Q. 1. How long have you been watching the Roughyeds?

A. I've been watching Roughyeds for 40 years since I left school at 16. My first game, as I recall, was a challenge cup tie v St. Helens at Sheddings. My grandad and I sat on the wooden planks in the Watersheddings grandstand (where the players came out).

Q. Which current or past Oldham players stand-out for you?

A. Charlie McAlister, what a player he was, and he didn't even know how good he was. If he'd had an aggressive bad-side he'd have been a NZ international no doubt.

Iva Ropati try scoring sensation, fastest Oldham player I have seen.

Hugh Waddell, what a signing from Blackpool Borough. More recently, Danny Langtree plays way above his weight and if only he was bigger, he would be Super league in my opinion.

Q. How does it feel to be the dad of the club Captain?

A. I couldn't be prouder. Gaz signed for Oldham from Salford and when he wore the red and white hoops it was like a dream come true. Karen (his mum) and I have been to virtually every game he'd played since he was 5 years old. Waterhead, Lancashire, Salford, Sheffield Eagles then he finally came home to the Roughyeds.

I must admit I had a tear in my eye when he made his debut for Oldham, albeit initially on



loan from Salford in July 2014. Oldham 24-23 Hunslet.

Q. Are you involved with the amateur game in any capacity?

A. Not now but was a junior coach at Waterhead coaching a fantastic team from U8-U12 that included Mark Brocklehurst ex Oldham and Lee Jewitt Hull KR. I was also Waterhead Secretary for a couple of years.

I played for Shaw, Hollinwood and Waterhead.

Q. What's your favourite opposition RL ground?

A. NOT BRADFORD! My favourite ground is Salford's AJ Bell Stadium. It takes so much flack from their fans but it really is a fantastic stadium.

Q. How do you think the current team is progressing at this half-way stage of the season?

A. This current team are so good; it's refreshing to watch them week in week out. Scott and Pete get so much out of players and it shows season after season. They have the best bonding in RL, a great set of lads who graft for one another. I see only one outcome this season... Promotion.

Q. Any humorous stories from your time watching Oldham?

A. A few, but none that could be printed in the programme!



Sloman's 'I'm willing to die' promise inspired our 1927 cup final triumph

GEORGE COWBURN continues his series in which he looks at Oldham's contribution to big events in RL history

FOLLOWING on from our last article we'll take a look at the third and fourth Challenge Cup finals Oldham appeared in consecutively during the 1920s.

Both finals were played against Swinton who, like Oldham, were cup specialists, appearing in three successive finals in 1926/7/8.

The 1926 final was played at Rochdale's Athletic Grounds on Saturday, May 1 in front

of a crowd of 27,000, paying receipts of £2,551.

With a smaller crowd there was none of the chaos which marred the 1924 final at the same venue.

Oldham reached the final with victories against Leigh (18-6), Rochdale Hornets (12-3) and Halifax (8-5) plus a semi-final win by 15-6 over Wigan Highfield at Salford.

Wigan Highfield moved to London in 1933 to become London Highfield before returning north after one season to become Liverpool Stanley, then Liverpool City, Huyton, Runcorn Highfield, Highfield and finally Prescott Panthers before leaving the league.

As Swinton finished third in the league to Oldham's seventh they were slight favourites, albeit that both teams had beaten the other in their home fixtures.

The match itself was a dour tight game with each side

scoring one try - hooker Blewer for Swinton and Welsh/Italian winger Joe Corsi for Oldham - so the three goals kicked by Swinton prop forward Morris gave the Lions a 9-3 victory.

A year later and despite finishing 13th in an

indifferent league campaign Oldham reached their fourth successive Challenge Cup final courtesy of wins over Salford (10-0), Hunslet (15-3), Leeds (11-5) and Wakefield Trinity (7-3).

Their opponents were once again Swinton, who finished second in the league and were also Championship winners that season.

The two teams met on May 7 at Wigan's Central Park ground in front of a crowd of 33,448, paying £3,170 for the privilege.

Oldham's team lined up like this: Bert Comm, Abe Johnson, Sid Rix, Alf Higgs, Tom Holliday, Bob Jones, George Hesketh, Jack Read, Jack Scaife, Rothwell Marlor, Bob Sloman, Freddie Ashworth, Albert Brough.

Oldham went into the match as underdogs but came up with a match-winning performance inspired by the words of skipper Bob Sloman as they prepared to go out.

He said: "I am going out there to die for the Oldham club. Anyone not prepared to die with me can sit here in the dressing room".

Swinton were on top in the first half but strong defence and a try late on by Holliday, plus Johnson's two goals, gave Oldham a 7-5 lead at half time.

Two early second-half tries by Sid Rix and Albert

Brough, who converted his own try, gave Oldham a useful lead and injury-hampered Swinton faded as Oldham got further on top with a Bob Sloman try and a brace by Holliday.

Brough's second goal and one for Swinton's Morris completed the scoring.

So it was that Bob Sloman became the last Oldham captain to lift the Challenge Cup in victory.

Winger Tom Holliday's hat-trick of tries was the last in the final until 1996 when Robbie Paul of Bradford Bulls matched Holliday's feat at Wembley.

The 1927 final was also the first to be broadcast live on the radio by the BBC.

Four Oldham players appeared in all four finals - centre/wing Sid Rix, half-back George Hesketh, second-row Bob Sloman and Albert Brough, who variously played second-row, loose-forward and on the wing.

Rix, Sloman and Brough had all been on the 1924 Great Britain tour to Australasia and Sloman also went on the 1928 tour.

George Hesketh was a crafty, experienced half-back who had played 10 years for Wigan prior to joining Oldham.

Ninety years and several semi-finals later Oldham are still waiting for that elusive Challenge Cup final appearance at Wembley !

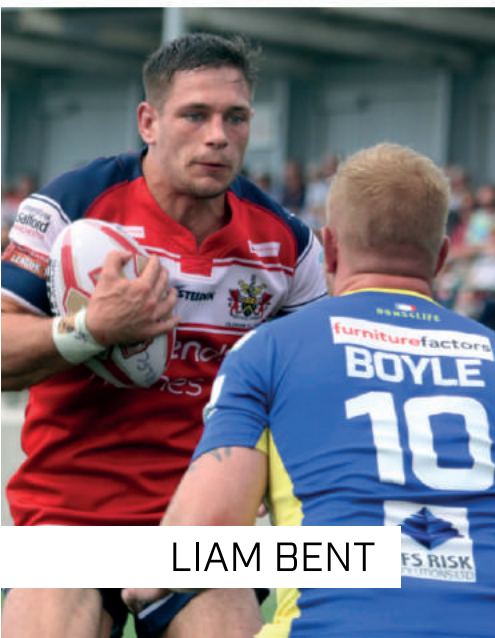

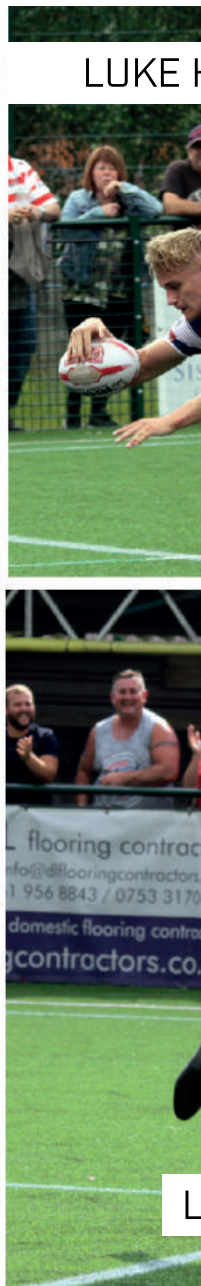

Eric Fitzsimons, sportsman and gentleman, dies in a Rochdale Nursing Home, aged 69

A FUNERAL service for the late Eric Fitzsimons, former Oldham RLFC player and coach, will be held at St Patrick's RC Church, Oldham, with Father Phil Sumner, on Tuesday, June 26 at 10.15am.

Eric, also well-known locally as a teacher at Breeze Hill and Failsworth High, and for his work with Oldham Schools' RL, used to be an altar boy at St Pats.

After the service it will be down to Oldham Crematorium and then on to Oldham RUFC at Manor Park, a club with which Eric also had close associations.

Eric, who also played at Hunslet and Rochdale Hornets, leaves wife Liz, sons Daniel, Michael and Ben, daughter-in-law Emily and granddaughter April.

He died in Springfield Park Nursing Home, Rochdale on June 6 after a long battle with dementia. He was 69.

A local man, he played football, rugby league and basketball to professional or semi-professional level.

The Rev Tony Ford, Oldham RLFC chaplain, said: "Lots of



local people owe a great deal to Eric for the help he gave them as mentor and teacher. I know. I was one of them.

"He was more like a mate than a schoolteacher. He was a top sportsman, teacher and friend to scores of young people.

"He would help anybody -- a true gentleman."

As a promising young soccer player he was courted by Everton. His Goodison Park dream never materialised, but he played for Oldham Athletic, Bury, Hyde United and Bradford (Park Avenue), who were then in the Football League.

When his football days were over two other local schoolteachers who were Oldham RLFC players at Watersheddings, Phil Larder and Dave Fricker, suggested he should try rugby league.

Eric took his boots to Watersheddings and the rest,

as they say, is history.

He became an established rugby league winger and goalkicker, landing 127 goals and scoring 11 tries for Oldham in his 46 senior games between 1979 and 1981.

He later played at Hunslet, but it was when he returned to his home-town club as coach a few years later that he really made his name in rugby league.

As head coach at Watersheddings in 1987-88, with Iain MacCorquodale and Mal Graham assisting, he led Roughyeds to the Second Division championship and then guided them to Division Two premiership success at Old Trafford where they beat Featherstone Rovers 28-26 in a thriller.

They also reached the semi-final of the John Player Trophy, beating Fulham, Bradford Northern, Batley and Warrington before losing 18-8 to St Helens in the semi at Wigan.

That was forgotten by the time they lifted the Second Division crown at Old Trafford thanks to a late try by winger Kevin Meadows.

Condolences to Liz and the family from everyone at Oldham RLFC.

London Skolars

Coach Jermaine Coleman brings his London Skolars team to Oldham today seven days on from a high scoring see-saw home game against Hunslet. 67 points were scored at the New River Stadium where Skolars came out of the changing rooms all-guns-blazing and scored three converted tries in the first 30 minutes to lead 18-0.

Hunslet recovered by the half-time break to claw-back 12 points and then pushed on in the second-half to achieve an 18 point advantage of their own and lead 36-18.

Skolars then hit back with two tries to trail by only six points with five minutes to go. A match-winning Hunslet drop-goal in 78th minute confirmed the points for the relieved Yorkshire side leaving Skolars ruing their luck.

Skolars began the season with a well-

earned draw away to North Wales Crusaders. Defeats to Newcastle and Workington followed but those results were tempered by wins against Hemel Stags, West Wales Raiders and Coventry Bears with only a defeat to high-flying York to blot the scorebook.

The Coventry victory came at the end of April and since that game, Skolars have been unable to add any more points to boost their league position.

Despite the winless run, creditable performances against Bradford and Whitehaven showed the mettle of the London side. An eight point loss to Keighley Cougars preceded the effort against Hunslet last week and showed that the next win can't be too far away.

Last season Skolars finished in 11th place out of 16 teams at the end



of the regular season. A subsequent place in the League 1 Shield saw them win six out of seven games and a place in the Shield final away at Hunslet. A 32-12 loss meant they missed out on the silverware but it gave the team something to build on for 2018.

Coach Coleman will be hoping for more improvement from his side at this half-way point in the season. Any results against northern sides would propel Skolars in the right direction and while promotion may not be a realistic goal this year, going one step further from last year's Shield final defeat would bring just rewards for the club.

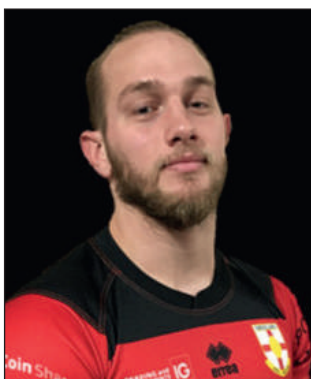
Melling is an England touch-rugby international, having played in European tournaments and the 2015 World Cup in Australia.
