

London are one of four teams to have full time professional players in the Championship division, which obviously makes today's challenge a very difficult one.



Away from home, we will again play in pink and grey, but this year the away-kit will be hooped to match the redand-white design.


Said club chairman Chris Hamilton: "We apologise for the late availability of replicas, but we had a problem when one of the sponsors had to pull out at the last minute...

Chris Hamilton... from the boardroom

Welcome Back! It's slightly different this year because we aren't at Whitebank, and although we have been forced to move out of town, that in itself signifies that we have finally achieved what some people thought we would never do --- win promotion to the Championship.

It seems a little strange to be writing once again about our achievements last season, but given that this is the first opportunity to do so in a match-day programme, I'm not going to waste it.

For several reasons, 2015 will go down as a great year in the history of the club. Not only did we win the League Leaders' Shield and then the League One Rose bowl, courtesy of our victory in the Promotion Play Off Final, but we also set records with a 14 match unbeaten run that took

us to the Championship.
Nobody can deny us that achievement, or grumble about the manner in which we achieved it, as we beat all before us and in convincing fashion to boot. Given that League One was at its strongest last season, it seems a bit surreal that we finally won it after going close on so many previous occasions.

We removed a big monkey off our backs last season and it was a combination of factors that enabled us to do it.

To the group of players who had been with us for three or four years, we added more quality in pre season and then even more during the season.

That lifted the whole squad.

We played entertaining rugby and we racked up points in every game. It was particularly pleasing to do that because quite a few people wrote us off when we lost to North Wales and Keighley early on.

After a big win at Swinton, however, we never looked back; a tremendous accolade to all the players and coaching staff.

Having enjoyed the publicity that comes with such achievements, we were soon back in pre season training with the addition of new faces. continued opposite

Jon Ford was hardly a new face, but he was now back as a permanent signing, together with Craig Briscoe, Jamel Chisholm, Danny Grimshaw and Jack Spencer. They were all signed not only for their playing ability but also for their characteristics, which are a big factor in our recruitment policy. Welcome lads, I hope your stays are long and enjoyable.

The new season brings lots of new challenges, not least of which is the move to a "newish" ground. I say "newish" because Stalybridge Celtic FC hosted our Challenge Cup tie against St Helens in 2002 on a shocking day weather wise and before a crowd of over 4,000.

When moving to a new home venue we have to be very organised as we basically move our whole operation from Oldham to wherever. That means we have to make sure that all bases are covered, whether that be stationery, staff or anything else. We certainly can't dash back to Whitebank if we forget something.

Our new Bower Fold partners have been very supportive and welcoming and I would like to place on record my sincere thanks to everybody, but particularly to chairman Rob Gorski and chief executive lan Milligan.

It is my sincere hope that everybody connected with the Oldham club enjoys the facilities here. There's a great playing surface and everything else about the stadium lends itself to a great atmosphere. Our opponents today, the London Broncos, also know what its like to move grounds. They have moved again as recently as this close season.

As a full-time team with ambitions to match, they represent a massive challenge to us. It will be a tough ask for our lads to compete in as tough a contact sport as rugby league but, rest assured, they are all looking forward to it.

Broncos chairman David Hughes has put millions of pounds into the Broncos over the years and it is to his eternal credit that he continues to back the club when many would have walked away. I can still recall talking to him at Griffin Park, Brentford when we played them in the Challenge Cup a few years ago and there was certainly plenty of empathy from both of us to the problems of the other!

It will be a good contest today and we are aiming to give a good performance and see where that gets us.

As ever, you have a part to play in getting behind the lads as we go into round one of what will undoubtedly be a tough season. This is where we have wanted to be for a while - let's make the most of it as we try to establish ourselves in the Championship.

A WALK DOWN MEMORY LANE

Three newly formed London clubs, London Highfield, Acton and Willesden and Streatham and Mitcham had, in the years running up to the outbreak of the Second World War, been accepted into the Northern Rugby League which in those days was comprised of just one division made up of 30 clubs. London Highfield was an early casualty managing to fulfil its fixtures for just two seasons, Acton and Willesden and Streatham and Mitcham faring much the same and just a short time later both these London outposts had locked their gates to rugby league too.

The rugby league continued to tinker with the idea of promoting club rugby league in the capital in order to complement the Challenge Cup final which had some seasons earlier been moved

from the north to Wembley.

One such venture was that in 1955 a new competition - the Associated Television Cup was dreamed up. The matches played between eight established northern clubs were all competed in the London area Oldham and Featherstone Rovers battling it out on an awful night in November on Queen's Park Rangers' Loftus Rd ground, the second half screened in the London area. The competition, decided on aggregate scores, and won by Warrington was short lived.

But, on September 14th 1980, despite the dissenters. another chapter surrounding rugby league's future in the capital was about to unfold when a brand new club Fulham RLFC and one of the sport's founder clubs, Wigan RLFC, faced up to each other on the iconic Craven Cottage pitch in a second division league match. In front of a crowd approaching 10,000 Fulham won 24-5. The national news was full of it.

What was important here, although unrealised at the time, was that the first cobble had at last been laid in a path that would ensure that the professional code of rugby league would maintain a foothold in London right up to this very day. The brand changed, Fulham, London Crusaders, Harlequins RL, London Broncos almost as often as did the home venue but tough as the journey might have been the argument that our game couldn't survive outside its hinterland could hardly be questioned.

I've supported Oldham for over 60 years and have seen most of the matches played between Londoners and Roughyeds, some to remember, some to forget mingled in with some dubious planning like a Friday night game at Charlton's Valley stadium most of the Oldham supporters not arriving until approaching half-time!

southern club was our away Because of promotion and relegation our paths hadn't crossed until earlier that season when we beat the Londoners at Watersheddings 30-12 in

remember not because it was a humdinger of a game, it was far from that. It was Oldham's first league match to be played in London since the Streatham & Mitchell and London Highfield era. Craven Cottage the victorian stadium of Fulham football club looked a picture perched like a heron on the banks of the Thames and the home of legends Haynes, Hill, Mullery, Cohen, Robson, Marsh, Welland et el and with a wisp of imagination ghosts of those stout Oldham players Tom White, Bert Avery and Jimmy Lomas who had represented England against the touring Kangaroos played on this ground back in 1911 could send a cold shiver down the spine

The Lancastrians arrived at Craven Cottage mid-season oozing confidence having already seen off Wigan, Leigh, Hull, Castleford, and St Helens at Watersheddings and drawn away to both Warrington and Castleford, Fulham had lost their last three and were on the edge of the relegation zone.

Fulham dictated the game via their two halves Eckerslev and Bowden tries coming via winger Cambriani, sub Kinsey and second-row Dearden with Eckersley adding a drop and Diamond four goals.


Oldham disappointingly ended without a try Mick Parrish adding the only points from two penalties. Fulham 21 Oldham 4.

For the record Oldham ended that campaign 10th in a first division of 16. Fulham were relegated from 13th spot.






This is London calling...

THE senior team in our capital city has invested heavily this year in a bold bid to regain their Super League status at the second attempt.

No fewer than ten new recruits have arrived from home and abroad as coach Andrew Henderson has set out his stall to take the Broncos back into the best competition this country can offer.

From overseas he has brought in Nathan Stapleton (26), a centre from Sydney Roosters; Mark Offerdahl (27), a forward who has previously played in Australia, Wales, the USA and France; Israel Eliab (25), a half-back from PNG; and Mark Ioane, a prop from St George Illawarra, but a Kiwi by birth more than 60 games for Cronulla's firstgrade squad before moving on to the Roosters and Ioane having averaged ten games a year at the highest level for the past three years with New Zealand Warriors, Canberra Raiders, Gold Coast Titans and latterly St George.

From nearer home, he has enlisted two half-backs in Scott Leatherbarrow (Batley) and Jack Bussey (Featherstone); two hookers in Andy Ackers (Swinton) and James Cunnningham (Hull FC); and a couple of other forwards in Alex Foster (Featherstone) and Eddie Battye (Sheffield).

Our New Likely Lads:

CRAIG BRISCOE (22) --- second-row forward, previously with Leigh and Barrow. Born in Wigan, he signed for Leigh from Wigan St Jude's when he was 16. Played 52 senior games for the Centurions, 30 of them in 2012 when they finished second to Featherstone in the Championship. Later went to Barrow, initially on loan, where he spent two seasons. Offered a new deal for 2016 but opted to sign for Scott Naylor's promoted League One champions.

JACK SPENCER (24) ---- 'Spanner jnr' is the son of our assistant coach Lee Spencer. A prop, like his dad before him, Jack passed through the academy system at Salford, where he played seven Super League games before he was 21. He later played for Barrow and Halifax for whom, in total, he strung together more than 40 appearances at Championship level. He has also tasted rugby league overseas, having played in Australia and in France with Villeneuve Leopards.

JAMEL CHISHOLM (22) ---- Leeds born, Jamel is reputed to be one of the fastest wingers in rugby league. Described by Roughyeds as an 'exciting prospect', Jamel joined Leeds Rhinos on scholarship as a 15-year-old and a year later signed pro forms for the Super League club, where he would spend five years. He played at under-18s and under-20s levels before moving on to York City Knights, who loaned him to Hemel and London Skolars to gain more experience.

DANNY GRIMSHAW (29) ----- an experienced half-back who has previously served York City Knights and Hunslet Hawks. Has played 50 of his 122 senior games in the Championship across a pro career spanning ten years — the first four at York and the other six at Hunslet. Born in the former pit village of Sharlston, near Featherstone, he twice played for Sharlston Rovers against Oldham in the Challenge Cup, at Boundary Park in 2004 and at Post Office Road a year later.


