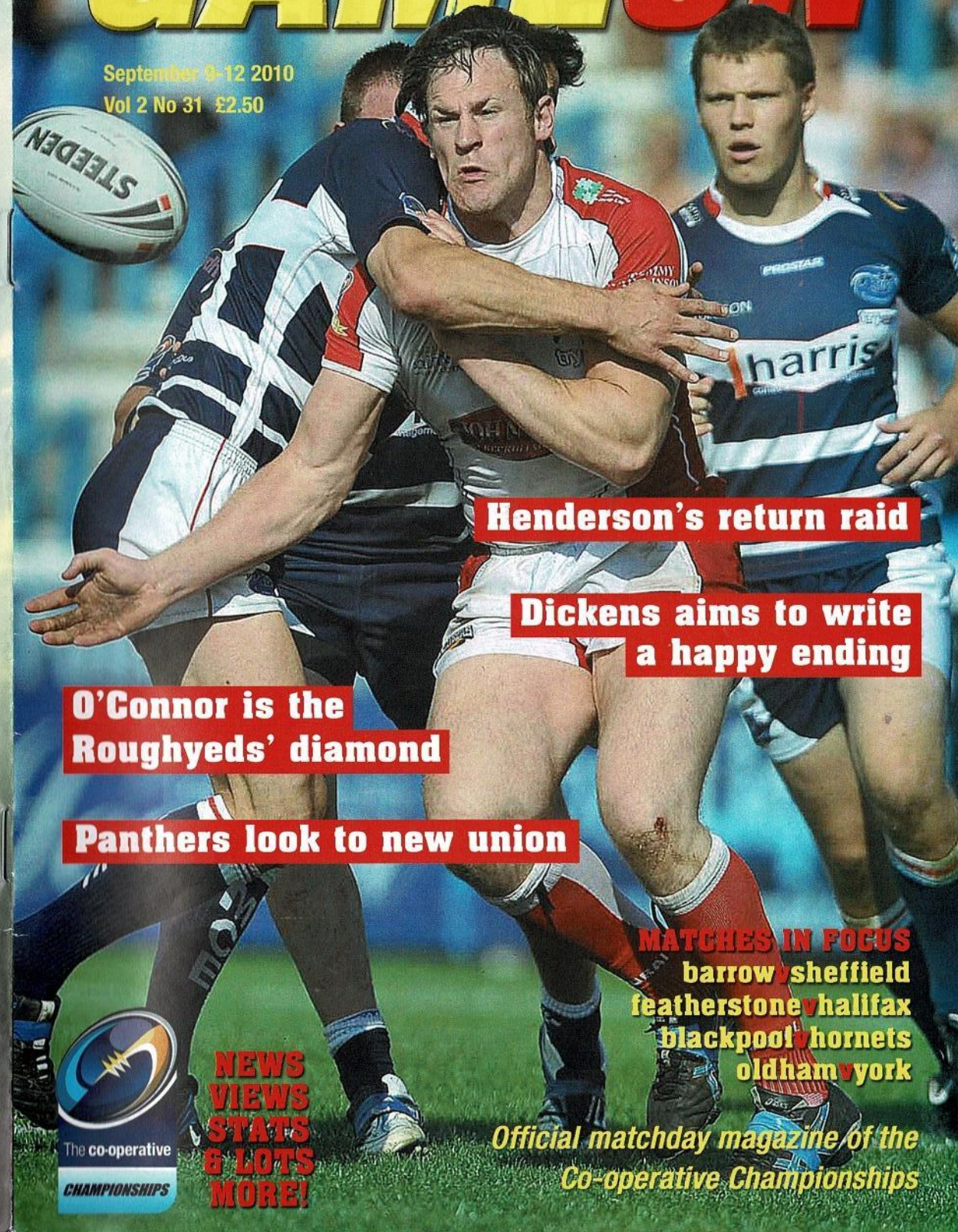
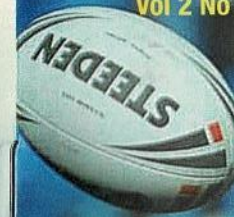

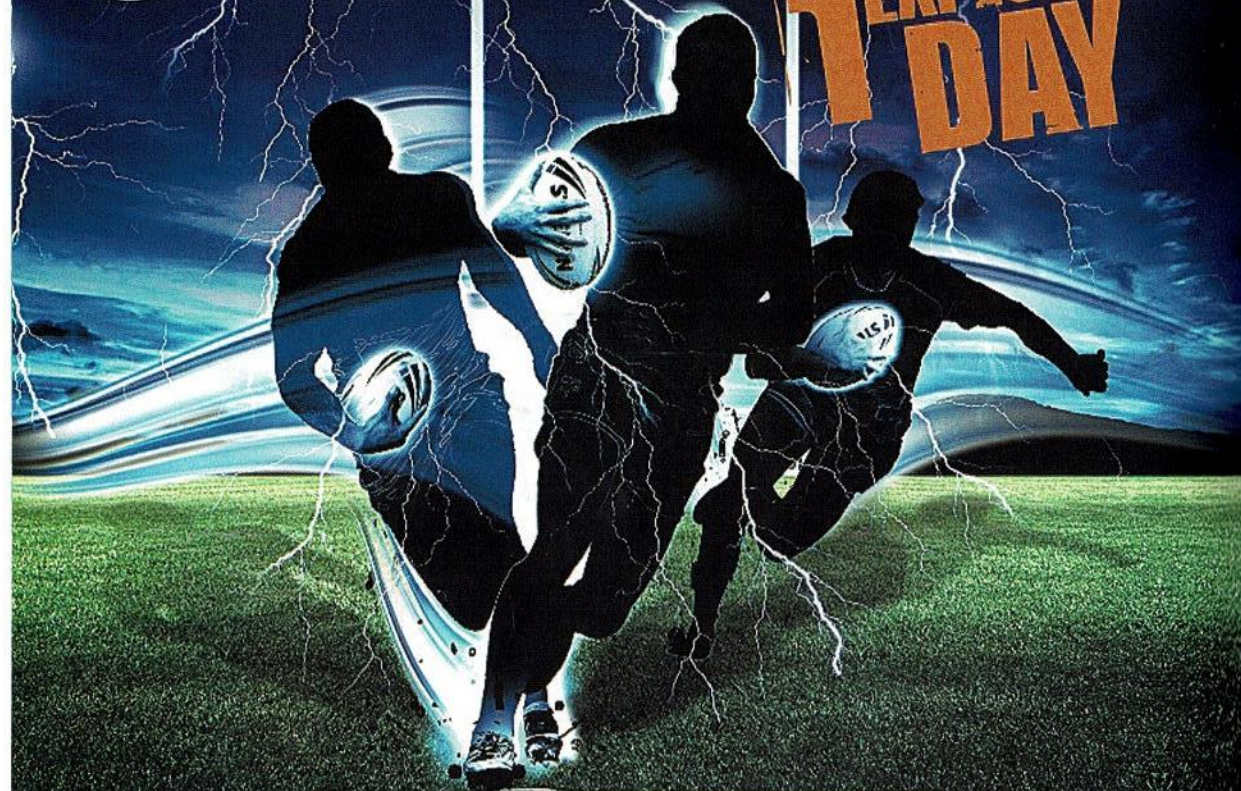

Can Eagles raid Barrow's nest?

SHEFFIELD Eagles really will be soaring after a great 26-24 win at Leigh. A late try from Tim Bergin sealed their passage into the semi-final eliminator and they now face another tough (and long) road trip to Barrow Raiders.

The reigning champions made easy work of Widnes Vikings in front of just under 2,500 fans and they look like they are hitting a bit of form just when it matters.

Everything points to a classic encounter in Cumbria with both teams just two games away from the Holy Grail, a place in the Co-operative Finals Day at Warrington on Sunday September 26.

All eyes will be on the Big Fellas Stadium on Thursday night in the other Co-operative Championship play-off with Featherstone Rovers hosting Halifax in what promises to be one hell of a West Yorkshire battle in front of the Sky cameras.

Rovers may have wrapped up the League Leaders Shield and beaten Halifax home and away during the season, but you can bet they'll be taking nothing for granted against Matt Calland's charges who know how to turn on the style when it's needed.

Both sides will be aware that there's a second chance waiting around the corner but will be determined to secure immediate passage to the Grand Final.

In Championship One Blackpool will be playing host to Rochdale's Hornets and York City Knights traverse the M62 to take on Oldham. The Panthers pipped Workington in an entertaining encounter on the Fylde coast in front of a disappointing 300 fans.

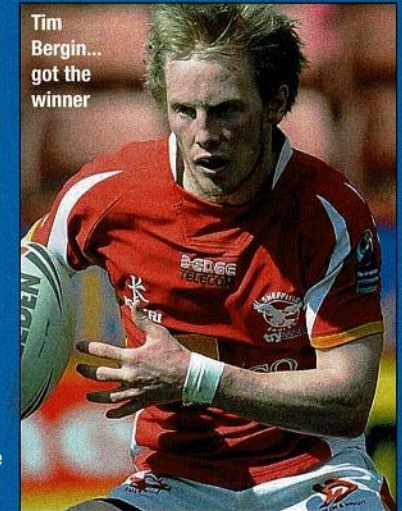
The game against the Hornets will be the biggest in Blackpool's recent history so let's all hope the fans get behind them and they get a few more through the gate.

Spotland hosted a tryfest as the Hornets saw off the Scorpions in an 80 point thriller. Full credit to South Wales for getting this far in their first season and this is just the platform they were hoping for as they bid to rebuild the profile of the sport in the Valleys.

Apart from Hunslet the Roughyeds have been the form team in Championship One and they'll start as favourites against York. You can bet the Oldham supporters will turn out in force for a game that could see them clinch their fourth consecutive spot in the season finale.

Both sides have played some terrific rugby this season and York will be keen for a repeat of their victory at the Whitebank Stadium back in early May.

Dickens hopes the Fev story has a happy ending...

In many ways he is 'Mr Featherstone Rovers' but captain and prop forward Stuart Dickens feels that plenty of people deserve credit for the rise of the club, as he told Game On's **BEN COLLINS**

IT'S 12 years now since Stuart Dickens made his debut for Featherstone. And but for a brief Super League spell with Salford in 2005, the 30-year-old prop has been a 'Fev' player for the duration.

That's something he is very proud of, but he is on the brink of his proudest moment yet with Rovers.

Dickens has skippered Fev to the Co-operative Championship title this season, losing just two league games in the process, and they now host Halifax hoping to book their place in the Grand Final.

While Fev were pleased to secure top spot in such convincing style, Dickens is eager to add gloss to a fine season by backing it up with Grand Final glory.

"If we finish the season well, get to the Grand Final and win it, it'll probably be the best season I've played in," he said. But if the season peters out and we don't finish the job off I suppose it'll be a disappointing one.

"I've been at Featherstone a long time and to play in a team that finishes top of the league is a massive achievement.

"I think it's been a bit understated really. Wigan have finished top of Super League and had a lot of publicity, Hunslet finished top of Championship 1 and they get promoted. It seems to have bypassed us a bit so we want to make sure we go all the way.

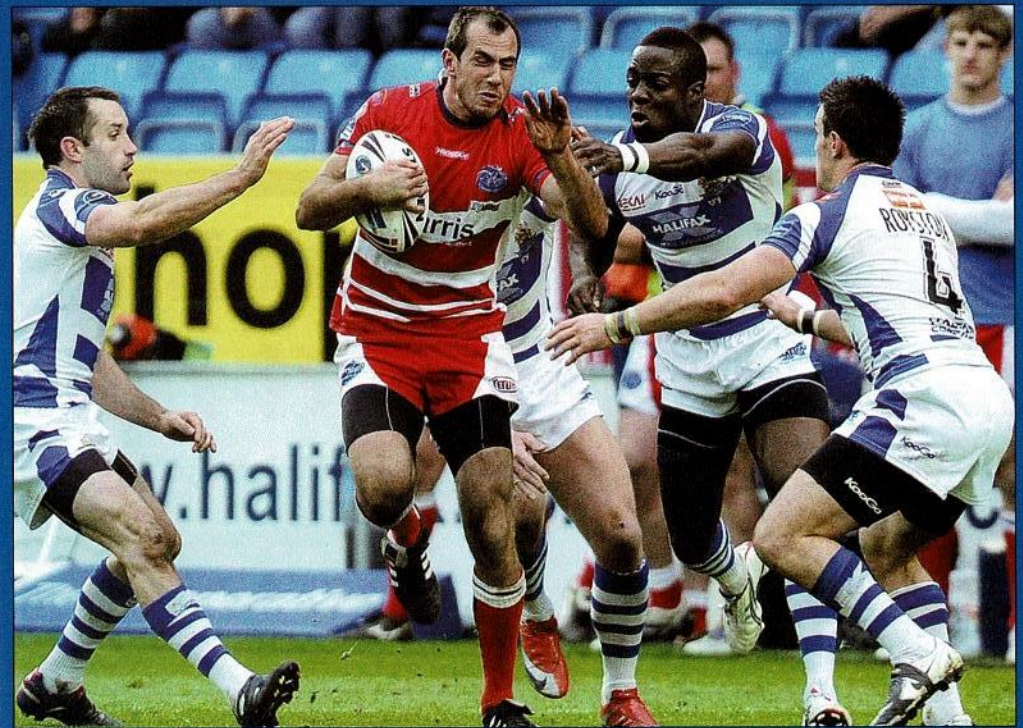
"We've been pretty good this year and if we finish strongly and achieve what we set out to, I'm sure we'll get the credit we deserve."

Dickens has become part of the furniture at Post Office Road having now racked up over 350 appearances for Fev.

Although his return from Salford towards the end of the 2005 season was not enough to avoid relegation, he stuck around to help them get promoted back into the second tier in 2007.

Dickens has seen many changes at the club and feels that this year's success is the culmination of two years' hard work since the arrival of head coach Daryl Powell after the 2008 season.

"You know the familiar faces amongst the supporters that you see every week, but coaches and players have come and gone so there has been some turnover," he said.

"But I think the last couple of years have probably been the most stable the club's been on the playing front. There's not been as much change-around as there has in the past.

"We weren't able to get the club back out of the division straight away in 2006 but we did it at the second time of asking.

"Every year since then the club seems to have built and developed even further and the club's moving in the right direction.

"Mark Campbell, the chairman, is doing a good job. He's very ambitious and wants to take the club as far as he can.

"Then there's the coaching staff. Daryl Powell and Ryan Sheridan are both outstanding coaches and really good blokes as well. I think they've improved everybody's game massively since they've been at the club.

"And the players we've brought in as well. We've got a strong squad now and we're a really close bunch of lads as well so everything's looking pretty positive.

"It's a great club to be around, I love being here and I love playing for the club so I've enjoyed every minute of it."

That has shown on the field with Dickens putting in a string of commanding performances to be named in the Championship All-Star team yet again.

Dickens is one of four Fev players in

the side, along with Liam Finn, Jon Grayshon and Matty Dale, although he reckons more of his teammates could have made it.

"I think I've played all right but I am pretty critical - I always think I can improve and play better," he said.

"I've been named in it a few times before but as you get older you appreciate things a bit more.

"It's not a goal you set at the start of the season but it's nice when you do get personal recognition like that.

"I think two or three lads are unlucky

not to be in there as well.

"Tommy Saxton's been outstanding all year - so too have Kyle Briggs and Tony Tonks - but there are other good players out there."

Featherstone had impressed from the outset this season and it was not until their ninth league game that they lost their 100% record, losing 26-24 at home to Toulouse.

And Dickens feels the pressure of maintaining that start was better than

the pressure of trying to make up ground, like they had to do last season when they finished sixth yet still went within a game of the Grand Final.

"We managed to get off to a good start and once you're up there, it's a lot easier trying to stay up there than losing a couple of games early and trying to play catch-up," he said.

"The two games we lost, we were nowhere near our best but we still only lost by two points so we must have been doing something right.

"We've had a couple of dips through the season, just like everybody else, but we still managed to get the results."

Halifax beat Fev 36-30 in the final eliminator last year and Dickens, who has signed a new two-year contract through to the end of 2012, knows going into the play-offs as league winners matters little.

"We're not getting carried away, we know there's some good sides in there so we'll have to be right at the top of our game," he said.

"We've had a couple of weekends off and some of the lads went to Wembley for the Challenge Cup final. It's been a bit of a balancing act - giving everybody some time off to keep them fresh but making sure they keep their sharpness and match fitness.

"But we've beaten all these teams this season so if we're at our best, we're pretty confident we can get a result."

Henderson's heading 'home' on play-off raid

His contract dispute with Barrow still hasn't been resolved, but only play-off victory will be on the mind of Sheffield's new hooker Andrew Henderson as he squares up against his old team. By JAMES COLLINS

ANDREW Henderson won't need any motivation when he takes the field at Barrow Raiders. The hooker feels his season has been rescued by the move to Sheffield Eagles after a protracted contract dispute at Craven Park.

Henderson admits there was a wry smile when he saw the Eagles would face his old club in the second play-off elimination round.

"I'd enjoy a win – I have nothing against the Barrow players, they are a great bunch and the fans were great to me when I was there," he said.

"Obviously there was an issue with the Barrow board and I didn't feel they treated me very well and it would be nice to get a win there."

The mid-season row left Henderson out of the Raiders team kicking his heels on the sidelines before the lifeline offer of a contract from Eagles coach Mark Aston just before the July signings deadline.

That dispute still has to be settled at an employment tribunal but for the Scottish international playing again has been a great morale booster.

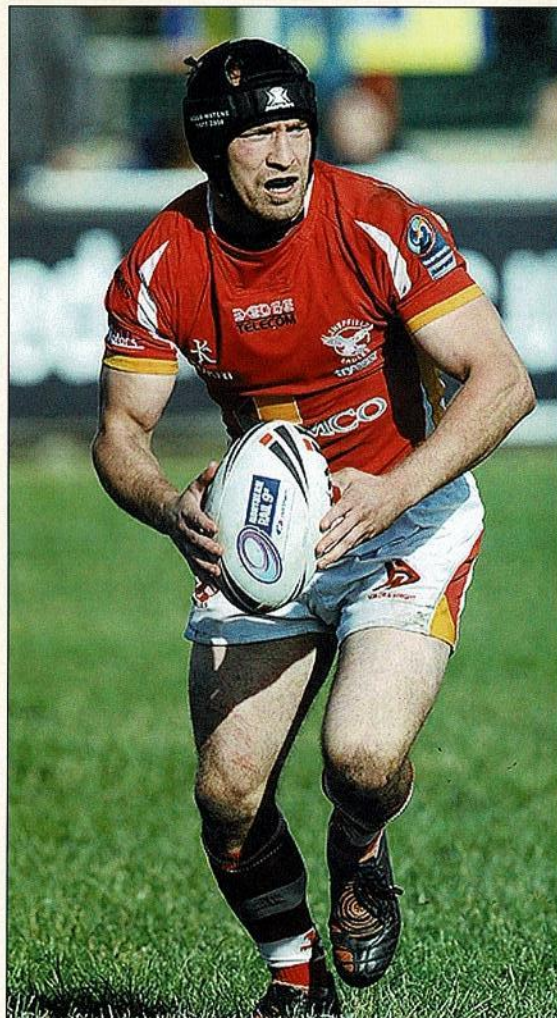
What lies ahead could be a contract for 2011 at Sheffield.

"It's been fantastic and I'm grateful for the opportunity Mark and the Sheffield club have given me at a difficult time and late in the season," he said.

"I wanted to be playing and in the short time I've been at Sheffield I've seen how the club operates and I've been impressed."

He added: "The facilities, organisation and infrastructure are great. Mark and his team have done a fantastic job in resurrecting the club from where it was 10 years ago.

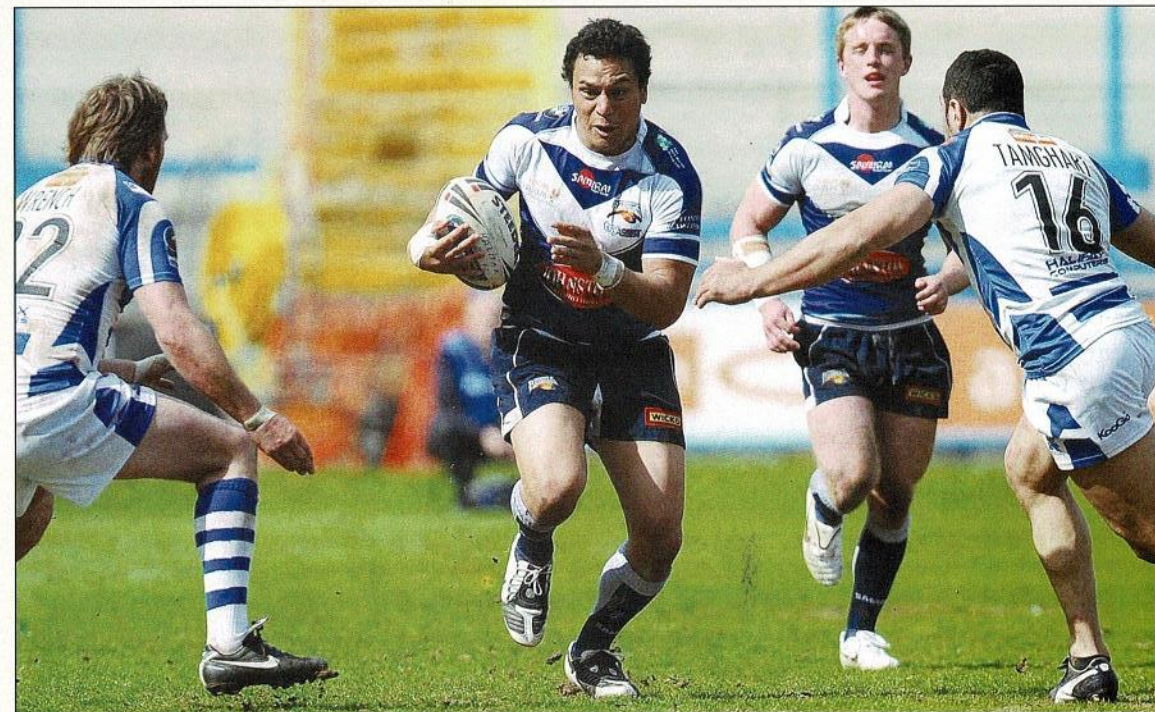

little 'extra' for Henderson. He said: "I'm sure Andy will be up for it, he'll have a point to prove to Barrow.

"He doesn't have to do anything special just give us the type of game he has since he came in the squad.

"He's a champion bloke who will be trying to make Barrow sit up and take notice. But it's not about one player it's about the Sheffield Eagles team and getting into the next round."

The crunch comes at Craven Park with the winners booking a ticket into the semi-final and just 80 minutes away from competing for the £100,000 Grand Final prize.

For this weekend's game Henderson has been spared the 300-plus miles round trip with his new team from Sheffield – he's still based in Barrow with his family.

The Eagles face having to play all their games away for the duration of their play-off run but Henderson said: "I've been fortunate enough to feature in Grand Finals and from my experience I think we can go all the way.

"This year any side is capable of winning the Grand Final.

"We have the long road coming from sixth position but we believe we are capable of doing it.

He added: "We play a pretty exciting game of rugby, we move the ball around well and we have the plenty of skilful players and striking ability out wide.

"There are some areas defensively we need to improve on and we need to be more clinical. In the Leigh game we created four or five chances, which in play-offs you need to take, but the last pass just wasn't sticking.

"We have to learn that in big games we have to take the opportunities because we might not be as fortunate at Barrow.

"Barrow have strike power all through the team – Ned Catic is in great form, Jamie Rooney and James Coyle at halfback are very creative and good organisers.

"Zeb Luisi is a danger man at the back. He's playing full-back at the moment but if he does go back to 13 he'll still be floating around and he's a dangerous player if you give him time and space.

"There's plenty for us to look at but I'm confident we can get it right."

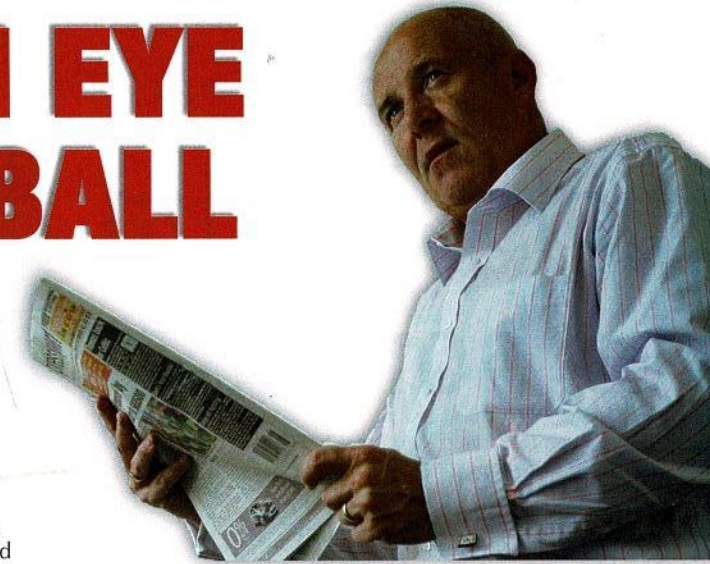

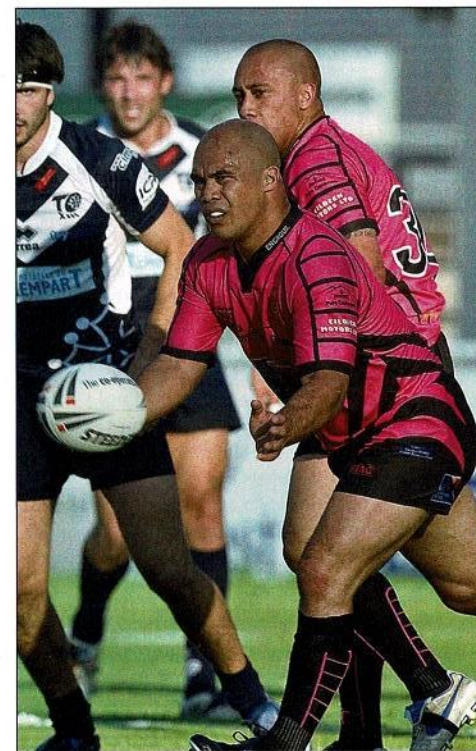
Sound familiar?

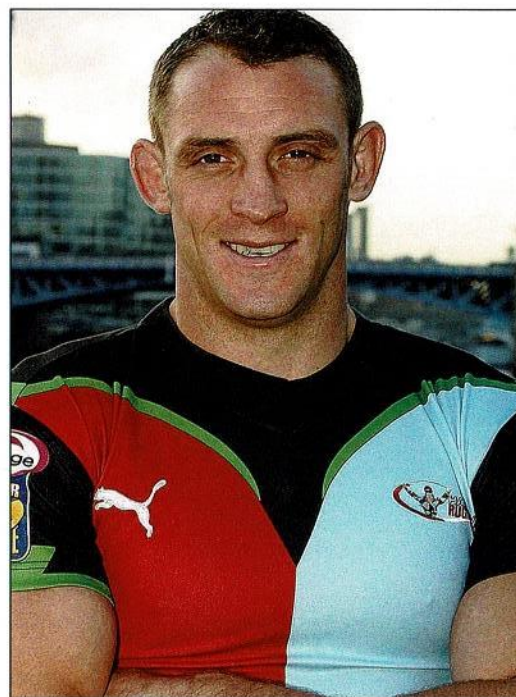

All-star pals line up to honour Garry's memory



FOURTEEN players from Garry Purdham's former clubs will turn out in his honour for Cumbria against England on Sunday October 3 at Whitehaven's Recreation Ground.

This initial squad, which is subject to some changes nearer the event, will be captained by Garry's brother Rob Purdham and will include Huddersfield's Gregg McNally and Kyle Amor of Leeds Rhinos, plus former Workington Town playmaker Liam Campbell, now at Barrow.

Cumbria will be coached by Paul Crarey, with assistant coaches Gary Charlton of Workington Town and Whitehaven's David Seeds, both friends and former team-mates of Garry Purdham.

"Garry was a great friend of mine and this game is quite fitting, even though he wouldn't have wanted the fuss," Seeds said.

"It's the strongest Cumbria team I have seen for a long time. It has been picked on merit and there is quality in there.

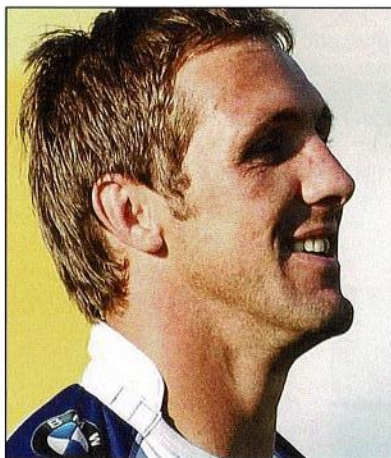
"I'm getting quite excited about what we are doing, not just for Garry's family, the reason it's being played, but for the whole of Cumbria. I can't remember the last time a full England team came to West Cumbria."

Carnegie Challenge Cup winner Jon Clarke of Warrington Wolves; St Helens winger Ade Gardner and Oliver Wilkes from Harlequins, will also feature in the Cumbria side.

"We have picked a handy squad," Charlton said. "We all know these lads can play and they won't let anyone down."

Surprise additions to the squad are young amateurs Rhys Davies and John Paul Brocklebank, both from Egremont Rangers, the club where the late back-rower started and ended his career.

Spokesman Dave Bowden added: "It was felt at an early

stage from everyone involved that representation in the Cumbrian squad should be from all the clubs Garry played for, it's a great opportunity for John Paul and Rhys to be part of the day and I'm sure Garry would have approved."

The final selection of the England team will depend on which sides contest the Engage Super League Grand Final, which is the day before the October 3 Recreation Ground clash but national coach Steve McNamara has pledged to field his strongest possible line-up.

Panthers set for a brand new 'union'

BLACKPOOL are set to be taken over by Fylde rugby union club. The Panthers have been looking for new investors since chairman Bobby Hope's resignation in mid-season and are now poised to enter into a Harlequins-style "joint venture" with their landlords.

The move makes real sense for the co-operative Championship 1 club, given they already share the Woodlands Memorial Ground with the National League Two North side.

It appears Fylde are not only prepared to pump funds into the Panthers but will also offer the rugby league club a deal whereby they share income from the bar and catering on match days.

Panthers head coach Martin Crompton, who is eager to see a takeover go through quickly so that he can plan his squad for 2011, described Fylde's takeover proposal as "an offer we couldn't refuse".

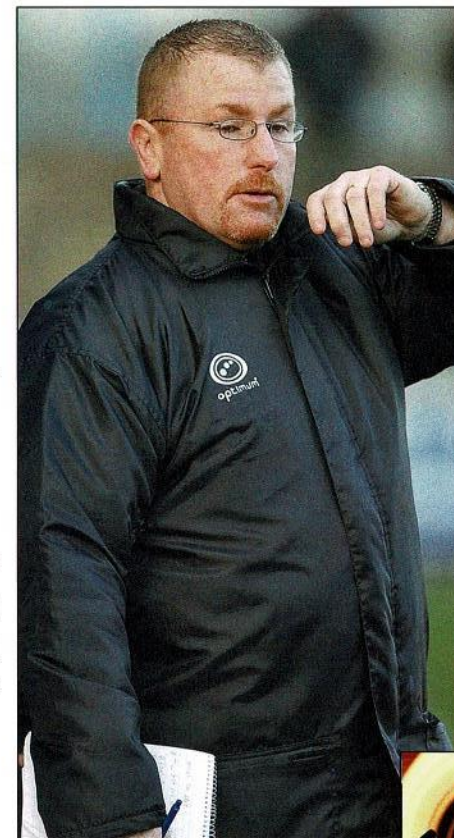
"This gives us a bit more stability and a lot more security," Crompton said.

"The RFL know all about it and they agree it is the best way forward for the club.

"We've not had a share of bar takings or food money before and I'm sure most clubs will tell you that's where most of your money comes from.

"Fylde can see the benefits of having us here and it's a good deal for us."

Former chairman John Chadwick has been leading the

search for new investment since Hope's walk-out, which he attributed to "ill health".

It is understood that Chadwick, representing the Blackpool board, met with representatives from Fylde twice last week.

Hope, who took over the club last autumn, has been holding out on selling his majority shareholding but Crompton says the club expect to force a deal through soon.

The Panthers were docked 10 points by the RFL in July as a result of "contractual irregularities" and breaches of registration and salary cap rules.

Red Hall are understood to have shown leniency on the club because of the circumstances surrounding their ownership.

A quick resolution could see Crompton pledge his own future to the club amid rumours linking him with the vacant head coach job at Championship Barrow.

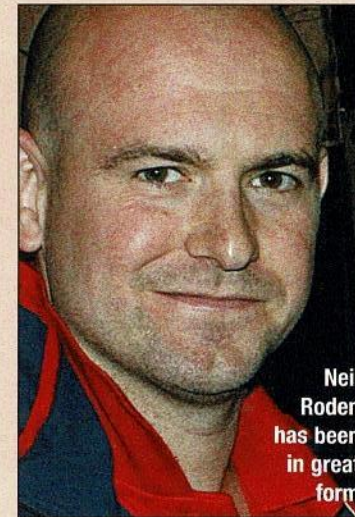

Home or away, Benson's boys deliver the winning goods

OLDHAM coach Tony Benson finds himself in an unusual situation. The Roughyeds are hoping to book a fourth successive Grand Final appearance when they host York City Knights on Sunday.

Yet there is barely any pressure on the Kiwi to ensure they go one better and finally earn promotion back into the Co-operative Championship.

Staying in business was the main concern for the Roughyeds this year after Bill Quinn left the club at the end of last season, with Chris Hamilton becoming chairman and taking on the unenviable job of managing the club's debt.

To move into the Whitebank Stadium in May, the club's first permanent home in 13 years, was an achievement in itself given the club's circumstances.

But Benson has also managed to keep the team competitive on the field, securing second place just three points behind Championship 1 winners Hunslet.

"At the beginning of the season we weren't given a hope of being anywhere near the play-offs so to get where we are with the side we've got, we've done really well," said Benson.

"I think we're better prepared now than this time last year. We'd just lost five or six of our better-paid players and were re-organising ourselves going into the play-offs.

"This is quite a different team. Ben Heaton, Chris Clarke, Scott Mansfield and Luke Sutton have come from reserve grade, Mick Fogerty and John Gilam have come from nowhere really, Danny Whitmore, Joe Chandler and

Valu Bentley have come from academy teams and Dave Ellison has come from the Skolars so it's a totally new team.

"We've replaced last year with genuine enthusiasm. We've a lot of young players who are eager to improve but we've also got some important senior leaders in there, who we've teamed up with our reserve graders this year almost as mentors. They've come together as a really good group that's driven."

While the enthusiasm of the youngsters has given Oldham a welcome lift it is the quality and experience of full-back Paul O'Connor and stand-off Neil Roden that have been crucial to their campaign.

Their contribution was recognised as both were named in the Championship 1 All-Star team and Benson was particularly pleased for O'Connor, who won three of the four club awards with Roden earning the other.

"It's no fluke and it's no gift from God – Paul works really hard," said Benson. "In the off-season he had to bulk up and he did that, and that's responsible for a lot of the improvement in Paul.

"He just needed a bit of size. Paul's got the heart of a front-rower, he gets bashed game-in, game-out and just bounces back every time, but adding a bit more power there, he's actually achieving more on everything he does. It means he's a lot safer, physically, too.

"We've also worked hard on his passing game and that's really come on. As for Neil, the three games we lost he didn't play so that tells you he's pretty important, not necessarily with his hands on the ball, but because he's a

very good guiding influence on the field. Everyone's available for Sunday so I've got a headache - but a good one."

Despite exceeding expectations so far, Benson believes his side can secure Grand Final glory.

"There's a buzz around the place and the exciting thing is that where we're at as a team now, I think we can go all the way," said the former Leigh and Skolars coach.

"We've been one of the most consistent teams and it's been shown by only three losses during the year. We've beaten Blackpool twice and Hunslet so there's no-one we really fear."

Oldham inflicted one of just two defeats for Hunslet back in March and they maintained that away form right through the season. They claimed a crucial last-gasp victory at Blackpool in July and won their last three league games to ensure they went finished the season with a 100% away record.

"It's mental toughness involved there as well as just having a stable environment," said Benson. "If you can keep the environment away as close as you can to how it is at home then you can get that sort of consistency.

"Our away fans usually outnumber the home fans so we've got the same support wherever we go and that certainly has a big bearing on things.

"We built the confidence week on week and I think we're a far better team now than we were two months ago or even six weeks ago.

"To do it up to that point with the team we have then still improve says so much about the group of boys we've got together. We've made a conscious effort to improve each week and I think we've done that."

Benson hailed the club's supporters as they rallied round to help get Whitebank ready for its first game back in May,

when York were also the visitors and ruined the party by snatching a 34-28 victory.

Crowds have been just below the 1,110 there that day but the Roughyeds are hoping for a bumper gate at the Whitebank's first play-off match.

"I'd be surprised if it's not a sell-out, which is about 1,500," said Benson. "It's pretty amazing what's happened at the stadium because the hard work hasn't stopped, to be honest. The next stage is getting terracing and I think once that's in it's going to be a pretty fantastic place.

What's working really well is people being so close to the pitch – the atmosphere's really good – and before and after the game there's a great area to socialise right on site.

"We've also got corporate facilities up and running, which helps to bring more money into the club and also other people who may not normally come."

After securing a second-placed finish, fans were rocked by news the club was facing a winding-up order. But chairman Chris Hamilton insisted the problem was

over 'old debt' from the previous regime and that the club's future is secure.

"The atmosphere around the club's really good," Benson added. "It's very positive. We've got full confidence in Chris. He said he'd sort it out and I believe he has. It never really crossed our mind, to be honest. The players know that regardless, they'll still get paid, and that was the same only last week.

"The one thing with Chris, in 13 years a player has never gone without what he's been promised."

And with such a man at the helm, Benson would be happy to stay on regardless of how the play-offs pan out.

"There's nothing formal yet but I'm not looking to leave," he said.

Widnes quick to sign two new boys

CLUBS in the Co-operative Championships have been quick to start recruiting for 2011 following the passing of the September 1st anti-tampering deadline.

WIDNES were swift to make a double signing for the 2011 season. The Vikings have brokered deals with Leigh second rower Macgraff Leuluai and Hull KR half back Chaz l'Anson.

Leuluai is the brother of Wigan's New Zealand international scrum half Thomas. l'Anson, meanwhile, spent a month on loan at the Stobart earlier this season.

STANLEY GENE is set to become coach of French club Villeneuve having won his case for unfair dismissal by Halifax.

Gene was set to fly to France this week after being offered the role of player-coach at the club. Fax terminated the contract of the former Hull, Hull KR, Bradford and Huddersfield star in July after he had struggled to overcome a knee injury.

But a Rugby Football League operational rules tribunal ruled that the Championship club had not followed the correct procedure. The tribunal ordered Halifax to compensate Gene for the remaining five months of the first year of his two-year contract.

DEWSBURY RAMS coach Warren Jowitt expecting to finalise deals with two new players with Super League experience – a back and a forward – as he rounds off his squad-building for 2011.

With most of his 2010 team already signed up, Jowitt is also waiting for a decision from prop Luke Stenchion on whether he'll be staying on.

The Rams are holding a fans' forum event on Sunday September 12, in the Royal Suite at Tetley's Stadium, starting at 3pm. The new signings for 2011 will be revealed.

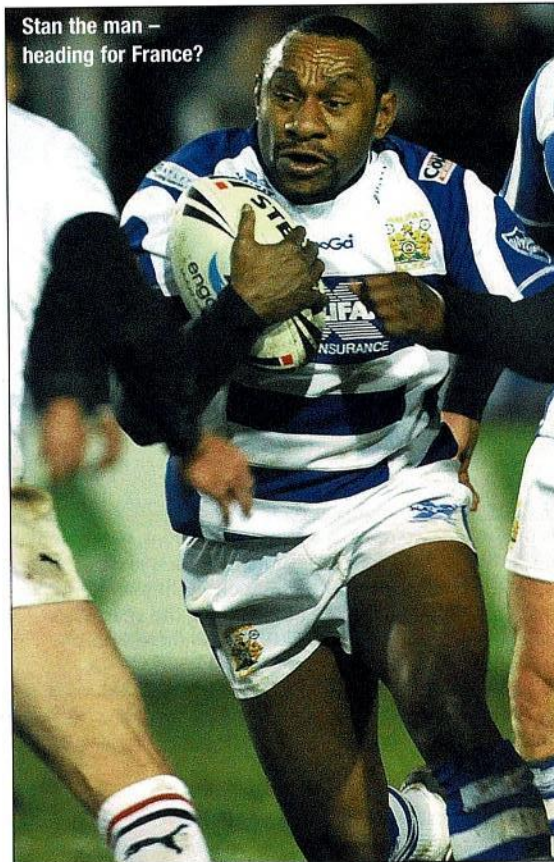
WHITEHAVEN'S plans for a new multi-million pound community stadium are still on track – as long as the club survives.

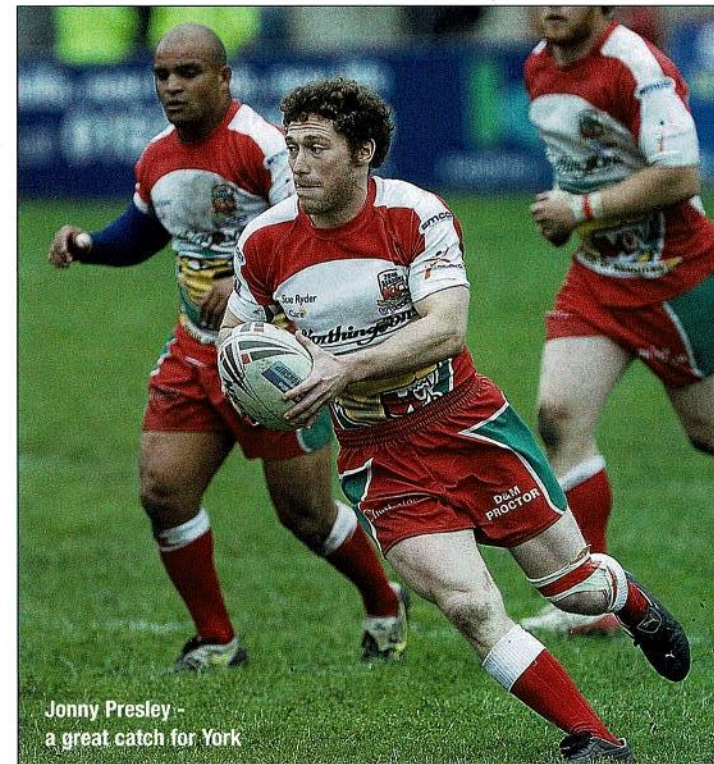
Coach Mark Aston says the length of the contract shows the confidence the club has in the centre. "It's not a problem and it shows the club's confidence in Menzie," he says.

O'Connor edged out third-placed Chris Clarke and second-placed Neil Roden to win the supporters' prize.

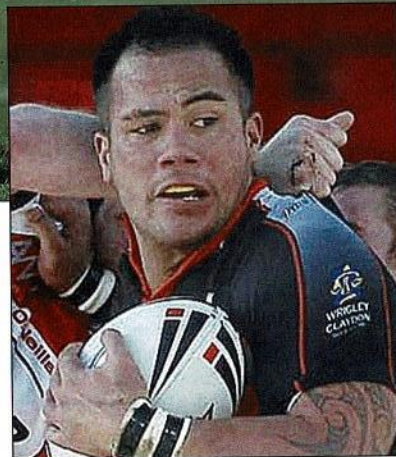
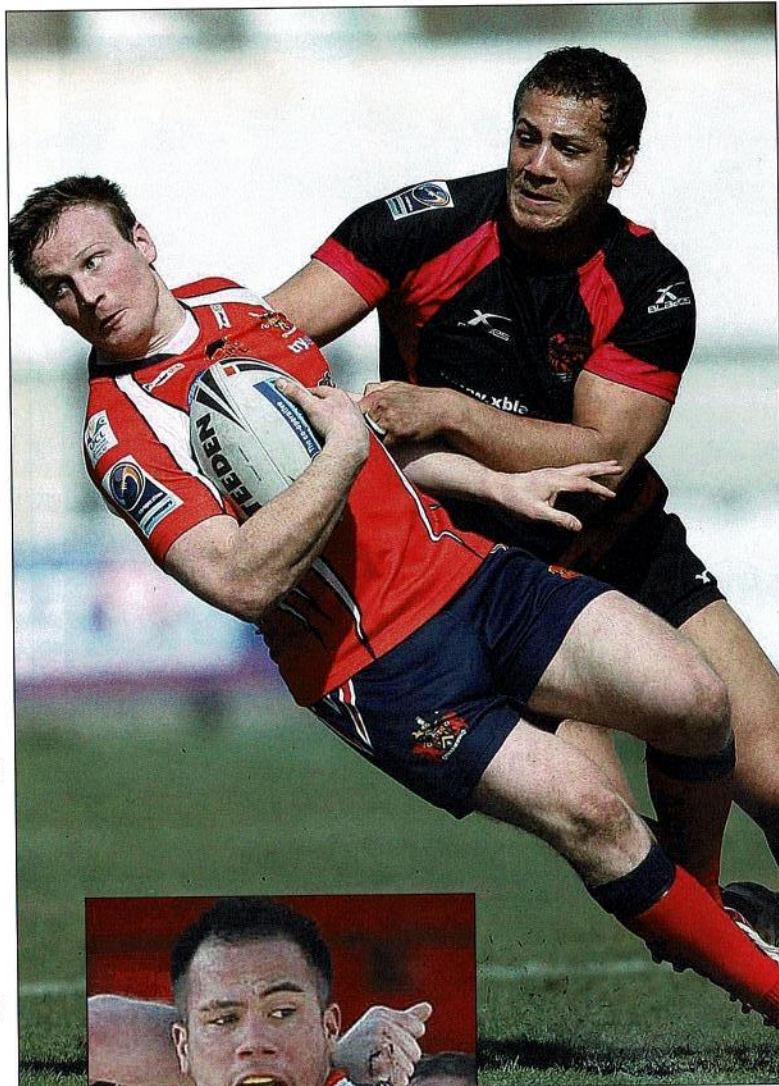

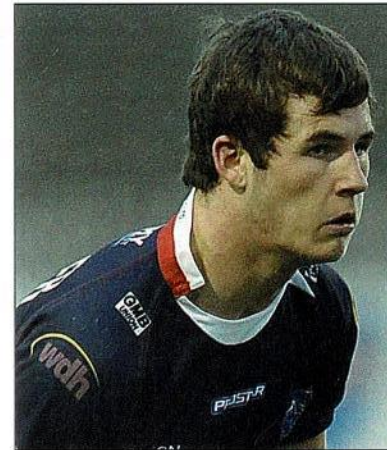

End of a dream for Centurions

TWO of the big guns with Super League aspirations crashed out of the play-offs at the first hurdle.

Leigh Centurions, who finished third in the Championship, squandered an eight-point lead at Leigh Sports Village to let unfancied but workmanlike Sheffield Eagles through to Week 2 and a qualifying semi-final spot.

Leigh had banked on making the Grand Final to boost their Super League application in 2012 but despite battling away to the bitter end they could not stop the South Yorkshiremen from throwing a gigantic spanner in the works.

Sheffield lost star full back Misi Taulapapa, who had scored a hat-trick two weeks earlier against the Centurions, after only a minute with a suspected broken leg.

But despite having to switch Tangi Ropati to full back and then to juggle his three remaining substitutes for the next 79 minutes, Mark Aston steered his side a week closer to the final.

It could have been a case of stage fright in front of the Sky Sports cameras, but one player who was not affected was Eagles' centre Menzie Yere. The Papua New Guinea international was the most dangerous player on the pitch and finished with two crucial tries.

Leigh led 18-12 at half-time with Mick Nanyn adding to his prodigious try haul but the Lancastrians began poorly after the re-start and Sheffield made them pay.

The crowd were ready for one last onslaught from Ian



Millward's men but prop Chris Hill lost the ball 10 metres out and the hooter sounded to bring the curtain down on a season that started with Leigh bouncing back from Championship 1, then promising so much, only to fall short.

It completed a mixed night for Hill, who was sent to the sin-bin after 90 seconds for what looked like a timid late hit on Brendon Lindsay kicking downfield on the last tackle.

Sheffield will now face Barrow Raiders, who destroyed the dream of another ambitious club, Widnes Vikings.

Two weeks ago the Vikings had plundered the league points at Craven Park and Barrow were in the doldrums. Not so this week.

Barrow were back at their best - under temporary coach Dave Clark - and they romped home 38-0 and never gave Widnes a sniff.

They looked a totally different team to the one that stumbled to a string of embarrassing defeats in the closing weeks of the regular season.

Led by the likes of the returning Richard Fletcher, Martin Ostler and ex-Widnes man Paul Noone Barrow had too much energy and too many ideas for the Vikings.

Raiders notched seven tries, two coming from substitute Liam Campbell who intercepted for one of his scores.

Widnes needed another gear but couldn't find one. There was no stopping Barrow as a long ball from Noone found wingman Andy Ballard and he crossed with ease for

his 22nd try of the campaign to give the Raiders a 28-0 lead and kill the game stone dead.

On a sour note, Raiders lost Liam Harrison and Jamie Rooney with leg injuries late in the game and they face a battle to get fit for the home tie with Sheffield.



BLACKPOOL produced a superb second-half fightback to recover from a 14-0 deficit and go through to week two of the Championship 1 play-offs.

It looked as though the Panthers, who finished fourth, would blow home advantage for the second year running when Andy Hobson and Martin Keavney were sin-binned in the first half.

Town led through two converted tries and a penalty but Blackpool hit back with 24 unanswered points in 10 minutes early in the second half.

Having kept a clean sheet in the first 40 minutes Town lost the plot from the re-start.

James Robinson knocked on under the posts for Town and then began the Blackpool fightback, with John Clough going over. Martin Ainscough, who had just switched to left centre then intercepted a pass and there was no stopping him from

scoring a 90-metre try.

A Tom Hemingway kick was then spilled by Andrew Beattie for a goal-line drop-out and Martin Keavney wriggled through to put the Panthers in front for the first time.

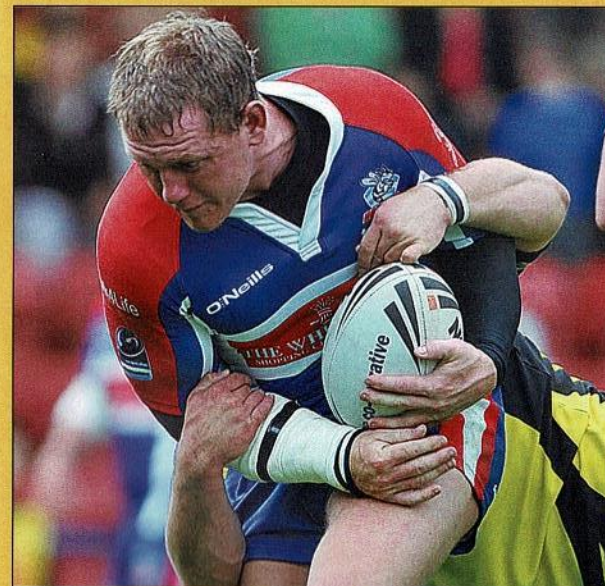
Blackpool extended their lead with the try of the match-by Mark McCully.
