Hello everyone and welcome to today's game against Keighley Cougars at the Vestacare Stadium.

It's only three weeks since we played Keighley in the league at their place which sometimes happens like that because of the way fixtures fall.

Sometimes you walk off a field and have no explanation for how you've played as a team. Sunday was that day. Today is a chance to start again and put things right.

Staying in Touch with Our Heritage with MICHAEL TURNER

Today we welcome Keighley's players, officials and supporters,

They joined the Northern Union in 1900-01, their first game against Oldham taking place at Lawkholme Lane on November 21,1903. Roughyeds won 10 - 2 and made it a 'double' with a 15-3 win at Watersheddings the following April.

Fixtures between the two were few in the early days. It was 1921 before the sides met again and 1930 before they had their third game.

On April 11,1955 more than 13,500 spectators attended a game at Watersheddings to see Oldham win 23-3. This remains the largest attendance for an Oldham v Keighley match.

More recently, there have been many meetings, the most important being the Championship One Grand Final at Warrington on October 4, 2009, which Keighley won 28-26. The referee went to the video five times and the decision went against the Roughyeds each time.

Six years later Oldham won 31-20 in the League One promotion final at Whitebank to book their place in the higher tier for 2016.

By George Cowburn... THOSE WERE THE DAYS!

In the early days of the Northern Union (the original title of the Rugby Football League) Oldham's kicking duties in a resounding 60-5 victory were shared around although local player Sam Lees was the main man with 151 goals to his credit.

That situation carried on into the 20th century but by virtue of their longevity Joe Ferguson, with 540 goals, and Alf Wood. with 342, were the most prominent.

Ferguson, in fact, was the league's leading kicker in 1904/5 and was joint leader with Hunslet's Albert Goldthorpe the season afterwards.

Into the 1920s and centre-wing Abe Johnson plus versatile back-row man Albert Brough came to the fore.

Johnson held the record for most goals and points in a

match with 12 goals and two tries (30 points under the scoring system at the time) over Widnes in 1928.

Brough, who was fast enough to play on the wing if needed, was four times Oldham's leading kicker in a season as well as scoring 68 tries for the club in his 170 matches.

The first regular marksman was "Guardsman" Tommy Rees, Oldham Alf Wood never a holder of four Welsh Rugby Union caps when he joined Oldham from London Welsh for the start of the 1928-9 season.

Taking over the goalkicking duties from Abe Johnson late in the season, he recorded his best haul of nine goals against Broughton Rangers in a 48-2 win on April 6.

In all, Tommy played a mammoth 417 times for Oldham, including 26

659 goals.

games during the War when he returned to the club, having been transferred to Broughton Rangers in 1938.

The touchjudges' flags were raised for Tommy 659 times with a modest eight tries to add to his overall figures.

Full-backs were not viewed as attacking players until after the Second World War. For instance. in all his 244 matches for scored a try.

Durability was a by-word for Tommy who, excluding friendlies and Law Cup matches (games against Rochdale are never "friendlies"), played in 116 games consecutively in the 30s and was also the club's record kicker in a season with 92 in official games in 1933-4.

More than one Great Britain cap would surely have come his way but for the presence of the mighty Jim Sullivan at the time.

What can one say about Bernard Ganley, who was Oldham's and arguably Rugby League's finest-ever goalkicker.?

From his first-team debut on March 3, 1951 until his last game ten years later on March 11,1961, Bernard amassed 1,358 goals for Oldham in 341 appearances.

Not the strongest defensively, but his immaculate goalkicking won many a match for the club in those fabulous ten years.

He was the first Oldham player to kick a century of goals in a season: 106 in 1951-2.

He was also the first to top 200 goals in a season in Rugby League history. His 219 in 1957-8 was a record until it was surpassed by Salford's David Watkins with 221.

Bernard topped the league's list again the season afterwards with 190. Capped three times for Great Britain, his ten goals in a 44-10 win over France was a record against that country.

The unenviable task of following Ganley went to Geoff Sims, who kicked 211 goals for Oldham.

Player-coach Frank Dyson thn kicked 206 goals over two seasons.

Phil Larder. Keighley's new director of coaching, was given the job in an emergency but looked such a natural that he kept it permanently and went on to kick 475 goals for his home-town club in the early to mid-70s.

I have already covered Phil's contribution to the Oldham story in a previous article when I was spotlighting the 'Murphy, Elliott, Larder' triumvirate, but suffice to say here that while he will be remembered more for his general centre play he was undoubtedly a goalkicker of some repute.

Moving on to Mick Parrish, he was signed from Hunslet for £18,500 in time to make his debut against Hull at the Boulevard on September 21,1980.

A centre like Larder, Parrish was the first player in Rugby League history to play and score in every match in a season with two different clubs -- Hunslet in 1979-80 and Oldham in 1981-2.

The only game in which he failed to kick a goal for Oldham in that season was the John Plaver semi-final defeat by Hull when he crashed over for a try after a determined run for the line.

Mick's best points haul was a three-try, nine- goal effort in a 66-7 thrashing of Blackpool Borough. Three times he topped 100 goals in a season in his 191 appearances.

In 1981-2, his best in an Oldham career which netted him 563 goals, three drop goals and 37 tries, he rattled up 164 goals plus 17 tries.

The only other goalkicker to make much of an impression from then to the "old club's" demise was Duncan Platt, brother of fearsome Test forward Andy, with 275 goals in 94 games between 1988 and 1992.

Post 1997, Lewis Palfrey was the top marksman with 350 goals, three drop goals and 22 tries in the four seasons from 2013.

A haul of 11 goals and three tries (34 points) in the 70-6 away victory at Hemel Stags in August, 2015 equalled a club record points-in-a-match total with Andv Ballard and Chris Baines.

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Oldham RLFC - Roughyeds Review | 15

I am writing this piece after watching the first of this year's Aussie State of Origin matches. The home side, Queensland, won 18-14, and there were a number of points of interest that arose out of the game.

The first was definitely that we should not think that, now that the likes of Lockyer, Slater, Inglis, Thurston, Cronk and Cameron Smith are out of the picture, it will be a cakewalk for England to win the next World Cup.

The latest generation of Australian players has several real super-stars among them, who will be no less of a handful than has been the case over the past almost 50 years since our last victories in 1970 [Ashes] and 1972 [World Cup].

Cameron Munster, Kalyn Ponga, Latrell Mitchell, James Tedesco and Josh Addo-Carr all have a touch of magic about them in the backs; Damien Cook is as quick a hooker out of dummy-half as I have ever seen; and they have the usual collection of fast, athletic, powerful forwards to choose from as well.

We will do very well to compete, as has become the familiar story.

It is never a good idea to wish one's life away, of course, but I must admit that I can hardly wait for what promises to be an absolutely cracking competition, over here, in the autumn of 2021.

From the noises coming from the organisers, too, it looks as though the marketing effort - including ticket prices - will be much more spot-on than it has been sometimes in the past, so that there should be a real World Cup atmosphere generated through the whole tournament.

No one will be keener than me to see a culmination of us defeating the Aussies in a sell-out final in November, 2021 - but let us not think it will be anything but a mammoth task.

My second point from the Origin match relates to refereeing. And it is nothing to do with the one-or-two refs 'debate', if such it can be called .

I know which side I would come down for on that, between Robert Elstone, who seems to think that everything originating Down Under is the ultimate perfection, and those who argue that there is an awful lot better we can do with the money than have two refs per game over here.

No, it is the ridiculous differences between how different games are adjudicated. And that is before we ask the question: How can any international sport worth the name have different sets of rules when played in different parts of the world?


The Origin game had very few penalties, with the refs allowing 'play on' for tackles that those same officials would have blown the pees out of their whistles to penalise in regular season games.

And the outcome? An incredibly fast, open game, fantastic entertainment for the fans, and players who were allowed to show their real skills in both attack and defence for the full 80 minutes.

Even at our level, we often find ourselves saying at Oldham matches:

'that would have been a penalty in Super League.

Consistency is all we ask - though I am not sure how we mightget it.

Six Chernobyl children, who are living in Oldham with host families for a month, are our flag bearers at today's game.

Aged between nine and 11, the three boys and three girls arrived in Oldham on May 26 and will leave for home on June 22.

For more than 30 years this charity has carried out a recuperation programme, bringing children from Belarus and North Ukraine to stay with British families.

Belarus and North Ukraine received a large proportion of the radioactive fall-out which, more

KEIGHLEY COUGARS

We welcome Keighley Cougars to the Vestacare Stadium today as the 2019 Betfred League 1 enters its second half. Each club in the league has played ten games and the promotion places on offer will be decided over the course of the next three months.

Keighley find themselves rooted to the bottom of the table due to starting the season on minus twelve points. The sanction was imposed on the club following a period of special measures in late 2018 due to financial concerns.

The Cougars' 2019 season began with a tough trip up to Whitehaven where they lost 28-16. They then went on an unbeaten run of six games, earning wins against Doncaster, Workington, both Welsh sides and Coventry Bears. A draw against a strong London Skolars side was the only point dropped until May.

Cougars were able to proudly proclaim that, but for their points deduction, they would have been League 1 leaders over the first third of the season.

A dip in form for the team began in a tough looking May fixture list. Defeats to promotion chasing sides Newcastle Thunder, Hunslet and Oldham has meant that Keighley still find themselves with a negative points tally of -1.

The fixture against the Roughyeds took place three weeks ago at Cougar Park. Former Keighley players now in Oldham colours returned to their former stomping ground and the likes of Ritchie Hawkyard, Scott Law and Emmerson Whittel helped Oldham to a 52-12 win.

A new management team is in place at Cougar Park in the shape of former directors Mick O'Neill, Mike Smith and Tim Wood, joined by O'Neill's son, Ryan, and his husband, Kaue Garcia, a Brazilian. The returning directors were at the helm of the club in the razzmatazz days of Cougarmania when the West Yorkshire side were controversially denied a place in the newly formed Super League.

Coach Craig Lingard departed Keighley in recent weeks leaving the club to be jointly coached by his former assistant Rhys Lovegrove and head of strength and conditioning Paul Royston. In another appointment, Phil Larder, a man no stranger to Roughyeds fans, has returned to Cougar Park.

Larder, who was defence coach when England won the 2003 rugby union World Cup, was in charge of Keighley at the heart of their successful period from 1994-96 and is returning to the League 1 club as part-time director of coaching.

Keighley Chairman Mick O'Neill says he chose to invite Larder back to the club after watching a video of the Cougars' success in the mid-Nineties and describes him as the Sir Alex Ferguson of rugby league.

Speaking to the Keighley News, O'Neill said: "Phil is very excited to come back. He is a top coach. He is the Fergie of rugby league. He was my No 1 choice.

"I was watching a video of Keighley playing in the Championship at Old Trafford from 1995 and saw Phil on it. I thought let's give him a try. Let's go back in time."

"What coaches are there around? Nobody stands out to me. If it doesn't work out, then I have made a blunder, but I don't expect that.

"He is still fit. It will help our coaching staff, they are excited. They are all getting to work together."

The Cougars will have good reason to put up a good performance this afternoon. They will be desperate to get the monkey of a negative points off their back whilst at the same time avenging the big home defeat against Oldham.

Oldham, soundly beaten at Doncaster seven days ago, will have their own reasons to get back on the winning trail. It should all lead to a fascinating afternoon's entertainment.
