Welcome to Oldham for this afternoon's game. I know Scott will have his team ready for this after we gave them a scare in the away game.

We need to back up last week's performance and show that we are in a false

position in the league. When we compete we can be just as good as the Northern teams but we have huge lapses in concentration at times and the better players capitalise on these.

We currently have so many players unavailable it's ridiculous. Injuries, suspensions and pre-booked holidays mean we will literally be down to the last 17 or 18 players today. It will provide some players with another good opportunity to show me what they can do though, as I look to see who I want to be part of next year's squad. A couple of our long term injured players have returned to training (Rory

Sharratt and James Walter) and they will be fit to return in a few weeks time.

We probably deserved something out of the game at Barrow last week. We were on the end of some harsh calls at crucial times

This afternoon's visitors are none other than the Oldham Roughyeds, one of the country's oldest Rugby clubs with an incredibly proud and distinguished history.

The links between Oldham and Gloucestershire go back to the earliest days of the sport when many fine Gloucestershire men signed for famous Oldham. Indeed no less than 3 Oldham players represented Great Britain in the Great Match of 1908 in Cheltenham. In addition 3 more played for the nation in the remarkable Rorke's Drift Test match in Australia in July 1914.

Now plying their trade in the third tier of Rugby League, Oldham do have experience at the top of the game in the United Kingdom. Formed in 1876 as Oldham FC, they are one of the twenty-two founder members of the Northern Rugby Football Union in 1895, a real foundation to the way we now play the game 120 years later.

Since their formation, the club has changed and evolved, from

Oldham FC to Oldham Bears, before their latest change back in 1998 to the Roughyeds. Before the change they were one of the original sides to compete in the Super League, playing in the competition for two seasons.

The fans will hope to see the club return to its glory days once again when silverware and huge crowds were a regular feature. Amongst the Oldham club's finest triumphs was the Championship success of 1957/8. Memorable Challenge Cup wins also were recorded in 1899, 1925 and 1927. Much to the chagrin of their many followers the Roughyeds have never appeared in the Challenge Cup final since it moved to Wembley stadium in 1929.

But back to the here and now and Oldham currently sit in second in Kingstone Press League 1, two points behind leaders Keighley. A victory today could see them go back to the top, after a superb start to the campaign. Ex-England international and Oldham boss Scott Naylor will look to take the form from their recent win over Swinton in to today's game at the Prince of Wales Stadium.

Naylor began his career at Wigan before moving on to Salford, spending a successful four seasons. He moved on to Bradford Bulls, a season after they won the first ever Super League title. Naylor would spend five years with the Bulls, making over a century of appearances and reaching the Super League's Grand Final, sadly losing to St Helens in 1999. In 2000 he earned his first cap for England, making his debut against Australia, before making three more appearances. After the initial loss in the Super League final, he would finally win it two years later, beating former club Wigan in 2001. He moved on in 2004 to re-join Salford before retiring.

Langtree, 24 is a product of the youth academy at St Helens but failed to break into the first team in the Super League. He trained with the reserves in Oldham before being handed a chance in the first team in 2012, where he seized his opportunity and remained in the team. He has since scored some vital points for the Roughyeds, including a try last weekend against Swinton Lions.

William (Billy) Hall was born in the St Mary de Lode parish in Gloucester, the youngest of seven brothers who all played for the Gloucester club and five of them, including Billy played for the county team.

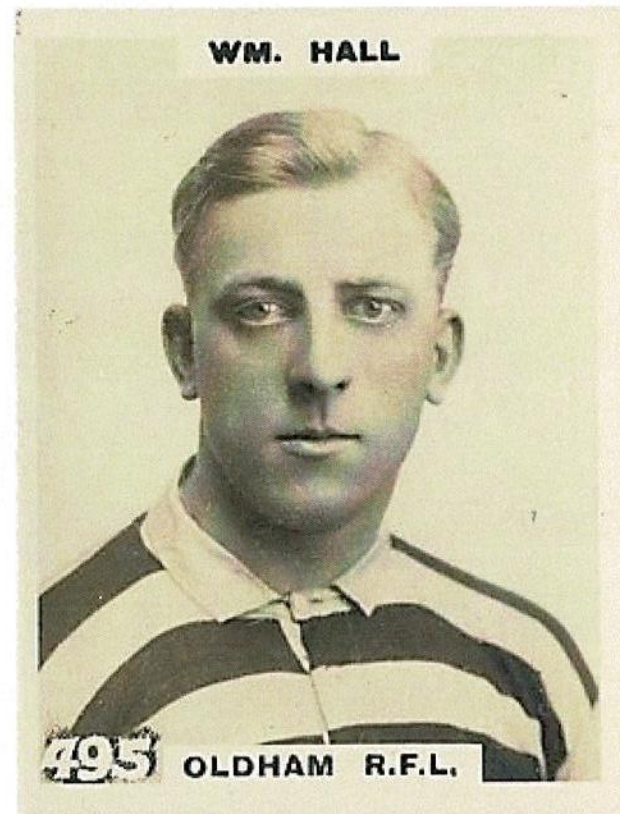
The oldest brother Charles played in two tests for England in 1901 against Scotland and Ireland and Billy himself was picked to play for an "England XV" against France in 1912.

Having toured France with the Gloucester club Billy was offered a position at Perpignan but decided

instead to play for Coventry from where he was recommended to the Oldham club, keen recruiters of West Countrymen, by their former player Tommy Cash. Billy duly signed for Oldham along with fellow Gloucester born player Dave Holland in time for the start of the 1913/14 season. Billy was not the first Hall brother to turn to the

Northern Union, as Rugby League was then known, older brother George moved north to play for Hull from 1902 to 1905.

Billy made his debut for Oldham in the first match of the 1913 season against Dewsbury which Oldham won 10-8 and scored his first tries (two) in the fourth match a



26-8 home win over Halifax. Playing left centre or stand off Billy made 38 appearances in his first season, scoring 13 tries including a best ever haul of four in a 32-5 victory over St Helens at Watersheddings, Oldham's home ground at that time.

The First World War interrupted Billy's career but by the time of his final game - a Challenge Cup quarter final victory over Featherstone Rovers on 12th March 1925 he had made 240 appearances for Oldham, scoring 53 tries and 2 goals. His centre partnership with Welshman Evan Davies becoming one

of the best in Oldham's long history.

Billy played in four Lancashire Cup Finals for Oldham (winning two), twice against visiting Australia sides, the 1922 Championship Final defeat to Wigan and the 1924 Challenge Cup Final when Wigan again defeated Oldham. That final which was played at Rochdale Hornets' Athletics Ground was Rugby League's equivalent of football's 1923 "White Horse" final. So great was the crowd that many of them spilled over onto the touchlines and Wigan's South African winger Attie Van Heerden was

reputed to have run behind a mounted policehorse to score a try under the posts. Oldham were also the Northern Rugby League and Lancashire League winners, with Billy a regular, in the 1921/22 season.

Billy also achieved international recognition. He played twice for England - against Wales in 1914 and Australia in 1921 (both victories) - and was picked for the 1914 Lions Tour to Australia and New Zealand along with fellow Oldham players Alf Wood and Dave Holland, all with strong Gloucester connections. (Another Gloucester born player John "Jack" Robinson from Rochdale Hornets was also on that tour). Billy played in all four Test Matches helping Great Britain beat Australia two tests to one and New Zealand by sixteen points to thirteen, playing at stand off twice and in the centre for the other two tests.

All told Billy played in twelve matches on Tour, scoring six tries. The third test against Australia was the legendary "Rörke's Drift" match. Billy was one of three players missing, injured, during the second half having been concussed after diving for a loose ball and colliding heavily with an opponent. He showed his bravery by returning to the field with ten minutes to go to help his overworked colleagues achieve a famous 14-6 victory against the odds as substitutes were not allowed in those days.

Gloucester's loss was Rugby League's gain in having this tricky resourceful and versatile player serve both club and country with great distinction.

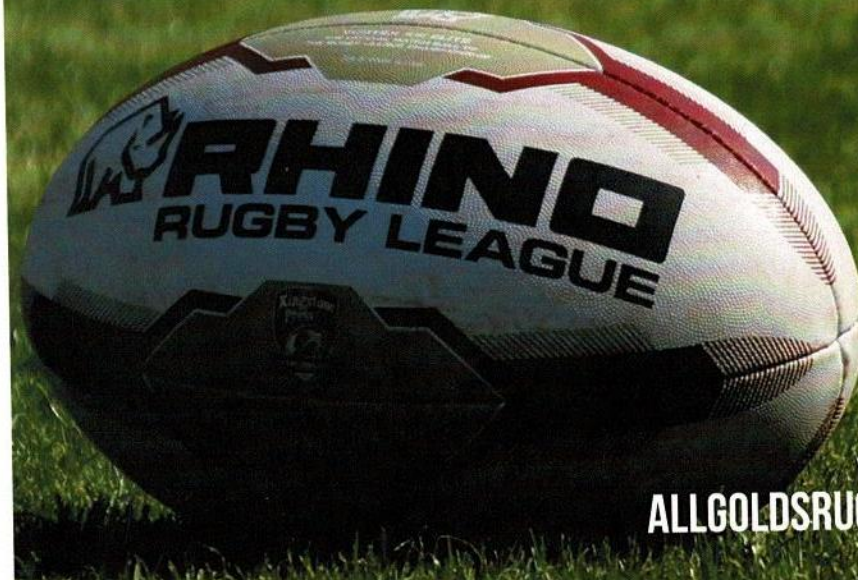
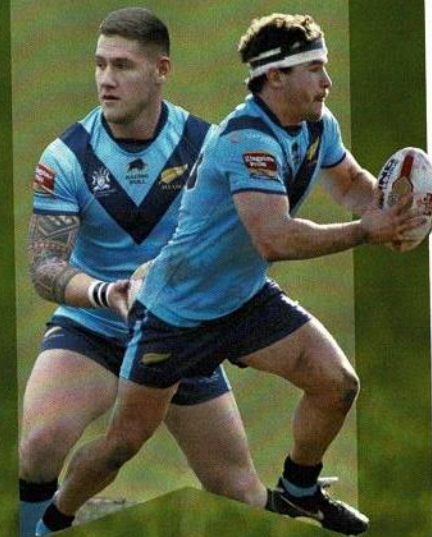

RUGBY LEAGUE ROUND-UP

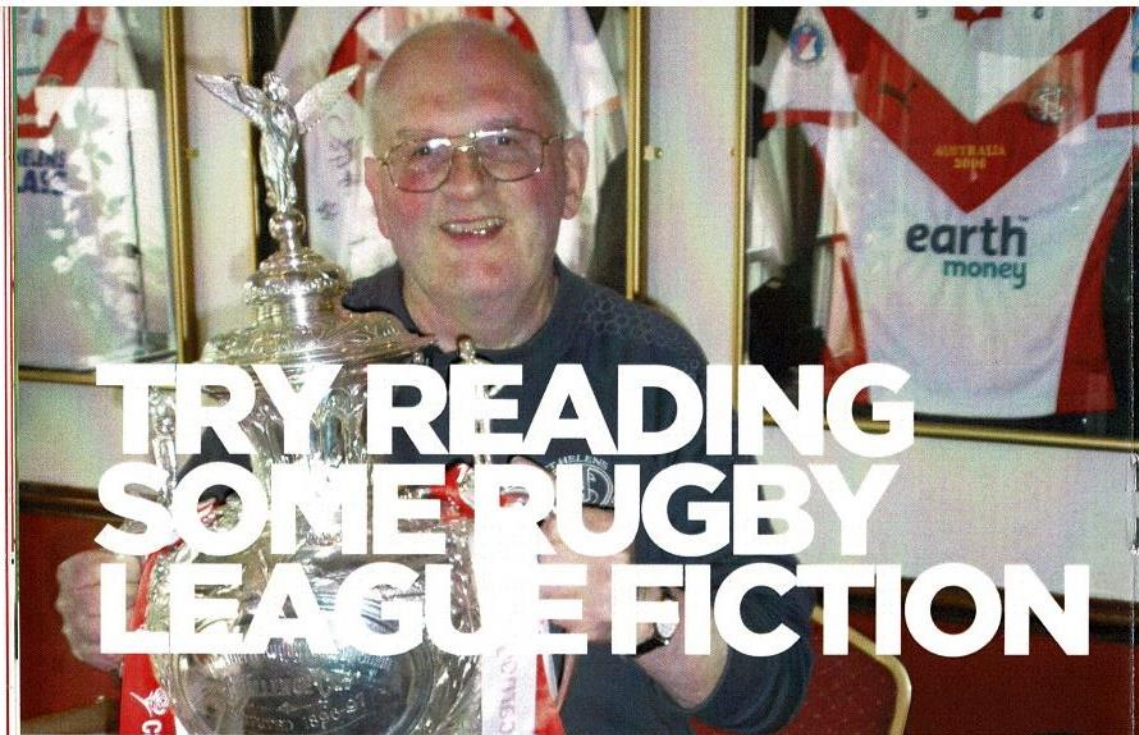

All fourteen sides in the Kingstone Press League 1 were in action last weekend, with the league still so close as we approach the half-way mark.

Keighley remain cemented to the top of the division with victory at home to promotion rivals Rochdale Hornets. The Hornets now slip to sixth with the sides around them all winning. Keighley are two points clear of second placed Oldham who travel to Cheltenham today. The Roughyeds won in a close encounter away to Swinton Lions, a side who've looked great this season, but will be disappointed to see themselves 8th. There are just three points between the second and eighth placed sides in the division, meaning

everything can change in a weekend. York threw themselves right into the mix, by thrashing Hemel Stags 10-70 away from home, the Stags were looking to build on previous victories, but were overpowered from the first whistle to the last. Barrow propelled themselves higher with a fine victory at home to the All Golds, it was a close encounter but the northern side edged the second half and managed an impressive victory. As for the rest of the league, down the bottom South Wales Scorpions remain winless,

with Coventry Bears being the last in a long line of clubs to hammer the Welsh outfit, 14-42 on this occasion. Elsewhere at the wrong end of the table, London Skolars did themselves no favours by missing out on pulling themselves from the bottom sides, losing 12-19 at home to Newcastle Thunder, meaning they remain 13th, and with just one league victory in 2015. Finally Oxford hosted North Wales Crusaders, with the Welshmen coming out on top 12-36, keeping them in the hunt of the leading pack.



TRY READING SOME RUGBY LEAGUE FICTION

For a long time after David Storey wrote "This Sporting Life" in the 1950s, no one in this country had successfully written a novel set against a rugby league background.

But things began to change in 1988 when Geoff Lee, a former CEB electrical draughtsman, began to write "One Winter" so called because it was set during that terrible winter of 1962/63. It was inspired by his love and knowledge of rugby league which he had followed since 1947 and the old saying about work that

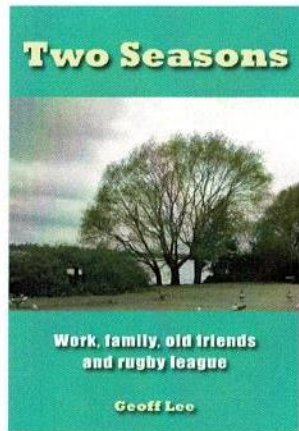
"They could write a book about this

place. It would be a best seller".

In order to combine fact and fiction, Geoff created the town of Ashurst which he located 'near' to his home town of St Helens. The town's largest factory is Wilkinsons Engineering Ltd., where his main character Alan Greenall is a draughtsman. Among his workmates are Charlie from Thatto Heath and a friend of Alex Murphy, Mick the

Wiganer from Platt Bridge, Stan the war hero, Len the trade union man, Joan the tea lady from Leigh and Sam, the former Merchant Navy seaman from Halifax. His presence in the drawing office ensures that Lancashire/Yorkshire humour is ever present throughout Geoff's novels.

"Greeno" has a keen interest in the history of our game and this enables Geoff to include many true stories about Rugby



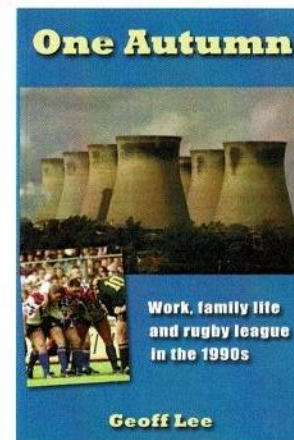
League. One concerned the Bristol and England full back Tom Brown who came north in 1933 to talk to officials of the Warrington club about changing codes. But he never did. When the RFU found out what he had done, they banned him for life! Another tale is told about how the French Vichy Government banned Rugby League during the war and there are also accounts of how various groups of fans managed to get to Odsal Stadium for Championship Finals and the 1954 Challenge Cup replay when over 120,000 people turned up.

His latest novel is called "Two Seasons". It is set in 2002 and 2003 and one of the new characters in the drawing office is Jennifer from the North East and a recent convert to the game. It includes such intriguing chapter titles as "Listening to Eddie and Stevo", "A day on the M62", "A day out in Wigan", "The spoilt papers

might win it" and Hazel Says No to Bush and Blair", Hazel once the office tea girl but now the deputy headmistress in an Ashurst school.

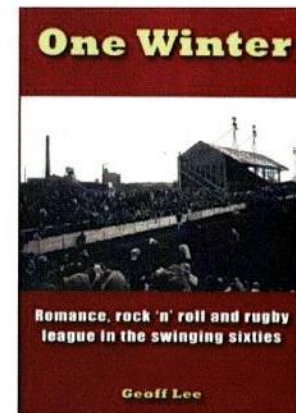
But "E-Mails From Amsterdam" and "A Swedish Affair" indicate that Geoff's tales also come from places far away from the rugby league heartlands while "I was born in Barcelona", manages to link Spain in the 1930s with a small pit village in Durham in the 1980s.

Geoff is half way through writing his sixth novel. It has no title yet although



his first chapter does. It's called "She's A Jehovah's Widnes" while others include "1895 and All That", "News From Heaven" along with "Picasso, Pissaro and Phil's Uncle Jack".

The author Stan Barstow, himself once a draughtsman, said that he



found "One Winter" to be "warm and authentic and an enjoyable read". Tony Collins, the Rugby League historian said it was a novel that rings true with an authentic voice of the northern working class in the 1960s.

Mike Stephenson (Stevo) said "One Autumn was easy to read, highly entertaining and with some very interesting story lines" while Ray French described "Two Seasons" in League Weekly as 'a terrific read'.

All three books have been published by London League Publications who have also published a number of player biographies and novels including "Rugby Football: A United Game". This is based on the idea of what might have happened if the northern clubs had been in the majority in 1895.

Started playing when I was 6 for the Raymond Terrace Roosters.

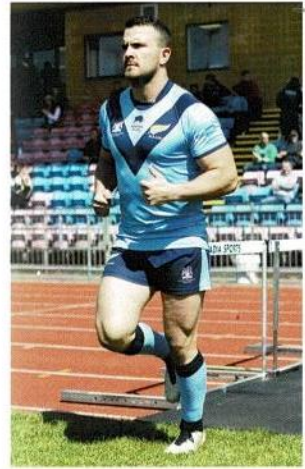
WHAT HAVE BEEN YOUR CAREER HIGHLIGHTS?

Dont really have a hero, but as a kid watching



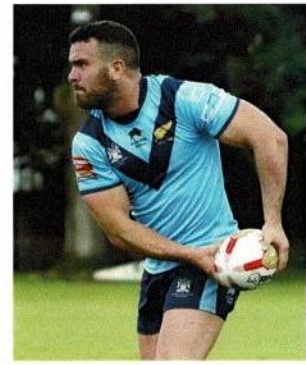
Joey playing for the Knights in my home town of Newcastle would be someone I looked up to.

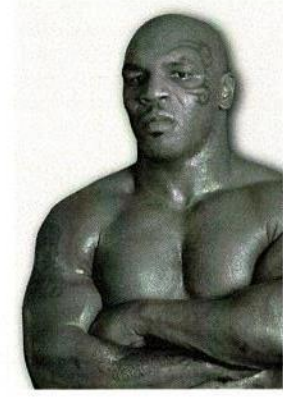

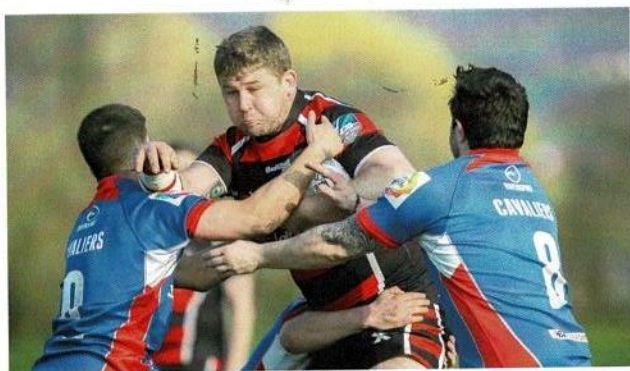
IN THE FOREST, SOMETHING STIRS



The West of England division could be getting a new team in the near future as the Forest of Dean Bulldogs are hoping to take to the field for the first time in a friendly against a Bristol Sonics Development XIII at Bream RFC today.

The Bulldogs have been in training for the past month with over 30 players from three or four local clubs all new to the game participating under the watchful eyes of All Golds community coaches Toby Topham and Jamie Crowther.

Both have been impressed by the toughness and skill of the players who have been quick to pick up the basics of the game. The details will come with experience and that begins this weekend.



The Forest Bulldogs are the brainchild of Bream RFC's Richard Halford and Scott Adams who are hoping

to create a Forest identity for the side and for them to play at various grounds around the area including

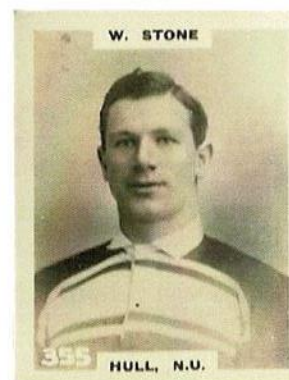
Cinderford, Berry Hill and, of course, Bream.

The hope is that players will graduate towards a professional contract with the All Golds and the side has already developed links with the Golden Fern that will bring help and advice as the club finds its feet. Both Halford and Adams believe that the two codes of rugby can coexist in the area. Adams said: "It was never our intention to create a union versus league battle, far from it.

"We actually see it as an opportunity for clubs to get involved, and we would like to hold the friendly games this season around different venues in order to utilise facilities during our summer season, and to grow our player and fan base.

"The fitness and skill set is transferable to union, so for those players that don't need a break during summer, it's an excellent opportunity."

The game is no stranger to the Forest of Dean as



Lydney's Regentsholme ground hosted two All Golds games in 2013, while playing talent has long been prized by northern rugby league clubs.

During the first half of the 20th Century, a series of players left the mines and fields of the Forest to head north to earn money from their rugby talent. Many have been featured in the pages of the All Golds programme and include Arthur Smith from Yorkley nicknamed "Mad Arthur" owing to his enthusiastic and forceful style of play and Jack Read and his brother Henry who played with distinction for Oldham and Rochdale Hornets respectively.

There was also Lewis Bradley from Cinderford and Billy Stone who was a blacksmith from Bream. Stone went to Hull and starred for the Airlie Birds between 1919 and 1927 playing 222 times and also earning six England and four Great Britain caps. He followed in the footsteps of William Holder who also left the village for East Yorkshire in the years immediately after the First World War.

More recently, All Golds prop Brett Scriven began his career with Bream before moving on to Lydney and then swapping codes to join the Golden Fern at the turn of the year.

But back to the Bulldogs who are looking to play more friendlies this summer



and early next year in preparation for entry into the West of England league in the summer of 2016.

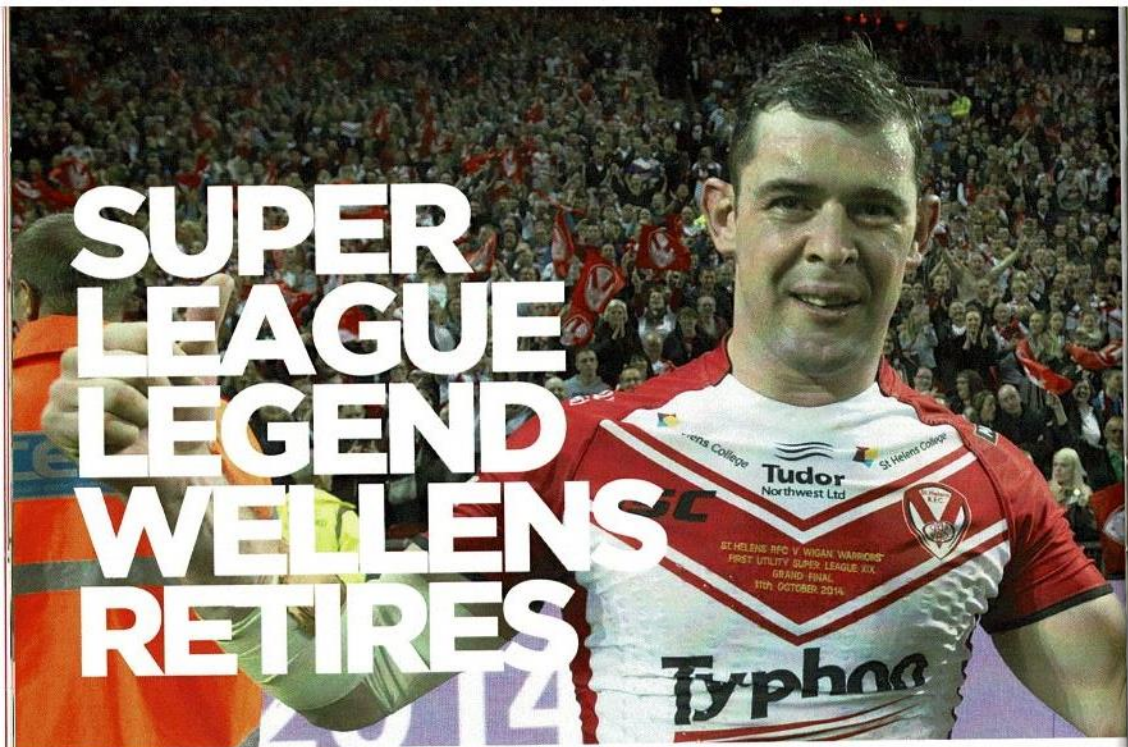
If successful, they will join Bath & Wiltshire Romans, Cheltenham Phoenix, Bristol Sonics and the Gloucestershire Warriors at the base of the player pathway towards the All Golds.

Rugby league is also at the heart of ambitious plans to develop the facilities at Bream RFC. Land is to be sold for housing and the existing pitches are to be levelled and relaid with a new clubhouse built that would be available for use by the community all year round.

With a long and glorious history behind it, rugby league in the Forest of Dean looks to have a promising future as well.

SUPER LEAGUE LEGEND WELLENS RETIRES



Young players dream of the career that Wellens had. This week he said goodbye to his home town club after 16 years loyal service.

He made his St Helens debut when the Spice Girls were at the height of their fame. This week, after 495 appearances for the club, Paul Wellens bowed out. A hip injury sustained in April has forced him into early retirement. He said the problem has been plaguing him on and off the field for the past year, yet he played through the pain barrier with the aim of reaching 500 appearances.



It's a constant reminder of the brutality of this wonderful sport. Injuries

play a massive part - as All Golds Head Coach Lee Greenwood knows only too well. This season his squad

has sustained 3 broken legs and numerous other muscle and head injuries.



The full back, born in the town he'd later go onto serve, played his entire career for the Saints scoring over 1000 points in a career remarkable not just for its longevity but stunning consistency. Last season he captained the club to a League Leaders' shield and Grand Final double.

A former Great Britain international, Wellens is second only to the Leeds captain Kevin Sinfield on Super League's all-time appearance list and will retire having won every domestic honour since making his debut in 1998. Remarkably he won the Lance Todd trophy in successive years after starring in Challenge Cup final victories over Catalans Dragons and Hull FC in 2007 and 2008.

Wellens joined his home town club in 1998. A year later he made his debut. He became renowned for a strong all round game, excelling at taking catches. In 2002, he suffered an injury only 2 minutes into the Grand Final in a game

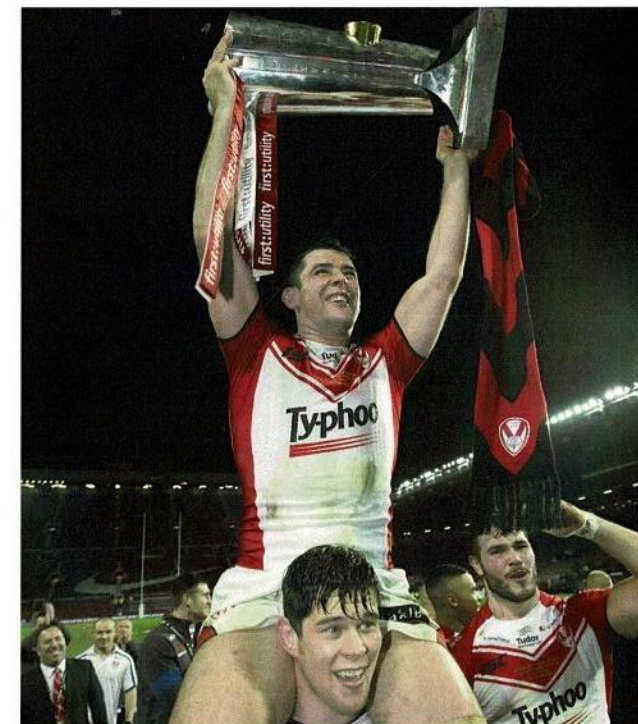
St Helens would go onto win against Bradford Bulls. He would play no further part in the game but vowed to return stronger for the new season. With a point to prove he came back like a man on a mission. He quickly became one of Super League's star players

and made the number 1 jersey his own for both club and country.

In the 2006 season which would see the Saints collect all three major domestic honours, Wellens own form was rewarded with the Rugby League Writer's Association player of the year. 3 years later he was honoured with a testimonial after a decade's service for the Saints.

He retires, aged 35, with the promise of a coaching position at the club next season.

It's not hard to imagine him becoming Head Coach in the near future and starting a new chapter at his beloved Saints.

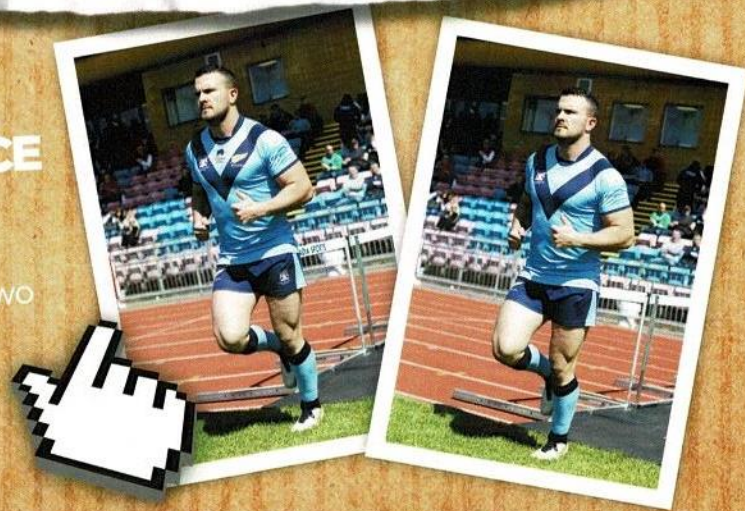

Much like the cup game earlier in the season the game was closely contested with all outcomes possible with 5 minutes remaining. Joe Hambley was the hero for Barrow with a late try that sealed the game after a high quality clash between two evenly matched sides.

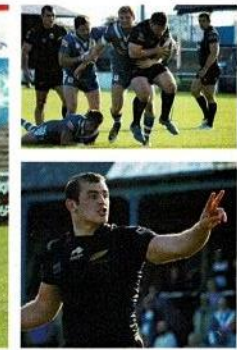
The game was played in bright sunshine unlike the previous encounter where both players and spectators fought against freezing snow and hail showers. Just like that game, the All Golds got off a flying start. Steve Parry, who put in a fantastic captain's performance, started the move when he drove through from dummy half. Matt Bradley, playing in an unfamiliar full back role, then played a superb pass out wide to Lee Mapals who scored his first try for the club. Matt Bradley, from the narrowest of angles, struck a perfect conversion to give the Golden Fern a 6 point lead.

Barrow looked to hit straight back but they were denied by a series of fine tackles. Joe

McClellan and Joel Thomas both made a couple of huge hits to deny the Raiders. The home side, playing into bright sunshine, were frustrated after making a couple of careless handling errors.

They eventually got going and scored two tries through Shane Toal. His first came on 17 minutes when he finished off a fine passing move and dived over in the corner. Josh Ward's conversion barely got airborne as it sliced well wide. Edwin Okanga-Ajwang then picked up a knock on his shoulder which put an end to his game. Danny Fallon came on to replace the former Salford man.

Almost straight from the re-start Toal scored a sensational



solo try. He received the ball in his own 10 metre line and side stepped his marker. He saw space down the wing and he set off on a lung busting run the length of the field. Two All Golds chased in vain but they couldn't get near the winger who touched down. Ward, from out wide, missed again but the home side took the lead at 8-6.

5 minutes before half time the All Golds won a penalty 25 metres in front of the posts. They chose to kick for goal, a decision vindicated when Bradley dissected the posts to draw the two sides level at 8-6.

Only 2 minutes into the second half the All Golds took the lead once more and it was an outstanding score. They broke down the right wing and after a quick play the ball switched sides to the left where Emmerson Whittle sprinted through. He had 2 All Golds with him but he backed himself to beat the Raiders full back. After feigning a pass he left the Raiders man for dead and touched down. Bradley, enjoying a magnificent season with the boot, just missed his conversion.

Barrow replied 5 minutes later when they scored their third try of the game. Hankinson was the man on hand to finish off a

move down the right side. Ward made it a hat-trick of misses when he pushed his conversion wide.

Soon after the Raiders were penalised for holding down at the tackle. From the resulting penalty Matt Bradley missed the upright by inches.

The All Golds were dominating territory but it was Barrow that got the next try. Peter Lupton, on from the bench, broke the line. He still had a covering All Gold player to beat but that didn't stop him from scoring a try all of his own making. Ward finally found the target with his kick to take the home side 18-12 ahead.

The All Golds refused to surrender and drew themselves level as the game went into the final quarter. After being held up on the line on the penultimate tackle, Bradley played a speculative grubber kick. The Raiders player looked sure to collect but the ball bounced over him. Ollie Purslow took advantage of the fortuitous bounce to touch down. Bradley made no mistake with the following conversion as a thrilling contest was once again level at 18-18.

With 15 minutes to go the referee awarded a penalty

to Barrow after a rather dubious offside call. Ward took responsibility and slotted the kick over from 20 metres.

A strong home crowd of 841, confident before the game, were now anxious of being on the end of an upset. Their worries were so nearly confirmed when the All Golds powered towards the Barrow goal line. The All Golds were held up twice on the line in a frantic set.

The decisive score came with only 3 minutes left. Raiders were given a fresh set of six after another dubious decision from the referee. On the last tackle they played a grubber kick and it was Joe Hambley who got on the end of it to win the game for his side. Ward tagged on the extras to give the home side the decisive 8 point cushion. The All Golds pushed all the way but time was against them, Barrow happy to hear the full time hooter.
