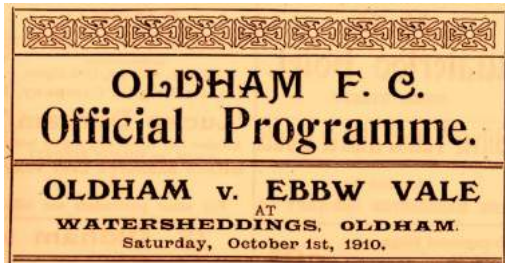

Today we extend a warm welcome to players, officials and supporters of West Wales Raiders.

Oldham matches against Welsh clubs go back to the 1890s and in the 1892-3 and 1893-4 seasons Oldham played Llanelli, the home base of today's visitors. The home team won each time, the match at Llanelli in 1892 taking place on Christmas Eve.



Once the Northern Union was formed in 1895, it wasn't until 1907-8 that Roughyeds faced, Welsh opposition. On September 7, 1907, Oldham opened the season with a 25-6 win at Merthyr Tydfil and it wasn't until February 22 that they suffered a defeat, at Salford.

The previous 30 matches saw Oldham roar to the top of the league with 26 victories and two draws, which included a successful Lancashire Cup campaign and victory over New Zealand All Golds. Doubles were completed over Merthyr and Ebbw Vale.

The Rugby League experiment in the Valleys lasted until 1911-12, during which time Oldham had regular fixtures against Welsh opposition.

A Cardiff club played in the early 1950s but a fixture against Oldham never materialised. However, when the Cardiff Blue Dragons formed 30 years later, the Roughyeds played back-to-back fixtures on January 31st and February 7th, 1982. Oldham won in Cardiff 33 - 15 and a week later at Watersheddings a last minute, disputed try by Brian Caffery gave Oldham a 10-7 win.

Oldham's first Welsh opposition this century was in 2007 when Roughyeds won at Celtic Crusaders on May 5 but lost the return on August 30.

By George Cowburn... THOSE WERE THE DAYS!

As West Wales Raiders are our visitors today it is appropriate to look at the contribution that Welshmen have made to the Oldham teams over the years.

From as early as the 1880s men from Wales "came north" and this was particularly prevalent in tough times such as the 1930s when jobs were hard to come by in the Valleys.

By the latter part of the last century and particularly since Rugby Union became professional the supply line has virtually ended - one reason why the emergence of a successful Raiders side would be good for the game as a whole.

Billy McCutcheon was an early pioneer and a stellar capture, signed from the Swansea club in 1888, seven years before the emergence of the Northern Union.

While at Oldham Billy was a member of the 1894 Welsh team which won the Triple Crown, beating England, Ireland and Scotland. Playing in the centre

he had the honour of kicking off the first-ever match at the new Watersheddings ground and lasted for the first two seasons of the breakaway Northern Union.

After he retired he became an international class referee and was a committee-man and later president of Oldham in a long association with the club.

In the early 1900s came full back Richard Llewelyn Thomas (Dickie), who was at Oldham from 1897 until he retired in 1909 - again, like Billy McCutcheon, maintaining his connection with the club as a committee-man.

Signed from Newport, Dickie made 363 appearances for Oldham, mostly at full back, and won every domestic honour available in his time at the club as a member of the great Oldham side of the Edwardian era.

The First World War took a chunk out of the Oldham career of Evan Davies, who was signed from the Llanelli club - not far from the Raiders' Stebonheath base.

Evan had a 15-year career with the club from 1911 to 1925 and formed arguably the greatest centre partnership at the club with Gloucester born Billy Hall. Along with his Oldham team mates Herman Hilton and Alf Wood, Evan was a British Lions tourist in 1920, playing in all three Tests against New Zealand despite having been injured on the Australian leg of the tour.

Ambrose Baker (166 games) played five times as a lock forward for the Welsh R U side before signing for Oldham from the Neath club. Playing in either the front or back row, Ambrose played in two Challenge Cup Finals in the 1920s as well as for the Welsh and Other Nationalities RL Test teams.

Oldham had several Welshmen playing for them in the 1930s such as Tommy Rees, Mick Downey, Norman Pugh, Billy Moore, Reg Hathway, Trevor Thomas and Lew Rees, but the stand-out man was Alex Givvons, a scrum half or loose forward who signed from Newport as a 19 year old in 1933.

Alex played 241 times for Oldham and six times for Wales at Rugby League, He had a long connection with the club, retiring as a player but staying on as trainer, kit manager and dressing room man - you name it Alex did it.

Such was the high regard in which he was held that Givvons Way, part of the housing development on the old Watersheddings site, was named after him.

Norman Pugh started his Oldham career in 1934, having signed from Swansea and continued, including most of the Second World War, until retirement at the end of the 1946/7 season with 363 games to his name.

A tall scrum-capped second-row forward he was known as "the whip" after his regular and well-known pleas to his teammates to "get cracking lads".

A little bit later, but not much, came Norman Harris (Iestyn's grandad), who was a classy centre. He later played for Leigh and then became player-coach

at Rochdale Hornets where his son Paul (Iestyn's dad) played in the 'A team and also made a name for himself as a centre at Saddleworth Rangers.

The glory years of the 1950s were in part due to the efforts of Bryn Goldswain and a young man signed at the age of 17 from Maesteg in 1950. Charlie Winslade formed a great second row partnership with Sid Little when Oldham were regularly picking up trophies.

Known for his long passes and shoulder charge tackles, Charlie was honoured with the naming of Winslade Close after him on the Watersheddings housing development.

Mike Elliott's long career at Oldham spanned most of the 1960s and 1970s after he joined the club in 1962. Hailing from the village of Blaina, Mike played a phenomenal 446 times for Oldham (the fourth highest on the club list) and scored 153 tries, mostly playing on the wing. He is still a very active and prominent member

of the Past Players' Association.

The last bona fide Welshman to leave the Principality to sign for Oldham was probably winger Chris O'Brien (as opposed to Welshman signed from other clubs such as John Mantle, Chris Charles and Clive Sullivan), since when that supply line has dried up.

Several excellent Welsh born players not mentioned previously are worthy of inclusion such as Joe Corsi, Don Vines, Les Anthony, Bryn Day and Malcolm Price, a brilliant centre who was recently installed in the Welsh RU Hall of Fame.

Malcolm is one of the few players to have played for Wales and the British Lions at Rugby Union and for Great Britain at Rugby League --- a fantastic achievement.

Indeed the club has had enough Welshmen to field at least two imaginary match-day squads of 17.

George's son Phil plays for the Raiders

The son of our programme contributor and lifelong Roughyeds fan George Cowburn plays for West Wales Raiders and will probably be playing today.

Full-back Phil Cowburn was brought up at Watersheddings as a boy and was once an Oldham ball boy.

These days George splits his leisure time between watching Oldham and Raiders.

Who does he cheer for ?

"It's only difficult when they play against each other," he said. "And for diplomatic reasons I'll keep the answer to myself!"

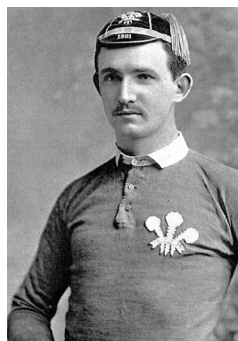

Councillor Ginny Alexander, the Worshipful the Mayor of Oldham Metropolitan Borough, said she was delighted to launch our latest initiative for young Oldhamers.

Accompanied by her Consort husband Mr Adrian Alexander, a former Oldham councillor and an ex-Oldham RLFC forward, the Mayor gave civic backing to our Junior Takeover Day (see page 14) which will take place when North Wales Crusaders come to the Vestacare Stadium on Sunday, July 14.

Community officers from Greater Manchester Police also attended a meeting of Roary's Pride at which the Mayor's Consort gave junior supporters a brief run-down on what it was like to play for Oldham RLFC.

Mr Alexander, who had previously played for Harlequins, England under-23s, the Barbarians and London Counties, changed codes to play for Oldham, whom he served for four years as a multi-talented ball-handling front-row forward.



WEST WALES RAIDERS

We welcome West Wales Raiders to the Vestacare Stadium this afternoon for this Betfred League 1 fixture.

The men from Stebonheath Park in Llanelli find themselves at the foot of this year's league table and are yet to record a league win in 2019. Keighley Cougars leap-frogged the Raiders last weekend, winning against London Skolars and thereby consigning our visitors to the wooden spoon position.

The Raiders 2019 league season began with a 28 - 4 round 1 loss away at Coventry Bears. In round 2 the much improved London Skolars were the first visitors to Llanelli and after 80 minutes the sides were only separated by ten points. A creditable Raiders performance against a side with one eye on the play-offs.

The early season promise gave way to some heavy defeats both home and away where the opposition points tally surpassed 50 on every occasion other than a 16 - 30 home defeat against Whitehaven.

Oldham's visit to West Wales back in April saw the Roughyeds run-out 72 - 8 winners. 14 Oldham tries and 8 Paul Crook goals put the Welshmen to the sword although they did cross the Oldham line on two occasions through Rowland Kaye and Patrick Jenning.

The last time the Raiders visited Oldham was during last year's hot summer. The result doesn't make good reading for our guests as Scott Naylor's rampaging team turned on the style and scored in excess of 100 points for the first time in the club's history. For the record the score was Oldham 102, Raiders 6.

West Wales coach Kim Williams has been able to strengthen his side in recent weeks with the signing of young Mitch Shaw from Coventry Bears. The young Australian hooker had played a lot of his rugby league for Brisbane Easts before coming the UK.

One Raiders player who will be no stranger to Oldham is their goal-kicking full-back Phil Cowburn. An Oldham lad through and through, Phil is a former

Oldham ballboy who's father George writes a regular column in this programme. George may have mixed allegiances during today's game but an Oldham win and a eye-catching performance from Phil could be a happy compromise.

West Wales announced in May that they have formed a new partnership with Saluzzo Roosters, an Italian club playing in French National Division 2.

It is hoped that the partnership will enable the Raiders and the Roosters staff to collaborate on marketing and management strategies and to provide potential sponsors with greater exposure throughout the UK and Europe.

The clubs will also work together to provide Coaches, Players and Administrators the opportunity for Professional Development via exchange programmes and the sharing of resources and knowledge.

Gioele Celerino, a front-rower and the Roosters marquee player for the 2019 season, joined West Wales as part of the partnership and has featured in two raiders games to date.

Oldham coach Scott Naylor has pointed out that the Raiders will eventually end their long losing streak and he's determined that day will not be today.

The Raiders come here with nothing to lose, everything to gain and it'll be interesting to see how they fare against promotion-chasing Oldham. It should be fun.

I don't propose to say too much about our performances v Doncaster, except to say that we seemed to learn absolutely nothing from our 1895 Cup defeat when we faced the same opposition a week later.

We left the Keepmoat Stadium seven or eight minutes before the end which I cannot remember doing for years.

The most relevant comment was that it felt almost as bad as 1984 at Whitehaven - and those who were at the Recre on that inauspicious occasion will understand how bad that means.

However, since the Doncaster disappointments, we have produced a very efficient effort at home to Keighley, and an excellent win at Borough Park, Workington - talk about Jekyll and Hyde!

We are now just one point behind Whitehaven, and level with Hunslet, with 12 games played and eight to go. Remarkable! So I thought I would have a look at the remaining fixtures for those teams in with some sort of realistic shout at eventual promotion.

And that is probably all the teams currently in the top seven. Maybe some are less likely to be real challengers, but as the table below shows, none can really be written off completely.

I have shown how many games each has currently lost, and how many games each has to play, home or away, against other potential top seven sides - plus Keighley, who are not going to feature in the promotion battle because of their points deduction, but who have only lost 5.5 games so far, and so are probably just as likely to beat the other teams as others in the table.
