

FEW people in the UK know the nuts and bolts of rugby league in France better than a man who lives on our doorstep --- Steve Deakin.

A former coach of the year in France, Deaks has worked over there with Cannes, UTC and Catalans Dragons.

This is the Deakin dossier on Lezignan by the man who coached Roughyeds for three years and was instrumental in bringing Said Tamghart, formerly with Oldham, now with Halifax, to this country:

"James Wynne is, without doubt, Lezignan's key man. He might be an Aussie, but he has played in France for about six years now and he knows the game over there like the back of his hand.

"He played a little bit for Newcastle in the NRL, but competition at the Knights was immense so he decided to make a future in France.

"He will be a massive threat carrying the ball. He runs straight and direct -- he is a big lad for a half-

back -- and he has a very good carry and show. He will be a big threat, particularly if he has people running with him. And Roughyeds need to watch out for his dummy.

"Oldham must aim for a good start. If they are slow to start, as they were against Blackpool, they will find it hard to get back into the game against these men.

"They have a big, robust pack with some pace in a young threequarter line. Aurelian Cologni played stand-off in their win at Workington, but there is a school of thought that he is more comfortable in the

back-row or at hooker and that might be one of the reasons why they were not as expansive as they used to be.

"I think we can expect a physical encounter. That doesn't mean they can't play good football or they can't keep their shape, but it does mean they will be looking to their strong, robust pack to take them forward.

"Defensively, too, they will be aggressive. The game over there is making good progress and there are currently a lot of good, young footballers in France, but they still have an aggressive attitude to their game.

"I believe it will be a very good game and I think that, despite Wynne's obvious threat, Oldham will be a little bit more creative at half-back as a pair. It will be a big test for the Coyle boys but I think they will come through."

A LOOK AT LEZIGNAN (PART TWO)

LEZIGNAN arrive at Boundary Park only three days after a French Cup semi-final against Carcassonne.

They are aiming to finish their domestic season as strongly as last year when the Sangliers gained revenge for a Championship final loss in 2007 with a 26-16 victory over Pia to take the trophy back to town 30 years on from their last championship win.

Following that title triumph, celebrations were long and noisy in the small, sleepy town of Lezignan in the beautiful Corbieres wine-producing region of south-west France. This season, though, started badly.

With players either on international duty, injured or still not arrived, the team stuttered early on and defeat in the first match at Carpentras started a run of three successive defeats, including the local derby at Carcassonne.

Jared Taylor, Adel Fellous and player-coach James Wynne were away on France World Cup duties.

Winger Olivier Janzac was on long-term injury, Jye Mullane had gone to rugby union, and Luke Hession and Chris Beattie had not arrived. Philippe Laurent suffered an early suspension so a poor start to the season was not a total surprise.

However, even when the international players were back and the squad was complete, the expected improvement in fortunes did not happen.

Things came to a head when the Sangliers lost at home to Carpentras in January and a crisis meeting between the directors and the players ensued.

Since then performances and results have improved. A 112-point blitz on Lyon - several of their players were absent because of a dispute with the club - was perhaps not typical, but a good win against UTC and the 18-6 Challenge Cup win at Workington, proved that the team was functioning again.

In fact, an eight-match winning sequence followed, the 28-20 victory away at Pia on 22 March being especially satisfying.

Lézignan then took over in third place from Villeneuve, whom they beat last Sunday 30-14.

Player-coach scrum-half, James Wynne, who reached a Challenge Cup semi-final with Toulouse in 2005, is Lezignan's key man although the experienced Aurelian Cologni is almost as important.

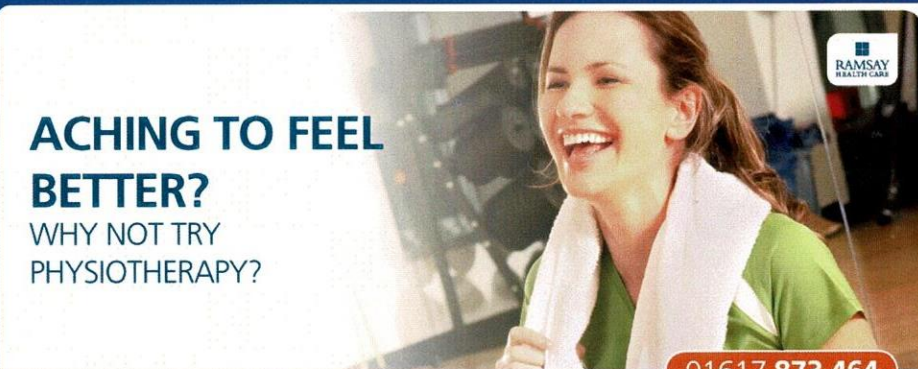
World Cup fullback Jared Taylor has the knack of chiming into the attack at just the right time, but their game is built firmly on forward power with Chris Beattie, Adel Fellous and Alister Brown immense in attack and defence in the deluge at Workington.

Despite the dominance of overseas players at Lézignan, the club is still producing its own young players, and the junior side has also reached the semi-finals of their Cup competition, the Luc Nitard.

'Bubbly' Ballard smashes through points barrier

RAISE a glass to Andy Ballard, our points machine and record breaker.

Handy Andy's nine goals and three tries - 30 points - against Workington last week smashed the new club's points-in-a game record and equalled the Oldham club's all-time record set 81 years ago.

And guess what? Our 22-year-old winger from Wigan hadn't a clue what all the fuss was about when he was asked to report to the boardroom after the game.

"I only found out in the directors' room when they gave me a bottle of champagne," revealed Andy. "I was gobsmacked, but it was a nice surprise. And now I fancy beating it again... and again!"

Ballard (pictured scoring one of his three tries against the Cumbrians) won the club's champagne-moment award for beating Danny Halliwell's 28 points in a game last season and then caused club statisticians to thumb through the all-time record books before rewriting them.

"It's no secret that I've got one eye on Mick Nanyin's points-in-a-season record," he added, "but it isn't something I dwell on. I just take each game as it comes. "It makes you think a bit, though, when you realise how close you came to doing something that no other player had ever done in the whole history of professional rugby league in Oldham.

"If the kick off the touchline that hit the post had squeezed in I would have cracked the record outright. I'll have to make sure I get it next time!"

It was on Easter Monday, April 8, 1928 that Abe Johnson, also an Oldham winger, set the record with two tries (worth three points back then) and 12 goals in a 60-5 win against Widnes at Watersheddings.

In terms of the new Oldham club, Mick Nanyin last season equalled Gareth Barber's 2002 record of 26 points in a game and then Halliwell smashed it with 28 points from four tries and six goals, also against Workington Town at Boundary Park in a 40-16 win on August 24 last year.

Not even the legendary Bernard Ganley could eclipse the 30 points recorded by Johnson way back in the Roaring Twenties and now equalled by Ballard some 81 years later.

Only five players in the 114-year history of pro rugby league in Oldham have finished a season as top of both the club's try and goal charts - Reg Farrar in 1922, Abe Johnson in 1928, Tommy Martyn in 1992, Daniel Brown in 1999 and Mick Nanyin in 2008, although Nanyin was only joint top try scorer with James Coyle, each with 21.

Nanyin last year kicked 139 goals and added 21 tries for a points haul of 362 - a record for the new club which Ballard is keen to challenge.

He currently heads the club try AND goals charts with eight tries and 37 goals - 106 points - from seven appearances out of a total of eight competitive games.

A place in the fifth round awaits the winners and teams will be looking at the all Super League games and relishing the chance to go further in the cup than either Leeds or Saints - now that doesn't happen too often !

Our thanks go to the competitions sponsors Leeds Met Carnegie for their backing and we hope that their representatives at the game today enjoy the occasion.

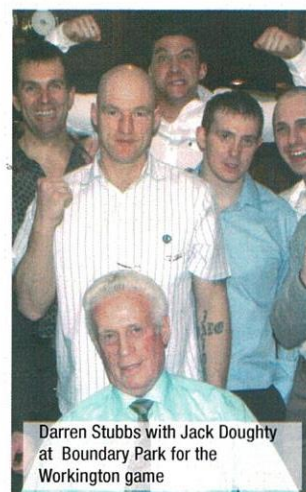

No 6 CRAIG ROBINSON



A family at peace - despite those rugby league rivalries

Roger Halstead talks to the Roughyeds' 'Exercet Missile'

TRY to talk to one member of the rugby family Robinson of Wakefield and before you know it you are chatting to them all. That's the Robbo way of things - a family united and at peace despite rugby league's rivalries and despite the threat of the 'Exercet Missile'.

I phoned the family home to speak to Craig and ended up talking also to his brother Adam and to their Dad, Michael - and if the eldest boy, Mark, hadn't been on duty with the Navy "somewhere in the North Sea" I've

no doubt he would have had a word or two to say as well.

Common denominator? They are all steeped in rugby league and they all owe much to the little amateur club that groomed them, Stanley Rangers.

Michael, proud as punch of his boys, and rightly so, used to be a coach in the junior section down at Rangers.

And each of his boys followed the same pathway from the age of five ... first Mark, then two years later Craig, and two more years after that Adam.

Fast forward to 2009 and the Robbo brothers are still playing the sport to

which the whole family has devoted so much of its life over the past 25 years or so.

Mark (25) plays at hooker for the Navy and, whenever he is at home, at prop for the family's beloved Stanley Rangers.

Craig (23) has arrived at the Roughyeds this season, where coach Tony Benson is converting him from a prop to a second-rower, after a few years with Wakefield Trinity Wildcats and then three seasons at Rochdale Hornets.

Adam (21) also started with Wakefield before joining Oldham via Doncaster and later leaving to sign for Dewsbury Rams.

Now it just happens that in two weeks time Oldham and Dewsbury will go head to head here at Boundary Park in what has all the makings of an absolute cracker between the bookies' joint favourites for the Co-operative Championship One title and, with it, automatic promotion.

And if all goes according to plan for the Robinson boys, and their Mum, Elaine, Craig will be in the Oldham team and Adam will be wearing the colours of Dewsbury.

The boys clashed several times last season when Adam

was a Roughyed and Craig was a Hornet, but this time it would be an extra special confrontation with so much riding on the match and with Adam returning to Boundary Park to take on his former team mates - and his brother.

You see, both Adam and Craig live at home with Mum and Dad so there is no escape from the rivalry.

Says Michael: "Both Elaine and I just love seeing the boys playing sport. We try to divide our time up equally and that isn't only watching Oldham and Dewsbury, it's travelling down to Portsmouth to watch Mark playing for the Navy.

"Of course, we wouldn't miss Oldham v Dewsbury for anything. I tend to support the team that's losing when we have a boy on each side, but Elaine just loves seeing them out there and taking part.

"It will be a big day out for all the family, and we'll be meeting up with friends as well. There might be rivalry on the pitch but once the game is over we'll be united as a family again. That's how it has always been, and that's how it always will be."

Adam "can't wait" for Sunday, April 19 and his return to Boundary Park in a match which he believes will go a long way to deciding the outcome of the championship chase even at this early stage of the campaign.

And Craig? "First, we've got Rochdale on Good Friday and I would like to prove a point there and at the same time do enough to keep my spot for the Dewsbury game.

"If Adam and I are on opposite sides I don't think you'll see us clash very often because he usually keeps out of the way! He knows I'll be lining him up for a big hit so he usually makes sure I don't get anywhere near him."

I reckon that's fighting talk. Craig laughs it off. "Seriously, we get on great," he said. "All three brothers do. Me and our Adam clashed about five times last season. He tries to smack me, but it really is surprising how rare it is in a match that we actually come face to face and head on."

Perhaps Adam is wary of the Exercet Missile. Let Craig explain: "Dad took me down to Rangers when I was five. Through the different age groups I nearly always played a year young, but I still got the nickname 'Exercet' because of the way I used to launch myself into tackles.

"It was a name that stuck for years, certainly all through the days when Stanley Rangers under-16s and under-18s were winning National titles and right up to the time I joined Wakefield.

"We had a crack youth team at Rangers that included lads who went on to play professionally such as Kevin King (Rochdale and Batley), Paul Hughes (York), Mark Applegarth (York) and Rob Spicer (Dewsbury)."

Craig made his debut for Trinity's junior academy side against a Leeds Rhinos side that included Danny McGuire, Rob Burrow and several others who went on to make big names for themselves at Headingley.

Aged 18, he picked up a Wakefield players' player junior academy award and a year later he was named player of the year in the senior academy.

He made his full Wildcats debut against London Broncos at Belle Vue when Shane McNally was Trinity coach and he got his chance in a young Wildcats side because Michael Korkidas was injured.

The young Robbo played at prop off the bench and in McNally's post-match individual ratings he was named by the boss among the top three

performers on the day.

Around that time he and Adam each won a player-of-the-year prize in the under-21s, but come the end of the season he wasn't offered a full-time contract and he felt it was time to look at other options.

"I don't know whether my face didn't fit or whether they didn't think I would progress any further, but I got myself an agent, Rochdale came in for me and that's how I came to have three very enjoyable seasons at Spotland."

Darren Abram was his first coach at Hornets, then Bobbie Goulding and finally Darren Shaw. Also there at that time was Tommy Goulden.

Craig was highly thought of by Abram, who guided Hornets into the play-offs -- they lost at Whitehaven -- but left part way through the following season when results were not going right and when Sean Gartland was put in charge to see the season out.

Then came Goulden and Shaw in quick succession. Robbo was vice-captain by this time and he played a prominent part in a run of nine wins out of ten which earned Hornets a play-off derby against Oldham towards the end of last season.

Despite this run, Hornets were slow to re-sign their vice-captain and Oldham nipped in to sign a player the Roughyeds had long admired.

Said Craig: "I was impressed by the chat I had with Chris Hamilton, and our Adam also told me that Oldham was a good club and that he had enjoyed his time here so I signed on the dotted line, and I am glad that I did.

"I've played prop most of my life but Tony (Benson) wants me to play second-row. I'm still getting used to the position, but I was pleased with my performance in the pre-season friendly against Huddersfield; not as pleased with it up at Barrow; and then against Rochdale I got injured in my first run.

"It was good to be back against Workington last Sunday. It was a great win and, happily, my elbow stood up fine to the test and I came through all right."

Craig gets more than his fill of rugby league because when he isn't training or playing for Oldham he is engaged in his full-time post as a development officer in the Wakefield and district areas.

The post is funded jointly by the RFL, Wakefield Council, Wakefield Wildcats, Castleford Tigers and Featherstone Rovers.

One of his jobs is to help to see that youngsters in that area get similar, or even better, opportunities than he and his brothers got.

And that won't be easy given that Mark, Craig and Adam were reared in a family united by rugby league --- the Robinsons of Wakefield.

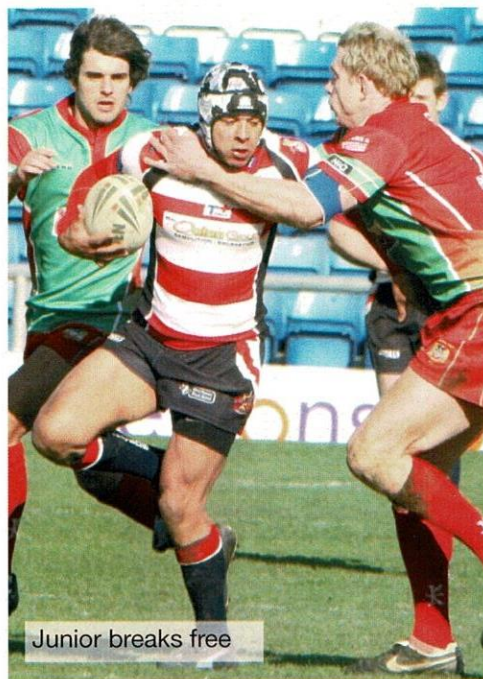
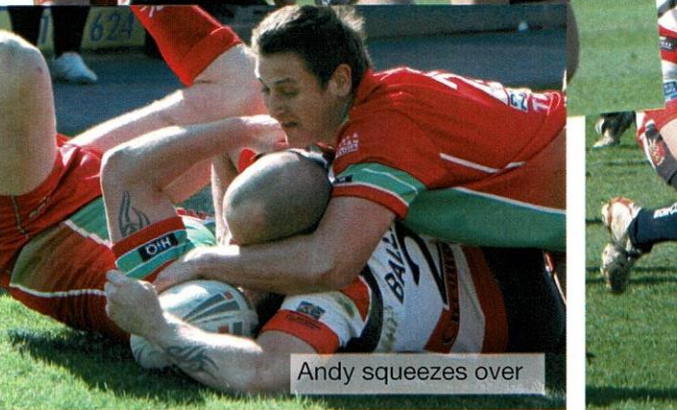

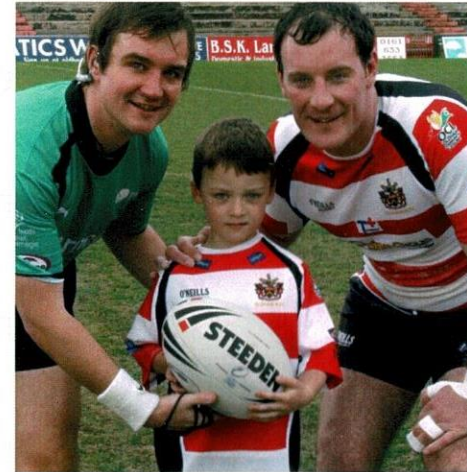

"This is a massive development for rugby league in Ireland," said Oldham boss Tony Benson, "because Stevie and Wayne are the first two fully-fledged Irishmen to come through the Irish development system and go on to coaching."

"This represents a massive breakthrough for the development of the game in Ireland. Things are definitely moving forward over there."

Benson himself has close ties with the Irish Rugby League and he was instrumental in many ways in the remarkable rise of Gibbons and Kerr from Sunday social rugby league in and around Dublin to places in the full Irish World Cup squad for last autumn's series in Australia.

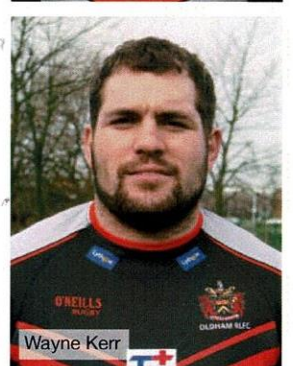
Gibbons was to spearhead an Irish Students' training camp in Dublin and then take charge of the squad at a Four Nations series, also featuring England, Wales and Scotland, to be held in Bradford from April 3 to April 10.

Added Benson: "These appointments are great for Irish rugby league, and great also for Stevie and Wayne."

"As head coach, Stevie will do well. He is an intelligent man with a good understanding of the game."

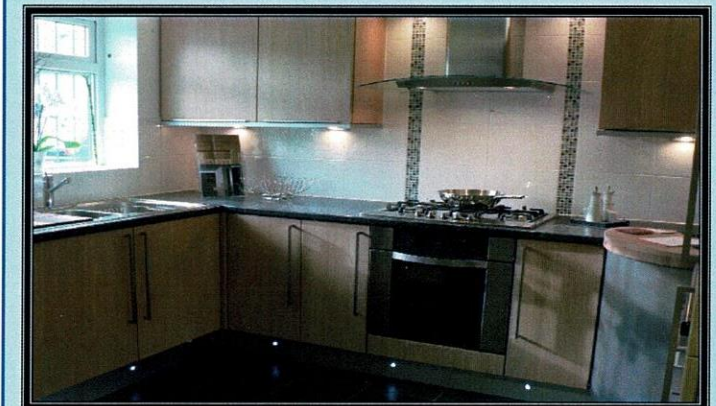
"And as far as the students are concerned, he and Wayne will be legends. Here are two true Irishmen who have come through the ranks via Irish Wolfhounds and Ireland 'A' to become members of a World Cup squad and to play professionally at a club like Oldham."

"They have been on tour to places like Russia and New Zealand and the young Irish students will see what they have achieved and will be keen to emulate them."

Daring to dream as the big boys roll into town

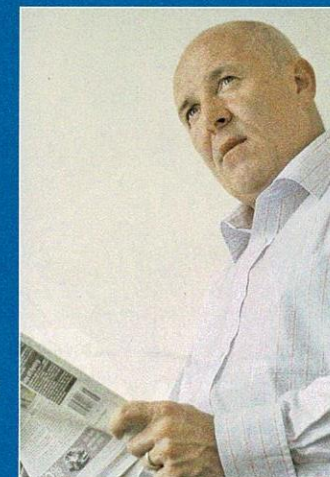

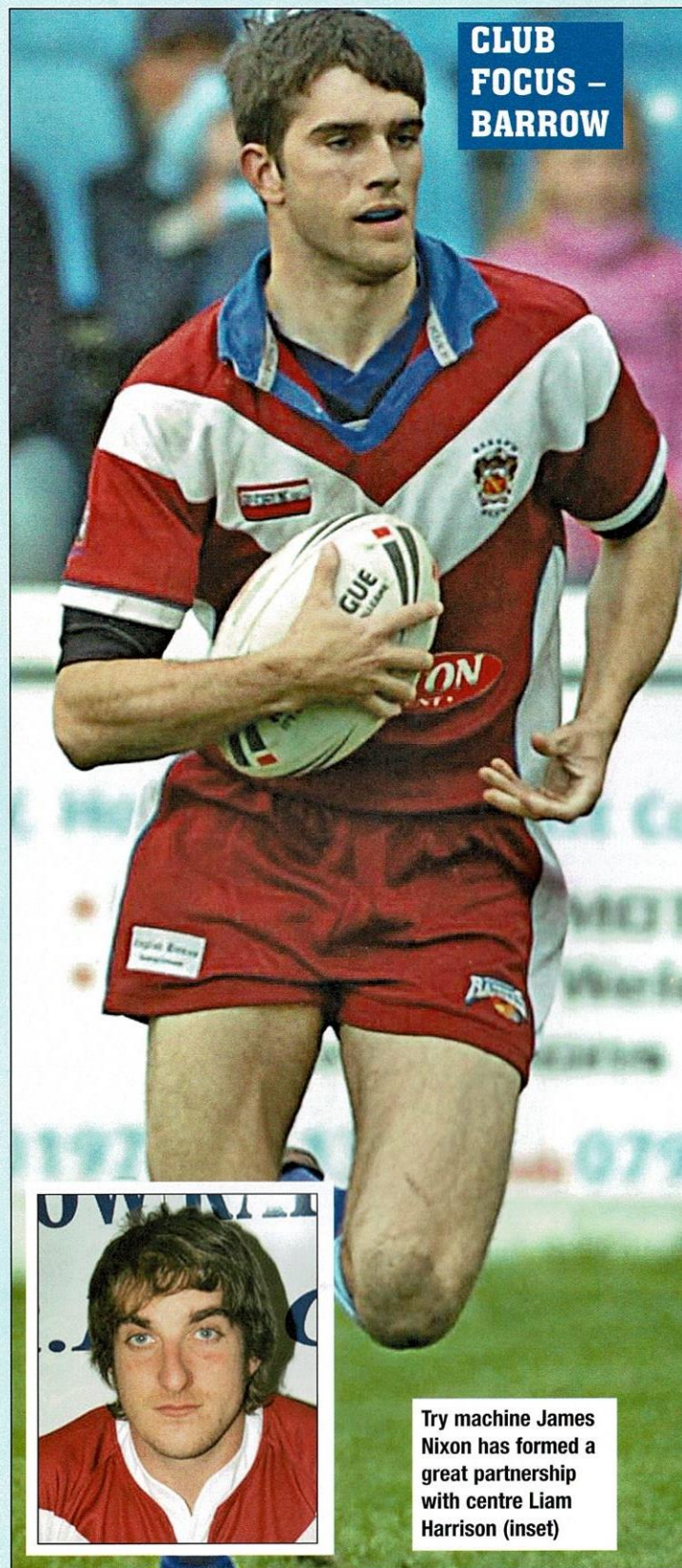

Buzz returns to Barrow

Drawing Wigan in the Challenge Cup has thrown Barrow into the national spotlight. GAME ON spoke to club stalwart Dave Sears about how the club is thriving once more after more than 20 years of struggle

THESE are exciting times for Barrow Raiders – and vice-chairman Dave Sears should know.

Sears has followed Barrow since the heady days of the 50s when they reached three Challenge Cup finals (winning it in 1955), and Cup fever has struck once more in Cumbria with the mighty Wigan coming to town.

Barrow are also riding high in the Co-operative Championship following promotion last season while they have a Northern Rail Cup quarter-final against Dewsbury in June and Sears reckons that not since lifting the Lancashire Cup in 1983/84 have they had it so good.

"We've had good times in between but the actual atmosphere and anticipation hasn't been like this for at least 20 years," he said. "Rugby league in Barrow is on the crest of a wave right now."

It's been all hands to the pump to get Craven Park ready in time, with more than 1,000 Wigan fans to travel to Cumbria.

Around 4,000 Barrovians are expected as the fourth-round tie has captured the imagination of the town, even the shipyards.

"Tickets went on general sale a week last Sunday at 8am and the lad who runs the shop couldn't get parked to open up because of the queue," said Sears.

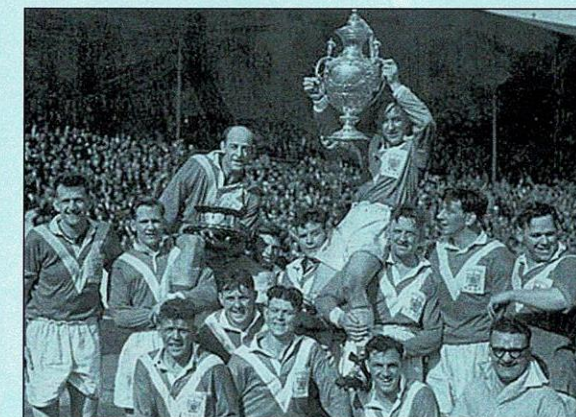
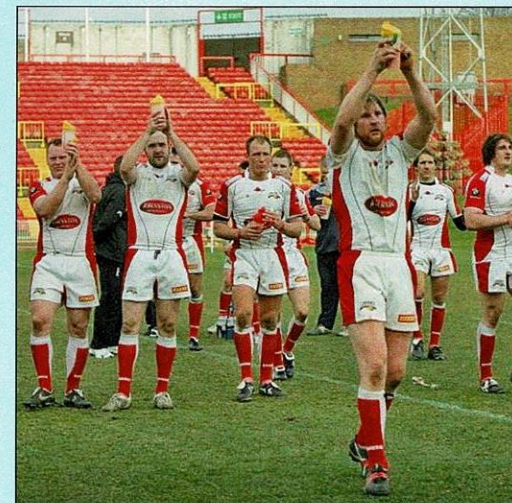
"We had people coming straight off nights at the shipyards to make sure they got a ticket."

"The national papers were making enquiries about coming up for the match and our press box holds two men and a pigeon so they'll have to be perched on the roof."

"We had Wakefield last year, which was a good tie and both the club and players were fine ambassadors for Super League. But this is Wigan, and this is what the Cup's all about, isn't it."

"As long as we don't disgrace ourselves it'll be great for the people of Barrow to see the superstars of Super League at close hand."

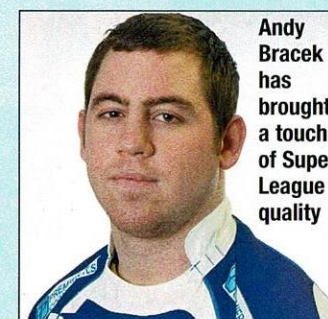

come back. It's raised our profile but we've been doing that all year anyway and everybody's talking about us."

The catalyst for Barrow's recent resurgence has been the arrival of chairman Des Johnston, also a life-long fan, who first got involved with the club in 2006.

Johnston has befriended Brian Noble through their passion for Manchester United and the Wigan coach has cast his eye over potential signings on Barrow's behalf.

Sears describes Johnston as "a bit of a character, who has a win, win attitude that's rubbing off on everybody" and that has lured the likes of ex-Super League players Andy Bracek, Gary Broadbent, Andrew Brocklehurst and Paul Noone to the club.

Season-ticket numbers have doubled with the average attendance rising from 1,600 to 1,800, and comfortable league wins over Doncaster and Gateshead have shown that under coach Dave Clark, Barrow will make a better fist of things than their last season at this level in 2005, when they claimed just one league win.

"Last time we got promoted we didn't

spend any money and the gates went right down," said Sears.

"We went straight back down so already this year we've won one league match more than we did in the whole of that season!"

"This time we're spending on players in the hope of recouping that through the turnstiles, and it is a gamble."

"It's been bankrolled by the chairman but his pockets are only so deep and it's the people of Barrow that will determine where we go in the future."

"Zeb Luisi has just arrived, we've got Ned Catcic to come and we make no secret of the fact we've got other signings to follow too."

"The buzz is there, it keeps people talking about us and it's another reason for people to come along and have a look."

"We're yet to play to our full potential, though, and hopefully we'll hit it against Halifax this week, which would really cause some shockwaves."

Things are improving off the field too, with John Thomason recruited as a partnership manager from Swinton and the

club is going into schools in Cartmel and Grange-over-Sands for the first time.

"We're heading towards the M6 now," Sears added.

"We're trying to grow that part of our business and our reputation."

"We're trying to look forward and trying to put things in place instead of living on a day-to-day basis as not only ourselves but a lot of other clubs have done for years."

Barrow's immediate success, though, and their chances of upsetting Wigan to a great extent rest on jet-heeled winger James Nixon, who scored a phenomenal 35 tries last season, and his centre Liam Harrison.

"Harrison's nickname is the Bull, and if it takes two people to stop him, then you leave the flying machine (Nixon) outside him unattended," said Sears.

"If you stop them on that side then you've got to go to the other to confront Ian Bell – it takes three or four to bring him down – and as Doncaster coach Tony Miller said, 'we know what they do, stopping them is a different matter'."

Saints star Jon muses about the difficult game at Wakefield, looks forward to Leeds and shares his thoughts on the rest of the Carnegie Challenge Cup draw...

NEWSROUND-UP



CHALLENGE CUP STAT ATTACK

Catalans and Lezignan are left carrying the French flag in the fourth round this year, after PARIS ST. GERMAIN were the first French club to appear in the Challenge Cup, in 1997.

They won 38-4 at Batley Bulldogs in round four and lost 8-4 at Salford Reds in round five.

Catalans hold the record for the highest score by a French club in the Cup with a 70-12 home defeat of Featherstone Rovers in the 2007 fourth round. Catalans also hold the record margin win, 66-0 at home to Thornhill amateurs in the 2006 fourth round. Catalans are the only French club to reach the final, losing 30-8 to St. Helens in 2007.

Bradford Bulls ran up the highest score against a French club with a 98-6 fourth round home defeat of Toulouse last year. It was also the widest winning margin.

A record three French clubs appeared in the fifth round in 2005: Pia Donkeys, Union Trezieste Catalan and Toulouse. Toulouse were the only winners and went on to become the first French club to reach the semi-finals, losing 56-18 to Leeds Rhinos.

INTER-DIVISION CUP CLASHES

THERE have been 146 Challenge Cup meetings between Super League and lower division clubs.

Super League clubs have won 138 and of the eight lower division wins only two were achieved by the away team.

The only victory by a team from the third level was Hunslet Hawks' 18-14 fourth round home defeat of newly promoted Huddersfield Giants in 2003.

The last two lower division triumphs were in 2006, Widnes Vikings beating Castleford Tigers 14-4 in the fourth round and Hull Kingston Rovers defeating Warrington Wolves 40-36 in round six. Both were home victories.

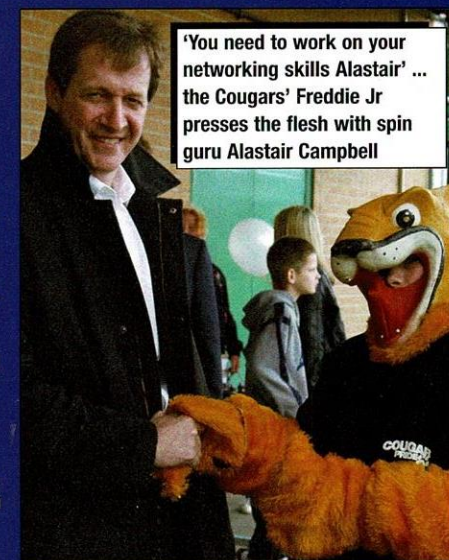

first year of Super League (1996) with Dewsbury beating London Broncos 12-10 at home and Widnes winning 17-10 at Workington Town in the fourth round, while Salford Reds had a 26-16 fifth round home win over Wigan.

Later, Keighley Cougars had a 21-8 fifth round win at Halifax Blue Sox in 1997, Leigh Centurions a 16-12 fourth round home defeat of Salford City Reds in 2001 and Hunslet's defeat of Huddersfield in 2003. Leeds Rhinos registered the biggest 'Super League win over lower division opposition when they won 106-10 at Swinton Lions in the 2001 fourth round.

CARNEGIE CHALLENGE CUP RUNS

ST. HELENS, the holders, have the current longest run of appearing in round five not having been knocked out at the first stage for top division clubs since 1995. Then they were beaten 40-24 in a fourth round replay at home to Wigan after drawing 16-16. Of this year's fourth round clubs Keighley Cougars have gone the longest without reaching the fifth

round, having not achieved it since 1997. Gateshead Thunder have not gone beyond the fourth round since they entered the competition in 2001.

AMATEUR CLUBS

The last amateur clubs to reach the fifth round were Ellenborough Rangers and Egremont Rangers in 1998. Ellenborough lost 78-0 at Hull Sharks, and Egremont lost 84-6 at Sheffield Eagles.

The record was set by Abe Johnson with two three-point tries and 12 goals in the 60-5 home defeat of Widnes on 9 April 1928.

It's tight at the top

JUST HOW competitive the Co-operative Championship promises to be this season was hammered home across the fixture list last weekend, with only high-flying leaders WHITEHAVEN recording a double-digit victory margin.

Even that, against an improving TOULOUSE side making its way to the far north-west of the now 'Europe-wide' competition, was hardly a runaway, with the men from the Recre prevailing 40-26 in the end.

Indeed Aussie Nathan Wynn looked like sparking an upset in the early stages before coach Ged Stokes sent on 'enforcer' Graeme Mattinson to close him down. In the end the tiring Frenchmen were just denied the bonus point their efforts deserved.

Still in Cumbria and division favourites HALIFAX only just kept their unbeaten start in one piece, edging the spoils 26-24 at BARROW.

They managed to turn around a 16-8 half time deficit and surge into a 26-18 lead but the battling



Barrowmen narrowed it to just two points with nine minutes left to play – and they could have stolen victory right at the death but for Dwayne Barker's timely intervention.

WIDNES coach Paul Cullen had the air of a man confident in his side's ability to stay the course after they saw off a determined SHEFFIELD EAGLES 28-20.

"Credit Sheffield for their start but patience and composure were vital," he said. "You have to respond when it is not going your way, although we tried to score on all our plays."

"We created three or four scoring opportunities in the first 20 minutes but the final execution wasn't there. We opened them up but didn't nail it."

"We got a little rattled when we didn't score, but we kept our composure and in the end we came away with the most important thing which was the win."

"I was disappointed that we conceded tries from kicks – that is something we need to work on."

The Eagles had led until the stroke of half time, but coach Mark Aston was particularly disappointed with the penalty count which young Dewsbury whistler James Child levied against his side.

"Were we so dirty and were they so squeaky clean?" inquired Aston of the 10-3 tally afterwards. "I have asked the question and sometimes you get an answer and sometimes you don't. I won't be holding my breath!"

The Thursday night televised game at BATLEY'S Mount Pleasant ground produced a real 20-20 thriller with visitors GATESHEAD – not that it looked like that early on as the Tynesiders stormed into the lead and almost out of sight.

But with the benefit of the famous Mount slope and a very strong wind at their backs in the second half, the odds were always on a resurgence from the Gallant Youths and a 20-4 interval lead was

n't quite enough for the Thunder.

Gateshead boss Chris Hood was disappointed afterwards that they didn't snatch all three points, but Bulldogs coach Gary Thornton was equally left rueing some flapped goal attempts from George Flanagan.

DONCASTER have finally got their new board in place and although they got their first point of the season, couldn't turn it into a win against visitors LEIGH, going down 24-18.

Defences were very much on top in a scoreless first 23 minutes and although Leigh surged to a convincing interval lead, Doncaster fought back bravely.

Dons coach Tony Miller said: "I can't fault the lads for effort and defensively we were pretty good. But in the first half our completion rate was shocking; we only completed four sets and on six occasions we gave away possession on the very first tackle. It was always going to be difficult at 24-6 but we had a go at them."

Tough lesson for Skolars as Hawks soar at last

AFTER recording good exam results last term it seems the London Skolars class of 2009 may need to go into special measures after a nightmare visit to a HUNSLET side also struggling to make an impact.

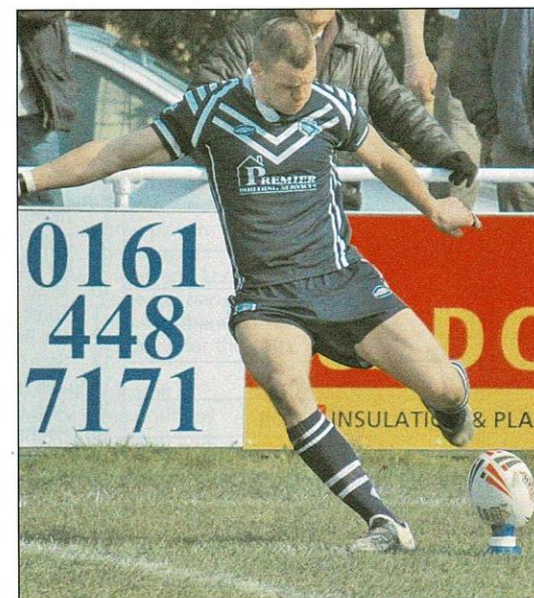

"There is still a lot of improvement in us," said Oldham coach Tony Benson. "But the good thing is that we were trying things. We scored 12 tries and bombed another four good chances, and that willingness and confidence to try things was good to see."

"We were much faster at play-the-ball than at Keighley and defensively we were much more effective at the ruck – and that was definitely the result of being able to do two full training sessions on grass for the first time."

Pity poor HORNETS RL



who came so close to putting a major dent in their -9 league points penalty before being denied right at the death by in-form DEWSBURY RAMS.

And it was a penalty from the boot of Rams loosey Patch Walker, one of six goals on the day, which broke the Hornets' heart in a 33-31 nail-biter.

The clubs swapped penalties and drop goals and the lead as the seconds ticked down only for the former Shaw Cross Sharks man to edge Warren Jowitt's men home after the final hooter had sounded.

It's now seven wins in a row for the rampant Rams though arguably it will be Hornets boss Darren Abrams who will be most encouraged by the performance of his team which is rapidly starting to take shape.

Better things – and results – look certain to come from the men at Spotland.

Following a hard time at the Rams the previous week, YORK CITY KNIGHTS chalked up a win, but in another nail-biter at home to plucky BLACKPOOL PANTHERS, 22-20.

York looked to be in reasonable control with a 14-4 half time lead but Martin Crompton's men are a different proposition these days and actually fought back to take the lead briefly around the hour mark.

It wasn't to be as David March put Wayne McHugh over for his second.

Gareth Langley had a difficult chance to tie the game for Panthers with a late conversion but it drifted wide.

Knights director of rugby James Ratcliffe was happy with the win but still thinks there is plenty more to come from the Knights.

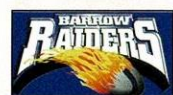
"We made some good yards but the options we took at the far end of the field left a lot to be desired," he said. "The completion rate wasn't high but we came away with the win."

If SWINTON LIONS were resting on their laurels after racing to a 26 point lead against KEIGHLEY COUGARS then coach Paul Kidd will no doubt be reminding them of how tough this division is this season.

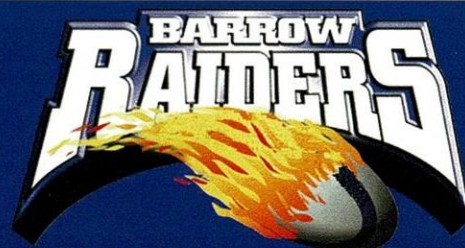

It will be a test of their skills, abilities and, most importantly, attitude as they take on full-time players from the Super League.

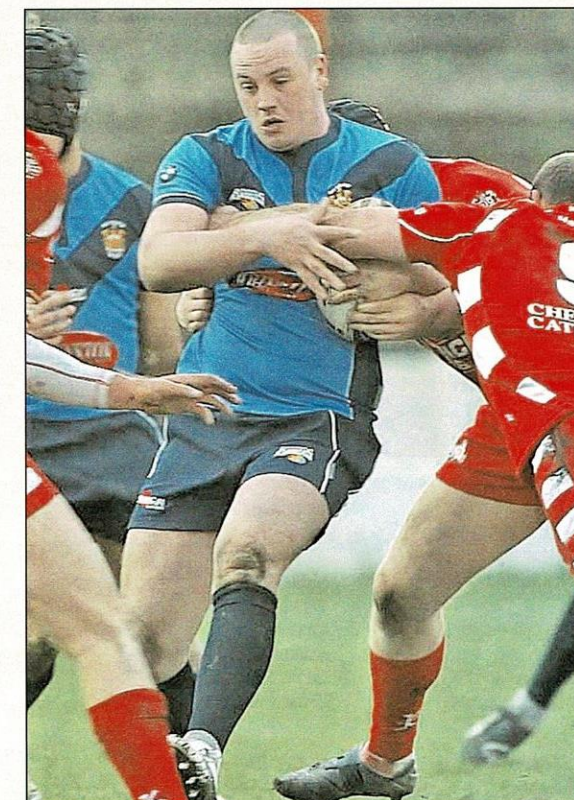
Andrew Bracek and Lee Dutton are none too happy that injury will keep them out of the reckoning for the game.

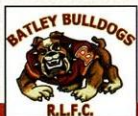

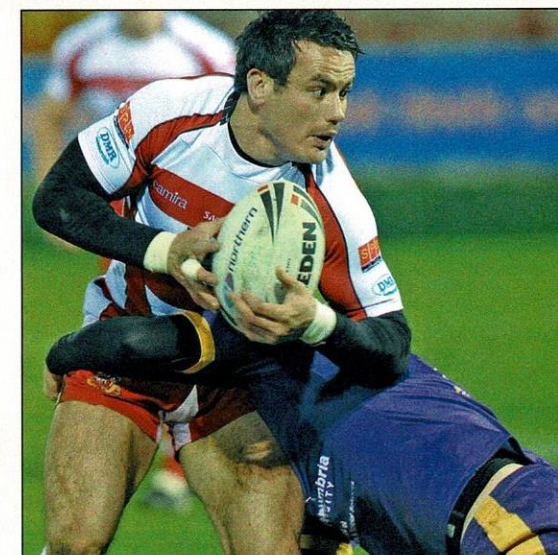
I think it's fair to say our upturn in form has been mirrored by the return of some key players. Jonny Campbell and Jermaine McGilvary have

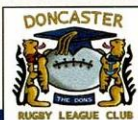
Eyes wide open ... Danny Maun looks to break the Thunder line

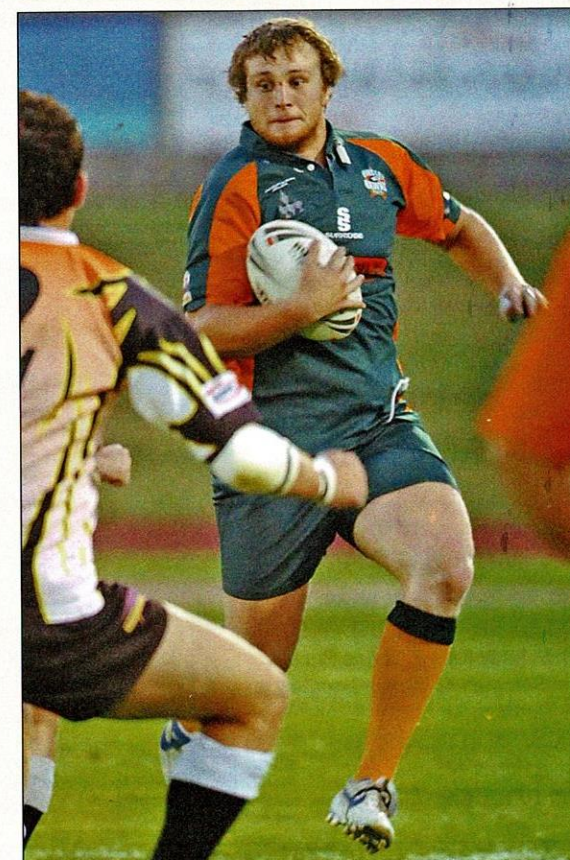

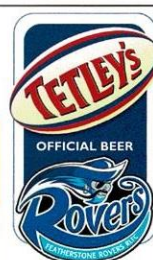
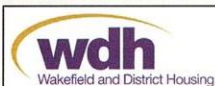

Most teams would have wanted this tie for themselves, as with an amateur club the perception is that you are guaranteed a trip into the next round.

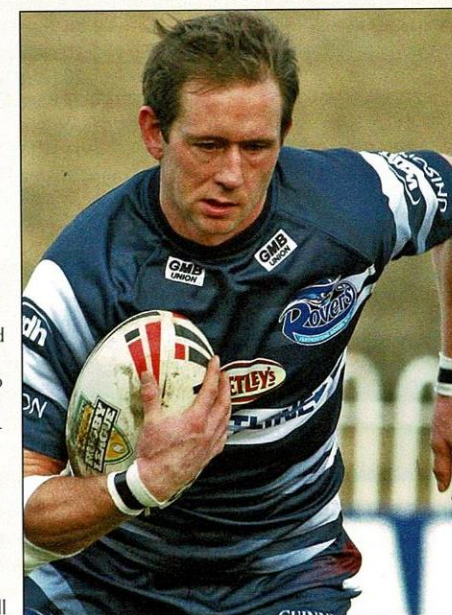

During my time at Leeds we had a conditioner in Edgar Curtis who was a practicing wrestler. He worked with us on our tackle technique to make us more effective in terms of finishing our tackles.

The fact remains that coaches will: a) Try and speed the play when you have the ball, and; b) Try and slow the play when you don't.

It is basic common sense and the RFL must be clear what is and what is not acceptable, then we all know and coaches can get on with coaching within the boundaries laid down.

Today is one of those games that make the Challenge Cup special. I hope all at the game have a great day.

We will be looking for a big improvement in certain areas tonight.

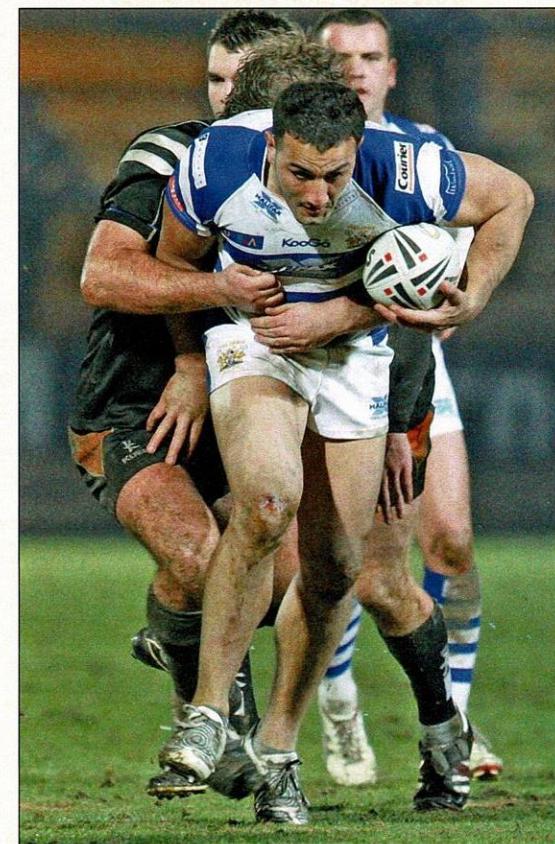
On the plus side, we showed real mental toughness to come out and win the game in the second half after being 16-8 down at the break.

can afford to turn up without the right mental attitude every week or you will end up on the losing side.

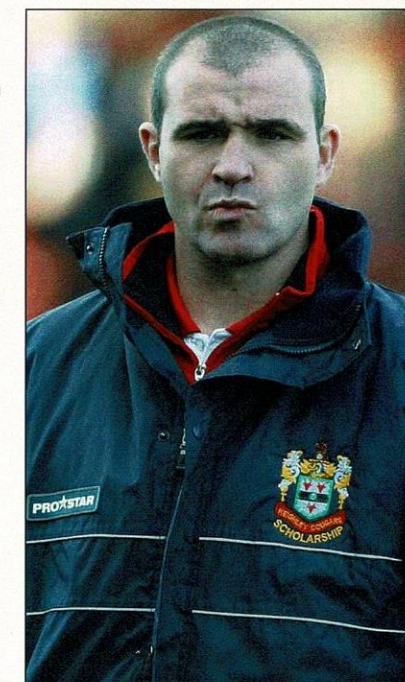

All the boys really put in the work and were going full out on each other in contact sessions. We also had two very good video sessions which I also think paid dividends.

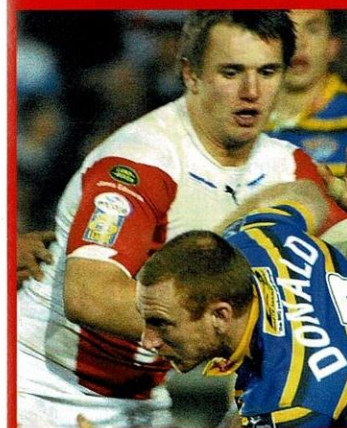

Here at Oldham we want to do well in every competition we take part in and we will be going all out to try to make sure our name is in the hat for round five -

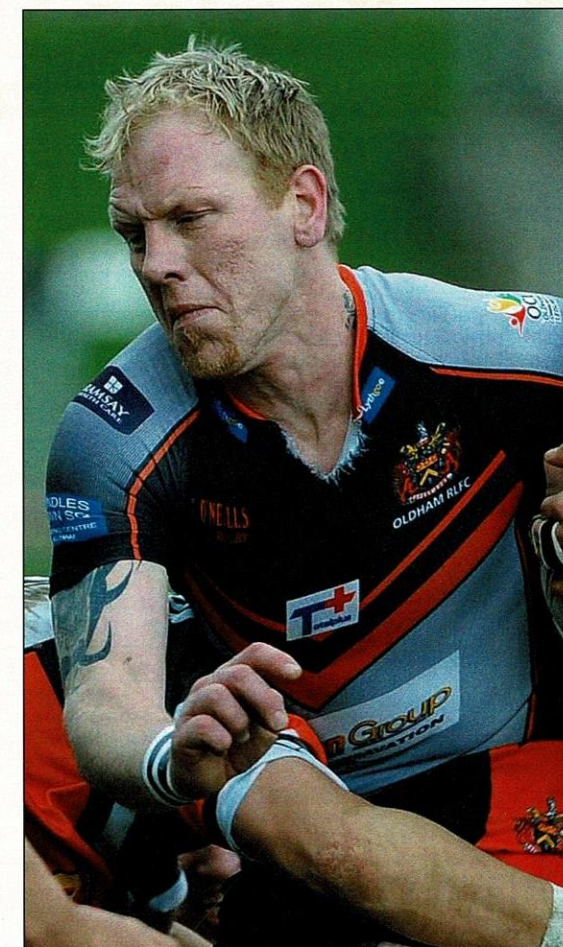
although we are aware of just how tough a challenge Lezignan will be.

Double whammy danger for us!

Totesport's expert rugby league odds compiler **MIKE OXLEY** considers the bookies' nightmare in the Challenge Cup



Challenge Cup 4th round week in bookmakers' terms means try and close the doors and try not lose too much money and at best make a little profit. As a bookmaker who knows at the best of times it is hard to make any profit on the minor leagues, the majority of profit is usually made from the Super League. The same rules apply with football where most money is made from the Premiership and you try and make small profit in the minor English leagues and Scottish leagues.

This weekend's Challenge Cup 4th round ties have 32 teams ranging from Wath Brow in the amateur leagues up to the Super League teams making their entrance into the competition.

The handicaps produced by different bookies in recent times very rarely range by more than 4 points in Super League and Championship games, but in the Challenge Cup you do get anomalies ranging up to 12 points difference. The strategy known as a double whammy comes into play.

The example of the double whammy is if two bookmakers have two different handicaps on the same game. For example Bookmaker 1 are Featherstone -56 v Wath Brow +56 at 10/11 and Bookmaker 2 is Featherstone -68 v Wath Brow +68 at 10/11.

A punter would have £110 on Featherstone -56 at 10/11 with Bookmaker 1 and £110 on Wath Brow +68 with Bookmaker 2. The punter is hoping that Featherstone then beat Wath Brow by

more than 56 points but less than 68 points so that both his bets win and he would return £420 for an out lay of £220 – a profit of £200. If Featherstone did not win by that margin then the punter would return only one bet which would return him £210 for an outlay of £220 a loss of £10, so basically a punter is risking £10 to make a return of £200 which is a 19/1 winner in real terms. So you can see why it is called a double whammy and punters lick their lips when the opportunity becomes available.

Right, it is time to enter the minefield and see if we can pick out some value pointers towards this weekend's games. There are five all-Super League ties and make a note for next week's matches, as it might be fruitful which teams playing next week are fresher, like for example Castleford and Warrington who on paper have relative easy matches, and so might be able to rest a few players this weekend.

We are going up to Cumbria to start with and in recent weeks I have mentioned how Dave Clark's Barrow have been growing in confidence and improving week on week. They are up against a usually formidable Wigan side that in recent years would see this game as a cakewalk and rest a few of their stars.

But not this weekend. Wigan, low on confidence after another humiliating home defeat by Huddersfield (containing half of Wigan 'rejects') need to win this game convincingly.

Craven Park with a Barrow team including ex-Super League players in Gary Broadbent, Andrew Bracek and Paul Noone is the last place you want to visit to try when trying to build up confidence in yourselves. I think the handicap will be set around a 20 start to Barrow and on current form I can see Barrow keeping within the handicap quite easily.

Of the other ties I can see Wath Brow competing for around 30 minutes and this match will depend on how serious Featherstone take it. I think the handicap will be set around the 50 mark, which if so I can see Wath Brow staying within the handicap. So good luck in punting and keep your eye out for a possible double whammy!

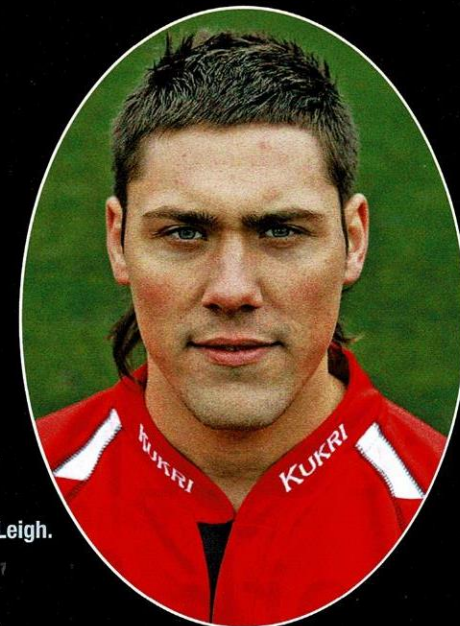

Feeder system can work for everyone

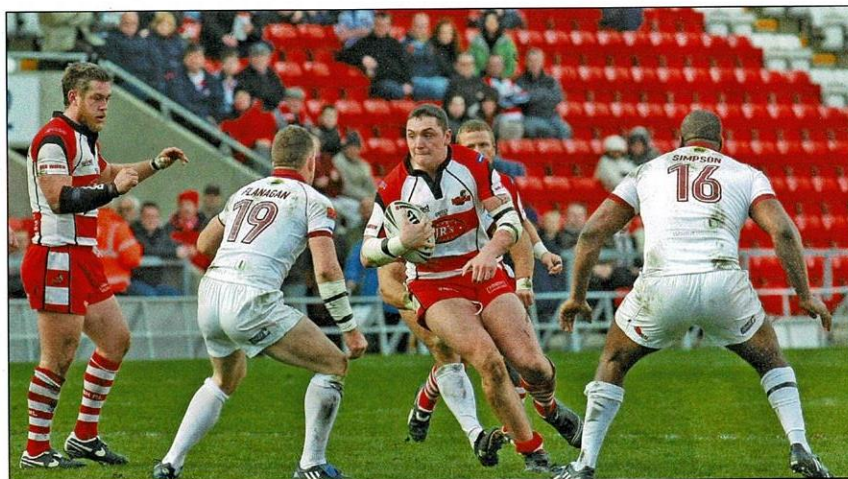
AS you might have read in League Weekly, the Rugby Football League last week took tentative steps towards forming a 'feeder'-style system between engage Super League and the co-operative Championships.

Now the RFL didn't actually use the 'f word', and well might they tread carefully over this awfully emotive issue. Clubs in the Championships don't want to be seen as second-class citizens, simply there to serve the big boys – even if, in truth, most of them may well be exactly that.

Any move that suggests an existence of permanent subservience to the bigger clubs sticks in the craw of many supporters of once great rugby league names such as Leigh, Featherstone, Oldham, Swinton etc.

But with the new licensing system, not to mention the current global economic slump, has come a new, more realistic approach by many club chairmen and chief execs – and a few fans too. Enough, hopefully, to ensure we don't abandon the whole idea just because it's a little complicated.

I can understand John Kear's concern that many co-operative Championship clubs have ambitions to play in Super League of their own – and that producing their own players, not just helping to

develop someone else's, is key.

But the RFL's idea to introduce a "dual registration" system (whereby up-and-coming Super League players can also be registered with a Championship club and therefore play for them instead of the reserves) needn't get in the way of those ambitions.

I'm sure a balance can be found. There's no reason why such a scheme can't be introduced for some clubs to take advantage of, while others with higher ambitions (Widnes, Leigh, Halifax, Featherstone etc) concentrate on breeding their own talent.

The benefits for British

rugby league could potentially be massive. There's no denying that the current reserve competition – which is now set to be scrapped in favour of an Aussie-style U-20s comp – is failing many of our young players.

The competition simply isn't sufficiently intense to prepare players for the rigours of Super League and those who have been following the increasingly exciting action of the lower divisions over the past few years must concede that both the Championship and Championship One provide far better breeding grounds for top talent.

And for the Championship

clubs themselves? Well, they get access to some of the top young talents in the game – increasing the quality of their teams and the division as a whole even further. That means less reliance on overseas imports and, crucially these days, better value for your money at the turnstiles. As I see it, everybody wins.

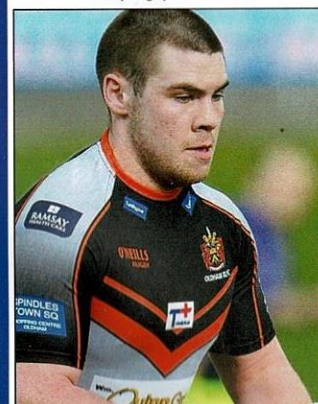
