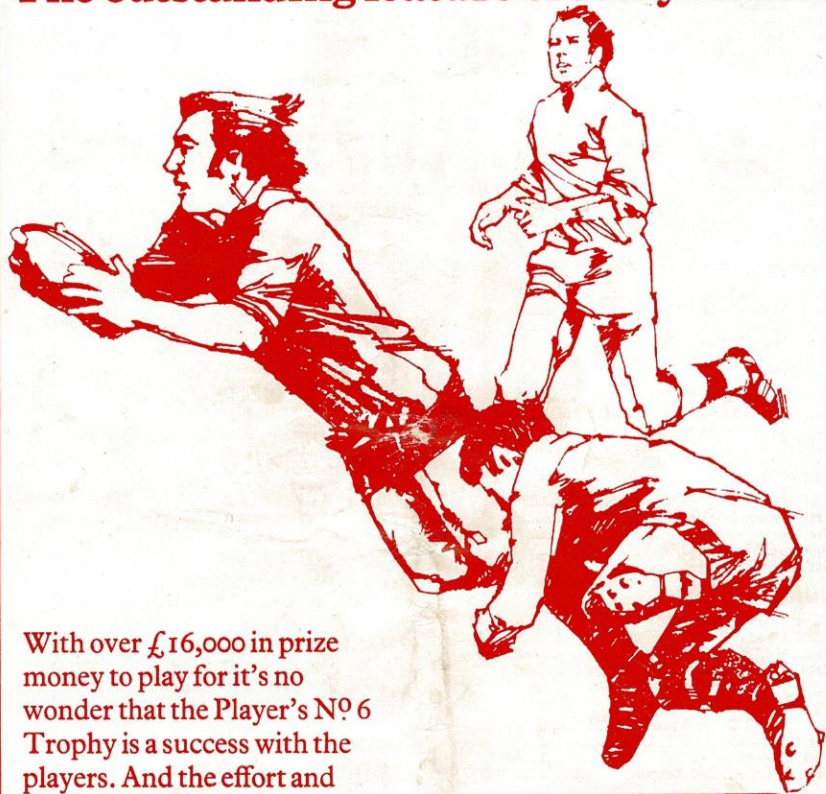


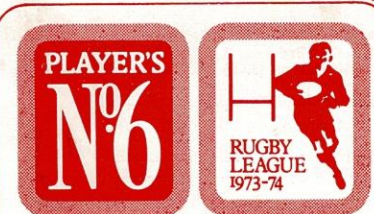

Rugby League has long been neglected in the world of literature when it comes to sporting publications. There have been several annuals and magazines but few have measured up to those in the field of soccer, cricket, golf and Rugby Union. But at last the game is given the sort of recognition and respect it deserves with the birth of the John Player Rugby League Year-book.

This edition is presented in a highly attractive and interesting form which should help lift the game's sagging image. It should fill a tremendous gap on the bookshelves of Rugby League fans who yearn to learn more about their own team, other teams and the game in general. It provides the sort of statistics that the average fan should enjoy reading about for after all Rugby League has a varied following from the professions, the offices, the mills and the mines.

These fans all have the same interests at heart and have helped to push the cloth cap image into the background in what some people like to insist is purely a working class game. There is a fine blend of the factual down-to-earth approach and sophisticated style in this book, which caters for the tastes of all

types of followers. It traces the breakaway from Rugby Union and provides histories of the game in this country, Australia, New Zealand, and France.

One of the most appealing features of this book, which I feel is reasonably priced even at £1.50, is the large number of photographs and the general glossy presentation. It has already met with an encouraging response from those players and officials who have had a chance to devour its contents.

Great Britain scrum half Steve Nash says: "I think it is a fine book and one which was needed in the game. I've enjoyed reading it and feel it is a book which you can repeatedly refer to as the season goes on." Welsh star David Watkins said: "It is a most comprehensive publication, attractively presented and I think it will appeal to everyone in the game."

Inside Central Park

Wigan and Oldham should know each other pretty well by now. Tonight's match is the third meeting of the two clubs this month, and they are paired again in a Northern League match at the end of September!

This curious situation has been brought about purely by the luck of the draw and other clubs have found themselves in similar circumstances. Castleford and Huddersfield cross each other's path frequently, while Leeds and Bradford Northern are enjoying more than their usual share of derby games. In Lancashire, Salford have to tackle Widnes in the first round of the Captain Morgan Trophy after knocking the same team out of the Country Cup Competition.

As you will know, Wigan have been drawn at home to Warrington in the Captain Morgan Trophy and a date for this match will be announced shortly.

Central Park has been chosen as the venue for this season's Great Britain versus France match. It will take place on Sunday, 17th February, 1974 — a date to note in your diary. Don't forget the match which takes place at Widnes tomorrow night when Lancashire entertain Yorkshire in a game which will decide the County Championship.

Wigan are now part way through a very busy nine day period during which four games will be played. On

Thursday we travel to Workington for our third cup-tie in six days. For any supporters who may be travelling, the kick-off in this Lancashire Cup semi-final is at 5.30 p.m. Apparently most Cumbrians are taking it for granted that Whitehaven and Workington Town will be this season's finalists, but both Salford and ourselves beg to differ on this point.

There has been an innovation this season on the international Rugby League scene. Home and away matches will be played between Great Britain and France at Under-21 level. Clubs have been asked to submit the names of likely candidates for the British team.

For the second successive match, a "curtain-raiser" is being staged at Central Park. On Saturday there was a match between local school teams from John Fisher and Golborne, and tonight it is the turn of the Oldham and Wigan Under-15's. This match will commence at approximately 6.15 p.m.

The Australian Rugby League tourists begin their programme with a match at Salford on 30th September. Even though Wigan have no fixture with the "Kangaroos" this time, we hope you will take the opportunity of watching them at another venue. The full itinerary is set out on page ten.

The Oldham Story

The history of rugby football in Oldham goes back to February, 1873, when at a meeting at the Prince Albert Hotel, Union Street, Oldham, it was decided to form a Rugby Union football club. Although rugby had previously been played in the town at Werneth, the Oldham club date their history from 1873. The first games were on a field behind the Glodwick Mill and the dressing rooms at the Shakespeare Hotel, Glodwick. The first match was against Stalybridge on 17th February, 1873, and the club's colours were black and amber.

A move was made to Clarksfield, where admission could be charged and in 1889 they moved to the present Watersheddings ground. Swinton were the first visitors and defeated their hosts.

Oldham were one of the pioneer members of the Northern Union when the "split" occurred in 1895 and in the first season they tied with Runcorn for the Lancashire section of the Championship. Another early honour was when they won the N.U. Challenge Cup, being the first Lancashire Club to take the trophy by beating Hunslet 19 points to nine at the Fallowfield Grounds, Manchester. Although Oldham have subsequently won the Challenge

Cup in 1925 and 1927 and been runners-up on four occasions they have never appeared at Wembley.

More recent successes have been achieved in the other competitions, mainly during the mid-'fifties when they were consistently high in the League and provided internationals such as Frank Pitchford, Alan Davies, Sid Little, Bernard Ganley, Charlie Winslade and Derek Turner. The Northern League Championship was won in 1956-57 when Hull were the runners-up, the Lancashire County Cup was won on three successive occasions in 1956, '57 and '58 and the Lancashire County League trophy was obtained in seasons 1956-57 and 1957-58. Oldham won the Second Division Championship in 1963-64.

The first secretary of the Northern League from 1895 to 1920 was an Oldham man, Mr. Joseph Platt, who was elected Secretary at the George Hotel, Huddersfield, when the "split" from Rugby Union took place.

The ground capacity of Watersheddings is now 18,500 with covered accommodation on all sides. The record attendance before the new limit was imposed was 28,000 for a match against Huddersfield in 1912.

B.B.C. 2 TV FLOODLIT COMPETITION

Tonight Wigan will endeavour to improve on the two point advantage gained in the first leg of this Preliminary Round match at Oldham last Tuesday. This will entitle us to a home game against the winners of the Rochdale Hornets and Swinton tie.

Last year Wigan progressed to the second round. Halifax were the visitors to Central Park in the first round, and they were defeated by 26 points to six. However, in the next round - another home game - Leigh gained a narrow victory by 16 points to 14. Wigan supporters

were still able to witness the final for this was contested at Central Park by Widnes and Leigh.

The highest crowd at a Floodlit Final was recorded at Central Park in 1968 when Wigan played St. Helens.

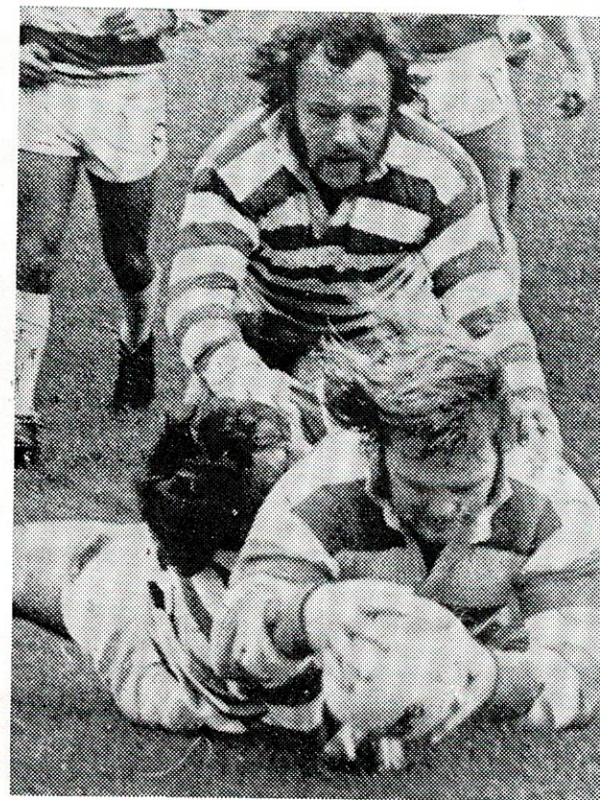
