





The overall performance had everything that a quality team needs to be successful throughout a full season.



THE focus is on goalkickers this week, given that Lewis Palfrey has reached the 500-point milestone for Oldham.


He also has the distinction of currently being out in front in the Kingstone Press League One's lists of this season's goalkickers and points scorers.

the drop-goal king himself, Neil Roden, who amassed 25 in his years at the club.

Rarely does a season pass when only one player kicks all the goals, but it happened in 2001 when Pat Rich kicked all 146 - a record for the new club, which Mick Nanyn went close to matching with his 139 in

On the flip side no fewer than SEVEN different players landed Roughyeds' goals in 1999 - Farrell, Minut, Brown, Quinlan, Wood, Coates and Salisbury.

And it happened again in 2009 - Ballard, Halliwell, James Coyle, Ashe, Joseph, O'Connor and Baines.

Most goals in a match were Andy Ballard's 13 in a 78-10 win against London Skolars in May, 2009.

Players who have kicked most goals for Oldham in their careers, as opposed to a single season, are as follows:

Pat Rich 303, Lewis Palfrey 226 (and still going strong), Gareth Barber 145, Mick Nanyn 139, Simon

The figures no not necessarily add up to those given in the season-by-season list because some players on that list also kicked goals in seasons when they were not the principal goalkicker.

Tony's ultimate battle in fight to beat cancer

YOU will perhaps have read in the papers, or seen on regional TV programmes, that former Oldham forward Tony Barrow jnr is fighting an aggressive form of cancer after doctors found a brain tumour.

Now aged 43, Tony signed for the old club at Watersheddings as a teenager while his dad, Tony snr, was head coach, writes ROGER HALSTEAD.

He learned his trade in the 'A' team and, as a young up-and-coming forward, played six senior games – four in the autumn of 1990 against Castleford and Hull KR at home and Widnes and Sheffield away.

In the following season, after his dad had left the club, he played twice more against London Crusaders away and Sheffield at home before himself moving on to pastures new at Swinton.

About that time the Barrow family had a massive impact on rugby league in Oldham because Tony snr was in charge of the team during that magnificent season of 1989-90 when he guided the side to promotion from the second division; to the Lancashire Cup final against Warrington; to the Regal Trophy quarter-final; to the Silk Cut Challenge Cup semi-

final; and to that fantastic Division Two play-off final at Old Trafford when the Barrow boys pipped Hull KR 30-29.

The team that day: Platt; Irving, Hyde, Henderson, Lord; Clark, Ford; Casey, Ruane, Fieldhouse, Round, McAlister, Russell. Subs: Newton, Martyn.

I wrote in the Chronicle: "The drama and excitement of Old Trafford was a fitting end to a memorable season in which Oldham won 36 of the 43 games played.

"They were involved in 15 cup-ties; they came desperately close to reaching Wembley for the first time; they were involved in several televised thrillers and First Division big guns Wigan, Widnes and St Helens were all defeated in cup-tie spectaculars."

Those were happy, heady days for the Barrows and for thousands of Oldhamers, who will now wish to be associated with young Tony's biggest battle of all.

Friends and family are rallying round to raise funds for any treatment the father-of-two will have to undergo.

A testimonial game has been played in his home town of St Helens and a fund-raising dinner, a sell-out, was due to be held today at Langtree Park.

Tony has two daughters, Megan (18) and Lucy (15) and a partner, Ann Marie. He is employed as a senior childcare worker and runs his own personal training business

His dad said: "You never, ever think that something like this will happen to you, but it has so we will be facing it head on."

News from HQ

THE Leader of the House of Commons, Chris Grayling MP has sent Parliament's best wishes to everyone who will be celebrating the 120th anniversary of Rugby League in the Founders Walk later this month.

Organised in association with the sport's charity, Rugby League Cares, the Walk takes place over six days from Sunday, July 19 to July 24 and takes in the original home stadiums of the 22 clubs, including Oldham and Rochdale Hornets, that founded the Northern Union on August 29, 1895.

The 120-mile venture gives people the opportunity to raise money for good causes in the sport by walking sections of each day's route, full days or the full 120-mile route.

Responding to a question in the House of Commons by Warrington South MP David Mowat, Mr Grayling paid tribute to the important role Rugby League plays in its communities.

"My honourable friend represents the great northern town of Warrington, where I once stood as a candidate as well, and also visited the local Rugby League team to see it play." he said.

"I'd like to take advantage of this opportunity to wish all of those involved in promoting the anniversary on the walk, the very best in celebrating a sport that has been an important part of our northern communities and continues to be so."

The Founders Walk takes place over six days but anyone wanting to take part can sign up to walk as far as they like on any or all of the route, with each of the days split into smaller stages.

Day 1 (Sunday, July 19): an eight-mile stroll around Hull, starting from



the Walton Street car park and taking in The Boulevard before ending at the KC Stadium.

Day 2 (Monday, July 20): starts at Fartown in Huddersfield and passes through Brighouse, Batley and Dewsbury before reaching Wakefield Trinity at the end of the 20-mile stage.

Day 3 (Tuesday, July 21): covers 24.5 miles between Hunslet and Halifax, taking in Headingley, Manningham, Bradford Park Avenue and Illingworth on the way.

Day 4 (Wednesday, July 22): is 22 miles starting at Rochdale and ending at Edgeley Park, Stockport via Oldham.

Day 5 (Thursday, July 23): 22.5 miles between Wheater Street in Broughton and the DW Stadium in Wigan.

Day 6 (Friday, July 24): walk concludes with a 23-mile stage between Fletcher Street in Warrington and Langtree Park in St Hellens.

NOTE: The Walk in this area leaves Asda, Rochdale at 9.30am, taking in the blue plaque at Watersheddings, and then continuing to Stockport. Highlighted on the route map are Kingsway Park High School in Rochdale; Watersheddings St; Waterhead ARLFC; and Hathershaw College; perhaps calling points where walkers can join the group.



Memories are made of this...

By Roger Halstead (in nostalgic mood)

POURING over some rugby league memorabilia from out of the attic, I came across a publication which only older readers will recall – an issue of 'The Rugby League Gazette' from December, 1953 and sold at the princely sum of sixpence.

One of the main articles, by 'Kirkstall', was headed 'Bob Sloman was a great leader...', a fascinating piece in which the writer focused mainly on Sloman's great contribution to the Oldham club, but also referred to a pair of his fellow West Country forwards, Tom Woods and Walter Roman, who signed for Rochdale Hornets.

Sloman was quoted at length about playing in four successive Challenge Cup finals in the years 1924-25-26-27 and offered this observation on life at Watersheddings: "The complete rugby league player needs the dedication of a Trappist monk."

I've been an Oldham fan now for the best part of half a century, but in the days when this particular Gazette was hitting the streets I was a Rochdale Hornets nut — a schoolboy who lived for Saturday afternoon and a trip to the Athletic Grounds.

In the pursuit of fair play on derby day, therefore, I will give you snippets from both clubs as published in the 1953 Gazette under 'club gossip'.

OLDHAM: Oldham have been criticised recently as not being fit, but sprinter-coach Frank Handley shouldn't worry about these comments. Oldham are not lacking pep, but a plan.

From being one of the most strikingly unorthodox teams two years ago, rising to fifth place in the table, they have lost their guile. The return to more orthodox methods has given the wrong impression that they don't know how to run.

Oldham were said to be producing too much

'fancy stuff' during their brighter period. Now, their supporters realise that 'plain' fare is even less palatable.

It is the absence of Daley that has made Oldham sluggish in passing, for he had an excellent understanding with Stirrup straight from the scrums. Deputy Feather is too much an individual player and the backs seem stifled. But Feather is a Watersheddings hero because of his versatility and the few supporters who travelled to Whitehaven agreed his display as deputy full-back for Ganley earned him the man-of-the-match laurels.

ROCHDALE H: Remember the lads of the Dover Patrol, who manned the motor torpedo boats, and the great job they did?

Rochdale Hornets have one of them in their team, and he has brought into the rugby league game the alertness he and his mates had to show in their hazards in the English Channel.

He is ex-Seaman Bernard McNally, their Welsh loose-forward, probably one of the best bargains any club has made in post-war football.

When Cardiff disbanded, top-scorer Bernard was one of the assets of the disastrous Welsh venture which were taken over by the Rugby League, and it was the League which received the modest £100 from the Hornets for his transfer.

Several other clubs have since kicked themselves because they didn't see in McNally the biggest bargain in the remnant sale.

A soccer player until he was introduced to rugby union in the Navy, he returned to civilian life and a place in the pack of the Cardiff Dockers RU team.

I can see him now at the Athletic Grounds... ah well, those were the days!

"A die-hard rugby fan has penned a book about his love of the sport.

"Craig, whose brothers Wayne and Dave are also keen Oldham fans, moved to North Wales with his wife Yvonne and children Reece and Megan in 2008.


"Wayne now lives in Kent, while Dave is in Napier, New Zealand."



Current Status



The former Barrow Raiders player joined Rochdale in time for their win against Newcastle Thunder and was impressive on debut, with Talbot getting his man at the second time of asking, having tried to lure him to Spotland in pre-season.

The man in charge

lan Talbot is in his third season as Rochdale Hornets boss and was appointed ahead of the 2013 season in which he led the club to their first piece of silverware in 90 years by gaining promotion to the Championship.

He is also the Lead Community Coach at St Helens after coaching the under 20's for a number of years. In his playing days lan was a hooker and enjoyed spells with Wigan Warriors, Wakefield Wildcats and Dewbury

'Tol', as he is referred to around the club, will be looking to guide the Hornets back to the Championship at the first time of asking.

RIP Gordon Haynes, classic loose-forward



IT is with much sadness that we record the passing, aged 86, of the former Oldham and Swinton loose-forward

Gordon Haynes.

The former
Orford Tannery
(Warrington)
junior joined

from

Oldham

Swinton during the 1959-60 season to replace Len McIntyre who, earlier that season, had filled the No 13 jersey, but had then moved to the front-row to play at hooker, where he became something of a Watersheddings legend.

Gordon Haynes made his Oldham debut against Dewsbury at Wateersheddings on December 19, 1959 in a league championship match which Oldham won 46-7.

He only played 11 first-team matches in the famous red and white hoops because he was plagued by knee problems which


resulted in him leaving the club at the end of his debut season.

Earlier in his career, while at Swinton, he played for a Rugby League X111 against New Zealand at

Odsal and for Great Britain
against France,
also at Odsal,
although at that
time, 1955-56,
Test caps were
not awarded for
matches against
the French.

While his playing career at Watersheddings was curtailed early, due largely to knee problems, Gordon Haynes had already built a distinguished rugby league career as one of the best ballhandling loose-forwards of his era in the British game.

A WORD FROM THE EDITOR

MUCH is made in the media, and I admit to when he wins the toss. being as guilty as most, of the Whitebank slope and its influence on performances and results.

I took the opportunity last Sunday, therefore, while interviewing Scott during the ORSA 'do' in the hospitality suite, to ask Oldham's head coach about the slope's importance and how best the Roughyeds use it.

'Slope? What slope?' was the gist of the reply from the man himself.

Scott basically went on to say that the Whitebank pitch was no more, no less than a patch of grass, like any other patch of grass, that his boys used for training on Saturday mornings and for playing on Sundays.

The geographics of the pitch, to coaching staff and squad, are an irrelevance.

Scott said: "We never talk about it, and it's not something that Lewis Palfrey even considers

"We play the same way whether we are attacking the bottom end of the ground or the clubhouse end of the ground. If it was a 1 in 10 gradient it wouldn't make any difference, either.

"Start concerning yourself with things like that and it can easily become just as much a negative as a positive.

"Other coaches might disagree with our approach. They're entitled to their opinion, obviously, and if they factor the so-called slope into their game plan that's entirely up to them.

"There may well be factors which, on any given day, Lewis (Palfrey) would take into consideration if he wins the toss, but I can assure you the slope isn't one of them."

So there you have it... time for me to 'slope' off in search of something else to write about.
