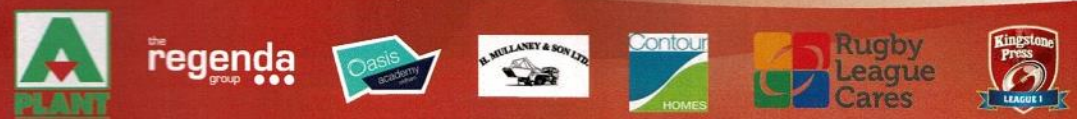

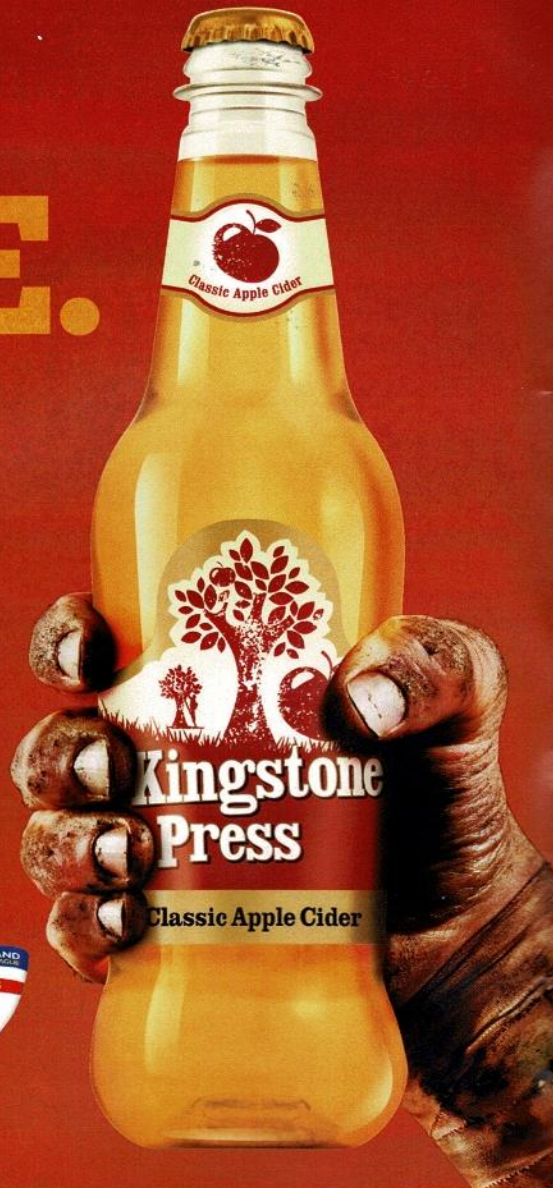

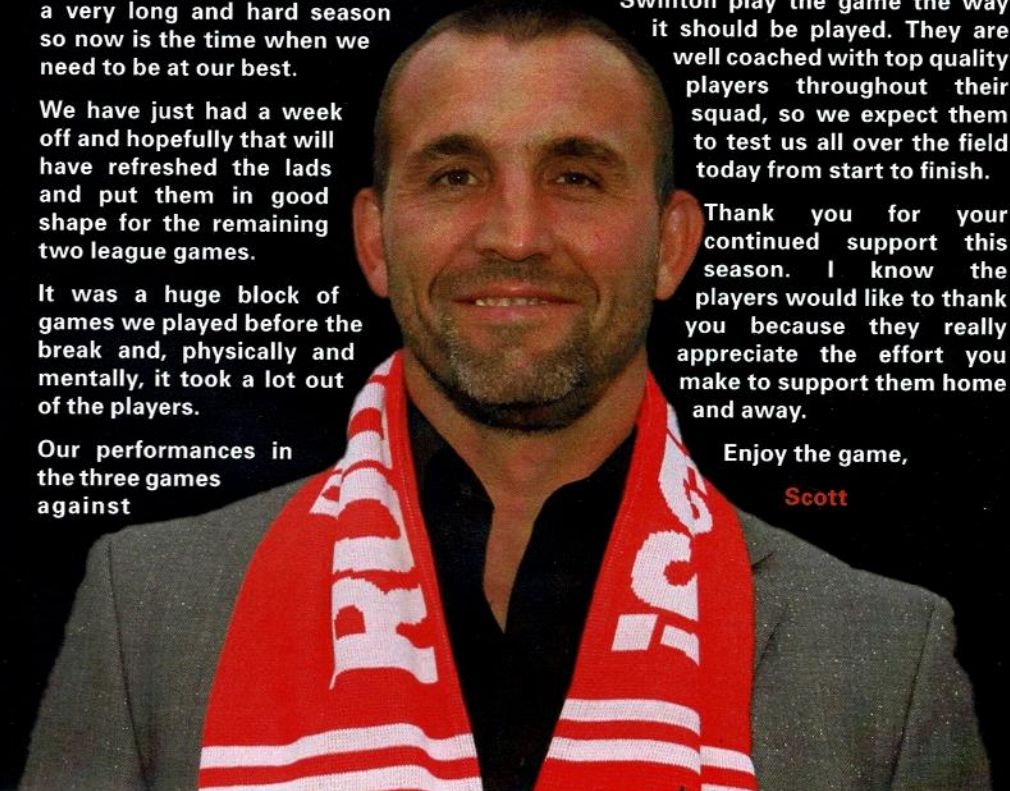
Today's opponents will give us the biggest challenge we have faced in the last ten games and, in my opinion, they will be the other team to get promoted, hopefully along with us.

Ever-present Josh battles on...and on...and on

YOU'VE got to admire the resilience and consistency of Josh Crowley in going nearly three full seasons without missing a single game.

He's the only ever-present across 25 cup and league games so far this year, taking his appearance stats to 74 out of 74, going all the way back to his Roughyeds debut in a Northern Rail Cup tie at North Wales Crusaders on March 3, 2013.

"I spoke of his phenomenal work rate after the Barrow game," said Oldham boss Scott Naylor of the 23-year-old former Warrington and Widnes youngster, whose career was at the crossroads when Widnes released him and he quickly became Naylor's first signing for the Roughyeds.

He played in all 24 games in 2013, all 25 in 2014 and this year he's within a minimum of three games and a maximum of five of a 100 per cent appearance record in three consecutive seasons.

With the support and financial backing of Chris Hamilton, Naylor and his No 2 Lee Spencer have worked wonders this season in putting together and supervising a squad that has taken League One by storm.

Relative new boys like Adam Clay, Adam Neal, George Tyson, Gareth Owen and Jack Holmes have been to the fore, but so have no fewer than 11 of Naylor's 'originals' who have been with him since he first walked into Whitebank in the autumn of 2012.

Crowley arrived first, to be quickly followed by Liam

Thompson, Sammy Gee, Lewis Palfrey, Richard Lepori and two on-loan youngsters from Salford in Jon Ford and Adam Files.

Reserve-team youngsters who were busting a gut to be given a senior chance, but hitherto had been kept in the background, didn't have long to wait once Naylor and Spencer got their feet under the table.

Danny Langtree, Phil Joy, Kenny Hughes, Michael Ward and Steven Nield were quickly elevated to senior status and have never looked back.

The 'originals' still form the backbone of a side that has lost only one of the last 26 normal league games at Whitebank, stretching back to April, 2013.

To underpin the consistency and stability of Naylor's regime, seven of his men from year one have played in 60 or more of the 74 games under his command, namely Crowley (74), Langtree (69), Joy (69), Palfrey (68), Ward (67), Hughes (62) and Gee (60).

Naylor has worked hard to develop team spirit and comradeship in the Oldham dressing room and that united front will form a key element of the side's psyche against Swinton Lions today in arguably the biggest and most important league game in the last three years.

Swinton have won nine games in a row, Oldham 11 so something will have to give on the day Roughyeds can get within touching distance of finishing as league leaders with the advantages that provides in terms of going on and clinching promotion.

A CHAT WITH CHRIS

HELLO and welcome to Whitebank for the latest match in this remarkable season.

After the Barrow game it was almost a case of "school's out" with the coaches and players having a week off to recharge the batteries.

The gruelling schedule can take its toll, mentally and physically, so it was good for the lads to put rugby on the back-burner for a few days.

A few of them took the opportunity to get away, which will have pleased their wives and girlfriends too!

There will have been a big week of preparation going into today's match against a Swinton Lions team which is also on a great run of form.

We can take a big step towards the league title with a win today, but we are aware of just how big a task that will be. Our win at Sedgley Park earlier this season will make them additionally motivated and in terms of where both teams will finish in the league table the stakes couldn't be higher.

We know we have to play to our full potential to get a win but, as ever, I'm sure Scott will have the right game plan to deliver a victory if the lads stick to it.

Just to be in with a chance of winning the league at this stage of the season, in a division that has been as tough as it ever has been, is a great achievement in itself, but there is no way we want to let anything slip now and I'm sure, like us, you have been through all the permutations of what can happen.

It's still feasible that we could lose today but still win the league if we win at Oxford next Saturday, but that's not in our thinking.



We want to break the club record for the most consecutive wins and we are focusing on nothing else.

As we approach the climax of the season, we have worked extremely hard to get where we are when many people outside the club thought we wouldn't even make the top five, such was the ferocity of the competition when the Rugby Football League delivered what they promised with a new format and with five teams coming down into League One. We can endorse our credentials once again today and we should also have a decent turn out, weather permitting.

In the last match against Barrow we had to dig deep and work very hard to eventually get on top and get the win and, once again, the team demonstrated their collective desire and commitment in securing the league points.

As always you, the fans, played your part in that - even in the rain - and, as I have always said, your support does make a difference to the lads. Keep it up today as we strive to take another step towards a home fixture on September 20.

Said ORSA chairman John McAndrew: "It was well attended, everyone enjoyed it and we raised a bit of money for the club so it was a winner all the way."

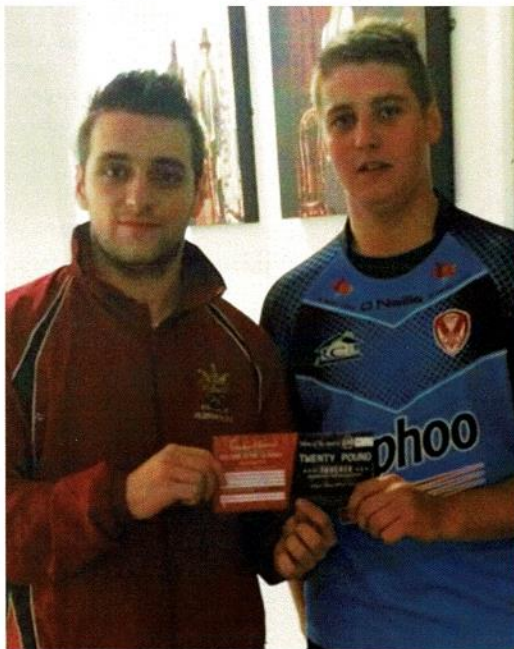

Life with the Lions...

IAN RIGG gives his verdict on the men who roar in blue and white

SWINTON Lions are in a rich vein of form for the run-in to the play-offs, coach John Duffy and his staff having worked miracles this season, with the backing of the board, to sign good players and to get the best out of them.

However, one of the stand-outs, full-back and captain Richie Hawkyard, has been a Lion for several years and has used his experience to help the younger players to flourish. He is a Yorkshireman, from the same family stock as former Watersheddings favourite Colin Hawkyard, who had a testimonial for his sterling service to Oldham for more than ten years in the 1970s and 80s.

The Lions have a fast back division with pacy wingers in ex-Oldham man Shaun Robinson and Mike Butt, who was signed after attracting interest while playing for Manchester Met University. Harry Aaronson and the experienced Ian Mort can also play on the wings.

Irish international Stuart Littler and former Ashton Bears amateur Chris Rothwell are likely to fill the centre spots.

Former Saddleworth Rangers junior Ben White joined from Leeds Rhinos to make the stand-off job his own, while the very pacy Chris Atkin has recently been playing at scrum-half.

Moving on to the pack, the prop positions are usually shared between quality performers like Jordan James, Mike Morrison, Tommy Gallagher, Ben Austin and Tom Thackery, on loan from Batley Bulldogs.

Andy Ackers, a fans' favourite, has had two good seasons at hooker, where he's a constant threat from short range. When he needs a rest, he is normally replaced by former Barrow Raider Aaron Lloyd, a very creative player.

There's a mix of youth and experience in the back-row where two players on loan from Wigan Warriors, Rhodri Lloyd and Rob Lever, have had great seasons.

Also available for those spots are former Wigan academy player Grant Beecham; ex-Saint Connor Dwyer, son of the Saints' renowned hooker of yesteryear, Bernard Dwyer; Darren Hawkyard and Josh Barlow.

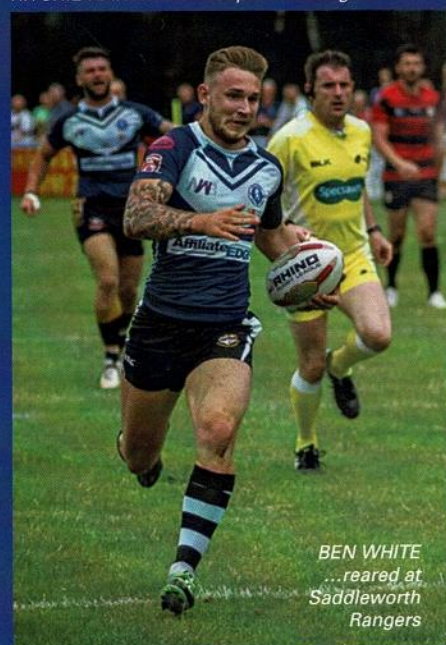
Others in the squad include Matt Gardner, currently playing for Brazil in Rugby Union nines; Mick Govin and Keith Holden, who can both cover the hooking and half back roles; Andy Ball, another

former Ashton Bears player who can play centre or back row; and half-back Jimmy Rowland, who is currently recovering from a shoulder operation.

Whoever plays today, we should be treated to some exciting rugby from two teams who, in recent weeks, have surpassed all expectations.

What a game at Sedgley Park!

IF today's game is half as good as the one at Sedgley Park in June it will be a cracker.

It was one of those occasions when we started like a house on fire, going 20-0 up inside the first half hour but then having to defend desperately in the dying seconds after the Lions got it back to 26-32 and threw everything at us in a bid to retain their unbeaten league record on home soil.

We led 22-4 at half-time, only to be rocked by a Lions fightback which pulled them back to 20-22 inside the first seven minutes of the new half. We then went out to 32-20 before the home side kept fans on tenterhooks with Andy Thornley's converted try in the last minute.

Gareth Owen and Adam Files both had top games from dummy half, while Danny Langtree scored the first of our five tries as early as minute two. The others came from George Tyson (2), Josh Crowley and Adam Clay, while Lewis Palfrey added six goals, including two late penalties.

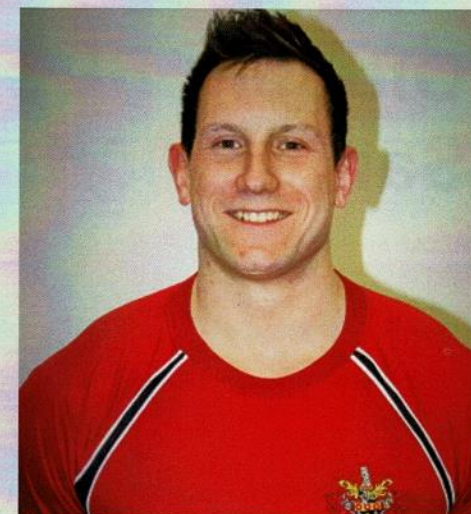
DANNY LANGTREE...opening try

Gee, Neal each out for two matches

IT has been widely publicised, but in case anyone is still wondering why we don't have the services of Sammy Gee and Adam Neal today it is because each player is starting a two-match suspension for offences in separate matches for which they each entered an Early Guilty Plea.

It needs to be stated at the outset that Sammy, our vice-captain, and Adam, our most experienced prop, have had superb disciplinary records throughout their time in the sport which, in each case, covers a significant number of seasons.

It was the first time Sammy had been sent off when he was shown the red card at Newcastle for punching. Suffice to report that the Thunder player who was sent off with him was given a five-match ban.

Sammy was ultimately charged with a grade C offence, but he was eligible to enter an Early Guilty Plea which provided him with a two-match ban. The recommended sanction for grade C is two to three games.

Like Adam, he will miss today's game and next Saturday's final game of the regular season at Oxford, but both players will be available for whatever comes our way in terms of play-off rugby beyond next weekend.

Adam, who has played more than 40 Super League games for Salford, has never been sent off. In this case he was given a yellow

card for a high tackle in the Barrow game, but subsequently the Match Review Panel charged him with a grade C reckless tackle which again carried with it a recommended sanction of two to three games.

The Barrow player wasn't injured and quickly got to his feet. Any reaction from other players was minimal to say the least. Play resumed with a penalty to Barrow and with Neal walking off to spend ten minutes in the sin-bin.

Initially, the player and club chairman Chris Hamilton were planning to make representations to the disciplinary committee, but on further consideration it was decided the best course of action was to submit an Early Guilty Plea.

Said Chris: "Adam didn't want to run the risk of picking up a three-match ban and missing out on the promotion game, if we are in it.

"We weren't necessarily happy with his C grading, but he was always going to get one match at least, which would have ruled him out of the Swinton game anyway.

"We ultimately felt that going down the EGP route was the best course of action.

"At any other time of the season it might have been different, but we are where we are and it is what it is so we have to take it on the chin and get on with it."

For the record, players are only allowed one Early Guilty Plea in any 12-month period.

Oldham RL shirt takes pride of place at Sam's 100th birthday bash

AN Oldham RLFC shirt, signed by the players, was a special present for lifelong Roughyeds fan Sam Bradley when he celebrated his 100th birthday.

As an RAF ground crew engineer with Bomber Command in the Battle of Britain, he was thrilled to get a telegram from The Queen — and delighted also to receive the Oldham Rugby jersey as a present from his son Ian (65) and daughter-in-law Angela.

Said Ian: "It's difficult to know what to get a man for his 100th birthday, but we knew he would love the signed shirt because he's supported Oldham for most of his life.

"Even now, from a distance, he's aware of how well the team is doing and how they are going all out for promotion. He's desperate for them to achieve it this year, after all their recent near-misses, and he makes sure I keep him up to date.

"He watches Super League games on television, but his heart is with the Roughyeds, whom he first watched as a small boy with his father.

"Every Sunday, I have to tell him how they've gone on and he often wants to talk about all the great games and the great players he had the pleasure of watching over many years at Watersheddings.

"He was made up when we gave him the shirt, signed by Lewis Palfrey, the captain, and the rest of the present-day squad.

"He's anxious that we keep him informed of what happens on the promotion trail over the next two or three weeks."

Sam lived most of his life on Honeywell Lane, Oldham but, having survived his first wife Louie and then his second wife Amy, he moved south 11 years ago to live in sheltered accommodation close to his family in Wellesbourne between Warwick and Stratford-on-Avon.

For most of his working life he was an engineer for Stone-Wallwork at their works on Bleasby Street,

close to Hill Stores.

As an RAF engineer he was stationed during the early part of the war at North Weald in Essex, one of Britain's most strategic World War 2 airfields and on the front line during the Battle of Britain.

He also served at Kirmington (now Humberside airport) with 150 Sqn as well as in North Africa, the Middle East, Malta, Sicily and many other regions in that particular theatre of war.

Said Ian: "Like so many of his generation, he has had an incredible life. During his war service, for instance, he survived three air crashes and also escaped unharmed from a train that was blown up in the Sinai Desert.

"Back in Oldham after the war, he picked up where he had left off in terms of watching Oldham Rugby and I started to go to Watersheddings with him when I was six or seven.

"I left Oldham when I was a young man so I never had the connection with Roughyeds that my Dad had, but rugby league is a fantastic game.

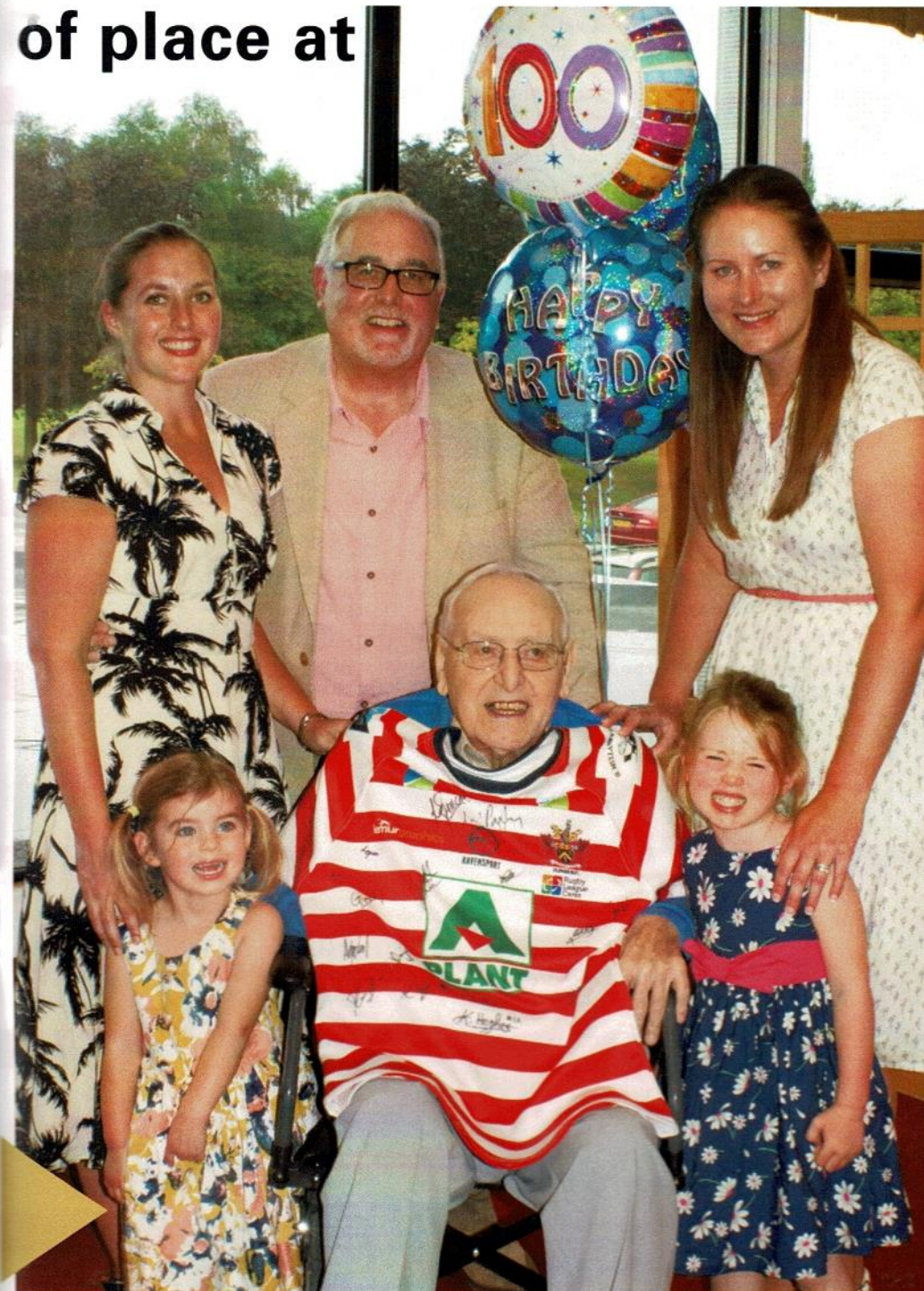
"I have always said, 'Once a rugby league fan, always a rugby league fan and I think my Dad is a shining example of that.

"He loves the TV games, loves to talk about the stars of the past and loves to keep an eye on the fortunes of today's Oldham team."

Said club chairman Chris Hamilton: "It isn't every day we are asked to get a shirt signed for a fan's 100th birthday.

"It goes without saying that congratulations and best wishes go to Sam from everybody at the club, including myself, coach Scott Naylor and his staff, all the players and all Sam's fellow Oldham fans.

"His is a remarkable life story, especially concerning his war years with the RAF. What an incredible debt we owe to people like Sam and his generation."

SO who was your Wembley hero?

Tom Briscoe, whose record-breaking five-try haul won him the Lance Todd Trophy as man of the match?

Kevin Sinfield, one of our own from up the road, who now holds the record for most captaincies in a Challenge Cup final?

Jamie Peacock perhaps?

Mine didn't make a tackle, throw a pass or defuse a bomb. But with a remarkable solo performance she stole the hearts of 80,000 people inside Wembley and brought a tear to the eyes of millions more watching on television around the country and across the world.

Lizzie Jones is a remarkable young lady. She sang *Abide With Me* beautifully (to this untrained ear at least as well as the many big-name soloists who had preceded her down the years), but who would have cared had there been a few wobbles along the way?

She sang superbly, looked stunning and had the whole stadium in tears, or close to it, especially when the big screen flashed up an image of Lizzie with her

late husband Danny and their baby twins Bobby and Phoebe.

Later she tweeted: "One of the best days of my life! Felt like I walked out to a huge cuddle. The support and love was overwhelming. Did it for my love."

Danny would have been so proud of her and of a stunning performance that made us all proud; proud of Lizzie and her family, but proud also to be involved, in no matter how small a way, with a sport that overflows with love, support and compassion whenever and wherever tragedy strikes within its parameters.

Wasn't the whole moving experience so typical of Rugby League's ability to open its arms in times of trouble or sadness and to demonstrate unequivocally that it is a sport with high values and standards and, most of all, with heaps of heart and compassion. A family sport if ever there was one. And doesn't it feel good to be part of that family.

Out of the most tragic of personal circumstances, Lizzie Jones has proved an inspiration to us all.
