



What was the last book you read? 'Of Mice and Men'... for my GCSEs. Not a big reader.


What's your favourite type of music?

WELCOME back to Whitebank for the latest instalment in the League One challenge!

In a run of what most people would consider to be the more difficult games we have had mixed fortunes to date.

Losses at Barrow and Keighley but a resounding win against Newcastle at home have left us needing to secure a win today against the Crusaders, who inflicted our last home defeat on us in the semi-final of the IPro Sport League One Cup.

Following that, they then got their name on the trophy as the first-ever winners by beating Swinton in the final.

Matches against North Wales have always been close and well-fought encounters and from our perspective we need to get our heads in gear.


The book is about Craig's experiences as a fan of Oldham RLFC and, believe you me, its realistic and it certainly rekindles some happy and some not-sohappy memories.

Tries galore, but Nick Johnson still holds the record with 25

Clay out in front this year as we welcome back Jon Ford

WITH 12 tries in ten outings, right-winger Adam Clay is currently our leading try scorer – a player who clearly knows the way to the line as he demonstrated with his hat-trick in our last home game against Newcastle Thunder.

Taking all competitions into account – League One, iPro Sport Cup and Ladbrokes Challenge Cup – he is, in fact, one of this season's most prolific try scorers among all players who operate in the sport's third tier, as is Jono Smith of the Crusaders, our opponents today.

Adam's hat-trick in our last home game, plus the return to Whitebank of another player who knows a bit about scoring tries, Jon Ford, has turned the spotlight on to Roughyeds' try scorers down the years and has raised the question of where Clay is likely to finish in the pecking order when compared

with our other leading try scorers since the 'new' club was formed for the start of the 1998 season.

But first things first and a big 'welcome home' to Jon Ford, who scored seven tries in five games for us earlier in the season before he was recalled by his parent club Salford Red Devils during an injury crisis.

He was back in time to play at Keighley last Sunday. He wasn't able to add to his try tally at Cougar Park, but it is interesting to recall that he was our top try scorer with 21 in the 2013 season and that, in total, he can boast the remarkable record of having scored 41 tries in 37 games for Oldham in four separate spells here either on loan or on dual-registration.

His return to Whitebank is a timely one because, as





you know, Tom Ashton is currently out with a knee injury and George Tyson can't play today because of suspension, although he will be available again for next Sunday's game against Oxford, which is also here at Whitebank

Breaking it down season by season, Ford ran in 21 tries in 15 games in 2013; 13 tries in 16 outings in 2014; and to date this season he has added seven tries in six appearances.

Season-to 1998

Comparisons can be misleading because the number of games per season differ considerably, but the fact of the matter is that, since 1998, nobody has matched winger Nick Johnson's 25 (31 appearances) in the 2004 season.

Some records credit him with 26 tries, but that includes one he scored in the pre-season Law Cup game against Rochdale and, for most purposes, official records do not take in points scored in friendlies or any other games outside of those in RFL-authorised league or cup competitions, including play-offs.

Just to nudge your memory, season 2004 was the one in which Oldham finished fourth in National League One behind Leigh, Whitehaven and Hull KR, but with one point

more than Featherstone and six points more than Halifax.

Other leading players that season were Keith Brennan, Gareth Barber, Gavin Dodd, Lee Doran, Phil Farrell, Jon Goddard, Dane Morgan, Neil Roden and Ian Watson.

Book review

From Watersheddings to Whitebank

An Oldham Rugby League Memoir by Craig Halstead

Foreword by Chris Hamilton

ONE fan's memories, stories, anecdotes and recollections of joy and despair over more than 40 years form the basis of a new book on Oldham RLFC. Several fantastic books have been penned about the club in recent years, but as far as we can ascertain this is the first one to be written from the perspective of a rank-and-file fan who might just as easily be chatting about his beloved Roughyeds to fellow fans over the bar of his favourite pub.

"From Watersheddings to Whitebank" (London League Publications Ltd, £11.95 paperback) is a collection of memoirs by Craig Halstead (49), who saw his first game at Watersheddings, aged five, in 1971. He has supported Roughyeds ever since.

Though living and working in North Wales these days - and NO, he won't be cheering for Crusaders although his Welsh-speaking wife Yvonne will be here with him - Craig will be at the game today and will be happy to sell anyone a signed copy of his work.

A book of 208 pages, illustrated with photographs from family collections, from the Oldham Evening Chronicle's archives and from the Roughyeds' official club photographer David Murgatrovd, with a foreword by our club chairman Chris Hamilton, the book provides an insight into how a lifetime of emotions and experiences, good and bad, can be fashioned for anyone who supports a club from childhood.

In the case of this new author, as with thousands of other Oldham fans, those experiences included the liquidation of one club and the birth and rise of a new one, like a phoenix from the ashes of Watersheddings, in the guise of Oldham RLFC (1997) Ltd.

The new club continues to provide the town with a professional rugby league club of which it can be justifiably proud.

The author, who has dedicated his work to Oldham RL fans past and present, says he is proud to have been associated with both Oldham clubs for all but the first five years of his life and proud also to be just as enthusiastic in his support of Chris, Scott and the boys at Whitebank in 2015 as he was in his backing for the old guard at Watersheddings in days of vore.

He adds: "Fans throughout the sport support their

club through thick and thin - some more than others - and although I was born and brought up in Rochdale I will always consider it a great privilege to have supported Oldham all my life. I just hope the rugby people of the town realise what they've got and what life would be like without it."



Cup kings of the Crusade aim to make it six wins in a row

NORTH Wales Crusaders come to Whitebank today in search of their sixth win in a row and bidding to emulate their 18-16 triumph here in the iPro Sport Cup semi-final on Wednesday night, April 8.

To do so they will have to become the first visiting side to win a league match on this ground since Oxford pipped us by the same score, 18-16, on Sunday, April 28, 2013.

That's a phenomenal record of which everyone here at the Oldham club is incredibly proud, but equally we are well aware that the longer it goes on the more determined will be our opponents to bring it to an abrupt end.

It all adds extra spice to today's encounter. not that it needed any given the number of fabulous games the two sides have been involved in during the 2013 and 2015 seasons and the fact that Crusaders pipped us by two points (plus a better for-and-against record) to go up to the Kingstone Press Championship as Championship One leaders at the end of the 2013 campaign.


That year, in the league, Crusaders pipped us 22-20 in Wrexham and we won 28-10 at Whitebank to set up a fascinating finale to the competition in which we finished a few weeks before Crusaders, who couldn't afford to slip up on the run-in otherwise it would have let us in as champions.

One of the reasons they were behind on fixtures was their progress to the final of the Northern Rail Bowl in which they beat London Skolars 42-24 with tries by Tommy Johnson, Christiaan Roets, Andy Moulsdale, Gary Middlehurst, Dave McConnell (2), Rob Massam and Andy Birkett.

That crowned a fantastic year for the Welshmen, who picked up three major prizes at the Kingstone Press awards dinner, namely Championship One club of the year plus player of the year (Jono Smith) and coach of the year (Clive Griffiths).

Massam, Stuart Reardon. Moulsdale. McConnell, Middlehurst and Smith were all included in the 'Rugby League World' magazine's team of the year, along with our very own Phil Joy and our long-term loan signing Jon Ford, who was our leading try scorer in 2013 with 21.

Fast forward two years and Crusaders recovered from a relatively disappointing 2014 campaign in the Championship by lifting more silverware in the form of the new iPro Sport Cup, beating Swinton Lions 14-8 in the final at Bloomfield Road, Blackpool (see picture).

To get there they won here at Whitebank in a semi-final thriller under lights, after which Jono Smith described it as the toughest and most physical game he had ever played in.

Added Jono: "Whitebank is always a tough pace to go to, but when you're playing with a final at stake the intensity turns up a notch.

"We had to dig really deep and somehow find a way to the line. The performance was a real team effort and every single player was committed to coming away with the win. We have definitely gained in confidence from what we did at Whitebank that night."

So to the final and more than 15,000 fans flocked to Blackpool for the first-ever Summer Bash to watch two days of spectacular KP Championship action and an enthralling iPro Sport Cup final in an action-packed game that left spectators on the edge of their seats.

RFL Chief Executive Nigel Wood said; "Summer Bash was an event that the whole sport should feel proud of. It was a fantastic weekend, showcasing the Kingstone Press Championship and League 1.

"I would like to thank the fans who turned out in their thousands to create a carnival atmosphere both inside and outside the stadium. They embraced the new concept and helped to make the event a great success. Congratulations must go to North Wales Crusaders on their spectacular win in the iPro Sport Cup final.

"For the fans who couldn't make it to Bloomfield Road they were able to enjoy the high quality drama on the field by watching the great coverage Sky Sports provided over the weekend

"I am looking forward to next year's event and we will confirm the date and venue in due course "

Lest we forget...

William Moore Bell Nanson

England Rugby Union international, Cumberland, Oldham and Coventry forward

Last Thursday the 4th of June 2015 marked the centenary of the death at Gallipoli of Sergeant Bill Nanson the former England rugby union international and Oldham forward.

Born in Carlisle in 1880 Nanson had already served his country with the Border Regiment in South Africa where he was presented with both the King's and Queen's medal for his services. On his return he joined the Carlisle RU club winning two England caps before joining Oldham at the age of 27.

He played just 28 first team matches in an injury hit career for the Roughyeds but won a Lancashire Cup runners-up medal in his first season when Oldham lost 10-9 to Wigan at Broughton in front of a 20,000 crowd. He, and several other Oldham players, later joined the recently formed Northern Union club Coventry

but Nanson, again due to injuries, faded from the rugby scene at the end of the 1911-12 season.

At the outbreak
of the First
World War he
enlisted with
the Manchester
Regiment and
due to his earlier
service in South
Africa was quickly
promoted to sergeant.

Nanson and his platoon where wiped out by the opposing Turks and unfortunately his body was never found - his death confirmed by the War Office over a year later. He was 34 years old.

Long haul back for Tom

SCOTT Naylor is keen to hasten highlyrated Tom Ashton's return to full fitness in his fight to overcome ligament damage in his left knee.

The 22-year-old former Sheffield Eagles centre was given the prognosis he feared most when a specialist at the Royal Salford Hospital talked to him about scan results.

Injured at South Wales Scorpions on April 19 in only his second game for Oldham, the powerful centre has suffered damage to both the medial and the anterior cruciate ligaments.

Surgery isn't required to repair the medial ligament, but he may need an

operation to mend the cruciate ligament.

Either way, he faces a long haul back and Oldham must come to terms with the fact that he isn't going to be available for several more weeks.

Said coach Naylor: "Tom has to see his specialist again in a couple of weeks and, hopefully, the anterior cruciate will have settled down by then.

"That's when he will get the final decision on whether surgery is needed and when he will be told how long he can expect to be sidelined for.

"Tom is anxious to get some firm answers to all his questions.

"It's not unusual for players to damage these two ligaments, but it may be another two or three weeks before much progress can be made.

"Tom will continue to attend training sessions in the meantime.

"We need to look after him because whether he plays again this season or waits until next season I want Tom Ashton to continue to be an Oldham player moving forward – and, as soon as possible, I want him to be playing the sort of rugby he

produced against Coventry Bears and South Wales Scorpions before he was injured."

Tom made a try-scoring debut for us in the Coventry game on April 12, but in the next game at South Wales Scorpions a week later he was injured just before half-time after again producing an impressive and highly-encouraging display.

It was a cruel blow for a young player with most of his career ahead of him, but Tom has time on his side and the best wishes of all Oldham fans will be with him as he starts the long haul back to full fitness.

Fans asked to take part in our sport's Birthday Walk

RUGBY League fans are being asked and encouraged to take to the streets this summer to celebrate our sport's 120th birthday.

The Oldham club was a founder member of the 1895 breakaway organisation that eventually became the Rugby League as we know it today and, as such, it would be both fitting and appropriate if our fans got themselves actively involved in the RFL's celebration walk which will be in this area on Wednesday, July 22, covering Rochdale (the site of the old Athletic Grounds) and Watersheddings.

From July 19 to 24, representatives of every section of the game can participate in the Founders' Walk, a historic 120-mile journey taking in the homes of the original 22 members of the Northern Union.

Organised by Rugby League Cares, the fundraising walk will commemorate the birth of the sport at the George Hotel in Huddersfield on August 29, 1895 and will see the sport come together to celebrate its glorious past.

RFL chief executive Nigel Wood will be doing the walk, which will begin in Hull and end in St Helens, taking in the 20 other original sites of the game's founding clubs while en route.

That will mean a visit to Watersheddings where we already have a blue plaque in

place in recognition of what that area and its one-time famous old ground meant not only to generations of Oldhamers, but to rugby league people throughout the world.

Landmark lunch to celebrate 1975 World Championship

England's 20-man squad for the matches Down Under was coached by Alex Murphy and captained by Roger Millward and included John Atkinson, Keith Bridges, Mike Coulman, Les Dyl, George Fairbairn, Keith Fielding, Ken Gill, Mick Morgan, Steve Nash and George Nicholls.

Wales's 20-man Australasian squad was coached by Les Pearce and skippered by David Watkins and featured Kel Costlett, Tony Fisher, Bill Francis, John Mantle, Roy Mathias, Jim Mills and Mike Nicholas.
