














HELLO everyone and welcome to today's 'Promotion Final' against Keighley Cougars at the Whitebank Stadium

SCOTT Naylor and Lewis Palfrey scooped major League One prizes when the Kingstone Press end-ofseason awards dinner was held at the Midland Hotel in Manchester in Monday.

Scott was named coach of the year and Lewis player of the year on a night when the boss and his captain were rewarded for playing key roles in our best season for years.

Interviewed after receiving his award, Scott said: "I enjoy coaching more then playing... it's not as painful.

"I have a great backroom team and a great set of players and it's because of those people that I'm standing here."

Lewis said: "This award is a reflection on what the team has done. As a halfback I rely on my forwards

"We've had a great year, but the job isn't done yet. Our aim has always been to win promotion and nothing has changed."

The Oldham captain's team mate George Tyson was also nominated for the award along with the Swinton duo of Richie Hawkyard and Andy Ackers.

After the formal part of the evening, Scott said: "We've done well this year, but I didn't expect to win the award. It was nice just to be nominated (he was up against James Ford of York City Knights and John Duffy of Swinton Lions), but to actually win it is really

"I'm happy for the club, for Chris (chairman Chris Hamilton), for the lads, the backroom staff, the fans and everyone else associated with the club. It's nice to see us moving forward year on year.

"George (Tyson) will be a little bit disappointed, understandably, but knowing the lad as I do, I know he will be very happy for Lewis and glad that, at least, he didn't have to go on stage and do a speech.

## Stability the key as 'Langers' re-signs

#### PLANNING for next season, we've retained Danny Langtree on a new two-year contract.

Said by our club chairman Chris Hamilton to be the "ultimate in tough professionals", the 24-year-old former St Helens junior will have been at Whitebank seven years by the time his new deal runs out.

It's his first two-year agreement with the club and it dovetails with Scott Naylor's current three-year commitment which runs to the end of the 2017 season.

Stability among coaching staff and senior players is considered to be a key element in the quest for success moving forward.

Said Scott: "He was already at the club when I arrived and I'm delighted he's staying with us. That says a lot about his loyalty to the club that signed him initially as a 19-year old.

"He isn't a big talker, but he's established himself as a team leader because of his strength of character and the example he sets with how he plays. That's how he gets his point across.

"He loves playing for Oldham and he deserves immense credit for all he has contributed to the club over the last five years."

Langtree's first two seasons were spent in the reserves, but he became an immediate first-team regular on Naylor's arrival for the start of the 2013 campaign.

Since then, he has played in 70 of a possible 75 games, scoring 36 tries.



# The 'voice' is also a good listener...

LEWIS Palfrey, our captain and League One a youngster. player of the year, has signed a new deal to stay at Oldham in 2016.

As captain, goalkicker, chief tactician and coach Scott Navlor's "voice" in the heat of battle, 25-year-

old Palfrey has played a key role on and off the field in what he has described as a "cracking" season so far.

Naylor, delighted to see his captain commit to another year at Whitebank, said: "I've known Lewis since he was a teenager at Salford, so we go back a long way. 'Spanner' (his No 2 Lee Spencer) has also worked with him since he was a kid.

"He was always willing to listen and learn, and he still is.

"He has improved performance over each of the three seasons we've been together at Oldham and he's matured into the quality halfback we always felt he would become when we had him as Lewis Palfrey

"He's a good captain, too. He has the respect of all the lads and, far from being a burden to him. the leadership thing has actually helped him to develop his own game."

> With 103 goals and 251 points, he finished the League One campaign as the division's leading marksman and top points scorer.

"I was chuffed to re-sign for another year," he said. "This one has been a cracking season so far and we've still got it all to play for. After three years I know the club inside out. There's a lot of stability and that's one of the things I like about it.

"If we get promoted, we'll face different challenges to the sort we have tackled this year, but we're already starting to build for 2016 and with Scott and 'Spanner' still here we'll be well equipped to do okay."



# Nobby nailed it – and not before time...

THERE'S no more appropriate time to examine Scott Naylor's record over his three seasons as coach at Whitebank than in the week he has seen his side lift the Kingstone Press League 1 Leaders' Shield and then received that division's Coach-of-the-Year award.

With the utmost respect to Swinton's John Duffy and York's James Ford, the other nominees, it was always going to be difficult to look beyond Oldham's head coach to receive the accolade, not merely because Roughyeds finished on top of the pile but because, on the way, they did a league double over the Lions and, in the one game they played against the City Knights, they won 34-12 at Whitebank.

Taking the league campaign as a whole, Scott's boys won more games than anyone else; lost fewer; conceded fewer points than any other club and were second only to Swinton in the number of points scored over the 22 games.

But it's been coming hasn't it? As chairman Chris Hamilton said this week: "Scott deserves a lot of credit. He has come in and brought his way of thinking to the coaching side. He brought in a lot of lads he and 'Spanner' had worked with before.

"He is what he is – a very good coach – and that's why we made the decision to give him this opportunity. We've kept the core of the squad together for the last two or three years and collectively they've developed."

In Naylor's first season, 2013, Roughyeds finished second to promoted North Wales Crusaders, only two points behind the Welsh side and nine ahead of third-placed Rochdale.

In 2014 there was a third-place finish behind York and Hunslet, both of whom were beaten on their own grounds as Roughyeds made the Grand Final for the second successive year with Navlor in charge.

So to 2015, a top-place finish for the first time in


THERE'S no more appropriate time to the 'new' Oldham club's 18-year history and now examine Scott Naylor's record over his three seasons as coach at Whitebank than in the chance awaiting them if things go wrong today.

Taking the three seasons as a whole under Scott's tutelage, Roughyeds have won 46 and drawn two of their 58 league games, losing only 10. But now comes the most remarkable statistic of the lot.

IN THREE SEASONS OLDHAM HAVE LOST ONLY THREE LEAGUE GAMES HERE AT WHITEBANK AND TWO OF THOSE WERE THE FIRST TWO WITH SCOTT IN CHARGE, AGAINST ROCHDALE AND OXFORD IN THE SPRING OF 2013.

In the two and a half years since then only North Wales Crusaders, who won 38-28 here in June, have taken maximum league points away from Whitebank – a phenomenal record of which everyone at the club can be as proud as punch, not least Scott, his No 2 Spanner and the man with whom Scott works so closely on a day-to-day basis, chairman Chris Hamilton.

The only surprise about Scott's Monday night accolade was that it had taken so long coming.

Leeds-born Jamel Chisholm (22) has signed a one-year contract, covering the 2016 season, after catching Scott Naylor's eye while playing on loan for London Skolars in our 32-6 win at the New River Stadium in July.

Scott said: "He's the kind of player we are always looking for – a winger with huge potential, who has not had the break or the little bit of luck he deserves since he left Rhinos, but is keen to take up a new challenge with us at Whitebank.

"I've been watching Jamel for a couple of years now and I'm really pleased we have managed to get him.

"He's an exciting prospect and I'm looking forward to bringing him into the club and working with him. He's fast, strong and athletic, with a good attitude, and I'm sure he's going to do well for us."

He joined Rhinos on scholarship as a 15-year-old with Headingley Hawks and, a year later, signed pro forms for the Super League club where he spent five years playing academy rugby at under-

18s and under-20s levels

In 2012 he scored 27 tries in 18 academy games, but since Rhinos released him he's been at Featherstone and York, who loaned him out first to Hemel Stags and then to London Skolars, without progressing as quickly as many thought he would.

Said Chisholm: "I've been unlucky with injuries, but I'm fully fit now and I'm hoping for an injury-free season at Oldham so I can get back to playing as well as I know I can.

"It's a new challenge and I can't wait to link up with Oldham for the start of pre-season training later in the year."

When Naylor spotted Chisholm's potential in London, chairman Chris Hamilton took up the case and opened talks, convincing the player that Oldham – and Naylor – would be good for him.

Said Chris: "Jamel admits he's been treading water since leaving Leeds two years ago, but he's got all the qualities you need in a winger – speed, strength, aggression– and he's keen to make a fresh start with us.

"Everything suggests that his best years are still in front of him."





# Keighley out to avenge their biggest defeat of the season

#### JOSH CHAPMAN sets the scene from the Cougars' camp

SINCE falling to a heavy 38-8 defeat here at Whitebank early last month - their worst reverse of the season - Cougars have won six of the best to make a return visit today for the 'Promotion Final' in red-hot form.

Four of the six victories under review were against southern sides, with Barrow Raiders at home and Rochdale Hornets at Spotland the exceptions.

The return from injury of Paul March and Paul Handforth has also made a huge difference so that Cougars will be much stronger and a much more dangerous proposition this time than they were when they were last here.

Back then, Handforth was out and March had to withdraw just before kick-off when he tweaked a hamstring in the warm-up.

Next up came the long trip to South Wales where Cougars won 48-10, after which Scorpions coach Mike Grady described Andy Gabriel, Paul White and Josh Guzdek as "the best back three in the division" after each had scored a try hat-trick at Mountain Ash.

The Barrow game came next and what a finish that was! With four minutes left, Cougars trailed 17-8, but two tries at the death by Rikki Sheriffe and Gabriel secured a dramatic 18-17 win with only seconds left on the clock.

Handforth's return after a calf injury came just at the right time for the tough ask at Rochdale, where he produced a man-of-the-match performance in a 10-8 win, prior to another top show in a 48-24 victory at Gloucester All Golds.

Next up was an emotional rearranged game against London Skolars at Hemel, the one that was originally abandoned because of the tragic death of Danny Jones. Although they had to work hard, Cougars picked up another two points prior to beating the All Golds, also away from home.

With several first-team regulars rested (like Oldham left out one or two at Oxford), Cougars finished in second place thanks to a home win against Hemel last Sunday.




#### THREE TO WATCH

**JOSH GUZDEK**, an exciting, young full-back, who has impressed massively since signing on loan from Hull KR. Energetic and with an eye for the try line, his ability under the high ball is second to none. He is tipped to have a bright future in the game.

**PAUL WHITE,** is League One's top try scorer with 25, having totalled more than 30 if you take all competitions into account. A Jamaican international, his partnership with Rikki Sheriffe down the left side is one of the main reasons that Cougars have finished in second place.

**ANDY GABRIEL**, is the Cougars breakthrough star of the season. He has scored at least one try in each of the last eight games. Since getting into the side during a mid-season injury crisis, he has made the right-wing spot his own, scoring 19 tries in 17 appearances.

#### Oxford 12 Oldham 76

League Express (Roger Halstead): 'More than half of the 246 fans present were from Oldham and they celebrated joyously with their squad of players, all of whom made the journey to leafy Oxfordshire with the exception of full-back Lepori, who was in Moscow playing for Italy against Russia.

# A WORD FROM THE EDITOR

ON behalf of Roughyeds supporters the world over may I offer heartiest congratulations to Chris, Scott, Spanner and all the boys on their achievement in finishing top of Kingstone Press League One with 19 wins from 22 games played — a remarkable reward for a season's hard slog and all the more astonishing when you take into account that five teams came down from the Championship as part of the RFL's major reconstruction of the sport.
