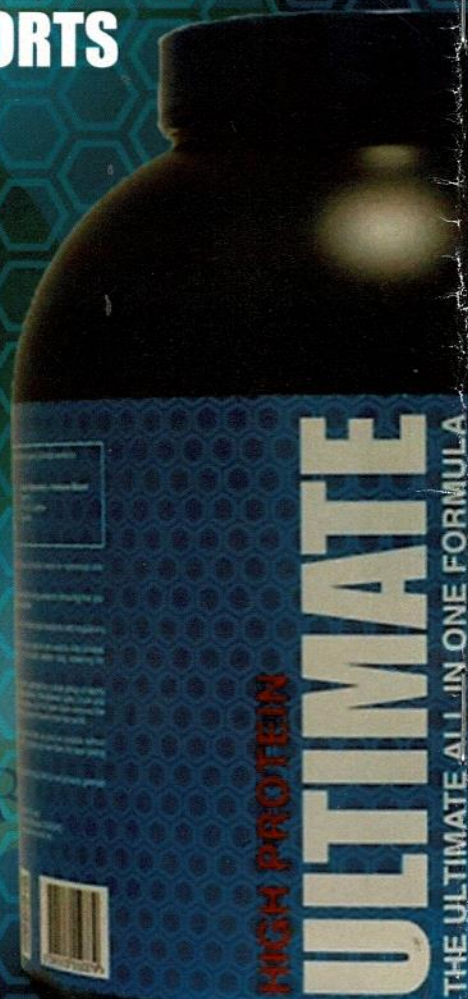



## Boardroom View

Terry Browne's initial views on the changes to the professional leagues from 2015



A warm welcome to you all to Enfield. Thanks once again to Roger Reed and the rest of the Enfield FC board for our continued stay here.

It's the second time we have entertained Oldham at home this season, but a different ground. Our last game here was the most enjoyable of our games at Queen Elizabeth II Stadium – a win against local rivals always gladdens the heart. However, a disappointing defeat in Cardiff means we have much to do if we are going to move up the table.

Last week saw the announcement of the structure of the three professional leagues announced. It's a big change for the sport. It has also meant that five clubs will be relegated into Kingstone Press Championship 1 a mere two years after four teams were promoted to expand the Championship. We must hope that there is some stability in the new structure so that it is given a chance to work.

The large number of clubs being relegated means three teams – Sheffield Eagles, Keighley Cougars and Whitehaven are fighting for 8<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> places, all of which have very different impacts. 8<sup>th</sup> place would see a club make the play-offs, 10<sup>th</sup> place means relegation, whilst 9<sup>th</sup> means the relative safety of

staying put in 2015 and the chance to play Bradford Bulls and London Broncos, who have been relegated from Super League.

A fourteen team league for what is currently Championship 1 will mean fewer break weekends which have been such a problem for many clubs this season. Whilst the fixture structure will aim to reduce travel (playing two of the clubs just once), there is still a strong possibility of a couple of trips up to Cumbria for some clubs. Coventry's entry will certainly mean a broad geographical coverage for the league, especially if North Wales are relegated.

However, the focus for now needs to be on the current season. Oldham just missed out on promotion last season, but unlike many clubs they have not panicked and thrown out the talent that got them so close in 2013. They have added to the core of that side and the benefits of a settled side have come to the fore as the season has progressed, last week beating the early high fliers, Hunslet Hawks.

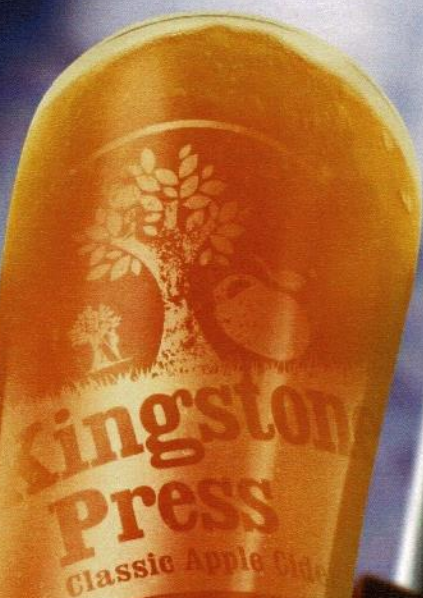

## View from the Dug Out

**Skolars' Head Coach Joe Mbu on progress at home, but a setback in the principality**



A warm welcome to everyone at Queen Elizabeth II Stadium today.

It was no surprise that the Hemel game was a tight one; a fine local derby that really showed the passion of both sides. I was pleased with our composure both to come back from an early deficit and also to hold on when Hemel came back at us in the second half.

After yet another gap in the fixture list we played on the artificial turf of the famous Cardiff Arms Park. That will be good experience for when we return to New River. We enjoyed a lot of possession in the first half, but just couldn't control the game as we should have been able to and we were punished for that.

Again we worked hard to bring us back into the game, but couldn't push our advantage forward. The loss, albeit with a bonus point, means every game is critical if we are to have any chance of making the top five play-offs.

Last Sunday saw Josh Sunley make his debut. Josh came through the academy ranks at Leeds Rhinos before a spell at Featherstone Rovers and whilst he may have much experience at first team level, his experience with those clubs showed in a strong performance, though he will need to avoid sin-binning as happened last week. It was also good to see Dave Williams and Ryan McDonald recognised for their efforts when they were named in the Kingstone Press Championship 1 team of the week.

Today will be the third game of the season against Oldham. The game at New River was a close one, but we didn't do ourselves justice in the game at Whitebank. Oldham are a strong side and are in

form. At the start of the year, they were probably the outsiders amongst the 3 older clubs, but they lie just three points behind York City Knights and beat Hunslet 24-23 last weekend. They will want to continue that form and ensure at least a top two place to give them a more favourable route to the promotion final.

The day at Cardiff Arms Park also saw a Welsh Conference game and our Under 19s took on a very strong Scorpions side that contained 14 of the Welsh side that took bronze in the 9s exhibition competition that in the Commonwealth Games (the competition took place at the start of the month and was won by Papua New Guinea). It's been a big step up from playing other London sides last year to playing near national teams and the side will have learnt a lot from their campaign this year, which bodes well for the future.

# Rugby League for Beginners

A simple guide for those new to the game



The simple aim of Rugby League is to score more points than your opponents

A Rugby League match lasts for 80 minutes (two 40 minute halves). Timekeepers monitor this and sound a siren or hooter as a signal to the referee when the game is over

You score tries (worth four points) by touching the ball down over your opponent's try line. You can convert that to six by kicking a goal. The other means of scoring are a penalty goal (also worth two points) and a drop goal (worth one point)

There are two teams of 13 players with four reserves on the interchange bench. Each team can make a maximum of 10 changes involving any combination of players. Rugby League players have to be multi-skilled but some players do focus on roles within their teams including carrying the ball into the opposition line (forwards), attacking on the fringes (backs) and distributing the ball (hooker and half backs). All players work together in their team's defensive formation

The ball has to be passed backwards. It can be passed as many times as you like until a player is tackled in possession

Each team has the ball for six plays (or tackles). After a tackle, the ball carrier plays the ball back along the ground to a receiver standing behind directly behind them. After the six plays are completed the team in possession must handover the ball to the opposition. Most teams elect to kick at this point in order to gain as much ground as possible

Six players form a Rugby League scrum. They are a means of re-starting the game and create a good opportunity to attack. Scrums are awarded for knock-ons (losing the ball forward) or forward passes

You are offside in Rugby League if you are within the gap maintained between the attacking and defensive sides by the referee or if you interfere with play after being in front of a team mate when they have kicked the ball in open play

A 40-20 kick is when a player kicks the ball behind his own 40 metre line and it bounces into touch within the opposition's 20 metre line. If this happens

the side that kicked the ball get the advantage of putting the ball into the resulting scrum. A goal line drop out is taken from under your own posts if you have been forced to touch the ball down in your own in-goal area or put the ball out of play in this area

A player is guilty of misconduct if he or she:

- Trips, kicks or strikes another player.
- When effecting or attempting to effect a tackle makes contact with the head or neck of an opponent intentionally, recklessly or carelessly.
- Drops knees first on to an opponent who is on the ground.
- Uses any dangerous throw when effecting a tackle.
- Deliberately and continuously breaks the Laws of the Game.
- Uses offensive or obscene language.
- Disputes a decision of the Referee or Touch Judge.
- Re-enters the field of play without the permission of the Referee or a Touch Judge having previously temporarily retired from the game.
- Behaves in any way contrary to the true spirit of the game.
- Deliberately obstructs an opponent who is not in possession.
- Uses a shoulder charge on an opponent.

In the event of misconduct by a player, the Referee shall, at his/her discretion, caution, temporarily suspend for ten minutes (yellow card), or dismiss the offender for the rest of the game (red card).

**Skolars' Community Coach Matt Cuss on representative honours across the age groups for Skolars**

Following the end of the London Junior League season, all eyes now turn to the London Origin Series, sponsored by Hard Rock Café. Throughout the whole of the regular season, some of London Rugby League's most experienced operators have been out and about performing talent id at all venues across London, looking out for standout performers at each age group.

After what has been another successful year for all our Junior Teams, we are delighted to announce that we have no fewer than 24 youngsters have been selected for the 3 game Hard Rock Café London Origin series which will determine the winner for 2014. Given our base in Wood Green, our youngsters will be joining forces with the rest of the teams north of the Thames to take on their notoriously strong Southern Counterparts.

The Hard Rock Café London Origin Series is a representative programme designed to recognise and reward the best talent playing in the London Junior and Youth League. With over 1,100 registered players it is a real honour for our lads selected to be chosen. Based loosely on the Australian 'State of Origin' Series, the 20 highest performing players representing the clubs based North of the Thames compete in a 3 match series against the 20 highest performing players at clubs South of the Thames at all age groups from U12 up to U17.

The series gives players an opportunity to experience a high quality training and playing environment, and also offers the chance for local coaches to develop on the coaching pathway with mentoring from London Broncos Head of Youth Darren Higgins who will be looking after the North and former Harlequins RL Head Coach Rob Powell who will be performing the same role for the South.

The series will commence on Saturday August 30<sup>th</sup> where coaches will get to see their squads for the first of two training sessions. The 3 game series begins at Elmbridge Eagles on **Saturday September 6<sup>th</sup>**, followed by Origin Two on **Saturday September 20<sup>th</sup>** at Hemel Stags and culminating with Origin Three on **Saturday September 27<sup>th</sup>** at Medway Dragons.

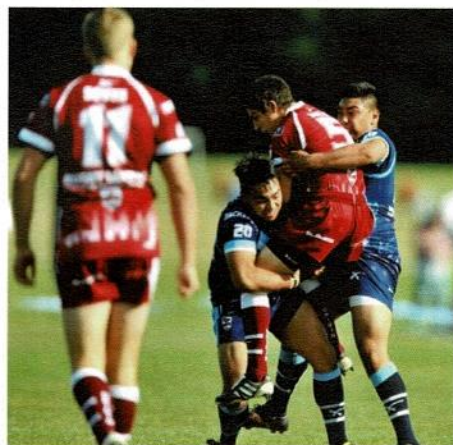

## New structure to usher in exciting new era for RL



Full details of the exciting new league structure that will come into operation in 2015 for Rugby League's professional and semi-professional competitions have been outlined

From next season the First Utility Super League and Kingstone Press Championship will both feature 12 clubs, whilst Kingstone Press Championship One will be renamed as Kingstone Press League 1 and comprise 14 clubs.

RFL Chief Executive Nigel Wood said: "The changes will ensure that every minute of every match in every competition matters and are being implemented following the most comprehensive consultation process in the sport's history.

"The return of promotion and relegation in a format that is financially sustainable for all clubs should ensure fans are entertained from February to October, with an exciting season punctuated by a series of world-class events commencing with the World Club Challenge and finishing at Old Trafford with the Super League Grand Final."

Super League and Championship clubs will each play 23 matches in the regular season - home and away against the other clubs in their respective competitions plus Magic Weekend or Summer Bash.

At the end of the regular season, Super League and the Championship will split into the Super 8s, three groups of eight clubs based on league positions called Super League, The Qualifiers and Championship Shield.

Super League features the top eight Super League clubs; The Qualifiers comprises Super League clubs nine to 12 plus the top four Championship clubs; and the Championship Shield features Championship clubs five to 12.

The Super 8s will be played on a seven match mini-league basis, and will largely determine the make-up of Super League and the Championship the following season.

In Super League, all eight clubs are guaranteed top flight status for the following year whilst the top four will contest a play-off series - 1<sup>st</sup> v 4<sup>th</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> v 3<sup>rd</sup>, with the winner going through to the title-deciding Grand Final.

In The Qualifiers, the top three clubs after seven matches will play in Super League the following season with the final place determined by the Million Pound Game, a play-off between the clubs finishing 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>. The loser of the match will join the three remaining clubs from The Qualifiers and six Championship Shield clubs in the Championship the following season.

In the Championship Shield, the top four clubs with contest a play-off series with the winners contesting the Championship Shield final. The bottom two teams in the Championship Shield will be relegated to League 1.

The 14 League 1 clubs will each play 22 games - 11 home and 11 away, playing each other once and nine teams twice with fixtures scheduled on a geographical basis. At the end of the regular season 1<sup>st</sup> will place 2<sup>nd</sup> with the winner promoted to the Championship as champions. The loser of that match will join the teams that finished 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> in a play-off to determine the second promotion spot.

The 14 League 1 clubs will also be joined by the 2014 National Conference League Grand Final winners and the 2014 RFL Conference Challenge Cup winners in a new knockout competition played at the start of the season.

To allow for the changes to the league structure, the top eight Super League clubs will join the Challenge Cup at the sixth round stage, with League 1 clubs entering at Round 3, Championship clubs at Round 4 and the bottom four Super League clubs at Round 5.





Another new-signing is a re-signing – half-back Brett Robinson rejoining the club after a season at

## Yo-Yos and thwarted ambition

Huw Richards on the changing nature of relegation and its return to Super League this season

Even if it had looked inevitable since the uncertainty over the club's future during the close season, it was still a sad moment when the London Broncos' relegation from Super League was confirmed three weeks ago.

It is also perhaps a time to reflect on the club's very real achievements. First of these it is that it is still there, 34 years on from its debut on the long-legendary afternoon when Wigan were demolished at Craven Cottage, every match extending its all-time endurance record for a professional club outside the northern heartlands.

The second is that having been lifted into the newly-constituted Super League for non-playing reasons, it survived the first 18 seasons without ever finishing bottom of the table. You might argue that it has been unlucky that this record is likely to be ended in the year when conventional promotion and relegation were re-introduced.

But it is difficult to make a hard-luck case for any team that loses 22 matches in a row. And there is a broader principle at stake – the intrinsic fairness of promotion and relegation.

To deny teams progression from lower leagues and guarantee an elite against the consequences of on-field failure always seemed a denial of league's deep-rooted democratic traditions. The game had always assumed that who you were did not matter nearly as much as how good you were, and that you should willingly play any opponent which qualified to compete at your level.

It was a significant point of difference with rugby union, where clubs traditionally played who they chose and whose elites lost little time, after the introduction of leagues created upward and downward mobility, in attempting once more to secure protected gated-community status.

League's equivocation over the principle in the Super League era was perhaps to some extent rooted in memories of the 1980s. If promotion and

relegation is a good thing, four-up, four-down was too much of it. Too many clubs, what was then called Fulham included, suffered debilitating yo-yo syndrome.

But to go the other way, to take a snapshot of a particular moment and declare that this would be the sport's shape for good – or at least for three years – was a colossal over-reaction. It thwarted ambition and cushioned inadequacy.

What is clearly an outstanding Leigh team deserves its shot at top level, while London and the horribly misused Bradford club get their chance to rebuild in a division where they can hope to be competitive. That is what promotion and relegation has always been, a mechanism which allows teams to find their level.

And while Super League's marketers might regret the absence of London – not to mention Bradford, a great rugby city – next year, that is how proper sport works. With luck the Broncos should be back before long. If not, so be it. The time when a reserved place for London could be justified, if it ever existed, is long gone. After 34 years London league should stand or fall on its own merits.

## Rugby League's Popularity Riding High



The popularity of Rugby League is at an all-time high, RFL Chief Executive Nigel Wood told the sport's Annual General Meeting.

Wood reported a huge increase in the number of people who watched the sport in 2013, healthy growth in participation numbers, more commercial partners coming to the game and new structures that will make every minute matter for every Rugby League club.

And Rugby League World Cup 2013 was critically acclaimed as the best in the tournament's history with almost half a million tickets sold, a world record crowd for the final at Old Trafford, eight sell-outs and a 76 per cent occupancy rate in the stadiums, both in the sport's heartlands and around Europe.

The England team that was 20 seconds away from booking its final place in the tournament has built a solid platform of young talented world-class players. And Wood told the AGM in St Helens that the RFL was working with other partners to produce an improved calendar for international competition that will benefit the national team. Commercial interest stimulated by the World Cup is converting into actual investment in the sport with the attraction of First Utility as sponsors together with the retention of Specsavers, Alcatel, who are joined by Kingstone Press, Isuzu, Brut, Tetley, Im Bru, Foxy Bingo, Elonex, ISC and Rhino.

Nearly 39m people watched Rugby League live, either at the ground or on television in the year – more than 40 per cent up on the previous year and participant levels increased across all categories. In the 16-19 age group participant levels rose by 16%, at adult level there was a 52 per cent increase and university Rugby League participation increased by 20 per cent.

Wood reported a profit for the governing body for the 12th successive financial year. In the financial year 2013, the governing body reported a profit of £120,000 – almost double on the previous year – from a record turnover of £34m. Every year since 2001, the governing body has returned positive financial figures.

Wood said one of the more pleasing developments over

the past 12 months has been the considerable reduction of insolvencies or near insolvent events that the sport has endured and records indicate the level of indebtedness is at its lowest level for some time.

The RFL's Policy Review, completed in 2013, had produced a strategy to delivered positive change in the sport across a number of key areas including:

- Competition structures and reform
- Club sustainability and the appropriate level of RFL support for clubs
- Re-engineering Academy, youth and other player production systems
- A 'whole game' philosophy with core principles

"Rugby League has an opportunity in 2015 to embrace an exciting new league format where every professional club can see a clear pathway to make progress and where resources are shared proportionately around the sport," said Wood.

"In addition youth and Academy Rugby League now has a clear direction of travel. It is in all of the games interests to engage more youngsters in playing the sport and keep more of these youngsters within the sport in the appropriately organised competition frameworks to ensure that each and every child has the best possible chance to develop their potential to the full.

"At the top end of the game, we are convinced that the new formats across the three leading divisions, First Utility Super League, Kingstone Press Championship and Kingstone Press Championship One will provide an environment in which every minute in every competition will matter for all clubs, fans and other stakeholders in the game.

"The game has been strong enough to make some brave decisions and create an environment for our clubs to prosper. Rugby League is now in a strong position and looking forwards with confidence and optimism."

The AGM also confirmed the appointment of Andrew Farrow as RFL President for 2014-2015, when Dr Paul Morgan will be Vice President.

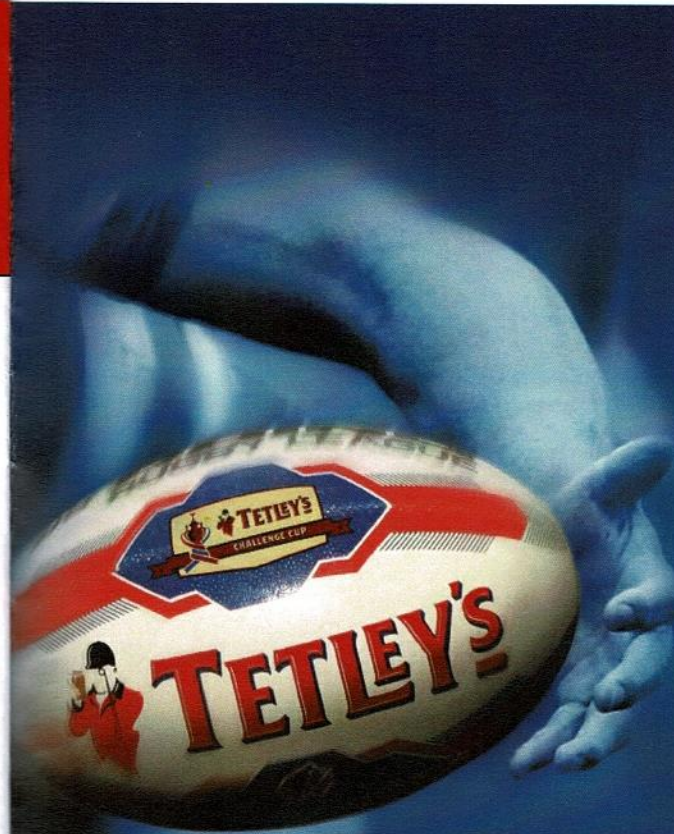

## This Month in Time

A short break between seasons 15 years ago and some close encounters home and away

### 1999

Having played their last game in the Rugby League Conference on 24 July, Skolars had a full month before the winter season in National Conference League was due to get underway.

### 2004

Skolars fell behind to three early Workington tries before Jermaine Coleman set up Joel Osborn on an angled run to the line, but they went in 4-24 at half-time. They fought back in the second half with Kurt Pittman scoring early before Joel Osborn kicked two penalties. Stuart Singleton raced on to a Coleman kick to score and Osborn's conversion narrowed the gap to just 2 points. But Tane Manihera kicked two penalties for the visitors, the Kiwi then managing to slip a ball out the tackle for Frazer to seal a 20-30 win.

The following game saw Skolars at home again, this time Hunslet Hawks were the visitors. Both sides' defences were strong in a scrappy first half hour with just a penalty goal apiece on the scoreboard before Deon McFadyen offloaded to Mark Cantoni to score. Joel Osborn then kicked deep from a scrum, Coleman catching the defence napping to win the race to the ball.

A high tackle by Deon McFadyen on the stroke of half-time saw Paul Seal retaliate. Both players were sin-binned for ten minutes, but when several players joined in to the brawl, it was Hunslet's Neil Mears that received a red card, as Skolars' went in at half-time 16-4 up.

Skolars took advantage of the gaps on the field with 3 players off and pushed the ball outside to Cantoni. JonLee Lockwood scored for the Hawks and Latham Tawhai was in support to finish a Paul Gledhill break. Tawhai was one of three future Skolars in the visitors side, with Jermaine Wray and George Raynor also playing.

A high kick by Tawhai was knocked backwards, but Peter Hannan picked it up and raced to halfway line to give Skolars momentum. Rubert Jonkers' run was finished off by Wayne Parillon to seal a 24-16 victory.

### 2009

With both sides having won one game in the league, the match against Workington Town was a key match between

the bottom two sides. Though the visitors dominated early on they couldn't score and Joe Mbu, on loan from Quins RL, powered over to open the scoring. Paul Thorman and Chris Frodsham traded penalties but two tries late in the first half gave Town a 8-12 lead. After Jack Pedley was sin-binned for obstruction the 12 man Workington side extended their lead. Paul Thorman's try narrowed the gap, but despite a late try for Olu Iwenofu, Adam Marsden's try ensured an 18-24 winning start for the joint managing team of Martin Oglanby and Gary Charlton, who had replaced London stalwart Dave Rotherham as coach.

The following Thursday night saw Skolars travel to Boundary Park for a game televised by Sky Sports. It was an intriguing choice given Skolars position in the table and the fact that the game between the two sides at New River had seen Oldham triumph 10-78. It was an inspired choice with Skolars leading for most of the game before a late rally for the home side.

It was the first time Skolars had been featured live on television, but it was Oldham that looked the more nervous, Gareth Honor forcing his way over the line for the first try. Then came another first for the club when Martin Roden's try was awarded by the video referee. Skolars went in 4-6 ahead at the break to a shocked and near silent crowd.

Skolars went further ahead soon after the break, after Fountain had picked up a loose ball, Jy-Mel Coleman slipping the ball to John Paxton. Man-of-the-match Honor managed to race to a Oldham kick through before the attack, but when Craig Littler scored in the right corner, the home side were just two points adrift.

The last five minutes were agonising for Skolars as first Thomas Coyle darted though the defence to put Oldham ahead and then Lee Greenwood touched down with the last move of the game to make the score 28-22.

### All Eyes on Cumbria

THERE will be some massive matches between now and the end of the season in the Kingstone Press Championship, where clubs' 2015 fate could be decided on the bounce of a ball or a conversion hitting a post.

Potentially one of the biggest will come at Derwent Park this Sunday, when Workington Town host West Cumbrian rivals Whitehaven. Both clubs are firmly entrenched in the group of clubs flicking between the race for fifth and a relegation scrap – it really is that close now.

At the moment, the two local rivals appear to be heading in opposite directions. Haven have slipped down to tenth – that all important first relegation place – after back-to-back defeats against Halifax and Featherstone. Town, in contrast, have now won their last six matches in a row to climb into seventh.

But it should be noted that Haven have still won one more game than Town this year, and trail them by four points at present because of their difficulty in collecting bonus points, something Workington mastered during their own losing run.

And when the sides met earlier this season, Dave Woods' Haven emerged 22-16 winners at the Recreation Ground. What the Australian coach wouldn't give for a repeat of that result this weekend. But his side will have to overturn the formbook if they are to come away from Workington with the three points.

After 15 matches this season, Town had won just three, although in their 11 defeats they had managed to pick up nine bonus points.

New coach Phil Veivers stressed a need for patience and said that the wins would come if performances continued to improve. That's a line that we often hear from coaches, and fairly often, those coaches end up sacked. But Workington haven't been a sacking club for a long time, and true to Veivers' word, the results started to come.

They are currently on the best winning run in the whole professional game alongside York City Knights and have developed a welcome knack of winning the tightest of matches.

On Sunday, Graeme Mattinson's last minute try sealed a potentially vital 12-8 win at North Wales Crusaders.

But there's an old cliché about that form book being thrown out of the window in local derbies – and that will probably apply in this situation.

Whichever team wants it the most is likely to emerge triumphant at Derwent Park.

And while victory or defeat will not completely define either club's season with four matches still to play after it, it could go a long way towards it.
