



Whatever happens during the next phase of the competition, I am sure you will agree that this has been a watershed year from the club and our standing in the game.



COACH'S COMMENTS






Gateshead International Stadium and Gateshead College will play host to two national sides during next year's Rugby Union World Cup.

England 2015 yesterday announced the training bases for all four national sides due to play games within North East England during next year's Rugby World Cup.

After a lengthy bidding process which saw venues throughout the North East compete to host sides playing in Newcastle, Thunder's home ground Gateshead International Stadium and main sponsors Gateshead College were announced as the training base for two-time champions South Africa and ninth ranked Samoa during their time in the region.

As main sponsors of Gateshead Thunder the college has already established strong links with the North East rugby league community, but will now cross codes to offer facilities to the world's second ranked national side along with Thunder's home ground, Gateshead International Stadium.



South Wales Scorpions player Barrie Phillips has been suspended for nine matches after admitting two Grade D offences in the match against Thunder on August 17th.

Phillips was put on report following a high tackle on Thunder's Jordan Meads in the 48th minute and a dangerous tackle on new signing Ryan MacDonald in the

72nd minute of the Kingstone Press Championship One fixture.

Thunder were particularly incensed by the tackle on MacDonald, which caused a dislocation of the props shoulder which has put an end to his season.

Thunder Managing Director Keith Christie said "We applaud the RFL for applying the highest available sanction for these offences, particularly in light of the consequences for Ryan. He had an outstanding game up to that point and it was very disappointing that his first game in a Thunder shirt came to an end in such a manner, following the reckless actions of the Scorpions player."





Oldham Roughyeds provide today's opposition at the International Stadium, looking to secure second place in the Kingstone Press Championship 1 table ahead of the start of the end of season play offs.



In the two matches between the sides this season, Oldham have taken the spoils on both occasions however, the Roughyeds will

wish to restrict Thunder after the home side lead the game at the International Stadium after one

Averaging five tries a game, the Roughyeds will travel to Tyneside in determined mood, knowing a win will give them crucial home advantage over Hunslet in the first round of the promotion games.

Formed in 1998, Oldham Roughyeds are the continuation of the original Oldham FC, one of the founding members of the Northern Rugby Football Union and which was also one of the founding members of Super League in their guise as Oldham Bears.

A club with a proud history, including three Challenge Cup titles the current squad are looking to build on last year's fine second place in the league and earn the club's first trophy for nearly a quarter of a century.

Oldham began the season a 4 - 18 away win at South Wales Scorpions, in a match that had to be abandoned after 72 minutes when appalling weather conditions and players showing hypothermia like symptoms, left referee Adam Gill with no choice but to call a halt to the game.

In their first home match, the Roughyeds were disappointed to be held to a 20 - 20 draw by a spirited Hemel Stags, after leading 16 - 0 at half time. A 68th minute score for Kenny Hughes had looked to settle the match in favour of the home side however two late tries for the Stags ensured the points were shared.

Following a narrow 16-18 away win at London Skolars, Oldham established themselves in second place in the early season running following their comprehensive 52-16 win over Thunder at Whitebank Stadium.

Scott Naylor's sides first defeat of the campaign followed as the lost out 28 – 12 away to league leaders Hunslet, before three consecutive wins minimised the damage caused to their title credentials.

This run of victories included a crucial away win at York City Knights when captain Lewis Palfrey scored the winning try three minutes from time.

Lewis Palfrey


Club captain Lewis Palfrey began his Rugby League career forming part of the Under 15 set up at Eccles and came through the Salford academy system, and spent two years at the club as a full time professional.

The 23 year old joined Oldham at the start of the 2013 season after abandoning plans to play in Australia for Wollongong and was immediately appointed captain by head coach Naylor, who worked with Palfrey at Salford.

A utility back who is primarily used by the

Roughyeds at Scrum Half, Palfrey has been in exceptional form with the boot, scoring 22 goals and one try in the team's nine matches to date.

He is a committed player who provides Oldham with many backline options and will direct play with intelligence and maturity.





Dale Bloomfield

One of Oldham's most potent attacking threats, Dale Bloomfield has been in free scoring form this season with eight tries in nine games and is hot on the heels of Thunder's Jason Payne as the league's top try scorer.

Primarily operating as a winger, but equally comfortable at Fullback, Bloomfield has been one of Oldham's most consistent performers since joining from Rochdale in 2013.

He began playing the sport as a junior for amateur club St Maries before becoming a Widnes Vikings scholar.

After a two year spell at St Helens, Bloomfield joined Rochdale Hornets in 2010 where he began to establish his credentials as a lethal scoring threat.

After settling into the club, the 26 year old played in every game in 2011 and

2012, scoring 32 tries in total.

Missing only one game for the Roughyeds last season, Bloomfield went on to score 11 tries from his 23 appearances and has continued his impressive scoring rate this term.

The Big Interview

Gateshead Thunder winger Tom Capper has found himself in a fine vein of form of late and playing a big part in the club's continued quest for promotion to the Kingstone Press Championship.

The 21 year old who is now in his third year at the International Stadium bagged a brace of tries against Hemel Stags in the last home game as well as putting himself around the park in recent matches in both attack and defence.

Growing in stature with each match, he is a long way from his first introductions to the game as a nine year old in Warrington.



"Basically it's a big town sport back in home and I overheard a couple of lads back in year five talking about it to their Mum and I thought I want to do that, I was ear-wigging, so I said I wanted to do it and took it from there."

Having played throughout his formative years, his big opportunity came his way whilst studying at Northumbria University when his performances in the Uni's rugby league side drew the attentions of Thunder captain Jason Payne and videographer Jim Neighbour:





"When I came up to Northumbria University, Kev Neighbour was overlooking the Rugby League trial, and he kind of had an eye on me. Then we got to a BUCS final and I ended up scoring a hat trick, then I pretty much got a phone call from Kev the next day saying do you want to come down and start training with us."

"So it was Kev Neighbour really who gave me the opportunity, along with Jason Payne who was looing at me as well."

With the club currently enjoying its best season in five years, with nine wins from 18 matches and are fully in the hunt for a place in the end of season promotion play offs, Capper thinks their new found form can be


attributed to head coach Stanley Gene.

"I think Stan and the whole set up, the facilities that the coaches give us, has allowed everyone to develop a lot this year. 

PAUL STAMP INTERVIEW

Thunder Hooker Paul Stamp is enjoying a season on the front foot in 2014 and has been a key component of a Thunder squad that has registered 25 wins from 18 games.

The 25 year old has made 17 appearances, missing only one through injury and has impressed as with aggressive, direct attacks through the middle of opposition defences, earning himself 5 tries across the season. It is the culmination of a journey that Stamp has been on from his formative years.



"The sport is within the family. I'm the youngest of three brothers and all we did as kids was play rugby all the time. I started properly around 7 and I played for the under 10s and I always played an age group above me, which I think was something that was pretty advantageous to me as it meant I learnt quicker."

Started at Norling Sharks, Stamp started his playing career as part of Hull FC scholarship system and remained part of the setup until he was 16 when he was released after being told he was too little and too skinny to make it. Shrugging off the rejection, Stamp played at West Hull for two years where he was spotted by Hull KR who he represented for two years before re-joining Hull FC for a further two years where he turned out in the reserves.

Turning 21, when no offer was forthcoming to step up to the senior side, Stamp turned his sights north for the continuation of his career. "When I couldn't play 20s anymore, I went to York City Knights where we got promoted and things were looking really good but in the second year there was a change of coaching team and I just didn't feature in their plans and thoughts."

"I joined Gateshead for the final five games of that season on loan and did enough to impress and earn myself a contract and now I am into my third season on Tyneside."

As another player who has been part of the Thunder setup during the dark days from 2010 – 2012, Stamp says that there is a noticeable change in the atmosphere around the club and that it is now a good place to be.

"You can tell even at training the atmosphere is a lot better and this is a club that is going places. The lads are buying into what Stan wants to do. We don't have an over-elaborate or complicated game plan and because we can see it working, we're all sticking to it and buying into the culture he's trying to establish."

"It's nice to be enjoying a strong season because we have had a tough couple of years in spite of having a reasonable team. I think it was just a case that the big boys spent a lot more."

When pressed on what he thinks has made the big change seeing Thunder go from recording the occasional win to being a consistently victorious side, Stamp lays the improvement at the feet of a settled pair of halfbacks.

"I think the key thing we have had this season is a good pair of halfbacks which is critical in this league. We've had those guys all season and they have been settled, which we haven't had in recent seasons."

"Their performance of those guys means I've actually been enjoying the season a lot more as it means I haven't had to fill in at halfback and I can concentrate on my role as hooker, which is where I prefer to play."


In a hugely positive season, Stamp sees many positives to take and while he has his favourite

moments so far, he is also keenly focused on maintaining a play-off push.

"The wins have obviously been good, as has going up against some of the bigger teams and standing toe to toe with them but from a personal point of view, away to London Skolars was a good game and away at Gloucester, where I got two tries including a length of the field job after intercepting a pass in our own red zone after defending for three straight sets of six."

"On the whole the team performance is more important than individual glory and we need to keep performing to make sure we get into those playoffs."

"In the last few years, play offs weren't something we could think about so now that they are within our grasp we have to take the chance. As a player, I've been able to say proudly this year that I'm a Gateshead Thunder player and getting into the play-offs will just keep that going."





MATCH REPORT

Gateshead Thunder fell to a narrow 34 – 30 defeat at York City Knights in rugby league's Kingstone Press Championship 1 on Sunday, earning what could be a crucial losing bonus point in their quest for a place in the end of season playoffs.

Launching a blistering attack on the York line, Chris Wellan's broke through the York defence only to be held up across the line. The respite would only be temporary however as Wellans made sure

through an almost identical play on the fourth tackle. A missed conversion meant York were level on 11minutes following a move started from a penalty conceded by Thunder for offside. Working their way up field patiently and methodically, the ball was spun quickly wide

from the fifth tackle for Ben Mace to dive in for a try under pressure.



York seized back the initiative on the cusp of half time through a converted try and a penalty in the final two minutes of the half but with only a six point deficit and a lot of York's progress coming through their own mistakes, things were looking strong for Thunder.

Not for the first time this season, the opening exchanges after the restart were to prove costly and only two minutes in a sin-binning for Rhys Lovegrove would allow York to extend their lead to through scores from Jack Aldous and Rvan Backhouse.

While Thunder were still pressing forward, they were making their lives difficult and failing to convert their pressure into points as a series of wild passes that failed to find their intended recipient ended promising attacks.

When they scored next, it was as a result of clean, precise hands as Jordan Meads fed Brown into space for an elegant try under pressure to reduce the gap to 14 points.

After conceding a converted try to James Saltonstall as the ball squeezed free in the tackle after being gathered over the try line, the game looked like it would be another tale of a frustrating second half.

Knowing they are locked in a three way tussle for fourth place however, Gateshead had other ideas and embarked on an incredible and almost successful fight-back.

Jordan Meads was the first to strike with fifteen minutes remaining as he gathered his own delicate kick through to reduce the deficit to 16 before hard running from Matty Barron earned another try, converted by Beharrell. With a bonus point now earned, Thunder put themselves into position to press for an unlikely

win with a moment of genius. Earning a scrum on their own 40m line, Beharrell took the pass from the base and seeing an empty field to his left put boot to ball and belted it down

It created a footrace between Lee Mapals and the York fullback and with both diving for the ball, it was the closest of calls that went the way of the visitors.

Another successful conversion left the Tyneside club two minutes to find a converted try but in a repeat of the Good Friday game at the International Stadium, they ultimately fell agonisingly short however with three contenders for the last two play-off spots separated by only two points, the losing bonus point could prove
