

### deaks's' with Steve Deakin



#### I DID something I don't usually do after that terrific game, and that superb rugby league occasion, at Boundary Park last Thursday night.

Official post-match presentations usually take place either in the boardroom or in the hospitality suite, but with so many companies sponsoring our big game against Celtic Crusaders --- 11 in total --- it was decided to go through the customary

formalities in the big concert room in the social club.

I was given the opportunity to say a few words and, with apologies to the Crusaders' party, headed by their operations manager Gerald McCarthy and their coach John Dixon, a good friend of mine, I said I wanted to speak first of all about my own players.

Normally, you wouldn't do that on occasions like this, but in this instance I felt it was right and proper to do so. Before I said anything else I wanted to tell my players publicly how proud I was of their efforts in the two games against the only full-time professional team in our division.

We won down at their place, of course, and although we didn't complete the double on what was, nevertheless, a truly memorable night here at Boundary Park last Thursday, we played well enough to make sure that Crusaders had to reach new heights of achievement in the second half in order to get

On tape and on TV I have seen a lot of the Crusaders' games this year and I have never seen them play as well as they did here in the second half. Nor has any other team played so well against us -- it was, without doubt, the best 40 minutes that any opposing side has thrown at us all season.

Suffice to say that things didn't go our way in the second half, but it would be churlish of me to look for excuses. They were just a little bit too quick for us in the second half and they had a lot of skill on the edges. But we scored 18 points against them and made them fight every inch of the way.

For half the game we showed we could mix it with them. They are full-time professionals after all and this advantage undoubtedly came into play in the second half. It was interesting to note that by midway through the second half they had made three changes: we had made eight.

Having said that, we held our heads high and we played a massive part in an outstanding game and an outstanding occasion in the history of the Oldham club. From this time last year the club has made massive strides on and off the field and I am quietly confident that 12 months on from now we will be able to say the same again.

As players and coaches, however, we have to try and put all that out of our minds and concentrate on one thing at a time -- that's the Swinton game tonight and then the London Skolars match on Sunday.

Then, and only then, will we know where we stand and what the play-offs will throw at us.

### LEE TO COACH TOWN TEAM UNDER-18s IN BID FOR GB PLACES

LEE Charlesworth has been named as coach of the Oldham Service Area town team under-18s squad which will compete in an inter-town Festival at Hopwood Hall, Middleton in October.

His No 2 and assistant coach will be Mike Tootill, and the squad's manager will be Harold Dawes, thus providing the town's under-18 representatives with an experienced and knowledgeable coaching and managerial team.

The squad will be named soon from the under-18s of Saddleworth Rangers and Waterhead, who compete in the National Youth League, and from St Anne's, who are in the premier division of North-West Counties.

Oldham will compete in the Festival with Wigan/Leigh, Warrington, Widnes, Lancashire and St Helens and regional selectors will be present to eye up candidates for progression to the next stage of the selection process for the Great Britain squad.

A 24-strong under-16s Great Britain squad has already been selected from North-West town-team players who were chosen initially to go on regional camp at Rossall School, Fleetwood and from there on to Spink Hill, Sheffield where they were in competition with boys from Yorkshire and other parts of the country.

The Lancashire team at Spink Hill was coached by Oldham Service Area official Gary Highton, who prepared his side over a four-week period at Hopwood Hall for matches against Yorkshire, Cumbria and a combined regional side, comprising of players from the London area and from Wales.

Rugby League performance analysts were on hand to watch all the games before going away and subsequently naming the Great Britain squad.

Oldham boys Gareth Owen (Waterhead) and Danny Moran (St Anne's) went nearly all the way in the selection process only to miss out at the final hurdle ---- tough luck on these extremely talented local youngsters who are sure to get more opportunities to showcase their skills on the bigger stage.

Garry Highton got 12 of his Lancashire players in the 24-man GB squad ---- quite an achievement considering that Yorkshire had only eight representatives, Cumbria two, London one and Wales one.

Although two sides stand out in that time, namely Mike Ford's 2001 Grand Final team and the current squad, there have been from the outset some excellent players donning Roughyeds colours. Here are my thoughts:-

At fullback the outstanding candidates are Mark Sibson, Gavin Dodd (who continues to star at Widnes) and our current temporary absentee, Paul O'Connor. For all round reliability in both defence and attack my vote goes to Sibson.

Wing gives us some exciting finishers. Chris Eckersley had pace to burn, Joe McNicholas was a popular flyer and Joey Hayes a real livewire. Then we've had local lads Damien Munro and Nicky Johnson, both capable of long range scores. However, with only a few games on which to judge them, I have no doubt that the current pairing of Byron Ford and Lucas Onyango are the best to have represented the club.



For me international class tells and Casey and Molloy are my choices.

Hooker is no contest. John Hough monopolised the position In the first seven years and only current players Simeon Hoyle and Andy Crabtree come anywhere near.

There are plenty of worthy candidates in the second-row too. How about one of Oldham's favourite sons Paul Round? Or there's Graeme Shaw, Dane Morgan, Bryan Henare, Lee Doran, Mark Roberts and one of our best current players lan Hodson. However, I think Shayne McMenemy was the best signing ever made by the current club and I would partner him with our current leader and captain Rob Roberts.

Loose-forward gives us the likes of Phil Farrell, Lee Marsh and Kevin Mannion but I have no hesitation in picking tough as teak David Gibbons for this position because he (as did brother Anthony) never gave less than 100%.

### halstead's choice

RUGBY League and the Yorkshire family of Tonks are inseparable in that hotbed of the sport centred around Featherstone, Castleford, Normanton and Pontefract.

Some of us remember Les at Post Office Road years ago. Now, there's lan ---- and at Oldham we have the pleasure of Tony's company. Common denominators --- they are all related, they all come from the same district, they are all prop-forwards.

They breed 'em tough, they breed 'em big, those Tonks. And they are proud of their heritage; like most families in that area it's a heritage built around coal and the mines, the local community, allotments, racing pigeons, cricket in the summer and rugby league in the winter.

Times are changing, though. The pits have gone, rugby league is a sport with seasons in the sun, Post Office Road is the Chris Moyles Stadium and a few miles away just across the M62 we don't have Wheldon Road any more, we have The Jungle.

One thing is constant — the big lads of the Tonks family are still throwing their weight around and keeping the family name alive in rugby league circles.

"My grandad was Les Tonks's brother," Tony told me this week. "He loved his rugby and I was no more than five years old when he said it was time I got my boots on. I remember it well. He took me down to Normanton Knights and said he had got another Tonks for them . . . and, yes, another prop.

"I was always a big lad for my age, always one of the biggest in any of the teams I played for and I can't ever remember ever playing anywhere else but in the front-row -- if you're called Tonks that's what you do."

Tony entered this world on April 27, 1985 in Pontefract Hospital. Aged 22, he has four brothers and two sisters and one of those brothers, 12-year-old Bradley Foster, is breaking with family tradition because he is an up-and-coming centre or full-back, who played in last week's Wembley curtain-raiser for Freeston High School, Normanton against their close and deadly rivals, Castleford High.

It was the Year Seven final of the Carnegie Champion Schools' tournament and with young Bradley performing well, Freeston High became the first rugby league side to lift a trophy at the new Wembley --- quite a day, then, for Bradley and for big brother Tony, who was watching high up in the stands.

"I went down to Wembley to give him a cheer and he had a smashing game," said Tony, who still has vivid memories of when he was aged 12 and working his way through the age grades at Normanton Knights.

Among his peers were Jamie Langley (now of Bradford Bulls fame), Richard Blakeway (Featherstone) and Ben Cockayne (Hull KR) and they all played alongside Tony in the Knights' under-15s side which became BARLA national champions seven years ago.

About the same time Tony was taken under the wing of Wakefield Trinity Wildcats. They invited him to play for one of their junior sides and, leading on from that, he had a season with the Wildcats junior academy side before Bradford Bulls got wind of this promising young prop from

the Featherstone area with the perfect family pedigree.

Tony suspects Jamie Langley, who had signed for the Bulls a few months earlier, gave the Super League club the tip, but he never did find out conclusively.

He said: "However it happened I don't know for sure, but my name got marked down at Bradford. They sent out their scouts to watch me play and they must have liked what they saw because they offered me a full-time contract just after my 17th birthday, and I accepted it."

He had left Freeston High a few months earlier and had spent those months, in his words, "labouring and learning". When the full-time offer came in from Bradford he was ready to snap their hand off.

Tony takes up the story. "I had a very good time in my years at Bradford, first with the under-18s and then the under-21s. I had not been in the under-21s long when I had a shoulder reconstruction, but I just got back in time for the play-offs — three matches — and then the final against Leeds Rhinos at Headingley.

\*That was some year for me because, in the space of a few weeks, I successfully made my comeback after the shoulder operation; I played in a winning Bulls side in the senior academy final; and to crown it all, Brian Noble awarded me my Super League squad number ---30 --- because he said he liked the way I had come back from a major shoulder operation.

"That final at Headingley was a great game. It was tight, hard and close -- just how I like my rugby. I can't remember the score, but I think we must have snatched it late on because they had already got the Leeds ribbons on the cup and they had to take them off to put our ribbons on.

"They were in the process of doing that when the floodlights went out . . . what a farce! Steve McNamara was in his first year as under-21s coach and to win the trophy was a great boost for him.

"I had another year under Steve's coaching and then I went out on loan to Doncaster for a year because I had reached that stage of my career at which I needed a new challenge and the opportunity to be playing first-team rugby somewhere against bigger and more experienced opponents.

"If I was ever going to do anything I needed to start playing against blokes who had been around the block a bit. I wanted and needed to be thrown in at the deep end. I needed to move up a level and to find some rugby where it would be tough and rough --- and I certainly found that at Doncaster, I can tell you.

"They were a great set of lads and there was a great team spirit and I enjoyed being part of the Doncaster dressing room.

"But there were things going on at the club off the field --- they have surfaced since with all the recent changes there --- and 1 didn't feel right about signing permanently once my year's loan with them was up.

"It was good to get to the semi-final of the Northern Rail Cup and I was really chuffed when I got the chance to play against two of my greatest rugby league role models in Barrie McDermott and Terry O'Connor, who were then in the same division with Widnes."

"Barrie Mac might not know it, but he has been a great influence on my career because he used to be my favourite player and I always took the opportunity to watch him when he was starring with Leeds and Great Britain.

"He was my sort of prop -- rough, tough and played like he loved every second of it. That's what I am trying to do."

Having decided Doncaster wasn't for him, it was back to Bradford for our hero 'Tonka'. In the meantime, Noble had moved out to join Wigan and Tony's former academy boss, McNamara; was now head coach.

He hadn't been back long when he was disappointed to learn that he didn't fit into the new Bulls boss's long-term plans.

Telling the story in his own straight-talking, matter-of-fact way, Tony went on: "I think Steve was under the impression I was going to sign permanently for Doncaster. Apparently, I didn't fit into his plans -- that happens sometimes, it's sport.

"He had coached me in the academy, though, and we were real good friends. I figured it was time to move on rather than fall out with him and perhaps lose a friend. I didn't want to do that. And it didn't happen. We are still good mates."

The decision having been made, Tony spoke to his agent, who set the wheels in motion. Dewsbury and York were interested initially and there was a chance to play in France, too.

"But I knew what I had to do as soon as I spoke to Deaks (Oldham coach Steve Deakin) and to Chris Hamilton and Bill Quinn. They had clearly-defined short term and long-term goals for the club and I liked that. I saw it, like they did, as a challenge.

"One of the short-term goals was to win promotion this season. I want to help the club to do that and then see what comes out of it for next year. We have a good chance of going up via the playoffs.

"Losing to Celtic Crusaders last week was a disappointment in some respects, but Deaks stressed to us afterwards that we hadn't played badly and that we had to move on with heads held high to the next two games against Swinton and London Skolars.


"We are all looking forward to those next two games. We mustn't look back. We've got to look forward, remain positive, make sure we all perform our various roles to the best of our ability and if we do all of those things I'm sure we will be all right.

"The team we have on paper is as good as anything in this division so long as the 17 players on duty for any given game go out and perform to the best of their ability."

Whatever lies in store over the next few weeks it's going to be an exciting -- perhaps scary --- time for everyone at the club.

But Tony has another big event coming up which is likely to change his live for ever just about the time the play-offs will be getting under way. His girl friend Gemma is expecting their child, due on September 10.

Will this latest little Tonks be a prop in the making? If it's a boy, he's got to be  $\dots$  surely.


Following on from the hugely successful BBC TV series *The Lost World of Mitchell & Kenyon* this newly released DVD includes much of that sports footage. Taken between 1901 and 1907 it features the titans of rugby league, association football and cricket, as well as rediscovering the Corinthian spirit of amateur sport and leisure of Edwardian life.

Whilst it includes most of the big clubs in rugby league and association football alongside that footage sits scenes of a swimming gala in the harbour at North Shields, the AAA Championships of 1901, the Mold cricket controversy – an early 'chucking' storm with an Australian umpire at its centre, the Manchester to Blackpool road race plus a trotting competition at Sprigfield Park, Wigan – do you remember Charlie McAlister making his Oldham debut there?

The 'voice-over' from Adrian Childs brings it all to life.

### with Ian Wilson roughyeds

### Now that we have had our first day out at the new Wembley stadium, it is perhaps time to have a look at the future of the Challenge Cup competition.

I must first say that I personally very much League competition itself. However, no one enjoyed the visit to Wembley. Like lots of others, I took a park and ride option, and was really impressed with the ease of access via Wembley Stadium train station, and even more with the efficiency of the departure arrangements after the game. Good escalator systems, excellent views and even clean and plentiful toilets clearly differentiated the new Wembley from the old too! I had gone there willing to be persuaded that we should return to Cardiff as soon as we contractually can - and certainly the disadvantage of the borough of Brent as an overall location compared to the city centre one is very clear. However, I think I am now happy to settle for the Cup Final at Wembley, and a separate weekend out in Cardiff - see below.

As for the game itself, the Catalans' defence was superb, but they spoilt any chance of beating what was a slightly below par Saints side by very disappointing handling close to their opponents' line. The outcome was that, although the game was more competitive than Huddersfield were able to make it in '06, there was rarely any doubt, especially after Saints' try on the stroke of half-time, as to who would emerge as winners. A great pity, since the day deserved a nail-biter of a contest.

But what of the future? I think there is no doubt that the competition has lost something of its lustre, partly because of the chasm which now exists between full-timers and part-timers, and partly because of the strength of the Super

could doubt either, observing the sundrenched thousands strolling to last week's final, that there is a massive tradition involved. and a huge reservoir of goodwill, so that we need to be very careful not to destroy what we have in attempting to change it at the margin

In order to minimise the number of early-round mismatches, I would do two things. There should be more amateur-only knock-out rounds, so that only the very top amateur teams are left by the time the National League and overseas semi-pro sides come in. And there should also be more rounds before Super League sides enter, so that only the very best non-SL sides are left to draw their supposed betters.

In 2008, that would mean a non-SL competition right down to the last 4, to go with the 12 S-L sides, though after that it would need further rethinking, if Super League is to be expanded

As to how the crowds in the later stages of the competition can be boosted, how about the Millennium Magic weekend being the 4 cup quarter-finals? Two games per day over a weekend, with the prize for victory being cup semi-final places - and increase the financial incentives too - and I reckon the magic of the cup could be restored in a stroke, as well as the Cardiff stadium sold out and the Cardiff pubs drunk dry! Worth a try?

### Carnesie sreat student run Taking support beyond boundaries


When Leeds Met launched the Carnegie Great Student Run 2007, leading the way was former Widnes, Wigan and GB star Joe Lydon.

#### HE MEN WHO CARRY ROUGHYEDS' HOPES AND AMBITIONS INTO 2007

ASHTON, Paul (half-back): Aged 27, Paul learned his trade at Saddleworth before playing for Halifax, Rochdale, Keighley and Swinton. Got his big chance at Oldham in 2006, initially on a week-to-week basis, and did enough to earn a full contract for 2007. Can play at scrumhalf or stand-off.

BAINES, Chris (back-row): A young forward who also did enough for coach Steve Deakin last year, while on loan from Warrington, to win a contract for the latter part of 2006 and then for 2007. Toured New Zealand with Great Britain Young Lions in 2003. Product of Chorley Panthers and Wigan St Pars.

BOULTS, Jason (prop): One of many new boys in the Roughyeds squad for 2007, 23-year-old Jason arrived on the recommendation of two of his former Halifax team mates, Jamie Bloem and Alan Hadcroft. Spent four years as a young pro with Bradford and then had two seasons at The Shay, missing only a handful of games.

COSTIN, Geno (prop or back-row): A 22-yearold Aussie, Geno first established himself in the Queensland Cup with Wynnum-Manly, but last year played in the same comp for Logan Souths. A rugby workaholic, he puts in overtime on defence and, in possession, always runs strong and straight.

CRABTREE, Andy (hooker): Won Great Britain academy honours in his Wigan Warriors days. Came from Swinton this year. A tidy footballer with good hands and game awareness, he can also play loose-forward. Alert and alive at dummy half.

FORD, Byron (winger): Cook Island international signed on loan from Hull KR in mid-August to the end of the season. A prolific try scorer, he totalled six in his first four outings for Roughyeds and on the strength of that was named in the Rugby League World NL2 form team for August.

GOREY, Andy (winger): A scrum-half in his Royton Tigers days, Andy became a good full-back in the former Roughyeds academy side. It was as a winger, however, that he finished 2006 as the club's top try scorer with ten --- no mean feat in a losing side.

HODSON, lan (back-row): Initially rejected new offer for 2007 due to work commitments, but the Roughyeds door remained open and he resigned in March after playing the odd game or two for Tyldesley RU Club. One of the club's better performers in 2006, he always gave maximum input, even when asked to play at stand-off.

HOUSTON, Drew (second-row or centre): Once a youngster linked with Melbourne Storm, Drew had two seasons in the Queensland Cup with Storm feeder club Brisbane Norths before heading south to join Dapto whom he helped to become champions of the Illawarra competition last year.

HOYLE, Simeon (hooker): Formerly with Keighley and Halifax, Simeon is a hooker of the old school --tough in defence yet able to make things happen from dummy half. Helped Keighley to win promotion in 2003 in the same team as Paul Ashton, Richard Mervill and lan

HUGHES, Adam (centre): The massively experienced 29-year-old boasts over 150 Super League appearances during spells with Leeds, Wakefield, Halifax, Widnes and Leigh. A powerful, pacy centre who knows where the try line is, he signed for Oldham in preference to several other clubs.

LANGLEY, Gareth (winger): Pacy, and a good finisher, 'Gaz' joined Roughyeds this year after five years at St Helens. He was Saints academy player of the year in 2005 and runner-up in 2006. Played at Salford as a teenager before joining his hometown club at Knowsley Road.

LITTLER, Craig (centre): Another Saints old boy, Craig was Langley's centre for four years at Knowsley Road. A year younger, he had the chance of another year with St Heiens academy, but opted to sign for Roughyeds and continue his centre-wing partnership with Langley.

MERVILL, Richard (prop): Formerly with Halifax and Keighley, Richard joined Roughyeds for 2007 after playing Down Under in the same Dapto side as Drew Houston. Suffered a broken hand in one of his early games for Roughyeds, but goes into Co-Operative NL2 action in a good seam of form.

MORTON, Gareth (centre): Accomplished goalkicker, followed his Hull KR team mate Byron Ford to Oldham on loan in mid-August. Signed until September 16, when he leaves to play RU in Italy. Former Leeds Rhinos youngster and Borders (Scotland) RU player. Dual code international.

O'CONNOR, Paul (full-back): Signed for hometown Widnes after winning students' international honours for Ireland and for Great Britain. Looked good in three loan games for Roughyeds in 2006 and returned on a more permanent basis in 2007, although he will be away for 14 weeks on a pre-arranged trip Down Under.

OLDHAM, Stuart (winger): Formerly with St Helens and Swinton, Stuart played his first serious rugby with Sedgley Park and Liverpool St Helens RU clubs before switching codes to join Saints. Had two seasons with Swinton and became one of six Lions to sign for Roughyeds for 2007.

ONYANGO, Lucas (winger): A real flier, aged 25, Lucas grew up in rugby union in his native Kenya. Has played for Sale Sharks, Manchester and Leigh in Union, and also Widnes Vikings in League. Did well at Vikings before damaging a knee. Over that now and keen to make the most of his chance at Oldham.

ROBINSON, Adam (second row): A tough and uncompromising player who relishes his defensive duties, the 20 year-old Yorkshireman turned down Featherstone in order to sign for the Roughyeds from Doncaster. Formerly of the Stanley Rangers amateur club, he started his professional career at Wakefield.

RODEN, Neil (half-back): Neil rejoined Roughyeds from Leigh for 2007 after leaving the club initially to go to Batley in 2004. In his first stint here he scored 290 points (68 tries and 18 drop goals) in 142 games over four and a half seasons. Has overtaken Mark Sibson as the 'new' club's leading all-time try score.

ROGERS, Wes (prop): Aged 29, and club captain. Like Neil Roden and Ian Sinfield, has rejoined Roughyeds for a second spell. Signed for Widnes as a 15-year-old, then had three years at Swinton, one here, three at Rochdale and three more at Swinton before coming "home" for 2007.

SANDERSON, Lee (halfback, hooker): Signed in March after a difficult period with Barrow. Roughyeds paid an undisclosed transfer fee for the Leigh lad, whose uncle, lan, was an accomplished Oldham hooker in Watersheddings days. Lee has previously played for Leigh, London Broncos, Rochdale and Barrow.

SINFIELD, Ian (back-row): Another experienced forward who has returned to his hometown club for a second stint. Brother of Leeds captain, Kevin Sinfield, Ian played in the first ever Roughyeds game at Rochdale on New Year's Day, 1998. Had four years here, then moved on to Rochdale, Keighley and Swinton.

SMITH, Kris (back-row or centre): Kris, aged 28, has been on the books of four Super League clubs, namely Leeds, Salford, London and Halifax. A product of the Eccles amateur club, he was snapped up by Leeds while still a teenager. Joined Roughyeds after four seasons at Swinton.

STEVENS, Warren (prop): A beat-the-deadline capture in August, he has made more than 100 Super League appearances, mainly with Warrington Wolves. Vastly experienced frontrower, who has also played in SL with Leigh and Salford. Signed until end of the season.

STOUT, Michael (second-row or centre): Signed from Swinton, Michael has a good turn of speed for a forward and likes to use it while breaking wide out. Played at academy level for both Warrington and Widnes. Chose to join Oldham after rejecting a Swinton offer for 2007.

TAMGHART, Said (utility): A French international, Said has represented his country at every level, including full Test matches against Australia and New Zealand. Came under Steve Deakin's influence when both were at UTC, better known now as Perpignan-based Catalans Dragons.

TONKS, Tony (prop): Roughyeds have high hopes of the 22-year-old Yorkshireman, signed from Bradford Bulls just prior to the start of the Co-Operative NL2 season. One year at Wakefield academy, then six at Bulls as a full-time pro, including last season on loan at Doncaster.

WILKINSON, Alex (centre, wing): Played his early rugby with Royton Tigers and toured with GB schoolboys to Australia in 1999 and with England academy to New Zealand and Australia in 2001. While a young pro at Bradford Bulls, he had loan spells with London Broncos, Huddersfield and Hull before going part-time with Roughyeds to continue his studies.

Of those Craig Farrimond has again been hit by serious injury, Chris Hough has gone on loan to Leigh, Mark Ogden has returned to Australia, Adam Sharples only appeared as sub in the very early Cup games , Desi Williams has not played since May and Chris Campbell has not turned out at



all having work problems and playing amateur rugby in Warrington until signing for Rochdale late in the season when Shaun Gartland took over coaching responsibilities.

Gareth Hayes on the other hand has been an ever present.

### The final frontier

THIS weekend sees the final round of regular season fixtures, with a host of issues still to be decided in both Co-operative NL1 and NL2.

The midweek matches will also have a crucial role to play, particularly in NL2, where Swinton Lions and Hunslet Hawks are vying for the final play-off place along with London Skolars.

Swinton travel to Oldham and Hunslet host Gateshead on Wednesday night, with the Lions one point ahead going into those matches.

On Sunday, Swinton are at home to Workington, while the Hawks entertain Keighley.

Either the Lions or Hunslet are favourites to clinch seventh place at present, but any late season jitters could still see Skolars sneak in.

Above those teams. Celtic Crusaders are looking to clinch the NL2 title and automatic promotion by winning away at Gateshead Thunder.

The Welsh outfit are already being linked with a host of impressive potential signings should they achieve their aim, though Thunder are out to spoil the party.

If the Crusaders stumble at the final hurdle, Featherstone could nip in and steal top spot though they face a difficult trip to Barrow.

The Raiders have issues of their own, as they are bidding to head off a late challenge from Oldham for third place.

In NL1, Castleford Tigers will seal first place and home advantage in their opening play-off game if they win at relegated Rochdale.

Widnes Vikings, their only remaining challengers for the Minor Premiership, have an away trip to Batley Bulldogs, who could still have an unlikely play-off place to play for.

That will depend on Thursday night's match between Sheffield and Whitehaven - if the Eagles win, Batley are out of the race.

Dewsbury Rams are also in contention for sixth at present, and they travel to Leigh guaranteed to finish fifth - on Sunday.

Haven have to beat Sheffield to assure themselves of third place in NL1, with Halifax poised for any late slip-ups ahead of their home game with Doncaster.

The Dons, along with Rochdale, are already confirmed as dropping down to NL2 for next season in the one key issue that is already

Both clubs will be keen to use relegation to rebuild in NL2, and are expected to be among the front runners in 2008.

This weekend, however, is all about 2007 - and there is still much to be settled ahead of the fascinating play-offs.

He goes to most home games, often with his seven year old daughter Sophie, and sometimes he gets to away matches, too.



> Having already beaten the Roughyeds in two of the three games the teams have lined up against each other this season. Paul Kidd's men are a capable lot.


> They have shown as much in clambering back into a play-off spot, despite being deducted six points earlier in the campaign.
