It shows how much respect they have for Kevin and how highly they regard their skipper and their mate. It's a real feel-good factor.


It has been great for the whole club to have our international players back this week in training. The younger players love having them here, because they know they are going to learn off them.





TEN YEARS AT THE TOP

KEVIN SINFIELD -ADEOFACHIEVEMENT

EVER SINCE KEVIN MADE HIS RHINOS DEBUT MORE THAN TEN YEARS AGO. IT SEEMS HE HAS ALWAYS BEEN DESTINED FOR GREATNESS...

1997

Aged 16 years and 346 days old. Kevin Sinfield makes his debut against Sheffield Eagles at Headingley Carnegie in Super League II. Head Coach Dean Bell is in his second season at the club as the newly named Rhinos head for a mid-table finish after flirting with relegation a year earlier. Leeds lost 22-24 to the Eagles.

1998

Sinfield makes his third appearance for the club in the 72-16 win over Huddersfield Giants and scored his first try for the club at McAlpine Stadium.

1999

Sinfield makes his first appearance in the Challenge Cup when he stars in the Rhinos win over Widnes at Halton Stadium in the Quarter Final of the competition. Sinfield scored two tries and set up another two in the 46-10 win. He

missed out on selection

for the Wembley Cup Final but went on to make a total of 21 appearances that season, nine of which were in the starting line up.

2000

2001 SEASON

Although Sinfield became an established member of the first team squad making 26 appearances including 19 starts under new coach Dean Lance, there was disappointment when he was overlooked for the Challenge Cup Final at Murrayfield against Bradford. The year ended on

a high when Sinfield was selected for England's World Cup campaign for his international debut.

2001

An eventful year for the Rhinos as Dean Lance was replaced by Daryl Powell and captain lestyn Harris left the club. Another year of

progress



for Sinfield as he played for Lancashire and England before making his Great Britain debut against Australia.

2002


Sinfield played in Australia for the first time in the ill-fated one off test against the Kangaroos in Sydney however he also played twice in the Test series against New Zealand. He was now a first choice for the Rhinos starting line up with 30 appearances.

2003

Sinfield becomes the youngest ever Leeds captain when Daryl Powell appoints him to take over



becomes the club's first choice goal kicker following the departure of Ben Walker. Sinfield kicks a



touchline conversion to take the Challenge Cup semi final against St Helens to extra time. The Rhinos win the greatest Cup game ever in the club's history but suffer heartbreak at Millennium Stadium against Bradford in the final.

2004

Sinfield becomes the first Leeds captain to win a Championship in 32 years as he leads the Rhinos to Grand Final glory at Old Trafford against Bradford Bulls. He finished the Super League season as top goal and points scorer in Super League but was remarkably overlooked for the Great Britain squad.



2005

Another first for Sinfield as he lifts the Carnegie World Club Challenge for the first time in the club's history at Elland Road. He also led his team to the Challenge Cup Final at Cardiff against Hull and the Grand Final return match against Bradford but bitter defeat followed in both. It was a personal year of achievement for Sinfield though as he picked up the Lance Todd Trophy at the Millennium Stadium and was named Leeds Rhinos Player of the Year.

2006

A frustrating season for the Rhinos and their captain. Having suffered a broken bone in his hand, he was ruled out for a spell in the season and defeat to Huddersfield and Warrington ended the Rhinos chances of picking up silverware.

2007

Sinfield becomes the first Leeds captain ever to win two Championships as he leads his team to Grand Final glory at St Helens with the finest Final display the club has ever produced, beating the Carnegie Challenge Cup winners 33-6 at Old Trafford. Sinfield was named in the Super League Dream Team and returned to the Great Britain squad under new coach Tony Smith.

LEEDS FANS HAVE GOT MORE THAN ONE REASON TO THANK IAN SINFIELD. THE OLDER BROTHER OF RHINOS SKIPPER KEVIN WAS THE MAN WHO FIRST INTRODUCED THE FUTURE GREAT BRITAIN STAR TO THE GAME AND ALSO, INADVERTENTLY, PLAYED A PART IN HIM MAKING HIS FIRST APPEARANCE FOR THE RHINOS.

Ian will miss this afternoon's game against his home town club after leaving Oldham in the close season for Rochdale, who play Blackpool in a pre-season friendly this afternoon. However, his thoughts will certainly be with his brother on a day when Rhinos fans can honour their skipper and he has come a long way since he had to borrow a pair of boots to play his first game.

"I started playing when I was nine for Oldham Juniors and I remember someone said to me that the Under 8s were short of players. I asked if my little brother could play, Kevin was only five and a half but he was keen to play. He had to borrow a pair of boots off a mate of mine and stuff newspaper in the toe so they fitted him but he took to it straight away. It helped that he played the game for a couple of years and by the time he was 7 or 8 he was already sticking out as a very skilful player.

"Although I am three and half years older than him, he actually agreed to sign professionally before me. I remember coming home one day and Doug Laughton was in our

front room agreeing the contract. There was a lot of hype at the time about Lancashire clubs and the star names they were signing but I think Kevin was sold on the way Leeds wanted to bring through young players and give them a chance. I signed for Salford after that but we have only played against each other once.

"Two years after I signed for Salford, I was playing for the A team at Headingley Carnegie against Leeds. My mum and dad and Kevin had come across to watch me play. Leeds


had a late injury and someone asked me if Kevin was at the game. They went and found him and he was put on the bench for the A team for his first game at that level. He came on and set up two tries and a couple of

weeks later that led to him making his debut. All the Salford lads were saying 'Lets smash this young lad' and the whole

> time I'm thinking 'Hang on, that's my kid brother!" joked Sinfield.

Despite being the older sibling, when it comes to rugby lan is more than happy to take the advice of his younger



brother. He added, "He is a role model for any young player coming into the game. He is more like a big brother to me when it comes to rugby. I go to him for advice and he always gives me the right answer. He has had so many ups and downs in his career but he always bounces back stronger. He has missed out on Cup Final teams and Great Britain call ups but that only makes him a stronger character."

Headingley Carnegie obviously holds special memories for Kevin Sinfield but for his brother the venue is tinged with disappointment after last year's Co-operative National League Two Grand Final defeat to Featherstone. Sinfield was part of the Oldham team that day and he says they just failed to perform on the day, he added, "It was a big disappointment for us. We were playing outstanding rugby in the build up to the game but on the day, anything that could go wrong, did go wrong. Credit to Featherstone, they deserved the win on the day. Kevin and I are very proud to come from Oldham and of our home town club. We were both ballboys at the club and grew up as Oldham supporters. I am sure the Testimonial game will be a fantastic occasion and it is a great choice of opposition," added Sinfield.



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

Mr Consistent

Kevin Sinfield is the only Leeds player in the history of the club to play and score in every match during a season, which he achieved in 2007.

That made him one of only two players to have scored in every round of Super League in a season. Wigan Warriors' Andrew Farrell did it twice in 1998 and 2001.

Kevin has twice finished as top Super League goal scorer at the end of the season, in: 2004... 132 (3) 2007... 114 (1)

He also finished as top Super League point scorer in 2004 with 277 (4t, 129g, 3dg).

Heading for the top

Kevin is the third highest points scorer in the club's history with 1707 points so far in his career. Lewis Jones (1952-64) leads the way with 2920, then Joe Thompson (1923-33) with 1883, just 176 points ahead of Sinfield.

Captains

Kevin Sinfield became the first Leeds captain to lead the club to two Championships. Below is a list of the men who have captained the club in major finals during the post-war years.




Ellery Hanley (1991-95)

Architect of getting Leeds back into the big time, the club's most expensive signing and Assistant Coach, took them to consecutive Wembley appearances after a near generation away. Redefined the phrase 'leading by example'; his all action displays, prodigious defence, incredible professionalism and phenomenal try scoring feats at the end of an already glittering career were the highlights of the Doug Laughton era. Only Wigan's pre-eminence prevented the ceaseless effort turning into silverware.

Lewis Jones (1952-64)

The perfect foil for centre partner McLellan, he inherited the skipper's role and led the side to their greatest triumph to date when he finally raised the





Championship Trophy in 1961, for the first time in the club's illustrious history. Scored the crowning try at Odsal that never to be forgotten afternoon and became one of only two players, along with Don Robinson, to own Cup and Title winners medals in a Leeds shirt. The icon of a generation and still venerated, his scoring records are unsurpassed.

David Ward (1971-87)

If ever a player exemplified what it meant to be the figurehead of the club, then it was hooker David Ward. His pride, passion and immense desire ensured that those around him constantly gave their best and the fans their backing. Being given the job was the making of him and his finest hours were at Wembley in 1977 and the following year when

his drop goal after half time against St Helens began the then greatest comeback in Cup final history. Exceptional in bringing home the 1979 Premiership and courageous in taking his men to John Player triumph in 1984.



STEVE DEAKIN'S MEN OSTENSIBLY BEGIN 2008 WHERE THEY ENDED 2007, AT HEADINGLEY CARNEGIE STADIUM. ALTHOUGH BEATEN HERE BY FEATHERSTONE ROVERS IN THE CO-OPERATIVE NATIONAL LEAGUE TWO PLAY OFF FINAL IN OCTOBER, THE MATCH – AND THE HOST OF ROUGHYED FANS WHO CAME OVER THE HILL TO SUPPORT THEM – PUT THE MEN ORIGINALLY FROM THE WATERSHEDDINGS, BACK ON THE MAP.

After the most torrid season in the famous club's history in 2006, when they were relegated without winning a game and, more importantly, staved off winding up orders; their reemergence in the second half of last season was one of the sport's great success stories.

Their playing record from the end of July was superb, losing only one match in twelve in their run to the decider and that to eventual champions Celtic Crusaders. Having come so close to promotion, Oldham - along with Ellery Hanley's Doncaster - are favourites to go up this year, not least because of a wholesale revamping of the squad that has seen an influx of seasoned professionals, the majority of whom have significant Super League experience.

The highest profile capture and

perhaps the biggest surprise was the persuading of ex-Rhinos cup winning three-quarter, Marcus St Hilaire to drop two divisions, after a successful season with Bradford. He played 25 times for the Bulls last year, including scoring an Easter Thursday try against Leeds, and in all has appeared in just over 200 games in the top flight in a career that has also included home town club Huddersfield.


Similarly experienced, Daryl Cardiss, has overcome some serious injury setbacks since entering the elite division at Wigan in 1996 and subsequently played Super League at Halifax and Warrington. Versatile enough to cover any of the back roles and a highly elusive runner, he arrives from Widnes.


He travels over with another sensational capture, that of centre Mick Nanyn, who has re-written the Vikings' points scoring records over the past two campaigns. A prodigious goal kicker; he topped the tries, goals and points for National League One in 2007.

TODAY'S OPPONENTS

In all competitions, he ended last year ahead of Kevin Sinfield with 161 successful two-pointers, his overall tally of 434 points more than a hundred ahead of his nearest rival. One of the most powerful midfield runners around, he looks set to wreak havoc in his new surroundings and has






the added incentive of a World Cup place beckoning at the end of year having played a key role in Scotland's qualification.

Hooker or loose forward Phil Joseph just missed out on the autumn extravaganza down under when Wales just lost out in the battle of the Celts. Strong and dynamic, he made his name at Huddersfield, playing 13 times in Super League in 2004 before moving to Swinton and then Halifax, scoring nine tries in 28 appearances for the Shay men last year.

Simon Baldwin also played at 'Fax when they were last in Super League and has had spells with Sheffield and Salford at the elite level. The hard working back rower joins from Whitehaven.

Centre Danny Halliwell has seen Super League action with five clubs since making the grade, also at Halifax, in 2000. Wakefield, Warrington, Leigh and Salford – where he joins from – are also on his CV.

Half back or hooker Matty Brooks came through the Academy ranks at Bradford before



moving back to his home city Hull. He came on loan from Hull Kingston Rovers last season and helped spark the Oldham revival and has now signed full time. He is likely to face competition for the scrum half berth from exciting ex-Wigan junior James Coyle, who has just signed a contract extension to 2009.


Tommy Goulden, who was one of Rochdale's standout's last year and Leigh's Tommy Grundy have also joined the new look Roughyeds. The bulk of the side that took the fight to Fev have also been retained, although exciting winger Lucas Onyango, who raced in for 18 tries in 23 games, will miss the first three months of the season after recently undergoing shoulder surgery.

Among the fulsome ranks are explosive winger Byron Ford, who played a defining role in getting Hull K.R. into Super League in 2006; much travelled, robust enforcer Rob Roberts; former Leeds Academy full back lain Gordon and ex-Bradford junior, classy centre Alex Wilkinson




who also played Super League at London, Huddersfield and Hull. Young, goal kicking full back Gareth Langley is one to watch and wily stand off Neil Roden pulls the strings.

Of the dozen who have left Boundary Park, 2006 top scorer Adam Hughes – who



Oldham have also bolstered their ranks behind the scenes, with the recruitment of former Hunslet coach Mark Cass as charismatic Steve Deakin's new assistant. 
