Every player that has ever played for the Lions has been allocated a unique Heritage Number, based on the chronological order of their debut. This has been a monumental piece of work and great credit is due to Les Smith and John Edwards.

On the same day, our special edition heritage kit will be revealed. This is a retro design to mark our 150th Anniversary. It will only be ever worn once by the Lions, most likely in our last home game of the season. Sublimated in the fabric of the shirt are the names of 150 of our greatest players, each representing a relevant year between 1866 and 2016. You too can have YOUR name on the shirt. The process for putting names on the shirt will be via the club shop tab on our website. The shirt itself will cost £50, with an extra £20 for each name you'd like adding on. We will also be publishing a handbook to accompany the shirt, giving the story behind each of the 150 famous players chosen to go on the shirt.

Championship Action

With Ian Rigg at the Sheffield Hallam University Sports Ground

A controversial penalty try eight minutes from time gave the Eagles an unlikely victory and passage into the fifth round. In fact, this was also the first time they had been ahead in the whole game as the Lions had played their hearts out and had deserved victory for their performance.

Stuart Littler put the Lions ahead in the third minute when Eagles knocked on in their own half and from the scrum move the ball moved swiftly to the right and he found the gap to go over and Chris Atkin added the conversion points. Macauley Hallett then went close and was held up and just after that Michael Knowles was dumped into touch on the first Eagles attack.

Hallett put the Lions further ahead on fourteen minutes after he finished off a good passing movement in the left corner and again Atkin converted it and it got even better for the Lions four minutes later when Rhodri Lloyd sent a short kick towards the try line and Mike Morrison won the race with Anthony Nicholson to score to the right of the posts with Atkin yet again adding the conversion points and the Lions now held a demanding lead.

Shaun Robinson went close from a Littler pass before Kieran Hyde was forced to knock the ball dead in goal from an Eagles attack. Duane Straugheir got Eagles on the scoreboard when he crashed over from short range on twenty-five minutes and Knowles converted it and this was quickly followed a few minutes later when Togagae found Menzie Yere on the left and he scored in the corner but Knowles could not convert this one. It was the Lions who finished the half strongly with Lloyd making a break down the middle with Stephen Nash in support but Togagae got to him before he could pass the ball and in the dying seconds of the half, Connor Dwyer was held up.

Hallett put the Lions further ahead two minutes after the break when he finished off another good passing movement to score in the left corner but this time Atkin could not convert against the breeze, but Eagles came back quickly when Ben Blackmore made the most of an overlap to score on the right but Dave Hewitt who had taken over kicking duties added the conversion. Straughier then added his second try on fifty-five minutes when he chased a Togagae kick to score out on the right but again Hewitt missed the conversion.

Hallett completed his hat trick in rather bizarre fashion when Togagae had the ball centre field ten metres from the posts and he had been tackled and got up to play the ball and there was no acting half back and as he played it the ball ran free and Hallett scooped it up and raced in for the try under the posts with Atkin making no mistake.

Blackmore added his second try twelve minutes from time with some pressure on the line and Hewitt again missed the kick but the Lions were still playing the better rugby and then came the hammer blow when Eagles launched a high kick towards Greg Scott who appeared to be taken out in the air and the ball then landed with an Eagles player Cory Aston who touched it down midway between the corner and the posts and was tackled as he scored. Hewitt then added the conversion points to put Eagles ahead for the first time and then the officials awarded another penalty in front of the posts as the player scoring the try apparently had be fouled in the act of scoring and Hewitt made no mistake again with the kick.

Blackmore was sent to the sin bin with three minutes left for punching Atkin in the tackle and the Lions still kept up the pressure on the Eagles line right to the end to try and pull something back and an incident was put on report in the final minute when Morrison was taken out off the ball and had there not have been a four point gap I am sure Atkin would have gone for goal in the position the penalty was awarded but it was not to be and time ran out but it was a fantastic effort from the team and this was echoed by John Duffy after the game who was proud of his side's efforts.

Championship Action With Jeff Tyldesley at Heywood Road

Four home games during 2016 for the Lions, four different grounds and four defeats; with the announcement this week of a semi-permanent home at Sale RU's Heywood Road, Swinton have taken a step towards stability, one which they so desperately need right now.

Featherstone also needed to do things on the hoof on the day, making three late positional team changes, after the teams were announced initially with lain Hardman, Danny Craven and Michael Channing all shuffling round.

Rovers however proved too much of a task for the nomadic Lions, Featherstone's defence in the first half was outstanding and points were only conceded when the game was arguably over.

In the first ten minutes alone, Swinton also did remarkably well to keep a clean sheet, Kyle Briggs looked to have set up Jamie Cording for the opener but the pass was forward, Danny Craven was bundled into touch by a number of tacklers lead by Shaun Robinson and Craven juggled another Briggs inside ball and knocked on by the

The first three tackles of the next set showed Swinton muscling up and giving out big hits. On the fourth, Andy Ellis eluded the line and shot away, Briggs supported before Macaulay Hallett brought him down. Fev' got up and flung the ball left where Scott Turner creeped in at the corner.

With half back partner Briggs receiving treatment, Andy Thackeray took the reins, a chip to the right was picked off and tapped down by Ian Hardman, among a gaggle of Swinton players. Craven was unable to convert either.

Ellis was then collared inches short and only an interception from Stuart Littler defused the situation before another forward pass denied a score for Misi Taulapapa.

Swinton's best move of the half came when Connor Dwyer ran a great angle, Ben White backed him up and Andy Thornley was somehow caught by Turner, just shy of a four pointer.

Rovers remained unflustered and swooped downfield with Craven providing Kyran Johnson with a walk in at the corner. This time, Craven screwed the kick to the right of the posts, Briggs took over the goalkicking in the second

The remainder of the first half was untidy and fractious, Taulapapa was warned for a high shot on Rhodri Lloyd, infractions mounted up and it ended with words exchanged among both teams in the centre of the pitch.

There were also a dozen first half penalties as referee Sam Ansdell had to have his whistle close to hand at all times, the Lions then conceded the first five of the second half, a period in which the game drifted out of their grasp.

Featherstone went further ahead after the interval, forcing firstly a drop out, from which Jack Ormondroyd drove back strongly to ten yards out. Thackeray then provided a delightful deft pass to send in Cording untouched.

A grubber from Matty Beharrall just beat winger Liam Marshall to the dead ball line before a wayward pass from White found the ground then the hands of Briggs, who ran it in and with goaling both tries, gave Rovers a pretty unassailable lead.

The home side's agitation spilled over and an all-in brawl ensued with Swinton skipper Mike Morrison being sent to the sin bin to cool down.

While Morrison was away, Rovers had a third try disallowed for a forward pass to Craven. This was prior to Thackeray using the extra space afforded to him to dummy his way over.

The biggest cheer of the day was also reserved for the best try, from all of sixty yards out, Dwyer met Beharrall's pass on a sublime angle, handed on to Atkin who located Hallett in enough space to race over down the left for the first try at Heywood Road for Swinton, Atkin adding a touchline conversion.

A great tackle from Littler denied Cording a second at the other end before Atkin himself burst the Rovers' cover to score but then failed to convert Swinton's second try.

Lions In The Great War With Ian Jackson

The men of Swinton, Pendlebury and Clifton who enlisted during the First World War served in many different theatres of conflict. They fought in Belgium, Egypt, France and Turkey and took part in most of the main land and sea battles. Many of the set piece locations are etched indelibly in the local and national memory such as Thiepval, Ypres and of course, Gallipoli.

It was at Gallipoli that the men of Lancashire first served along–side the Australia and New Zealand Army Corps known thereafter as ANZAC in one of the fiercest military operations of the entire war. The ill-fated Gallipoli Expedition was an attempt to destroy Turkish forces in the Dardanelles before an outright assault on Constantinople. However, as events unfolded the whole campaign became a costly disaster. Here is a selection of the stories from the local men serving in the Lancashire Fusiliers in Turkev.

Private Harold Unsworth lived at City Walk, Pendlebury and was posted to Gallipoli in May 1915. Before the war, Harold played for the amateur rugby club Deans Rovers from Swinton and was discharged from the army in February 1919 following a long and distinguished military service. In 1920, Harold signed for Swinton and played 67 times for the Lions. Private Jabez Whittaker also played for Deans Rovers before the war and lived on Partington Lane, Swinton. During the Gallipoli Campaign, Jabez was first injured in the head and then sent to hospital in Cairo. However, he returned to Gallipoli and in August 1915 he lost his right hand and was sent back to Bacup Military Hospital in England to convalesce.

Private Arthur Turbine played for amateur rugby club Swinton Park before the war and lived at Bishop Street, Pendleton. During his army career Arthur excelled in boxing competitions but in June 1915 he nearly lost the sight of both eyes whilst serving in Gallipoli. He was evacuated to Malta to recover and then sent back to England. Corporal Henry White also played for Swinton Park as well as professionally for Broughton Rangers before the war. He was killed in action on 5 June 1915 having served previously during the Boer War from 1899 to 1902 in South Africa.

Private Frank Anderton played for amateur club Swinton St Marys before the war and lived at Holt Street, Clifton. On May 1915 he got injured in his left arm and sent to Malta to recover. He wrote back home to his wife: "I had not been in action above an hour when I got shot and the arm is broken." Frank not only recovered but survived the entire war and was not discharged until August 1919. The last word goes to Private Albert Tyldesley of Dorning Street, Swinton in a letter home from Gallipoli to his wife. "I would like to see dear old Swinton once again. We must hope for the best and put our trust in God to pull us through."

Lions In The Great War

The First World War cast a long shadow over the entire country. This is why communities everywhere were keen to create war memorials and rolls of honour in public places. For example, the Lych Gate at St Peter's Church in Swinton is covered with the names of local men killed in the Great War including Swinton players Albert Sanderson and Joseph Cartwright, who was the son of Sam Cartwright the Lions' grounds-keeper at the Chorley Road enclosure.

Elsewhere there is a Memorial Cross at Holy Rood Church in Swinton erected in 1920 that features the name of Swinton player Herbert Shedlock, who joined "A" Company of the 22nd Service Battalion of the Manchester Regiment. On the 11 January 1917 whilst stationed in France, Herbert took part in a dawn raid on enemy lines. The assault on a German trench was successful and Herbert came through safely and took-up a position in a captured dug-out. However, as the morning mist cleared, the German snipers became active. Herbert was shot through the head and killed as he emerged to take a message to an officer. In a letter from the company quartermaster, it was said that there was universal respect for Herbert from both the officers and men alike. Many of the other soldiers wrote letters of condolences to Herbert's family as he was held in such high esteem.

Also on the Memorial Cross at Holy Rood Church is the name of Harold Bertram Rylands who was born in Eccles and lived at Ashburn Lodge in Worsley. Prior to the war, Harold studied at the University of Manchester and was part of the Swinton Boy Scouts and the Swinton Home Defence Corps. On 19th December 1914, he was commissioned as second Lieutenant in the 16th Battalion of the Lancashire Fusiliers which contained many local Swinton men. By 22nd November 1915, the Battalion had landed in France at Boulogne headed for the Somme Battlefield. Harold was injured in the head in 10th March 1916 but recovered; and he even survived the carnage of 1st July 1916 on the opening day of the Battle of the Somme. However, on 23 November 1916 the 16th Lancashire Fusiliers attacked enemy lines in concert with the 2nd Battalion Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers. Supported by a barrage, the men dashed across the devastated terrain and sped towards the German "Munich" trench where fierce hand-to-hand fighting followed. It was here that Private Dai Davies witnessed Harold fall into the German lines after being shot but no-one could reach him. Harold's name adorns the vast Thiepval Memorial in France that commemorates the soldiers who fell at the Battle of the Somme.

Mercifully, Welsh-born Private Dai Davies of the 16th Lancashire Fusiliers survived the conflict. He played for Swinton before the Great War and holds the unique distinction of playing in the 1900 Challenge Cup Final for Swinton against Salford and in the 1904 FA Cup Final for Bolton Wanderers against Manchester City in a truly remarkable life.
