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

TONIGHT promises to be one great occasion here at Boundary Park and I think it is a magnificent reflection on the quality of rugby league in co-operative NL2 that both clubs possess players who can set pulses racing and both teams are capable of locking horns and giving us a product of which we, as rugby league folk, can justifiably be proud.

Was it Phil Clarke, I think it was, who declared at the media conference to announce tonight's big event that the corresponding fixture down at Bridgend in May was one of the best games of rugby league he had seen all season?

In anticipation of a similarly intense and absorbing game tonight, I would like to welcome everyone to Boundary Park on this historic occasion which will hopefully see the Oldham club establish a new co-operative NL2 attendance record, thus beating the 3,441 at Brewery Field when we won there, 34-26, in early May.

A big welcome, particularly, to the Celtic Crusaders party and to their coach, John Dixon, who has been extremely helpful all season in his provision of tapes of matches and the many other little things in which coaches often contact each other for some assistance. John has always done his best to help, and I thank him personally for that.

I'm sure we can look forward to an exciting game against the team that would have been many people's choice as competition favourites at the start of the season.

With only three games to go, including tonight's, I would like to think that Oldham have acquitted themselves well this year and that, at the very least, they have competed on level terms with every other club in the division.

In fact, but for a few lapses of concentration and a fairly lengthy injury list I think we would have been higher up the division that the fourth position we currently occupy.

Coming into tonight's game we are on the back of six wins in a row -- and over the course of the last few outings a full squad has been utilised in an effort to make sure that everyone is match fit and injury free going into the play-offs.

To help in this respect, the board has fulfilled its promise to sign players of proven quality if and when they became available and, currently, I am sure the fans are being excited by the go-forward of Warren Stevens; by the class goalkicking and creative quality of Gareth Morton; and by the outstanding

I sincerely hope that tonight's spectators will get behind the team like never before and that they will come back to Boundary Park for the remaining two regular season games against Swinton Lions next Wednesday evening, September 5, and against London Skolars four days later on Sunday, September 9.

Only then will we and the other clubs in the upper reaches of the division know what the play-offs have in store or who will go up automatically as champions. It promises to be a fantastic finish to what has been a really competitive division from the start way back in early April.

Every team in the division has competed strongly and, make no mistake, with Crusaders tonight, followed by Swinton Lions and then London Skolars -- even though all three games are here -- we face an extremely testing run-in over the last lap.

It goes without saying that you, the fans, can make a big difference, especially here at Boundary Park, and as we enter the business end of what has been a long and testing campaign the boys will appreciate your vocal backing more than at any other time over the past six or seven months.

On and off the field there is a buzz around the club right now and I am sure that everything that has gone on over the last couple of weeks in terms of marketing and promoting this big game will not have gone unnoticed.

The intention of everyone at the club is to lift Roughyeds back into co-operative NL1 and, from there, to build towards the ultimate objective -- a place in Super League.

All that, though, is for the future. Let it not detract from our task tonight and whatever lies ahead in the next three or four weeks.

These are exciting times. The fans who have been with us all season deserve our thanks and appreciation, which we endeavour to show at the end of every match. To those who might be here tonight for the first time for a long time, we hope you savour what we can offer as a team and as a club and that you come back to join us in our united efforts to take this club upwards and onwards.

It promises to be some ride in the next few weeks. Stick with us -- and enjoy not only this game, but the others as well.

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

TOUGH SEASON FOR THE UNDER-15S, BUT MORAN, OWEN AND FITZPATRICK SELECTED FOR REGIONAL CAMP

Congratulations are in order for three members of the Oldham Service Area town team under-15s who earned selection for the regional camp at Rossall School, Fleetwood --- a stepping stone in the RFL's structured youth development programme.

It was a tough season for the under-15s, but Andy Fitzpatrick, Danny Moran and Gareth Owen did more than enough to win their trip to Fleetwood, as did many other local youngsters at the different age levels we have featured in earlier editions of our match-day magazine.

The under-15s squad for the inter-town Service Area programme of matches comprised of the following players:

OLDHAM 0 HALTON (WIDNES) 44

Up against a strong Halton side, Oldham stuck bravely to their task, but injuries to key players early in the game didn't help. Clearly, however, there was still much work to be done.

OLDHAM 18, COPELAND (WHITEHAVEN) 44

A whirlwind start by Copeland saw the Cumbrian boys race into an 18-0 lead inside the first quarter of an hour. The character of the Oldham team then surfaced, however, and the local boys reduced the deficit to 24-18 with two tries by Gareth Owen and one each by Steven Kiss and Alex Leach, one goaled by Aaron Brown.

Mistakes ultimately cost Oldham dearly, however, and with far too much defending to do they couldn't prevent Copeland scoring more tries to finish comfortable winners. This was a much better performance by a gutsy Oldham team which dominated various stages of the game.

OLDHAM 32 LANCASHIRE 32

Following on from the previous game this was another much-improved performance, in which Oldham scored some superb tries, six in total.

Danny Moran (2), Aaron Brown, Gareth Owen, Matthew Fogarty and Philip Joy all touched down with goals coming from Scott Owen (3) and one by Fogarty.

The game turned in the last 15 minutes when Oldham were 28-14 ahead. From an Oldham scrum on their 20, a quick ball released Fogarty, who was recalled for a forward pass with the line in sight.

From this Lancashire hit back with three converted tries to take the lead only for Joy to score in the corner late on to provide Oldham with the draw they undoubtedly deserved.

OLDHAM 0 WIGAN/LEIGH 66

Oldham were on the wrong end of a 12-try beating, but this was partly due to the fact that the side had only 14 players on duty due to injury. Despite the result, Danny Moran, Andy Fitzpatrick and Gareth Owen caught the eye.

OTHER SERVICE AREA ITEMS:

** THE under-18s town team squad will be formed by early September to play in a tournament on Saturday, October 6 against other Service Area teams. 

I had just started to write that a feature of the game today which I don't like is how every tackle seems to become an excuse for a wrestling match.

When, lo and behold, Peter Rowe's column from Australia in League Weekly contains news that half the clubs in Australia now employ wrestling coaches. Now don't get me wrong, at one time I was a great wrestling fan but that was in the days of Bert Royal, Les Kellett and Masambula not the crackpots of today's WWE. The cause of this plague in modern R.L. is obvious: it's to slow down the play the ball in order to get the defensive line set. But there are obvious dangers in wrestling a tackled player on the ground who has the handicap of the ball in one hand and the possibility of more than one defender to contend with. The potential for serious injury is there. And from a spectator point of view a quick play the ball is far more likely to create breaks and open play than a slow one. And the basic cause of all this unnecessary writhing about is the ten metre rule. That distance is just too much to cover to enable players to get back in position after every tackle. And the other drawback of ten metres is that it emphasises power in the 'collision' (as coaching jargon has it) at the expense of skill with the ball. Yes, I'm afraid we oldies liked to see a Vince Karalius, Johnny Whiteley, Harry Pinner or Terry Flanagan, geniuses with a ball in hand rather than the crash, bang, wallop of the one man drive, four rotating props game of today. That isn't to belittle the talent and dedication of the modern day player, in fact I'm in awe of their ability. But that doesn't stop me from regretting the lost skills of previous generations.

Let no-one be in any doubt that the achievement of Catalans Dragons in reaching the Carnegie Challenge Cup Final is worthy of the highest praise. A club in only its second season in Super League had no right to expect to reach such dizzy heights so quickly. That it did is testament to the foundations laid (Steve Deakin had no little part in that, please note), the quality of recruitment and the coaching. Having seen the Dragons several times on T.V. I don't think they get any favours from English referees (and they certainly didn't get any from the T.V. scheduling of their games prior to Wembley). And, of course they suffer from the inevitable moans of those British spectators who would have our game forever confined to four northern counties. Well, Wembley week proved two things: firstly that if you want maximum media exposure international interest is paramount, stimulating interest in both France and Spain as well as Britain and, secondly, that one big game on terrestrial T.V. is worth ten on Sky for publicity value. Sorry to say that in a match programme for a game being covered by Sky because we all know the excellence of Sky's coverage has revolutionised the broadcasting of our game. But for audience reach the figures speak for themselves. Nevertheless, grateful thanks to Sky for choosing to cover tonight's match. The first Oldham/Celtic Crusaders fixture was a classic. I hope they are rewarded with an equally compelling game tonight.



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halstead's choice

ANDY Crabtree was 'hooked' on rugby league from the first time his dad took him down to the local amateur club . . . and when you learn that it was that great academy of the sport's skills and sciences that is Wigan St Pat's you begin to know why.

Has any amateur club in Lancashire, Yorkshire or Cumbria produced as many rugby league players as Pat's?

Legends of the game, like Joe Lydon, Andy Gregory and many more, have never forgotten their roots at Clarrington Park.

And literally hundreds of well-turned-out, well qualified journeymen professionals have rolled off the Pat's conveyor belt of talent, owing much to the club, it's prowess in producing good players and its band of dedicated coaches and youth section assistants.

Among those on the current Roughyeds staff who have come through the system at Pat's are Chris Baines, James Coyle, Neil Roden and Andy Crabtree, whose dad, John, coaches the Pat's open-age second team and is almost part of the furniture at the club.

"He's been involved down there as long as I can remember," said Andy. "I guess that, being born in Wigan with a dad so steeped in the game as that, it was only natural that I would be taken down to St Pat's at a very early age. I think I was six or seven, certainly no older than seven.

"At that time Standish Eagles was like a St Pat's nursery club for the very young lads, but then they combined into one club anyway, so I played a little bit with the Eagles and then I was at Pat's, where I stayed until I signed for Wigan. My dad is still there. I think he'll be there for ever."

Another Roughyed dad who can lay claim to be a St Pat's stalwart is Jack Roden, Neil's father. Jack doubles up as chief scout for the Warriors and few know more than Jack about the youth game in and around Wigan over the past decade or so.

"Andy Crabtree? He was an absolutely outstanding prospect as a kid," recalled Jack. "But you don't need to ask me, just look at his record and his CV. Even now, a few years on, I think he would have been playing in Super League had he possessed just a little bit more pace to give him that extra zip out of dummy half.

"He's a great footballer, he provides a good service from acting half, he has good hands and he hits hard in defence. Jimmy Reader at Warrington (club scout) thought the world of him when he was a kid, but he was always going to go to Wigan. He went on two tours Down Under and he always got good reports from his performances on the other side of the world.

"As I say, modern-day coaches like their hookers to fly out of dummy half and make ground and I'm sure Andy would be playing at the top level now if he were just that little bit more explosive around the play-the-ball."

Andy worked his way through the age grades at St Pat's alongside half a team of peers who would go on to become professionals, among them Mark Roberts (ex-Roughyeds, now at Halifax), Shaun Briscoe (Hull FC), Jon Whittle (Featherstone), Dean Gaskell (Widnes), Sean O'Loughlin (Wigan) and the late and highly talented Billy Jo Edwards (younger brother of Shaun), who was so tragically killed in a car crash.

If the young and precocious Crabtree wasn't playing at club level, he was hooking for his school teams, first at Sacred Heart Primary in Wigan's Beech Hill suburb and later at a secondary school whose name was, and

still is, synonymous with the very highest level of schoolboy rugby league achievement, St John Fisher. It would be nice to know how many Wigan boys owe success in rugby league to St John Fisher in school hours and to St Pat's in leisure time.

No matter. Andy Crabtree was certainly one of them -- a rising star at St Pat's and, as hooker, a key figure in a St John Fisher school team that had the astonishing record of going through five school years without a single defeat. Billy Jo Edwards was captain and scrum-half, Andy Crabtree was hooker and Sean O'Loughlin, now skipper of Wigan Warriors, was loose-forward.

"We were English Schools' champions five years on the trot at the different age groups," recalled Andy this week, "and on the strength of never suffering one defeat in those five years we got into the Guinness Book of Records. It was a big achievement, really."

You bet it was. And it was to go even better for the boy who, unusually, began his rugby life in the position he still plays many years later --- No 9.

In a cross-code schoolboy rugby league challenge match, Andy and his pals at St John Fisher were invited to go head-to-head with the English Schools' rugby union champions from London. The Wigan lads said they would take them on at rugby union --- and they whipped 'em at that code, too.

These were heady days for young Crabtree who, at the age of 16, won all the usual town team and county honours before earning selection as captain of an England Schoolboys' squad that included the likes of Alex Wilkinson, Sean O'Loughlin, Shaun Briscoe, Danny McGuire, Chev Walker, Billy Jo Edwards and Gareth Morton, who has just joined Roughyeds on loan from Hull KR.

The same year he toured Australia with Great Britain and Ireland Schoolboys which "fared pretty well" (his words) in the southern hemisphere and had the distinction of beating the Queensland state side.

His hometown Wigan Warriors had long been watching the progress of Crabtree, who would build on the experience of captaining England Schoolboys by accepting an invitation to captain the Wigan Warriors Academy side --- a key role in his development, which he commanded for two years.

Back to Jack Roden. "I think that, more than anything, underlined the regard in which he was held by everyone at Wigan."

Selection for the England Academy side to tour New Zealand and Australia was considered by many as a formality and he lived up to his billing by taking the man-of-the-match award in a memorable win against the young Kiwis in Wellington.

On returning home he found himself, like many young men, at life's crossroads with decisions to be made relative to the future and to where he stood in terms of

placing his chosen sport in a list of priorities, balanced against study and the need to look beyond rugby league for a living.

He had successfully completed GCSE and 'A' level studies and was to begin university life in Salford, studying Business Information Systems --- a discipline that was to stand him in good stead in future career moves, including his present position, working in St Helens for the Royal Bank of Scotland, dealing with mortgages.

Said Andy: "I had an extremely busy two or three years, captaining England Schoolboys, captaining Wigan Academy, going on two tours to the southern hemisphere and all this time working hard to get my GCSE passes and then my 'A' levels.

"I was about to start out at Salford University so I thought it was time to have a change of direction in rugby, too. Wigan had strong links at that time with Orrell RU Club, so I went playing for Orrell for one year. It was the one time in my life when I didn't play hooker. At union, I played scrum-half."

He enjoyed the 15-a-side code, but he missed his rugby league and he was to return to the sport with Warrington Academy, where he spent one season before seeking first-team football with Swinton Lions in the National League.

After two years in the Lions' den he was ready to move on again and Oldham knocked on the door of his Golborne home at just the right time.

He has never regretted the move. "Things are very professional here at Oldham," he said, "and we are having a good season. There is healthy competition right through the squad and everyone is fighting for his place. That's a good thing, especially at this time of year when we are getting down to the nitty-gritty.

"The professional bit comes in handy, too. For instance, it makes a real difference when we have overnight stops before long away games, like we did only last week when we went up to Gateshead.

"We hope to finish high enough up the division to get some advantages in the play-offs and with that in mind tonight's game against Celtic Crusaders is going to be a very important one. We had a great win down there. Nobody fancied us to win, except ourselves."

Andy Crabtree and Simeon Hoyle have more or less shared the hooking job all season and just how much the specialist task has been shared equally is seen in the respective match statistics of the two hookers --- up to an including the Gateshead game on August 19, Crabtree had one try in 21 appearances, Hoyle one try in 22.

"As I say, there is a lot of competition, and that's how it should be," said Andy. "I don't think anybody at the club would want it any other way."


Aged 24, he has a sister, Andrea, and he lives in Golborne, not too far off the East Lancs Road, with his girl friend Caroline. Family? Ever the joker, he quipped: "We do a lot of baby sitting for others . . . oh, and we have a rabbit. Does that count?"

Even comedians have their serious side, though, and Andy was no exception when I asked him whether he still had any ambitions in rugby league. Thoughtful for a moment, he replied: "Yes, I do --- to play at as high a level as I am able. I've had three seasons in NL2 -- two with Swinton, one with Oldham -- and I would like to be tested now in NL1: hopefully with Oldham next season.

"That's still a long way off, however. All we can do as individual players, and as a squad, is take things one game at a time and see where it takes us. Hopefully, that will be where we want to go."

And where will that be? "Everyone at the club has had promotion as our goal from day one when we started pre-season training last November. Nothing has changed that. Next season we want to be in NL1.

"That's what we have been striving for all season and now we have to go out and make it happen."

NEW OLDHAM BOOK!

Remember giving the 1986 Aussies the fright of their lives up the hill at Watesheddings? The 'Unbeatables' had been playing as though on another planet until a David Topliss led Oldham brought them back down to earth.

And, of course, those older supporters amongst us (me included) still relish the memory of Derek Turner & Co smashing to bits the mean green and gold machine of 1956.

Up in the top tier of the main stand this evening will be sitting Joe Collins and John Blair both keen as mustard Roughyed supporters. Joe, played for Oldham against the 1967 Kangaroos whilst John turned out in a trio of matches against touring sides - the '71 Kiwis and both the '73 and '75 (here for the World Championships) Aussies.

Of the 1975 match, Aussie, Graeme Langlands - one of the best backs in the world and who had sat out the match in the stand - said "Oldham came back superbly to trim the lead and until the Raudonikis try, I believed they might snatch a draw. We murdered St Helens and Salford and without doubt Oldham are by far the best and toughest club side we have encountered". Of the same match John Blair said "This was another tough encounter. I was up against Tom Raudonikis and found him to be a very strong and powerful player. When Johnny Patterson put Martin Murphy clear for his try Graham Eadie came in and cleaned him out just as he passed the ball. This caused a bit of a mêlée as they used to say!"

It's the centenary celebration this year of first ever 'rugby league' tour to these shores - that of the 1907 New Zealanders who became known as the All Golds. They won the test series but still lost against a powerful Oldham side. The Kiwis are here in October and will play a celebration test Northern Union vs. All Golds (or otherwise known as the Gillette Fusion Centenary International) at the Halliwell Jones Stadium, Warrington on the 20th of October.

The ideal time then for the Heritage Trust to publish Michael Turner's new book which tells the story of each and every touring side that's played against the Roughyeds (and much more) - starting off with the game against the All Golds and running beyond the match against the Aussies in 1986 to take in the World Club Championship matches in 1997 and more recent ly visits of enterprising South Sydney and Manly representative sides.


RUGBY FUN AND FITNESS ON OLDHAM EDGE.

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
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

Since this is having to be written before the Wembley occasion, and with something of a natural break in the league fixtures, I thought it was time for a bit of star-gazing. Who is going to make it into the play-off series which will shortly be upon us?

In Super League, as indeed in the other competitions too, there are a few crucial fixtures coming up, which will have a big say in determining the final league positions. At the top, the main issue still open is likely to be whether Saints or Leeds finish first and so get the advantage of a home draw in the game to decide who goes straight to Old Trafford. Each has one difficult away game - Leeds at Bradford and Saints at Wigan - as well as two home ties to finish their league fixtures. Underachievers of the season? Surely, Leigh, in fifth place. And huge credit to both Dewsbury and Sheffield, who are fighting for sixth place and the privilege of a play-off dart at Whitehaven! I must admit, too, to a little bit of sadness to see Hornets on their way down to NL2 - where hopefully we will not be playing them in 2008!

Why not? Obviously, because I think we will emerge from a thrilling NL2 play-off series as Grand Final winners! I don't, in fact, think we will lose another game this season - but I am afraid we will have to go all the way to make it, with no second chances, and it will all be a huge test of nerves as much as anything else. I expect us to finish in fourth place on points difference to Barrow - how expensive now look those mid-season slip-ups! And that would mean that we would have to win home games against probably Hunslet and Workington, before going up to Barrow to qualify to meet Celtic again at Headingley. See you there!!

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

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



What does the future hold?

DOES anybody know what the Rugby Football League's plan for National League rugby is after 2009?

Certainly the officials of clubs in NL1 and NL2 don't seem to.

While the plans for Super League clubs under the proposed franchise/licence system are relatively clear cut - although even then we don't know how many teams will be included - the professional game outside of that elite appears to have an uncertain future.

Clubs are still unsure about when the final decision on the structure of the game from 2009 will be made, with some suggesting it could be as late as midway through next season.

More than that, officials don't even know who will make that final decision - whether it will be a vote at the Rugby League Council, or if the RFL's board of directors will decide.

Whatever side of the franchise debate you stand on, that cannot be good for the vast majority of clubs in the game.

In this month's Rugby League World, a number of senior National League figures have their say on the current situation.

There are still very strong views on whether Rugby League should retain promotion and relegation on an annual basis.

But to move away from that for a minute, it is the general uncertainty that concerns club officials

as much as anything.

Oldham chief executive Chris Hamilton, who is personally against scrapping promotion and relegation, summed those feelings up.

"If clubs actually knew what will be happening to the teams that don't get in, then there may be more universal support for it (the licence system)," Hamilton said.

Halifax coach Martin Hall has slammed the uncertainty.

"No-one is sure if it will get voted in, or even how the National Leagues will work," Hall said.

"I find that ludicrous and ridiculous. How can you run a business when you don't know what's happening from one season to the next?"

"In any business - and that's what we are, a business - there has to be some planning.

"We still don't know what is happening for the 2009 season, and might not do until next year. How can anybody plan for the next two seasons?"

"It's just poor planning, for everybody. Next season is going to be difficult for everybody to know what's what."

Various other senior figures have their say in the September edition of Rugby League World, with the feature also including the argument on whether or not the licence system will work for National League rugby.

One thing is for sure - some big decisions need to be made, and quickly, for the good of Rugby League at all levels, but especially in NL1 and NL2.



WITH both clubs playing out tonight's fascinating clash focusing on gaining promotion to National League One, this is a match of singular importance both on and off the field.


Of course, much publicity has rightly centred around the fact that, by way of a £1 charity donation on the turnstiles, entrance is free. Roughyeds officials have worked hard behind the scenes recently to both secure the backing of local business and to generate a buzz within the rugby league community. Hopefully, by the time you read this, Boundary Park will be full of both lapsed and new Oldham fans, with a healthy sprinkling of other club shirts around the place. The bold initiative certainly merits a healthy turn-out. And, with Sky Sports providing live coverage of a promotion match-up which will resonate throughout the division, the action on the pitch promises to live up to its billing. Most who saw the reverse fixture down at Bridgend agreed that it was one of the most thrilling games of rugby league they have seen all season. Even casual viewers cycling through the Sky Sports channels on that Friday evening in May can't help but have been drawn in by the high quality of play and Oldham's stirring comeback, turning a 26-16 deficit into a 34-26 triumph. Though many bemoan the moving of fixtures to accommodate live coverage, rugby league at this level needs all the positive exposure it can get.

The last appearance Celtic Crusaders made on television away from home saw John Dixon's side overcome title rivals Featherstone Rovers with some ease. Some of the tries scored by the Welsh side that night certainly made a few neutral fans in my local pub sit up and take notice, while the general play — marshalled by Jace van Dijk — was of a very high level. Oldham will have to be right at the top of their game to take the three points tonight. But, with players like Byron Ford on the books until the end of the season — what a performance he put in at Hunslet, for those who weren't there — not to mention the other high-calibre captures made of late by coach Steve Deakin, the Roughyeds are certainly a stronger outfit than that which last took to the field to face the Crusaders. This is about as tough a game to call as you can get. It isn't quite make-or-break, as whatever the result, the team that loses this evening will at least get the chance to make amends through the play-offs. But, with the Crusaders chasing the title and Oldham looking at climbing into third spot, few will be thinking much beyond tonight's 80 minutes. Enjoy.

SUPPORTING DR KERSHAW'S AND THE RFL BENEVOLENT FUND



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DR Kershaw's Hospice and the Rugby League Benevolent Fund have publicly expressed their gratitude to the Roughyeds for coming up with the unique scheme which will raise money for the two charities via the attendance at tonight's game.

The hospice requires at least £1.2million a year to do its work and to provide patients with first-class care and attention.

The RFL Benevolent Fund provides financial assistance to players at all levels of the sport who are seriously injured, invariably young men, many with mortgages and families to support.

At the media conference which launched the Roughyeds' unique scheme, the hospice was represented by Mr Brian Hurst and the RFL Benevolent Fund by Phil Clarke, the former Wigan and GB international and now a popular and well-known pundit on Sky Sports.

Mr Hurst outlined the financial demands made on Dr Kershaw's and described the Roughyeds' initiative as "absolutely fantastic".

He added: "I've never heard of anything like this before. And I would like to say to whoever thought of it: 'Brilliant'. I hope everyone has a fantastic time. Brilliant."

Phil Clarke gave one or two brief examples of the assistance provided to seriously injured players by the Benevolent Fund. He said the Oldham club's initiative was "a great idea" and added: "You know, the greatest thing in life is to make a difference to somebody else and that's what Oldham are doing in this instance."

"I'm sure it will be a great success. I went to the corresponding game between Oldham and Crusaders in South Wales in May and I have to say it was one of the best games of rugby league I've seen all season."

Chief executive Chris Hamilton, speaking on behalf of the club, said the two charities had been carefully chosen because both were close to the hearts of thousands of Oldham people and both were fully deserving of maximum support to help them in the work they do on behalf of sick or injured people.

In the days following the media launch the club was invited to look at the new facilities at Dr Kershaw's and Mr Hamilton happened to be there when a group of volunteers were busily preparing more than 5,000 letters about tonight's game which were going out to the Hospice's supporters.

A dozen people provided willing hands and the operation took three hours to prepare the envelopes and another two hours to frank them.

The Hospice has to raise £1,200,000 independently each year to run and maintain its highly specialised levels of care, while a massive programme of extensions and refurbishment over the last five years has been carried out at an overall cost of £2.2million,

more than £1.7million of which has been raised by the Hospice and its supporters.

Phase three of the development, completed recently, includes a new physiotherapy unit, kitchens and washing-up areas, two new Chapels of Rest, a car park extension, increased security in the form of electric gates and new office storage facilities.

This phase cost in the region of £750,000, but thanks to a substantial legacy the Hospice had to raise no more than £280,000 --- this, though, on top of the annual running costs of £1.2million.

Said Mr Hurst: "With this in mind we are grateful for all funds received which allow us to continue and develop our specialised services. The support and kindness of local people and businesses is very much appreciated by all patients and staff."

LAST OF THE NEW BOYS READY FOR FINAL PUSH

THE Roughyeds' sometimes-hectic recruitment activity over the past couple of months came to an end for this season with the recent captures --- a few days before the deadline --- of Hull KR pair Byron Ford and Gareth Morton and much-travelled prop Warren Stevens.

Coming so soon after Rob 'Two Bobs' Roberts, James Coyle and Ian Gordon threw their hats into the Roughyeds ring, these latest signings once again underlined the board's burning ambition to take the club upwards and onwards, writes ROGER HALSTEAD.

Ford and Morton are here on loan, while Stevens has signed a short-term deal to the end of the season.

The big prop, formerly with Warrington, Whitehaven and Leigh, had agreed to play for Andy Gregory's Blackpool on a match-to-match basis to ease himself back into the game, but Roughyeds boss Steve Deakin was keen to bring him here in the knowledge that once he had got himself match fit he would, alongside 'Two Bobs', provide invaluable experience to a young set of Oldham forwards.

At Hunslet the other night Stevens made his first start in an Oldham jersey, toiling somewhat early on -- like the rest of the side -- but returning for another stab at it in the second half and producing his best performance so far.

Ford and Morton, meanwhile, have made an immediate impact, Ford scoring five tries in three Oldham outings to date, while Morton has chipped in with two tries and 13 goals in the same number of appearances.

Watched by his fellow Cook Island international and former Oldham forward Tere Glassie, Byron sparked Roughyeds into action with a length-of-the-field dash that led directly to Gareth's opening try of the game.

But it was when he was switched to full-back late on that he turned on the real razzle-dazzle to twice weave his way through a mesmerised Hunslet defence for a couple of classy, crowd-pleasing touchdowns.

Morton, meanwhile, was kicking goals from all distances and angles --- seven out of seven to be precise, to follow his four from five at Gateshead where he snacked a conversion attempt off the right-hand touchline against an upright in his one and only failure.

"Promotion is the No 1 goal for us," said Ford, "and, hopefully, we can make it all the way to the Grand Final at Headingley."

With proven try scorers like Ford, Adam Hughes and Lucas Onyango around, and a goalkicker of Morton's class to turn four into six, the Roughyeds must be in with a shout.
