

Tom's all smiles after his latest check-up

TOM Ashton, our young centre, was all smiles after receiving the latest prognosis on his knee ligament injury.

He was fearing the worst and expecting to be told that he would need an operation, but instead he learned that the injury was not as serious as first thought.

The 22-year-old former Sheffield Eagles player damaged both the medial and anterior cruciate ligaments in his left knee in only his second game for Roughyeds at South Wales Scorpions seven weeks ago.

When he was given the scan results and told that, at best, he would face a long, uphill battle to regain full fitness, he was also warned there was a strong possibility he would need surgery.

That would almost certainly have finished him for the season.

But he has now been told by a knee specialist at the Royal Salford Hospital that with rehab and with specialist work in the gym on weights and the bike he might be ready to resume light training in six to eight weeks.

Said Tom: "I've got a partial tear in the ACL (anterior cruciate ligament) and a full tear in the MCL (medial cruciate ligament).

"I'm told it would have been more serious if it had been the other way round.

"The MCL can heal naturally and because the damage to the ACL is only partial it looks as though I might escape the knife.

"The specialist examined the range of movement in the knee and he was happy at the way things are progressing.

"He doesn't think I'll need surgery, but I've a lot of work to do on rehab and weights before I see him again in a few weeks.

"It was always going to be a long-term thing, but the latest prognosis gives me a glimpse of the light at the end of the tunnel and it's a massive positive for me."

CHAT WITH

WELCOME back to Whitebank for what I think needs to be almost a fresh start to the season.

The last two matches have been disappointing in terms of performance and result and we need to re-find that belief and confidence that we have had previously.

Make no mistake, Keighley and North Wales are among the favourites to get promoted for a reason, but there is no doubt that we are capable of beating both of them if we stay strong and keep to the game plan Scott is giving to the players.

Over the last few years we have more than amply demonstrated that we are one of the best teams in the division, but it seems like, at times, some of the players suffer from a lack of conviction when things get tough.

It was another positive meeting. We are talking about a wide range of issues, some of which are not entirely in the club's control, so it is inevitable that there is not much to report yet in terms of outcomes.

What is pleasing, and should be therefore for all of you too, is the desire to move forward in unison and hopefully this will continue. Another meeting is planned in mid-July and I will obviously keep you posted.

What are your thoughts on the three divisions this season? Personally I think the RFL must be very satisfied with the way the new structure is working and we aren't even at the point where the top two leagues split into the eights.

We all know how tough League One is but anybody who follows Super League and the Championship can only be enthused with the way those leagues are shaping up with the revised opportunity for promotion and relegation.

The current bottom four in Super League, for example, includes some big clubs and there is going to be an almighty scramble over the next few weeks as they push for the top eight before the cut.

Whilst the mechanics of how the different 'eights' will operate might still be a little confusing to some people, I don't think there can be any doubt that the new structure has had the desired effect – and the best is yet to come.

Rugby Oldham and ORSA join 'positive' talks

Representatives of Oldham RLFC (1997) Ltd, headed by chairman Chris Hamilton, had a second "extremely positive" meeting with various supporters' groups on Monday to discuss various aspects of how best to move the club forward in unison.

Supporters were represented by ORSA (Oldham Roughyeds Supporters' Association), Rugby Oldham (the Supporters' Community Trust) and an independent group, led by Mark Heywood, who had initial talks with the club several weeks ago.

Chairman John McAndrew was there for ORSA, while Rugby Oldham was represented by Geoff Cooke (chairman), Ian Wilson (secretary) and Brian Walker. Various issues were discussed in "full and frank" debate and another meeting was arranged for Monday, July 13.

In a joint statement all parties agreed that more progress had been made towards determining the future direction of the club although there was nothing tangible to report at this stage.

Said club chairman Chris Hamilton: "It was another positive meeting and it was beneficial to have ORSA and Rugby Oldham present because key to anything we can achieve is the involvement of all relevant stakeholders.

"While we are still a way off reaching a decisionmaking stage, we are moving forward together and that is what we are all trying to achieve."

lan Wilson (Rugby Oldham): "We were very happy about the positive atmosphere of the meeting and, in particular, of Chris's willingness to discuss, on a serious basis, different possibilities for the future ownership of the club.

"We are very happy also to confirm that we do not have, and have never had, a situation in which we are at loggerheads with the club even though communication has not always been the greatest."

John McAndrew (ORSA): "Definitely a positive meeting – and one on which I will report back to our members at our next meeting."

Mark Heywood (independent fans' group): "This meeting was just as positive as the first one. Our aim was always to get the club and Rugby Oldham together in order to discuss if there is a better way to develop the club, using the expertise of the whole Oldham rugby league community, of which Rugby Oldham and ORSA are huge parts."

Winger Jarrod jets away to a place in the sun

WINGER Jarrod Ward has explained why he made the "agonising" decision to leave the club to take up a new full-time job on the French Riviera.

"I thought long and hard about it," he said. "But in the end I had to accept it was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity that I couldn't turn down. It was impossible to turn it down. I had to think of the future."

He will be based in 'Super' Cannes – a retreat for film stars, top European footballers and some of the wealthiest people in the world – and his job will be to manage a £65million holiday villa, where he has worked previously in a part-time capacity.

Added Scott: "We wish Jarrod all the best and hope everything goes well for him. We'll miss him.

"He has been offered a job he couldn't turn down and as a young man with all his future ahead of him he has made the sort of decision we will always respect."

"To have this opportunity on the day that Rugby League celebrates its 120th birthday makes it even more special for us."





An Oldham Rugby League Memoir by Craig Halstead

Foreword by Chris Hamilton

THE latest book on Oldham Rugby, 'From Watersheddings to Whitebank' by Craig Halstead, has received favourable reviews in the press.





Crowd figures on the up?

The attendance of 671 at the Crusaders game last Sunday was easily the best Whitebank crowd of the season so far.

The previous best was 491 for the visit of Stanley Gene's Newcastle Thunder, but there is every reason to believe that our attendances will continue on an upward spiral in the second half of the season.

Of the seven League One fixture last weekend only one was better than ours. Barrow v Keighley pulled in 1,141, but the rest were pretty dismal – Gloucester v Hemel 153; Skolars v Coventry 259; Oxford v South Wales 286; Swinton v Newcastle 455 (less than we got here for Thunder's visit); and York v Rochdale 386.


York are currently experiencing a nomadic existence — and we know something about that — so the fact that the Rochdale game was played at Featherstone was one big factor in their being such a small turn-out.

From the playing point of view, the second half of the regular season will be much tougher than the first from Oldham's perspective, given that of our remaining 12 fixtures, after today, six are against teams who were in the Championship last year and another is against York, who finished top of Championship One in 2014 with six more points than third-placed Roughyeds.

And the other five – against Gloucester, London, Hemel, Newcastle and Oxford are all away.

That means that some of the most attractive games of the season here at Whitebank have still to be played and with them, of course, should come some of our best attendances.

York (July 5), Rochdale (July 12), Keighley (August 2), Barrow (August 23) and Swinton (September 6) should give our aggregate attendances for the season a massive boost, especially if the boys on the field can get back to winning ways and put their recent disappointments behind them.

Succeeding Tony Benson at Oxford, and in his first season in the city of the dreaming spires, Tim commutes from his home near Castleford, as does managing director Adrian Smith, who lives near Pontefract.

The board also includes Tony Colquitt, who spent five years as chief executive at St Helens.

Rumford is currently rebuilding a squad that no longer possesses a single ex-Oldham player, let alone TEN, as it did in 2013, the club's first year at this level.

He said: "I still work full-time at Cas and I think I've done every job there apart from bar man. On Tuesday and Thursday nights I'm allowed to leave a couple of hours early to travel down to Oxford. Cas are a great club to work for and I am extremely grateful to them for allowing me to follow my ambitions in coaching.

"When the Oxford job came along I felt it was a perfect fit for me at this stage of my career, and I've got to say I'm enjoying it immensely.

"The travelling can be a bit tough and we're under no illusions about the size of the task ahead of us, but it's a natural progression for me and I love the challenge.

"We just have to run with the blows and take the rough with the smooth, but we're not doing too bad up to now with four wins out of eight league games, beating Hemel, Skolars, Gloucester and South Wales all at home."

Tim believes there are two divisions within League One — the top eight that form the northern powerhouse and then the remaining six, of which Oxford are currently on top, much to his pride and pleasure.

He added: "We we made a good start and we're aiming to finish top of the southern group, which is a realistic target for us and one that we would be proud to achieve.

"In an ideal world we'd field a team full of boys from down there, but we've got to balance that ideal with the urgent need to be viable and competitive in a division that is going stronger each year, and particularly so this year with the addition of the five teams which came down.

"People say there's a lot of money in the south but if there is, it isn't coming into rugby league. The day might dawn when one of the clubs down there comes into money, but other than that you could only build a team of locals if you had youth development teams and academies and even then it would be a long-term investment which would also require money to set up and maintain.

"There are some good lads down there, but it's questionable whether there's enough to go round, so for now we've got to strengthen with northern-based players and I suppose I'm fortunate in that respect because of my links and contacts with the game in Yorkshire"

Oxford have a dual-reg agreement with Bradford and it was interesting to see that in last Sunday's 38-30 win against South Wales they were led by former Super League ace Matty Blythe, who played in the second-row and by all accounts was an extremely influential figure, as anyone would expect.

Among other recent recruits are Jonny Payne, a prop who's been at Castleford and Bradford; Andy Matthews, a winger from Fryston Colliery and Lock Lane; and hooker Dean Mignacca, an Aussie of Italian descent, who has signed on loan from Rochdale Hornets.

Said Tim: "Dean was looking for some game time and it fitted in with what we needed at Oxford. If it helps Dean and it helps Oxford its of mutual benefit and so much the better.

"We've also brought in Steve Scott, a forward, and Andy Matthews, a winger — two young players from the Castleford area. At one time, Andy played in the Tigers' under-20s.

"In a squad of 22 or 23 I've got about nine or ten northern lads.

"I firmly believe that boys from the south have to have something about them. They need to be in the side on merit and not merely because they tick all the right boxes in terms of meeting the local criteria and expansionist ideals.

"We've had a mixed bag of results, but the win against Gloucester was a big one because they have some financial clout thanks to their close links with the university.

"At Oxford we operate on very tight budgets. I knew that when I went. It has to be that way. We've just got to get on with it.

"My remit is to make Oxford credible in this hugely competitive Kingstone Press League One."

No piece on Oxford would be complete without a reference to that April day in 2013 when Tony Benson brought his 'Blues to Whitebank for the first time, including loads of our former players, and they beat us 18-16.

Remarkably, that was the last time we lost a league game at Whitebank until North Wales Crusaders came to town last Sunday and beat us 38-28 to end a run of 27 league games on home soil without being beaten – a fantastic achievement.

A WORD FROM THE EDITOR

EVERYBODY associated with the Oldham club was pretty cheesed off last Sunday when we were beaten at Whitebank in a league game for the first time since April, 2013.

Lots of fans will remember that Tony Benson's Oxford did us 18-16 in a very strange game by virtue of the fact that the visitors paraded almost a full team of players who had been at our club in the previous season just a few months earlier.

There was also the Benson factor to take into account and, not unexpectedly in the circumstances, Tony was petty upbeat after his win.

On that Sunday afternoon in late April two years ago, however, who would have ever believed that we would go another 27 games on home soil before suffering another loss in the league.

We had a few close shaves... like the 24-24 draw with Gloucester at the end of the 2013 season; the 20-20 draw with Hemel at the start of the 2014 campaign; and the two wins by one point in thrillers against York (31-30) and Hunslet (24-23).

In both those games the Roughyeds showed

phenomenal desire, self-belief and a never-say-die spirit to come from behind in the last few minutes and to clinch glorious victories — in much the same way that they went away to Hunslet and York in the play-offs at the end of that season and triumphed again, 25-24 at Hunslet and 31-12 at York.

Even in the final, although we were not at our best on the big day, the crown went to Hunslet only on a golden-point drop goal after the scores were locked up at 16 apiece at the end of normal time.

Fast forward a few months and we have just seen us concede 26 points at Keighley in the first half and a similar number before half time in the next match against Crusaders.

That wasn't the Roughyeds we have come to know and love — and it wasn't the Roughyeds that, under Scott, went nearly two and a half seasons before losing two league games in a row.
