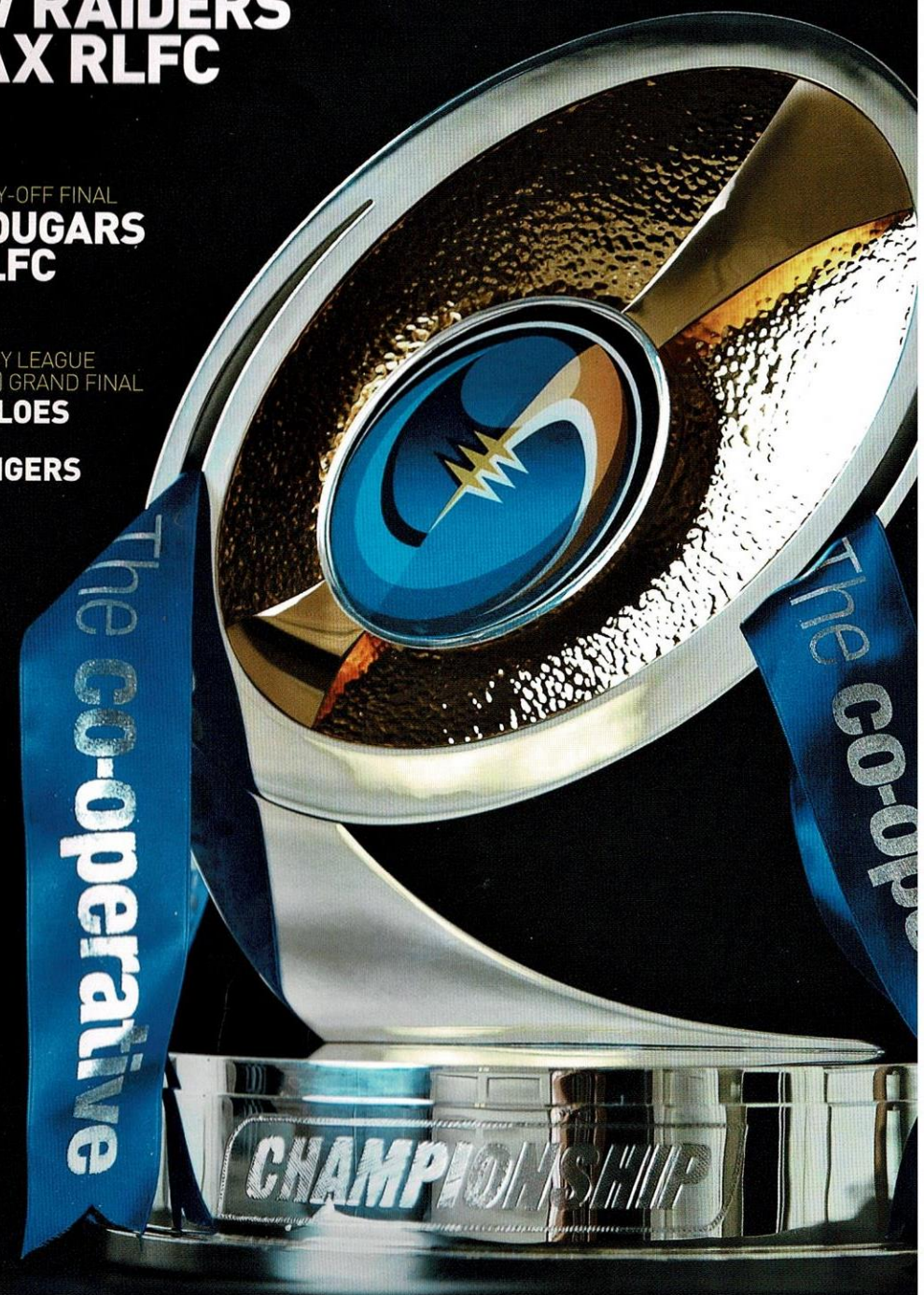

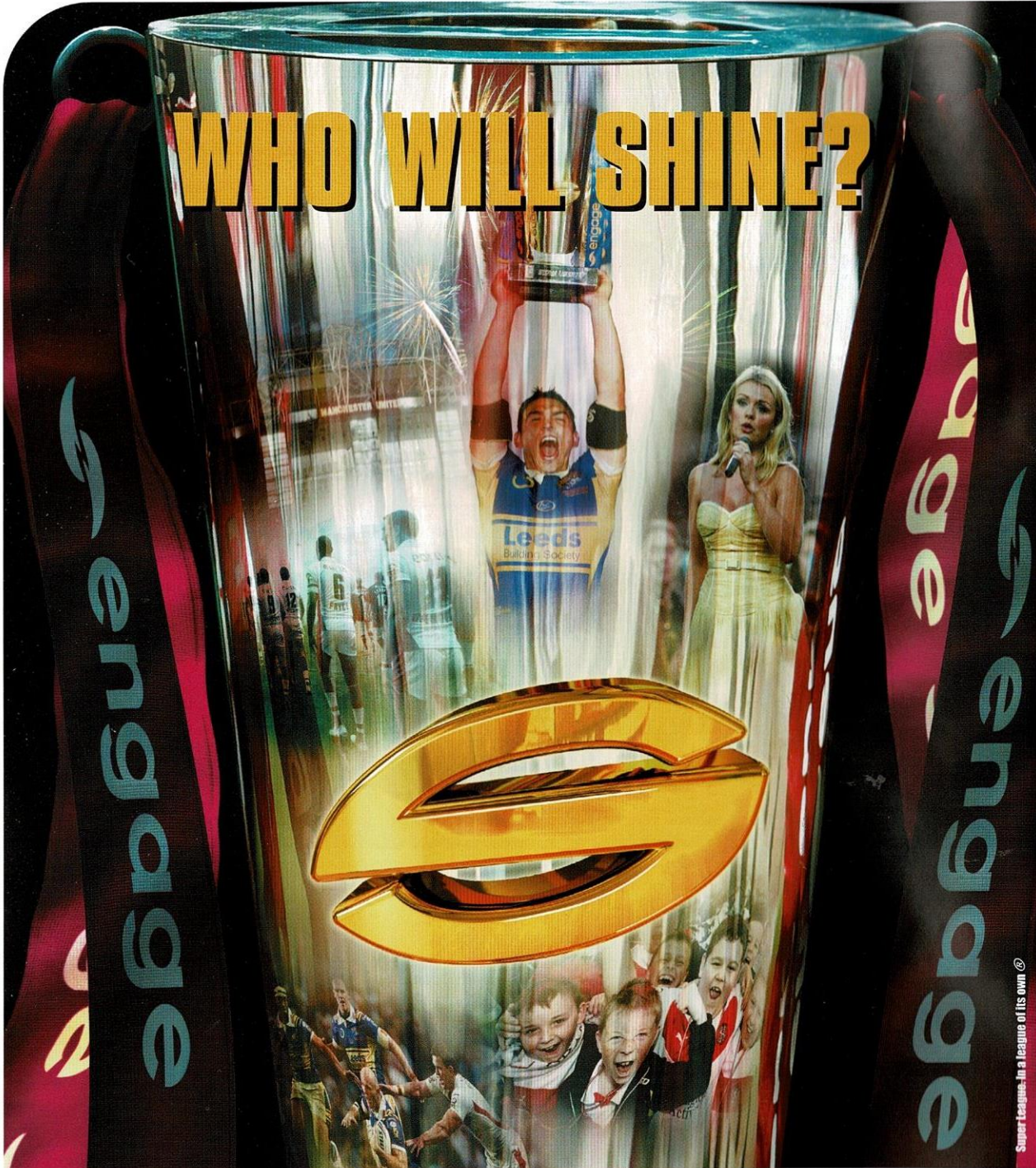

## MAN OF THE MATCH AWARDS

The Rugby League Writers' Association will select today's Man of the Match award for The Co-operative Championship Grand Final, and the winner will be presented with the Tom Bergin Trophy. The Co-operative Championship One Play-off Final Man of the Match will be awarded a commemorative trophy, while The Co-operative Rugby League Conference National Man of the Match will be awarded the David Oxley Trophy.

## IN THE EVENT OF A DRAW

If, at the end of 80 minutes, the scores are tied, then the match will be decided on a 'Golden Point' basis with the winners being the first team to score. If that score is a try, then no conversion kick is necessary. In addition, any unused interchanges from normal time are carried over.

They may have been Barrow's bogey team in the league this season, but when it came to the crunch and a place in the Co-operative Championship Grand Final was at stake, the Raiders beat Halifax in impressive style, to book their trip to Warrington.

Ill-discipline from the visitors gave Barrow their first breakthroughs, as a penalty from Jamie Rooney opened the scoring, and then another penalty offered the field position for Liam Harrison to find top scorer James Nixon out wide.

Neither side could make pressure pay for a while, but Rooney added a drop-goal to his impressive night with the boot, then Ballard crossed to put the Raiders 15-0 up at half-time. Halifax had their chances to reduce the arrears, but lacked the composure and handling to get on the score sheet until just after the hour Ben Black broke through to send Shad Royston between the posts for a six-pointer.

Rooney was still

bossing the game, however, and he restored a three-score lead when his run helped Ned Catic bag another converted try.

Nixon's run set up Bracek soon after to put the result beyond doubt, and after another Rooney penalty was converted the winger accepted Catic's pass for his second try of the game and 31st of the season.

Another late Royston try got the visitors into double figures but the Cumbrian fans were already celebrating by then. And after a performance like this they will feel confident of glory today.

Halifax, meanwhile, would have a second chance to make the Grand Final when they met the winners of the Elimination semi-final. An improved performance would surely be essential.

But Widnes hit back before half-time through Tim Hartley, and early second half pressure saw Hartley crossing again, then Anthony Thackeray's

solo try was converted to edge the Vikings in front.

Yet Haven weren't finished, and a penalty and drop-goal from Rudd restored their lead with nine minutes left.

Widnes chose to gamble, and it paid off as they regained possession from a short kick-off and worked the ball to James Webster for the match-winning try.

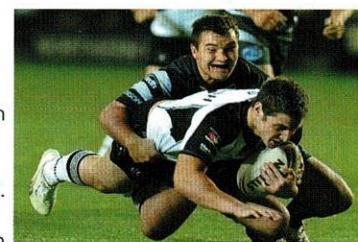

The home side got off to the perfect start with tries by Gavin Dodd and Anthony Thackeray both converted by Tim Hartley. But Featherstone seized on errors by the Vikings with both Andy Kain and Kyle Briggs touching down.

Harris converted both and added a penalty just before half time to nudge them ahead. After the interval, a 90-metre interception

try from Waine Pryce and a short range effort from Jack Lee, both goaled by Harris, made it 26-12 and Rovers looked to be on their way. But the Vikings came storming back with converted tries from Shane Grady and Richard Varkulis. Yet Harris wasn't finished, and late on he converted his own try for a famous victory.

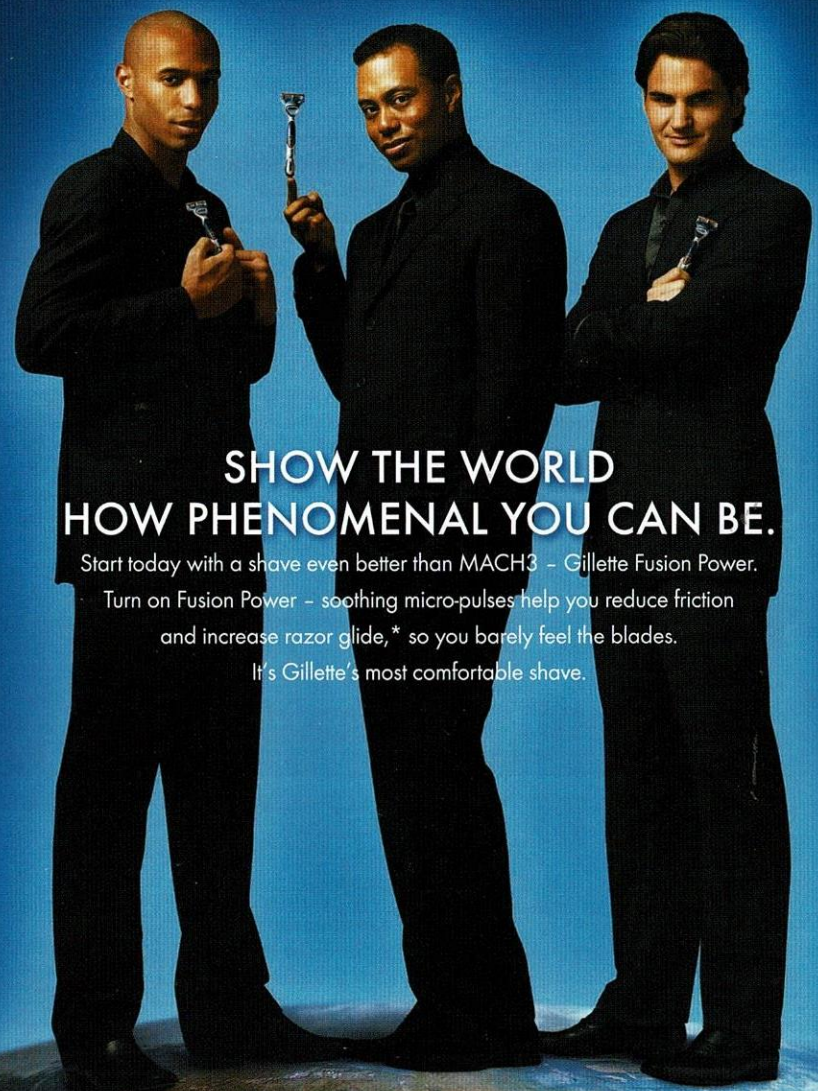
A riveting contest in which the lead changed hands five times hung in the balance until the final whistle.

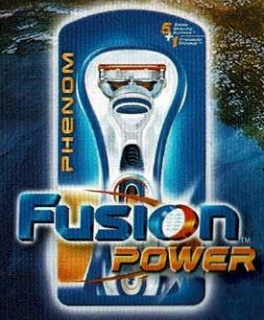

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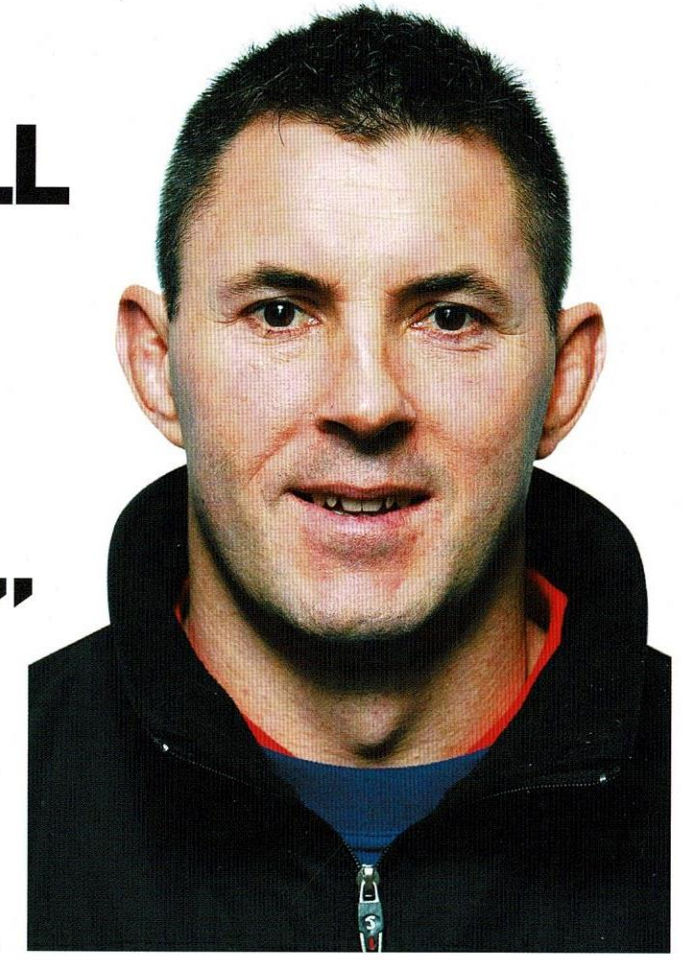

**■ What would it mean to the club and to you to win today's Grand Final?**

It would be a fantastic achievement. We've achieved a lot already in finishing top of the league, and to reach a second final of the year is testament to the efforts the players and the chairman Des Johnston have put into this club.

**■ What were your realistic expectations when the season began?**

I don't think anyone at the club, or the fans, knew quite what to expect this year - we'd just got promoted so our first priority was just to do as well as possible at this higher level. Des Johnston came along and put a lot of time and money into the club and bought some good players in, so now our ambitions are growing all the time. What we've done so far is fantastic but we now want to take it to the next level and actually win some silverware.

**■ It's been an unusual year for you - Steve Deakin was appointed above you in July, and then he parted company with the club a few weeks later...**

Yes, Des brought some new players in and Steve as well, and I think the club needed that. I'm still learning as a coach and I need to be mentored a bit to learn a bit more about the technical side of the game. I learned a lot from Steve and it's improved me as a coach so I think it's worked out well for the club and for me.

**■ This is an ambitious club - will there be more changes next year?**

I'd hope there would be a certain amount of stability - these players have got us to where we are. That said, the new coach

who comes in will want to do things his way, and there's also the challenge of other clubs being interested in our players. Des is working hard to keep them here and continue our progress.

**■ You have come into form at the right time - is that a tough trick to pull off?**

In play-off football you see players go the extra mile. But that can go for and against you. They know they've got one opportunity to perform. But the trick is to play your normal game and not be too psyched up for it.

**■ Will the experience of playing in the Northern Rail Cup Final help you?**

I think everyone learns a lot from big games. I think we know a few areas where we'll do things differently, and hopefully we'll go one better this time. ■

# “WE’RE GOING TO DO EVERYTHING WE CAN TO GET IT RIGHT THIS TIME”

Barrow’s wing wonder **James Nixon** has had quite a year - 31 tries, a new baby, and now a second major final appearance. Can he make it even better today?

■ **What does it mean to reach the Grand Final?**

It’s a big achievement for any player to play in any sort of Grand Final. It’s going to be a huge occasion for everyone.

■ **As a Barrow-born lad, have you noticed the increased interest in the Raiders recently?**

Yeah, the interest has definitely picked up over the last three seasons since Des (Johnston, chairman) has come in and brought high quality players to the club. This year everyone’s talking about what we’ve achieved so far, topping the league and reaching the Northern Rail final. I think it was beyond anyone’s expectations if we’re honest.

■ **You’ve been with the club since you were a teenager – how have things changed in that time?**

I think this is my seventh season and the club has massively changed since then. In my first season we got promoted but we had a nightmare the year after. We struggled and went down again. But then Des came in and he’s taken us in the right direction.

■ **Was it difficult dealing with the coming and going of Steve Deakin?**

Yeah definitely. Dave Clark had a brilliant start to the season – we won nine out

of 10 or something then we lost our momentum. The players should have held their hands up more - we have to take the blame ultimately, but as it was, Steve came in and got us back on track. I think Dave learned a lot from what Steve did even in the four weeks he was there, and since then we’ve been in really good form and we’re now in the Grand Final.

■ **Will the experience of the Northern Rail Cup Final stand you in good stead?**

It can only be benefit for any player to know how it feels to lose a game like that! We’re going to do everything we can to get it right this time.

■ **You must have been pleased to make the Championship All-star team...**

Yeah, especially considering it was in my first season in the Championship after a couple of seasons in the lower level. I



wasn’t expecting to make it into any all-star team let alone score 31 tries.

■ **Did you have any bets on about yourself being top try scorer?**

No, but I wish I had now! I thought I’d be looking to get up around maybe 15-20 so to get 31 was unbelievable.

■ **You were recently set to take part in the ‘Rugby League’s fastest man’ race – why did you have to pull out?**

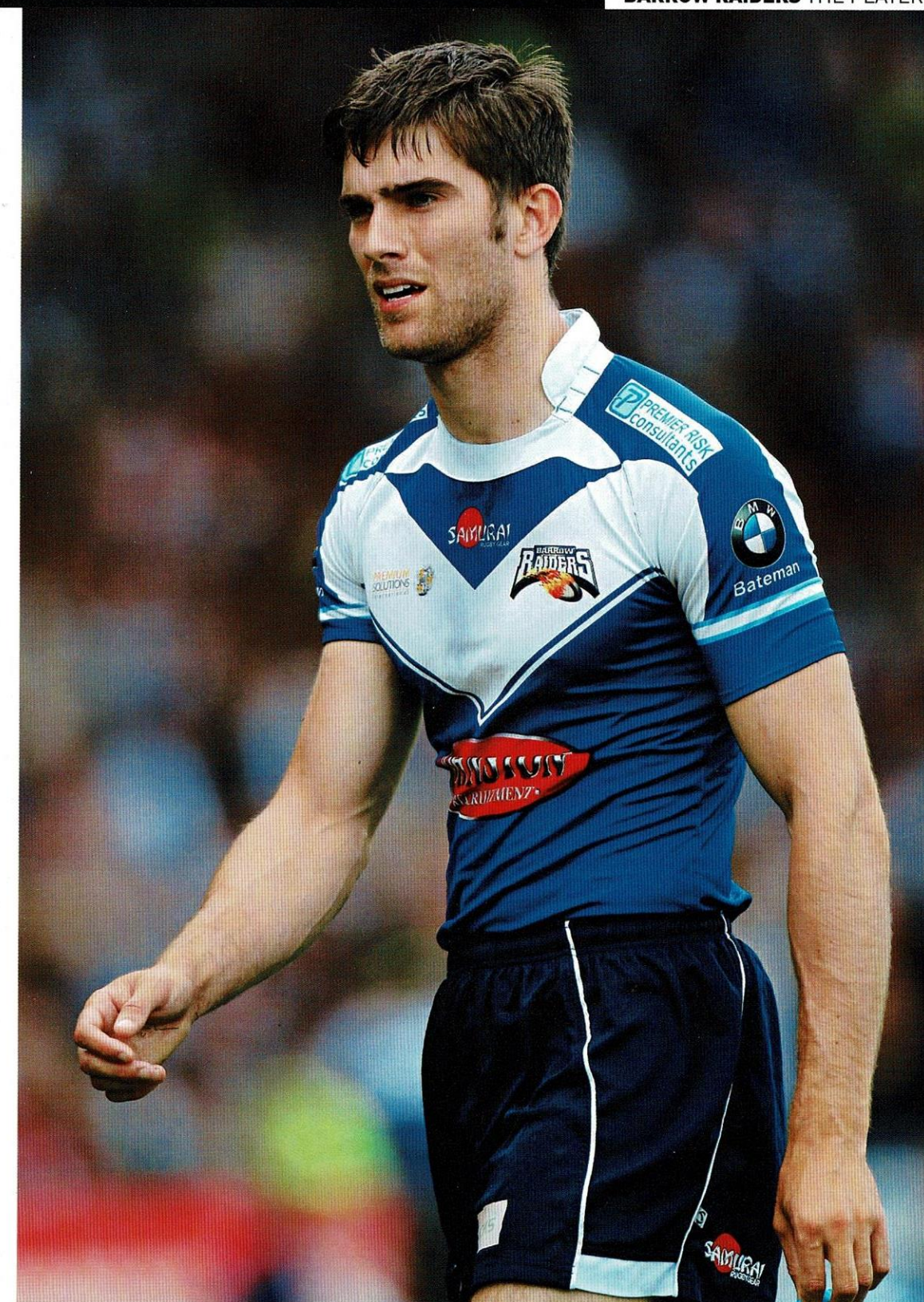
My son was born on the Tuesday before so I couldn’t go - I wasn’t going to miss that for anything!

■ **Fair enough, congratulations! The race winner won in 11.1 seconds, so do you think you could have matched that?**

It was over 90 metres, and I can do 100 in just under 12 so maybe it would have been close. I’d like to think I’d have been in contention though.

■ **Barrow have Super League ambitions – do you feel you could compete at that level?**

I’d like to think so. Every player wants to play at the peak of the game. I was given the opportunity with Harlequins last year but I turned them down. I’d love to play for my hometown team in probably the best league in the world. But there’s a long way to go yet! ■

## "IT'S A DREAM COME TRUE TO BE IN THIS FINAL"



Having felt the pressure after Halifax's up and down season, coach **Matt Calland** is now ready to enjoy the Grand Final

■ **After an up and down season, you've come up trumps when it mattered - do you feel vindicated?**

We're over the moon to be in the final. And I feel as though a lead weight has been lifted off my shoulders. We hadn't been playing well but the enthusiasm and effort of the players saw us through.

■ **That was quite some semi-final match - how did you see it?**

Our execution and our shape wasn't always the best but we made up for it in other areas. We just turned it on at the right time. Featherstone were the better team in the first half but after that our defence was second to none.

■ **Does a win like this give you extra momentum for the final?**

It's a good platform, but there's still improvement to be made. We've had a

full week to enjoy the build up and now we can't wait for the final - it's a dream come true.

■ **Why do you think you faltered after such a good start this season?**

We played so well in the first part of the season, but after we lost to Featherstone - they came back from 18-0 down to win 22-20 at our place - a bit of doubt crept in. Also I think teams were gunning for us because we were the top team. If you're a little bit off in this league, it's so competitive that you'll get punished.

But one thing I love about this team is that they never give up, and they can score tries from nothing. And that ultimately helped us turn things around.

■ **You were on the losing side in two Challenge Cup Finals. Is this a chance to taste victory in a major final?**

Yes, and it is for the club too. I think it was 1990 when they were last in a big final. And I've told the players from experience - there's no worse feeling than losing a game like this. Get your hands on those winners' medals!

■ **This is clearly a club with ambition - how close do you think you are to having the team and squad you want?**

We've got a really strong side now, we've ticked a box for a Super League licence, the new stand is happening at the stadium, we just need to get more fans in. Hopefully being in a big final will keep the crowds growing. ■

# “WE’RE AFTER PAYBACK - IT’S GOING TO BE INTENSE”

Halifax’s Australian half-back **Ben Black** has been a pivotal figure in their season once again. Reaching today’s final is one goal achieved. The second is to win it.

■ **That was a pretty thrilling semi-final against Featherstone. Have you recovered yet?**

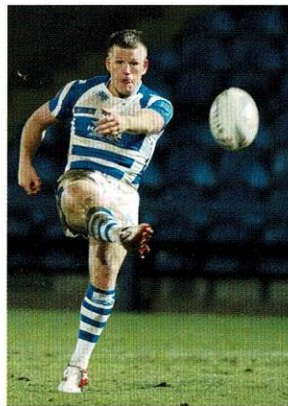
Yeah, just about! You could tell it was a semi-final game – 100 times faster, really exciting stuff, and the fact it’s sudden death and you have this one chance means you’re really going for it. But that’s what you live for – to play in the most intense games like that.

■ **So what does this mean for you to reach this final?**

It’s a dream come true – I’ve only been in one Grand Final before and it’s great to be in one with Halifax because it’s become my second home. I love this club and they’ve looked after me really well. It’s been great for the club and the fans really deserve it.

■ **You lost to Barrow a couple of weeks ago – how will you turn round that advantage?**

I think a Grand Final is a different ball game. When I look back on this season we played them a few times and it was always close. But they were different games



– they fully deserved to beat us at their place in the qualifier, but we’ll be so up for this one and we’re after payback. It’s going to be another intense one.

■ **Is there an advantage of not having the extra week off?**

Yeah it can work both ways. The game last week kept us in shape and I think it’s kept our thoughts together if we’d had a few days off to do our own thing we might have taken our minds off it, this has kept our fitness up. But they’ll be so up for it too, especially having just missed out in the Northern Rail Cup.

■ **It’s been a good season – has there been a renewed interest in the town?**

Yeah, just to see the amount of people wearing Halifax shirts in town is just phenomenal. Everyone’s so proud and I think they’ve sold a record amount of shirts. We haven’t been in a final for 19 years or something. This morning I went for a walk and everyone was cheering – there’s a buzz about the place.

■ **How has Matt Calland been for you as a coach? An arm-round-the-shoulder type or a fierce task master?**

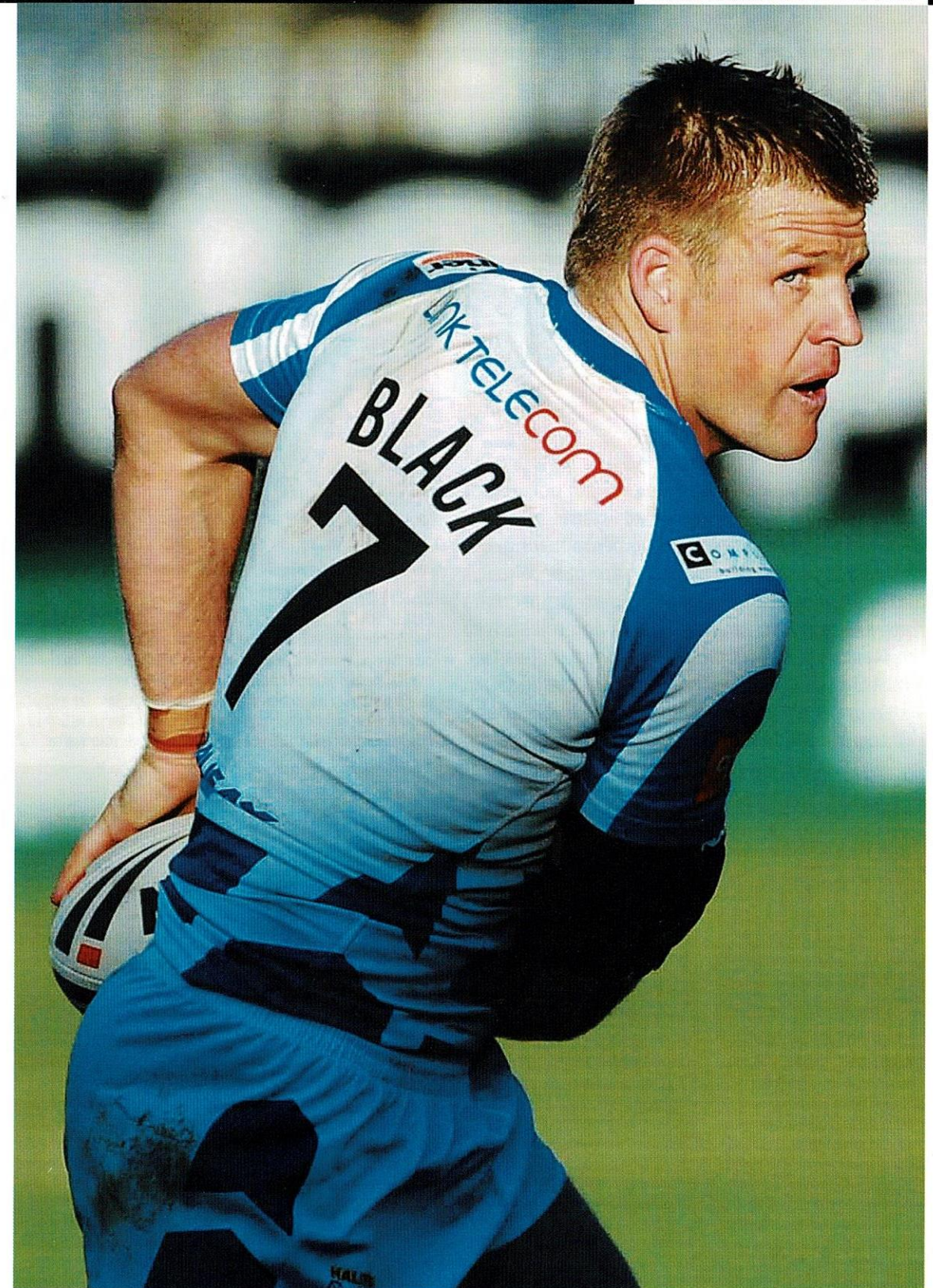
He’s been a bit of both. We’ve had our ups and downs but he’s really pulled us together in the last couple of weeks. He gets a lot of flak when we lose but he’s taken us to a Grand Final – you can’t argue with that. He’s an awesome coach, very smart and it’s showing now.

■ **You’ve had interest from other clubs in recent years – have you had difficult choices to make?**

No, it’s always flattering but I think I’ll finish my career here. The club is like a second family for me now, and I’ve got a lot of good friends round here. I came to England a few years ago and it’s good to travel and be able to do what you love doing at the same time. Also, I have a new girlfriend over here and she’s helped me out a lot, so I really couldn’t be happier at the moment.

■ **Do people at the club often talk about Halifax’s Super League ambitions?**

Yeah it’s always in the back of our minds, but your first priority is to be part of big games like this. We had two goals this season – the first was to reach the Grand final and the second was to win it. The fact that it’s given us an extra chance to get into Super League is a bonus. ■





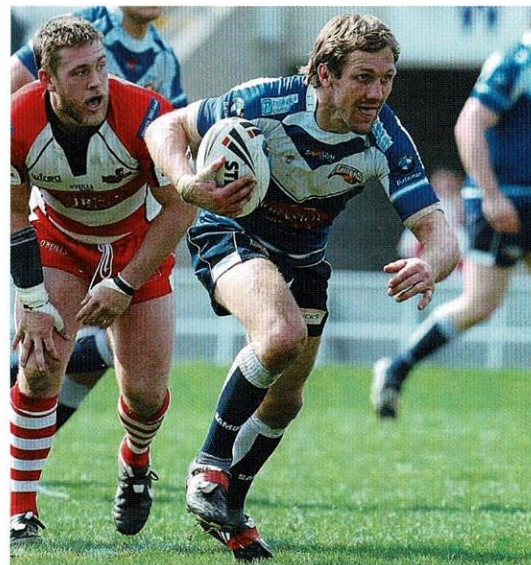
# ONES TO WATCH BARROW

“It's been a great year for us as a club, and I'm enjoying my footy up here. It's a great town, and the fans are 100 per cent behind us. They know their Rugby League and get out there in numbers to support us.

You're only as good as you're last game but I've been satisfied with the way I've been playing. At 31 I'm still making my fair share of breaks and scoring my fair share of tries so I'm pretty happy about that. I was gutted having missed the Northern Rail Cup Final, we were without a few players that day and Widnes punished us, so it's great for me to have a chance to put that right by winning this final.”

“Gary's as safe as houses at the back - not much gets past him. He makes his tackles and doesn't make any mistakes. His attack has improved tenfold recently and that's probably been his main asset over the last couple of months. He's probably our most improved player which just goes to show that at 32 you can still improve your game.”

“He's got all the attributes. Jamie's got a great kicking game, he takes the line on and can pass. I played with him when I was at Wakefield and knew the calibre of player he was and talked to Des (Johnston, chairman) about bringing him over. We'd needed that bit of spark at the time and he brought that.”



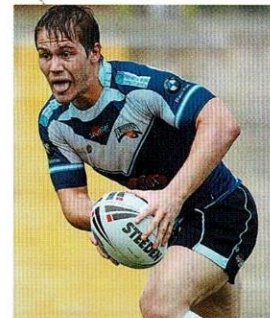
**ZEB LUISI

PROP**

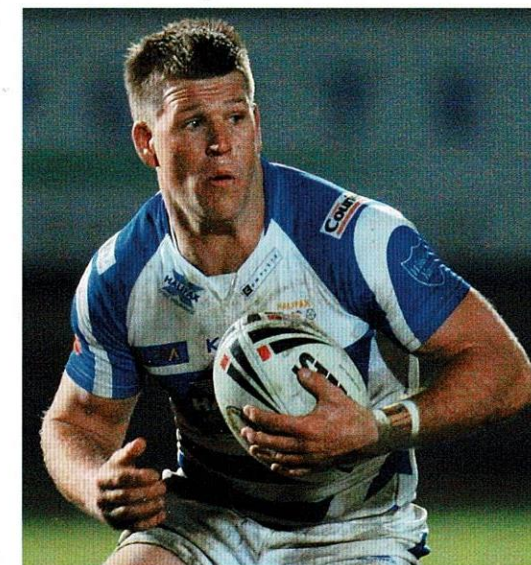

SCRUM-HALF**

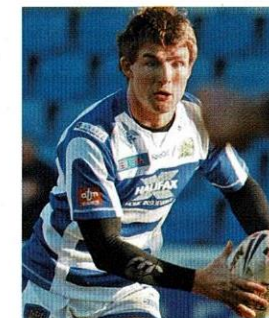
“One of those players who can make something out of nothing. He's got great speed off the mark, and an eye for a gap, as he demonstrated against Featherstone. He's elusive too, and gets his fair share of tries. This is his second stint with us after going back to Australia for a while, and he's been a real asset to the team.”

Halifax's all action skipper **Sean Penkywicz** gives us his verdict on the season, and introduces some of his team-mates who could prove key performers for them today.



“This year's gone OK for me personally, although like all the lads it was frustrating to have the team on fire at the beginning of the year and then we had a real dip in the last month or two of the season. You can't play at

the same level all the time, and it was a shame the dip in form came at the end and cost us top spot. A few players didn't perform so well and it had an effect, but we've managed to turn it around and get to the Final, so I'm made up about that. 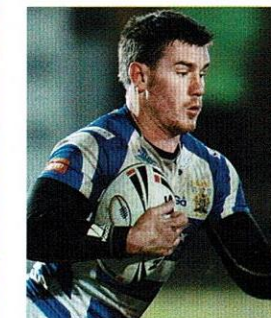
**MARK GLEESON

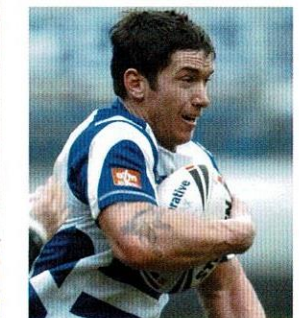
**SAID TAMGHART

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# THE CO-OPERATIVE CHAMPIONSHIP REVIEW OF THE SEASON

The newly rebranded Championship delivered the most fiercely competitive season ever, with half a dozen sides battling for supremacy. We enjoyed every second of it



## MARCH/APRIL

The inaugural year of the Co-operative Championship made it very clear that the newly re-branded competition had a new and improved intensity about it. Ironically, though, the first game was anything but an even contest. New boys Toulouse endured a 70-0 baptism of fire at the Stobart Stadium. Yet it was a timely reminder of the standard expected, and one which they clearly took notice of.

The surprise package of the campaign were newly promoted Barrow, who won six of their first seven games, defeated only by Halifax, who were shaping up as the pacesetters with a 100 per cent record. Fax ended April in front of the Sky Sports cameras with a defeat of Iestyn Harris's Featherstone who had also won five from six.

Despite being among the pre-season favourites for the title, Widnes Vikings were rebuilding in the wake of Paul Cullen's introduction as coach at the start of the season. Losses to Halifax and

Leigh left them playing catch-up with the front-runners.

Meanwhile, Toulouse showed that they had learned from their mistakes, and soon they were the ones dishing out hidings, against Batley, Leigh and Doncaster in successive weeks.

The other two promoted sides, Gateshead and Doncaster, only managed a single win during the opening weeks, and the same went for Batley and Sheffield. But crucially, the Eagles gained bonus points in each of their defeats due to losses of less than 12 points.



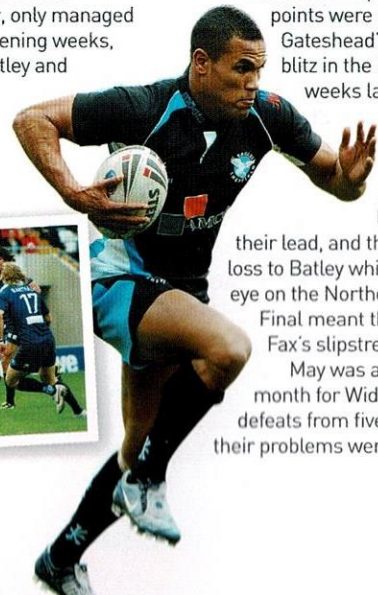
## MAY/JUNE

Halifax's winning streak had to end sooner or later, and it may have been no coincidence that their first defeat came a week after they had taken Castleford to extra time in the Carnegie Challenge Cup. Sheffield won at The Shay to hand

Barrow the top spot, and more points were dropped after Gateshead's first-half try blitz in the North East a few weeks later. However,

a win over Barrow inbetween those two lapses restored their lead, and the Cumbrians' loss to Batley while they had one eye on the Northern Rail Cup Final meant they stayed in Fax's slipstream.

May was a miserable month for Widnes, with four defeats from five games, but their problems were nothing



compared to those of Doncaster, still with only one win all season, and with financial difficulties meaning administration and a points deduction.

Heading in the other direction, meanwhile, were Toulouse, who had gone on a run of seven wins in eight games, and Sheffield, who beat the Frenchmen as well as Halifax and Whitehaven to make up for their poor early season form.

Leigh also received a boost, as their old coach and former St Helens boss Ian Millward announced he would be rejoining them next year. For now, though, they faced a relegation battle.

## JULY/AUGUST/SEPTEMBER

Five straight defeats during the closing weeks of the season put paid to Halifax's once formidable looking charge at the top of the table, but they weren't the only big names to falter late on.

Widnes suffered a hangover at

Gateshead after their Northern Rail Cup win in July, and then fell to a Jamie Rooney-inspired Barrow in their penultimate game to dash any hopes of topping the table.

Creeping up behind them almost unnoticed were Sheffield, who were unspectacular but highly effective in winning 10 of their last 13 games to eventually seal third place in the table.

But it was Barrow who ended the season on top. After losing to Whitehaven in the Cumbrian derby at the beginning of July (with Haven and their fans all in pink in aid of a cancer charity -

see picture, left), five straight wins saw them home, despite defeats in their final two games and the shock dismissal of coach Steve Deakin in August.

An even tighter battle was taking place to sort out relegation issues. Doncaster were long gone, but with a fading Toulouse exempt from relegation during their first year in the competition, there were three teams level on points going into the final games. Gateshead's 56-0 win at Doncaster guaranteed their safety, and Leigh excelled in a 47-14 home win over Whitehaven. At 14-0 down at half-time against Featherstone, it looked as if Batley would be the fall guys in this story. However, they fought back to win 30-26 and leave Leigh and their fans heartbroken.

Now for the play-offs. Could our delicate hearts stand any more excitement? Oh go on then. ■

**1 Miles Greenwood HALIFAX**  
This attacking young full-back has come on in leaps and bounds this season, and was key to his side's impressive season.

**2 James Nixon BARROW RAIDERS**  
The Raiders' chief try-scoring weapon is a homegrown talent, and his speed and elusiveness out wide remain difficult for any side to deal with.

**3 Menzie Yere SHEFFIELD EAGLES**  
This member of Papua New Guinea's World Cup squad has been a pacey, powerful threat for Sheffield this year.

**4 Liam Harrison BARROW RAIDERS**  
Another dynamic young utility back who has galvanised the Raiders side this season, often linking up effectively with James Nixon for important tries.

**5 Jermaine McGilvray BATLEY BULLDOGS**  
On loan from Huddersfield, this darting winger has continually been a darting threat out wide in a relatively under-achieving Batley side.

**6 Brendon Lindsay SHEFFIELD EAGLES**  
The veteran Australian stand-off has found another new lease of life, his experience and skill helping make the Eagles one of 2009's surprise packages.

**7 Andy Kain FEATHERSTONE ROVERS**  
The half-back has blossomed next to old stager Iestyn Harris, pulling his side's strings in style.

**8 Kyle Amor WHITEHAVEN**  
A prop who has been a revelation as part of one of the Championship's most formidable front rows

**9 Andy Ellis BARROW RAIDERS**  
The Hull-born hooker has been a constant inspiration in a changing Barrow line-up.

**10 Karl Edmondson WHITEHAVEN**  
The Kiwi policeman has been Haven's strong arm of the law in his final season.

**11. Michael Knowles GATESHEAD THUNDER**  
A former Castleford youngster whose ability to play in the halves and the pack, and kick goals, reflects his natural footballing ability.

**12 Richard Fletcher WIDNES VIKINGS**  
This former Castleford and Whitehaven back rower has been a late bloomer at 28, but his tough tackling has been indispensable for Widnes.

**13 Zeb Luisi BARROW RAIDERS**  
Since signing from Doncaster the former Harlequin has helped Barrow establish a blend of youth and experience. He has also switched from full-back to loose forward with aplomb.

The newly rebranded Co-operative Championship One was dominated by Dewsbury Rams. Their coach tells his story below, and we also profile the All-Star team

### INVINCIBLE RAMS

Dewsbury coach **Warren Jowitt** on the Rams' incredible unbeaten season

**"We're very proud of what we achieved this year. It was a huge team effort from everyone at the club working together.**

"I put a lot of time and effort in and so have the lads, training three or four times a week when they're only part-time players. In 1997, when I was at Bradford, we went 20 games undefeated and won the league. That was down to hard work, and a great team spirit, which we've also got at Dewsbury. I see this team at Dewsbury in a similar mould in how they work together and enjoy each other's company.

"Getting that 100 per cent record was never really a consideration. It was one game at a time. I thought it would be nice but they were my own personal thoughts and nobody knew that. I knew it was going to be a big ask because there are some quality teams in Championship One.

"There was only one game where I panicked. When we played Rochdale away I said to my assistant: 'We've lost this.' Thankfully we got a last minute penalty and snatched a win.

"After we beat Keighley to win the title there was a massive anti-climax. We played exceptionally well to get it wrapped up but then my job was to try to keep the lads going. "In the final games we had a big dip in form but we still came out with two good results. Then we had to go to Blackpool on the last day and they were in form. That gave us a challenge, and we blew them off the park. A great end to a fantastic year."



**1 Jonny Leather BLACKPOOL PANTHERS**  
A try-scoring, goal-kicking full-back who helped his side make the play-offs.

**2 Bryn Powell DEWSBURY RAMS**  
Long-serving Welsh international who has had one of his best seasons to date on the wing.

**3 Kane Epati DEWSBURY RAMS**  
Try-happy Samoan centre who has gone from strength to strength since recovering from injury last year.

**4 Casey Mayberry ROCHDALE HORNETS**  
Strong, speedy centre who can make, score and save tries with equal skill.

**5 Gavin Duffy KEIGHLEY COUGARS**  
Talented homegrown utility back who is a formidable defender as well as a pacey attacker.

**6 Pat Walker DEWSBURY RAMS**  
Versatile ball-player who has been a reliable goal kicker whether in the halves, backs or forwards for the Rams.

**7 Liam Finn DEWSBURY RAMS**  
The brains of the team, directing them from half-back and hooker, and scoring a few tries too.

**8 Mark Applegarth YORK CITY KNIGHTS**  
A fearless front rower whose leadership helped York to a highly impressive third-placed finish this season.

**9 Richard Chapman HUNSLET HAWKS**  
His distribution and direction helped Hunslet punch above their weight this season and make the play-offs.

**10 Scott Law KEIGHLEY COUGARS**  
A key performer for the Cougars and invariably the go-to guy when hard yards need to be made up the middle of the park.

**11 Andy Bostock DEWSBURY RAMS**  
Energetic back rower with the power and pace to also make him Dewsbury's top try-scorer this season.

**12 Chris Baines OLDHAM**  
Tireless pack operator for the Roughyeds who can be relied upon to get the team's engines roaring even when the chips are down.

**13 Adam Hayes DEWSBURY RAMS**  
Classy former Huddersfield loose forward who can be relied upon to bust a tackle as well as he can offload from one.



# ANALYSIS

**Barrie McDermott**, the former Leeds and Great Britain prop who is now an analyst for Sky Sports, assesses Barrow and Halifax



## OVERVIEW

"The last time Barrow were in a final I think they'll feel they let themselves down. They are a better side than they showed in the Northern Rail Cup Final. They'll have learned from the experience of going onto the big stage and not delivering. Their early season form was very good but I think the defeats to Wigan in the Challenge Cup and Widnes in the Northern Rail Cup certainly took something out of them. Halifax, meanwhile, have recovered their form just at the right time, so I can't see this game as being as one-sided as the Qualifying Semi-final at Craven Park."

## UP FRONT

"Halifax use a variety of front rowers and they're not what you'd call stereotypes. There's **David Wrench**, an honest performer whose work ethic and work

rate is outstanding. **Neil Cherryholme** is making a real name for himself in this division and when those two get tired the very exciting **Said Tamghart** and **Frank Watene** come on. The Halifax pack can adapt to anything.

"Barrow have a very experienced front row pairing in **Brett McDermott** and **Rob Roberts**. **Ned Catic** is also one of the best back rowers in the division on his day and I expect him to make up for missing out on the Northern Rail Cup Final.

"I think the key contest will be at hooker. Barrow's **Andy Ellis** is an outstanding player and his battle with **Sean Penkywicz** will be crucial. They both need their

big forwards to be dominant and allow them quick play the balls because both have the speed and guile to disrupt any defensive pattern."



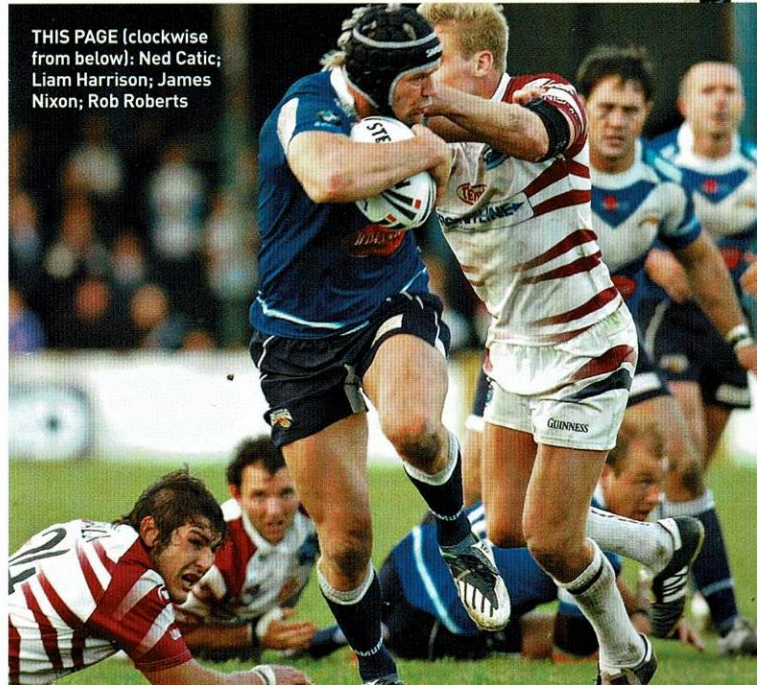
## BACKS AND WIDE MEN

"Barrow are a threat all over the pitch. In **Gary Broadbent**, they have another player with a vast amount of experience who's always in the right place at the right time. The kicking game of **Ben Black** will test him but I think he's got the experience to cope with that.

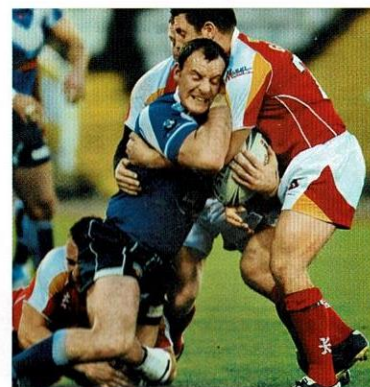
"**Liam Harrison** is a big strong centre and he's a constant threat when he's got the ball. He's sound in defence and his speed and tryscoring is complemented by the service

he gives to **James Nixon** on the wing, so Barrow's left edge is a real threat.

"**Jamie Rooney** could still play at Super League level, he's very smart with the ball, got a good kicking game, and makes good decisions. If he gets in the right field position he's also got the pace to score.

"For Halifax, **Shad Royston** is an underrated player in my view. His kick returns are as good as anything in the league and he can often get on the end of offloads. He combines very well with **Paul Smith**, who sticks out on the right wing for Halifax.



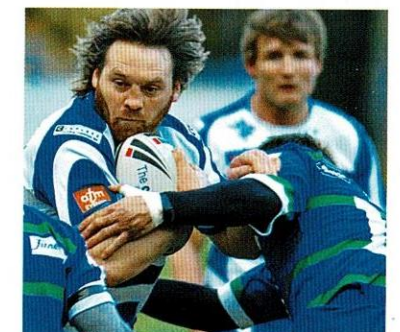
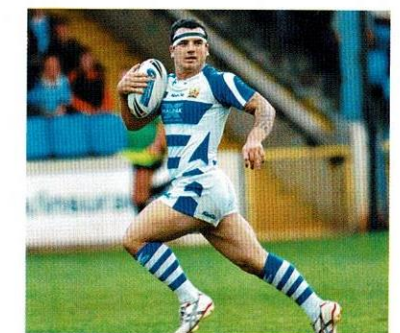
"**Mark 'the rubber ball' Roberts** enjoys running into people more than he does running round them. He and **Dave Larder** commit defenders and set up a lot of things for their team-mates.

"I mentioned Ben Black earlier - he's a maverick, an instinctive player with pace to burn, and another quick, strong try threat for them is winger **Rob Worrincy** - there are potential try scorers all over."

## SUMMARY

"I think the teams are well-matched but the first thing that jumps out at you is the amount of quick players in both teams - they have the pace to score a hatful. In the semi-final, Barrow's goal-line defence and their attitude was excellent. If they turn up with that attitude it will be their day but Halifax have an ability to score from anywhere.

So I think that we're going to see plenty of tries, but it will be the defences that will decide the outcome."

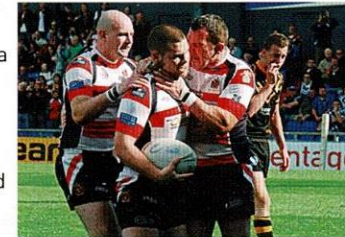

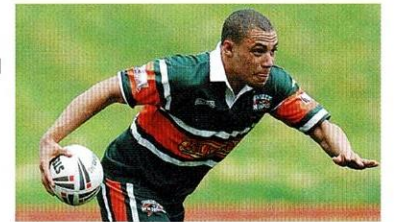
A fifth win in six games was sealed as Hunslet clinched the spoils late on at Blackpool, after being behind for most of the game.

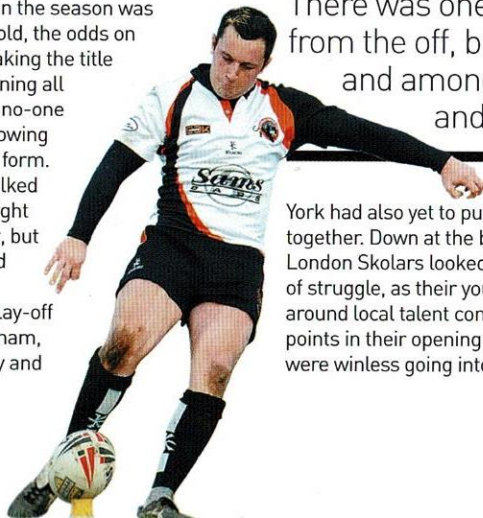




**MARCH/APRIL**

York had also yet to put a good run together. Down at the bottom, though, London Skolars looked set for a season of struggle, as their young team centred around local talent conceded over 200 points in their opening three games and were winless going into May.

**MAY/JUNE**

If any confirmation was needed as to Dewsbury's continuing dominance, they provided it with wins over Swinton, Blackpool, Keighley and York, but the latter at least fought back from 22-8 down to within a converted try

of the leaders, to suggest they had it in them to be play-off contenders. Another comeback helped them beat Oldham and leapfrog the Lancastrians into second place at the end of June. Keighley were also in good form despite a drubbing from Dewsbury, but Swinton were still proving unpredictable, losing four straight and then winning three, ending June in fifth place.

At the bottom, London Skolars finally scraped a win, at the expense of Workington who hadn't won since the opening day, while Rochdale showed they could still punch above their weight - Leroy Rivett was among the notable names contributing to a victory over York. Alas, they remained bottom thanks to a nine point deduction for going into administration before the start of the season.

**JULY/AUGUST/SEPTEMBER**

As the business end of the season loomed, there seemed no sign of the Dewsbury juggernaut

grinding to a halt. The only question was whether they could go the entire season unbeaten, and the team that came closest to spoiling that record was once again Rochdale, who led 24-22 at half-time, before the Rams stepped up a gear to win 40-24.

The champions elect beat Blackpool in the final match to seal the record - no easy task, since the Panthers' win in the Northern Rail Nines was a reflection of their strong form, which saw them rise to fifth and secure a home play-off spot.

After a wobble in which they went down disappointingly at home to Hunslet and away to Blackpool, York won their last four games to clinch third spot, but they couldn't overhaul Keighley, who cemented second place by winning six of their last eight, their only defeats coming

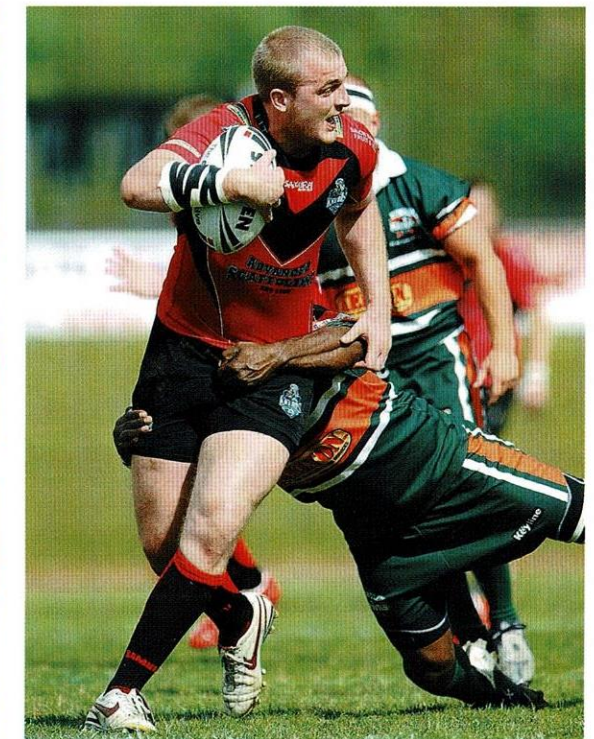
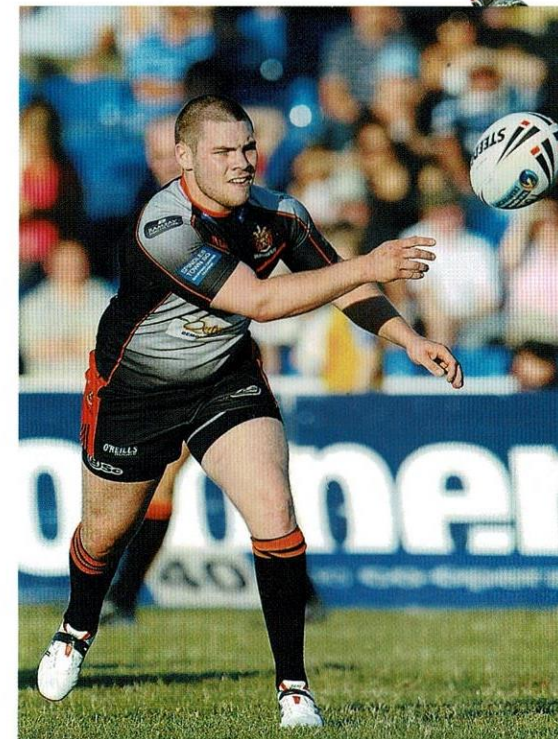

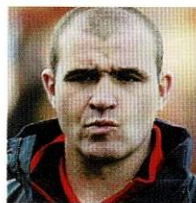

“Games like this are all about peaking on the day and I think we've come into the final in good form. We've had a very consistent year, and any team who gets to final has the right to feel confident about their chances.

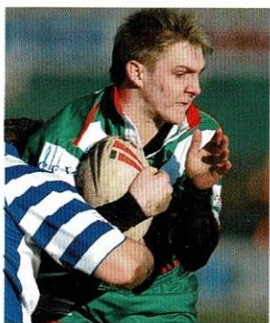

And if we do win? Well many of our players could certainly play at a higher level, and deserve the chance. But they have to show it today.”



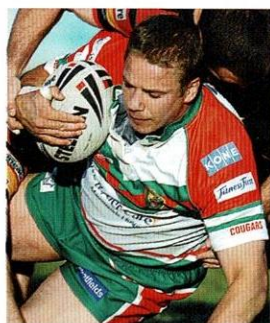

# PREVIEW

This is Oldham's third successive Play-off final, writes **Gareth Walker**. Yet Keighley still start as favourites



**THE Co-operative Championship One Play-off final brings together two sides that have taken very different three-year routes to this afternoon's clash.**

Keighley Cougars have been steadily building under their popular coach Barry Eaton, while for Oldham, this represents a third successive shot at promotion via the Play-off Final.

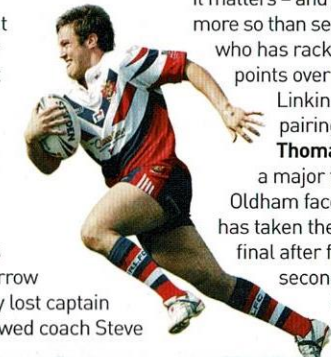
The Roughyeds have experienced successive heartbreaks against Featherstone Rovers and Doncaster, and will be hoping that their long-held dream of returning to the second tier of the professional game finally reaches fruition today. Oldham have consistently been among the division's biggest spenders over the last three years, but while they had another significant recruitment drive for this season, their campaign has been hit by difficulties.

Coach Tony Benson had to deal with the transfer deadline day departure of four of his first choice team to Barrow Raiders, having already lost captain Rob Roberts, who followed coach Steve

Deakin to Cumbria.

With considerable uncertainty also surrounding Oldham's ownership throughout the year, Kiwi Benson has not had an easy ride; something that was last week acknowledged by the club's chief executive and current RFL President Chris Hamilton.

Their appearance in today's Play-off final was not as expected as in recent years, with Benson's team having to win three successive play-off games, culminating at York on Sunday. But they have hit form when it matters – and none more so than second rower **Chris Baines**,



who has racked up an incredible 60 points over the last three games.

Linking up with the half-back pairing of **Neil Roden** and **Thomas Coyle**, he is sure to be a major threat for the Roughyeds.

Oldham face a Keighley side that has taken the easier route to the final after finishing an impressive second in The Co-operative Championship One behind champions

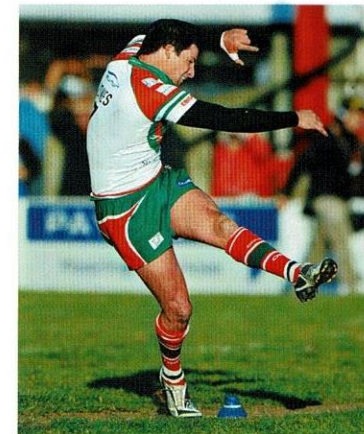

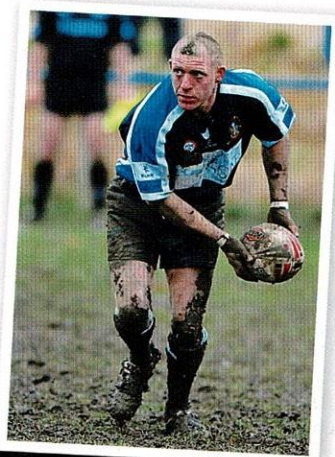

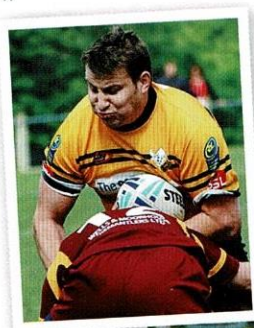
# REVIEW OF THE SEASON

Bramley Buffaloes were leading the way once again from early on this year, but there were new contenders taking their place among an evenly matched chasing pack



### APRIL/MAY

From the very first game of this season it became clear that the old order might be shaken up a little. Newcomers Nottingham Outlaws beat 2007 Champions Featherstone Lions in a 46-44 thriller in West Yorkshire in week one, then went down 38-20 to perennial table-toppers Bramley Buffaloes, but that proved to be the only defeat in their opening nine games. Another team from outside Rugby League's traditional heartlands, Hemel Stags, were also going well, with six wins from eight and only narrow defeats to Bramley and Huddersfield. The Buffaloes had a 100% record, but their fellow contenders for the top spot from last season - Warrington Wizards and Featherstone - were underachieving. However, we were soon to find the season was yet young.



### JUNE/JULY

Bramley dropped their first points in a draw at Featherstone, but they put that behind them with a 56-4 spanking of Warrington. The Wizards, however, responded by winning five on the trot, including a narrow defeat of Huddersfield Underbank Rangers, who had risen to second spot after continuing their strong form, including a 30-28 win over Bramley. That was the Buffaloes' second defeat in three games after going down 30-22 to Nottingham. Hemel's form was wobbling, too, with defeat to a youthful Dewsbury Celtic (with an average age of only 19!), and Liverpool

Buccaneers were also looking out of the play-off picture after only two wins since the end of May.

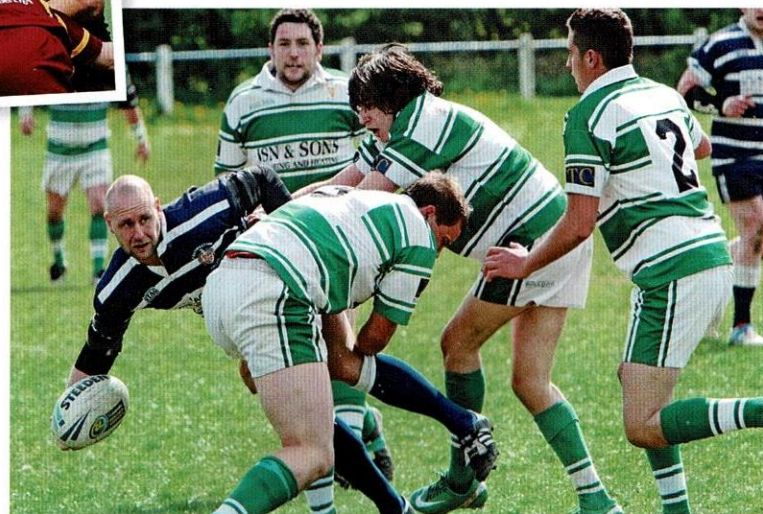
At the bottom, meanwhile, Carlisle took confidence in the midst of a tough debut season, and climbed to eighth due to their double over East Lancs Lions.

### AUGUST/SEPTEMBER

As the final few weeks of the season dawned, Bramley looked all but nailed on to top the pile at the end of the season, and indeed they clinched it with two weeks remaining. But the five places beneath them were more difficult to predict. Nottingham's great start to the season was offset by the loss of talismanic skipper Paul Calland to injury and a couple of promising

young players to the likes of Doncaster and Harlequins - a testament to their achievements thus far. A 50-0 whitewash at the hands of Huddersfield Underbank came as a shock, though, and defeat to Hemel two weeks later helped the Hertfordshire boys climb ahead of them in the table. Thankfully Calland returned and his side rediscovered their form to win their games in hand and reclaim fourth spot and a home tie in the play-offs. Featherstone's win over Huddersfield closed the gap between those two to a couple of points, but they went down to Bramley the following weekend, meaning they would finish third behind a Huddersfield side who had achieved their highest ever placing.

All told, it had been by far the most closely contested Conference National season to date, and the play-offs surely had more thrills in store.

The Buffaloes began brightly, but Rangers matched their two

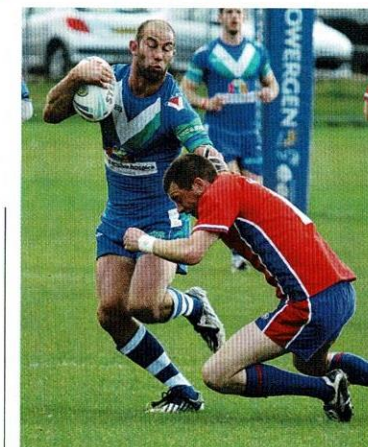

But Lee St Hilaire cut the deficit to four points and with 12 minutes left Darren Hawkyard plunged over to level it. A penalty from Thorley then gave them a sniff of victory but in a sensational finale Paul Drake equalised with one of his own. He then charged down a Rangers drop goal attempt, regathered the ball, and sprinted half the length of the field for the match-winning try.

The home side now had the bit between their teeth, and concerted attacking pressure led to two tries in five minutes which made it 34-4.

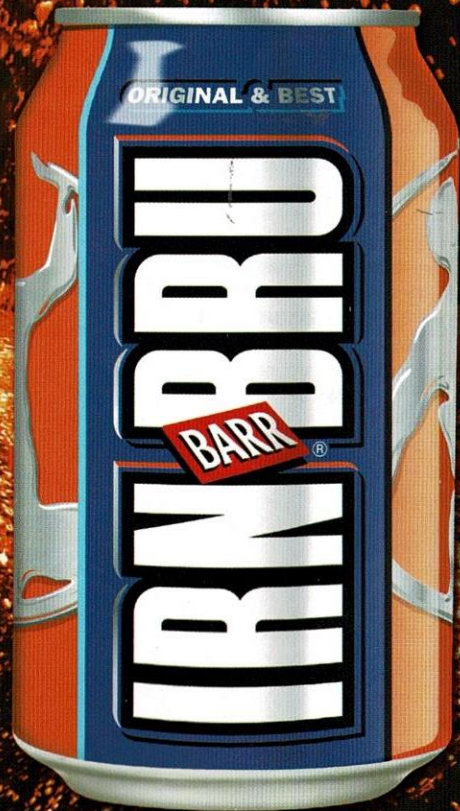

#### JON NICHOLLS LOOSE FORWARD

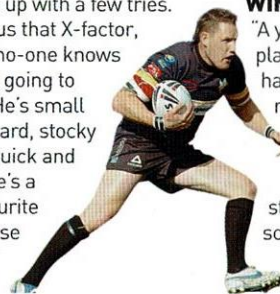
“My assistant coach, who originally came from the Leeds Met University side. He’s key in everything we do, and players look to him to direct them on the pitch.”

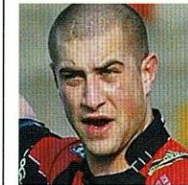
#### CRAIG GREEN WING

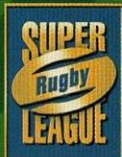
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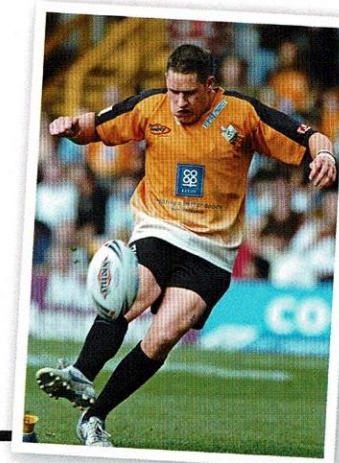

# GRAND FINAL PREVIEW

If their epic matches earlier this season are anything to go by, today's Final could be a thriller, writes **Phil Caplan**



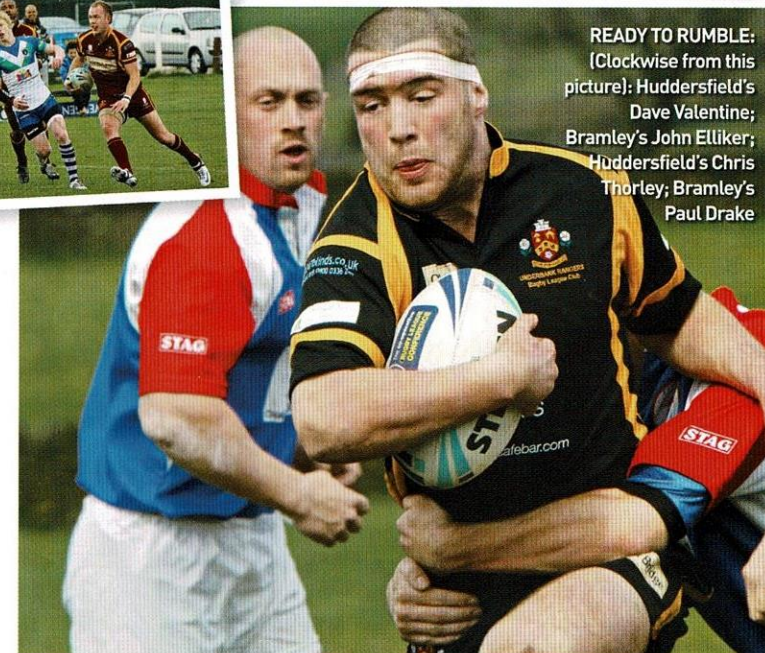
There could not be more of a contrast between the two sides contesting the Co-Operative Conference National crown, which for the second time in three years, is a West Yorkshire derby.

League leaders Bramley Buffaloes, charged up by RLCN Coach of the Year Mark Butterill, are in their fifth consecutive Grand Final and will be desperately looking to pick up the title having missed out to Celtic Crusaders Colts and Featherstone Lions in the past two seasons. Opposing them, Huddersfield Underbank Rangers have celebrated their 125th anniversary in the best possible way by qualifying for their first ever Grand Final.

Rangers, who have nurtured some of the code's most famous names at their picturesque Holmfirth ground, including Harold Wagstaff, Paul Dixon and Eorl Crabtree, hold the distinction of being the oldest amateur club in Rugby League.

The sides have met in three very close games this season. Buffaloes full-back **Shaun Flynn** became the first player at the re-formed community club to notch 100 appearances when his penalty won the first encounter 20-18 back in May, then Huddersfield got their revenge in July with prolific winger **Richard Aka**'s try sealing a similarly dramatic 30-28 victory.

Another tight contest was witnessed in the Qualifying Semi-final two weeks ago when Bramley's talismanic stand-off **Paul Drake**, a nominee for this year's

The experience of skipper and scrum-half **Jon Nicholls** along with hooker **Graham Harrison** and veteran prop **Danny O'Connor** will be key to Bramley's aspirations, while Huddersfield's outstanding centre **Shaun Mitchell** notched his 21st try of the campaign last week. **Chris Thorley** is a talented half-back and **Neil Barrett** was in tremendous form with the boot. His kicking duel with Drake, who claimed 14 points when the Buffaloes last lifted the title in 2006, could be crucial.

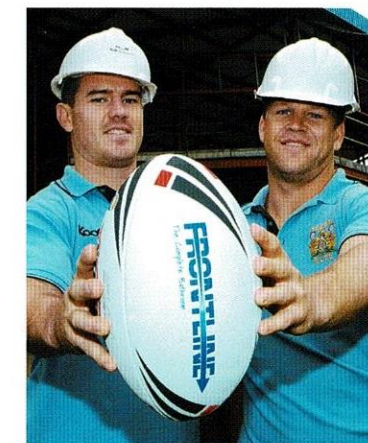

Head Coach Matt Calland commented: "The club are proud to receive Frontline silverware for achieving disciplinary best practice on the field."

Five of the 11 clubs in The Co-operative Championship actually achieved a clean record with no-one sent off. They were: Widnes Vikings, Batley Bulldogs, Toulouse Olympique, Featherstone Rovers and Leigh Centurions. Congratulations to them.

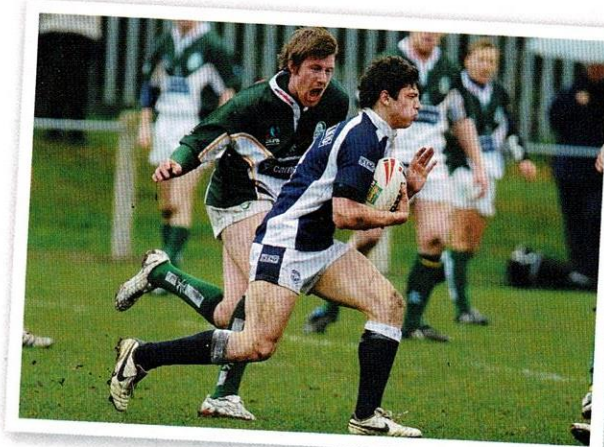

# EUROPE EXPECTS

Championship players are set to star in the [rugbyleague.com](http://rugbyleague.com) European Cup



A number of the Co-operative Championships' finest will be looking forward to playing in this autumn's Rugby League internationals – and we're not just talking about the Toulouse players who are hoping to be part of the French squad for the Gillette Four Nations.

The other major international tournament happening in October is promising to be every bit as exciting, and bigger than ever, while also featuring a number of players from The Co-operative Championships.

The [rugbyleague.com](http://rugbyleague.com) European Cup will feature six of the sport's emerging nations – Scotland, Wales, Ireland, Serbia, Lebanon and Italy – who will compete in six countries over a four week period, beginning on Saturday October 17. The tournament culminates in a Finals Day at Brewery Field, Bridgend, on Sunday November 8.

In another boost to the competition's profile, three games from the tournament, including the final, will be broadcast live on Sky Sports.

Scotland's train-on squad includes Barrow's try-happy winger **James Nixon**, and debut selections for Sheffield's **Brendon Lindsay** and **Mitchell Stringer** take the Eagles' contingent to four. Gateshead also boast four representatives, including veteran **Andrew Henderson**, while the Widnes trio of **John Duffy**, **Lee Paterson** and **Iain Morrison** return after making history in last year's World Cup squad.

Among those hoping to add to their Welsh caps will be the Halifax's **Sean Penkywicz** and **Mark Roberts**, and they're likely to be playing alongside a couple of their opponents

from today's Co-operative Championship Final, in the shape of Barrow's **Rob Roberts** and **Andy Bracek**. Oldham's **Phil Joseph** is also in the squad.

Dewsbury's **Liam Finn** was among the scorers in Ireland's memorable 34-16 win over Samoa in last year's World Cup, and he's once again part of the Wolfhounds set up this autumn. He won't be the only Co-operative Championship One player with international ambitions either, as two of the Oldham squad for today's game – **Wayne Kerr** and **Marcus St Hilaire** – are also named. Barrow and Halifax are represented too, with the Raiders' **Liam Harrison**, **Dave Allen** and **James Coyle** also getting the nod, along with Fax's veteran campaigner **Bob Beswick** (pictured below).

Lebanon's side is packed with young Australian-based talent alongside big names like Wests Tigers' **Robbie Farah**, but Italy and Serbia both have Championships talent in their ranks.

Gateshead's **Paul Franze** has represented European Shield winners and Cup dark horses Italy in the past, and will offer valuable NRL

and international experience, while Keighley Cougar fans will remember **Marco Ferrazzano** from his stint at the club.

Serbia are coached by Whitehaven's Ged Stokes and include the Cumbrians' recruit **Soni Radovanovic**, as well as Blackpool's **Simon Svabic**.

"All the games in the competition are vitally important," said Kevin Rudd, RLEF Executive and

Development Officer, "so the level of intensity is expected to be extremely high."

The competition will determine the seedings for future international competitions such as qualification for the 2013 World Cup, then next year's European Cup will also include France, and the eventual winners will qualify for the 2011 Four Nations alongside England, Australia and New Zealand.

# OLD WOLVES, NEW TRICKS

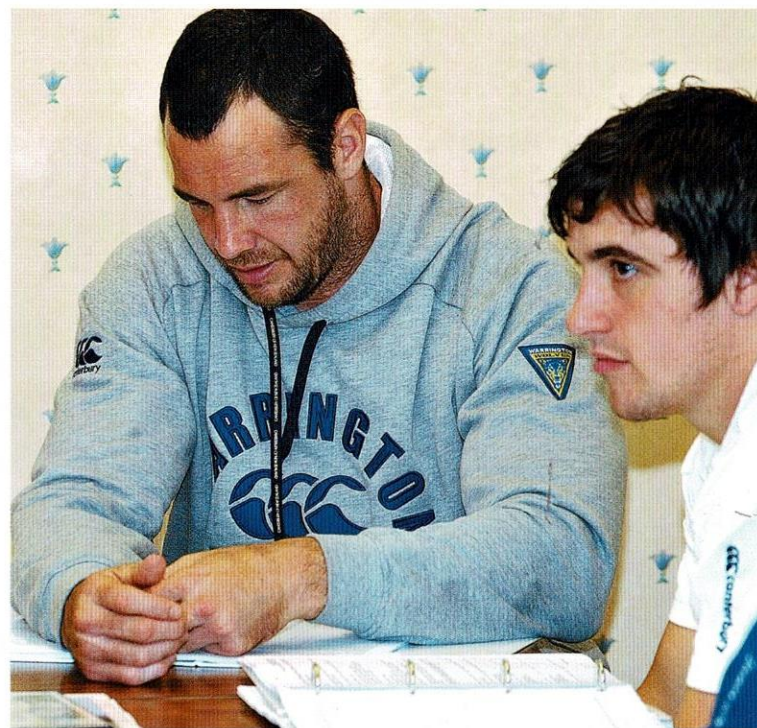
Warrington's Adrian Morley, Mickey Higham and Matt King are among many players improving their knowledge of the game by taking a UKCC Level 2 coaching course

The UKCC Level 2 course covers all aspects of the coaching role and allows participants to coach at all levels of the game, from children through to open age. And you don't have to be a top player like Morley to make the most of it.

"It's our standard course that prepares people for whatever environment they're in," said RFL Talent and Coach Manager Dave Johnson. "A lot of it's based around the How To Coach skills, which introduces people to the coaching process and all the things that help to make an effective delivery. They touch on psychology, physiology; there'll be some tactical and technical things in there as well; but it's really

about how they deliver on the field.

"Normally it's a four-day course. Coaches come in for a weekend, then go away to develop themselves and work on what they've learnt, then they come in for another day, go away and practise some more, then come in for assistance at the end.

The course has certainly left an impression on Morley.

"It's really enjoyable," he said. "I get a kick out of coaching people and that's why I'd like to do it after I finish playing. I'd encourage anyone to give it a go." ■

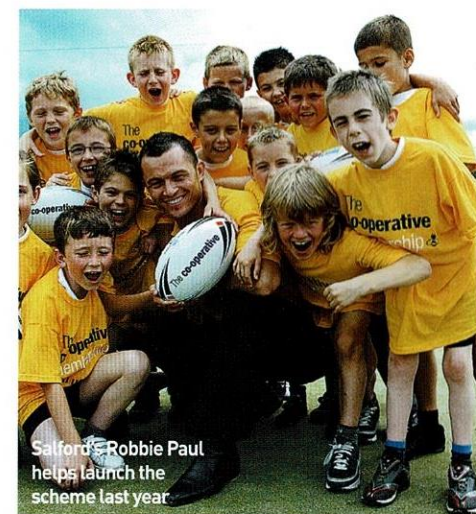
away match travel and whether they have introduced new people to the sport.

Ten teams from across the country play in a league and they were yesterday due to play their own Grand Final at York's Huntington Stadium.

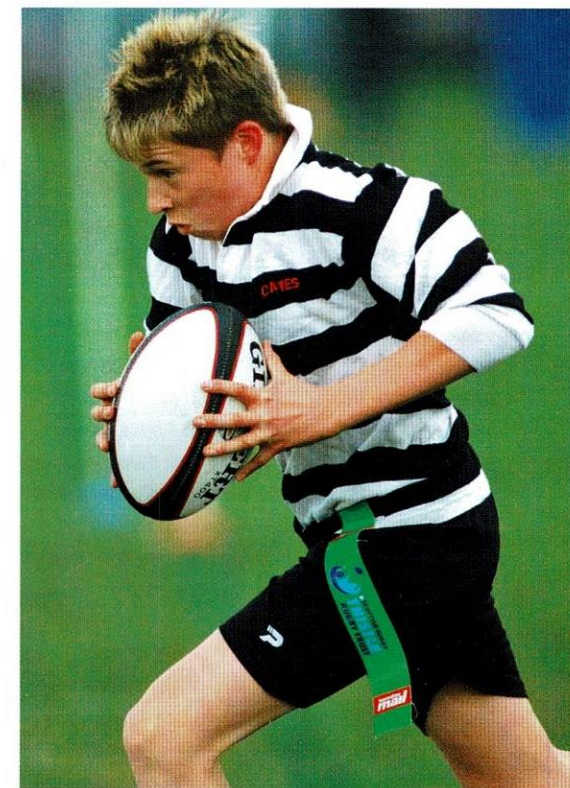

The sport also replicates the professional game more realistically than you might imagine.

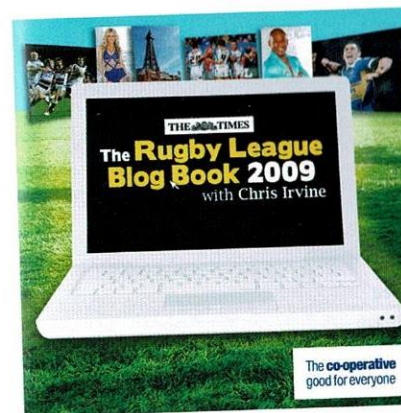

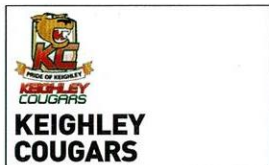

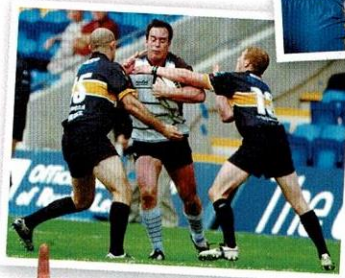
