Club officials fully understand that supporters are thirsting for more information about this "exciting

opportunity". The directors of the club are itching to reveal more, but they know they must hold back further announcements until the deal is concluded to avoid jumping the gun on the final outcome or jeopardising ongoing talks.

That's why chairman Bill Quinn and chief executive Chris Hamilton issued the following statement when news of the club's interest in Andrew Street was made public by other sources a few days ago.

The statement read as follows:

"Following intense speculation recently the club can confirm that it is currently in negotiation with various parties to obtain a licence for the use of Andrew Street, Chadderton, home of Chadderton Football Club.

This situation has been ongoing for a significant period of time throughout which, in accordance with club policy, all discussion and negotiation has been done on a strictly confidential basis.

Unfortunately, due to circumstances beyond the club's control, we have now been informed that this situation has been made public before negotiations are concluded.

This is potentially a very exciting opportunity for the club and for everyone connected with it.

However, while acknowledging that our interest in Andrew Street is now in the public domain, the club will be making no further comment until the negotiations are concluded.

We would like to stress to local residents, supporters of Chadderton FC and fans of Oldham RLFC that our use of this facility will not be for first-team matches.

Furthermore, we had previously discussed with officials of the football club, local councillors and officers of OMBC our intentions to involve local residents in discussions about the site to allay any fears they may have had as a result of incorrect rumours and assumptions that have been doing the rounds over the past few months.

This situation will not change and we hope to be in a position to invite our fans, local residents, councillors and anyone else with an interest in the development of the site to a series of meetings once contracts have been signed by the relevant parties."

A similar statement appears on the website of Chadderton Football Club, who play in the Vodkat North-West Counties League.

Roughyeds acknowledge that their supporters will have a big part to play in the success of the new venture and they assure fans that they will be delighted to provide "all the information fans want" when the time is right.

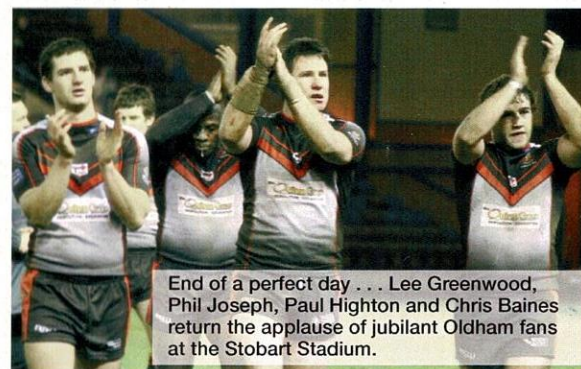

PRESS PACK APPLAUD OUR BIG NIGHT AT WIDNES

Roberts leads Oldham to shock win at Vikings

Ballard the Boot plunders the Vikings - and 'Two Bobs' lands man-of-the-round award!

SKIPPER Robert Roberts and winger Andy Ballard had special reasons to celebrate after our terrific 22-20 win at Widnes in a thrilling start to our Northern Rail Cup campaign.

Captain Courageous 'Two Bobs' went through the pain barrier to return to the field in the closing stages and lead Oldham to a memorable triumph against the

red-hot trophy favourites - a demonstration of heroism that was recognised by the RFL's player-of-the-round selection panel.

"It's great to receive an award like this," said Robert, "and I give a big thank-you to all concerned, but the secret of our success was teamwork. Every man played his part.

"We reacted positively when they came back at us and went in front 20-18. We showed great spirit to regain the lead in the 78th minute and that proved that our fitness levels were a match for those of the full-time professionals."

Winger Ballard continued his impressive early-season form with seven goals from seven shots and a try in the corner for good measure - 18 points in total.

For Oldham it was the perfect start to a new season. For Widnes, though, defeat had its repercussions. On Monday the Vikings announced they had parted

company with coach Steve McCormack in the aftermath of their shock home defeat and, presumably, after a weekend of inquests. Here is the press gang's verdict on the night Benson's boys took the Stobart Stadium by storm:

WHAT THEY SAID

"Oldham turned the tables on the Northern Rail Cup favourites with a solid display that upset the odds at Stobart Stadium. Tony Benson and his players fancied their chances before the game and their optimism paid off as they outshone Widnes for periods of the game, and deserved to win.

"Benson had done his homework. Oldham dominated the floor and the ruck, which was pivotal to their victory". - **Martin Lace, League Express.**

"The writing was on the wall very early on for the Vikings when Roberts, ably supported by the Coyle boys, took the game to the home side.

"James Coyle put up several bombs, one of which was spilled by Loz Wildbore, which allowed Jason Boults the opportunity to score by the posts and Ballard kicked the first of his seven goals. It took Widnes until the 26th minute to hit back." - **Graham Lovett, League Weekly.**

"The first match of the Northern Rail Cup provided a shock with Oldham taking a thoroughly deserved win at the home of the cup favourites. The first half saw the Roughyeds well on top with two excellent tries, a good kicking game and terrific defence restricting the Vikings to a single try by ex-Oldham man Gavin Dodd." - **Keith Potter, Oldham Advertiser.**

"Ice-cool Andy Ballard got Oldham's 2009 season off to a magnificent start with a faultless goalkicking display at Widnes. Two conversions, five penalties and a first-half try gave the former Salford winger 18 points as Tony Benson's boys stunned the Northern Rail Cup favourites with one of the club's best all-round performances in years.

"Committed in defence and creative in attack, Roughyeds led 18-4 as the clock ticked up to the hour mark and it took a disallowed try by Lee Greenwood to provide the shell-shocked Vikings with the heart and the will to mount a spirited fightback." - **Roger Halstead, Roughyeds website.**

"The game's pivotal moment came on 34 minutes. Wildbore was involved in what looked a minor fracas with Halliwell, but referee Mr Child saw enough to dismiss him. Two penalty goals for interference at play-the-ball early in the second half put Widnes in a deep hole at 18-4 down." - **John Lawless, Liverpool Echo.**

The introduction of the nines competition in July for the teams not in the final is another bold move by the game and one which deserves to prosper. Nines will bring a new type of game for many fans although the older ones will remember similar pre season cup competitions held at Wigan years ago. Certainly it is a game for the fast elusive players and already our props are undertaking extensive sprint training in readiness for the event. We have reminded them, however, that we hope to be in the actual final rather than the nines!

On a serious note there has been an incredible amount of hard work put in by a lot of people since the end of last season to prepare ourselves for the tasks ahead and on behalf of the club I would like to thank them.

Can we also say a massive thank you to all our fans who were able to purchase a season ticket in these difficult times as this provides a big boost to the club during the close season.

Finally and I know I say this every week please, please get behind the team, make some noise and the players will provide you with plenty to cheer about!

"It would be remiss of me not to thank the people over there (looking across to the Roughyeds table) who look after the club so expertly."

Bill and Suzanne were at Boundary Park for the Rochdale game on Wednesday before they flew off on honeymoon, to a secret destination in the West Indies, the following day.

As soon as he gets back, Bill will go into a strict training routine in order to box in a charity event labelled 'The Battle at Batley Frontier' on April 1. Organised to benefit the Steve Prescott Foundation, the show will be staged at the Batley Frontier, Bradford Road, Batley and Bill's fight with RL legend Garry Schofield will top the bill.

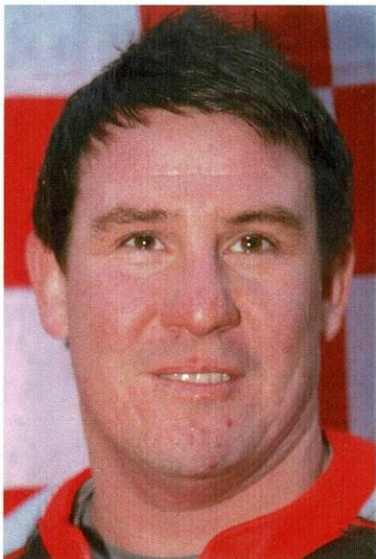

PLAYER PROFILE
No 2 PAUL HIGHTON



Roger Halstead talks to the Oldham prop who never lost his 'soft spot' for the club he cheered as a boy

LOCAL BOY MADE GOOD DELIGHTED TO RETURN TO HIS OWN BACKYARD

WHEN a hugely experienced player like Paul Highton has something to say anybody with a modicum of nous has to sit up and take note.

You don't serve Salford City Reds for 11 seasons; play in nearly 300 games; appear in more than 200 Super League clashes; and play a dozen times for Wales without acquiring the knowledge

to become somewhat of an authority on rugby league and its idiosyncrasies.

No doubt that weighed heavily in favour of the 31-year-old Oldham-born prop when Roughyeds boss Tony Benson was balancing the credentials of the candidates for the twin roles of vice-captain and skipper Robert Roberts's right-hand man and confidant.

Side by side they should do a great job as wise old sages in the height of battle -- as we witnessed in the thrilling win at Widnes nine days ago --- and as leaders of the group off the field and around the dressing room.

Highton, for one, is excited by the prospect of ending his playing career with the club he supported avidly as a boy and is even more enthusiastic about the season that lies ahead since Benson entrusted him with the responsibilities that go with his appointment as vice-captain of the club.

He was made-up by the win at Widnes but, as you would expect from a player who has been around long enough to have seen it all before, he was at great pains to keep the season's opening-day triumph in perspective.

As a player who was in the Salford side beaten by Oldham at Boundary Park in the same competition around this time last year, Paul is better qualified than most to warn of the dangers of a side perhaps falling in love with itself after one terrific performance and a win that was unexpected by most people outside those who actually made it happen.

"We are very aware that we made a similar start last year," he said, "and looking back to that win against Salford has brought it home to us that all we did at Widnes was to win one match and get the season off to a good start.

"We've now got to build on that over a long season. Sheffield will be tough opponents today. They are a proud club who are traditionally tough opponents. Mark Aston knows the game inside out. It remains to be seen whether they are as good on their travels as they are at the Don Valley.

"But I know we will not have an easy game all season. Every side will want to gain our scalp because we are tipped to do well in Co-operative Championship One as well as in the Northern Rail Cup. Every team

that plays us, certainly in the league, will regard it as their Grand Final."

Paul, who lives in Rochdale and has two children, Harrison (7) and Ella (2), would have come to Oldham a year earlier had it not been for his testimonial at The Willows.

"When I was a lad my dad used to take me to watch Oldham home and away," he said, "and I've always had a soft spot for the club. I've always wanted to play for them at some point in my career. Just to play for the Roughyeds is great, but to be given the added responsibility of vice-captain makes it even better.

"I'm really excited about the season ahead, and I suppose a lot of fans will be too after the win at Widnes, but as I have said already, we have to keep that win in perspective.

"It was my first game for more than five months, after an operation on a wrist, and I was a little bit off the pace. I felt strong and confident, but there is no substitute for match fitness. On the plus side, the wrist held up and I brushed off the cobwebs. Now I'm looking forward to the games that are coming up."

Highton's operation, a few months ago, was to mend a wrist which has taken a hammering over his many years in the front-row. He damaged it two years ago, but he kept putting off surgery until he knew he was leaving Salford to join Oldham.

"I didn't want to come to Oldham and bring a medical bill with me," he explained, "so I got the job done first. By returning to action at Widnes I'm three months ahead of the medical schedule, but I was happy at how it went."

And so to the beginning. Larry Dawson, up at Waterhead, was the biggest early influence on the young Highton, who was only 16 when he signed for Halifax after choosing to join Steve Simms at Thrum Hall ahead of the club that the cream of the Oldham crop were all signing for around that time --- Warrington.

Paul had joined the trek to Wilderspool with the likes of Iestyn Harris, Paul Sculthorpe, John Hough and Ian Knott and he was on the verge of signing when he got a call from Malcolm Reilly at Halifax.

When it came to the nitty-gritty he opted for Halifax. He explained: "As a kid I was always a little bit in the shadow of Iestyn and Scully, so I thought I would do my own thing and go in the opposite direction. I was ready to sign for Warrington and there was a wrangle when I told them I was going to Halifax instead. I had decided I wanted to take my own route, the Yorkshire route, so off I went."

A centre in those days, the young Highton made his Fax debut at the age of 17 and quickly worked his way through the system. By 18 he was a regular

first-team man, still in the centre, after earning his stripes in the academy and 'A' teams.

All was going sweetly until his first contract expired. He agreed terms on a new deal and signed a bridging agreement until his new contract was drawn up. The club later withdrew the offer, however, and put before him a new one, slashed by half and with the addendum that it was 'take it or leave it' because the club held his registration.

Said Paul: "I refused to sign and the club then transfer-listed me at £100,000. I was only 18 and nobody was going to buy me at that price so I sought advice and went to a tribunal. It was in the early days of the tribunal and the case hit the headlines.

"I won it on 'restriction of trade' grounds and I became a free agent. I had a brief spell at Featherstone on loan while awaiting the decision of the tribunal. Once it came through I spoke to a few clubs, but chose Salford because it was a developing club and I thought I might make an earlier breakthrough there than if I had gone to a Leeds or a Bradford."

It was April, 1998 when he signed for Salford and it was to be the start of an 11-season association with the City Reds where he spent a "fantastic" time at a club that was run as a tight ship by its popular and highly-respected chairman John Wilkinson.

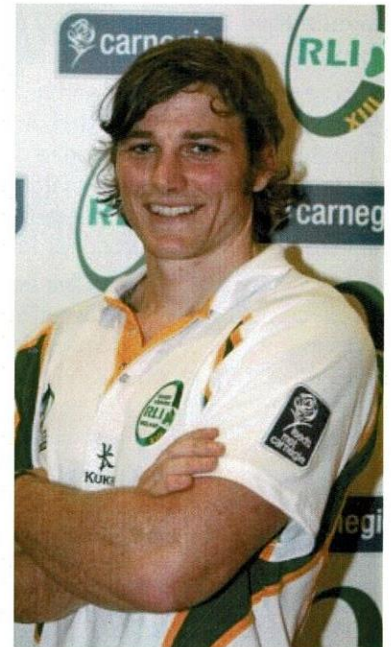
Nine of those 11 seasons were in Super League and Paul played under five coaches --- Andy Gregory, Steve McCormack, John Harvey, Karl Harrison and Shaun McRae.

He named Harrison as the pick. "I felt he was very unlucky to lose his job," said Paul. "He was a top coach, he knew the game inside out and he surrounded himself with first-class assistants in people like James Lowes and Scott Naylor."

All that is behind Highton now, though. He has finally achieved his wish to wear the colours of his home-town club and he is relishing the prospect of helping the Roughyeds to realise their own ambitions in the next year or so.

LUCK OF THE IRISH?

NO ENTRY

The trouble surrounding visa applications is the issue that dominated the early season. GAME ON asked some of the coaches for their views

WHATEVER your view on overseas players in British rugby league, this winter has proved it's far from a black and white issue.

News that Aussies and Kiwis were no longer to be allowed to play in the UK on working holiday visas will have been met positively by many fans still upset by England's shoddy performance at the World Cup and bemused by a general feeling that our game is being overrun by imports.

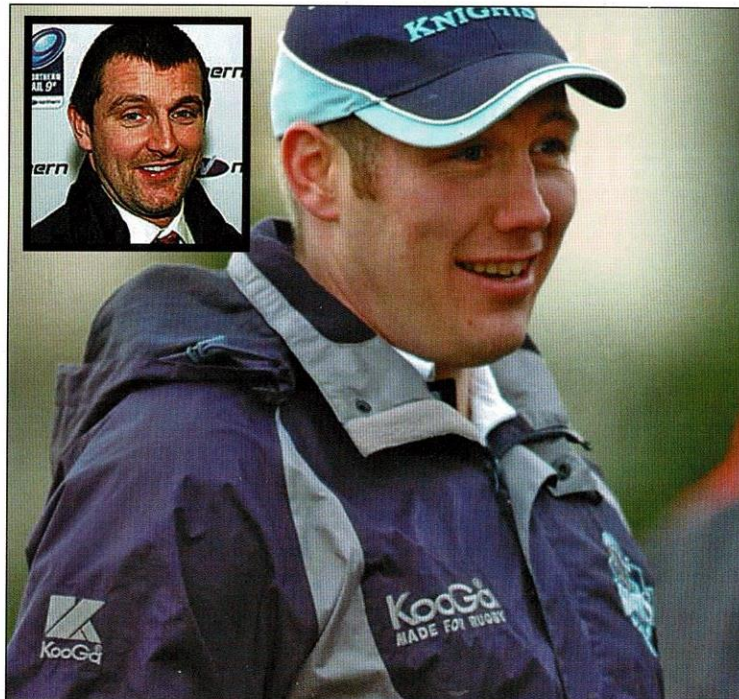
But, for coaches and chief execs at clubs across the co-operative Championships, the sudden tightening of visa regulations – following a Home Office ruling late last year – has caused sheer chaos.

For the record, players can now only play professional RL in the UK if they obtain a work permit. That means meeting certain entry criteria such as having played enough games in the NRL or having taken part in the World Cup (or alternatively having a British or EU passport).

But the matter is complicated by the fact that the RFL can grant special dispensation on an individual basis to players who don't meet that criteria, and that's where this issue really gets thorny – because what qualifies an individual to be 'worthy' of this special dispensation?

One man who believes the RFL has the balance wrong is York City Knights player-coach Paul March, who is currently battling to save his new signing Garry Green's professional career.

Australian-born Green, signed from Batley in the off-season, does not meet the criteria to be allowed to play professional sport in the UK. He is, however, a resident in the

UK, a business owner and therefore a British tax payer.

"He has no intention of moving back to Australia, so all we are doing is preventing someone from playing the game we all love," said March, who believes such emotional factors should have a greater bearing on the RFL's decision-making process – a view he hopes will be shared by an independent appeal panel in the coming weeks.

"The decision has really had an effect on Garry," he said. "He's been ill over the last couple of weeks with stress because he's been worrying about what's happening. This is a massive issue for the club and for him."

"I think it's right that people who are looking to come over and don't meet the criteria are turned away, but I don't think it's right to deny people who have been over here already and have been a part of our competition over the past few years.

"Dan Russell, for example, made a massive impact for Gateshead last year. One minute he's playing a big part in the game and the next he's being sent home. Things like that make a mockery of the situation."

"I think we need to take into account emotional factors like this a lot more. I'll use Brendan Rawlins at Keighley as an example. Keighley knew Brendan didn't meet the criteria to get a visa, but he has been over here for a few years now and doing a lot of good work in the community as well as on the field. That's why he's been given special dispensation, and hopefully that will go for us on appeal in Garry's case too."

And March is far from alone in ruing the impact the ruling has had on certain individuals within 'the Greatest Game'.

"From an individual point of view, it's

disappointing for Dan Russell that he's prevented from playing," said Whitehaven boss Ged Stokes, who had moved to sign the Aussie pivot from Gateshead Thunder but has now had to replace him with EU passport holder Jamie Theroharous.

"Rugby league is a people's game and every decision you make has an impact on someone's life," he adds. "And whether or not overseas players harm the English game anyway, I don't know. I think there are benefits there from playing alongside better quality players."

Stokes also insists coaches aren't going about recruiting foreigners just for the sake of it. "You have to understand that coaches have to look overseas because there simply aren't the numbers in England in certain positions. We've got plenty of forwards, but ask any coach and they'll tell you there's a lack of numbers in the half backs and the centres."

"The problem is that Super League clubs tend to stockpile the best young players for themselves. What we need to do to make sure we have enough numbers is get towards Gary Hetherington's idea of forging close links between Super League and Championship clubs, so that top youngsters could gain more first team experience by playing in the Championship. That would be the perfect system."

"But until then, we just don't have enough players."

However, that's not the view of one coach – from perhaps a surprising club – who believes the tightening of the visa rules are very much in the interests of the sport.

"It's easier to recruit an Australian than it is to bring in a local player, because you can go about recruiting him by email, by looking him up online or getting footage

from YouTube. But how many talented British players are we missing out on under our noses?" asks Callum Irving, coach of the London Skolars – often perceived to be one of the clubs to benefit greatly from such imports.

Whilst Irving lost two players – Rubert Jonker and Mario Du Toit – to the changes, he is proud to have fielded 15 British players against Leigh last week, albeit in a 74-6 defeat.

"How many Martin Offiahs are hiding away at clubs like Rosslyn Park?" he added.

"What I fear may happen is that coaches just look to bring in players who do meet the criteria for dispensation because they played in the World Cup, or else bring in Australians with European passports. I don't think that's the idea behind having these rulings in place."

"The problem is that it isn't clear what the Championships are fundamentally about. At the moment, we're stuck between it being a pathway to Super League and a competition that you want to win in its own right. You want to develop players, but you're also concerned about getting to a final in the next three years so you can apply for a place in Super League."

"I think if all clubs worked together then that wouldn't be a problem. We should model ourselves on the (American Football's) NFL, where they compete for three hours each Sunday but where they co-operate for the good of the whole sport the rest of the time. That's why a team like Green Bay can compete with a team like New York over there, because they work together for the good of the game."

"We've lost two good club men in Rubert and Mario because of these rules, but I think that for all the short term hits there could be some real long-term benefits for the game."

"We need to invest time and resources into looking for young local players, and clubs need to agree to give their coaches time to do that."

"The licensing system should mean less pressure on coaches and more time to bring young players through at all levels, but that isn't happening. I'm very lucky that I have a very patient and understanding chairman at the Skolars and more clubs need to be like that as well."

David Woods is the former coach of Gateshead and Castleford, leading them both to promotion. Here he gives his views on the great visa debate

THE recent change in regulations by the UK Borders Agency is having a significant impact on Rugby League clubs in this country, and especially those at Co-operative Championship level. It has affected a lot of clubs and some more so than others.

I feel that it was a decision that had to come for the good of the game of rugby league in the UK, but it came at a very bad time. Most clubs had already agreed contracts with players and some of the players had actually been training.

By bringing in this decision at the last minute, in November, meant clubs then had to release players and look for others, something that is very difficult to do and it can also be more costly to the club. It also leaves the player with a sour taste in his mouth because most would have had all their plans based around what they were doing with their lives.

My old club Gateshead had a few players rejected with two of them having played huge parts in our promotion from National League 2 to the Championship.

Dean Jamieson is a player with a lot of ability. He's played representative footy at Cronulla and also Premier League at the same club. He played in every game for us in the 2008 campaign, has an English girlfriend and worked to keep himself going. Lewis McPhail was another, he only missed one game for us and came through the strong St George junior system, yet both after being signed for the 2009 season have been told they are no longer eligible to play.

Other players have relocated and then told they aren't able to play which has meant many have gone back home or gone on to do some travelling.

Some players that haven't even arrived in the country have spent thousands of dollars to gain visas, they have quit jobs in Australia and New Zealand, given up their rental properties and have then been told, sorry, you can't come.

Who determines who is eligible, the Home Office that made the decision, but don't know rugby league, or the RFL who can overturn decisions on appeal?

The fairest and best thing that the RFL could have done was to allow the players that were already here, stay and play out this season, not allow any others to come in and be new registrations and then I'm sure all the clubs would have been happier.

As I've said this would have been the correct decision for the RFL to make and it would have given the clubs time to organise their recruitment policies for the future, plus the clubs, I'm sure would have appreciated the help of the governing body.

On another note, the Championship and Championship 1 leagues are going to be very toughly contested.

With no promotion or relegation into Super League clubs in the Championship will have to wait their turn and make sure they are competing to the highest level they can and win the Northern Rail Cup or the league.

There is still relegation to Championship One and with Toulouse given a lifeline by the RFL it makes it even tougher and more pressure on the coaches to ensure they are competitive and are winning games.

I'm sure that Widnes, Halifax, Whitehaven, Featherstone, Gateshead, Barrow and Leigh will be at the higher end of the table in the top division, with York who have recruited very well and playing some good footy.

Blackpool, under Martin Crompton with another season under his belt, Oldham, Dewsbury and Keighley will fight it out for the top places in Championship One.

Widnes Vikings parted company with Head Coach Steve McCormack on Monday morning.

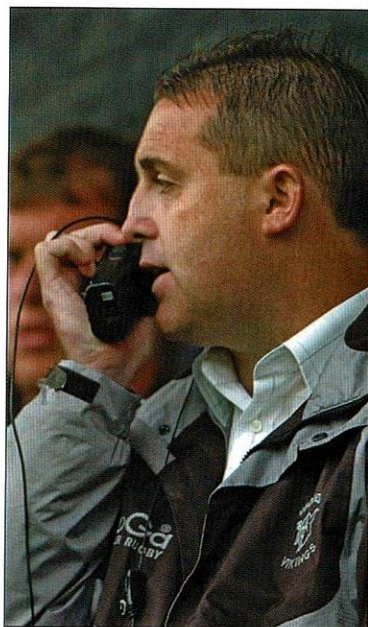
In the interim, assistant coach John Stankevitch will take over in a caretaker capacity and he lead the side for Friday night's clash with Gateshead Thunder.

Mentoring Rams

Dewsbury Rams and Shaw Cross Sharks have launched a brand new initiative to develop local junior rugby league.

The Mentoring And Development (MAD) scheme is based on professional players becoming personally involved with junior player development at their local clubs. The aim is to expand the thinking and stimulus of our young players in an environment that hopefully will heighten their awareness through the involvement

of professional players.

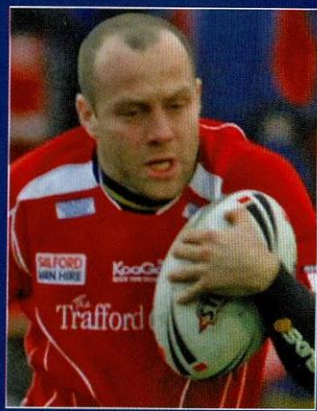

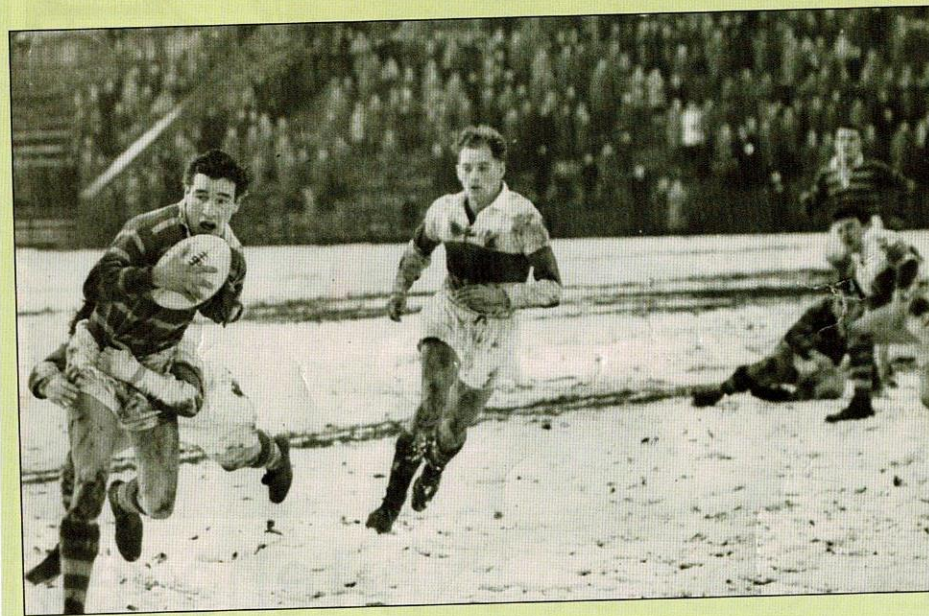

Dear Sir,
As a staunch Widnes Vikings supporter, I am absolutely appalled and flabbergasted at the treatment of coach Steve McCormack.

The board, in my view, acted far too hastily in showing Steve the door after just one game of the new campaign.

I appreciate there is a lack of patience in modern sport but to part company with Steve so early begs the question; why allow him to assemble and oversee the squad in the off-season? It just doesn't make any sense whatsoever.

Everybody knows that stability is a prerequisite for clubs who want to compete in the top echelons of the league. After axing Steve, I'm not convinced my club is capable of challenging for honours.

The Cumbrians stormed into a 40-12 lead before the Bulldogs threatened the comeback of all comebacks with 18 unanswered points.

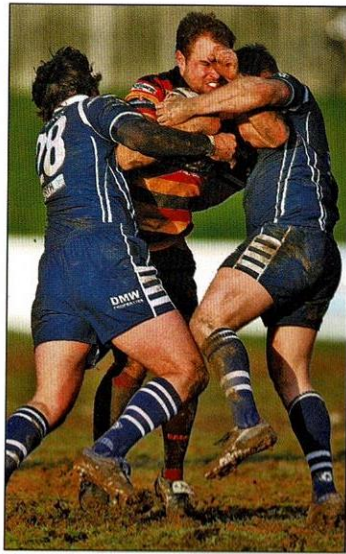
But the re-introduction of hat-trick hero Andy Gorski steadied the ship and two late Haven tries sealed the victory.

Blackpool coach Martin Crompton said: "Everybody's happy at the club right now. There's a good buzz about the place."

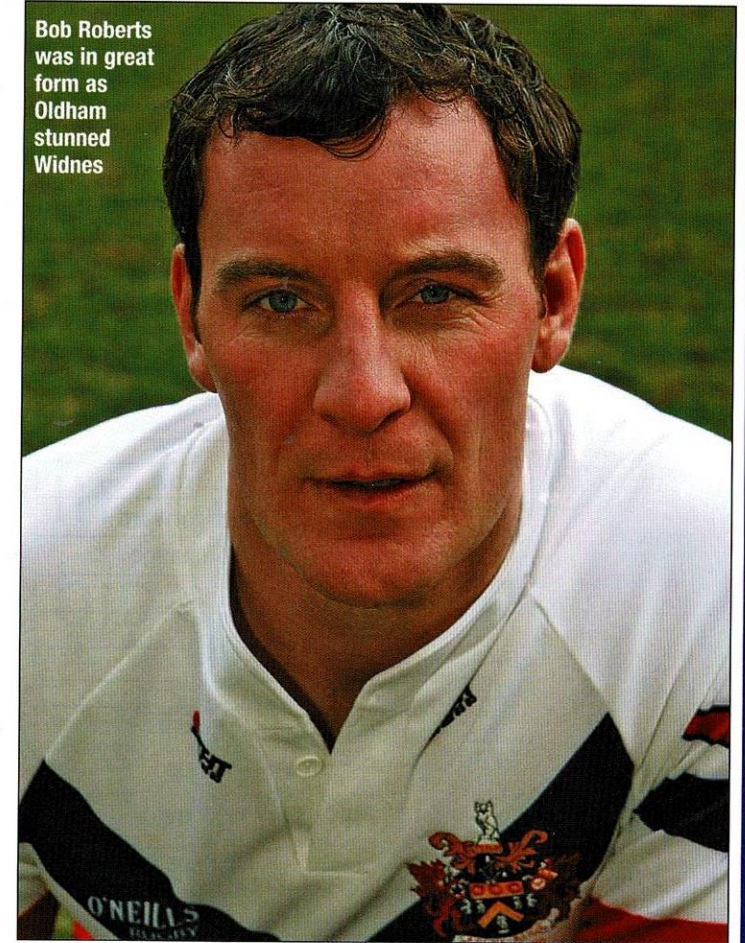
Keighley's narrow defeat gave them a bonus point to add to the three they gained from their 40-20 success over GATESHEAD, rearranged from the opening weekend.

Hunslet are bottom of the pool as

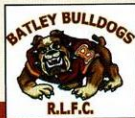
they followed up that defeat with a 38-10 reverse at home to HALIFAX.

However, things are improving and I am looking forward to getting our injured players back pretty soon.

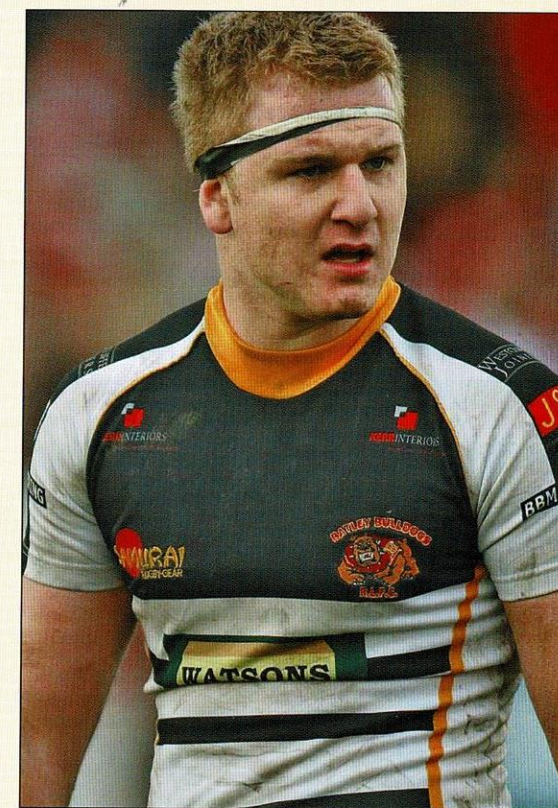
Mennell, Lythe and Cardozo are not too far away and will make a big difference to us, and Byron Smith should be back from honeymoon in time for the Dewsbury game.

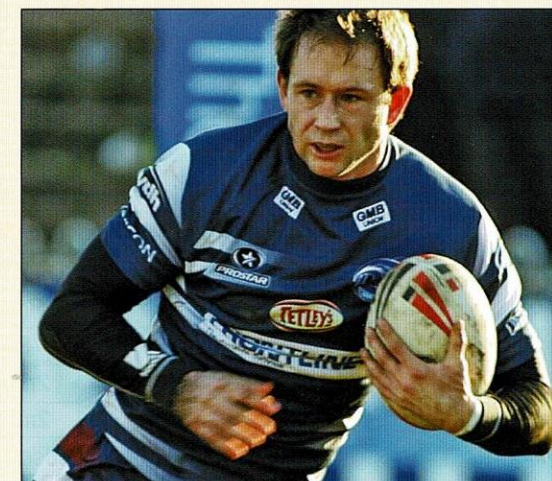

This means that exciting newcomer, Sam Smeaton, a try scorer on his debut at the Keepmoat Stadium won't have played against Leigh, but could therefore be playing this afternoon. Smeaton really is one to watch and he is a player with bags of ability and the drive and ambition to go with it.

Things are little less flexible in the backs, but Rovers' new recruits - Ian Hardman, Iestyn Harris and Jon Steele look - to have bedded in quickly and combined with Tommy Saxton (who can interchange with Hardman at full back or centre), Andy Kain (developing a dynamic partnership with Harris), the versatile Joe McLocklan and the vastly experienced Waine Pryce really do look one of the most potent attacking forces in the competition.

The telling factor in Rovers' performance could well be how much that game against the Centurions will have taken out of Powell's side but Rovers' attitude to training and rehab could see them take on the Rams with not too many ill effects.

Powell will, for sure, be calling for a full 80 minutes performance from his side, something he felt he didn't get from them against Doncaster.

He commented at the time: "We'll have to be a bit more consistent over the full 80 minutes. If we can repeat (against Leigh) what we did in the first half (against Doncaster), and string that together for a longer period, we will be difficult to beat"

Although the concept of the Olympic stadium is perhaps in the reverse of the concept, since it has been built big, and will probably be downsized after the Olympics.

The initial construction phase is for a capacity of 6,000, because playing outside Super League that is ample for our needs.

Should a franchise be granted to Rovers when the next applications come round, then everything is in place to simply adjust that design for the required capacity and level of facilities, when the time is right.

The design for our new home is in the hands of the Archial Group. They are the people who are working on the new Waford Stadium that I mentioned.

They are also responsible for the design of Castleford Tigers' new stadium.

This project, as with everything else we do at Featherstone, fulfils the needs of a club that is the hub of much of what goes on in the surrounding communities, and within a sound financial structure.

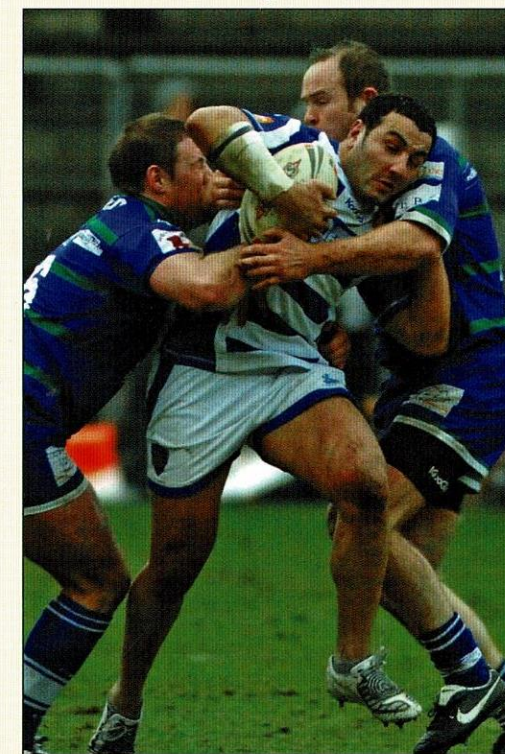
of weeks to get back on track.

Which brings me on to today's opponents Hunslet.

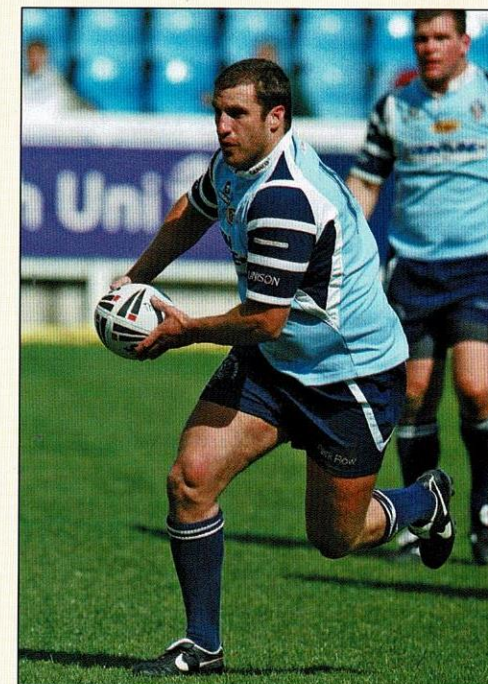
They have probably been the most active team outside Super League in the transfer market this year, bringing in virtually a new squad as well as keeping a nucleus of players from last year.

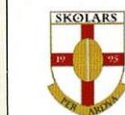

Skolars v Dons

Capital gains in spreading the word

WITH the scheduled Super League launch having to be moved to Huddersfield from London and both professional sides having to postpone home games because of heavy snow, some might consider the start of February to have been bad for league in the capital.

But there was an incredibly positive piece of news, which shows the strides the game has made in the last few years.

BBC London announced that they would be broadcasting a weekly, hour-long London rugby League programme throughout the whole of the engage Super League XIV and Co-operative Championship 1 seasons.

Now that might not seem significant to those of you

reading this in the areas where rugby league coverage on the radio has been excellent for many years. Growing up in the north west 20 years ago, I took that coverage for granted. In the south of England it was very different. Less than a decade ago, coverage was pretty minimal.

The advent of internet radio helped increase the level of coverage, with Quins' games being broadcast that way for about five years now.

That must have proved popular as the station started to gradually increase its coverage in its midweek sports shows. Even then, the mid-week coverage was limited to

the summer once the football season had begun to wind down.

The fact that BBC London are prepared to put a rugby league show on for a hour for seven months of the year must show that there is a demand for the programme that goes well beyond the fortnightly home support at New River and the Twickenham Stoop.

We compete for airtime and column inches with 14 footballs in the Premiership or the Football League, two county cricket sides and four rugby union sides that are either in the capital or have historic links to it. Getting such profile can only help increase awareness of the game across the capital.

Hopefully that awareness

will help produce interest to play and watch the game.

Awareness has been helped over the last decade with the growth of the junior game in the capital. That's helped bring the game to the attention to a far bigger potential audience. That junior participation has also led to a growth in the amateur game and that grassroots element is something that the BBC are keen to publicise.

"We want to show our commitment to what is a growing sport in London," said BBC London 94.9's Sport Editor Pete Stevens when announcing the launch. "It's not just about Harlequins Rugby League and London Skolars, the amateur game is equally - if not more - important."

Local lads will come good

Last weekend was one of massive disappointment for us as a group. We were up against a formidable outfit in a wonderful venue and were dominated throughout the game. Our boys worked as hard as they have all season but we lacked a cohesiveness which game time brings.

We will look to put all those things right this Sunday in our delayed first home game in the Northern Rail Cup.

For a few months we have been talking about giving opportunities to the locally based players and this is something we will absolutely stick to. Last weekend saw 15 British players take the field for the Skolars the other two being on long term visas due to them having settled in the country.

This is a great statement to make and shows where we are going as a club. However as a group of players and

We look forward to the visit of Doncaster whom we had four games

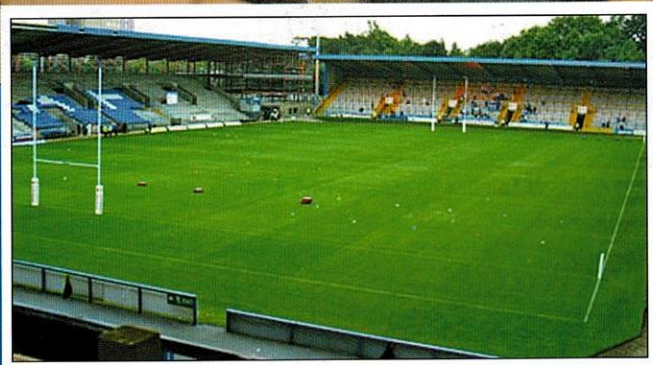
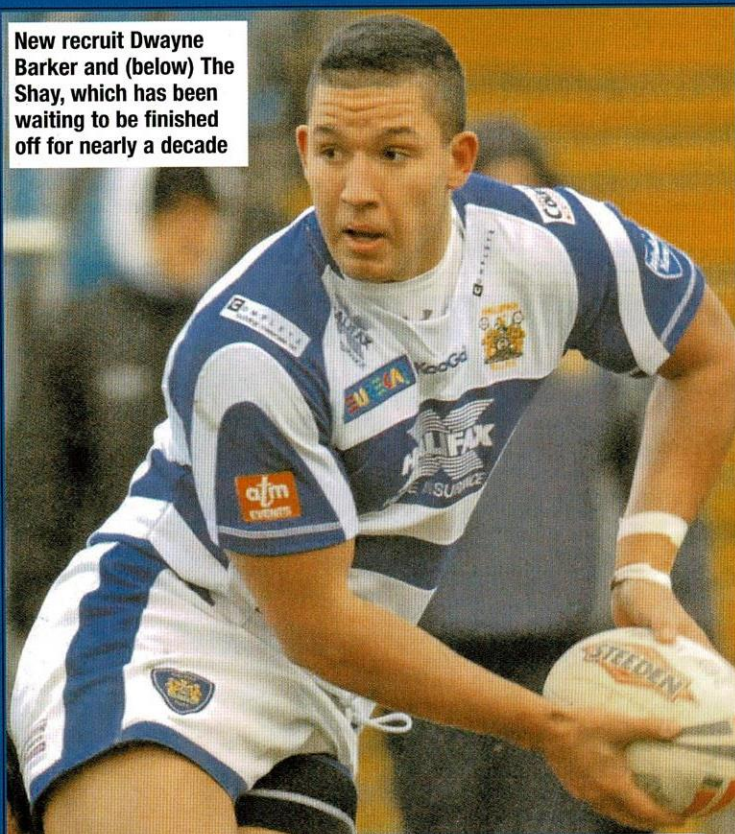
against last year. I know they have recruited well and will be a formidable test for our team this afternoon, but as a group we are confident we will compete with the Dons in every facet of the game.

Final pieces falling into place for Fax

Halifax are many people's favourites to win the Championship this season but off the pitch the club's push for Super League is finally taking shape as GAME ON discovered

CLUB FOCUS – Halifax RLFC

FANS visiting The Shay for Halifax's first home game of the season today might just notice a few differences.

That's because work has at last begun on redeveloping the stadium's run down East Stand, which was left half-finished back in 2001 due to a lack of funding.

Over the winter, developers moved in again after Calderdale Council chiefs gave the green light for a £4.5m redevelopment plan and, over the course of the season, the stand will be transformed from a terrible eyesore into a facility which the club hopes will be deemed fit for Super League.

"One of the main reasons we failed with our Super League licence application was the state of our ground," admits the club's chief executive Graham Clay.

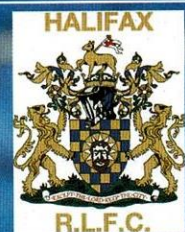
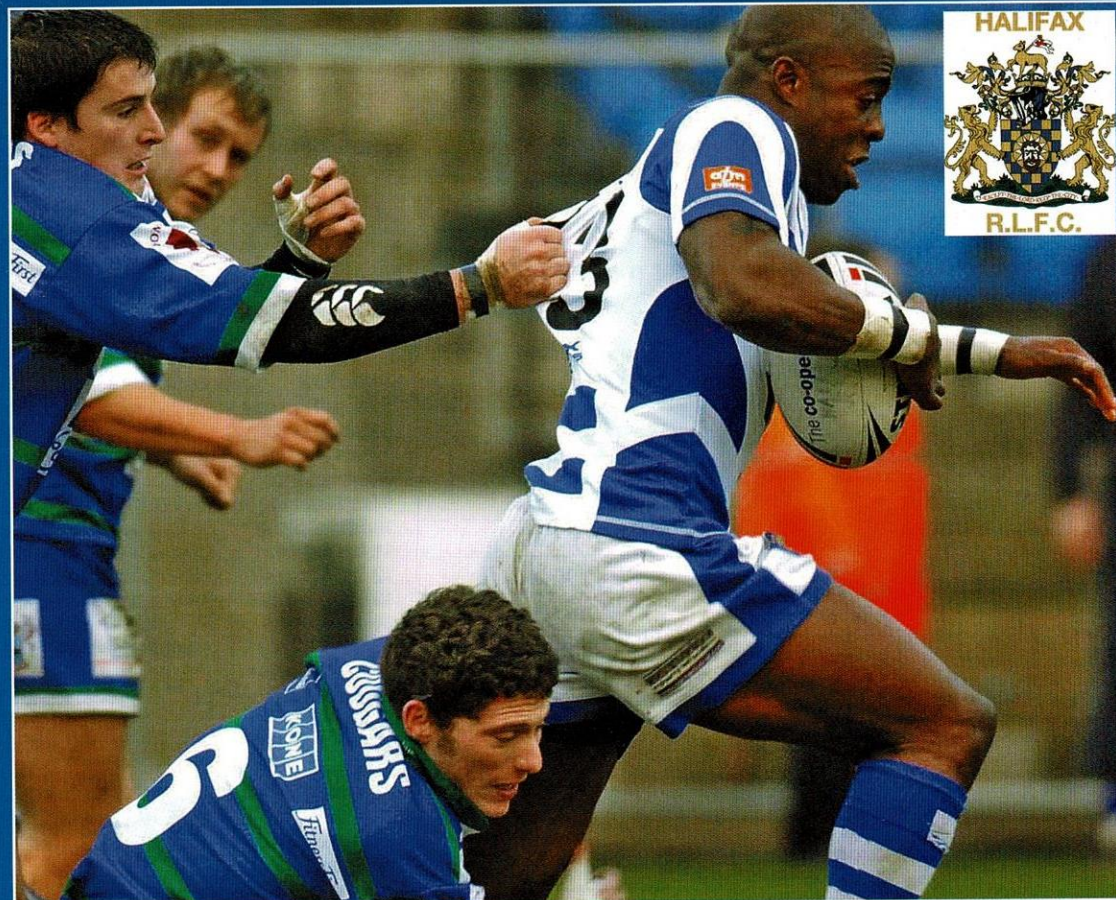
"We were really disappointed with the decision last summer, but we understand what we need to do in order to put forward a stronger case in 2011. It's still our ambition to get back into Super League, absolutely."

When finished, the East Stand will be able to accommodate 3,500 seats, taking the capacity of the stadium up to around 15,000 – a figure that comfortably surpasses the minimum Super League entry criteria of 12,000.

However, those criteria don't solely revolve around the size of a club's stadium, rather the facilities and match day experience it offers supporters. That's why reigning Challenge Cup holders St Helens are so desperate to move into their new stadium and why three-time Grand Final winners Bradford Bulls are so keen to push through with the renovations to the Grattan Stadium as part of the Odsal Sporting Village development.

But the new look Shay will offer a whole lot more to the club, the fans and their partners Leeds Met Carnegie, whose pledge to utilise the development as a college campus convinced councillors to press ahead with their plans.

The stand isn't expected to be fully refurbished until September, with only an outside chance that date could be brought forward (that being largely dependent on West Yorkshire enjoying a rare "good summer"). The likelihood is that the first competitive game of rugby league that it sees will be the first game of next season's Northern Rail Cup.

But, even if the real noticeable changes will only begin to appear around the summer time, as Clay remarks: "Fans here today should notice a bit of a difference already."

"The first few months of the redevelopment have been concentrated on getting the groundwork in place, and also on repairing some of the effects of being exposed to the elements over the past eight years."

"But people will see that the old Weavers club has been demolished, and there is also a hole appearing where a fantastic new glass-fronted restaurant will be situated."

"At the moment, we're able to accommodate 120 match day diners, but once the East Stand is completed that will be up to 400. The restaurant and balcony will offer a pretty unique view of the pitch, and it will be the biggest banqueting facility in the Calderdale area."

"On top of that there will be hospitality boxes, bars for the fans, and new dressing rooms and a gym for the players and coaching staff as well as a college campus and office space for the club."

That office space will come in pretty handy for Fax, who are currently stepping up their operations off the field ahead of

a second Super League licence application in 2011. So too will those top corporate facilities, in view of businesses hit hard by the credit crunch now being a little pickier about their investments.

"It'll just make us more attractive to businesses," says Clay, who reports that business is very much on the up for the club.

"In terms of sponsorship, our shirt is now worth the most it's ever been. The latest deal was worth more than any other in the club's history."

"We're also doing a lot of good work in the community; we have six players full time that get involved with that sort of thing across Calderdale. We've just started a new dance and fitness club, and we've linked up with the local children's museum Eureka! to launch a new 'Mission Nutrition' programme."

"At the moment, all our operations are dotted around the stadium in temporary offices and such, so it will be great to have the East Stand completed. It can be sort of a new hub for the club, a bit like the Carnegie Stand over at Headingley."

But even with a stadium fit for Super League, higher attendances, increased revenue streams and further community activity, Fax – last in the top flight in 2003

– still need to get one vital box ticked.

Performance on the field still counts, and those hoping for promotion to Super League from 2012 know they must have either won the Northern Rail Cup, or reached the co-operative Championship Grand Final over the next few years.

Under the guidance of coach Matt Calland and with the addition of a number of exciting new signings over the off-season – including Bob Beswick from Widnes, Dwayne Barker from Harlequins and Rob Worrincy from Sheffield – Clay is confident Fax are on the right track on that score too.

"We had a good season last year when we finished third, although we were disappointed to lose in the play-offs when we did," said Clay. "This year we want to do even better."

"In the likes of Sean Penkywicz, Paul Smith and Bob Beswick, I think we have some Super League standard players and we're all excited about the potential the side has."

"We certainly want to be up there winning silverware this year."

"With the Northern Rail Cup and the co-operative Championship there are two trophies up for grabs, and we'd like to win them both."

Our execution was off a bit, but that fine-tuning will come with game time over the next few weeks.

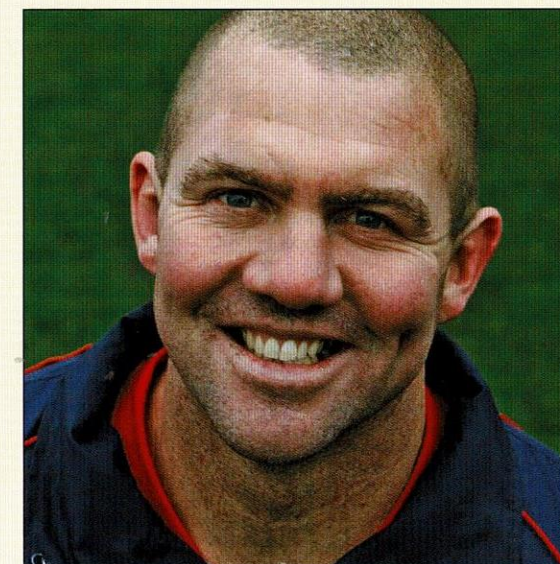
Today we take on Blackpool, and with seven or eight of our former players, and a couple of ours from their end, there will be plenty of connections out on the pitch.

We have a healthy competition for all positions all over the park and this can only work for us in a positive way. With no one guaranteed a run



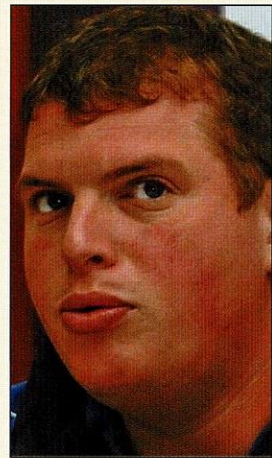

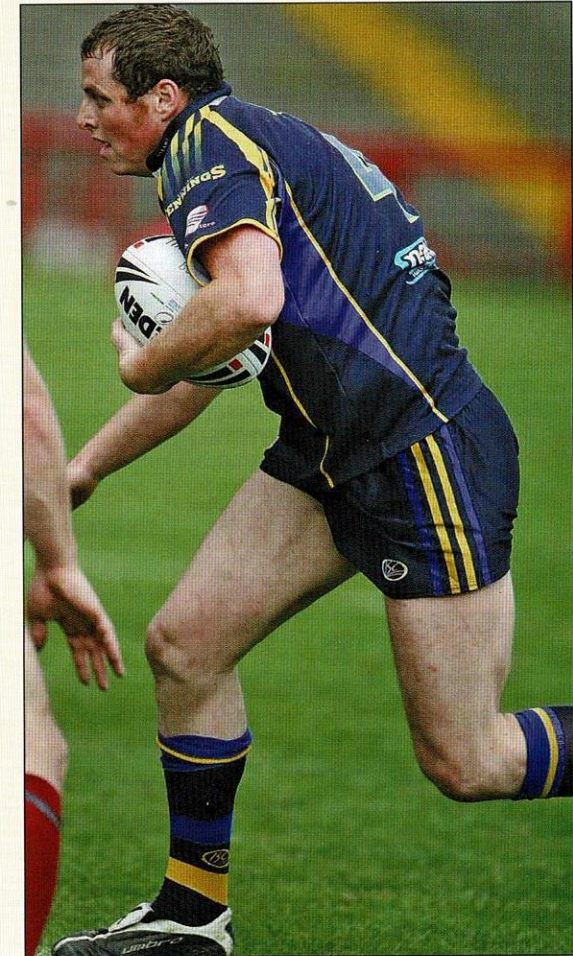

Tonight we welcome the Gateshead players and staff to the Stobart Stadium Halton and know we have a tough task.

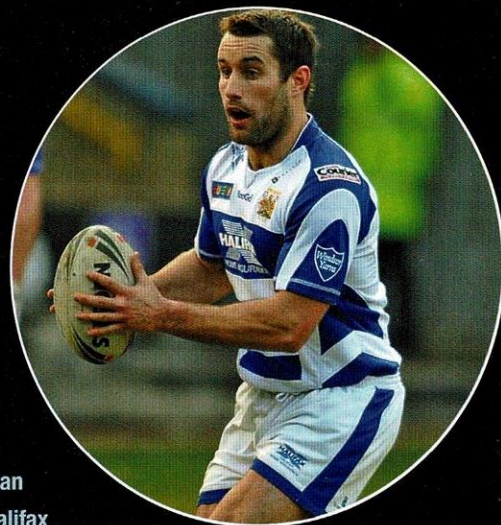
The Northern Rail Cup is an important competition and hopefully tonight we will put the trials and tribulations of the last week behind us and pick up our first win of our campaign.

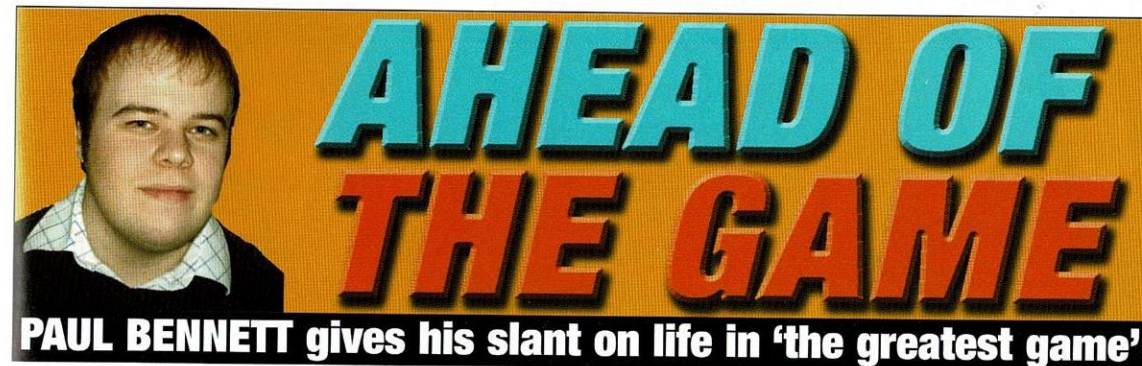

Bradford were obviously supremely confident he'd be granted a visa despite facing trial for allegedly glassing his own girlfriend and then lying to the police about it. If he's guilty of such a horrendous offence then I'll be glad to see him barred from joining Super League, but what happened to the whole idea of 'innocent until proven guilty'?

Presumably, they reckoned there was a chance Bird might 'fly'. One can only assume the good people at the UK Borders Agency get all their sports coverage from the Telegraph.

Lower down the leagues, Whitehaven

have missed out on scrum half Dan Russell who, let's not forget, was one of three nominees for the NL2 Player of the Year award when at Gateshead last year. In his place, they've simply brought in a player with the relevant passport – but odds are such players, reasonably rare as they are, aren't as good as the 'full-blown foreigners' they replace.

Meanwhile, the RFL are granting dispensation to anyone who was a member of any of the squads in the World Cup – but is that really any genuine stamp of quality?

So before we start celebrating the fact our borders have been rammed shut, maybe we should reflect on those still coming by the back door – not to mention regretting the top stars now lost to our competitions.

If you missed last week's picks, well I have a few more up my sleeve for this weekend.

If some of you are reading this article as you have entered the ground and it is around 2.30pm, you might be one of the people that bookmakers always keep an eye on.

These people seem to live in pockets around the Cumbria and Yorkshire areas. At around 2.45pm, or 15 minutes before the scheduled kick of time of a league or cup game, the phones go mad in the call centre or bets fly through on the internet monitor.

We call them the team news punters, as the name suggests these are the type of punters who watch the likes of Dewsbury, Whitehaven and Oldham week in, week out, and when they get the team news – four regulars might be missing – they are on the phone backing the right side of the handicap. That will make you realise how hard it is as a bookmaker to stay on top of all the prices and handicaps in the lower leagues.

On writing this article, Widnes have just parted company with head coach Steve McCormack.

This usually leads to an improved display for the next match. Widnes have another home tie against Gateshead, who to be fair are not the best of travellers. I would suggest a small investment, Widnes conceding 20 points or less on the handicap.

For the next investment, we travel up to Cumbria to a derby match that has the tradition of throwing all form out of the window. But I just see this so one sided and for the first

few weeks I would generally try and lay Workington, who are a team low on confidence, poor on form and with a host of new players that look like they will need a few weeks to gel.

And finally for my nap and this will look a most unusual selection for the team that I am tipping up.

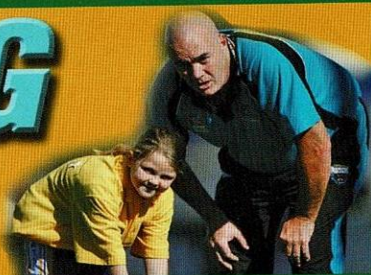

Cougars shape up the schools and Freddie!

Keighley's development scheme sees them work with 2,000 children while the club has taken an innovative approach to helping kids learn about the benefits of eating healthily and keeping active. **GAME ON** explains all

Keighley Cougars have gone back to school and they've gained top marks for their efforts.

The Championship One side has pulled together an impressive development of Rugby League skills in not only their Aire Valley hinterland but in both neighbouring districts of North Yorkshire and Wharfedale.

Currently the Cougars development team, which is headed up by Foundation Manager Dean Muir and Development Officer Tom Hall, is delivering coaching into 34 Primary Schools in two partnerships throughout the region.

The club's participation in the Aireville Sports Partnership and the Oakbank Sports Partnership sees the coaches working with 2,000 children and that's an impressive workload for a small club like the Cougars.

Muir said: "We're delivering the coaching programmes to Year Four and Year Six in the Primary Schools. Each of the schools receives six sessions in their package which are based around Tag Rugby.

"Each course covers a basic introduction to Rugby League and all the core skills the players need to take part in a game.

"Those schools that opt to take part in the tackle tournaments receive an extra two coaching sessions so that their players can cope with the extra demands placed upon them."

Each school has the opportunity to play in six festivals: Boys Year Six, Girls Year Six, Boys Year Four, Girls Year Four, Boys Tackle Year Six and Girls Year Six.

Muir added: "The aim is to provide the children with a great introduction to Rugby League and the Keighley Cougars. The club has been developing the programme during the last four or five years and it is now ready to ramp up to the next level."

When Keighley Cougars Head Coach Barry Eaton returned from watching the World Cup and working with Brisbane-based club Wynnum Manly he was staggered.

The club's mascot Freddie Cougar had gone to seed and piled on the weight. Having escaped the all-seeing eye of Eaton the furry super cougar had feasted on burgers, chips and pies. And they had all landed round his waist line.

He was that unfit that he struggled to keep pace with the queue in the chip shop in Riddlesden just round the corner from Cougar Park!

Eaton laid down the law: "Get fit Freddie or Get out!" That was the hard word and Freddie knew he was facing the sack so he started a six-week 'Freddie gets Fit' campaign.

And Keighley Cougars took full advantage because they linked his campaign to the anti-obesity and healthy eating programmes being run by the Government and area's

Primary Care Trust.

They struck up an exclusive partnership with media partners, the 'Keighley News' and developed a week-by-week 'Freddie gets Fit' progress chart on the newspaper's website.

The club also supported that by developing a 'Freddie Gets Fit' website and a group on the social networking site Facebook.

Freddie's campaign has brought the furry mascot loads of profile throughout the region. He's pulled cars, trucks and trains in the full glare of publicity as well as undergoing a highly public weigh in at a local doctors' surgery.

Helen Carter, the Cougars General Manager, said: "The 'Freddie Gets Fit' campaign has been very successful. Not only has it driven home via the Keighley media that the club is active but it has keyed into vital health messages being made available to children.

town's main shopping mall, the Airedale Centre.

"We made two three-hour appearances in the centre on two separate Saturdays and he was virtually mobbed by kids on both occasions.

"We handed out leaflets in support of the healthy eating campaign and Freddie had his picture taken with loads of people from babes in arms through to senior citizens.

"We have established new partnerships with companies and organisations in our area as we worked through the campaign which will be on long-term benefit to the club.

"Add into that the co-operation we received from partners like Northern Rail and Sunwin Nissan and it's added up to a significant campaign for the

Keighley. The programme is designed at preventing anti-social behaviour and tackling gang cultures in both Keighley and Bingley.

The second element is aimed at the substantial Asian community in the area and is being supported by Bradford Metropolitan District Council.

Together the club and Council are hoping to engage with the Asian community and, besides aiding integration, the aim is to deflect the effects of extremism on the community.

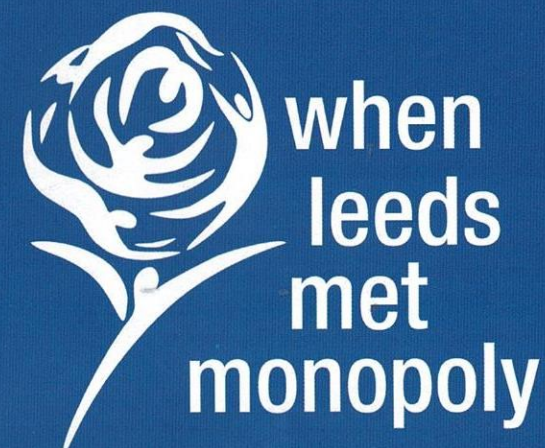

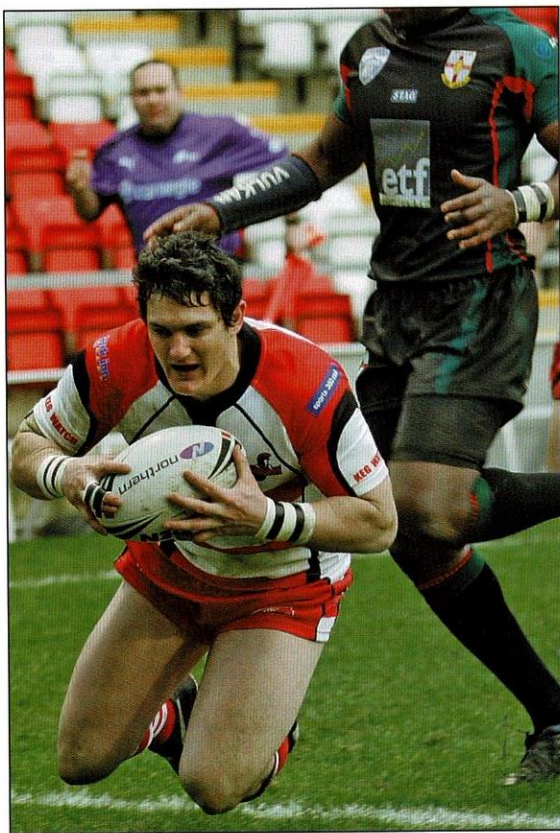
