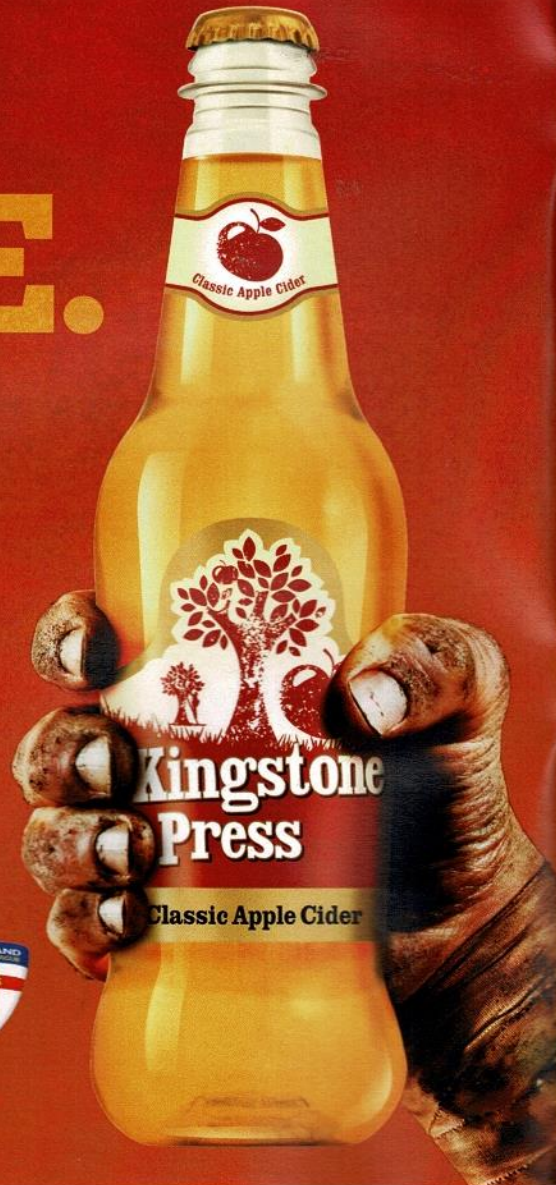

All that said, we are also in good form and playing good rugby so we too are confident going into today's game.

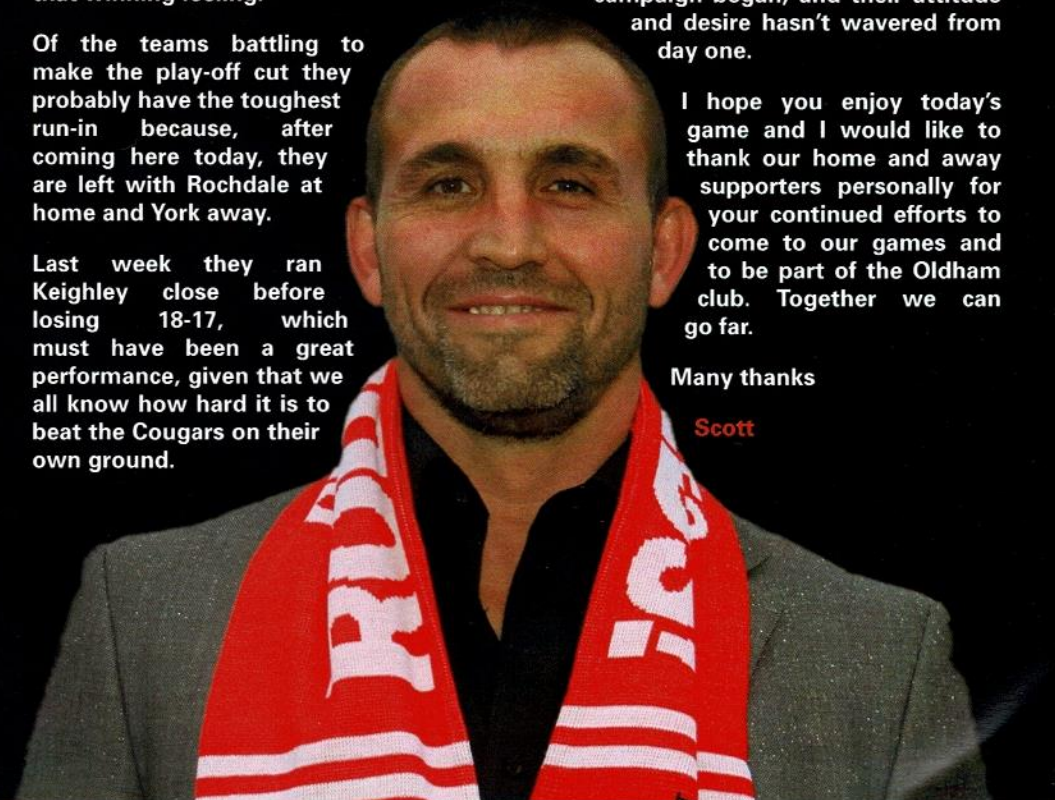
Since the defeat by North Wales in early June, we have once again made Whitebank an extremely difficult place for a visiting side to come and play and today will be no exception.

Points-machine Palfrey tops the charts and equals a club record

LEWIS Palfrey's 11 goals and three tries at Hemel confirmed his status as the most prolific gatherer of points in Kingstone Press League One.

His 34 points at Pennine Way also equalled the Oldham club's all-time record for most points scored by an individual in a single match.

Abe Johnson's 30 in a win against Widnes at Watersheddings stood from 1928 to 2009 when Andy Ballard scored 34 with 13 goals and two tries in a 78-10 win against London Skolars at the New River Stadium on May 2.

Five months later, in September of the same year, Chris Baines excelled with four tries and nine goals in a 54-30 win against Hunslet at Boundary Park to match Ballard's achievement.

Now it's been equalled again thanks to Palfrey's hat-trick of tries and 11 goals in table-topping Oldham's 70-6 win at Hemel – the biggest win in Scott Naylor's three seasons here as head coach.

Said Lewis: "I'm proud and privileged to become one of three joint record holders, but at the same time I'm gutted because the one conversion I missed, after Danny Langtree scored our second try, was an absolute sitter."

The 25-year-old Oldham captain will lead his side into battle against Barrow at Whitebank today, having kicked more League One goals (95) and amassed more points (235) than any other player in the division.

Barrow's Josh Ward is second with 78 goals and Paul Crook of Rochdale is Palfrey's nearest challenger on points with 199.

Taking the sport as a whole and encompassing

all competitions, only Martyn Ridyard of Leigh Centurions, with 146, has landed more goals than Palfrey's 116 – eight more than Ryan Shaw of Bradford Bulls and ten more than Kevin Sinfield of Leeds Rhinos.

Palfrey says it is a "pleasure and a privilege" to captain an Oldham team that tops the division with four points to spare and can boast the longest winning run of the 38 clubs in Super League, the Championship and League One.

Halifax's 14-0 defeat by Widnes Vikings in round one of the Super 8s (Qualifiers) ended their winning streak at nine and left Roughyeds way out in front with ten, followed by League One rivals Swinton (seven wins) and York (six).

Scott Naylor's men have amassed more points, 708, than any other side in the division, despite the coach's insistence that defence will determine where Oldham finish.

Palfrey is regarded more as a maker of tries than a scorer of them, but his hat-trick at Hemel took his overall total for the season so far to 11 – more than he scored in 2013 and 2014 put together.

In terms of club records for points in a season, Palfrey's 277 to date has already beaten Andy Ballard's 254 in 2009, but he still trails Mick Nanyin, the 'new' Oldham club's record holder with 362 in 2008 and Pat Rich, who finished with 320 in 2001.

Nanyin did it in 32 games and Rich in 34 so bearing in mind that Palfrey has made 23 appearances so far this season, he is right up there with them if you calculate his stats on a pro-rata basis.

Elevenses' is the next target

Last week, up at Newcastle, it was a completely different proposition.

I was rather apprehensive on the journey up there as I knew Stanley Gene would have them fired up following their defeat at Gloucester the previous week.

He sure did – and the game was in the balance for a long time until we scored decisive points at the end.

Your backing of the team is so important. Today, we should have a healthy attendance and you can play your part. Get behind the lads and hopefully we can knock off another game with a win.

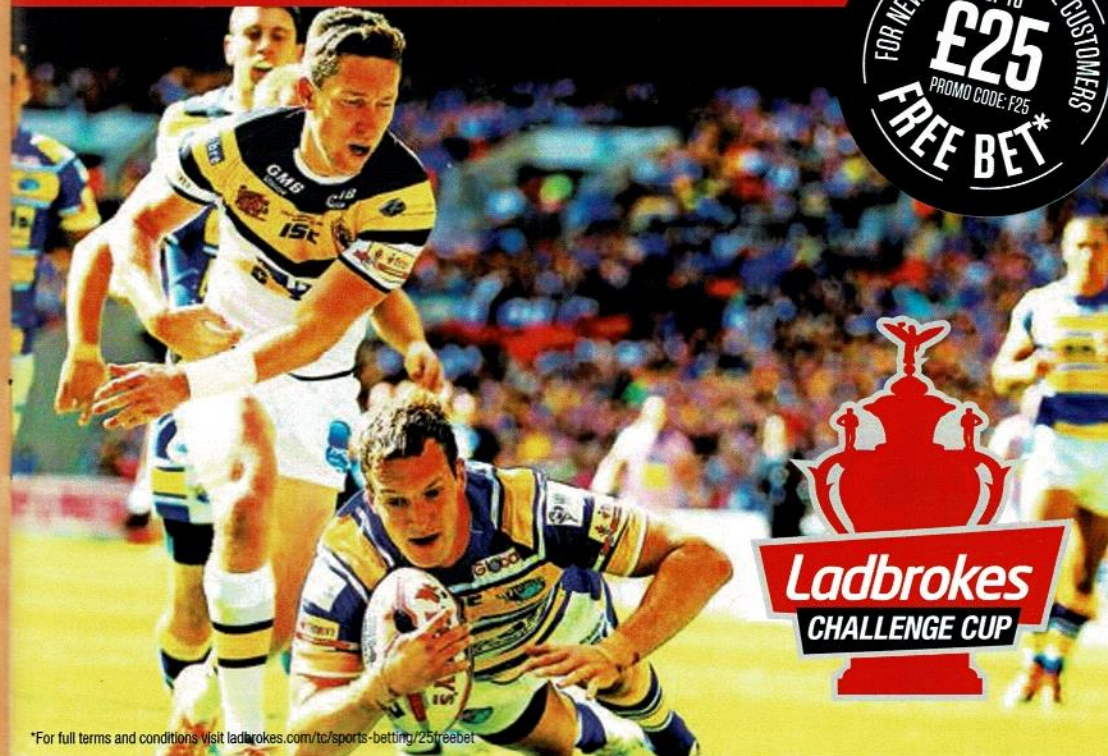

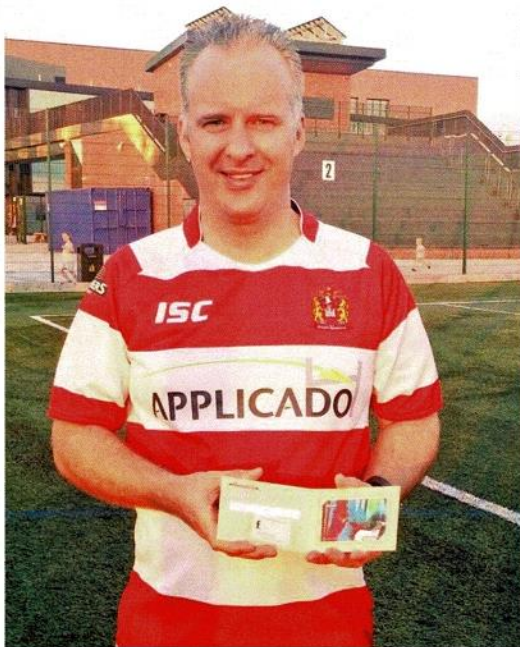

Focus on today's match sponsor

NEIL Gibbison, our match sponsor today, has restored the smile on the faces of more rugby league players than he has had hot dinners.

He was Oldham RLFC's club dentist from 1984 to the year 2000 when he moved to Cumbria, supposedly to enjoy semi-retirement.

Fifteen years on, he is working full time and harder than ever in the dental department of three separate hospitals in Barrow, Workington and Whitehaven, while settled in Millom which, he tells us, is "just across the estuary" from Barrow.

He still retains a keen interest in the Roughyeds, occasionally driving down to Whitebank but never missing an Oldham game at Craven Park, the Recreation Ground or Derwent Park and he was even present at the two Challenge Cup ties we have had up in Egremont in recent seasons.

Aged 61, he follows both Oldham Rugby and Oldham Athletic from a distance, but his first love is rugby league and the Roughyeds, for whom he continued to act as club dentist when Oldham RLFC (1997) Ltd succeeded the original

Oldham club following its liquidation in 1997.

Said Neil, who was born in Chadderton: "I keep in close contact with the club via Chris (chairman Chris Hamilton) and I love nothing better than watching Oldham in action whenever I can.

"Both Roughyeds and Athletic have had their ups and downs over the years, but I really enjoy keeping in contact, especially with the rugby club.

"I do miss not being able to watch every game, but with a bit of luck Oldham will get promoted and then they'll be up at Workington and Whitehaven again."

In his 16 years as club dentist, Neil dealt with the players' routine dental care, but on match days he was on hand to deal with all sorts of facial injuries, ranging from broken teeth to broken and dislocated jaws.

He said: "The worst case I ever saw was that of Charlie McAlister, who suffered a double fracture of the jaw. It was complicated and we had a few problems with that one.

"Then there was John Henderson. He was very unlucky. He was always suffering facial injuries, losing teeth or copping one on the jaw."

Oxford game switched to Saturday

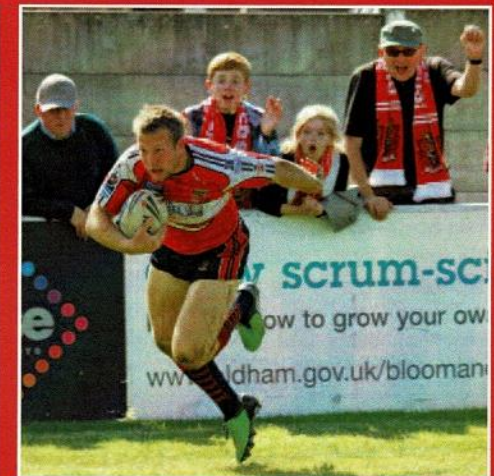
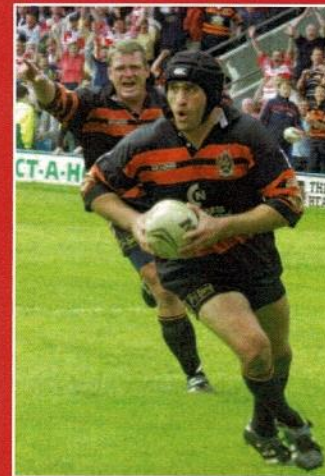

Raiders chasing top-five spot

OLDHAM and Barrow Raiders clash today for the third time this season, the two previous games having been played at Craven Park.

They were both fiercely contested, Roughyeds winning 32-10 in the quarter-final of the iPro Sport Cup on Sunday, March 15 and Raiders reversing things with a 30-18 victory in League One, also at Craven Park, on Saturday, May 9.

Today it's our turn to stage the third meeting here at Whitebank, which will be Barrow's first visit since before Scott and 'Spanner' took charge of the Roughyeds' rudder.

Barrow were last here in the fourth round of the Challenge Cup in April, 2012. We won 26-14 and went on to play St Helens at Langtree Park in the next round. We lost 76-0, the first of eight losses in a row.

In that same Championship One season of 2012 we beat Barrow here 32-26 on April Fools' Day, only to suffer a heavy, 42-16 defeat at Craven Park in the August.

At the end of that season the top four got promoted – Doncaster, Barrow, Workington and Whitehaven in that order – with the Raiders spending the 2013 and

2014 seasons in the higher division before dropping back down again this year as part of the sport's major restructure.

They found it tough going in the Championship, finishing third bottom in 2013 (eight wins from 26 games) and bottom of the pile in 2014 with only four wins from 26.

So far this season they have won 12 out of 19 and currently sit in sixth place – one beneath the play-off top five – with only three to play: Oldham today, then Rochdale at Craven Park and York away.

If they were to squeeze into the top five at Rochdale's expense they would realistically have to target three wins from three. Anything can happen yet, but if Paul Crarey's men in blue and white were to win today and Rochdale were to come unstuck at home to Keighley it would put a whole new slant on things.

If the reverse were to apply, Raiders would be virtually out of it so they will be desperate to do the business today and, as Scott points out in his notes on page 3 of this issue, that will make them highly-motivated opponents indeed.

Going back to this season, we caught the Raiders on

the hop on a cold day in mid-March when we went up there in the iPro Sport Cup, went 10-0 down inside as many minutes – and then took the game by the scruff of the neck to rattle up 32 unanswered points.

Adam Clay, on the right wing, celebrated his return to his old Craven Park stomping ground, where he was Barrow's top try scorer in 2013, by scoring two tries.

On the other wing Jodie Broughton made his one and only dual-reg appearance for us from Huddersfield Giants and also scored a brace.

Just short of two months later we were back at Craven Park in the league and this time it was a different story, the Raiders prevailing 30-18 to inflict the first of our

three league defeats.

This game was notable for a free-for-all near the end, after which referee Chris Campbell sent off Barrow's Liam Campbell and our own Gareth Owen and placed the whole incident on report.

Subsequently, Owen, George Tyson and Josh Johnson were all suspended together with Barrow's Campbell, each for two matches.

As events turned out, dual-reg Josh Johnson didn't play for us again, but Owen and Tyson both missed the games against Keighley away and North Wales at home, this the last time we were beaten on June 7.

So now it's down to the Oldham v Barrow decider, which promises to be a cracker.

Our 'Adie' will be the happiest man in town

ADRIAN Tierney is in his second season as our club's kit manager. More than that, he is a self-confessed Roughyeds fanatic and has been since he first stumbled across rugby league by chance nearly 30 years ago.

Aged 49 (he celebrated that birthday on the team coach going up to Newcastle last Sunday), he is a character in his own right and, as his new nickname of 'Tucker' would indicate, he is infamous for the number of sausage rolls and meat pies he stacks away on long coach trips while for ever tipping the scales at 11 stone wet through!

Come next Saturday, however, our Adie will be well known to a rather bigger audience. Not only will he be going to Wembley for the first time; he will be out on the famous turf, flying the Oldham RLFC banner on behalf of his club and his town.

Every club will have a representative, but the parade will be led by the 22 founder clubs at the historic meeting at the George Hotel in Huddersfield in 1895 at which the fast, exciting and brilliant sport we know today as Rugby League had its origins.

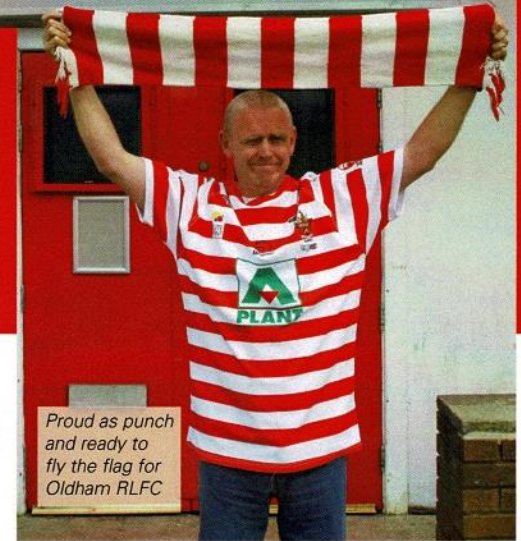
Oldham was one of the original founders so Adrian will be somewhere among the first 22 in the parade of clubs and there won't be a prouder man in the stadium or, indeed, in our capital city.

"It will be a dream come true...a day I'll remember for the rest of my life," said Adrian, who watched his first Oldham game in 1987.

He recalled: "I wasn't particularly interested before then, but I'd be about 21 at the time and the club appealed for volunteers to clean the stands at Watersheddings.

"Two of us turned up and they gave us a ticket for the next home match against Castleford. It was a brilliant game; absolutely enthralling; I was hooked for life and I've watched Roughyeds regularly ever since."

"In fact, when I was asked if I'd be interested by Chris Hamilton (club chairman), I snatched his hand off," said Adrian.

"Nearly two full seasons into the job, I can't believe how brilliant it is. We've got a great chairman, a great set of lads, a fantastic coaching and backroom staff headed by Scott and 'Spanner' and some great supporters, of which I am one.

"If it's left up to me, it will be a long time before anybody else gets the kit manager's job at Whitebank, I'll tell you.

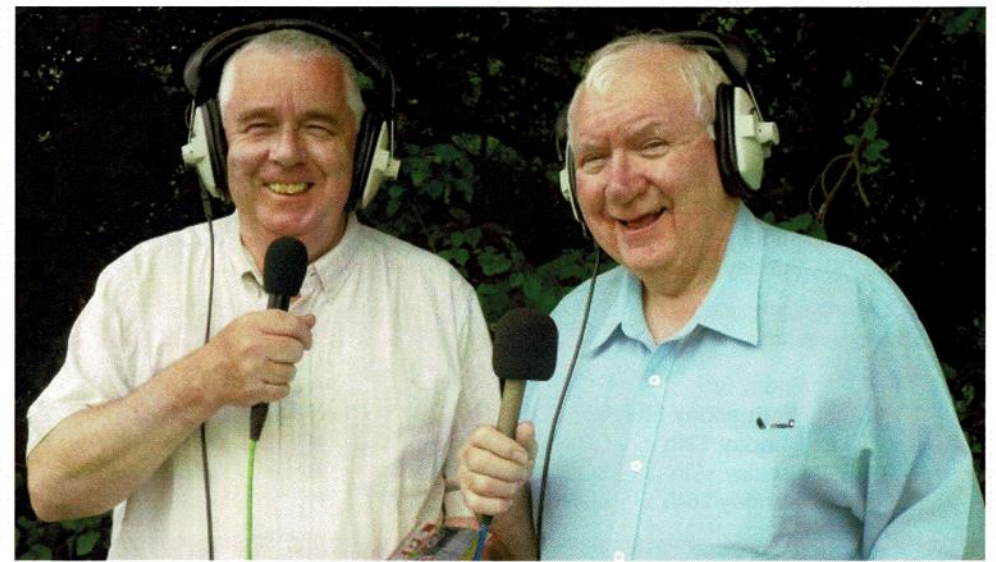
"As for the Wembley trip, I'll be proud and privileged to fly the flag for this club, for this town and for this great sport.

Derek Turner – 'rough, tough and gifted'

THE sincere condolences of everyone at the Oldham club go to the family and friends of the late Derek Turner, a Watersheddings legend, who died three weeks ago in Wakefield at the age of 82.

Known as 'Rocky' throughout the rugby league world, he was a loose-forward of exceptional talent who ranked alongside centre Alan Davies as the best of the best in the great Oldham side that won the sport's Championship Final at Odsal, Bradford in 1957.

During that magical period in the club's history, Turner was feared throughout the sport – at international level, too – as a loose-forward who was rough, tough and exceptionally gifted with ball in hand. He was also renowned as a ferocious tackler.

He signed for Oldham from Hull KR in 1955 and made a total of 134 appearances for the club, scoring 35 tries, before being transferred to Wakefield Trinity in 1958.

The biggest and best of his 134 games in the crack Watersheddings side of the late fifties was that Championship Final at Bradford when Oldham beat Hull 15-14 in front of a crowd of more than 62,000.

At that time, Hull's equally famous loose-forward Johnny Whiteley formed a triumvirate of brilliant British No 13s with Turner and Vince Karalius of St Helens and the Great Britain selectors struggled to decide who was the best, often picking two of them in the second-row with the other at loose-forward.

Both Turner and Whiteley gave outstanding performances in the 1957 final, Oldham prevailing thanks to Colin Hutton's failure to convert a late try for Hull by winger Stan Cowan.

Oldham lined up like this: Ganley; Cracknell, Davies, Ayres, Eddy; Daley, Pitchford; Jackson, Keith, Vines, Little, Winslade, Turner.

With Turner in tow, Oldham also won the Lancashire Cup in 1956, 1957 and 1958.

He won 11 Great Britain caps while at Watersheddings, but his big regret was that Oldham never reached the Challenge Cup final at Wembley.

A WORD FROM THE EDITOR

IN two weeks' time we play our last home game of the regular Kingstone Press League One campaign and if any club, chairman, team or coaching staff deserved to have the backing of their biggest crowd of the year then it must surely be Oldham.

Scott and the boys have entertained us superbly over the last few months, not only by playing winning rugby but by playing crowd-pleasing rugby and by scoring lots of tries, goals and points.

We command a four-point lead at the top of the table; Lewis Palfrey heads the League One goals and points charts; we've scored more points to date, 708, than any other team in the division (to meet deadlines this had to be written before last Thursday's York v North Wales game); and we currently enjoy the sport's longest winning run.

Unbeaten since June 7 when Crusaders won at Whitebank, we've accumulated ten wins in a row and need only one more today to equal the 'new' club's record of 11 straight wins, set back in 2001 when Mike Ford was coach.

Talking of crowds, it will be interesting to see what today's attendance reaches, given that the 725 and the 888 for the last two home games against Rochdale and Cougars respectively were each the biggest of the season so far.

Indeed, the 888 figure was the best for two years, raising a realistic hope that, perhaps today or if not then at the Swinton game, we can top 1,000 supporters for the first time since 2013.

If Newcastle can hit four figures, as they did last week when we were the visitors, then Oldham surely can. So put out a rallying call among friends, neighbours, work mates and family members and ask them to come on down and give this Oldham side a cheer as they enter the final push for promotion.

It's the least they deserve, isn't it?
