FIJIAN FORCE

It's a fact worthy of any pub quiz that Rochdale boasts the UK's largest Fijian community outside London. In 1958, whilst in Australia, Hornets director Arthur Walker saw Fijian Joe Levula play in a union match. Impressed by the winger's power and speed, Arthur determined to bring Joe and fellow Fijian Orisi Dawai, onto the Hornets team. In 1961 Joe and Orisi flew the 10,000 miles to a new life in Rochdale. Close behind were Liatia Ravouvou, Apisai Toga and Voate Drui. Drui's wife Dorothy remembers a call going out for blankets for the Fijians who touched down at Manchester airport wearing sarongs, in the midst of one of the coldest winters on record. Mika Ratu made the trip in 1965, and like Drni, married a Rochdale girl. Three generations of Ratus have played for the Hornets, and Mika's son Emon recalls his father's experiences for our audience.

WATERSHEDDINGS STADIUM HOME TO OLDHAM ROUGHYEDS:

The Watersheddings stadium was home to Oldham RLFC for 108 years, from 1889 to 1997. With its pavilion, quirky scoreboard and vibrant social club whose acts included committee man, Rocky Farnsworth, Watersheddings was the heart of Oldham's rugby league community. Entire generations of families went through its turnstiles. The Watersheddings' record attendance was set in 1912 when 28,000 people watched the Roughyeds beat Huddersfield 6-2. On the same day, a crowd of 35,000 saw Oldham Athletic F.C. lose to Everton in the FA cup final.


