



John Butler — Late Selection

John Butler's selection for Great Britain's tour of Australia this summer was a little belated but still one of the most popular in the 26-strong squad.

It is generally accepted that all the players heading Down Under on May 23 are dedicated and determined to succeed in the quest to regain the Ashes.

But I was impressed by the immediate reaction of Butler when discovered he was to replace Salford's Keith Fielding, who withdrew for personal reasons.

'I am not going out there to be a ham-and-egger,' he declared. 'I want to win a Test place.'

That honest approach is characteristic of a player, who has quickly carved out a dazzling new career with Rochdale Hornets when he was almost swept up to the game's scrapheap.

There was a most unhappy chapter in the Butler success story when he was forced to retire injured in the Player's No. 6 final against Warrington, after making a great start in this game.

Fortunately Butler has made a habit of bouncing back as he did after packing in the game 12 months ago.

'I was fed up with travelling from my St. Helens home to play for Keigh-

ley and decided to call it a day,' he recalls.

'But when Rochdale came for me I had second thoughts and decided to start again.'

It was, of course, coach Frank Myler's experienced eye and sound judgement which prompted the Butler switch from loose forward to stand off.

After winning recognition from Great Britain's selectors to travel to France as reserve, it must have been a disappointment to Butler to find he had failed to win an original place in the 26-strong tour party.

The value of Butler's inclusion is that he can play loose froward, stand off or even centre for he is powerful, skilful and enthusiastic.

When he is not working as a mechanic in a St. Helens garage he is improving his home on modern lines or looking into the past.

He spends hours pouring over old programmes, enjoying reading about former stars and would, I reckon, be great material for a sporting guiz panel.

He's a player anxious to enjoy every minute of this coming tour and most of it, I feel, at the expense of the Australians.


