

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

Our game last Friday against Rochdale was a gritty and tough performance, full of heart and character.



I was interested to see, once again, some of the surprise results in Super League over Easter, particularly on the Monday when players were backing up for their second match in four days.



# 'Able' Kane

## gets Naylor nod of approval

SCOTT Naylor has again lauded the "excellent" work of the latest addition to his backroom team --- Kane Daniels.

Daniels (23) has succeeded Mike Hughes as our head of strength and conditioning, while retaining his full-time appointment at Huddersfield Giants where he is responsible for the physical well-being of more than 50 young players in the Super League club's academy.

Although his Whitebank appointment is a direct spin-off of our dual-registration partnership with Huddersfield, Kane is working part-time for us on a contract negotiated with Roughyeds and paid by us.

He was the man in charge of conditioning throughout our tough and hugely demanding pre-season programme.

Scott spoke highly of his work several weeks ago and reiterated it after our win at Rochdale on Good Friday when we came from 12-0 down to win 23-16 with 11 points in the last quarter of an hour.

In many ways it was a similar performance to the one we put in at Barrow where we also won after conceding two tries early on.

In his post-match analysis at Spotland after the derby, Scott said: "We are a very fit squad thanks to our partnership with Huddersfield Giants and the help they have given us in this respect.

"Kane Daniels is doing a great job for us as conditioner, but a lot of credit must also go to the players who have bought into his methods and his enthusiasm and done all

the hard work that was asked of them.

"We are finishing strongly and in a competitive division in which there are going to be a lot of close scores you need to finish strongly.

"Also, we haven't used up our full allocation of replacements, and that's been the case in several games -- another marker to the quality of our fitness and durability."

It was Scott's second public acknowledgement of Kane's prowess in conditioning and the affect his work has had on the mental and physical toughness of our players.


He said earlier: "Kane has come to us with a Super League background and with new ideas and methods.

"Mike Hughes has left to go to Australia, but we have an excellent replacement in Kane, whose gym and general conditioning sessions are very different to anything we've done previously.

"He is very professional and everything he does with the squad is well organised and well run.

"I've seen a huge difference in the squad's fitness levels during the time Kane has been with us."

Club captain Lewis Palfrey also spoke highly of Daniels, while assistant boss Lee Spencer revealed that he and the Giants' man were working in close partnership on



the fitness and conditioning programme, thus freeing up head coach Naylor to concentrate on football matters.

Daniels joined Huddersfield in 2013 and is now the club's head of strength and conditioning at academy level, looking after players from under-15s through to under-19s.

He's a graduate in sport and exercise science from Leeds Beckett University and he has also studied similar disciplines from Victoria University in Melbourne. While in Australia, he worked in the AFL.

His work with the Giants' elite youngsters takes in nutrition, conditioning, gym sessions, speed, agility and rehabilitation.

Said Kane: "I aim to equip the next generation of Giants players with the athletic attributes required to excel in Super League rugby.

"At Oldham my brief is to help the club to win promotion and to that end I want to see Roughyeds with the best physically equipped squad in the division by creating strong, explosive, robust athletes with high levels of rugby-specific fitness capacities."

# Hull KR trio help Bears to a winning start

## Focus on today's visitors

RUGBY League's new era had extra special significance in the Midlands on Good Friday when Coventry Bears made their debut in Kingstone Press League One and set off in style by beating Oxford 32-10 at Butts Park Arena, watched by a crowd of more than 700.

It was a fixture in which the Bears gave debuts to three young loan players from Hull KR and which underlined the exciting geographical diversity that this third-tier competition brings to our sport.

Since the newcomers were beaten here at Whitebank last month in both the iPro Sport Cup and the Ladbrokes Challenge Cup they have strengthened considerably by recruiting the talented trio from Humberside as well as young Matt Reid, a second-row forward or centre from North Wales Crusaders.

The Hull KR boys are all full-time members of the Rovers senior squad, having starred in their club's under-19s side last year which reached the play-offs for the first time.

Matthew Marsh (stand-off) and Connor Robinson (scrum-half) were the regular half-backs and Marsh was rewarded with the Rovers' 2014 Young Player of the Year award.

Another outstanding member of the side was the Bears' third player from the Robins, 19-year-old Josh Guzdek, a highly-rated full-back or wing.

Like Reid from the Crusaders, the Hull KR boys have each signed on loan for one month initially with a view to a longer stay in the Midlands.

The team that got the Bears off to a winning start lined up like this: Brophy; Guzdek, Medforth, Coleman, Hunte; Sheen, Marsh; Geurtjens, Brown, Cooper, Thompson, Barratt, Phillips. Subs: Robinson, Hall, Calvert, Taylor.

The start of the League One season was met with unbridled optimism by everyone involved with the club.

Bears captain Simon Phillips said: "We had two pre-season games and we lost one and won one. Being a team in the Midlands, a lot of the lads have come from rugby union so they're still learning the game and we have a few young guys here too but it's all starting to come together.

"Losing those two games against Oldham was a shock. Being new to the league, we didn't really know what to expect but I guess you learn more from losses than wins.

"We know what areas we need to work on now. This is completely new for us but I guess other teams aren't going to know what to expect from us either."

Phillips was recruited from Australian club North Devils in Brisbane, having previously played for the North Queensland Cowboys in the NRL.

The 31-year-old says he has settled in well and being from a Rugby League-mad nation, he hopes the Bears can help to promote the game in the Midlands, as well as establish themselves in League One.

"It's been a good experience so far. The club have been great with me and my family and I'm thoroughly enjoying it," he said.

"Coming from Australia, where everyone loves Rugby League, it's a big change to be in the English Midlands which is a region you don't generally associate with the sport.

"It's important to the club to develop Rugby League in this area and I know that there is a lot of attention on the University team. The lads have also been going into schools. It's part and parcel of being a part of this team, we have a duty to promote both the club and the sport.

"The goal for us this season is to get as far up the table as we can and to be pushing for the play-offs. We won't be too disheartened if we don't get there because it's going to be a big ask but we'll be pushing as hard as we can because we don't want to finish at the bottom of the table."

# New-boy Tom getting ready for action

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**WE are delighted to confirm that we have strengthened our squad by signing Sheffield Eagles' young centre Tom Ashton on a contract to the end of this season.**

Leigh-born Tom, aged 22, was at Sheffield for more than three years and had resigned for 2015.

For much of that time he lived in Mossley and had a part-time job outside rugby, but on moving back to live in Leigh and getting full-time employment in Stockport he found it impossible to fulfil his commitments to Sheffield Eagles.

He needed a club nearer home so he asked for his release from Sheffield — and got it.

“Two or three other League One clubs were also interested, but when I talked to Oldham and trained with them a couple of times it just felt right for me,” said Ashton.

“There was a buzz in the air and everybody seemed very ambitious.”

Ashton became our second centre signing in six days, following the return to Whitebank, for a third loan spell, of Salford's Jon Ford.

Unlike Ford, who was here in 2013 and again in 2014, Ashton will be given two or three weeks in which to familiarise himself with the Roughyeds' systems, style of play and coaching methods before being considered for his debut.

Said coach Scott Naylor: “When we heard Tom was available we followed it up immediately because he has a lot of qualities to his game.

“It will take him a bit of time to get used to us, and to understand what we are trying to achieve, but I am looking forward to working with him and seeing him reaching a position in which he has earned his place in the team.”

As a boy, Ashton spent seven years at Leigh Miners before switching codes to join Sale Sharks academy and later making his semi-pro debut at Preston Grasshoppers, aged 17.

Within a year he was back in rugby league with Sheffield, playing mainly in the academy

but earning a first-team contract in 2014 when he made eight senior appearances and scored a try against Castleford in the Challenge Cup.

“I hope I can add something to what everyone is trying to achieve at Whitebank,” said Ashton, who was at school in Leigh with his new Roughyeds team mate George Tyson.

# KEEPING ABREAST OF THE RULES

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**FOUR rule changes, relating to concussion, referrals to the video referee, obstruction and use of the sin-bin, have been introduced this year.**

- Changes to the obstruction policy will favour the attacking side and remove ambiguity that caused confusion among players and fans last season.
- Teams will be allowed an additional 'free' interchange if an injured player needs a pitch-side concussion assessment — a move designed to safeguard even further players who receive head injuries.
- Offences for which players can be sin-binned will be cut from seven to four to encourage referees to impose immediate sanctions and thus reduce the number of 'on report' decisions.
- A new law on the use of video referees will bring the sport in this country in line with Australia's NRL in which the referee is required to signal his decision first even if he then goes 'upstairs' for the video official to look at whether there is enough evidence to over-rule him.

RFL chief executive Nigel Wood said: “These changes will enhance the sport for players, spectators, coaches and TV viewers alike by making the laws of the game as simple and unambiguous as possible.”

Fans should also note that the 'bonus point' system of rewarding teams which lose by 12 points or fewer has now been abolished. We now return to the straightforward former system of two points for a win, one for a draw and nil for a defeat.



**News from HQ**

**THE RFL has launched the next phase of Let's Talk Rugby League, its national campaign which aims to gain a greater insight into why players participate in the sport.**

Previous research helped the RFL understand its current and potential audience: players, fans and spectators. The results enabled the governing body to design and develop products and programmes that have been specifically tailored to meet demand.

The second phase of Let's Talk Rugby League will examine the motivations of current players to enable the RFL to continue to design programmes and services that are player-centred.

Over the next eight weeks Let's Talk More Rugby League will gather the opinions of current players of all ages and abilities on what motivates them to play the sport, including how they first became involved and why they continue to participate in Rugby League.

RFL Director of Participation and Strategic Partnerships David Gent said: "Let's Talk Rugby League was a huge success and gave us a valuable

insight into why the sport appeals to some of our most important stakeholders: Let's Talk More Rugby League is designed to drill deeper into those findings by engaging with participants on a more detailed level.

"We believe that by improving our understanding our customers, we will be able to offer higher quality support and services that are better suited to the demands and needs of our players.

"The information that we gather will ultimately help us to drive participation in the sport and I would urge everyone who's associated with Rugby League at community or professional club level to complete the survey and have their say."
