This will enable youngsters to combine an education with professional Rugby League guidance under the umbrella of Swinton Lions, and will lead to the formation in time of our own Academy team and hence provide a player pathway to the Swinton Lions first team.

We are also involved with Edstart, who provide fantastic support to local Primary School children in terms of lifestyle and sporting activities. In addition we are in the process of forming a relationship with the Wood Street Mission, a remarkable local charity who support under privileged children across Salford and Manchester. Hopefully you will have also taken the trouble to pop down to our community event a few weeks ago, which took place at Agecroft on the site of our proposed new stadium. With regard to all of these issues we will continue to keep our supporters updated.

Finally, a couple of dates for your diary. Friday 23 September (at Swinton Park Golf Club) is when we will be holding our special 150th Anniversary Special Dinner and End of Season Presentation. There will be a three-course dinner and live entertainment, plus there are plans to showcase some of our remarkable heritage. There will also be the traditional presentations to the Lions that have excelled this season. Also, on the exact date of our 150th birthday, Thursday 20 October 2016, there will be a special service at St Peter's Church of celebration, remembrance and commemoration. The church played a significant part in our formation back in 1866, and this seems the most appropriate place in Swinton to mark the actual day. It will not be an overtly religious occasion and everyone is welcome regardless of religious or non-religious beliefs.

Last but not least look out for the special Heritage Kit that will be worn by the Lions in our game at Halifax on 11 September, plus there will be a superb 150th Anniversary book which is due to be available sometime in the autumn.

SCOTT Naylor has warned his Oldham players that the 30-16 win against Workington was merely the start of the final push to secure Championship survival. With six games to play, Roughyeds are five points better off than Workington and Whitehaven, the bottom two, and one point up on Swinton Lions, who they play next Sunday at Heywood Road, home of Sale RU Club. Referring to Oldham's latest victory, Naylor said: "The result was everything. In terms of a survival 'four pointer' it was as big as it gets.

The win puts us in a strong position, but that's all it does. "It doesn't guarantee us anything. There's still six games to play and a lot of points to be won. We've a lot of hard work ahead." Back-row forward Craig Briscoe hobbled off with a knee injury, which was due to be investigated over the past week. He saw only a couple of minute of the action, but Naylor said the other players whom he recalled (Lewis Palfrey, Joe Burke and Sammy Gee) plus debut-boy Scott Turner contributed famously to a fully-deserved win.

Turner, playing full-back, scored two tries for Roughyeds, while others came from Jamel Chisholm, Jack Blagbrough and Danny Langtree. Lewis Palfrey kicked five goals from five attempts. Roughyeds led 24-6 at half-time and then held off a spirited Town fightback which produced two late tries.

Subs: Gee, Briscoe, Hughes, Blagbrough A GREAT day for the club... that was how Scott Naylor summed up his joy and satisfaction when asked to paraphrase his feelings in no more than six words. A comprehensive 30-16 win against Cumbrian opponents who had twice previously this season turned Roughyeds over opened up a five-point gap at the lower end of the Championship table between Naylor's men and the bottom two, Workington and Whitehaven.

Said Naylor: "The biggest difference between this performance and how we played against Workington a fortnight ago (Town won 32-30 at Bower Fold) was how our forwards got stuck in and played with desire and a lot of physicality. Our middle unit was superb. "We made a few changes and the lads who came in were terrific. "I don't normally talk about individuals, but this time I'm going to because Scott Turner, in his first game for us, was top class at full-back.

After a performance like that on debut he deserves some plaudits. "He scored two tries, had another disallowed, never put a foot wrong in defense and got us out of trouble a few times with his speed and footwork. "The second half wasn't what I was hoping for, but we got across the line because we worked hard to preserve our lead when we were putting ourselves under pressure. It would have been better if we hadn't put ourselves in that position in the first place, but at least we coped with it admirably."

Dewsbury took the spoils in this game of two halves as they held on to thwart a late Lions fightback, in which full back Chris Atkin passed the five hundred points mark for the club with his final kick.

Veteran Paul Sykes gave his side the lead in the fifth minute following a short pass from Andy Kain and Sykes added the conversion to his own try. The Lions then had a couple of good chances when Macauley Hallett and Mike Butt both went close but the Rams defence although stretched, managed to hold out and they scored a second try against the run of play midway through the half when Sykes scored again on the right but missed the conversion to this one.

The Lions then had another couple of chances but the last pass went to ground on both occasions and the home side added two more tries in a four minute period before the break with Joel Farrell and Lucas Walshaw both going over from short range and Sykes converted both but the Rams were reduced to twelve men on the stroke of half time when Jason Crookes was sent to the sin bin for a high tackle on Hallett but they held a commanding lead at the break.

Swinton started the second half well with the forwards matching the Rams large pack in the middle and Jake Emmitt had a solid debut for his new team but it was a Rams error that got the Lions on the scoreboard six minutes into the second half when Kain tried to pass to his winger on the right and Hallett intercepted and raced half the length of the field to score on the left and Atkin added the conversion points. Walshaw was placed on report for the Rams on fifty-one minutes for an alleged shoulder charge on Connor Dwyer who had to leave the field with a head injury which could put him out for a few weeks.

The Rams scored another try against the run of play when Josh Guzdek scored by the posts on the hour and Sykes converted and then added a penalty for a high tackle a few minutes later to stretch the lead and then Dom Speakman found his way over for a try by the posts and again Sykes added the conversion before the Lions continued their fightback as firstly with ten minutes left Josh Barlow crashed over by the posts from short range and Atkin converted again.

Four minutes later, Butt scored a good try when Atkin kicked the ball for the left corner and Rams' winger Dale Morton thought it was going to roll dead but the Lions winger had other thoughts and chased it down to touch it down as it was about to run over the dead ball line and Atkin again added the conversion points.

The final try came with a minute left when the Rams were on the attack in the Swinton twenty and Rhodri Lloyd intercepted a pass and raced eighty metres to score on the left and Atkin added the conversion just before the final hooter sounded to claim his club milestone.

Bulldogs levelled on ten minutes when Alistair Leek went over by the post after Keegan Hirst had gone close and Pat Walker converted and it got even better for the visitors who had brought a large following with them when firstly good passing saw Chris Ulugia go over on the left and two minutes afterwards Wayne Reittie latched onto a Dom Brambani kick to score and Walker converted one of them.

The Lions were placed on a team warning on seventeen minutes because of all the penalties they were giving away and a minute later Andy Thornley was sin binned for holding down and Walker kicked a simple penalty goal.

Reittie forced a goal line drop out on twenty minutes and from this pressure Leek went over for his second try and Walker converted. The home side then had a couple of chances but the final pass went to ground and the Bulldogs went further ahead when Shaun Squires scored from another Brambani kick through but Walker missed the conversion.

The Lions did hit back with a second try four minutes from the break when Josh Barlow crashed over by the posts and Atkin converted but the Bulldogs were well ahead at the break.

It got better at the start of the second half when Ulugia scored his second after a Lions' handing error and again the conversion was true and four minutes later they were in again when another Lions' error saw Brad Day score by the posts and Walker again made no mistake. Dave Scott made an error fielding the ball in goal on fifty minutes and the goal line drop out was awarded but from this the ball went to ground again and Scott it was who swept it up and put his team on the attack which ended with former Lion James Brown scoring in the right corner but the conversion was missed.

The Lions came back again on sixty-four minutes when Connor Dwyer started a move which ended with Ben White breaking through to feed Thornley who went in for the try and Atkin converted again. Barlow was sent to the sin bin for an alleged punch on Brambani and a couple of minutes later Shaun Ainscough finished off a move on the left and the conversion was again good but Swinton came back again when Atkin broke to feed Matty Beharrell who scored by the posts and Atkin again converted.

The Bulldogs finished the game with two more tries in the final five minutes when Ainscough and Brambani bani both scored and Walker added another conversion as the hooter sounded.

<u>Lions Through The Decades - 1950s</u>

Rugby League enjoyed a post-war boom in popularity that gathered pace in the 1950s as attendances increased. Swinton benefited with better home crowds and also through continuing to stage major games at the spacious Station Road. The Lions competed well throughout the decade and crucially put in place the foundations for future success.

The decade started well enough for Swinton with Frank Osmond being selected for the 1950 Great Britain Tour to Australia and New Zealand. The summer months saw the arrival of key signings including Peter Norburn from Worsley Boys club in Wigan. The team had a modest 1950-51 season after a poor start and eventually finished with the retirement of stalwart forward Jack Stoddart after 19 years with the club.

On 7 April 1951, the record attendance at Station Road was set when 44,621 people watched Wigan beat Warrington in the Challenge Cup semi-final; although the ground was not full. Further work at the Pendlebury Road end meant the capacity was close to 60,000; however, this limit was never put to the test although many big crowds attended future matches.

In the autumn of 1951, Station Road staged the Great Britain versus New Zealand Test match which was the first-ever rugby league game screened live on national television by the BBC. The broadcast programme had an estimated 3 million viewers. The 1951-52 season continued the trend of indifferent team form although around this time the club signed an exciting young stand-off named George Parkinson from Whelley Juniors, another club in Wigan. Off the field, Chairman Jack Robertson was replaced by Bill Scholes.

At the end of the 1953-54 season, Cliff Evans replaced Griff Jenkins as coach; and so began one of the most spectacular coaching careers in modern-day rugby league. Cliff was an inspiration figure at the club who specialised in developing young players and advanced training techniques. Incidentally, team selection during this period was often hampered by call-up to National Service as happened to prop-forward Eddie Billington who was posted to Germany.

After an indifferent start as head coach, Cliff Evans worked hard on team fitness as well as signing some promising young players, including Swinton legend Ken Gowers. The start of 1955 saw an upturn in form and the season ended with victory over Salford and an unexpected defeat in the first-ever visit to play Blackpool Borough. Around this time, local adversaries Belle Vue Rangers folded after being formed in 1877.

Throughout the remainder of the decade, the Lions showed signs of improving form. The 1955-56 season ended in a credible tenth place with local players such as Brian Critchley and Peter Smethurst combining well with the Wigan contingent; that now included club captain Albert Blan. The relatively young squad battled well over the next two seasons and even played in the famous "V" shirt for the first time against Rochdale Hornets in the 1957-58 season with a white jersey and single blue chevron design. Also, the cinder running track was extended around the pitch for training purposes and the team finished sixth in the 1958-59 season, which included impressive displays from winger Johnny Stopford.

The afternoon's entertainment will begin with the traditional schoolboy curtain raiser which this year sees St Peters of Wigan take on Castleford Academy in the Champion Schools Year 7 Boys Final.

<u>Lions Through The Decades - 1960s</u>

The 1960s is remembered locally in Swinton as a period of glorious success played-out in a magnificent sporting arena. Under the shrewd coaching of Cliff Evans and the clever captaincy of Albert Blan, the Lions played entertaining and effective rugby league football.

The Lions secured a 12-5 victory over Salford at Station Road on New Year's Day 1960 and a week later, an exciting young player named Alan Buckley made his first-team debut. The scene was now set for a wonderful sporting odyssey for many years ahead with the Swinton back division in particular, considered as one of the most creative in the league.

The 1960-61 season began well enough with winger Johnny Stopford scoring a string of tries assisted ably by his centre partner Alan Buckley. Although the Lions lost the Lancashire Cup Final to St Helens, later in the season another Swinton stalwart made his debut, namely Bob Fleet. Great individual displays from the likes of Peter Smethurst meant the Lions finished third in the league and won the Lancashire League in the process, but the team lost the Championship play-off at Warrington.

During the summer of 1961, the club constructed the iconic goalposts at Station Road standing at over 58 feet tall. The following season, the Lions combined with Salford to form a Manchester XIII against the touring New Zealanders played at White City, Manchester but the Lions then lost the Lancashire Cup final again to St Helens.

In the 1962-63 season, the RFL introduced a two division set-up, but in the early stages of the campaign the Lions lost the Lancashire Cup final against St Helens. The winter months that followed were known as the "big freeze" which delayed fixtures for ten weeks. Then the Lions went on a terrific 18-game unbeaten run and lifted the First Division Championship even though tragically chairman Bill Scholes died during a home game against Widnes.

This magnificent achievement was re-enforced the following season when the Lions won the First Division Championship again in 1963-64 with excellent attacking football in front of huge crowds at Station Road. Forwards such as Derek Clarke, Ron Morgan, Graham Rees and Barry Simpson matched most opposing packs with the Swinton backs including Albert Cartwright, George Parkinson Ken Gowers, John Speed and Graham Williams ripping apart opposing defences.

The Lions reached the Lancashire Cup Final the following season losing once more to St Helens as the RFL reverted back to one division and around this time new star players joined the squad such as Billy Davies and Derek Whitehead. The Lions then lost a Challenge Cup semi-final to Wigan at St Helens. Dave Robinson emerged as a major find at loose forward, who along with Alan Buckley, Ken Gowers and Johnny Stopford were selected to tour with Great Britain in 1966.

The following seasons the team played touring teams from Australia and New Zealand and Station Road hosted Test Matches and Challenge Cup semi-finals as a Wembley appearance eluded the team. The Lions reached the Floodlit Trophy final against Castleford in 1966 after installing floodlights in 1964 and Swinton finally won the Lancashire Cup in 1969 defeating Leigh.


