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



GATESHEAD THUNDER BECOME PART OF NEWCASTLE RUGBY LTD

Following weeks of intense speculation, the acquisition of Gateshead Thunder by Newcastle Rugby Ltd was officially announced on May 23rd, a day chairman Bill Midgeley described as "the most significant date in Gateshead Thunder's history.

Now sitting along with union side Newcastle Falcons as part of Newcastle Rugby Ltd, Thunder retain their own identity including name, colours and badge and will continue to play out of Gateshead International Stadium until at least the end of the 2014 season.

The change of ownership brings immediate benefits to Thunder, not least of all additional funds being made available to

strengthen the squad in time for the end of season play offs and the use of the Falcons' marketing and commercial functions as Thunder strive to increase attendances at home matches.

Gateshead Thunder chairman Bill Midgeley said: "This is undoubtedly the most significant date in Gateshead Thunder's history since the formation of the original club back in 1998 and its first season in Super League back in 1999. The offer from Newcastle Rugby Ltd was unanimously accepted by the shareholders of Thunder Rugby Ltd and I'm both delighted and excited at the short and long term future for the club."

"There's a lot of hard work ahead for everyone involved but this news gives us a real opportunity to grow not just Thunder but the sport of rugby league in the North East."

Commenting on the ownership change Newcastle Rugby Ltd chairman Semore Kurdi said: "I'm delighted that Gateshead Thunder has become part of Newcastle Rugby Ltd. There are a number of benefits to having both league and union clubs within the same organisation. Resources can be shared off the field in terms of administration, marketing, medical, sports science and facilities that will be to the advantage of both clubs.

"We look forward to the second half of the season now with the aim of Thunder being promoted to the next tier. With rugby league now re-introducing promotion and relegation between the various levels there is a clear path through to Super League and reaching that level is our long term goal. If we achieve that goal by our target date we will have earned our place by growth on and off the field and by becoming a sustainable club.

"We also look forward to the Falcons Community Foundation working with the Thunder Community Programme to benefit both codes and the wider North East community in the future."

Since joining Newcastle Rugby Limited Thunder have made a number of exciting new signings, and we look forward to sharing more news with you as the club continues to develop further over the coming months.



Today's Visitors

Oldham Roughyeds provide today's opposition at the International Stadium, looking to build on an impressive start to their season, that has seen them win seven of nine matches and currently sit third in the Kingstone Press Championship 1 table.



Averaging five tries a game, the Roughyeds will travel to Tyneside in determined mood, knowing a win will put them firmly into the hunt for the league's only automatic promotion place and give them a chance of avoiding the play offs, that have ended their promotion hopes for the past four seasons.

Formed in 1998, Oldham Roughyeds are the continuation of the original Oldham FC, one of the founding members of the Northern Rugby Football Union and which was also one of the founding members of Super League in their guise as Oldham Bears.

A club with a proud history, including three Challenge Cup titles the current squad are looking to build on last year's fine second place in the league and earn the club's first trophy for nearly a quarter of a century.

Oldham began the season a 4 - 18 away win at South Wales Scorpions, in a match that had to be abandoned after 72 minutes when appalling weather conditions and players showing hypothermia like symptoms, left referee Adam Gill with no choice but to call a halt to the game.

In their first home match, the Roughyeds were disappointed to be held to a 20 - 20 draw by a spirited Hemel Stags, after leading 16 - 0 at half time. A 68th minute score for Kenny Hughes had looked to settle the match in favour of the home side however two late tries for the Stags ensured the points were shared.

Following a narrow 16 -18 away win at London Skolars, Oldham established themselves in second place in the early season running following their comprehensive 52 -16 win over Thunder at Whitebank Stadium.

Scott Naylor's sides first defeat of the campaign followed as the lost out 28 – 12 away to league leaders Hunslet, before three consecutive wins minimised the damage caused to their title credentials.

This run of victories included a crucial away win at York City Knights when captain Lewis Palfrey scored the winning try three minutes from time.

With only one point between Oldham and the top spot, today's game will provide Thunder with a massive test and should serve up a classic encounter.

Scott Naylor

After taking the reins of Oldham in September 2012, former England centre Scott Naylor is the man charged with guiding the Roughyeds back towards the top of English Rugby League.

Enjoying stints with Wigan, Salford and Bradford, Naylor scored a total of 160 Super League tries and was a key feature of the Bradford teams that twice won the Tetley's Challenge Cup.

He also played a pivotal role in the club's 2001 Super League and the 2002 World Club Challenge triumphs.

Naylor hit the peak of his international career in the 2000 Rugby League World Cup, where he earned four England caps, partnering Keith Senior in the centre against Australia, Fiji, Ireland and New Zealand.

ne 2000 nd caps, ia, Fiji, Ireland

In his first season in charge the 42 year old guided his team to an impressive second in the overall table, winning 12 matches out of 16 and missing out on automatic promotion by only two points.

A strong play off push saw Oldham qualify for the end of season Grand Final only to lose out to Rochdale in the showpiece match.

As a result, Naylor will be demanding his charges continue their recent form and make a concerted push for the League title and the automatic promotion place.

Lewis Palfrey

Club captain Lewis Palfrey began his Rugby League career forming part of the Under 15 set up at Eccles and came through the Salford academy system, and spent two years at the club as a full time professional.

The 23 year old joined Oldham at the start of the 2013 season after abandoning plans to play in Australia for Wollongong and was immediately appointed captain by head coach Naylor, who worked with Palfrey at Salford.

A utility back who is primarily used by the Roughyeds at Scrum Half, Palfrey has been in exceptional form with the boot, scoring 22 goals and one try in the team's nine matches to date.

He is a committed player who provides Oldham with many backline options and will direct play with intelligence and maturity.





Dale Bloomfield

One of Oldham's most potent attacking threats, Dale Bloomfield has been in free scoring form this season with eight tries in nine games and is hot on the heels of Thunder's Jason Payne as the league's top try scorer.

Primarily operating as a winger, but equally comfortable at Fullback, Bloomfield has been one of Oldham's most consistent performers since joining from Rochdale in 2013.

He began playing the sport as a junior for amateur club St Maries before becoming a Widnes Vikings scholar.

After a two year spell at St Helens, Bloomfield joined Rochdale Hornets in 2010 where he began to establish his credentials as a lethal scoring threat.

After settling into the club, the 26 year old played in every game in 2011 and 2012, scoring 32 tries in total.

Missing only one game for the Roughyeds last season, Bloomfield went on to score 11 tries from his 23 appearances and has continued his impressive scoring rate this term.

Sam Gee

Vice-captain Gee is an extremely versatile player who contributes much all over the park, notably from hooker, loose-forward or even centre where he has played on numerous occasions.

He is currently in his second season at Oldham and played in 21 out of 24 games last year.


He is grandson of the late Ken Gee, a prop who starred for Wigan and Great Britain just after the war and was generally recognised as one of the sport's best-ever front-row forwards.

Sam played his early rugby as a centre at Orrell RU, but he was persuaded to turn to league and was soon selected for England Colleges, where he caught Warrington's interest.

He had two years at Warrington, three at Wigan and two at London Skolars before he moved back north to spend an unhappy season at Whitehaven.

The Big Interview

Plying their trade in the third tier of English Rugby League since 2010, Thunder are now back on the rise and looking to establish themselves as a force to be reckoned with in the sport.

Now part of Newcastle Rugby Ltd, sitting alongside Rugby Union neighbours Newcastle Falcons under the stewardship of Semore Kurdi and showing the best form in over five years, Thunder is a club with a real buzz surrounding it.

New players have been added to strengthen the squad,

administrative functions have been bolstered through the secondment of personnel from the Falcons business function and the ultimate goal of once again playing at Super League level has been set. It's a far cry from the situation at the end of the 2009 season when, after surviving their first season in the second tier Championship, the club were rocked by the news that the holding company was to be wound up.

Ultimately the club was to survive, but with a business plan unable to sustain Championship rugby league, the club had no choice but to accept relegation back to the division-they had won as champions 12 months before.

Part of the team that secured the future of the club then, is today's managing director Keith Christie, who has once again been at the forefront of the efforts to ensure professional rugby league has a place on Tyneside and is perhaps more than most, looking forward to the next chapter of the Thunder story.

"It's an exciting time for a club that has been a massive part of my life for the last five years and I am really looking forward to what the future has to offer Gateshead Thunder."

"We have achieved an awful lot since 2009. We successfully managed to preserve this club and then build it into a respected entity, one which was recognised by the RFL as the best Community Club in 2010."

"The business plan for the club then was to be based around our community foundation which would use funding from Sport England and the RFL to underpin the club by delivering coaching within the local community.

"Funded for an initial three years, when that came to an end in 2012, it became apparent that it had done excellent work in terms of engaging with the local community, but this work had not delivered the galvanised support for the club from the local rugby league community we had hoped for. In fairness that was most likely because of the results on the field, but the set up was not sustainable." Faced with dwindling crowds on the back of a run of 64 consecutive defeats, the quest was on to either find a new investment to regenerate Thunder or for the club to pass quietly into the night.

After a long period of careful discussions and investigations, the deal to become part of Newcastle Rugby Ltd. was signed off at the end of May and has given added impetus to Thunder's 2014 campaign, which has set them up for a tilt at reaching the end of season promotion play offs.

Christie explained: "The immediate, direct influence has been on the players and coaches. The guys at Newcastle Rugby Ltd are as serious about making Thunder a success as we always have been, but having people who have a track record of success from outside Thunder show interest, invest and ascribe a value to the club has I think, given the players and coaches a real lift."



While the focus of the here and now is on the play-offs, Thunder also have the chance to build for 2015 with resources that will make the club serious players.

"The investment will allow Stan to identify players from a wider talent pool than before to ensure we have the very best players we can playing in the shirt and representing the club."

"We have a long way to go until we are in a position to make a push for Super League and we will only do it when the club is ready, by which I mean we have stabilised ourselves within the Rugby League ladder, increased our fan base to a level where the costs of running a Super League outfit are sustainable and put a value back to the club in how it is perceived by the outside world."

"It is something that really hurts when people make throw away comments about Thunder losing again. I want that put to bed and people to talk about Gateshead Thunder because we are a club and a team that the town and the wider region is proud of. That is now something we can task ourselves to do."





Jason Payne Interview

Jason Payne is having his best ever season in a Thunder shirt in 2014 and for a man who has been a club stalwart since joining in 2008 that sees the Scarborough born prop going some.

Currently top of the Kingstone Press Championship One try scoring charts with 12 four pointers in 11 games, Payne has featured in the mythical team of the week on four occasions so far this season and has also been named player of the week once.

With his current form leading head coach Stanley Gene to suggest Payne is showing the attributes necessary to perform in Super League; Payne is taking the plaudits in his stride.

"It's always nice to hear positive comments like that, because I definitely feel I am playing well, but it's a team game and what I've done this season is very much based on excellent team performances"



"I am playing in a team with a great bunch of lads around me who work well together and it means I can just concentrate on getting into position and on getting those points. Matty [Beharrell] has been superb so far and has been delivering me some neat passes and that just makes the job of finishing them that little bit easier."

Payne, who began playing Rugby for his local club Scarborough Pirates, aged 13, embarked on his professional career straight from school after joining the academy system at Castleford Tigers.

He remained at Cas until joining Thunder on loan in 2007, representing the Tigers in the Challenge Cup and Super League and he has fond memories of his time there.

"I started at Cas virtually the day after I left school and was determined to make a career out of rugby. I worked hard, trained and eventually broke into the first team and made my Super League debut against St Helens in 2006."

"They were World Club champions at the time and we had a few injuries, so the game was a bit one sided but the atmosphere playing in-front of so many people was a really great experience. I had a couple more appearances including my second where I was sent off for a high tackle on Stan!" Making himself part of the fabric of the club since joining, Payne has been through the highs and lows during his time on Tyneside and is particularly enthused about recent developments at the club. With Thunder now part of Newcastle Rugby Ltd, he says a new wave of optimism is spreading through the club.

"I've been through the whole range of emotions since being here and right now, it is the best atmosphere we've had in a long time. I was here when we won promotion to the Championship and

experienced all the positivity there was around then and that is what the club is like right now."

"In the past, the club maybe hasn't been in a position to capitalise on its progress into the championship, but now with the additional support, we should be able to keep upward momentum going."

With a stated goal of reaching the Super League, but with no fixed timescale, the first step for Payne and his teammates is to secure promotion back to the Kingston Press Championship and the Captian is confident that an assault can be made on that aim immediately.

"We're just outside the playoff spots at the moment, but they are very much in reach, so we as a team need to make sure we are doing what we know we are capable of and sticking to our game plan."

"We have taken some big defeats from the top clubs, but our performances have been improving as the season has gone on and ultimately, we don't need to beat them in the league, we just need to do it in those key games and I'd back us to do that on a big stage."

"To get top 5, we need to beat the teams that are around us, and then just push like crazy against the top teams. We might get wins, but if we give our all, then we will at least get bonus points, and they will be crucial in achieving what we want to this season."



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MATCH REPORT



Gateshead Thunder's fine, recent away form was in short supply on Sunday afternoon, after a second half capitulation gave York City Knights a resounding Kingstone Press Championship 1 win.

The Knights scored 24 unanswered points in the second half as Thunder's challenge faded following the enforced withdrawal of Hooker Paul Stamp through injury.

After pushing the Knights all the way in a narrow defeat at the International Stadium in April and after recording two, consecutive hard fought away wins against Hemel and Oxford, Stanley Gene's charges travelled with high hopes of continuing their push towards the league summit.

Things got off to the best possible start after only six minutes, with a try for Jacob Blades following early inroads made into York territory.

Receiving the ball awkwardly from half back Matty Beharell, Blades juggled superbly before stabbing the ball through behind the York defence, winning the foot race and getting Thunder onto scoreboard.

After a successful conversion from Beharrell, matters tightened up with both sides striving to find a way through and after repelling a number of threatening York attacks, the Thunder defence was breached on 15 minutes.

Following a penalty for a high tackle, York kicked to touch and began a new set of six from half way. Three tackles in, the Knights players spun the ball out wide with precision and pace through the hands to put Austin Bell in for a try by the comer flag.

All square at six all following the conversion, Thunder's response to the Knights equalizer was almost instantaneous.

Giving a good chase of the kick off, the Tynesider's forced a knock on from the Knights receiver 10m from the line. From the resultant scrum, three phases of route one rugby created a big enough gap for Sonny Esslemont to qhost through.


Two tries in ten minutes from Colton Roche and Jack Lee, both converted by former Thunder player Benn Hardcastle saw Thunder fall behind for the first time in 194 minutes of rugby before captain Jason Payne scored on the stroke of half time.

Providing superb support in attack, the skipper's 12th try of the season provided Beharrell with the chance to tie the game going into the break, which was only narrowly, not taken.

With a similar scenario to that of the Good Friday home game, the prospect of a victory looked within reach with Thunder's second half performances being at the heart of their five wins to date.

It was however, all one-way traffic after the restart, beginning almost immediately from the whistle with centre Tyler Craig the first to go over Loose Forward Jack Aldous added another after good work from James Haynes before Ed Smith made it 36-16.

Joe Picketts completed the scoring in stoppage time to leave Thunder disappointed with the result and a clear seven point gap between the top three and the remaining play off positions.



MATCH REPORT



Thunder closed the gap between themselves and the Kingstone Press Championship One play-off spots two weeks ago against Oxford, after being made to work for a full eighty minutes by their hosts to record their fifth win of the season.

Tries from Louis Sherriff, Jacob Blades, Joe Brown, Jamie Rooney, Paul Stamp and Lee Mapals and a 100% conversion rate from Matty Beharrell ensured that Thunder are now two wins from two games versus Oxford this season.

The victory was one built upon solid defence and Thunder were on the front foot as a result of this following a tenth minute score from on loan fullback Sheffiff jinked his way through the Oxford lines to bundle over.


With a 0 - 6 lead from Beharrell's successful kick at goal, the missed conversion from a quick fire reply for Oxford allowed Thunder an intact cushion with which to probe the home defence and duely added two tries in a six minute purple patch.


First on 23 minutes, Blades crossed for his third try of the season after being set into space by Rooney, before Brown took the scores to 4-16following brilliant play on the right wing by recent signing Mapals.

With the conversion added, a 4 – 18 half time lead saw Thunder in control of the match, however a bright start to the second half saw Oxford reduce the deficit to eight points through a Callum Mulkeen try and Tommy Connick conversion.

Hopes harboured by the majority of the 310 in attendance of a fight-back took a knock on 51 minutes after Rooney finished a great Thunder break and despite a further score for the hosts, were finished off following tries from Stamp and Mapals.

A consolation score on 75 minutes gave Oxford hope of securing a bonus point from the match, but the Thunder defence held firm to ensure the hosts took no points from the game.





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
