



ITALIAN international Richard Lepori is back at Whitebank to strengthen Scott Naylor's squad for the promotion push.

Full-back Lepori (23) has signed on a deal to the end of the season. He links up again with many of the players who were his Roughveds team mates in 2013.

Still here are Josh Crowley, Adam Files, Sammy Gee, Kenny Hughes, Phil Joy, Danny Langtree, Steven Nield. Lewis Palfrey, Liam Thompson and Michael Ward.

Said chairman Chris Hamilton: "When we discovered he was available we worked hard to get the deal over the line as quickly as possible. The timing is spot-on. given that unlucky Steven Nield is out for the rest of the

Chuffed to get his man for the second time in two and a half years, Scott said of 'Lippy': "He was one of our best players in my first season at Whitebank.

"He's a massive addition to the squad — a quality signing.

"His arrival makes my selection job tougher, but with quality options that's just how I like it.

"We keep topping up here and there and we should soon have Tom Ashton back after injury, which will also be a major boost.

"That will be like having two new players, not one."

Lepori wasn't available for the 32-6 win at London Skolars because he was with the Italian squad in the Ukraine that weekend, but he was back in his old familiar role in Wrexham last Sunday when we recorded our seventh win in a row by beating Crusaders 23-6.

It was while he was starring at Whitebank two years ago that 'Lippy' won his first Italian cap.

He learned his trade as a youngster at Salford and Castleford before shooting to prominence at Oldham in his first year of senior rugby.

One of Scott's early signings for the club, he played in 22 of the Roughyeds' 24 games in 2013, scoring 12 tries to finish third in the club's try lists behind Jon Ford (21) and Adam Files (15).

He was a leading player in a young side that finished only two points behind leaders North Wales Crusaders, who won automatic promotion.

Rochdale, in third place, were nine points behind Naylor's boys, who they beat in the play-off final, which was Lepori's last game in Oldham colours at the end of his first stint here.

He headed off to Far North Queensland in a region best known for snakes and crocs and spent a year there, playing rugby and working on a farm, before coming

home and signing for Whitehaven, which was to prove no more than a stepping stone on his route back to

"For me, there'll be no better place to do that than at Oldham.



CHAT WITH

WELCOME once again to Whitebank Stadium for yet another big game. How many times has that been said this season? They just keep coming don't they?

The fact that they do, of course, is entirely down to the way the team has performed on the pitch - and that commitment, desire and skill was never more evident than last week at Wrexham.

We took on, and totally outplayed, a very good North Wales Crusaders team that, I think it's fair to say, were expecting a win.

Having beaten us twice at Whitebank this season, it was perhaps understandable that they were confident, but what they didn't reckon with was an Oldham team that is getting better and better each week.

That progress isn't necessarily all down to improved skills and players adjusting to systems. For me, we have seen a much more mature mental approach to games this year when compared to previous years.

I've said for a long time that our most dangerous opponent is ourselves and I still believe that. If we play as well as we can, we are a very dangerous team.

As I said earlier, today's match should be another cracker. First v second, a chance for us to avenge our defeat at Cougar Park earlier this season and a chance to knock off another game in the countdown to the end of the regular season.

We know how tough Keighley will be. They will also recognise what an important game this is for them also. It should be a cracker.

Last Sunday I had nerves similar to those I get in the build-up to a Grand Final. That isn't a good thing for me and. as I write these notes, my stomach is churning-again just thinking about the Keighley game. That can't be right can it?

One thing is for sure; the 17 lads in red and white will be giving it their all. Get behind them and hopefully cheer on the Roughyeds to another win in a big game. They don't come much bigger than this one.



Talks continue with supporter groups

ANOTHER meeting will be held on Monday, August 10 as talks continue with supporter groups concerning the club's future and the possibility of supporter involvement in the club's ownership.

This statement was circulated to local media outlets after the last meeting on July 13:

OLDHAM RLFC (1997) Ltd, and its owner/ chairman Chris Hamilton, have had another meeting with ORSA (Oldham Roughyeds Supporters' Association), Rugby Oldham (Supporters' Trust) and a group of independent fans to further discuss issues relevant to the club's future

These include ground development at Whitebank; better communication with fans via a new, superior website and more vigorous use of social media; and exhaustive talks into the possibility of supporter involvement in the club's ownership.

Mr Hamilton has said many times in the past that he would welcome talks with any interested parties and from that stance he has never wavered.

ORSA say their 'modus operandi' is to directly support the club, coaching staff and players. Being involved in part ownership of the parent club is not within their remit, although certain individuals in the association could be interested when more details emerge.

Rugby Oldham, on the other hand, is interested in opening dialogue with the club regarding potential involvement in ownership but if talks were to ever reach the stage of a particular scheme becoming a practical proposition, the Trust's board would need to seek approval from its membership. It already has a mandate to open preliminary discussions.

Mr Hamilton was not in a position at that stage to report any progress on ground development, but he hoped to be in the not too distant future.

In the meantime, Rugby Oldham will be seeking advice and guidance from Supporters' Direct, the national organisation to which it is affiliated, and Mr Hamilton will consider a timeline for further talks with the Trust's board.

The club can also announce that a new and upgraded website will be established in consultation with the RFL's communications department and, in particular, with its web and social media expert Adam Treeby.

From Watersheddings to Whitebank Oldham Rugby League Memoir

THE following is Phil Caplan's review of the above book, published in the July edition of the rugby league magazine, 'Forty20':

IN his memoir 'From Watersheddings to Whitebank', author Craig Halstead – son of esteemed long-time Evening Chronicle rugby league reporter Roger – pens the dedication to 'Oldham rugby league fans past and present – Keep the Faith!'. At times it must have been hard for them to do that.

Halstead charts his journey from going to his first game, aged five in 1971. He followed a side that were founder members of the Northern Union, but by then on a slope where the disappointments — not least going into liquidation and losing their spiritual home at the, invariably freezing, Watersheddings — outweighed albeit memorable highlights; most of those in the 1980s.

As he says in his introduction: "It has been said, only partly in jest, that although a man can change his wife, his politics or his religion, he can never change his favourite team". The essence of this personal crusade.

The Challenge Cup has presented him with the most pain, Oldham being one of the few long-established clubs never to play at Wembley. Four times during his 20s they contested semi-finals but lost them all, the one in 1990 courtesy of a hotly-disputed, disallowed try.

In an entertaining look at life away from the sporting glamour, Halstead notes that his lifetime indulgence has seen him witness: "... many fine matches, terrific players, funny incidents and allowed him to meet some amazing characters."

They are all of them captured in this enjoyable book.

TIME TO FOCUS ON THE NEW BOYS



Will comes with Hope that he can lend a helping hand

WILL Hope, the former Salford forward, has played once previously for Oldham and that was in Scott Naylor's first game in charge on March 3, 2013.

It was an inauspicious start for the coach who has since led Roughyeds to two Grand Finals and, currently, to the top of League One.

Roughyeds went down 48-12 at the Wrexham home of North Wales Crusaders in the Northern Rail Cup and Hope was on the bench with Michael Ward, Adam Files and his Red Devils colleague Jordan Walne.

In the same year Hope went on to play three Super League games for Salford, while the year after he went out on loan to Sheffield Eagles and played a dozen times for the Championship club, during which time he was called up to the Ireland squad.

He went on to play for Ireland in the European Championships, but then chose to take time out from the sport.

He said: "I enjoyed my time at Sheffield, but I turned down a contract offer because just then I had other things I needed to do and I had decided to have a break from rugby league.

"I started on scholarship at Salford when I was 12 and I turned pro when I was 16. I was at Salford a long time. I worked my way through the Academy to the first team, but when they were able to spend a lot of money I knew I wouldn't get in the side and they let me go to Sheffield on loan.

"It was great over there, but I needed a break and now I feel much better for it.

"I know Scott and 'Spanner' well and if I can help them out I will be happy to do it. I'll certainly do the best I can for them."

Said Oldham boss Scott Naylor: "I tried to sign Will last year when he left Salford, but he wanted some time out, like Adam Neal did before we signed him.

"However, he's been looking to get back into the game for a while, and I've been talking to him on and off behind the scenes for the past couple of months.

"He comes from a Super League club with all the attributes you need. I rate him highly.

"He's been keeping himself fit so after a couple of weeks of training with us he'll be ready to go.

"If we see the same Will Hope as the one who left Salford we've got ourselves a very good player indeed.

"Three clubs in our division were chasing him when he left Salford, plus another two in the Championship.

"We've done well to get a player of his calibre and the fact that he's chosen to come to Oldham is a feather in the club's cap. It says a lot about the club that we can attract players like Will."

Elliot 'born into rugby league'


ELLIOT Liku is looking forward "massively" to the opportunity at Oldham to prove he is ready for the step-up to senior rugby.

The 19-year-old prop, who has captained Leigh Centurions reserves this season, has arrived at Whitebank on loan after causing quite a stir with his man-of-the-match performance against Scott Naylor's men in a pre-season friendly.

The young man remembers it well.

He said: "I've known Scott well for a long time. And when he brought his team to Leigh for a friendly in pre-season he said he would tell his Oldham forwards to run at me all the time.

"I thought he was joking, but I soon discovered he meant it all right. Anyway, I think I did okay in the game and I think it was on the back of



my performance that day that I've ended up at Oldham now.

"One of the big factors in my agreeing to the loan was the opportunity to play for Scott and to gain experience in his team."

Born in Billinge, Elliot is the son of Tau Liku, who played for Leigh for several seasons in the 1990s and also played for Tonga in the 1995 World Cup.

At various times of his rugby development in Leigh, he has played for Leigh East, Leigh Miners and Leigh RU Club.

Scott was coach of the rugby union club's first team when Ellliot was playing for one of the age-group sides.

He said: "I was never interested in football or other sports — just rugby. I suppose it was in my blood. I think I was born into it.

"I played a bit in the development sides at Centurions and then I signed properly when I was 18. I'm contracted until November this year.

"In the meantime I'm looking forward to helping Oldham to reach their goal for the season which I know is promotion. If I can play a part in that, bring it on."

Outside of rugby, Elliot is studying for a degree in sports coaching at Wigan and Leigh College.

"I've watched him grow up," said Scott. "I know him very well.

"He propped against us in a pre-season friendly. He got the man-of-the-match award.

"He's captain of Leigh's second team. He's ready to make the step up to senior level and I have every confidence in the lad to do a good job for us.

"We're on the last leg of the season and we badly needed another prop. We only had four and that puts us right on the border line."

"We need five at least going into the business end of the season with six league games left and then at least one play-off game, if not more.

"With five props I can rotate four from five and one of them can always have a rest. Elliot's arrival will enable me to do that, and I think it's important."

Working on the 3 Rs . . . rugby, Roughyeds, Roma project

Tuesday nights were for over-16s, Thursday nights for under-16s and on each night there were opportunities for people to play football, rugby, basketball, tennis, table tennis, cricket, rounders and dodgeball.

Created by Newall, these sessions were designed to help participants master a variety of skills, not only in each of the different sports, but also incorporating life skills such as communication, coordination, decision making, problem solving and help with speaking English.

Said Danny: "Their English-speaking improved significantly and that will help them more than anything to get ahead in this country.

"Chris Hamilton (Oldham RLFC chairman) was the driving force behind this community project and he and the club deserve a huge thank-you for giving an opportunity to those who wouldn't normally have it, to regularly partake in sporting activity.

"We had 40 people attending over the two nights, each week, and we gave them all a big surprise one night when Rory, the club mascot, put in an appearance. He was certainly a huge hit.

"I was impressed by their fantastic attitude and respect for me and what we were doing as a club; their eagerness to learn and try new things; and their friendly and competitive regard for sport.

"Their English improved too and that will be a massive positive for them.

"The group also made a lot of progress in playing football, so much so that Guga, their community leader and a former professional footballer, has put plans in place to start a new football team in this area for under 16s."

The project doesn't finish there, however, because a cookery-based education course will be up and running in September, using the cooking school at Oasis Academy Oldham.





Lizzie welcomes more cardiac screening

LIZZIE Jones, wife of former Keighley Cougars player Danny Jones, has welcomed the news that cardiac screening is to become compulsory in all three of Rugby League's professional and semi-professional competitions.

Details of the plan to extend compulsory screening from First Utility Super League to the Kingstone Press Championship and League 1 were outlined at the RFL annual meeting in Leigh.

Lizzie, whose husband collapsed and died from heart failure triggered by an undetected heart defect while playing for Keighley against London Skolars in May, attended the meeting at Leigh Sports Village, where she praised the decision.

"I would like to congratulate all the Championship and League 1 clubs on their decision to conduct cardiac screening with their players," said Lizzie, who was given a standing ovation by delegates.

"Anything the game can do to minimise the chance of another family experiencing what we have gone through has to be welcomed.

"I would also like to say a big 'thank you' to everyone involved in Rugby League for the support they have given to me, my twins and my family: we couldn't have got through this without you

"We are enormously grateful for everything you have done for us, it's been overwhelming. The

support of the Rugby League family has given us the strength to rebuild our lives without Danny."

Cardiac screening has been compulsory for all Super League players since 2012 while Championship and League 1 clubs have been advised to regard the procedure as "best practice." However, following consultation with clubs at their recent competition meetings, the RFL is now making screening mandatory for all Championship and League 1 clubs from 2016.

RFL Chairman Brian Barwick said: "It was very moving to hear Lizzie speak so eloquently about her life since the tragic loss of Danny and we were pleased that she was able to attend the meeting.

"The clubs are very supportive of the cardiac screening programme and of the need to do all they can to protect their players' welfare.

"It goes without saying that we wish Lizzie, her twins Bobby and Phoebe, her wider family and her friends the very best. We will continue to provide what support we can in the months and years ahead."

Cougars on a mission in memory of Danny

WHATEVER the final outcome, the Cougars 2015 season will be forever overshadowed by the tragic death of Danny Jones.

A Welsh international half-back, Danny sadly passed away after suffering a cardiac arrest on the field during a league game at London Skolars in May.

In the months that followed, nearly £300,000 has been raised to swell a trust fund that has been set up in his memory for his twins, Bobby and Phoebe.

Prior to Danny's death, Cougars won their first four league fixtures, during which Danny reached the milestone of 1,000 points for the club in the win at Hemel Stags in April.

The week after he died, 4,066 spectators crammed into Cougar Park to watch James Feather grab a hat-trick to inspire Cougars to a 52-10 win against Coventry Bears.

A season's first league defeat by Swinton would spark Cougars on to a further five victories, including home wins against promotion rivals Oldham (32-24) and Rochdale Hornets, either side of a welcome away win against bogey side Barrow Raiders.

An away defeat by North Wales followed before Paul March's men got back on track with unconvincing victories against Oxford and Coventry.

Then Swinton inflicted another defeat on the Cougars prior to last Sunday's home win against Newcastle Thunder.

THE COACH

Paul March is into his third season as playercoach. Despite a disappointing first season which saw the side narrowly avoid relegation from the Championship, March led Cougars to a 2014 Challenge Cup quarter-final clash at Widnes Vikings.


A controversial relegation followed, though, as a result of the much-publicised dual-registration saga with Batley Bulldogs.


THREE TO WATCH



Squad of 23 for final push

Partner club Huddersfield Giants have recalled their loan and dual-reg players due to a large injury list, but Roughyeds believe they are adequately covered for the run-in following the recent captures of Richard Lepori and Jon Ford, the anticipated return from injury of Tom Ashton and the latest signings of Liku and Hope.

Steve Nield is waiting for knee surgery and has accepted that he will not play again this season.

With the signing drawbridge having gone up, Naylor has 20 players of his own available to him, plus Ford (Salford), Liku (Leigh) and David Hewitt (St Helens), who are on loan.
