

Profile: Scott Naylor

by men who know him well

SCOTT Naylor won't thank us for this...

(he shuns the limelight and especially references to his playing days) but there will never be a more appropriate occasion on which to turn the spotlight on our head coach than a visit to Bower Fold by Bradford Bulls.

Between 1999 and 2003, Scott made 128 Super League appearances for the Bulls, scoring 51 tries, playing in three Challenge Cup finals at Murrayfield, Twickenham and the Millennium Stadium, Cardiff and in a couple of Super League Grand Finals at Old Trafford against Wigan and St Helens.

As a tough, no-nonsense centre he played in one of the best post-war teams ever to grace our great game before retiring as a player and starting out on a coaching career that was highlighted last year when he led Roughyeds to promotion and won the KP League One coach-of-the-year award.

So what of the man behind the coach and the former England player?


A fascinating insight is provided by the legendary and recently retired former Bradford, Leeds and Great Britain star Jamie Peacock.

Scott was a senior member of the brilliant Bradford side when a young Peacock was starting out on a career that was to provide him with every honour in rugby league.

Describing the Roughyeds boss as one of his five early mentors — alongside Brian McDermott, James Lowes, Mike Forshaw and Bernard Dwyer —— Peacock said: "Scott was incredibly under-rated."

"He was a nightmare for opponents, but he looked after me, even socially, and we had some good times together.

"In my early days I had a gang of five who invested a great deal of time on and off the field to guide me in the right direction, whether they knew it or not



"They provided me with the perfect apprenticeship."

Writing in his book, Jamie Peacock, No White Flag, the former superstar and current TV pundit, describes how Naylor wrapped up Wigan's Australian Test centre Steve Renouf in a Super League Grand Final in 2001 when the Warriors were humbled 37-6.

"Scott was an expert at that. He unsettled some of the game's greats.

"He was horrible to them, getting in their ear as well as giving them a physical working over which, more often than not, put them off their natural game. They were suddenly too busy being wary of him.

"A genuine, salt-of-the-earth unassuming type, he knew what his abilities were and he always played to the best of them.

"He loved to moan, but that was his way of getting through training. By the time he got to Bradford his body was knackered, but he did the best he could.

"You need players like that in any successful team; guys who are prepared to be great defenders.

"You won't necessarily see them scoring spectacular 60-metre tries, but you find that those wearing the other team's colours who should be influential are completely bottled up.

"Scott was a great club man and a good, honest bloke who was true to people and very loyal to them.

"He could drink, but he knew the right time to have a beer. He wasn't the hardest trainer, but he always did his job once he crossed the whitewash --- and he played through the pain barrier on a vast number of occasions."

A Leigh lad, Scott also played for Salford before heading off into Yorkshire after starting out as a youngster with Wigan.

And Neil Barker, former rugby league reporter on the Manchester Evening News, had this to say of our head coach in a Leigh Centurions programme:

"Stubbly Scott can be surly and strong-willed, but he gets his kicks from ripping-up fairytale scripts.

"As a proud Leigh lad, he loved putting the boot in on Wigan and he certainly did that in 1996 when Salford gained one of their greatest-ever victories, beating Wigan in the Challenge Cup and smashing a 43-game unbeaten un for the Warriors, who had made Wembley their second home.

"Naylor's direct style made him a firm favourite with Salford fans. He was a hard-hitting, no-frills centre, who was happy to let his performances do the talking. "More recently, as coach of newly-promoted Oldham, he has used his dogged determination to show that he is still a strong survivor and a fighter.


"Maybe it is more than coincidence that the nucleus of his side (and backroom staff, editor) is made up of men who were first shown the rugby ropes by Scott (and by 'Spanner' and Peter Carey, editor) at Salford.

"So many warmed to his honest approach. He was a father figure to many and a strong source of inspiration and hope.

"Never afraid to roll up his sleeves and graft, Scott has a good reputation in the game as a fair and innovative coach.

"He continues to sidestep and snub the limelight, but as Wigan know too well, a rare smile breaks out when he upsets the applecart.

"He knows the power of self belief. Since taking charge of Oldham that has become a necessity."



How unlucky can you get?

Spare a thought for Craig, out for the season

EVERYONE at the club, not least the fans, will be feeling desperately sorry for Craig Briscoe, who suffered a serious knee injury in a pre-season game at Barrow and has since been told that he won't play again this season.

It was the knee injury all sportsmen dread (just ask Steven Nield about that) ---- a ruptured anterior cruciate ligament as well as severe bruising of the bone.

Craig is now waiting for an operation, to be followed by a week or two on crutches and then months of rehab.

One of our four close-season signings, this former Leigh and Barrow back-rower trained hard all through the rigorous pre-season programme and made his Roughyeds debut in our first warm-up game at Keighley.

He wasn't long into his second game, against his former Barrow team mates up at Craven Park, when he was tackled just short of the line and felt his knee'go'.

"We are upset as a club, but nowhere near as upset as Craig, who was so looking forward to making an impression at Oldham," said chairman Chris Hamilton.

"Hopefully, he will get his operation out of the way as quickly as he can and then he can start on rehab and the long haul back.

"The first thing he told me after the prognosis was that he wanted to remain involved with us. That's a measure of the man. We will do all we can to help him and to speed his return to playing rugby."

That was endorsed by head coach Scott Naylor, who said he felt "desperately sorry" for Briscoe, who hadn't missed a single training session since the annual preseason slog began last autumn.

He went on: "He's a great lad and we were looking forward to seeing how he would play for us in the Championship.

"Injuries are part of the game, but he has been very unlucky with this one. I know he will do all he can to get back playing for Oldham as soon as he can. He deserves to be playing because he's a great lad who will only ever give of his best."



A joiner, 23-year-old Briscoe has accepted that he won't play again this season even though he's walking normally and had only two days off work after his ill-fated return to Craven Park, this time in the 'away' dressing room.

He said: "I was stunned when they gave me the scan results because my knee seemed to be improving day by day.

"There's obviously something wrong with it inside, but it certainly wasn't the news I was expecting.

"I was going for the line when it happened. I was held up just short in a two or three-man tackle. My right foot didn't move, but when one of the Barrow boys came in, my knee twisted and that was it; the damage was done."

"I've some tough times ahead -- like when I'm on crutches after the op ----but I'll be working hard on my rehab and staying involved with the club and the boys in the hope that I can get back into it as quickly as possible.

"That will probably be next season. Anything else would be a bonus."

The best wishes of everyone at the club are extended to Craig for a successful operation and a stress-free period of rehab. Get back as soon as is physically possible.

It perhaps isn't widely known that all Championship clubs have to contribute towards the costs of staging Summer Bash but, like the other 11, the more tickets we sell from Whitebank the more of our initial outlay we will recoup.

Please note that all rules and regulations, including ticket prices and concessionary qualification, are governed and laid down by the RFL.

Tickets are available in two categories ---- CAT. 1, reserved seats in West Stand (same side as the tunnel); CAT. 2, unreserved seats in North Stand and in South Stand (behind the posts at each end).

Concessionary tickets are available to 65s and over; students with valid ID, to be shown on the day; 16s and under; serving Military with valid ID, shown on the day.

TICKET PRICES

One-day tickets (available ONLY for the day your team plays, Sunday in our case): reserved seats (Cat 1), £30 adults, £15 concessions; season-ticket holders, £15 adults, £7.50 concessions; unreserved seats (Cat 2), £20 adults, £10 concessions; season-ticket holders, £10 adults, £5 concessions.

Two-day (weekend) tickets: reserved seats (Cat 1), £50 adults, £25 concessions; season-ticket holders, £25 adults, £12.50 concessions; unreserved seats (Cat 2), £30 adults, £15 concessions; season-ticket holders, £15 adults, £7.50 concessions.

POINTS TO NOTE

- 1: Alternating between North and South Stands (both unreserved) is NOT permitted.
- 2: Weekend (two day) fans get only ONE ticket, which must be retained for the Sunday.
- 3: Children under 2 go FREE, but MUST have a ticket
- 4: Wheelchair users MUST make pre-arrangements with the RFL.

A WALK DOWN MEMORY LANE

HAVING been an Oldham supporter for 60 years I've stacked up a veritable encyclopaedia of memories of matches and incidents played out between Oldham and Northern (as I still slip into calling the Bradford club) and, of course, Bradford's internationally famous stadium - Odsal.

In this FLASHBACK article, I've recalled a selection of those memories, some of which are still vivid, some fading, But, as is the case with most of us of a certain age, I find it simpler to bring forward those recollections that have been stored the longest.

Due to the way rugby league fixtures were structured, Oldham and Bradford didn't play each other as often in the league as they would have preferred and they didn't clash at all between the years 1953 and 1968.

My earliest recollections of the Yorkshire club, its famous Odsal Stadium and rugby league itself go back to 1954 when I was eight years old and didn't know much, if anything, about rugby. I certainly didn't know that Halifax and Warrington, the league's two top teams of the era, had just slogged out a boring 4-4 draw in that year's Challenge Cup Final at Wembley.

The replay was booked for Bradford Northern's Odsal Bowl where, despite a shortage of thrills and spills in the Wembley showdown, more than 100,000 spectators turned out for the Wednesday evening decider. The official attendance was 102,659, but lots of fans gained entry illegally while others, stuck in long traffic jams, didn't get anywhere near the stadium.

So, as you would be forgiven for asking, what has this to do with an eight year old who didn't have a clue about rugby league?

Well, brought up in Watersheddings I was used to rugby traffic on Saturday afternoons, but not in midweek, so I was understandably confused that particular Wednesday afternoon by the sheer volume of cars and coaches – mostly coaches hired from dozens of northern towns and cities - which snaked up Ripponden Road and Huddersfield Road, ferrying Warrington fans to Odsal.

Traffic came to a standstill at the

Lancashire boundary, many realising then that they would never make the match on time.

For the record , Warrington won 8-4 in a far more entertaining game than in the final with Jim Challinor and Gerry Helme, both of whom would later manage Oldham, scoring the two Warrington tries.

... what has this to do with an eight year old who didn't have a clue about rugby league?

The following Saturday it was the turn of Halifax fans to pass by Hill Stores when they threaded through the town in the opposite direction on their way to Manchester City's Maine Rd stadium to take on the Wire in the Championship Final. Warrington completed the double, winning by the narrowest of margins.

Fast forward three years and Oldham were crowned rugby league champions in front of what appeared to be a packed 62,000 Odsal crowd. The question of how at least another 40,000 had been allowed in for the Warrington-Halifax replay can only be answered by the fact that it bordered on the insane.

In October 1960, Alan Davies, Oldham's prince of centres, played in the World Cup decider against Australia on the Bradford pitch. Played on a mud-heap in pouring rain, with a French referee in a pitchbattle that was more reminiscent of the Somme, the British stoutly held their lines to beat the old enemy 10-3. We supporters were soaked to the skin; so much so that during the journey back to Oldham the coach driver couldn't stop the windows from steaming up and when driving on those winding Pennine roads, that's a worry!

the league and also in the second round of the Challenge Cup.

Northern, after their financial hiccup, were on the up again and Roughyeds boasted a fairly strong team as well. The tie was played at Odsal, where Bradford were urged on by a 17,500 crowd. After a thrilling 80 minutes, with the score locked at 7-7, Oldham had forced the Yorkshire side back to Watersheddings for a mid-week replay. The old ground appeared to be bulging at the seams when 18,260 spectators paid to watch.


One of the most successful transfer deals Oldham negotiated during the years I've supported them was in the early 70s when Bradford's half-back David Treasure arrived at Watersheddings. He was a Northern sub in the 1973 Challenge Cup final and was both lightening fast and elusive, this resulting in him playing for Wales in the 1975 World Cup out in Australia. Oldham certainly got a good return for their money when he scored 38 tries in 112 matches before he left for Leeds in a £5,000 deal.

Season 1996 and with it came the birth of Super League. Most clubs adopted nick-names. Northern became Bulls and Oldham the Bears. The Bulls charged down the Bears with relative ease in each of the four Super League games played between the two sides, also ousting the Bears in similar style from the 1997 Challenge Cup.

Like Bradford all those years earlier,
Oldham also hit a financial brick wall
at the end of the second Super
League season, this forcing them into
liquidation. The club was re-formed
as Oldham RLFC (1997) Ltd and
following the recruitment of a posse
of new faces, including former Bulls
players, Sean Cooper, Graeme Shaw,
Nathan Varley and Jason Clegg, the
new club took a place in the 1998
Second Division Championship.

Since then the two clubs have played each other just the once when Oldham were overcome in the 2014 Challenge Cup.

Winger Brian Lord and loose-forward John Rae, a Cumbrian, were signed by Northern in low-cost transfer deals from Oldham, Rae proving a shrewd buy at £1,250 when he progressed to play for Great Britain. Lord, too, gave good service and I'm pleased to report that to this day he is an active member of Oldham's Players' Association.

As I wrote earlier, Oldham and Northern didn't play each other on a regular basis for many years, but that changed in season 1967-68 when we faced one another home and away in Oldham won the rematch 12-2 with a brace of tries from Bob Irving and three goals from the boot of Brain Curry. All to no avail, though, as Roughyeds drew Leeds in the next round and exited the competition.

The Oldham side for that replay was B. Curry, M. Elliott, J. McCormack, J. Donovan, M. Murphy, W. Briggs, T. Canning, K. Wilson, K. Taylor, G. Fletcher, R. Irving, C. McCourt, A. Hughes. Subs: T. Davies, C. Smith.

The former Salford and Saints man (25) is expected to star again in 2016, though it has to be said that Bulls have potential matchwinners right across the park.


At Bower Fold today, Lowes will pick from these:

- 1: OSCAR THOMAS (22, full-back) -- signed last August from London Broncos, having made 22 appearances in total in Super League and Championship.
- 2: OMARI CARO (24, winger) -- said to be a real flier. Born in London, he first played for Bulls in last year's Super 8s. Has also won rep honours with Jamaica.
- 3: ADRIAN PURTELL (31, centre) captain this year, his fifth at the club. An Aussie born in Albury, New South Wales, he played for NRL sides Canberrra Raiders and Penrith Panthers before coming to England.
- **4: KRIS WELHAM** (28, centre) -- spent ten seasons at Hull KR before joining Bulls for 2016 and 2017.
- 5: DANNY WILLIAMS (29, winger) a product of the Leeds Rhinos nursery, he has also played for Hull FC, Castleford Tigers and Salford Red Devils. Last season scored 25 tries in 26 games.

- 6: LEE GASKELL (25, half-back) -- won four club awards in his Bulls debut season of 2014. Last year 20 tries in 21 games. Previously played for Salford and Saints.
- 8: PAUL CLOUGH: (28, prop) -- part of St Helens' 2006 treble-winning squad, he was loaned to Widnes in 2014 before signing for Bulls at the start of 2015. 32 appearances last year.
- 9: ADAM O'BRIEN (22, hooker) -- A Bulls' academy product, he spent 2013 on loan to Dewsbury Rams. Broke into the Bulls first team in 2014.
- 10: ADAM SIDLOW (28, prop) arrived at the Provident Stadium in 2013 from Salford Red Devils. Also played in the second tier with Workington Town and Widnes Vikings.
- 11: TOM ALBISON (24, back-row) -- Another product of the club's academy. Made his debut as an 18-year-old.
- 12: DALE FERGUSON (27, second-row) arrived from Huddersfield Giants in 2013. Also played for Wakefield Trinity Wildcats and had a loan spell at Hull KR. Nine appearances for Scotland.
- **13: DANNY ADDY** (25, back-row) one of the longest-serving players at the club. Made senior debut in 2010, aged 19.
- 14: JAY PITTS (26, back-row) -- arrived from Hull FC in 2014. Also played for Leeds Rhinos and Wakefield Trinity Wildcats. A real utility man.
- **15: MATTY BLYTHE** (27, centre) -- Born in Irlam, he played for Warrington Wolves and Leigh Centurions before joining Bulls in 2014.
- 16: DAN FLEMING (23, prop) -- Born in Halifax, he has also played in Super League with Castleford Tigers and in the Championship with Batley Bulldogs and Rochdale Hornets.

- 17: JEAN-PHILIPPE BAILE (28, centre) -- 22 caps for France, seven seasons with Catalan Dragons, played for France in two World Cup competitions.
- 19: STEVE CROSSLEY (25, prop) -- First burst on to the Bradford scene in 2010 and then had stints at Dewsbury Rams and Featherstone Rovers before returning to the Provident Stadium.
- 20: MITCH CLARK (22, prop) -- New Zealander in his first season with the Bulls. Played initially in Australia with Penrith Panthers before coming to England to play for Doncaster.
- 21: EPALAHAME LAUAKI (32, prop) -- signed this season from Manly Sea Eagles. Also played for Hull FC and Wigan Warriors. Born in New Zealand, he is one of six front-rowers in the squad.
- 22: JAMES CLARE (24, wing) -- signed from Castleford Tigers on a two-year deal late last summer.
- 23: ALEX MELLOR (21, second-row) -- Halifaxborn, graduated from the academy and last season renewed his contract for a further two years.
- 24: LUCAS WALSHAW (23, back-row) -- standing at 6ft 5in, formerly of Wakefield Trinity Wildcats, for whom he made his senior debut aged 18.
- 25: BEN KAVANAGH (28, prop) -- Made more than 150 appearances in total for Widnes Vikings and Wakefield Trinity Wildcats. Signed for Bulls for two years.
- 26: VILA HALAFIHI (22, hooker) -- Leeds-born and a product of the Rhinos academy. Moved Down Under to play for Penrith Panthers and arrived back in the UK to become a Bull before the start of last season.
- 27: JOHNNY WALKER (25, prop) -- signed last November from Leigh. Super League experience with Hull KR and Castleford Tigers and a loan spell at Wigan Warriors plus time at Gateshead Thunder, Doncaster, Whitehaven and London Broncos.
- 28: KURT HAGGERTY (27, second-row) signed last November from Leigh Centurions. Also played for Widnes Vikings, Leigh (twice), Barrow Raiders and Blackpool Panthers.
- 29: ETHAN RYAN (19, centre) worked his way up from the academy and one of the youngest members of the squad.

- **30: JOE LUMB** (19, hooker) Another youngster on the way up, he played in both pre-season friendlies this year against Leeds and Castleford.
- 31: JAMES MENDEIKA (24, utility back) Irish international formerly with Featherstone Rovers after spells with Leigh and Swinton. Worked under James Lowes as a Warrington Wolves academy starlet.
- **32: JONNY CAMPBELL** (28, winger) -- signed for two years from Batley Bulldogs, for whom he made 125 appearances.
- **33: ETU UAISELE** (31, wing) -- born in Tonga, previously played for Paramatta Eels, Penrith Panthers, Featherstone Rovers, Sheffield Eagles and Dewsbury Rams.
- 34: RICHIE MATHERS (32, full-back) -- joined Bulls in January this year, A former England international, he signed for Bradford while remaining player welfare manager at Warrington Wolves. Also played in the NRL.





GARY Middlehurst, the latest addition to our forward pack, has built himself a reputation over the last few years as a highly-respected back-row forward and one of the most experienced in the Kingstone Press divisions.

He had a couple of seasons at Rochdale before becoming a mainstay of the North Wales Crusaders side that narrowly pipped us to the automatic promotion spot from League One in 2013; finished higher than Rochdale, Swinton and Barrow in the 2014 Championship campaign; and then won the 2015 iPro Sport Cup with the 14-8 defeat of Swinton Lions in the final at Blackpool on Summer Bash weekend.

To get there they won a semi-final thriller against Roughyeds at Whitebank 18-16, although Gary didn't play in that game because of injury.

He played in most of the other Oldham-Crusaders games though since 2013, four won by Crusaders, two by Roughyeds.

In 2013, Scott's first season in charge at Whitebank, the Welsh side beat us 48-12 at Wrexham in what was then the Northern Rail Cup. It was our young side's very first game under Scott's tutelage and Crusaders capitalised on their far greater experience to score eight tries, one of them by Middlehurst.

By the time we returned to Wrexham in the league we had grown in stature and confidence, narrowly losing this one 22-20 and conceding two tries to Middlehurst, who went on to become the Crusaders' 2013 players' player of the year.

We avenged those two defeats at Wrexham with a 28-10 victory on home soil as both teams went neck-and-neck for top spot in League won, Crusaders getting there finally with only two points to spare.

We didn't meet in 2014, when Crusaders were in the Championship, but in 2015 we again had three great games against them, the Welshmen prevailing in the iPro Sport Cup semi-final and in the league game at Whitebank, but our boys pulling off a magnificent 23-6 victory at Wrexham as one of 14 wins in a row.

In his three seasons at Wrexham, Middlehurst scored 24 tries in 62 appearances. In 2013 he was the club's only ever-present and his haul of 16 tries placed him second in his club's try-scoring list to winger Rob Massam on 25.

It says much about his work ethic and his regard for his team mates that he was voted players' player of the year in both 2013 and 2014

"He's a top player. We are confident he will make a big contribution this season."

As Scott has said: "Whenever we've played Crusaders in the past three years, Gary has been one of their top men. He works hard, plays the game tough -- how I like it -- and he never takes a backward step, which is very important in the Championship.

"We've done well to get him in competition with other clubs. He will be a great addition to the squad. I'm looking forward to seeing him in the Oldham jersey."

Aged 32, but claiming: "People reckon I look no more than 25", Gary is contracted to the club to November 30. He has recently returned from long-distance travelling with his wife Kelly, so it will take him some little time to get in shape for his first game as a Roughyed.

He added: "I'm naturally fit, so it won't take me long. In fact, I lost a bit of weight while we were on our travels.

"I'm looking forward to a new challenge, a new club and a new set of lads. I used to watch Scott when he was a player and now he's going to be coaching me. I'm looking forward to that as well.

"Ar 32, some people might say I am getting on a bit, but I feel as good as ever and I reckon I've a good two years left in me yet."

Final word goes to our club chairman Chris Hamilton, who said several clubs were interested in the player, some from the Championship, some from League One.

"He's a top player. We are confident he will make a big contribution this season," said Chris.
