



Oldham have followed up the re-signing of skipper Rob Roberts for 2009 by announcing the capture of Salford City Reds' goalkicking winger Andy Ballard.

The 22-year-old Wiganer, who has joined Roughyeds on a one-year deal, worked his way through Salford's Academy ranks and established himself in the first team after being voted Under-21s players' player of the year in 2007.

Pacy, and an accomplished goalkicker, he is said to be good defensively and a player who has what it takes to make a big impact at National League

"He will be a very good acquisition, and we are delighted to get him on board," said Oldham's chief executive Chris Hamilton.

Ballard was just one of several players who are now well-known names in the sport and who toured Australia, New Zealand and Fiji with the North-West Counties under-16s in 2001. The management team included three local men in Steve Bithell (tour manager), Gary Highton (team manager) and Roger Halstead (media manager).

Craig Robinson (Prop);

During the tough times of the 2007 season Craig always led from the front, never allowing his head to drop. His battling qualities and loyalty to the cause have been rightly rewarded with Craig named Vice Captain for the 2008 season, a fitting tribute to the former Walsefield man. All Craig's 15 appearances came from the bench scoring 4 tries. This year Craig's frequent appearances have been a mixture of starting and sub.

Wayne Corcoran (Half Back/ Loose Forward):

Wayne was another player that showed loyally beyond the cause during the 2007 season. Despite requiring a shoulder operation for the majority of the season Wayne bravely played on showing immense courage. Wayne came back into fitness and this year has made a telling impact playing in a variety of positions, the most recent being booker.

Eric Andrews (Wing);

The highlight of 2007 for Eric was the magnificent solo matching winning try he scored in the Challenge Cup verses Cellic Crusaders. That try gave everyone a glimpse of just what Eric is capable of given the space and a chance to run at the opposition. Eric has enjoyed his stay at Hornets and was only too willing to pen a deal for 2008. No-one made more appearances than Eric's 28 in 2007. He scored 10 tries in all competitions. This year Eric has again been consistent in both appearances and performance and has once again proved a valuable member of the suusd.

Danny Samuels (Loose Forward)

Danny successfully made the transition from U/21 to First Team Grade during 2007. Danny was one of the mainstays of last year's successful U/21's team making a significant contribution at that level despite suffering a number of injuries. This year Danny's appearances have en split between reserve grade and first team with the latter coming in the last few weeks when Hornets' fortunes have taken a encouraging step forward. Danny will be looking to continue the progress he is making with some big performances in the play offs.

Sam Butterworth (Stand Off)

Had three great seasons with Hornets from 2004–06 before linking up with the now current Coach Darren Shaw at Leigh where Sam had an exceptional season and was instrumental in Hornets downfall on both occasions the sides met last term. Since returning Sam has proved his versability with appearances across the three quarter line as well as at half back and as suitstitute.

Paul Alcock (Second Row)

Paul started his career at Warrington Wolves and has had a number of clubs before joining Hornets at the beginning of the year. Despite suffering injury in the earlier stages of the campaign Paul's no nonsense approach has caught the eye with some strong performances throughout the wear.

Martin Ainscough (Standoff)

Product of the Widnes Academy Martin played for both the Junior and Senior academy at Widnes and was awarded junior academy Player of the year in 2002. A player who has played against Australia for Great Britain Students and also loured Australia in 2003. Martin also played for England Students in the World Cup that was held in Australia. With chances limited at Widnes Martin signed for Leigh for the 2007 season playing 18 times scoring 10 tries. Since joining Hornets Martin has become or of the team's major attacking forces with some very impressive displays, the most recent of which coming against Swinton where he scored four tries in one game. He is by far Hornets' top try scorer for the 2008 season having already scored 27 tries which leaves him requiring just 4 in the play offs to equal Marlon Bilty's record of 31 tries in a season.

David Newton (Prop)

Dave re joins Hornets after having a spell away from the club at Swinton and there is no doubt that that he has returned to the Club a better player for it indeed he was very highly regarded at Swinton and they were bitterly disappointed to lose him. Dave made a Grand Final appearance for the Lions in 2006. This year Dave has been a solid contributor to the Hornets pack in all 22 games.

David Best (Prop)

Another player that is in his second spell at the Club having spells at Oldham and more recently Batley in between. David has really matured as a player and his power and toughness upfront has been a major asset to Homets this season. He has led from the front throughout the current campaign and will be tooking for a big end to the season.

lan Sinfield (Second Row)

Ian left the Club in 2003 to join Keighley where he made the first of his two Grand Final appearances. Ian then had two highly successful seasons at Keighley before moving onto Swinton and then to his homelown team for a second time Oldham, where he was a Grand Finallast in 2007. His leadership qualities have proved invaluable and he was appointed Captain mid season upon the arrival of Darreh Shaw. His performances have been consistent and to a high standard. This was emphasised with his inclusion in the Scotland initial World Cup Squad for the Auturn four of Australia.

Chris Hough (Half Back)

Although only in his mid twenties Chris can be best described as a much travelled seasoned pro. Along with a previous spell at Hornets Chris has played for Oldham, Swinton, Doncaster, fatley and also had a loan spell at Leigh last season. Chris has appeared both in first team and reserve team rugby this year where his on field leadership has been eye catching. He will be hoping to make a contribution to the end of season finale despite recently suffering an injury.

Mark Brocklehurst (Centre)

An "Oldhamer" Mark played his junior rugby at Waterhead where he was picked up by Wigan. Mark played a couple of seasons in the junior ranks at Wigan before he joined Swinton at the start of the 2007 season. He scored four tries in 1 4 appearances last term for the Lions with has recently shown his flexibility as a player where he has put in some great performances playing at loose forward. He is another player who will be looking to continue his good form as the season (trays his a close).

Alex Brown (Wing)

A powerful winger who joined Keighley at the start of the 2006 season from the amateur game he was playing for the Huddersfield Sharks club. He became soon became a crowd favourite at Keighley scoring a number of long range tries which earned him the 'most improved player' award at the end of the 2007 season. Alex has put in some noticeable performances on the wing with his 14 tries. Despite having recently playing reserve level rugby, Alex will be determined to bounce back and finish the season on a high.

Tom Wild (Prop)

A Scotland B international Tom was also a member of the NLC team of year last season and has graduated from the reserve grade this year. Without doubt as the season has progressed Tom's performances have improved and this was recognised this week on the International stage with his call up to the Scotland Squad for the World Cup.

Chris Giles (Full Back/Wing)

A real stand out performer for Hornets during 2005 at either Full Back or on the Wing. In certain matches Chris's Super League experience proved invaluable and was a model of consistency. In the 2005 season Chris scored some vital tries and improved his tally in 2006 and scooped the supporters' player of the year award. In 2007 Chris moved onto pastures new only to return to the fold on loan. Since his return he has scored two tries in his seven appearances and will want to continue his consistency at full back throughout the play offs.

Leroy Rivett (Wing)

Leroy entered the history books in 1999 when he collected the Lance Todd trophy as man of the match in the Challenge Cup final having scored four tries in Leeds Rhins 5:16 km in at Wembley. Since then Leroy has had a number of obtain chuding Warrington, Keightey, Chorley, Hull KR, Leigh before joined Hornets mid way through the season. His skills and professionalism have shown through in the recent upturn in fortunes for the Luly, on the pitch and a continuation of his form will certainly be a major benefit to Hornets in the play offs.

Carl Sneyd (Centre/Full Back)

Carl is a product of the Homets Reserves where he put in some outstanding displays. It was clear to see that Carl was a potential star in the making and he has successfully stepped up to become a first team regular and a points machine. In 21 games this season Carl has amassed 242 points and will be looking to continue to improve throughout the promotion

Jonathan Muir (Second Row)

Jonathan, or Jono, as he is known has made a substantial impact since joining from local amateur dub Pochdale Mayfield. Having joined the club mid way through the season, he has undoubtedly strengthened the pack and always makes good yards forward when the noordnight wises

Janan Billings (Hooker)

Janan rejoined Homets mid way through the campaign after being surprisingly released by National League 1 Halifax. His low centre of gravity and good footwork makes him extremely difficult to stop when he is on a roll. He has played previously for a number of cluts including Sateshead Thunder, Blackpool Panthers and Rochdale Mayfield. His style of play could prove decisive in the play offs.

Paul Rolls (Scrum Half)

Paul was somewhat thrown in at the deep end when joining Hornets mid season. It is no coincidence that since his arrival Hornets attack has taken on an extra dimension and his combination with Martin Ainsouugh has caused havoc in opposition defences in the latter part of the season. Both Paul and Hornets fans will be hoping this continues in the month that lies ahead.

Dave Cunliffe (Prop/Second row)

Dave has returned to the Hornets fold this year and has proved a vital cog in the Hornets pack. His experience and leadership have guided Hornets in their revival throughout the year.




SUPPORT ROUGHYED**RESERVES**

NEARLY ISO SUPER LEAGUE GAMES PUT DARYL IN THE TOP-CLASS BRACKET

Player Profile: **DARYL CARDISS**

WITH nearly 150 Super League appearances for Wigan, Halifax and Warrington on his CV, Daryl Cardiss can claim to be one of the most experienced players in the Roughyeds' camp.

The 31-year-old Yorkshireman, born in Leeds on July 13, 1977, has started games for Oldham this year only on the wing, but for most of his career at the top level of English rugby league he made a name for himself - and a well-known name too - as an accomplished full-back with pace to burn.

His story begins with that prolific provider of young talent, the Hunslet Boys Club. Traditionally, the working-class area to the south side of the city of Leeds, as opposed to the 'posher' part to the north, has produced hundreds of young stars who have gone on to make it big in the professional game. We think, quite rightly, of the Oldham area as a hot-bed of junior talent but down the years there has been nothing to touch the sprawling suburbs and housing estates of Hunslet and neighbouring Middleton.

Albert Goldthorpe, in the news recently, was probably the first rugby league super star to emerge from that area in the late 1890s, and they have been coming ever since.

Recognising South Leeds as an unrivalled rugby league breeding ground, the Wigan club have, in more recent times, always been active over there and have signed many young boys from within a mile or two of the old Hunslet ground at Parkside, most famously Jason Robinson.

They also swooped on that area in 1994 to sign the then 17-year-old Daryl Cardiss, whose first taste of Super League was with Wigan in an accomplished career that has also seen him in the colours of Halifax and Warrington in Super League and representing Widnes and Oldham in Co-operative NL1 and NL2 respectively. He has also had a short spell on loan with Batley Bulldogs in NL1.

The Roughyeds chased him in 2007, but failed to get him on loan from Widnes. This time, though, a one-year deal was completed to the huge satisfaction of the board and coach Steve Deakin. Widnes had loaned him out to Batley towards the end of last year and, unluckily, he broke a bone in a shoulder while at Mount Pleasant.

Widnes wanted to re-sign him for 2008 and so did Batley, but he opted to come to the Roughyeds and, despite a severe shoulder injury early in the season and a long lay-off for a major reconstruction of the joint, Oldham fans have seen on numerous occasions exactly why Oldham were so keen to sign him.

He had a cracking game on the left wing in Oldham's 18-14 win against Salford City Reds at Boundary Park in the Northern Rail Cup on February 22, but near the end, with Oldham under intense pressure, he was left in agony after making a try-saving tackle in the corner.

He was to be out of the game for four months - a cruel blow not only for the player, but also for the Oldham club. Happily, he returned to action in the hugely satisfying 40-16 defeat of Gateshead at Sedgley Park on June 29 and he has played in nine of the last 11 games, all of them on the wing. For most of his career, though, he has played in the full-back position, making 18 Super League appearances for Wigan; 99 for for Halifax and 25 for Warrington - 142 in total and 46 tries also in the elite competition.

He has represented Yorkshire in the Origin series and in 2001, when the Oldham club's current chief executive Chris Hamilton was manager of the England squad, Daryl was called up to the England party for the game against Wales at Wrexham.

Mr Hamilton was quoted thus at the time Roughyeds signed him: "Deaks (coach Steve Deakin) wanted him last year. We know his quality. He is vastly experienced and he can play equally well in a variety of positions."

Throughout his career Daryl has been a highprofile player for whom mentions in the national press were nothing out of the ordinary. Take this piece by David Burke in the Sunday Mirror of May 7, 2000.

Wrote David: "Wigan Warriors are lining up a move for old boy Daryl Cardiss, the six-try leading scorer for Halifax Blue Sox.Wigan, though, will face competition from Super League champions St Helens if Cardiss fails to agree a new contract at the end of the season. A snag for the derby rivals is that Halifax would be entitled to a transfer fee under RL rules because Cardiss is still under 24.

"Cardiss, 22 in July, was snapped up by Halifax from Wigan two years ago and his electrifying pace has made him a big hit with the fans at the New Shay."

Or what of this story by Ian Laybourn in The Independent on April 29, 2002. Wrote Ian: "Halifax's unsettled fullback Daryl Cardiss will be

in the shop window tonight when he turns out for the Blue Sox against high-flying Hull.

"The 24-year-old former Wigan utility player, who was Yorkshire's full-back in last year's Origin game, has been placed on the transfer list at £55,000 after asking to leave the club. The fleet-footed Cardiss, who signed a new three-year contract last season, believes a move will benefit his career -- and Blue Sox coach Steve Linnane is hoping a run of good form will be a help to both parties."

In his long stay at Halifax, Daryl played for both Linnane and his coaching successor Tony Anderson and he was at the Shay at the same time as his current Oldham team mate Danny Halliwell.

In August, 2003 it was time to move on, and Cardiss returned to this side of the Pennines when he signed for Warrington. Less than a year later, in June, 2004, he signed a two-year contract extension with the Wolves to see him through to the end of the 2006 campaign, but before that was up he went to Widnes on loan and ultimately signed for the Vikings on a permanent basis. The Warrington Guardian, in its edition of July 1, 2004,

The Warrington Guardian, in its edition of July 1, 200 featured Daryl in a piece in which the full-back expressed his concern because he wasn't scoring enough tries.

It was reported that he had crossed for 47 tries in 110 career games before joining Wolves from Halifax, but the writer went on to explain that "in primrose and blue the 26-year-old has placed the ball over the whitewash three times in 23 outings."

The writer explained that although Cardiss was Warrington's last line of defence the player considered try-scoring to be a huge part of his game and Daryl himself was quoted as saying that he was anxious to start scoring more freely.

He did exactly that at Widnes in NLI - 12 tries in 30 appearances - and there is no doubt at all that he would have figured prominently in Oldham's list of leading try scorers this season had it not been for that cruel twist of fate which saw him badly injured in only the third competitive game of the current season.

He was to be sidelined for the next 21 games, but he has since proved conclusively that his major shoulder surgery was a success. You can be sure of one thing --- Cardiss will be hunting tries as usual and eager to get his name on the scoresheet in today's hugely important play-off showdown with Rochdale Hornets.





NO COMMENT - JUST THE FACTS OF THE MATTER

(Roger Halstead takes a longerthan-usual look at the final Co-operative NL2 table add on page 22)

SPARE more than a passing glance at the Co-operative NL2's final table and it provides any amount of talking points based on some fascinating statistics.

Consider these:

*Only Gateshead had more wins than Oldham, yet the Roughyeds finished third.

*Only Gateshead had fewer defeats than Oldham, yet the Roughyeds finished third.

*Oldham had one more win than Barrow, yet finished beneath them.

*Oldham lost one game fewer than Barrow, yet finished beneath them.

*Prior to the introduction of the bonus point, Roughyeds would have finished second.

*Oldham lost only five games out of 22, but scored only one bonus point -perhaps the most significant statistic of the lot.

*Oldham finished with four more points than Doncaster, who are already through to the Grand Final.

*Only York (740) and Gateshead (767) scored more points than Oldham's 716.
*The bonus point Oldham 'lost' at

Gateshead due to a controversial conversion retake would have given them automatic promotion.

*Of the top four teams Oldham had the poorest defensive record and that also cost them heavily in the race for the top two.

*Rochdale Hornets, finishing seventh, rattled up 715 points -- 12 more than promoted Barrow and only one fewer than third-placed Oldham.

*Hornets are 80 minutes from the

Grand Final despite losing more league games (11) than they won (10). Food for thought, indeed, and now to the play-offs in which Whitehaven (NL1) and Rochdale (NL2) have been the surprise packets so far, though bear in mind the copy deadlines for this programme were ahead of Whitehaven's final eliminator at Salford City Reds on Thursday evening.

The Cumbrians earned a crack at Salford in a televised tie thanks to outstanding wins at Leigh and at Halifax, while today's Boundary Park visitors, Rochdale, raised eyebrows throughout the National League with their superb triumphs on their travels at York City Knights and Keighley Cougars.

Interestingly, and at the time of writing, there had been four play-off clashes in NLI and four in NL2 and in each case there had been three away wins.

In NL1 Celtic Crusaders won brilliantly 44-18 at Salford to book their place in next Sunday's Grand Final at Warrington, followed by Whitehaven's wins at Leigh and Halifax.

In NL2, Doncaster emulated the Crusaders by winning here at Boundary Park, while Rochdale matched Whitehaven with their wins at York and Keighley.

The pattern in Super League contrasted starkly in the early rounds. The outcome of the Saints-Leeds game on Friday night and the Catalans-Wigan match on Saturday were not known at the time of going to press, but in the elimination play-offs the home sides won comfortably, the Frenchmen hammering Warrington 46-8 and Wigan defeating Bradford 30-14.

It is all building up to a couple of superb Grand Final occasions, first at the Halliwell Jones Stadium next Sunday, September 28, and then at Old Trafford on Saturday, October 4.


