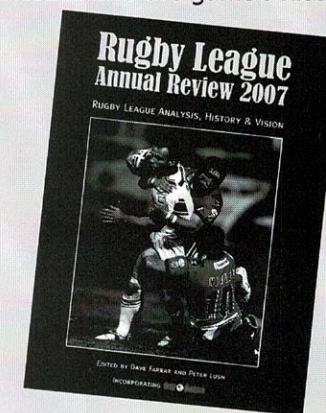

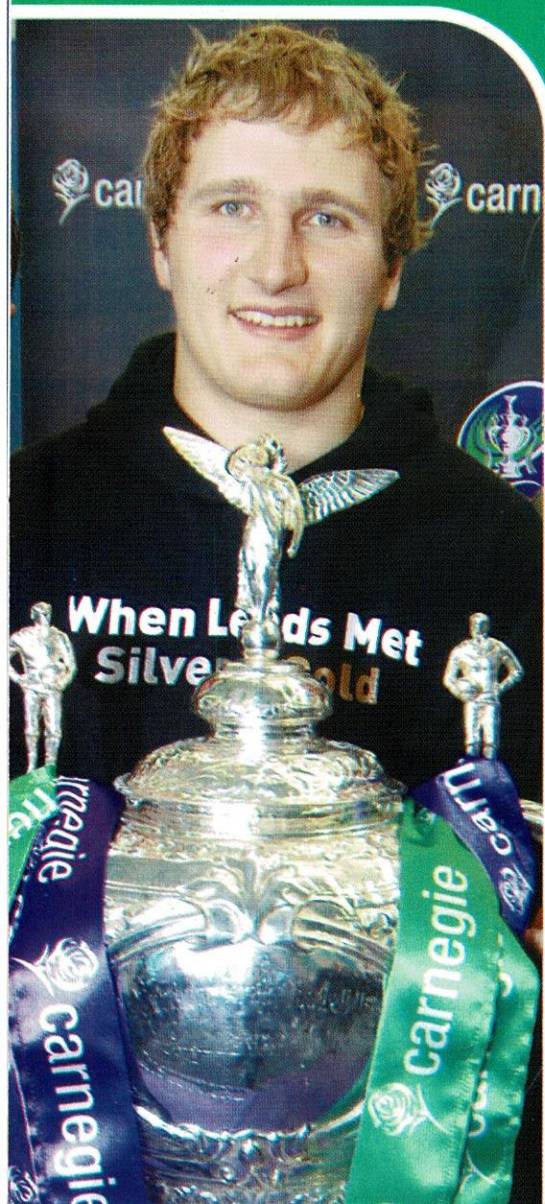

Today's Visitors...

Paul Ashton - Learned his trade at Saddleworth before playing for Halifax, Rochdale, Keighley and Swinton. He was in the Cougars side that won promotion to NL1 in 2003. He got his big chance at Oldham in 2006, initially on a week-to-week basis and did enough to earn a full contract for 2007.

Chris Baines - Was in his third season of under-21s rugby at Warrington when he first got the chance to move on loan to Roughyeds last season and signed on a permanent towards the end of 2006. A product of Wigan St Pat's, he toured New Zealand with Great Britain Young Lions in 2003, also representing his country at youth level against Australia and France.

Jason Boult - Started off at Siddal under-16s, spent four years as a young pro with Bradford Bulls and signed for Halifax in November, 2004. Was an ever-present with 30 appearances in 2005 and then added 27 more in 2006 until the 16 stone and 6ft 2in Prop left the The Shay to join former team-mate Alan Hadcroft.

Matty Brooks - Played his amateur rugby at Embassy Longhill before signing for Bradford Bulls. Has been at Hull KR for seven years now and with first-team rugby limited to one appearance this year took the opportunity for a loan spell at Oldham.

Geno Coston - A non-quota Aussie, who is in England for the first time and hoping to make an impact in NL2. First established himself in the Queensland Cup competition with Wynnum-Manly, alongside another Roughyeds recruit Mark Ogden, but last year played in the same comp for Logan Souths.

Andy Crabtree - Former Wigan and Warrington Academy who joined the Lions in 2005. The former Great Britain Academy player played in the hooking at Swinton but can also play loose-forward. Has come-on from the bench in all of Oldham's games so far this year.

Andy Gorey - Local lad who came through the former Roughyeds academy. In 2006 he established himself as a regular on the wing, making more than 20 appearances and taking his try tally into double figures to finish the season as the club's top try scorer.

Ian Hodson - first arrived at Roughyeds on loan from Swinton midway through the 2005 season. Stayed on for 2006 but was talked into signing on for this season, when he was initially going to take a year out.

Drew Houston - One of the two overseas quota men for 2007, once a youngster linked with Melbourne Storm, had two seasons with Storm feeder club, Norths in the Queensland Cup, before heading south for Dapto, champions of the Illawarra competition last year.

Simeon Hoyle - In 2003 he helped the Cougars to win promotion to NL1 from a third-place finish in the league, winning the League Express man-of-the-match award while beating Sheffield. He later headed Down Under for a spell before returning to Halifax, from where he opted to sign for the Roughyeds.

Adam Hughes - Started his career at Leeds after playing his amateur rugby with Milford. Also played at Wakefield, Halifax, Widnes and Leigh. Vastly experienced in Super League, in total he has made 162 Super League appearances scoring an impressive 78 tries.

Gareth Langley - At 16 he was playing for Salford under-18s, but wasn't on contract and it didn't take long for his hometown club St Helens to take him to Knowsley Road. He was the Saints senior academy player of the year in 2005 and runner up in 2006.

Craig Littler - Lined up with Gareth Langley as centre and wing partners in the Saints academy teams of the past four years. Played in France at Super League level for the Saints in their 2006 campaign.

Richard Mervill - Formerly with Halifax and then Keighley, came to the Roughyeds for 2007 from Australia. Played in the 2003 Keighley side that won promotion to NL1 and later jetted off Down Under, where he has been playing for Dapto in the Illawarra competition.

Paul O'Connor - A former Ireland and Great Britain international at Students' RL level, spent two seasons with Widnes, his hometown club, operating mainly in the under-21s at full-back or on the wing.

Lucas Onyango - Grew up playing union in his native Kenya. Played in the 2002 Commonwealth games here in Manchester and returned to play for Manchester RU before turning codes to sign for Widnes Vikings in 2005. Injury finished his Widnes career and he signed for Leigh RU where he was signed from in March.

Adam Robinson - Spent five years at Wakefield, after joining on a scholarship ultimately spending two years as a full-time pro in the Wildcats' Super League squad. Went to Doncaster for more first-

team rugby in the 2006 season. Moved to Oldham when it went pear-shaped at the Lakers, scoring try on his debut in the win over Barrow at Boundary Park.

Neil Roden - Rejoined the Roughyeds from Leigh after leaving the club initially to go to Batley in 2004. In his first stint with Oldham, after joining from Wigan Academy, played for the Roughyeds in the 2001 Grand Ginal against Widnes at Spotland.

Lee Sanderson - Turned pro for hometown club Leigh and won National League under-21s rep honours while there. He moved south to London Broncos but suffered a serious knee injury which sidelined him for nearly a year. He then had a spell with Rochdale before a short spell at Barrow this year. Things didn't work out at Craven Park and he moved on to Oldham.

Ian Sinfield - Vastly experienced forward who is returning to his hometown club. Played in the first ever Roughyeds game at Rochdale on New Year's Day, 1998. Moved to Rochdale, then to Keighley, and on to Swinton. While at Keighley he played in the NL2 Grand Final, achieving the same feat with the Lions last year.

Kris Smith - Left Swinton for Oldham last year after four seasons with the Lions. Although a

product of amateurs Eccles, he started his professional career with Leeds before moving onto Salford. A serious knee injury hampered his progress and he spent a year in France with Pai, before stints at Halifax and London Broncos.

Said Tamghart - A French international, who has represented his country at every level, including Test matches against Australia and New Zealand. On his way up the ladder to full French international honours, he played for Carpentras, Avignon and UTC (better known now as Perpignan-based Catalans Dragons).

Anthony Tonks - A product of Normanton Knights, had a season with Wakefield Academy before turning pro for Bradford when he was 16. He was full-time at Odsal for six years, though last year spent a loan season at Doncaster Lakers. Became a free agent under his agreement with the Bulls and Oldham had to shake off a lot of competition from clubs in NL1 to get his signature.

Alex Wilkinson - Oldham-born, who has signed for Oldham for part-time Rugby to complete his degree. A schoolboy international who was snapped-up by Bradford Bulls and has had loan spells in the Super League with London Broncos, Huddersfield and Hull.

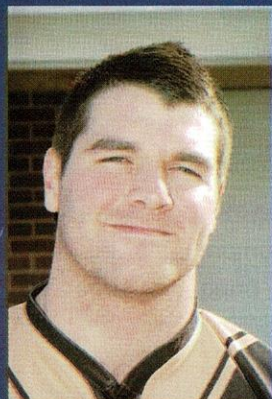

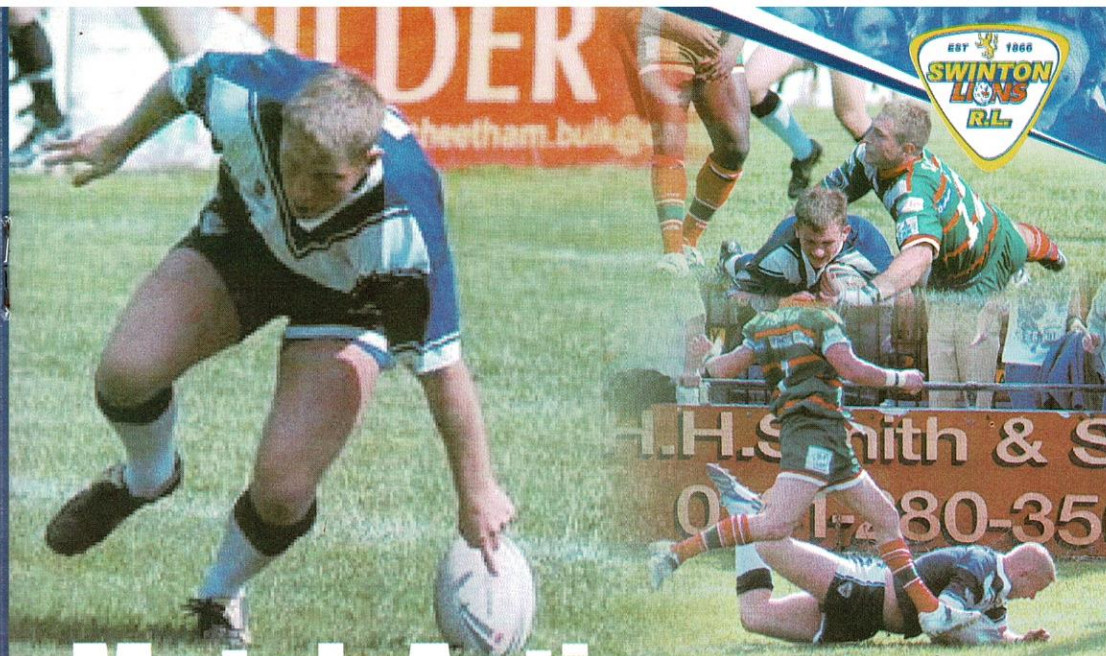
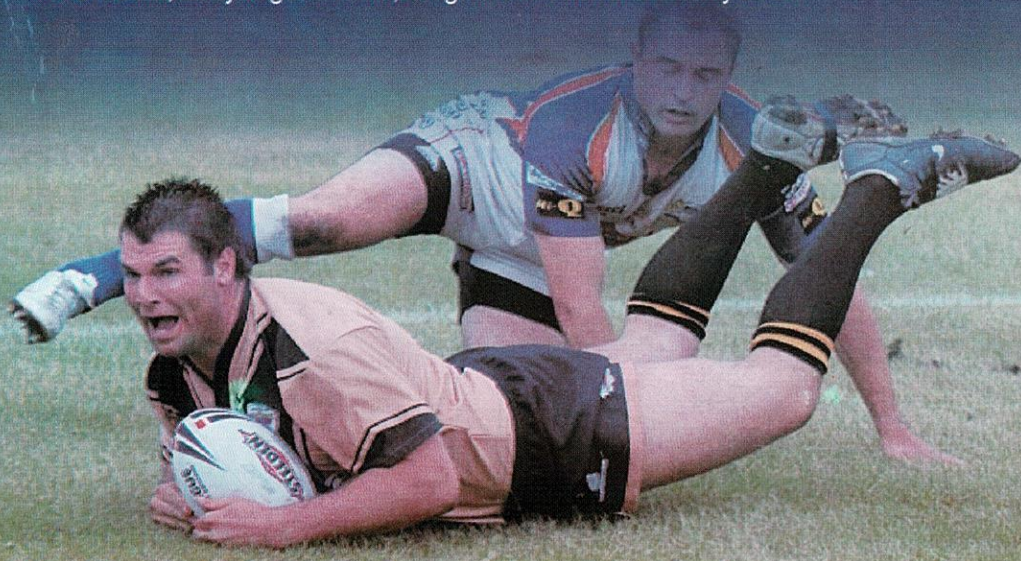

Mark Brocklehurst re-injured his knee in the game against London and a scan has confirmed that he has partially torn his cruciate. As it is only a partial tear, I am confident that Mark will make a good recovery with an intense rehabilitation programme and not require the surgeon's knife.

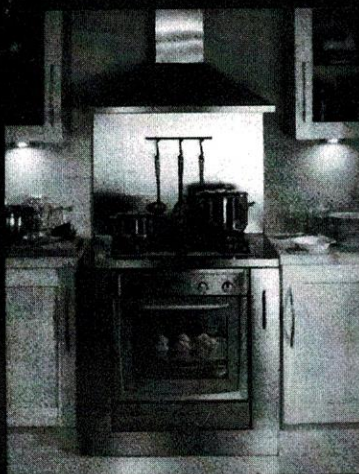

It is to be hoped that the clubs still waiting to host a televised game have seen what can be achieved with a little imagination and hard work.

Because it has to be beneficial for everyone at this level of the game, if the Thursday night venture with Sky continues to go from strength to strength.

SUPER LEAGUE bosses made great strides a couple of weeks ago - now I just hope they don't take a big, if temporary, step back. What do I mean? Well, I'm made up our chief execs finally got together and acted on the numbers of overseas players.

Rising levels have smothered our chances at international level for years so it's good to see clubs act before those chances finally snuff it. I've nothing against those guys - they're often great entertainers and, largely, great blokes too; true pros our boys can learn a lot from. But for every foreigner that earns a contract, an opening for a promising young British talent is shut. Luckily, action has been taken. There's something that just troubles me though. Under the new rules, clubs must reduce their quota to 20 per cent by 2011 - that's five foreigners in your 25-man squad. Fine.

In the meantime, though, you can have 40 per cent of your squad from overseas - that's 10 of 25, much more than you're allowed right now.

Ok technically, under current rules, you could have ALL 25 players in your squad from overseas as long as 22 of those were EU passport holders or 'Kolpak' players.

This doesn't happen because those sorts of players - of the quality to play in Super League



- aren't overly common. Most clubs have a handful on top of their three quota stars. Now, though, clubs aren't so limited in their search. They can bring in 10 foreigners - full stop.

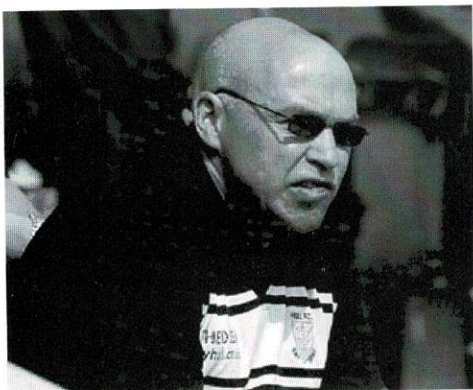
The fewer the restrictions, the greater the choice, and the greater the temptation to bring someone in from the NRL than look for someone within our game - especially as coaches are free to sign players from Down Under NOW whilst they have to wait until September 1 for the British lads.

There's a danger, isn't there, that the numbers of overseas players could actually go up short-term?

I'd like to think coaches would have the foresight to start their reduction now - but if you were a coach, with the thought you might get sacked if you under-perform, then would you necessarily be so relaxed about the short term?

Take Hull ... Under **Kear** they prioritised promoting British talent. Under Sharp, they now have seven overseas players. Swain and McMenemy will go, but in will come Berrigan and Dykes and Sharp's shown he's keen to have more by having a crack at Civoniceva. If he wanted, he could add three more foreigners.

Maybe he will, maybe he won't. I'd like to think the latter - but there are no guarantees. I suppose what I'm saying is, I just hope clubs forget aiming for 2011 and get moving towards that 20 per cent now. Otherwise, in the short term, couldn't a few promising British stars get lost?

Last Time Out

Swinton Lions went down in the cruellest way imaginable 33-38 in the National League 2 clash at Workington's Derwent Park ground. The Lions conceded a last minute try to lose it in the final tackle; a try that featured an obvious forward pass and which also resulted in star man Phil Wood sustaining an ankle injury plus full back Chris Hull being sin binned for dissent.

It all started so well for the Lions, Liam McGovern's massive kick to the corner was fluffed by Matty Woodcock and Paul Alcock was on hand to pounce, the difficult sideline kick was missed. 4-0

The lead lasted barely a minute, Jamie Beaumont charged onto the ball and offloaded to new signing Adam Sidlow who ran through lax tackling to score, Carl Forber goal. 4-6

The game was pretty tight in the early stages, Craig Ashall almost sent Dean Gorton in at the Grandstand side corner but Martin Keavney and Stephen Dawes rammed him into touch.

The sides exchanged penalties as Ashall was harshly adjudged to have high tackled at one end while Town's Andrew Beattie almost beheaded Wood when he evaded three defenders at the other. 6-8

Town's large pack and narrow pitch are two of the main factors for their home strength and when Beaumont bludgeoned his way over from close range for Forber to convert it was looking worrying for the Lions. 6-14

However when Gareth Hayes span out of the tackle off Wood's pinpoint pass to score a converted try and it was followed up another penalty for a high shot on Wood from Beaumont, Swinton were level at 14-14.

The gallant Lions were cheered from the pitch as right on the hooter, Mike Smith crunched Martyn Wilson and from there the Lions built the foundations for Martin Moana to stampede over with McGovern converting. 20-14

Swinton had the better of the early exchanges, although no real scoring advantage was gained until on 49 minutes when Wood and Ashall combined for the stand off's inside ball to allow Mike Smith to dodge over. 26-14

This signalled the end of Swinton's control, after Matty Bryers and Dave Newton were penalised for holding down, Keavney flung the ball to Beattie who provided a strong finish. 26-20

Swinton were then forced into some heroic defending; holding out for 18 tackles in their own final third and Wood making a magnificent stop hauling down Neil Frazer who had broken through after the ball had gone through eight pairs of Workington hands.

Suddenly blue headed hooker Shaun Lunt ghosted by three Lions defenders before Hull hauled him down. The Lions thought they had weathered the storm but Beaumont kicked the ball out of Hull's hands and a quick play the ball from Darren King saw Lunt over anyway. Forber held his nerve to level. 26-26

Town had some momentum going, Alcock made an almighty take off a bomb to the corner when Beattie looked favourite to reach it and Smith hammered Sidwell under the posts to stop another try.

Yet it was the Lions fans who were ecstatic when, following Wayne English's miraculous offload everyone except Wood stopped and he raced under the posts, McGovern converted and Town had to score twice to win. 32-26

Andy Saywell made a vital interception from Franco Kmet with Town having a four man overlap before yet another high shot. Swinton used the penalty well, making a textbook set; strong drives from forwards Smith, Moana and Newton saw the Lions forge a path to the posts for McGovern to coolly drop a goal. 33-26

In most games, that would be enough but an error straight from the kick off and Tani Lavulavu barged over and the gap was back to a point. 33-32

Then in the final tackle of the game disaster struck and following a break down the right with Wilson heavily involved, the ball was lobbed back inside, it appeared to bounce forward, the referee disagreed and Sidlow took full advantage. Cruel doesn't go far enough. Final score 33-38.

One Lion on the Shirt

The game of Rugby League once had the Rothmans Rugby League Yearbook to supply statistics, but this annual publication ceased in 1999 after 19 editions. Whilst the game has never had an equivalent of the Wisden Cricket Almanack published continuously since 1864 there are still a number of high quality annual publications that provide statistics, comment and analysis on the sport. There are three current books that as a whole supply copious information and data on Rugby League.

The Gillett Rugby League Yearbook 2006-2007

The Gillett Yearbook edited by Tim Butcher and Daniel Spencer now in its eleventh year and provides the statistical gap left by the Rothmans Rugby League Yearbook. There are team line-ups, scorers and other match statistics for every professional match played in 2006. There is also a statistical section on each club. In 2006, the Swinton section shows that Wayne English made the most appearances with 33 plus one as substitute, Andy Saywell scored the most tries in all competitions with 26 and Liam McGovern kicked the most goals with 38. The review of the season confirms that Chris Hough took his place in British Rugby League history when he scored the first-ever golden point against Celtic Crusaders in the final eliminator at Bridgend. There are also colour photographs of the National League Two Grand Final against Sheffield Eagles at Warrington. The book is published by League Express and is available from bookshops. The ISBN is 1901347168.

Rugby League Journal Annual 2007

The Rugby League Journal is edited by Harry Edgar who established the Open Rugby magazine in 1976. This annual provides history and comment on the game plus a wonderful array of photographs and illustrations. There are features on the Lions and Station Road. The Swinton club nostalgia section has photographs

of Kenny Gowers, Johnny Stopford and Les Holliday. Also, there are many action shots of a packed Station Road during International Test Matches including the so-called "Swinton massacre" in 1963 when Australia beat Great Britain by 50 points to 12. This was the day Great Britain lost the Ashes on home soil and to date have not won them back in this country. This book also comments on the modern game and mentions how well Wayne English and Lee Marsh played in the 2006 season. Academy Update

Darren Woods made the next try as he broke the Bulldogs defence and found Kash Watkins to his left who went in under the sticks. Lewis Lockett was next to breach the Batley defences, on a run from the half-way line he had choices either side of him but chose Rob Mack backing up on the right who scorched in under the posts.

Lewis Lockett had goaled all four tries to make it 26-24 but had to come off after his last conversion with an arm injury.

With victory in sight the Lions lost their way a bit and an unconverted try put Batley 6 points in front, which they held onto for the final minutes.
