



New-boy Joe up for the challenge

HE isn't surnamed 'Bloggs' or 'Public'; this Joe, OUR Joe now, comes from Newport in South Wales, speaks with a pronounced Welsh accent, has the family name of 'Burke' and loves to clock up huge minutes on the field, a trait that has made him one of the most resilient forwards in the KP Championship and KP League One.

A tall, long-striding prop, Burke has signed for Roughyeds from cash-strapped North Wales Crusaders on a deal to the end of November, 2016. He was one of seven players who were released from NWCs contractual agreements because the Wrexham-based club couldn't honour them.

At the age of 25, still young for a prop, Burke comes with a couple of targets ---- first to prove himself a good acquisition by Roughyeds, then to do enough to win a place in the Welsh squad for the 2017 World Cup in Australia and New Zealand.

His arrival takes Scott Naylor's squad to 23 in number, although Craig Briscoe is expected to be out for the season with his serious knee injury and at this stage there's no telling how long Tom Ashton will be out after major surgery to sort out a burst appendix.

The 23 doesn't include young centre Jake Bibby, who has played for us for the past few games while on loan from Salford.

Crusaders fans thought a lot of Burke, who was pretty popular with his peers as well judging by his dressing room triumph at the end of last season when he was voted players' player of the year.

Ryan Gould, media manager at Wrexham, told me: "You've got a good 'un in Joe. He's a cracking lad and a superb front-row man."

Over to Oldham chairman Chris Hamilton, who said: "We worked closely with Crusaders and did things the right way. I've sorted it out with Brian Wake, one of their directors, who has been very helpful and particularly supportive of Joe."

Burke played in all Crusaders' 30 games last season (28 starts, two sub appearances) and then signed for another year. His farewell appearance was as recently as two weeks ago when he played his final game for Crusaders against Barrow.

Added Hamilton: "He's tall and rangy and a different kind of prop to our others. He's been a tough opponent several times and he'll slip easily into the work ethic and ethos of our club.

"He played in the Championship with Barrow in 2014 and now he's keen to get back in there with us."

Naylor said: "In this division you need an abundance of forward strength. With only four props (Joy, Spencer, Ward, Thompson) we were walking a tightrope.

"Joe is a quality player. He's mobile, hungry for success and he has the engine to do long spells.

"He's very driven. He's been in the Welsh squad for a while and he wants to stake a claim for a World Cup spot next year.

"The unfortunate situation at North Wales Crusaders has turned out to be a positive for us.

"Joe is am ambitious lad and in view of the problems at Crusaders he thinks they will struggle to get out of League One.

"He now pairs up again with his former Crusaders team mate 'Gaz' Middlehurst, who has put on some weight, is training well and made his debut at Workington.

"We have a lot of competition in the pack now, and that's what's needed.

"We always start the season with a small squad and then add to it when the time is right and appropriate. That's what we've done again."

'Security' is key to new prop's move

JOE Burke has told our club media department that he was looking for "security and progression" when he chose to leave troubled North Wales Crusaders for a new start under Scott Naylor.

Newport-born Burke (25), who has also played for South Wales Scorpions and Barrow Raiders, was one of seven players to depart Wrexham-based Crusaders as a free agent because the club couldn't honour its contractual agreements and players were asked to take pay cuts.

Also among the seven were former Oldham half-back Jamie Dallimore, who left Whitebank in 2013, Naylor's first season, and Burke's fellow prop Ryan Duffy, who has gone to Whitehaven.

Revealing that Mitchell Cox, Frankie Halton, Danny Jones and Danny Rasool had also gone, a statement on the Crusaders website said: "Everyone at the club would like to place on record their thanks to all of them for their commitment and service."

Burke, a tall front-rower, was Crusaders' players' player of the year in 2015, described in his website profile as having enjoyed a superb debut season in which he could easily put in 80-minute shifts.

He also carried his club form on to the international scene with Wales, standing out, it said, in the Dragons' European Championships success.

By beating France, Scotland and Will Hope's Ireland, Wales qualified for the 2017 World Cup in the southern hemisphere and Burke hopes to do enough for Roughyeds this season to be on the Welsh plane to Sydney next year.

"But first and foremost, my aims are to settle in at Oldham; to get to know the other lads; and to get used to the systems that Scott (Naylor) employs," he said.

"It's up to me, as the new boy, to do right by the club, by my new team mates and by the coaching staff.

"It's a sad situation at Crusaders, but it is what it is. It's a short career and I need a bit of security which I'll get by joining Oldham.

"By playing in the Championship again (he did that with Barrow in 2014), I'm hoping to get back into the Wales squad, but first of all I've got to earn some recognition with my new c,ub, and that's down to me.

"I told Crusaders I would give it my all until the day I moved on --- and I've played in each of their five games this year.

"I'm sad to be leaving them in the present situation, but at the end of the day I've got to think about security and progression."

Burke cut his rugby league teeth as a teenager with Newport Titans in the Welsh Conference before joining the then Celtic Crusaders' under-18s, with whom he won a National Youth League title.

He moved up to Super League side Celtic's reserve team, but when Celtic relocated to Wrexham he remained in his native South Wales and spent three-and-a-half seasons with Scorpions, making more than 70 appearances in total.

He caught the eye of Barrow and moved north to join the Raiders, for whom he played more than 20 times in the Championship year of 2014.

Next stop was Wrexham where, back on Welsh soil, he figured in all 30 Crusaders games last year, fronting up as starting prop 28 times.



It perhaps isn't widely known that all Championship clubs have to contribute towards the costs of staging Summer Bash but, like the other 11, the more tickets we sell from Whitebank the more of our initial outlay we will recoup.

Please note that all rules and regulations, including ticket prices and concessionary qualification, are governed and laid down by the RFL.

Tickets are available in two categories ---- CAT. 1, reserved seats in West Stand (same side as the tunnel); CAT. 2, unreserved seats in North Stand and in South Stand (behind the posts at each end).

Concessionary tickets are available to 65s and over; students with valid ID, to be shown on the day; 16s and under; serving Military with valid ID, shown on the day.

One-day tickets (available ONLY for the day your team plays, Sunday in our case): reserved seats (Cat 1), £30 adults, £15 concessions; season-ticket holders, £15 adults, £7.50 concessions; unreserved seats (Cat 2), £20 adults, £10 concessions; season-ticket holders, £10 adults, £5 concessions.


POINTS TO NOTE

A WALK DOWN MEMORY LANE

FLASHBACK - KELLS A.R.L.F.C. (4th Round Ladbrokes Challenge Cup)

SINCE the club was formed in 1931, Kells have drawn several semi-pro clubs in the early rounds of the Challenge Cup. In 1946, in a two-legged first-round tie, Warrington struggled to a 3-0 win in Cumberland but won 27-0 in the return leg at Wilderspool. Down the years Kells have taken on Hunslet twice, losing narrowly at Elland Road in the first round of the 1985-86 competition. Before they toppled Hemel Stags 12-6 in the third round of this season's Challenge Cup, however, the nearest they came to claiming the scalp of a pro club was a heroic 4-4 draw at home to Fulham in 1987.

A year later they took on Leeds on Whitehaven's Recreation Ground, losing 28-0 in front of a huge 6,000 crowd.

In last season's third-round match Kells lost at home to Rochdale Hornets 29-12 and in 2014 they went down 52-4 to Batley
Bulldogs at Mount Pleasant.
After several notable successes in
amateur competitions, from
which the Cumbrians moulded a
tremendous reputation, the Kells
management applied to join
what is now the leading amateur
competition, the Kingstone Press
National Conference, successfully
securing a place in the third
division.

Since then, they have gone from strength to strength, winning successive promotions and at the end of last season proudly claiming a place in the tournament's premier division. Kells and Oldham have never clashed before, but the Cumbrians are no strangers to this area, having played amateur side Saddleworth Rangers in the league as recently as last season, winning 36-26 in Cumbria and 16-8 at Shaw Hall Bank Road. In previous times there have also been under-18s cup clashes between Kells and Rangers. Back in 1978 the clubs met in the under-18s National Cup up in Cumberland.

under-18s National Cup up in Cumberland. Rangers included several Oldham stars of the future such as Paddy Kirwan, who would progress to represent Lancashire; Terry Flanagan (Great Britain) and a 15year-old Des Foy, who scored the winning try in a 12-6 triumph for Rangers.

Some six years later, Foy was destined to face the great Wally Lewis in the first Test of the 1984 Great Britain tour to Australia. Oldham are no strangers to the Cumbrian amateur scene either. In recent seasons they have played at Egremont Rangers in both the 2012 and 2014 Challenge Cup third-round ties. In 2012 Oldham won 22-14 and two years later they won 42-24.

The Oldham team for the 2012 match, played on Whitehaven's Recreation Ground, was: Greenwood; Onyango, Cookson, Fogarty, Brocklehurst; N Roden, Dallimore; Boults, Clough, Johnson, Noone, Clarke, Thompson; Subs: M Roden, Whitmore, Ellison, M. Syron.

Tries came from Clough, Clarke, Whitmore and Thompson with Dallimore kicking three goals, Attendance 468.

The Oldham team for the 2014 match, played at the Copeland Stadium, Whitehaven was: Nield, Agoro, Wood, Gee, Bloomfield; Palfrey, Robinson; Boults, Hughes, Ward, Crowley, Langtree, Hobson, Subs: Files, Joy, Okanga-Ajwang, Davidson.



Tries came from Nield (2), Crowley (2), Agoro, Hughes, Langtree and Files with Palfrey kicking five goals. Attendance 340

Before then, Roughyeds played Broughton Moor in a two-legged first-round tie in 1949, winning 30-0 at Watersheddings and 35-2 in the return. The Oldham club's first- ever match against Cumbrian amateur opposition was in the 1902 Challenge Cup when they beat Maryport 27-0 away.

One Kells old boy who donned the red and white hoops of Oldham was craggy forward
Charlie McCourt, one of three rugby playing brothers.

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We've never played Kells before, but in recent years we've twice beaten Cumbrian amateurs Egremont in the Challenge Cup. Mark Hobson (right) tries to break a three-man tackle in 2014, while Lucas Onyango (below) tests the Cumbrian defence in 2012.

Charlie played in 74 first team matches for the Roughyeds between 1967 and 1970 before tragically losing his life while working on the construction of the Channel Tunnel.

Smith & Kells;

Doing Cumbrian rugby proud...

"We'll be coming down there to enjoy the day," said Kells head coach Peter Smith in a chat with Roughyeds chairman Chris Hamilton just a few minutes after the draw was made for this fourthround Ladbrokes Challenge Cup tie.

"Aye . . . and I'll take that with a pinch of salt too," countered Chris, who has known Peter well for years (they're good pals) and needs no reminding that the man who has won two National Conference divisional coach-of-the-year awards in the last three years always has his sights set on rather more than "enjoyment" when his proud Kells lads go into battle.

Or does he? It all depends, in a rugby context, of individual interpretation of the word 'enjoy' or, as my Collins English Dictionary puts it: 'to take pleasure from'.

Some days later and totally unaware of the aforementioned banter twixt Oldham chairman and Kells coach, I rang Peter in Whitehaven (where Kells are based) and ventured to suggest that, as he had won three promotions in three seasons, leading his club from NCL division three to premier division in the shortest possible time, he must have the Midas touch.

"No, it's about the players... and about enjoyment," said Peter. "We train and play in such a way that the boys really enjoy it. Makes sense, surely. If you're enjoying what you're doing you want to carry on doing it... training, playing, winning."

Smith (49) has spent a lifetime in rugby league in Cumbria. As an amateur growing up in the game, he was a BARLA international. He went on to play at the Recreation Ground with Whitehaven and when his playing days were over he spent many years on the coaching staff, working under Paul Cullen, Kevin Tamati, Steve McCormack, Dave Rotheram and Paul Crarey, now in charge of Barrow Raiders.

He's also spent 15 years with Kells, who have come from nowhere in the past three years to earn their place in the NCL's flagship Premier Division this season, playing their first game last Saturday against Siddal.

Two weeks earlier, on a fabulous weekend for the community game, Smith's men beat Hemel Stags 12-6 --- one of five amateur clubs to knock over semi-pro opposition with Hemel, South Wales Scorpions, Oxford, London Skolars and Newcastle Thunder all left licking their wounds.

While many eyebrows were raised, the outstanding success of the community clubs came as no real surprise to League Express's hugely respected authority on the amateur game, Phil Hodgson.

Said Phil: "For years now, I've been writing that the gap is closing. I wasn't all that surprised at the third-round results. The top amateur teams have very good players, great team spirit and in most cases the players have been together for years.

"I certainly wasn't surprised by Lock Lane's win at Oxford. A few Cas lads play for Oxford so there would be a lot of 'local' interest in that one.

"Kells also put up a great defensive performance to beat Hemel. I don't have a lot of knowledge about Oldham these days, but I expect the Cumbrian lads to put up a very brave and committed performance.

"They're being touted in some quarters as favourites to win the NCL Premier Division at the first time of asking. That's quite a statement. There are a lot of good sides in that division. Wath Brow, for instance, will have something to say about that.

"Kells have a great pedigree in the Challenge Cup and whatever the result at Bower Fold today they'll do Cumbrian rugby proud. They are a very good club."

Smith has a nice blend of youth and experience at his disposal in a side that includes a few BARLA internationals and just as many who have been in the pro ranks and have now returned to their grass roots.

Best known of the ex-pros is loose-forward Carl Sice, who will be remembered as a more-than-useful hooker for both Whitehaven and Workington. Centres Craig Benson and Martin O'Neil and second-row man Paul Culnean have also enjoyed spells at the Recreation Ground, while stand-off Tyrone Dalton was named NCL first division player of the year in 2015.

Forwards Dave Lowery and Scott Lofthouse are BARLA internationals, but there is nobody more experienced than 35-year-old Sice and his former 'Haven colleague Culnean, who is 39.

Said Smith: "It will be a great day when we come down to Oldham. We had three home draws in a row to get to this stage, so we can't grumble at having to travel. I've a few selection options, but before we hit the M6 for the cup-tie we've got a big game against Siddal, which will put us in the right frame of mind for Oldham.

"Oldham have been knocking on the Championship door for a few years now, so we know how tough it will be at Bower Fold. While Oldham have been going well under Scott Naylor to get to where they are today, we haven't done so badly ourselves.

"In the 2013 season (Naylor's first at Whitebank) we were in NCL division three so we have progressed in parallel with Oldham.

"We had to do a lot of defending against Hemel in the last round and that will stand us in good stead in this game.

"We'll certainly turn up on the day; we won't be looking to hide; and we can guarantee this . . . we'll enjoy it."

FOUR months into his job as one of two assistant coaches at Roughyeds, Peter Carey says he is confident the squad can achieve its target of accumulating enough league points to stay in the Championship.

The 47-year-old former Salford youth coach, who now forms one-third of Oldham's coaching team with Lee Spencer and head coach Scott Naylor, was brought in last November as the League One champions set out on their preparations for life in the higher division.

Five games in, he is enjoying life in the Roughyeds' fast lane and loving the challenges the job brings.

Said Peter: "We've got a superb set of lads, who made me feel welcome from day one. I've coached a lot of them when they were kids at Salford, as have 'Spanner' and Scott.

"We're very much a three-man team. Scott wants our input. The three of us voice our opinions and then Scott takes it from there. It works well.

"I'm confident we can stay up. It's all about getting up to speed for the Championship and being switched on for 80 minutes. In some of our games we've switched off temporarily and we've been punished.

"Getting that right and getting the lads to have the confidence to stick to Scott's game plans are key elements of what we're doing. We are developing week on week and we hope it will start paying off in the next few weeks.

"We've now got new faces coming in to strengthen the squad. Every week there are 17 shirts up for grabs so all the lads need to be looking over their shoulders because there is a lot of competition."

As well as his two coaching lieutenants, Scott has a third hand-picked member of his backroom team in Kane Daniels, who is responsible for the squad's strength and conditioning.

Said Carey: "When Scott invited me to join him and 'Spanner' I snatched his hand off. He's the best coach I've ever worked with and the opportunity to do it again was too good to turn down."

Carey's appointment on a one-year contract enables Scott, 2015 League One coach of the year, to oversee an extended programme of coaching and preparation to meet the higher demands of our new status in the Championship.

Explained club chairman Chris Hamilton: "Scott felt he needed another pair of hands in order to continue the work he and 'Spanner' have been doing for the past three years, but also to add other aspects of coaching to meet the bigger challenges we meet now.

"The coaching team can now do specific work with individual players; spend more time analysing the opposition; do more video work and other things like that to get maximum benefit from bringing in another experienced coach."

Carey played for Swinton amateur side Folly Lane for 28 years before he was introduced to coaching, like 'Spanner', by the inspirational Don Preston, a father figure to scores of prospective coaches in and around Salford and Swinton over many years.


He worked initially with Salford Service Area squads and then joined 'Spanner' in coaching the Reds' scholars.

At the invitation of Alan Hunte, head of youth development at Salford, he later became head coach of the Foundation side (under-16s) before progressing to assistant boss of the under-18s, a role he performed for several years,

A spell at Swinton Lions, where he worked with a new under-21s squad, was followed by a return to Salford in 2007 when he was asked by Hunte to look after the Reds' under-21s with Naylor.

After two years in that role he became head coach of the academy and under-19s teams, having previously gained experience working on the RFL's regional camps.

His Salford service ended in 2014, whereupon he returned to his former amateur club, Folly Lane, as first-team head coach in 2015.
