



WELL DONE CHRIS -REWARD FOR A DECADE OF TRUE GRIT IN THE SERVICE **OF ROUGHYEDS**

EVERYONE at the Roughyeds has been celebrating the election of Chris Hamilton into the role of vice-president of the Rugby Football League.

The club's chief executive and former chairman, a founder member of OldhamRLFC (1997) Ltd, was honoured by his fellow Rugby League Council members at the annual general meeting of the RFL in Warrington

Kevin Nicholas, the Batley chairman, becomes the new president and Chris

will be his right-hand man for the next 17 months before succeeding him as president in July, 2009.

"This is a tremendous honour for the club and also for the people who have supported me in my efforts on behalf of Oldham Rugby League Club over the past ten years," said 45-year-old Chris.

"They are too many to name personally, but I must mention my partner

Gillian and my fellow director Sean Whitehead, both of whom have been withme over many long years. There are many, many other people, too, and their backing and support has always been, and always will be, deeply appreciated.

"A lot of sacrifices have had to be made over those years just to make sure we had a rugby league club, and I will forever be grateful to those people who have stuck with us through thick and thin.

"From a personal point of view it is obviously very nice to be recognised in this way and very nice to know that I have the support of people within a sport that I love. I have only to look back at the contributions of people who have held similar roles at RFL level to know I have much to live up to. That puts it very much into perspective for me.

"But my appointment is more about our club than anything else. It is an honour for Oldham RLFC (1997) Ltd and recognition for all the many battles that we board, players, fans, coaches, staff - have won both on and off the field over the past decade."

Arguably the greatest of those battles was keeping the club alive in 2005 and 2006 when, with Sean Whitehead by his side. Chris spearheaded the fight to keep his beloved Roughyeds in business despite an Inland Revenue winding-up order and debts which, with penalties and interest, ultimately totalled £250,000.

They met those liabilities without going into insolvency measures to earn the admiration of many in the sport's corridors of power at the RFL, not to mention the admiration of the new owner and chairman Bill Quinn, who joined the club a little more than a year ago with a pledge to take it forward to new levels.

As full-time chief executive Chris Hamilton is still playing a leading role in the club he founded with three other directors in the autumn of 1997 following the demise and liquidation of Oldham Bears. Even in the darkest days and hours of 2006 Chris and Sean were determined that would not happen again to the new

Chris has been the new club's RL Council rep ever since those early days of 1997 when he was very much the new boy at League HO. And commenting further on his appointment he said: "I am privileged to have had the chance

to contribute a little bit to our great game."

He has contributed more than "a little bit". A founder member of Oldham RLFC (1997) Ltd. he was chairman for more than nine years. He has been, and still is, chief executive of the club from day one.

He has been the club's RL Council rep, and still is, from day one; and he has also filled several roles at League level over the past few years.

He was deputy chairman and then chairman of FASDA (the first and second divisions association) and then FASDA's rep on the Operational Board of the RFL bodies which are no longer in existence.

He was also a member of the RFL board (now constituted in a different way with members who are independent of clubs).

On the playing side he was England manager for a game against Wales a Wrexham in 2001: National League under-21s manager in 2003 with Steve McCormack as coach; and National League manager in 2004 with Karl Harrison as coach.

When Chris becomes president of the RFL in 2009 he will be the first Oldham official to have held the post in its present format and the first in its previous format since Frank Ridgeway was chairman of the RL Council in 1958-59, then representing the former Oldham club. Well done, Chris - it's an honour fully deserved by a man whose true grit over the last ten years has ensured that professional rugby league is still alive and kicking in Oldham.

Tonight's match is the first since we played the same opponents, Salford City Reds, away two weeks ago.

The Oldham club has a successful track record of doing this in the past with the likes of Lee Doran, Gavin Dodd, Adam Sharples, Andy Gorey and Danny Nanyn amongst others to have come up through the ranks and played first team rugby. We are currently finalising negotiations for

our home ground for these matches - which is always subject to the minimum standards set out by the RFL and will hopefully have more news on that front in the next few days.

As ever, once the season starts, we are continually busy with our focus being matches each week and tonight is a big challenge for the team so please show your support for their efforts and please get behind them - it really does make a difference.

OLDHAM'S LINK WITH CHELTENHAM FESTIVAL SPANS 100 YEARS OF 'GOLD CUP' HISTORY

Roughyeds officials at green plaque ceremony to commemorate New Zealand's epic first tour by ROGER HALSTEAD



A Cheltenham Festival with a difference is coming up in May... one that isn't about turf, silks and thoroughbreds but about rugby, history and the prestige of Oldham Rugby League Club in Victorian and Edwardian England.

The Cheltenham RUGBY Festival will be held on Friday, May 2 in the beautiful Regency town's council-owned Prince of Wales Stadium and will comprise two separate competitions for the All Golds Cup and the 1908 Cup.

Both trophies have been commissioned by Cheltenham Borough Council, the Tourist Board and the Gloucestershire County Rugby League in partnership with the local Civic Society and with the full support of Gloucestershire Warriors RL Club and Cheltenham RUFC, whose home base is the Prince of Wales Stadium.

It is purposely called the RUGBY Festival (not League, not Union, simply RUGBY), but both competitions will be nine-a-side events and played to rugby league rules. The All Golds Cup, competed for by eight as yet unnamed senior teams, is named in honour of the famous New Zealand touring side that beat the Northern Union (England) 8-5 in Cheltenham on February 15, 1908 to win the first-ever rugby league Test series in this country by two Tests to one.

A century later, the player of the floodlit tournament will receive the William 'Massa' Johnston award, named in honour of the New Zealand forward who scored the winning try for the All Golds in the last few minutes of the game.

Competing for the 1908 Cup over the afternoon of May 2 will be eight schools from the Gloucester-Cheltenham area and the top player in that tournament will receive the Arthur Smith Award in memory of the Oldham and Northern Union (England) player of that name, who was born in Gloucestershire and who was one of three Oldham players in the England team beaten by the All Golds.

This latest initiative to recognise Cheltenham's role in rugby history was announced after the unveiling of a green plaque last Friday (February 15) on the site of the former ground in St John's Avenue, the Athletic Ground, where the famous Test took place exactly 100 years ago to the day.

Oldham had three players in the Northern Union side, more than any other club. They were Arthur Smith, who had been signed from Cinderford in Gloucestershire; stand-off Tom White, another West Country man who made 224 appearances for Oldham; and Oldhamborn winger George Tyson, who topped the Oldham try-scoring charts for three years in a row between 1907 and 1909.

Arthur Smith earned the nickname 'Mad'. He signed for Oldham iln 1905 and his 247 appearances in the red and white hoops of Oldham produced 21 tries. He played in all three Tests against the All Golds in 1908.

In the Cheltenham crowd for the third Test was

English RU international Alf Wood. He was recognised and approached by a delegation from Watersheddings and he signed for the start of the 1908-09 season, going on to play 244 times for the Roughyeds during which time he kicked 342 goals in a 12-year career.

The Oldham link didn't finish there. Referee for the Test was former Oldham player Bill McCutcheon, who later became a leading official of the Watersheddings club and the club president.

The trip to Cheltenham was indeed a fruitful one for the Oldham contingent who, immediately after the match, signed the All Golds vice-captain George W Smith. He had been to England on the 1905 All Blacks tour and it was then that he became interested in the Northern Union game, or Rugby League as we know it today.

One of New Zealand's top all-round sportsmen, George settled in Oldham and lived out his life here. His last surviving daughter, who lived in Royton, died only three or four years ago.

The Oldham club was invited to last Friday's ceremony to reflect the club's "outstanding contribution to this historic occasion" and so it was that Roughyeds chairman Bill Quinn and chief executive Chris Hamilton headed the local delegation.

Chris, who had been elected to the role of Rugby Football League vice-president only two days earlier, was one of several invited guests to make an address at the unveiling ceremony. He spoke eloquently of the Oldham club's contribution to the first Test series to be held in England and made the point that today's officials were privileged to represent Roughyeds on such a historical occasion.

The unveiling was carried out by Kevin Nicholas of Batley, new president of the RFL, and the New Zealand Rugby League's rep, Brad Tindall.

Many other civic, parliamentary and sporting dignitaries were present while former Great Britain international forward Denis Betts, now on the coaching staff at Gloucester RU club, turned up later.

The recurring theme throughout the speeches was the sheer scale of the achievement of the New Zealand tourists, who sailed for ten weeks to get here after being kicked out of the game at home for accepting money to play. They didn't even know the rules of the 'new' code.

Tony Collins, professor of the Social History of Sport at Leeds Met. Carnegie University, said the All-Golds' adventure "was unparalleled in sport" and ensured that rugby league would become established in New Zealand from a position of strength.

Despite the tragic dealth from pneumonia on the way home of tour organiser Albert Baskerville, the tourists helped to establish rugby league in Australia.

What the plaque says:

"Here until 1982 was the Athletic Ground, home to Cheltenham Rugby (Union) club. World rugby history was made on February 15, 1908 when the pioneering rugby league touring side, the New Zealand All-Golds defeated the Northern Union (England) 8-5 to win the first-ever rugby league Test match series.

"Born in 1883, Albert Henry Baskerville from Wellington, New Zealand, was the prime advocate and organiser of the ground breaking tour by the All Golds to England. The team returned home via Australia where the first ever Test match between the two countries was played on May 9, 1908 in Sydney.

"New Zealand won 11-10, Baskerville playing a leading role. Shortly afterwards, he contracted pneumonia and died on May 20, 1908."

BORN TO BE A RUGBY LEAGUE HALF-BACK...

...and tough enough for the Paras!

Player Profile: JAMES COYLE

James Coyle, the Roughyeds' talented No 7, was born to be a rugby league half-back.

When your grandad and your dad, both called Bernard, played for Wigan at scrum-half it's a fair bet you are going to follow in the family footsteps and maintain the Coyle tradition.

The third generation Coyle did exactly that ... and to maintain consistency and further increase the chances of the dynasty stretching to a fourth generation in years to come there is yet another Coyle, James's 19-year-old

brother Thomas, currently playing at scrum-half for the Warriors.


Big brother James, just 22, has been there, done that and worn the Warriors tee-shirt. Now, he has left full-time rugby behind and. instead, he is studying for a degree in civil engineering, working full time for British Nuclear Fuels at Risley, near Warrington and playing part-time rugby league for the Roughyeds.

And what does "part time" rugby involve? Training in Oldham three nights a week and on Saturday mornings, doing solo sessions near home in Wigan and playing on Sundays - little room for manoeuvre in a crowded schedule.

When he isn't on site at Risley, lames is studying civil engineering at Bolton University where he is nearing the end of year one in a four-year course which demands one-day-a-week attendance and many, many hours of study at home.

> Employed by BNFL, he probably learns more on site than he does in university lectures.

"I'm required to get the degree," he explained, "but BNFL demand that I spend as much time as possible at Risley. Most of the work is specific to them -- and although its a civil engineering degree they make the point that, working for them, if I were to get something wrong it could be rather more



falling down!"

lames is used to "falling down" or being tackled. It's been happening to him since he first handled a rugby ball at Wigan St Pat's as a seven-year-old. It toughened him up, got him used to taking hard knocks -- and those early years in rugby getting bashed as a little scrum-half stood him in good stead when he took on the might of the Army at Catterick Camp a couple of years ago. Back at Wigan for his second stint with his

hometown club, he was one of ten young players -- eight from Wigan, two from Batley -- who were sent to Catterick to be tested mentally and physically on a course designed for paratroopers. Of the ten, only four finished the course and, of those, only three picked up enough marks in endurance and other tests to pass with flying colours.

lames was one of the three - and that certificate was a huge addition to a CV that included selection for the NW Counties under-16s tour of Fiji, New Zealand and Australia in 2001: player-of-the-year awards in three successive seasons while playing Academy rugby at Wigan: five appearances for England at international academy level; and five games in Super League for his hometown club.

In the younger of the two squads that NW Counties took Down Under in 2001, Coyle played alongside James Roby at half-back in a side that remained unbeaten on tour. Shortly after getting home he signed for Wigan and a couple of years later, aged 18, he became a full-time pro with the Warriors.

He played for England Academy twice against France; twice against New Zealand on tour Down Under; and once against Australia in Penrith when the English boys made history by becoming the first side to beat the Aussies at that level.

Back home, he was player of the year in his first season of Academy rugby at Wigan; supporters' player of the year in his second year; and player of the year again in his third year.

It was Ian Millward, the Aussie coach who had stunned the sport by moving from St Helens to take command at Wigan, who

advised lames to seek first-team rugby elsewhere. Recalled James: "He said he didn't think I would get a lot of Super League opportunities at Wigan, but he felt I needed a higher standard of rugby than academy football."

So it was off to Widnes Vikings for the young Coyle, who signed a one-year contract and played in 31 of the Vikings' 32 games in 2006. He was offered a new deal for 2007, but he was looking for a move and he ultimately accepted an invitation to return to Wigan, by then under the command of Brian Noble.

"I didn't really enjoy my rugby at Widnes," he said, "so I went back to Wigan when Stuart Wilkinson (Noble's No 2) gave me a call, but then I had some serious thinking to do about my future and when the opportunity arose for me to take employment with BNFL I decided to go down that route.

"That's when I was looking for part-time rugby, and that's where Oldham came in. I spoke to Chris (Hamilton) and Deaks (Steve Deakin) and several players who were already here told me they were very happy and it was a good club to join.

"I am happy to say I definitely made the right decision. I signed initially for half a season, but then I signed again for 2008 and later it was extended to take in 2009.

"There are a lot of new players in the squad just now and it will take time for us to gel properly, but Deaks is a very experienced coach and I am absolutely sure that everything will come right soon."

Sculthorpe, Kevin Sinfield, Jordan Turner, Kyle Eastmond. Not a bad list of players, I am sure you will agree. And of

course its basis is that it is made up of current, future or recent past top-level players who either come from the town or played their formative junior rugby here, but who were or are largely lost to the town's professional club because of its reduced status compared with the "good old days". I am certain too, that readers of this programme will be able to add names of their own to the list. For example, what about the two local youngsters who have just signed for Salford's Academy side, Gareth Owen and Matthew Fogarty?

I am equally certain that I do not have to make the point to readers that the town still continues to be a thriving centre of rugby league, and to produce quality both in its amateur and youth sides and its individual players, even though it is now more than 10 years since we had either a top level pro club in the town, or indeed even an RL-dedicated ground.

This is surely why the decision by messrs. Quinn, Hamilton and Whitehead to re-form an Oldham RLFC academy side is of such crucial importance. It is also why it is so good to be

able to welcome John Hough and Leo Casey - two Oldham RLFC stalwarts if there ever were such people - as the initial coaching staff for what has now become the Reserves side.

Of course, it has never been the case that all local players play for their local side witness the number from the Leigh area who were

amongst the stars in our 1950s team, for example. But it is surely absolutely vital, if we are ever to have a realistic chance of making progress towards the promised land - if such it can be called - of a Super League licence/franchise in the future, that there is a clear route available for local lads to progress in the game via their local professional club as the starting point.

The creation of a Reserves side, alone, of course, will not be enough to stem the tide of local youngsters who currently, quite understandably, sign up for other clubs. But it does represent a beginning, at least. That is why the town's supporters' trust, Rugby Oldham, is so keen to help the pro club in every way it can, I know, to make the Reserves venture a success. It is also aiming to help to generate the necessary co-operation between the pro club and the local Service Area which will enable the town to see its first ever RL scholarship scheme in place, in order to cement the club's role in the game in the town at earlier age groups.

Long-term goals require long-term thinking and that is what we seem to be beginning to get, at last, among the town's RL fraternity. Good news indeed.


